Small turnout hears candidates views in St Johns before election

A debate between State Senate candidates Richard Allen (R) and Richard Warren (D) about Allen's residency in the 30th Senate District and remarks between House candidates Stanley Powell (R) and

Don Stanton (D) highlighted the recent Meet the Candidates meeting in St Johns. The St Johns Womens' Club sponsored the meet the candidates evenings, attended by the above candidates and Judge

Frederick Lewis and William Jackson, both running for the district judge office and Elaine Brockmyre (D), the lone candidate for the County Board of Commissioners to be at the meeting.

The question of Allen's residency came near the end of the meeting when Warren asked him to explain how he established residence. Allen said, "I'd love to - I'd like to explain to the whole

district that I've always lived in the 30th Dist." Gratot County Democrats have charged that, although Allen has a house in the 30th Dist, he actually resides in the 35th

Allen explained that he lived in what was the former 30th, but following redistricting, did move to the new district in order to run for the State Senate. Warren claimed that such a

move violates the 1-man, 1-vote process and that candidates should run where they live. The remarks between Powell and Stanton came up several times during the meeting and covered the range from Stanton's statements during the campaign to Powell's voting record.

County approves budget

ST JOHNS - The Clinton County Commissioners have approved the \$2,328,803 1975 general fund budget, as compared with \$2,071,964 in 1974. The major expenditures

Also provided for in the new budget were pay raises for all employees with one exception, an elected official Willard Krebel, register of deeds. Other increased salaries are County Clerk Ernest Carter, Treasurer Gerald Shepard and Drain Commissioner Dale Chapman, \$14,482, increased from \$13,494. Sheriff Anthony Hufnagel, \$15,496 from \$13,494.

The county's share of the salary for judges was also increased as follows: Circuit Court Judge Leo Corkin, \$6,500 up from \$6,000. Corkin also receives \$26,500 from the state. Probate Judge Timothy Green, \$17,972 up from \$17,344. The state also pays him \$16,348.

District Court Judge Frederick Lewis, \$10,140 up from \$9,542. The state also pays \$21,500.

The commissioners gave themselves a raise, the first in 6 years. They will receive \$2,000 instead of last year's \$1,800. The chairman of the board will get \$2,800 instead of \$2,400, the finance committee chairman, \$2,400 up from \$2,100 and all other committee chairmen \$2,200 up from \$2,100.

Schedule hearing about watershed

A public information meeting will be held Nov. 6 at 1:30 pm in the Ashley High School East Oak St. gymnasium to discuss the preliminary draft environmental statement for the West Upper Maple River Watershed project.

Purposes of the project are watershed protection, flood prevention and improved drainage on agricultural land and public fish and wildlife development in the West Upper Maple River Watershed which is located in Clinton and Gratiot Counties.

Representatives of the sponsors, which include the Clinton and Gratiot County Soil Conservation Districts, Maple River Drainage Board and Michigan Dept. of Natural Resources as well as staff from the

Soil Conservation Service will answer questions about the project and the Environmental Impact Statement.

About those leaves...

ST JOHNS - It is suggested that leaves either be put in plastic bags and placed next to the curb, or they be raked out to the curb, where they will be picked up by City Employees. The burning of leaves is not recommended. If leaves are burned, a burning permit

should be obtained by contacting the St. Johns Police Department, 224-6721. Do Not Burn Leaves In The Street. Citizens are asked to not rake leaves into the gutter after city crews pick up Wednesday and Thursday.

Clinton National Bank and Trust Company of St. Johns will open its twelfth location Oct. 30 and become the first occupant of a site earmarked for a 15 unit shopping center.

The branch, designated as "Plaza 27", is a pre-constructed building designed by Bank Consultants, Inc. of Indianapolis, Indiana providing two drive-up windows plus an inside lobby area and is situated on US-27 near St. Johns' southern limits.

Executive Vice President Gayle Desprez, who has overseen the opening of the new facility, described the branch as one which will ease the traffic burden of CNB&T's mid-town auto facility and provide customers who live or work south of St. Johns a convenient banking location. "We've been eyeing this site for nearly two years," explained Desprez, "and customer traffic, along with the proposed shopping center, convinced us of the growing need for a branch in the area. Our branch here is designed for fast, efficient customer service and being open 65 hours each week should ensure that type of service."

