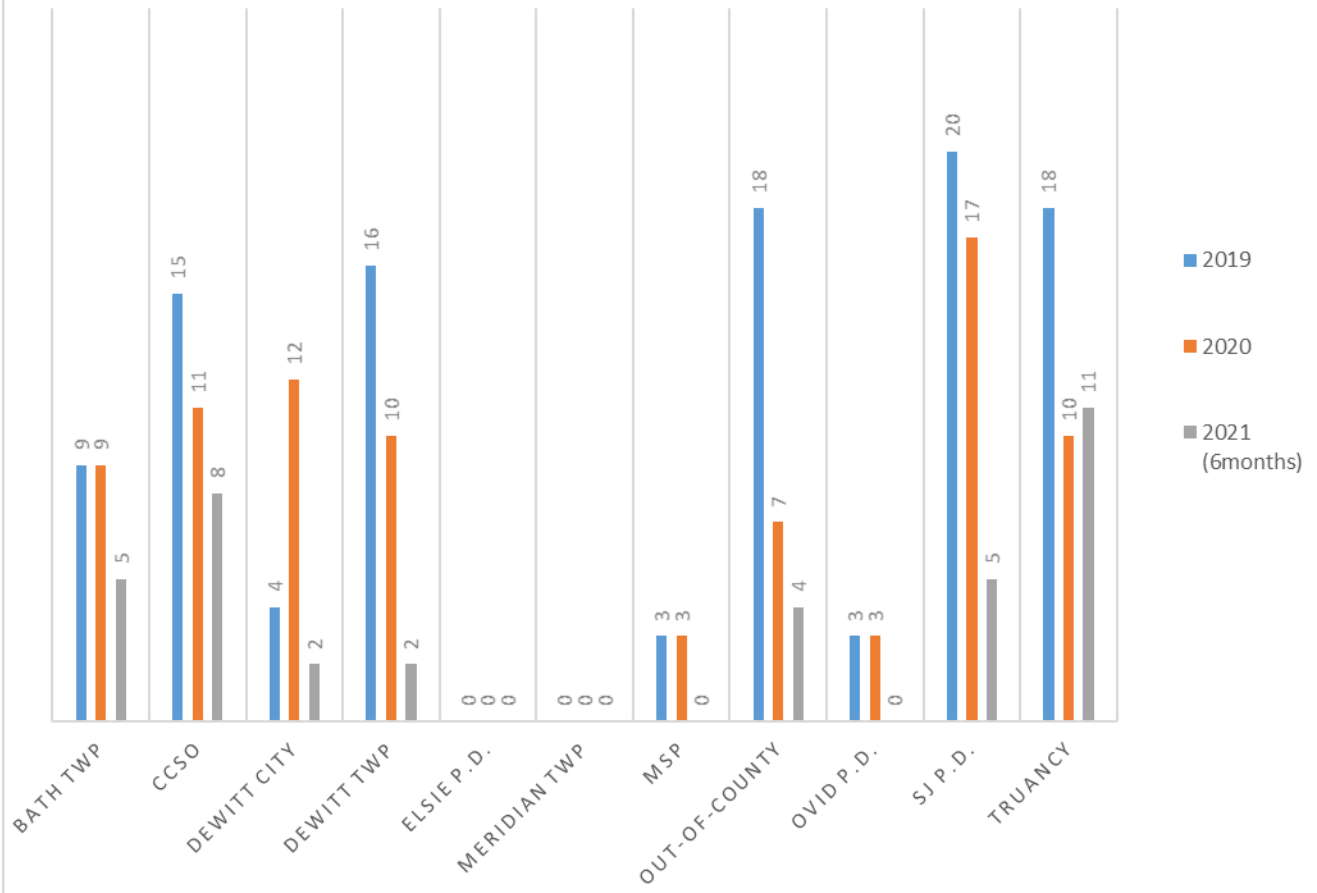

Child Care Fund

In-home Care – Intensive Home and Community-based Services (IHCBS) - In-Home Care (IHC) program expenditures are restricted to new or expanded programs that are alternatives to out-of-home institutional or foster care. IHC funds may not be used to duplicate services. From April 1, 2021 to June 30, 2021 there have been 15 youth served through this program component.

Green Haven Usage – From April 1, 2021 to June 30, 2021, a total of 5 separate youth have resided at Green Haven for a total of 70 days of either secure detention or residential care in the open setting. A total of 7 non-resident youth also received 21 days of day treatment and educational services at the facility.

Institutional Care

- **Court Operated Detention**– From April 1, 2021 to June 30, 2021, no youth were placed in another court, county, or tribe operated facility.
- **Private – In-state Residential Care** – From April 1, 2021 to June 30, 2021, no youth were placed in residential treatment programs.

Triple P (Positive Parenting Program)

Triple P is an evidence-based parenting program that Juvenile Court has just implemented and was approved to receive Child Care Fund reimbursement. Two Juvenile Court staff members were trained in the Level 3 Discussion Groups in June 2021 and are scheduled to test for accreditation in July. Two youth and their parents participated in the Level 4 Standard Teen Triple P program during this report period. One youth and her parents completed the program successfully, and the other continues to participate and make progress.

