## Death claims Ray Osborn

Mr. Osborn was married to Nell Gallagher in Cincinnati, Ohio in 1929. He came to St. Johns in 1933 and operated the Gamble Store on North Clinton Ave., which he owned and operated until his retirement. He was a member of St. Joseph Catholic Church.

He is survived by his wife, Nell; 2 sons, Rev. Douglas Osborn of Rome, Italy, and Richard C. Osborn of Minneapolis, Minn.; 2 daughters, Mrs. Marcia Puhlan of Mt. Pleasant and Mrs. Nancy A. Barrett of St. Johns; and 12 grandchildren.

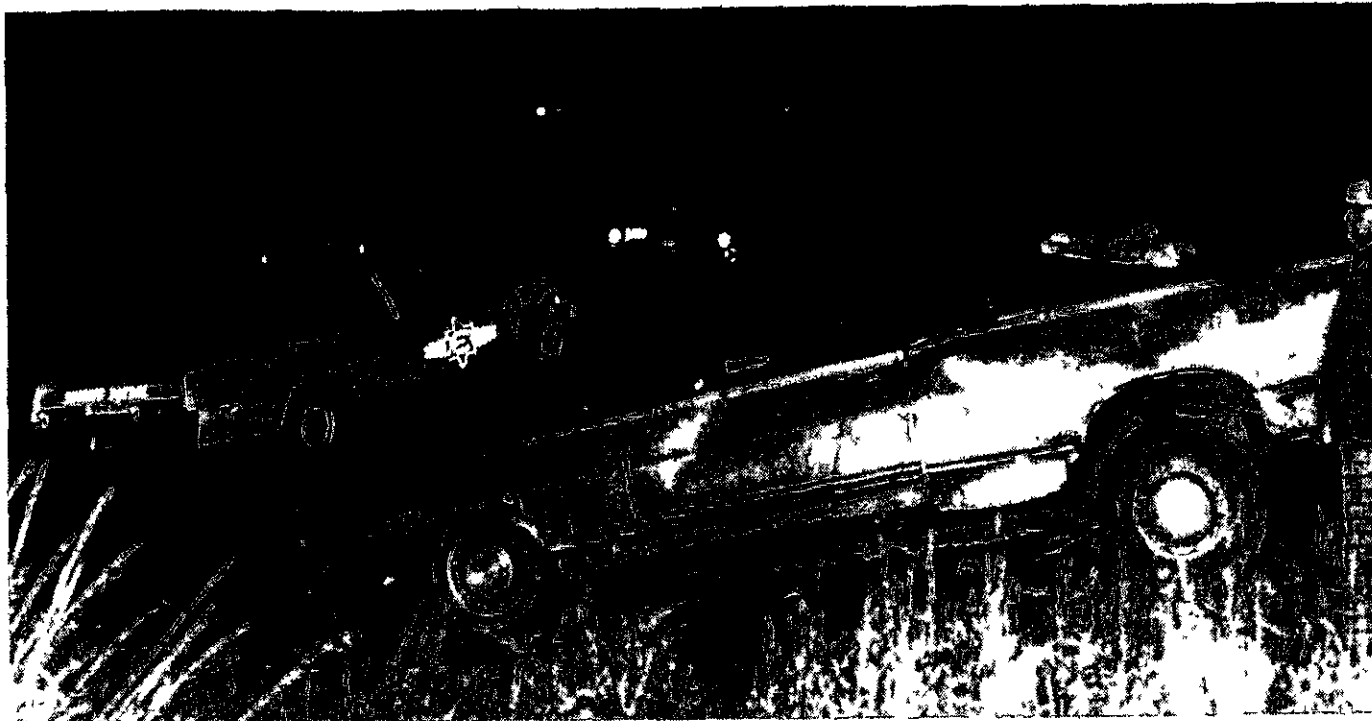
## St Johns sets hours for Halloween

BATH TWP - Bath Twp's Board of Trustees unanimously approved the \$272,943 proposed 1975 budget Monday during their regular meeting.

The budget provided for a drop in tax millage from 6 to 4.5 mills part of which was a 1-mill drop which was specially voted in 1973 for fire equipment.

There was a drop of 5 mills due to the increase in assessments by the 10% factor placed on all property assessments in the county by the State Tax Commission.

Included in the budget were raises for elected officials and policemen. Elected officials will receive a 3% raise and policemen will receive a 4.2 to 6.4% raise. Also policemen pensions will be fully paid, instead of 75% as in the past.

The 2 largest increases in the budget were for road construction and park maintenance. The 1974 budget provided for \$33,585 for road construction and, by June 30, 1974 \$55,744 had been spent. The new budget earmarks \$80,000 for road construction and maintenance.

The sum of \$5,858 was provided for park maintenance and development as compared to \$1,500 provided for in 1974.

## Charge St Johns woman with murder of infant

ST JOHNS - A 23-year-old St. Johns woman has been charged with the 2d degree murder of her 17-month old daughter.

Charged by St. Johns Police with the 2d degree murder was Chiyako Harrison. She and her husband Larry Harrison reside at 1524 S. Lansing, St. Johns.

Police received a report Oct. 4 that the

daughter, Lisa Harrison, was admitted to Clinton Memorial Hospital and later transferred to Sparrow Hospital in Lansing with severe head injuries.

She remained in critical condition until Oct. 15, when she died at 1:15 p.m.