One of the features of the new office that traveling or vacationing customers will find advantageous is the height of protective canopies over the teller stations. The shelters are above average height which will allow all types of recreational vehicles to pass through without danger of damage to vehicle or structure. Desprez explained that the large number of recreational vehicles which pass through CNB&T's mid-town auto facility prompted installation of the new canopy design.

Another feature prompted by customer desire is the drawer type teller service. "Many customers feel more comfortable with drawer service than with the pneumatic tube systems," Desprez explained. "With our Plaza 27 office we now offer both types of drive-up service." The bank's main auto bank has a pneumatic tube system.

The new facility is located between US-27 and Scott Road with ingress and egress available from either. Most general customer services outside of loan and mortgage applications can be handled at the new location.

Clinton National, which now operated 12 locations throughout Clinton County and north Lansing, is also awaiting approval of a thirteenth office in the DeWitt area. Application for this branch was submitted to the Comptroller of the Currency this past spring.

Redwings fall 7-6

St Johns High dominated most of the game Friday but an inspired defensive play by Grand Ledge left the Redwings 7-6 losers in a key West Central conference football clash. The loss stymied St Johns' hopes for a piece of the WCAC crown.

Grand Ledge scored on its only sustained drive of the night to go ahead 7-0 in the 4th quarter, then stopped a St Johns extra point run to preserve the victory. Last season the Comets did the same thing to pull out a 21-20 decision over the Redwings.

The Redwings nearly pulled off the victory by scoring with 1:21 left on the clock. Quarterback Keith Haske lofted an 8-yard pass to the left corner of the end zone, where end Ken Randolph made a diving catch.

St Johns elected to run for two extra points. Haske ran the option to the left side pitching at last minute to tailback Kevin Knight, but Grand Ledge linebacker John Duguid eluded Redwing blockers to knock Knight out of bounds at the 2 yard line.

The vaunted Comets, holders of a 16-game winning streak before last week's double overtime loss to Alma, ran up against aggressive St Johns defense and found itself outplayed most of the way.

St Johns was in Grand Ledge territory on every series, while keeping the Comets from crossing midfield until the 2nd half.

The Comets reached St Johns turf offensively only once, and made the most of that chance to score.

Other mid-stripe crossings by Grand Ledge came on a 2nd half kickoff return and a recovery of a St Johns' onside kick in the final seconds.

The visiting Redwings held a 10-2 advantage in 1st downs at the half and finished with an 18-9 margin. They out rushed the Comets 97-46 in the 1st half and 192-121 overall. Grand Ledge rallied from a 36-0 air yardage deficit in the 1st half to gain a 63-59 edge in that department. All 3 completions came on the hosts' only consistent drive.

But Grand Ledge came up with big defensive plays when most needed to help keep St Johns' in the hole on the scoreboard.

The Redwings took the opening kickoff from their own 21 yardline to the Grand Ledge 32 before losing the ball on downs. Grand Ledge threw St Johns for a 2-yard loss on 4th down and 1 yard to go.

St Johns had a drive going from the Grand Ledge 48 on the 3rd series, but lost yardage on 3 straight plays to stumble to a half back on its own 47.

The most promising of all St Johns threats came on its next possession of the ball. The Wings drove in 11 plays from their own 29 to gain 1st down at the Grand Ledge 5 yard line.

Key gains included runs of 14 yards by Harold Wellman, 8 yards by Kevin Knight and 17 yards by Nick Koenigsnecht.

Knight and Wellman each gained a yard up the middle to put St Johns on the 3 yard line with 15 seconds left in the half. Defensive back John Brandenburg belted St Johns' Randolph as the 3rd down pass arrived in the end zone and Randolph couldn't hold it.

A hard 4th down pass over the middle cut through both the traffic and end Mark Green's hands, leaving the Wings short and the score tied at zero for half time.

An exchange of 3rd period punts gave Grand Ledge the ball on its own 11 yard line where it mounted its only solid drive of the night.