Additional Programming/Services/Assessments

Youth Level of Service/Case Management Inventory 2.0 (YLS/CMI)

All youth who are opened for services with Juvenile Court are given the YLS/CMI risk/needs assessment to determine their level of risk to reoffend and to assist in program planning. The instrument is administered prior to disposition, and a case management plan is developed. The youth and plans are then reassessed every 90 days thereafter to determine if areas of risk have been reduced, and progress toward goals has been made. Between April 1, 2021 to June 30, 2021, 43 youth were open for services with Juvenile Court and 17 of those finished their terms of probation successfully. 32 youth were administered at least one assessment. Of those 32:

- 17 reduced their risk levels from the initial assessment
- 6 had their levels remain the same (all were at a low risk to begin with)
- 0 raised their risk levels
- 9 have not been reassessed

Community Service

Juvenile Court has coordinated community service activities with various organizations such as the Knights of Columbus, Happy Feet Pet Rescue, Lions Recycling Center, Goodwill, Clinton County Parks and Recreation, Sharing and Caring Family Life Services, Habitat for Humanity, St. Johns City and Police Departments, DeWitt City, the Bath Public Library, Ovid Healthcare Center, and Capital Area Community Services. During the 2nd quarter of 2021 Juvenile Court youth completed 266 hours of community service.

Y.E.S. Program

Clinton County Juvenile Court began facilitating the Youth Empowered to Succeed (Y.E.S.) program for the summer on June 29, 2021. Utilizing the WhyTry Curriculum, the 9 youth, ages 14 through 16, will attend two days per week at Green Haven and five days of Challenge Residential Camp at Eagle Village. So far the program is going very well with youth all participating in the lessons, engaging in activities, and enjoying themselves.

Teen Court

Youth who have been placed on the Consent Calendar and take responsibility for their actions may be offered the opportunity to go before the Teen Court for disposition. No Teen Court hearings were held between April 1, 2021 and June 30, 2021.

Victim/Community Awareness Program

Juvenile Court utilizes the “Victim/Community Awareness Program: An Orientation for Juveniles” curriculum. No groups were held during this quarter due to an insufficient number of youth to participate. At least one will be scheduled for the 3rd quarter.

Truancy Intervention Program (TIP)

Juvenile Court partners with Community Mental Health to conduct mental health screens for pre-adjudicated youth. A licensed CMH therapist determines the need for services, links them with services both in and outside CMH and completes further assessments as needed to ensure timely provision of services. Youth going before a referee on the consent calendar as well as youth going before the Court on Truancy petitions receive screenings. From April 1, 2021 and June 30, 2021 7 youth received mental health screenings through the TIP program.

Criminal Responsibility to Stand Trial

Due process requires that a juvenile must be afforded the right to counsel during court proceedings. This right to counsel means little if the juvenile is unaware of the proceedings or unable to communicate with counsel because of a psychological or developmental disability. No Juvenile Competency Evaluations have been conducted during this report period.

Additional Data for 2nd Quarter 2021

Restitution: \$1774.95 in restitution was collected.

Counseling Services: 20 youth received counseling services through various community agencies.

Employment: 9 youth obtained and/or maintained employment.

Trends and Updates

PA 389 of 2020 (Previously SB 700 of 2020) – Limiting the use of detention for Status Offenders

SB 700 was introduced on January 8, 2020 and came into effect April 4, 2020, coming into compliance with federal laws regarding limiting the use of secure detention for status offenders with an alleged violation of a court order. The Act requires prompt notification to DHHS; an assessment to determine the needs of the youth, a Court hearing to be held to determine probable cause regarding the violation and need for detention, a written report to the court which references the specific order violated, a factual basis to determine whether the juvenile violated the order, and reasons why there is no

appropriate less restrictive placement. The Act limits the number of days a youth can be placed in secure days to no more than 7 days and requires a plan for the juvenile's release. The order may not be renewed or extended. Clinton County Juvenile Court has used Green Haven's detention cells for status offenders when they have violated the court order, but our detention cells are limited to 48 hours. More often those youth are placed on the open, or non-secure, side of the facility where they are able to stay longer to stabilize, support, and assist them with their needs. Clinton County is fortunate to have the open side as it allows for youth to continue to attend their home schools, meet with their therapists as scheduled, and visit with their family members regularly. Use of out of county facilities for status offenders has been used very rarely by Clinton County, and some detention facilities have now opted not to accept status offenders at all. One youth was placed in secure detention for 1 day during the 2nd quarter of 2021. No youth on probation for status offenses have been detained in another county's facility or in residential placement.

Raise the Age

In November 2019, legislation was passed in Michigan extending fund availability to juvenile justice youth who come under court/tribal jurisdiction at age 17. Beginning October 1, 2021, Juvenile Court will provide services when the court exercises jurisdiction over a juvenile who is 17 years of age, but under the age of 18 at the time of the offense. Public Act 114 extends the already existing Child Care Fund (CCF) Reimbursement Program to include reimbursement of juvenile justice services and/or placement for those youth. These expenditures will align with the types of costs normally eligible for CCF reimbursement. Raise the Age-associated expenditures under the CCF reimbursement program will be reimbursed 100% via the already-existing CCF monthly reimbursement process.

Public Act 97 establishes a Raise the Age Fund within the department of Treasury, which will be administered by MDHHS for reimbursement and auditing purposes through E-GrAMS. These will be expenses associated with exercising jurisdiction over juvenile justice youth who come under court at age 17 that would not be reimbursable through the already-existing Child Care Fund Reimbursement Program. A Raise the Age Intent to Apply application was submitted with an estimated amount of \$131,670.00 for Clinton County Juvenile Court. Data was gathered from 2017, 2018, and 2019 from the prosecutor's office for 17 year olds who received criminal complaints and compared to the Juvenile Court data for the number of petitions for 10-16 year olds from those same years. This comparison showed a 29% increase in the number of youth that could be coming into our system beginning October 1. The total amount of money estimated was determined based on our actual expenditures from 2020 minus 12 line items that should not be affected; an increase of \$20/hr. for attorney fees was added as well as vehicle repairs and maintenance for a possible 3rd vehicle. That figure came to \$454,033.05 which was then multiplied that by 29%. Some guidance has been provided to the counties with regard to submitting the proposed CCF budget, and that budget is currently being worked on.