Mrs. Harrison waived preliminary examination and bond was set at \$10,000, which was not posted.

## Weekend accident claims life of man and daughter

OVID - An Ovid man and his daughter died early Sunday morning following a collision with a Clinton County Sheriff's patrol car.

Dead are Alejandro Garcia, 64, 308 E. High St., Ovid and his daughter, Virginia Garcia, 16, of the same address.

Sgt. Donald LeRoy Kennell, 31, driver of the patrol car, was treated for minor injuries.

According to a witness, Sgt. Kennell was traveling north on Hollister Rd. with overhead warning lights flashing when the Garcia vehicle pulled across Hollister Rd. from Colony Rd. The patrol car was believed to be traveling about 65-70 miles per hour, responding to a breaking and entering in progress in Elsie.

The witness reported the Garcia vehicle stopped for the Colony Rd. stop sign and then slowly started through the intersection.

In other business the board agreed unanimously to buy 4.8 acres of property for \$7000 and the back taxes.

\*Voted unanimously to let the county be responsible for enforcing the new state construction code which will go into effect Nov. 6. The new code would require a licensed electrician and a licensed plumber.

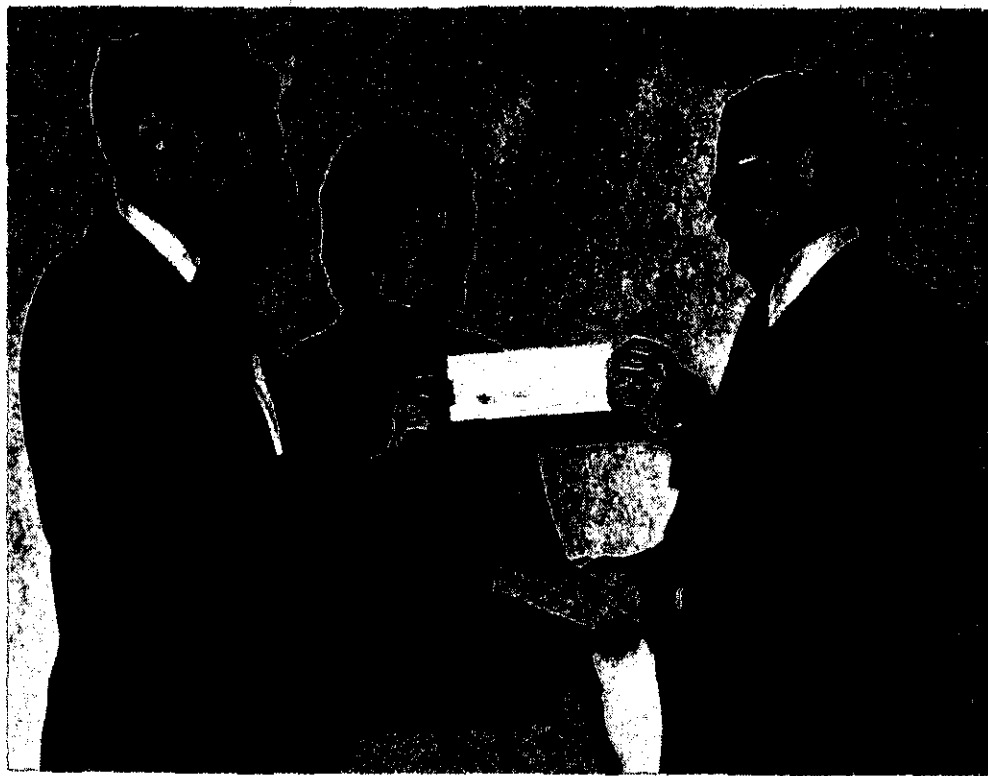

**Dedication marks 75th anniversary of St. Johns First Church of God**

ST. JOHNS - On Sunday, Oct 27, at 3 pm, the First Church of God of St. Johns will be honoring the 75th anniversary of the Church of God in St. Johns by dedicating their new facilities, located at the intersection of M-21 and DeWitt Rd.

The guest speaker for the service will be the Rev Roscoe Snowden, Director of Church Service Division, of the Executive Council of the Church of God, Anderson, Ind. Also participating in the service will be Dr. B. Gale Hetrick, Executive Secretary of the Church of God in Michigan; the Rev Robert Hazen, pastor of Penway Church of God, Lansing; and the Rev Francis Johannides, pastor United Methodist Church, St. Johns, representing the local ministers.

This year marks the Diamond anniversary of the First Church of God here in St. Johns. In 1899 Mrs Allie Fisher and Mrs Eliza Haynes started the Church of

God in St. Johns. The services were held at the Haynes home at 708 Park St.

After Mrs Haynes died in 1914, Mr and Mrs Amandus Stockwell continued the work. They then held the services in their home on the corner of their home and Emmons Sts. Later, in the early 1930's, Meetings were conducted in the Lutheran Church, located then on Morton St, by the Rev Homer A. Pontius and still later in a meeting house, converted from a residence, at 107 N. Lansing St.

In 1942, under the direction of seven women members of the Church of God, funds for a church building were solicited and the white frame structure, located on the corner of N. Whittemore and E. Railroad, was completed. Then in 1947 the church succeeded in paying off the debt and the building was formerly dedicated. From then until March of this year they worshiped there. This year the former building was sold to the

Reorganized Church of Jesus and have been worshipping in Christ of the Later Day Saints their new facilities since.

