Includes purchase of building for District Court

County Board adopts 1974 budget

ST JOHNS -- The Clinton County Board of Commissioners approved a \$2,190,180 budget at their Tuesday morning meeting

and announced plans to purchase Hoag Funeral Home for use as a District Court facility.

Down payment on the \$140,000 purchase was included in the Revenue Sharing budget of \$406,844.

Also included in the Revenue Sharing budget is \$185,000 for the Clinton County Road Commission.

The Road Commission appeared at the last Commission meeting to request \$300,000 for road improvements, but the board suggested they try a millage to raise the money.

A total of \$116,000 was scheduled in Revenue Sharing money to be used for remodeling the heating and cooling system of the Court House.

A total of \$48,000 was scheduled to go to jail budget and another \$5,000 goes to the Sheriff's Dept for the Metro Narcotic Squad Fund.

Another \$12,844 will be used as a payment on the District Court Building.

The purchase of the Hoag facility as a District Court was not met without opposition on the board.

Three members, Duane Chamberlain, Roger Overway and Harold Martin voted against the purchase while approving votes came from Derrill Shinabery, Gerald

Shepard, Maurice Gove, Alta Reed, Virginia Zeeb, Don Gilson, Dyle Henning and William Hufnagel.

One commissioner, Chamberlain, said he voted against the purchase because he felt the money could have been put to better use by building a facility specifically for District Court instead of attempting to remodel an existing facility.

The only person present at the budget hearing, besides board members and members of the press, was Dale Emerson, supervisor of DeWitt Twp.

He said he felt the board should have provided a more detailed budget and he found support from some members of the board.

Harold Martin said he felt each member of the board should be "entitled to a copy." He was speaking of a line item budget showing each department's detailed budget.

After one discussion it was moved by the board to provide line item budget to members of the board. Such a copy of the budget is available for inspection by the

public in the county clerk's office.

In going through the budget, the board revealed what a previous meeting seemed to indicate strongly -- the fact that Charlie Frost will not be a full-time Civil Defense director in Clinton County.

Members of the budget committee were asked about the blank beside the Civil Defense item and they answered that the budget was reflected in the Sheriff's Dept budget. However, Dyle Henning added that the position would not be full-time after Jan 1.