Fifteen plays later the Comets scored on a 36-yard pass from all-conference quarterback Mark Benson to end John Baldwin with 10:42 left in the last quarter. Zac Falor kicked the extra point.

St Johns punched right back from its own 31 yard line, gaining 3 1st downs and reaching the Grand Ledge 29 yard line. Kalem Latimer's 13-yard run kicked off the series.

Grand Ledge stiffened to force a punt. St Johns returned the favor and the Comets punted from their own 26 yard line.

Grand Ledge nearly preserved a shutout on the punt. The ball bounced off the chest of St Johns receiver Jeff Thornton and was recovered at the Redwing 39 yard line.

But the Comets, who had been plagued by penalties all night, were whistled for illegal motion on the play and had to punt over.

That nearly left 3 1/2 minutes for St Johns to travel from its own 43 yard line to score.

A 15-yard pass interference penalty on the 1st play helped. Two plays later Latimer swept left end on a reverse for 13 yards to the Comet 26. A 13-yard pass to Green at the 2:00 mark put the Wings on the Ledge 9. Knight gained a yard, setting up the 8-yard scoring fling to Randolph.

After the extra point run failed, Grand Ledge ran out the clock (1:15) in 3 plays.

"We figured a power play wouldn't have a good chance of working on that extra point try," explained Coach Joe Gonzales. "We knew Grand Ledge had to respect Wellman if we faked to him, and they had to respect Wellman if we faked to him, and they had to respect Knight and Keith both on the option to the outside, so we called it."

"We knew they would be coming at us hard on the play, but we hoped Haske or Knight might be able to slip in wide," he said.

"It was a good play, but they covered it real well."

Why not kick for the tie and go into overtime? "We went for the win," said Gonzales. "Grand Ledge is a powerful team - bigger than we are. With 4 tries from the 10-yard line in overtime they had a good chance of scoring. We had moved the ball well most of the night and we figured we could win it before overtime."

Knight led St Johns rushers with 53 yards in 18 carries. Wellman added 47 yards on 10

hauls and Latimer totaled 40 yards in 7 tries. Haske completed 7 of 9 passes without an interception. Five aerials went to Randolph for 38 yards. Green caught 2 for 21 yards.


"The team came over here and played consistent, good hard football," praised Gonzales.

"We don't like to lose, but we're as proud as we can be of this team," added assistant coach Jan Szymczak.

Next for the Redwings will be a home date Friday, against league-leader Alma. The Panthers came in with a 5-0 WCAC mark and a 6-1 overall record. Grand Ledge is 2nd and still has a chance for a title tie with a 5-1 league slate. St Johns is now 3-2 and could cause the tie by defeating Alma. Waverly is 3-2 with 1 league game remaining. Hastings and Charlotte each are 1-4 and Ionia is 0-5.