Two theater parties are being planned: one in January and the other in March.

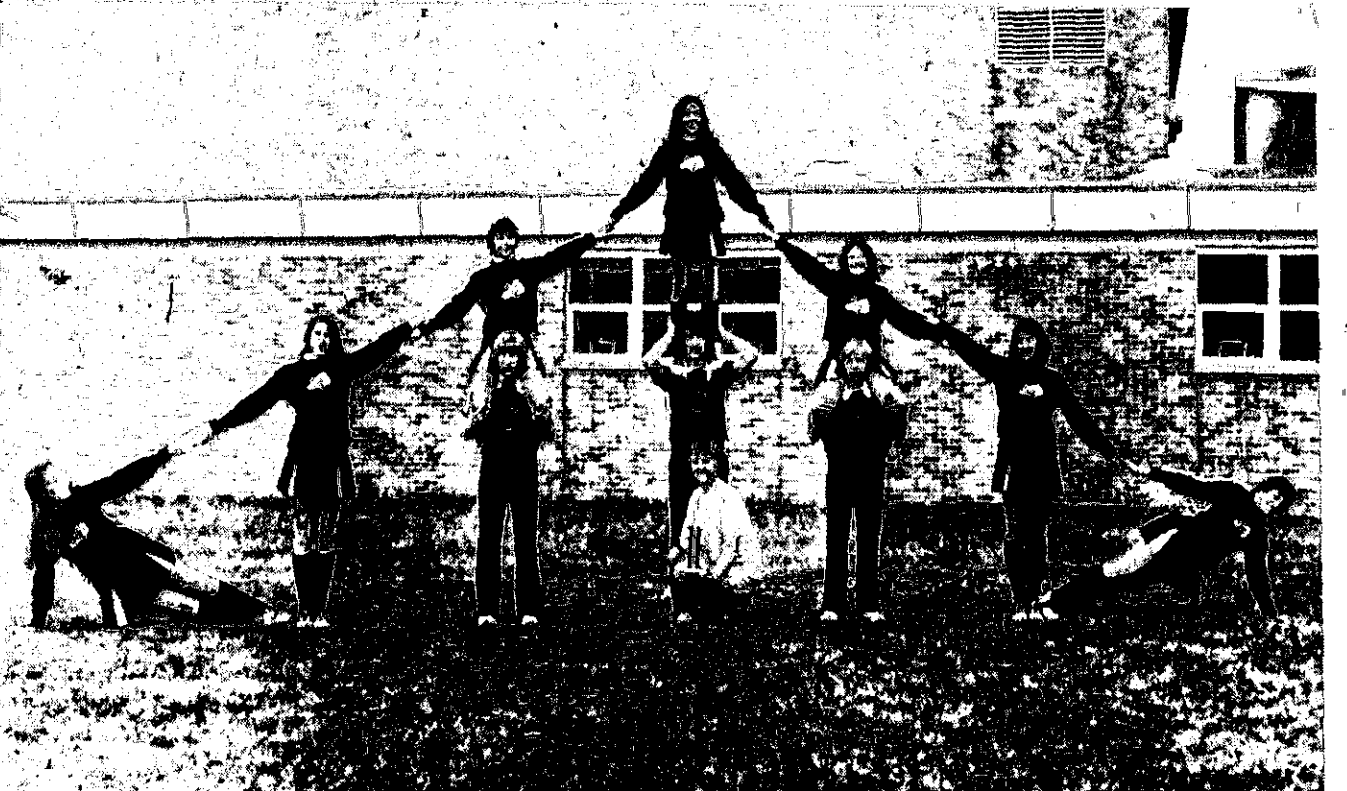
The sewing committee is still in need of helpers for their Wednesday afternoon sewing sessions.

Smith took over the duties of office manager in Clinton County in June, 1959 and has continued in that position since that time.

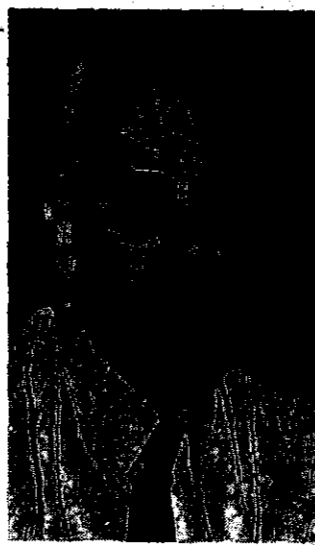
He was honored in March of this year by the state office with a certificate of appreciation for outstanding performance.

Wellman left for his European studies of banking from New York after a reception in the Chinese Room at the Mayflower Hotel. He joined bankers from all over the US.