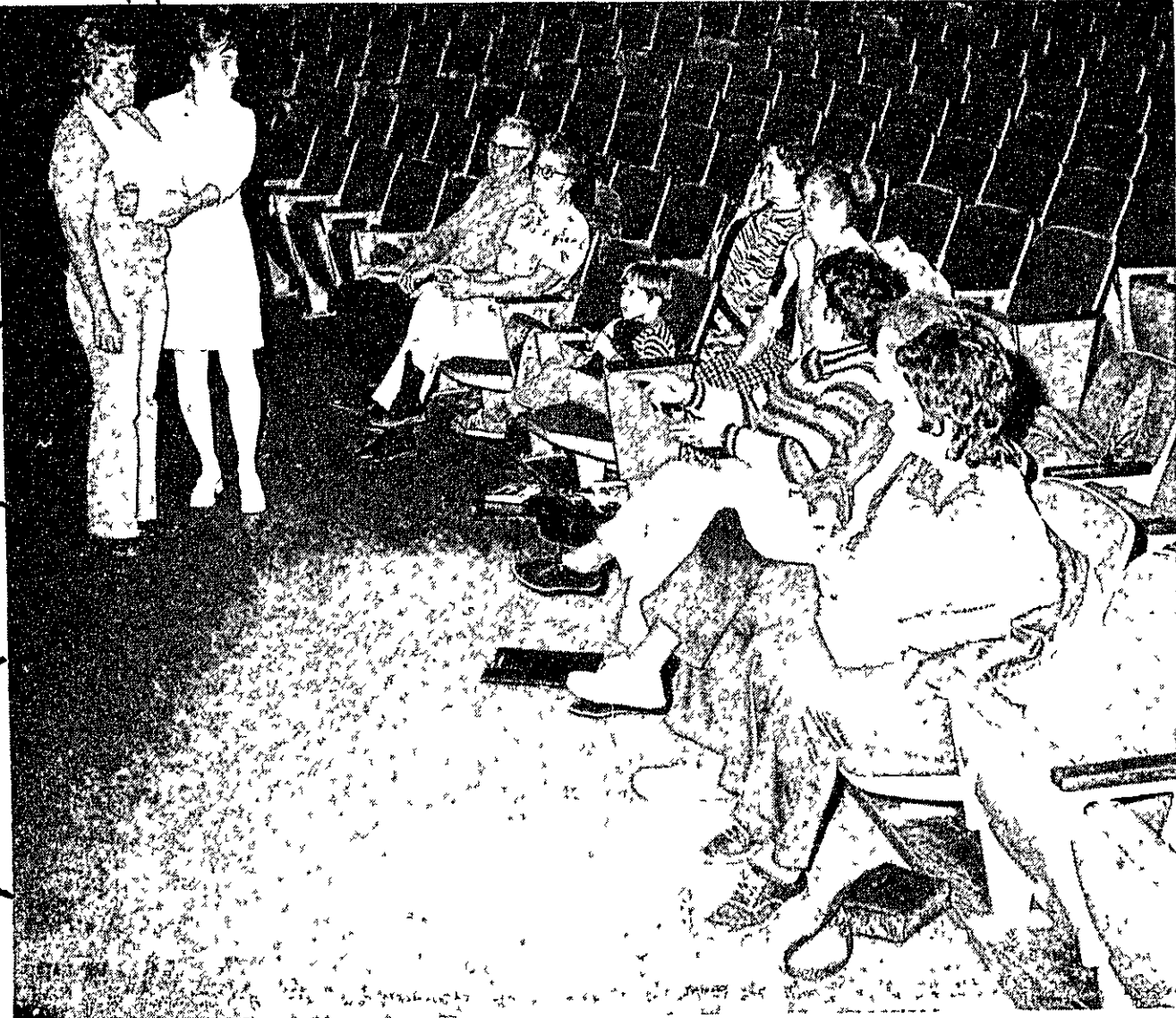

Hospital hosts workshop Oct 31

ST JOHNS--Clinton Memorial Hospital will host a financial workshop Oct 25.

Paul McNamara, hospital administrator, explained the workshop and said, "the

Clinton Memorial Hospital has always felt it had a responsibility to the community to provide the highest quality patient care available at a price that is both fair and reasonable to the community.

"Many things are done daily to hold down the cost of operations. In order to further insure we are doing our best, Clinton Memorial Hospital subscribes to a Hospital Administrative Services Program which is available through the American Hospital Association.

"This program provides comparative data on all hospitals in the United States which participate in the service. We are able, then, to compare our cost of operation with hospitals within our district in Michigan, all Michigan hospitals, or hospitals throughout the country.

"In order to take full advantage of this data, we will be hosting a workshop Thursday, Oct 25 with hospital controllers from Hillsdale, Marshall, Allegan, Carson City, Greenville, Reed City and Charlotte. These hospitals have sufficient similarities to make it worthwhile to discuss the comparative data in an attempt to minimize inefficiencies of operations.