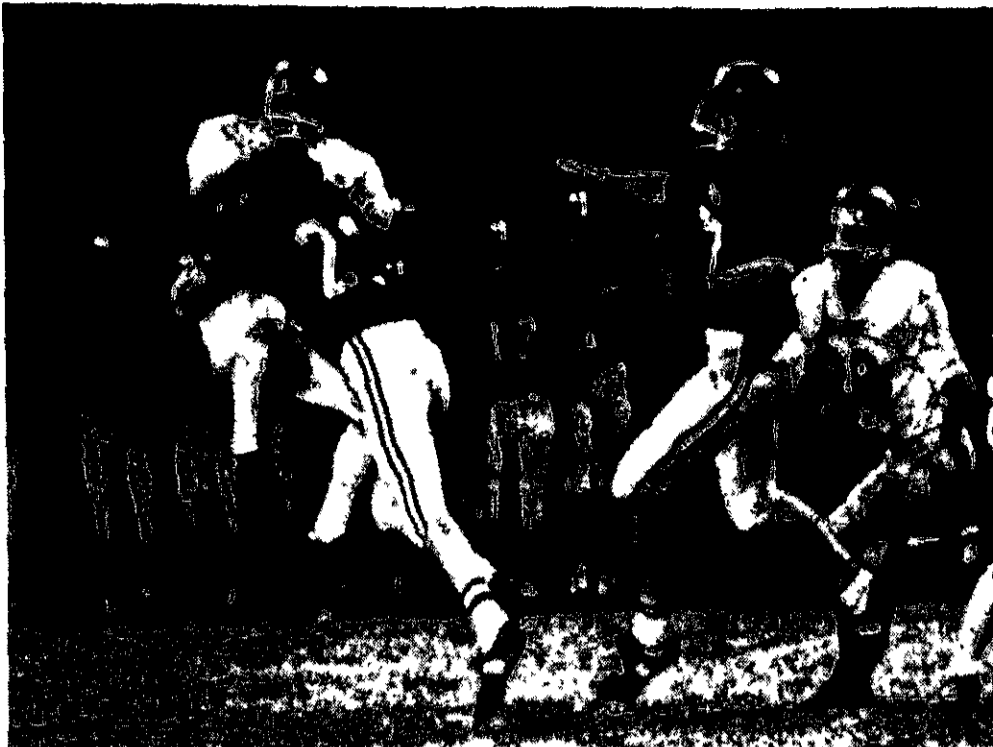

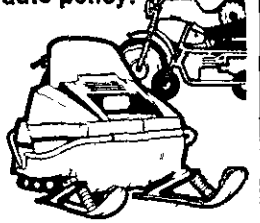

Cederberg Out, Marble In

When Sam Marble set out to slay the 10th District dragon we were skeptical and doubtful.

Elford (AI) Cederberg is an absentee dragon who has served his presidential master well and his constituents poorly for 20 years, but many of them don't seem to care. He is against people-helping programs and in favor of military extravagance. And yet he wins elections and figured until very recently to win again.

People in much of the district have never seen him — he lives in Washington and maintains an apartment address in Midland — but they know his name. And those who need a personal service — like a flag or a favor find him attentive.

Sam Marble, on the other hand, was an unknown in much of the district, and as a long-time college professor and teacher did not seem to have either the common touch or the drive it figures necessary to unseat a legislative fixture.

We misjudged and underestimated Sam. He's worked hard and decently, not just to win for himself a public office but to win for the district responsible and responsive representation in the Congress of the United States. He is narrowing the gap. The dragon may be in trouble.

Sam hasn't ducked the hard issues, either. Pardoning Richard Nixon was a mistake, he says, a continuation of the worst aspects of the Nixon regime. Not everyone in this district shares that view.

The political process must be altered to give the people a stronger voice and better government, says Sam.

Government spending must be reduced — unnecessary military spending at home as well as abroad.

In every significant area, Cederberg has voted on the other — the wrong side. He opposed Social Security increases, and the National Conference of Senior Citizens rated him 90 per cent wrong on senior citizen issues in 1973.

It's not just that Cederberg was in Richard Nixon's hip pocket, it is that he thinks like Nixon, still. Just within the last few months he has voted for a special appropriation for Eisenhower College in Seneca Falls, N.Y., against an increase for education aid to disadvantaged and handicapped children, against increased funding for libraries and against additional appropriations for nutrition programs for the elderly.

Cederberg voted recently, against efforts to reform the House committee structure and against all efforts to reduce requested appropriations for the former President, whom he speaks of as "the leader of the World," forced out of office for a "technicality."

He voted for one more inflated military appropriations bill and against an effort to prohibit the C.I.A. from using appropriations to undermine or destabilize the governments of foreign countries. And he opposed an amendment to a consumer protection bill that would have au-

thorized the Federal Trade Commission to seek court redress for consumers injured by "unfair or deceptive" trade practices.

If he's a winner, what we need is a failure.

Sam Marble is absolutely right when he says that Cederberg has, for 20 years, voted against helping the sick, the elderly, the small businessman, the farmer, the union man and the parent concerned for his child's education.

He has supported the most corrupt Administration in the nation's history, and defends it still, while voting against reform measures.

While the nation was in the throes of impeachment, Cederberg was cruising the Potomac with the impeachee.

What a service 10th District voters will be doing themselves and the nation Nov. 5 if they vote Elford Cederberg out and Sam Marble in.