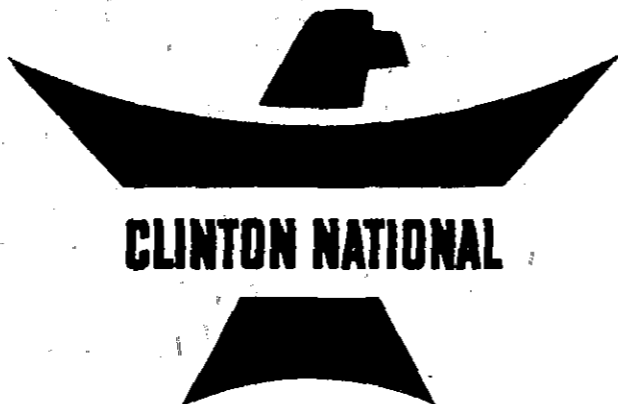
After an all-day seminar the next day, Sept. 8, the group arrived in London. Wellman and the others received lectures on the Euro-Dollar Market and

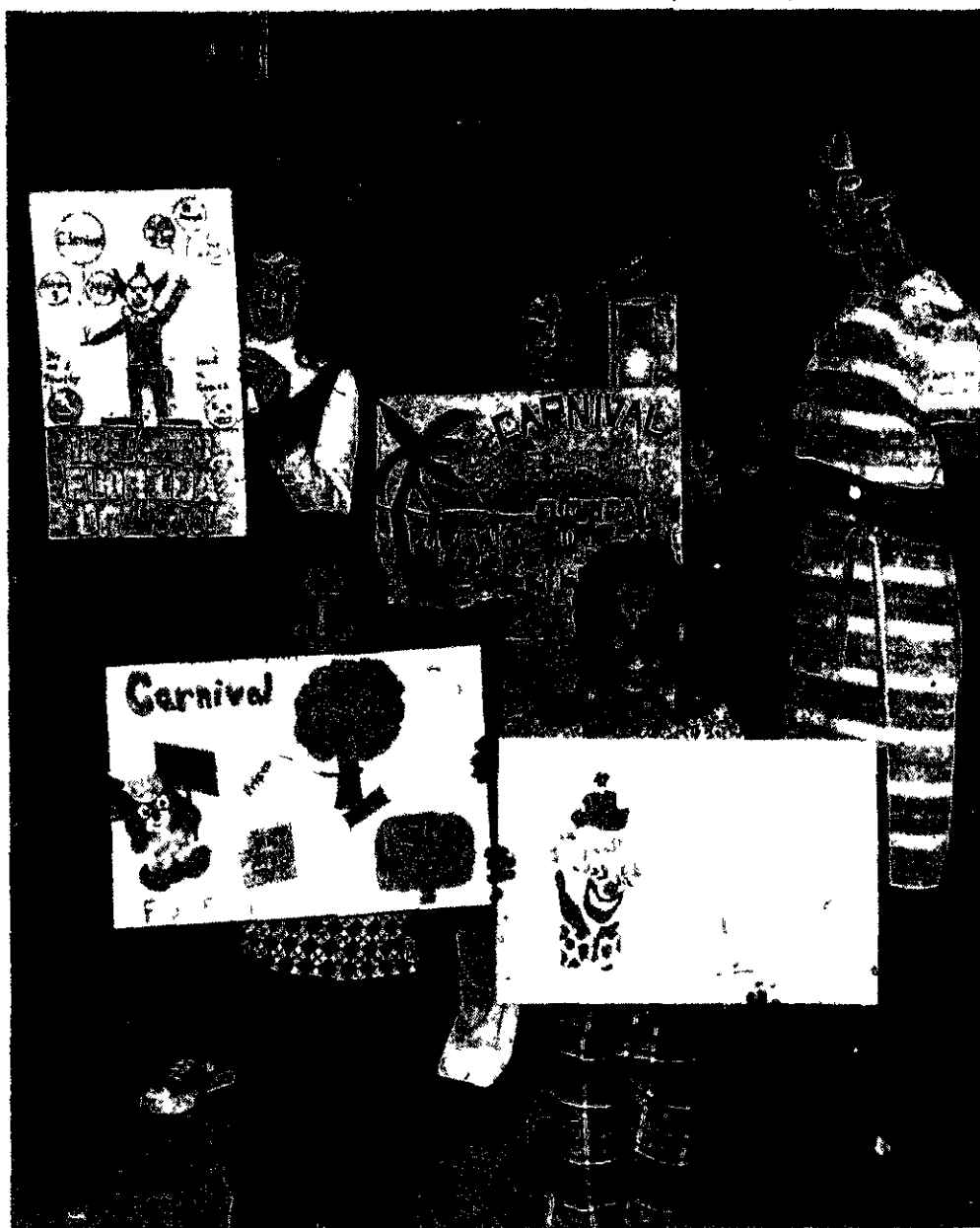

Pacing the Redwing scoring was Julie Harris and Jennifer Ott with 9, while Linda Eisler and Kendie Knight each added 8.

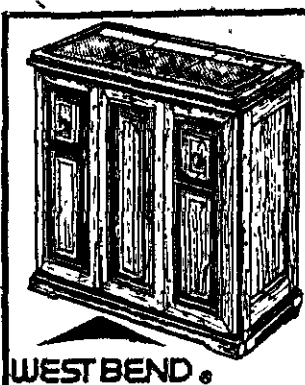
On Thursday, Oct. 11, the Redwing girls varsity and junior varsity squads were both victorious over the Charlotte Orioles.

## "If It Fitz . . . Please don't come clean

You should use it continuously for only 1 year, the FDA said, "unless extensive tests are made to determine its impact on reproductive organs, the brain and spleen." Geez. Thank God I've never known my son to stay in the shower longer than 8 months.

These terrifying facts should be enough to scare both man and mushroom. With this in mind, I read the entire FDA report to my family every night. So far, no one has heard me over the noise of the shower running. Onward and Upward.