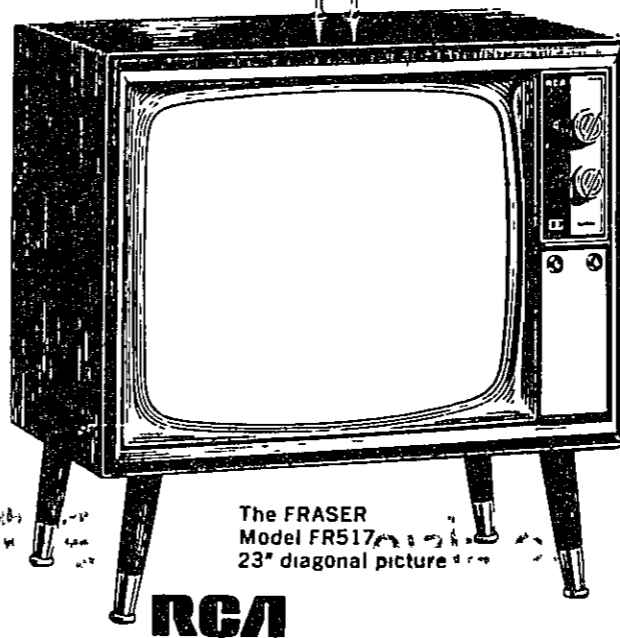

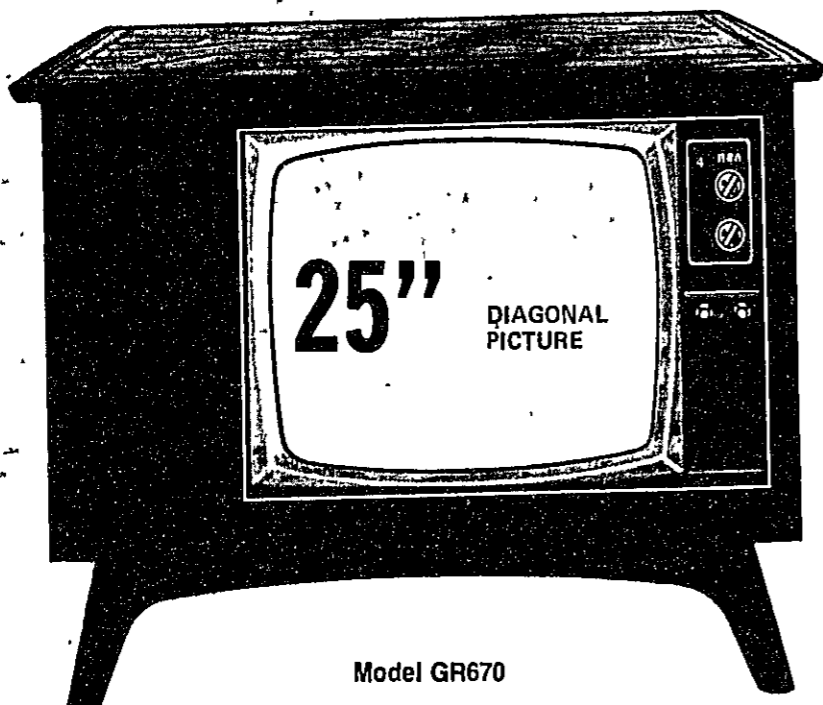
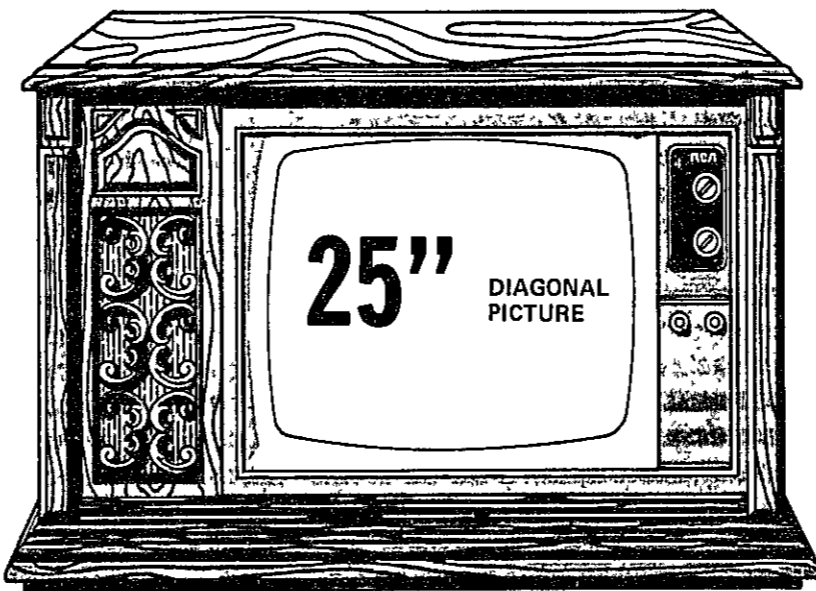

Wakefield is a 1949 graduate of St Johns High School and a 1953 graduate of Michigan State University.