Sam doesn't have a legislative record for us to compare with AI's. And all voters have to go on is what Sam says. It is easy at this moment to be skeptical about what ANY candidate says about anything.

The main reason for that skepticism, however, is that so many of the yo-yos in office have let us down. Al Cederberg is one of those yo-yos.

Sam Marble may turn out to be another, but at the moment there is no indication of it, and on the basis of his straightforward, energetic campaign, he deserves a chance. Certainly we do, too.

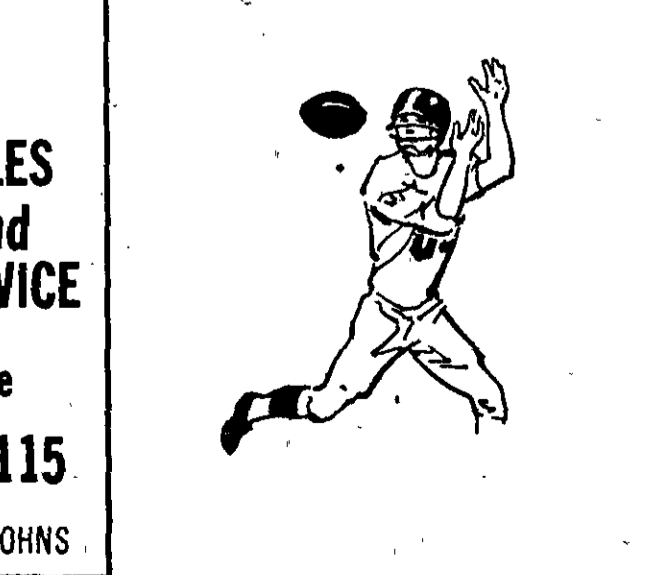

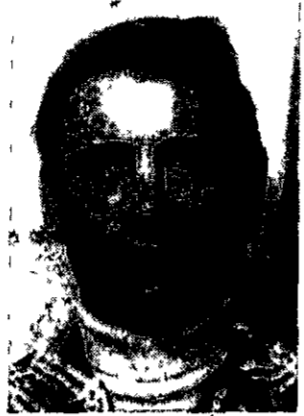

The proceeds go into the school fund for East Olive and Olive Center to purchase needed equipment. A portion is automatically set aside for the purpose of building up the school library.

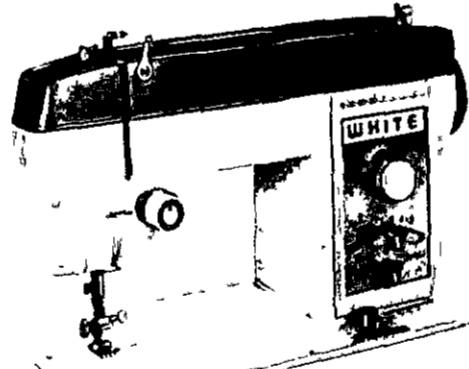

Watch out for pheasants

What Jim Sparling may not understand is that the pheasants are getting away, for lord's sake. Something has got to be done before this nation is overrun with rampaging ringnecks.

It is a fine thing for Sparling to be against gun controls. But what this country really needs is a law requiring every citizen to own a gun and to kill at least 1 animal per week. Otherwise, there'll soon be a 10-point buck crowding in front of you in the A&P checkout line.

Sparling is a Republican candidate for Congress from my district. He recently told a Michigan Deer Hunters' meeting "Firearms don't kill people, people do."

Strip off the back of his conservative gray suit and he'll stick to any bumper.

Sparling was speaking in Lapeer but he gave no indication he was aware of the great danger nearby. He wasn't even wearing a pistol. Probably his dumb aides hadn't told him about the marauding pheasants taking over the State Game Area just a few short miles north of where he stood, unarmed. Otherwise, he would have sounded a warning "Firearms don't harvest pheasants, people do. And you'd better get busy!"

The Mich Dept of Natural Resources (DNR) started the trouble with its Put and Take program. The DNR breeds thousands of pheasants and then releases them at various locations so hunters can harvest them. As I pointed out last year, the hunters wear bibtop overalls, carry pitchforks and drive Allis-Chalmers tractors. Back on the farm, the hired man is shooting wheat.