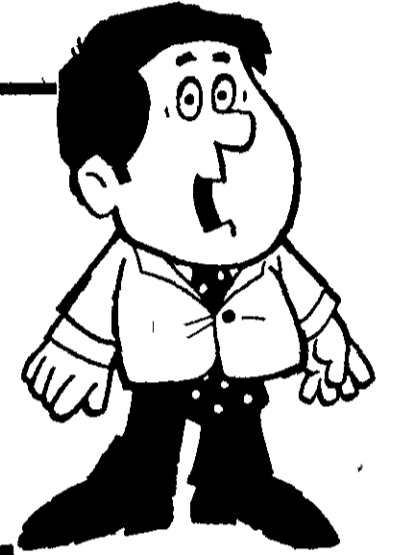

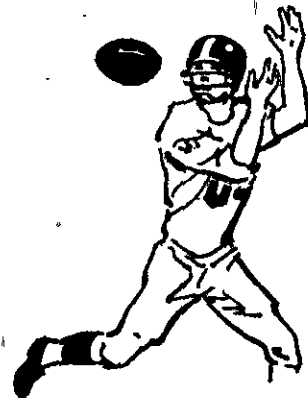

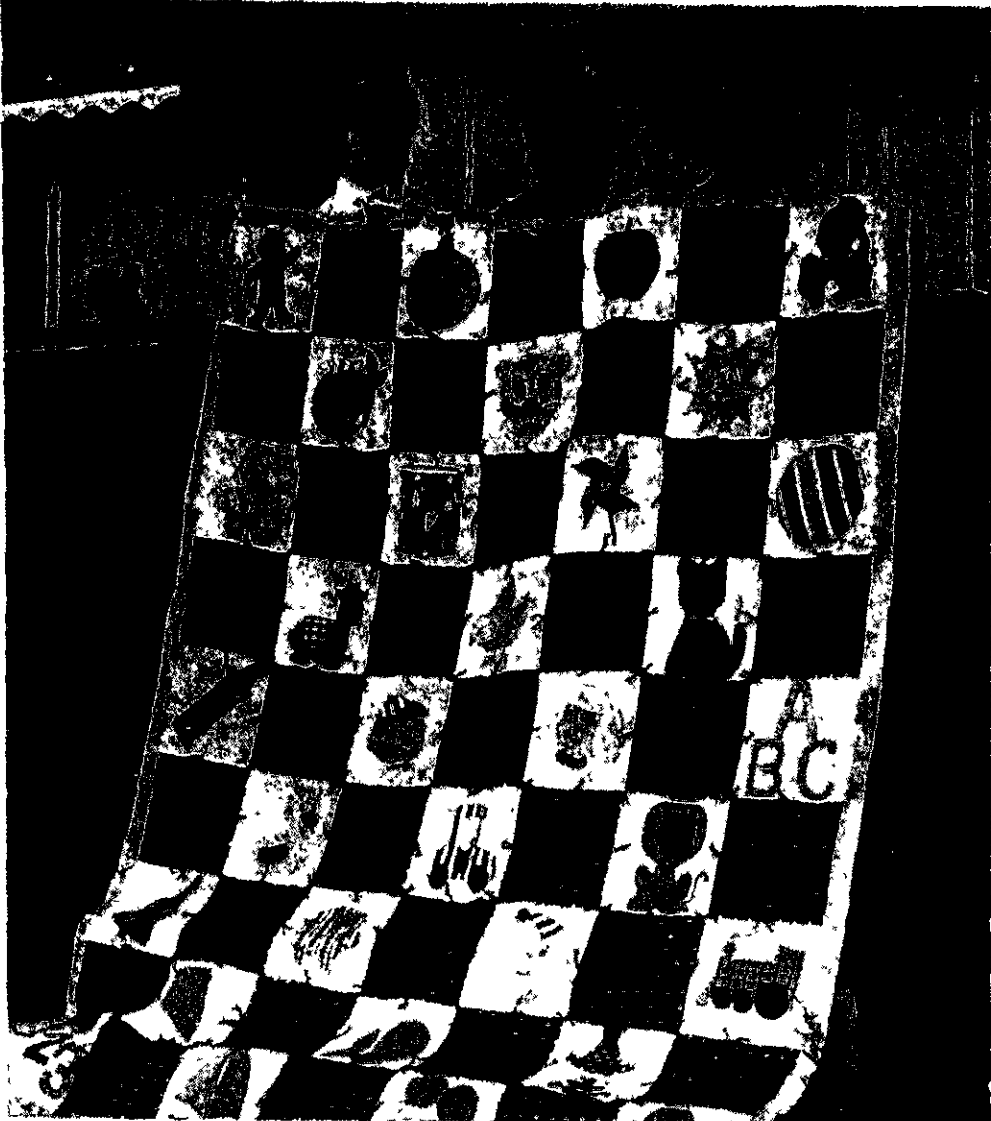

# Bill's Column

## Soil testing pays

By WILLIAM LASHER

Soil testing has always paid dividends. Now with fertilizer increasing all the while, applying the correct analysis and amount of fertilizer will really pay off.

The price of fertilizer has increased tremendously this past year and will be more expensive next spring, I think. Fertilizer is worth stealing. This is what the number of padlocks on barns says to me. A number of people bought fertilizer last fall and stored it over the winter. Behind locked doors.

With fertilizer priced high enough to have theft value, soil

testing should rank high with your fertilizer program. You can't afford to be wasteful of fertilizer now.

Many people are applying lime now and should use a soil test to determine the amount per acre.