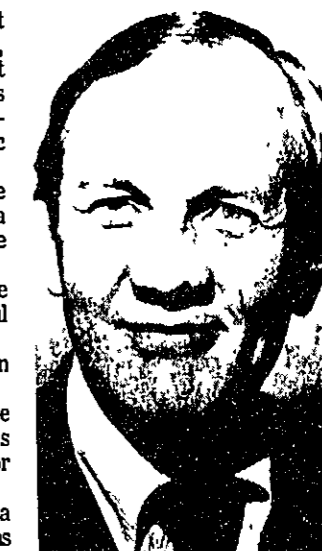
He is the son of Mrs. Cressie Wakefield and the late Paul Wakefield.

Gen Tel announces service improvements

OWOSSO -- General Telephone will spend \$13.1 million to expand and improve service in its central Michigan

operating area in 1974, according to B.R. Davies, central division manager for the company. The central division includes 131 communities served through 48 exchange central offices in Barry, Clare, Clinton, Eaton, Genesee, Gratiot, Ingham, Ionia, Isabella, Livingston, Mecosta, Midland, Montcalm, Newaygo, Osceola, Saginaw and Shiawassee counties.

The \$13,117,200 program, largest ever for the company's central Michigan service area, follows service improvement and expansion expenditures of over \$49 million made in the past five years, including a \$13 million program now being completed.

"More than \$7.4 million is earmarked for additional equipment to provide for our continuing growth," Davies said. "This will include additional line and terminal equipment within our central offices as well as more cable outside to meet the increased demand for both local and long distance service."

The 8,000 lines to be added will accommodate from one to four customers each and the 7,100 terminals will accommodate one customer each. Most of the cable the company adds will be buried or underground in conduit, he said.

The utility manager said customers served by all 48 exchange central offices would benefit by either the local or long distance equipment additions and, in most cases, by both. In all, 80 service improvement and expansion projects are planned for the 48 exchanges in the division.

URBAN SERVICE IMPROVEMENT CONTINUES

The company, now completing one major objective of providing rural service with no more than four parties per line, is already well into another: offering urban service with no more than two parties per line. Already effective in 25 exchanges, more than \$704,000 will be spent on the urban service program next year, with plans for completing it in 11 additional

exchanges, including Bath, Ithaca, Linden, Merrill, Shepherd, Sheridan, Stanwood, Weidman, Woodland, Hubbardston, and Ovid.

A program to expand base rate areas, or provide urban grades of service to customers who now have rural service, will cost \$37,300.

TELEPHONES, TOOLS, BUILDING COSTS

Telephones, business systems and related connection equipment will cost another \$2.5 million in 1974 and cars and trucks, major tools such as ditchers, trenchers, cable plows, trailers and generators and office equipment will add \$342,000 to the budget.

Specialized equipment called Traffic Data Systems which systematically read, record and transmit information on equipment usage to a central location for computer analysis to determine future equipment needs in an exchange will cost \$100,000. Previously, the equipment usage information had to be manually gathered at much less frequent intervals.

ELECTRONIC OFFICE CONSTRUCTION BEGINS

The initial installation of equipment for an Electronic Tandem Switch (ETS-4) at Alma will cost about \$331,600. Scheduled to be "cut-into-service" by 1977, the electronic equipment will replace present electro-mechanical equipment for both local and long distance service.

More than \$1.3 million is budgeted for a new building at Alma which will house the electronic equipment. Other buildings and building additions in the division will cost about \$311,000, including projects at Durand, Howard City, Muir, Owosso-Corunna and Weidman.

The 1974 central division service improvement and expansion program represents an average investment of more than \$115 for each of the 122,600 telephones in service in the division. General Telephone's total capital investment in land, buildings and equipment for the central division is now \$80,278,365 or \$728 per telephone in service.

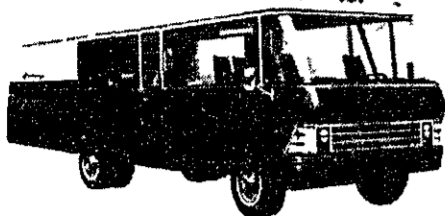

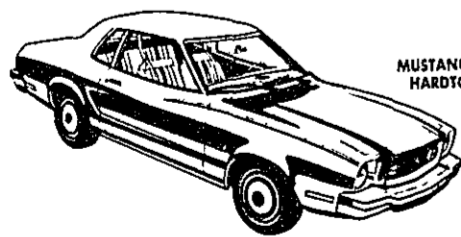

There was also an old dairy of Miss Knight's father that recorded the trip from Ohio and subsequent happenings. There were many old family pictures and also the 1901 graduating class of Elsie High School of which she was a member. She attended the old rural Watson School.

Later Miss Knight attended Ferris Institute at Big Rapids and Ypsilanti State College and taught at the Sherburne and Paige Schools.

When Miss Knight's sister-in-law died, her brother, Ernest and his 3 young children, Gladys, John and William moved back to the farm where Miss Knight and her mother cared for the children.

Even now, Miss Knight always has the annual Christmas dinner for the family, does her own work, finds time to embroider gifts and does much reading. She is one of the oldest and most loyal supporters of the Elsie Public Library.

Miss Knight joined the Elsie Chapter #68, Order of Eastern Star in 1914 and this year was honored as a 59-year active member at a special meeting of the local chapter. She served as Conductress in 1918 and was always an active member in OES projects.

She was also a member of the old Maple River Grange at the Colony and served as secretary and member of the Ladies Aid Society of both the Methodist and Baptist Churches at various times. She also continues her interest in the West Elsie Extension Club.

yard-line, but the Redwings held on all 4 downs and really got tough on the 4th-down when Hastings was on the 1-foot-line. Becker said, "Defensively, I would really have to commend the right side of the defensive line on that goal line stand. They ran it right at Brent

Coffman, Jeff Thornton, Jeff Hazle and middle linebacker Marty Brewbaker." It was that right side of the defensive line that turned back Hastings at the goal line. Coffman also recovered 2 fumbles and Chris Slamka recovered another. Brewbaker

had 11 tackles and Dick Parker was credited with an outstanding job at nose guard. He was in on 8 tackles. In addition to his touchdown reception, Mark Barz also picked off 2 Hastings passes. St. Johns takes on Grand Ledge Friday. Becker describes Grand Ledge as "a very big football team averaging over 200 pounds on the line and very quick." He says undefeated Grand Ledge has an outstanding quarterback in Mark Benson and a good receiver in Terry Worthington.