Lime has lots of good qualities. For instance, lime makes for most efficient fertilizer utilization improves crop yields, and promotes longevity of alfalfa stands.

As fertilizer has gotten more expensive, lime has gotten more popular. Before applying

lime, get a soil test to determine the amount needed.

Lime needs time to change the soil pH. Lime applied now will be effective for 1975 crops.

The old song "Don't guess, soil test" holds as true today as ever. Fall is a good time to take a soil sample and bring it in for testing. The soil is not too wet and there generally is some slack time to get a sample. For information call or stop in to your County Extension Office, 1003 S. Oakland, St. Johns for the Extension Bulletin "Sampling Soils".

## Parents contribute to child's play

Now that older brother and sister are back in school, here's your chance to get reacquainted with your preschooler. Your youngster may be feeling kind of left out and lonely.

You can help your child through this adjustment. "Set the stage" to help him develop through this daily activities.

Play is the way children learn about the world. Play to them is their work. They imitate the work of adults every day.

Let's consider some ways you can make your child's activities more meaningful.

Read about child development. Try to learn what your child is capable of and what he needs to learn. Consult the local library. The extension office also has a variety of bulletins on children.

Show a genuine interest in your youngster's play. Being alone is important but knowing

you're there is important too. You can show your interest by helping him to get started playing alone.

See that your child gets different activity experience throughout the day - quiet, active, creative and group play. Mornings, for instance, may be a good time for active, outdoor play.

Provide opportunities to be with other children. The nearer playmates are in age, the more benefit they receive from playing with each other. Maybe you'd like to try forming a neighborhood play group with your neighbor's children, several mornings a week. This would give your child a chance to be in different environments. It would also give mother some time away from her youngster. Next week we'll talk about observing children play.

**ASCS sets committee election date**

Dorn Diehl, State Executive Director of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office, announced that the election of ASCS community committees is scheduled for December 2, 1974, a farm vote that will affect virtually every farmer in the State.

ASC committees are responsible for administering ASCS farm programs through the county ASCS office. County ASCS offices are field offices of the USDA and serve as headquarters for the ASC committees in carrying out farm programs.

ASC committee elections are unique in that only farmers may vote and serve on the committees and the elections are held by mail. Farmers are already nominating candidates, by mail, to be placed on the ballot for community committee.

By Oct 29, all nominating petitions will be mailed to county ASCS offices where ballots will be prepared listing at least six candidates for the office. By November 22nd, ballots will be mailed to all farmers eligible to vote. Farmers have until December 2 to mark their ballots for the three farmers of their choice to serve on the community committee.

Shortly after December 2, the ballots will be counted and the three winners will be notified of a county convention to be held on December 12. All three community committeemen will serve as delegates to the convention where they will elect

area farmers to fill vacancies on the county committee and to select the chairman and vice-chairman of the county committee for the coming year.

Committeemen take office on January 1, 1975, and are responsible for the day-to-day administration of USDA farm programs.

The farmer committee system, originated over 35 years ago, has continued to be the most effective method of administering farm programs yet devised, stated Diehl, and no other group of citizens has so direct a voice in running Government programs.

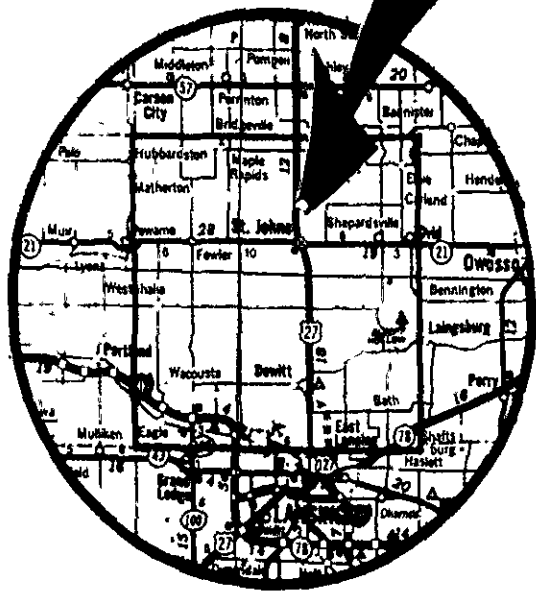



# Redwings get set for tough Grand Ledge squad...

It's nitty gritty time for St Johns High this week. Friday's football game at Grand Ledge won't be the 1st time St Johns has faced an unhappy team, but the Comets undoubtedly will be the toughest unhappy club the locals will see all season.

St Johns coaches expect that after losing their 1st contest in 16 starts last week, the Comets will be more than a little put out. Hopping mad, maybe. While the Redwings were slapping a 26-0 shutout on homecoming guest Hastings Friday, Grand Ledge was dropping a 28-20 decision in double overtime at Alma.

The Comets, who won or shared at least 5 West Central championships, now find themselves in the unusual position of trailing someone. And they're not expected to enjoy being pressed in the standings by St Johns. Alma leads the pack with a 4-0 conference mark (5-1 overall), while Grand Ledge is 4-1 (5-1 all

games), St Johns is 3-1 in the WCAC and 4-2 for the season. The Redwings plan to remain a title contender, despite the challenge of this week. Fresh from a total team effort in the Hastings pasting, St Johns is viewing its impending visit to Grand Ledge with mixed feelings. The tone of the event

lies somewhere between Hitler's invasion of Poland and the Christians' encounter with the lions. Toward the Hitler side, coach Joe Gonzales is convinced the Redwings can triumph - not a blitzkrieg, maybe, but a victory. "We can beat them," he says. "We have to rely on quickness and get off the line fast. We have to play consistent, no-mistake football. And Haske (junior quarterback Keith Haske) can be dangerous - he can do a lot of things." Haske earned the starting job last week after leading a nearly triumphant comeback at Waverly.