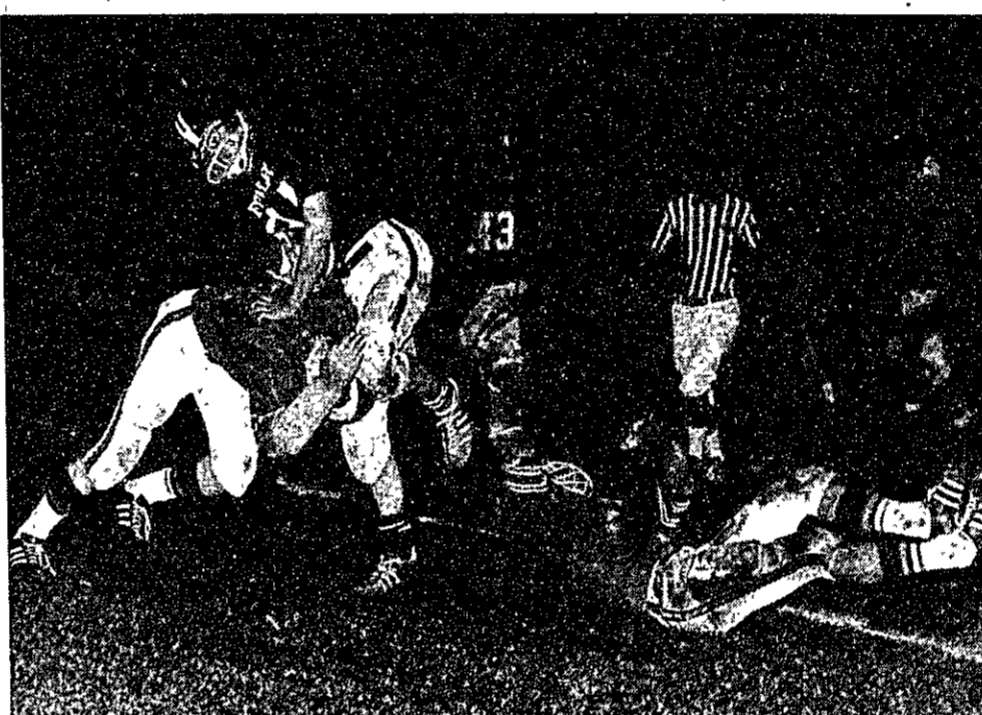

P-W Coach Bill Marks said several of his defensive players had outstanding games, but credited a well-balanced defensive unit with holding Fulton to 69 yards on the ground

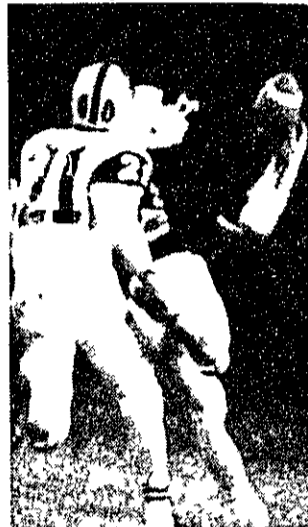
and 21 in the air.

88th District Report

by Stanley Powell

The fall 1973 session of the Legislature got underway last week and the House Republican Caucus went into the opening session with important, problem solving legislative proposals that will have statewide impact.

Our legislative proposals were, for the large part, a result of our House Republican Task Forces that have been working on solutions to problems in 7 broad areas of concern.

The task forces, as we have mentioned in earlier columns, have worked throughout the summer on problems in the areas of education, consumer protection, elections, environment, economic development, social services, and taxation.

These task forces have traveled throughout the state, each member paying his own way, to hold public hearings and talk with people to get an idea of what the problems in these areas are and how they can best be solved.

The House Republicans held a day-long caucus prior to the beginning of the session and came out of that day-long session with 8 legislative proposals and policy statements on the pressing issues.

We did not assign priority numbers to the positions because we feel they are all equally important and bipartisan and if the Legislature gets down to business this fall there is no reason why they cannot be accomplished.

Early action expected on school strike situation

At the forefront, of course, is the problem of 3 school districts, which at that time had not yet started classes because of teacher strikes.

These districts—Detroit, Inkster and Flint Beecher—cannot receive state aid because they were not in session on the fourth Friday enrollment count, which determines the amount of state aid the districts are to receive, and it now looks like these districts might not be able to complete 180 days of school before the end of the state's fiscal year, which is a state requirement for receiving state aid payments.

We fully expect to see a "forgiveness" amendment introduced to reduce the 180 day and fourth Friday count requirements so that these districts can receive state aid payments.

We view this only as a short-range solution to assist 3 specific school districts and while we realize that getting the youngsters back in school is most important and necessary,

our caucus proposes to go way beyond this short-range solution and develop legislation that will solve the teacher strike problem for all districts.

House Republican Leader Clifford Smart (R-Walled Lake) has directed the Task Force on Education, chaired by Rep. Melvin L. Larsen (R-Oxford) to work on solutions to the problems caused by teacher strikes. That task force, whose members are: Representatives William R. Bryant (R-Grosse Pointe Farms), Roy L. Spencer (R-Attica), F. Robert Edwards (R-Flint), R. Robert Geake (R-Northville), John S. Mowat (R-Adrian), Ralph Ostling (R-Roscommon) and Edgar Geerlings (R-Muskegon), is now heavily involved in that work.

Some of the areas of consideration include:

- penalties for illegal strikes against teachers and school boards.
- binding arbitration.
- establishment of a uniform school calendar that would set forth the starting and ending school days, count dates, a set number of vacation days, prohibition of Saturday classes and the possibility of the state assuming control of strike-bound school systems.

It is interesting to note that 46 states have laws prohibiting teacher strikes, yet there were 140 strikes nationally in 1972. This year the national number of teacher strikes stood at only 60, but 35 of them occurred in Michigan.