## ...Trounce Hastings 26-0

Stars were prominent during Friday's 26-0 homecoming romp by St Johns High over Hastings:

"There were the usual starry-eyed homecoming dates, half-watching the game while acutely aware of their escorts."

"There was a homecoming queen by the name of Starr Harrington."

"And there were football stars - so many that the St Johns coaches couldn't stop talking about them."

"We had a little polish this time," beamed head coach Joe Gonzales. "We really moved the ball well in the 1st half."

Assistant coach Jan Szymczak grinned at a cluster of jubilant players in the locker room and warned, "No players of the week right away - we're going to have to think it over."

"There was good reason for high spirits. They way the Redwings played against Hastings, they likely could have beaten anyone."

The Redwings held Hastings to minus yardage and only 1 first down while delighting the frozen homecoming crowd with a touchdown on each of the 1st 4 St Johns series.

By halftime it was all over and Gonzales turned over much of the 2nd half to reserves. Everyone played but the injured.

The Redwing defense had perhaps its finest hour by holding the inept Saxons to a total offense of minus 20 yards. That included a 5 yard pass and minus 25 yards rushing. At one time late in the game Hastings was 41 yards in the hole on the ground. The visitors' only 1st down came with 5 minutes left in the contest.

Meanwhile, St Johns rolled up 219 yards on the ground (150 of them in the first half). Kevin Knight gained 111 yards in 25 carries, scoring the 1st touchdown on a 2-yard dive.

Harold Wellman, who scored the last 2 TDs, gained 64 yards in 14 carries and set up the 1st tally by hauling the ball 4 times for 29 yards in key gains.

But "stars" were everywhere and Gonzales could well have been reading the roster as he sung his team's praises.

"Nick Pytlowany had a great game - he recovered a fumble (setting up the 2nd touchdown), intercepted a pass and led the team tackles. We moved him to 1st string linebacker to save Knight for offense."

"Jeff Brasington and Jeff Hazle did a great job in their 1st start at defensive tackle," added Gonzales.

"Hazle has played super offense all year and was doing real well at defensive end, but we moved Curt Pettigrew to end

and made Hazle tackle. He closed things off over there. Brasington took the place of Pete Kurncz, who had earned a starting tackle job and then broke his thumb. Brasington did an excellent job."

Gonzales kept thinking of more:

"Brian Pertler took Haske's defensive halfback spot and played real well - he covered his man all the time and they couldn't pass. Brian's got a great attitude, he's always willing to help wherever he can. He's an excellent captain."

Pertler lost his starting quarterback job to Haske.

"And Harold," noted Gonzales of upback Harold Wellman, "just blocks and blocks and blocks. What a job he does blocking!"

"It was good to have Carl Bashore back at offensive

tackle... Ted Loznak is consistently good for us every game and he's holding onto his job real well... Gary Strauss really wanted to play - he ran real hard (picking up 26 yards in 7 carries) in the 2nd half... Gonzales remembered as he savored the feeling of a solid game. And on it went as he handed out kudos.

St Johns took Hastings' first punt at the Redwing 35 and scored 12 plays later with 5:10 on the clock. Knight followed his 2-yard run to the end zone with an extra point kick.

Hastings fumbled on its 2nd play after the kickoff and Pytlowany's recovery started the Wings on a 7-play sprint from the Saxon 33 Haske

perfectly timed a pitchout on the option and swingback Kalem Latimer went 11 yards with it to score at 1:06 of the 1st quarter. Knight kicked for a 14-0 lead.

Another Saxon punt gave St Johns the ball at the visitors' 49 early in the period. Wellman finished a 7-play series by running the final 4 plays to the TD His 4-yard run over right guard made it 20-0. The final 2 extra point kicks failed from poor snaps

Dan Whitmore, whose 6 tackles were all 1st hits, covered a Hastings fumble at the 16 after the St Johns TD and Wellman crunched 1 yard up the middle 5 plays later to make it 26-0 with 3:35 left in the half.

### Redwing freshmen defeat Hastings

St Johns freshmen gridders defeated Hastings Thursday night 32-6.

In the 1st quarter, Jason Bargar scored on a 92-yard run after turning the corner with St Johns deep in their own territory. The extra point run by Bob Rice was good for an 8-0 Redwing lead.

In the 2d quarter, Dave Rice went in from the 7-yard-line and Randy Pertler scored from the 4-yard-line to give St Johns a 3-touchdown lead. Rice added the two 2-point conversion runs.

John Cardenas zipped off-tackle for a 15-yard touchdown in the 4th quarter. Gladstone took over the 2-point conversion.

Hastings put across their lone touchdown in the final quarter.

Defensively, Al Werbish, coach, said the team played a "sound game." Eric Bailey led the defense with 12 tackles, followed by Jeff Cox with 9. He also blocked 2 punts and picked off 2 Hastings passes.

Jim Shanley added 6 tackles.

The junior varsity Redwings now have a record of 3-2-1 and go against Grand Ledge Thursday away at 7 pm.

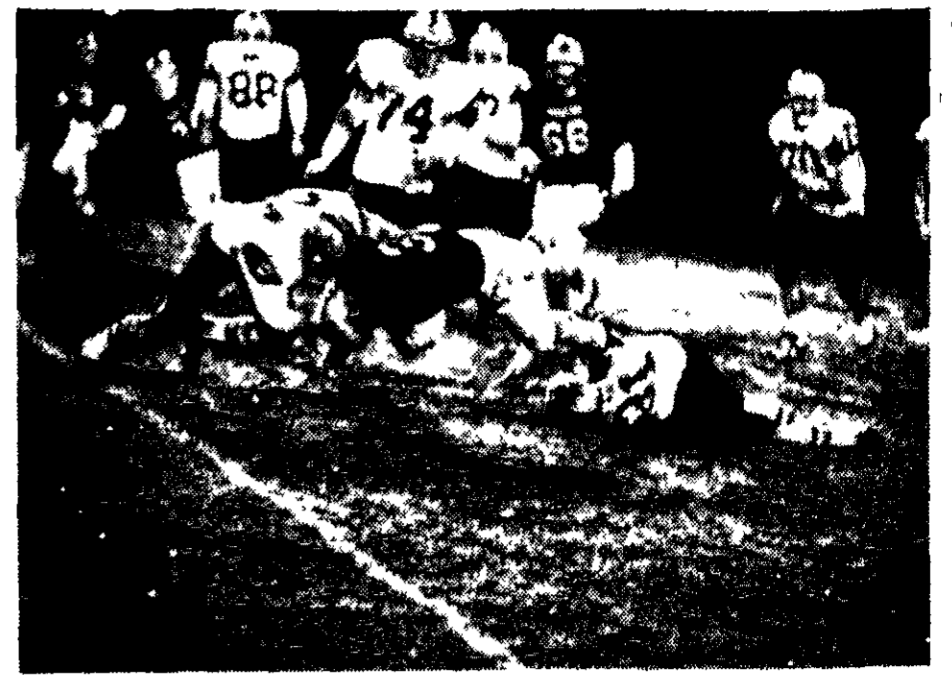

Green also was a standout on defense, turning in 22 tackles.

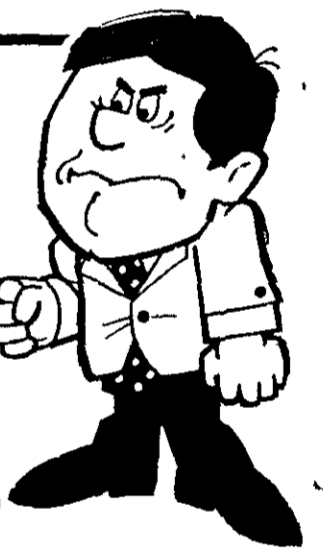

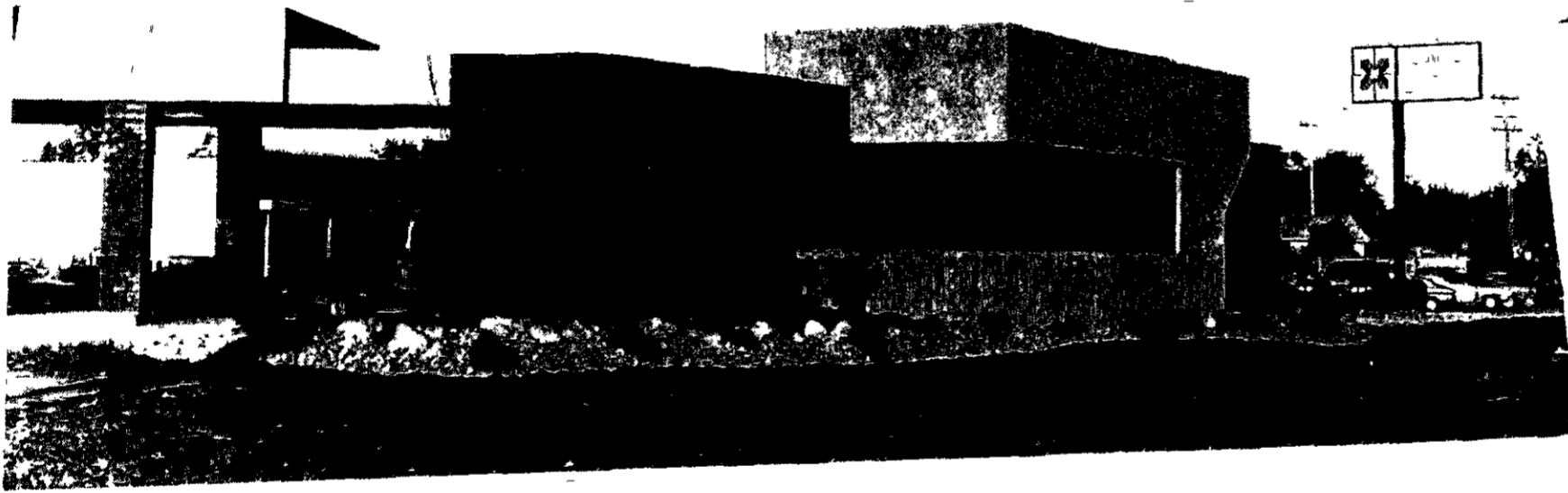