Campaign financing and spending reform

The House Republicans have always supported broad and far ranging reforms in the area of campaign spending and finance and we feel this is another very important issue that will be tackled by the Legislature with bi-partisan support.

Specifically, we support legislation requiring:

- full disclosure of all campaign receipts and expenditures.
- central depositories for campaign funds.
- a single campaign fund treasurer for each candidate.
- a broad definition of campaign contributions, including in-kind contributions.
- listing by individual names of contributors to fund raisers.
- filing of expenditures and receipts by all candidates for public offices.
- pre-filing of names of contributors.
- post-filing of late contributors and of all expenditures.
- retention of campaign

PURPOSE AND SECURITY: The bonds are to be issued under the provisions of Act 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1967, as amended, in anticipation of and are payable primarily from contractual obligations of the Charter Township of Bath, to provide the necessary funds to pay a part of the cost of constructing a sewage disposal system for the Charter Township of Bath. The contractual payments are sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds, when due. The usual closing documents, including a certificate that no litigation is pending affecting the issuance of the bonds, will be delivered at the time of the delivery of the bonds. If the bonds are not tendered for delivery by twelve o'clock, noon, Eastern Standard Time, on the 45th day following the date of sale, or the first business day thereafter if said 45th day is not a business day, the successful bidder may on that day, or any time thereafter until delivery of the bonds, withdraw his proposal by serving notice of cancellation, in writing, on the undersigned in which event the County shall promptly return the good faith deposit. Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve Funds. Accrued interest to the date of delivery of the bonds shall be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

ANNUAL STATISTICAL AND FINANCIAL REPORT

St. Johns Public Schools of Clinton and Gratiot Counties

The school year of 1972-73 saw the beginning of a "Shared-Time" vocational program for four of the five other school districts in Clinton County. All districts with the exception of DeWitt participated in the program.

Programs initiated were Auto Mechanics located in the old Bee's Garage in downtown St. Johns, Building Trades with students building a house in Fowler, Cosmetology which was contracted with Melba Academy of Beauty Culture, Electronics taught in St. Johns High School and Health Careers taught in the home High Schools. In all, 232 different students from the four High Schools participated in the program.

Growth in the number of students continued slowly. The membership of 4246 students was an increase of 35 over the 1971-72 year. The fiscal year commenced with a General Fund Equity deficit of \$41,487. The deficit was erased with the General Fund Equity as of June 30, 1973, standing at \$118,959.

For the year 1972-73 the minimum Teacher salary was \$8,000 for a beginning teacher with a BA degree while the maximum salary was \$14,137 for a teacher with an MA degree with 12 years experience. The average teachers salary was \$11,500.

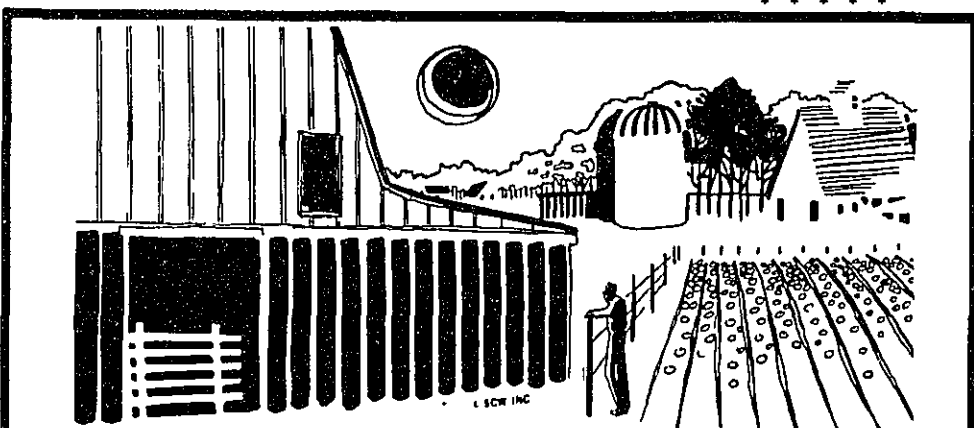

Tax change would bring more taxes

A newspaper article crossed my desk last week which expressed the supposedly surprising news that a survey of its readers favored such a tax change.

I don't find it surprising at all. That's because, in its survey, the newspaper told only half the story. I wonder if the results would be the same if the questionnaire included a proposal to increase the income tax by a whopping 25 percent.

I am sure that, by giving only half the story, we could get like results if we were to ask a similar question about any tax. Certainly people want them removed, and that's one thing all of us in government should keep in mind.

But, services must be paid for and, until there is some serious inclination around here to reduce the level of governmental services, any loss of tax revenue will have to be replaced. Repeal of the sales tax on food and drugs would reduce revenue by \$250 million. Since that's the amount an increase from 3.9 percent to 4.9 percent in the state income tax rate would produce, it's ap-

parent where legislators will be looking first for a replacement.

This figures out to a 25.6 percent hike in your state income tax bill. I am not sure we're all prepared to pay that price.

There are some interesting things in the history of Michigan taxation on this current subject. Back in the middle 1960's, when the first income tax was enacted, Governor Romney suggested a standard \$600 personal exemption and that there be a provision for credits for sales taxes paid for food and drugs.

When the final bill passed, the individual exemption was raised to \$1,200 to allow for sales tax credit but which would simplify the computation and administration of the tax.

And just this year that personal exemption figure was raised to \$1,500 (effective next January 1) and I hesitate to increase the tax even before the effect of that reduction is even felt by the taxpayer.

There are lots of angles, both pro and con, to the discussion of exempting food and drugs from the sales tax. Certainly lower

income people pay a higher portion of their income in sales taxes. But, because of the high personal exemption figure, they could well be completely exempt from the state income tax even though they may still be required to pay federal taxes.

The average person probably would never notice the relief of eliminating the sales tax on food and drugs; but, he would sure notice it if his income tax deductions were increased by 25 percent every payday.

We have tried to build a balanced taxation policy here in Michigan. We have spread the burden out among property, income and sales taxes. When one of these, the property tax, became excessive, we instituted a program of shifting that burden to the income tax. This, too, will be felt by many for the first time this year.

For the time being, at least, I think we should leave things alone. Let's go along for a little while and realize the benefits of the changes we already enacted. There's time enough later for additional alteration if it is needed.

Wild game tips

Much of the nearly 7,000 tons of dressed meat taken each year by Michigan hunters and trappers never reaches the table due to mishandling by hunters or misgivings by cooks, says Bill Lasher, Clinton County Extension Agent.

For good-tasting wildgame, use special care both in the field and in the kitchen.

In warm weather, clean and wipe dry body cavities of game birds as soon as possible, Lasher advises. Do not remove feathers or use water until ready to cook. In cool weather, birds may be carried through the day without cleaning.

Clean abdominal cavities of small mammals, bear and deer the day they are killed. Remove splintered bones, shot and fur from wounds.

If there is little natural bleeding from the wounds, bleed the animal. Or soak the cleaned animal 8 to 10 hours in a solution of one tablespoon salt

per quart of water.

For tender meat, wait 24 hours before cooking young game. Older animals should be aged several days and par-broiled.

Because wild game tends to be drier and tougher than domestic meat, cook at low temperatures in moist heat, Lasher suggests.

To prepare pheasant, use any moist-heat chicken recipe. Pheasant meat is similar to chicken but drier.

Duck meat is usually served rare. Lasher points out. Wild duck meat is dark and dry, and should be cooked in a covered roaster with strips of bacon on the breast.

Wear rubber gloves when cleaning rabbit, and cook the meat until well done to avoid tularemia, or rabbit fever. Warty growths on rabbit legs, head and other body parts are harmless.

With ruffed grouse, or par-

tridge, prairie chicken; woodcock and sharp-tail grouse usually only the breasts are served.

When preparing beaver, raccoon or bear, remove all fat from the meat to avoid strong flavor and odor. Serve bear meat well-done. Even after long roasting, bear meat is pinkish when first cut, but darkens.

For further wild game information, obtain Extension Bulletins 252, "Good Eating from Woods and Fields," and 253, "Venison," from your County Extension Office.