Put and Take worked fine last season. The DNR told harvesters when and where the pheasants would be released, so attack plans could be made in advance. In our area one weekend, it was possible to muster 4,500 harvesters against 250 pheasants. Under these conditions, the territory was secured quickly with no enemy surviving. The

only casualty among the harvesters occurred when an infantryman ran up against a particularly stubborn flip-top beer can and cut a knuckle.

But something subversive infiltrated the DNR this year. Perhaps it all started when a park ranger was scratched by a Communist squirrel. Anyway, an unAmerican decision was made. There is now no prior announcement of exactly when the pheasants will be released. The invasion can come at any time, without warning. There is no way the harvesters can be prepared. They can't man the fort 24 hours every day. After all, this is a volunteer army and even the most patriotic harvester must spend some time earning a living, helping the hired man shoot wheat.

The fearful result is not surprising. In our game area, a pheasant survival rate of 40% and even 50% a week has been reported. This means almost as many pheasants are staying Put as are being Took. There may well be an escaped pheasant flapping around your home right now, as you read these very words.

This is happening despite the heroic efforts of a few harvesters who have been tracking the trucks that deliver the pheasants to the game areas. A DNR driver recently complained to a newsmen "They're just like hounds. Everytime I go to Put some pheasants, there they are with their shotguns, ready to harvest."

That's good news, of course. But it isn't enough. The DNR has lots of trucks. Many more tracking harvesters are needed. And they must be trained and financed. It is not enough that men like Sparling fight gun controls. What this nation needs is legislation requiring a machine gun in every window and a bull's eye on every animal.

Otherwise, there'll be a pheasant in the White House some day.

Energy Crisis: Blessing in Disguise?

I don't mean to sound like the ultimate eternal optimist but calamities are sometimes accompanied by opportunities, and the energy crisis could conceivably prove to be a potential disaster that is really a blessing in disguise.

There is, of course, a big if — and that is IF we respond to the fuel shortage by developing the mass transportation facilities this country has either been allowing to deteriorate or refusing to build for several decades now.

To accomplish this, we're going to have to interrupt — and perhaps even bring to an abrupt end — our love affair with the automobile.

We already know that one result of the energy crunch will be less fuel for private cars.

With existing mass transit systems being given priority in the announced allocation of fuel, the basis for the development of workable mass transportation has already been established.

Although they may not have been thinking ahead to this crisis, the delegates to the White House Conference on Aging in 1971 suggested a means for achieving this goal when they recommended that the Highway Trust Fund be converted into a general transportation fund to be utilized for all modes of transportation.

Today, that suggestion is even more valid. If we are going to have increasingly less fuel for automobiles during the next decade or so, it is foolish to continue building more and more superhighways for fewer and fewer cars to use less and less.

For the immediate future, we are going to need more of the kind of mass transportation we presently have. However, if mass transit is going to be more than a stopgap device for the duration of the energy crisis, flexible innovations are desperately needed.

Many people trying to use mass transportation today are discovering that while there are indeed lots of buses and trains, none are going where they are going within a reasonable amount of time.

In certain areas of New Jersey for instance, it is impossible to get from town A to town B, a distance of five miles, without taking one bus from A into New York City, a distance of 20 miles, and a different one back to B, another 20 or so miles. And, similar problems can be found across the country.

For the elderly, this situation is particularly distressing. Imagine a 70-year-old woman with a doctor's appointment having to go through that kind of routine — and then do it all over again in order to return home. If she can't afford a taxi (and most can't), the exhaustion and frustration will just add to the problem that made her visit the doctor in the first place.

The answer lies in developing transportation systems that are able to go where people want to go, when they want to go, and at a price they can afford to pay. This is not an impossible dream. At this very moment hundreds of towns and small cities are experimenting with dual rail systems — a very practical cross between a taxi and bus service with the advantages of both.

On the drawing boards of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and other universities and research centers delving into transportation problems there are blueprints of systems that could make many people actually want to leave their cars at home.

Why haven't these great ideas been put into practice? The answer is simply that there has been no real incentive to change the way people travel. Now, there is.

Most older Americans can remember the last time this country experienced an energy shortage. Many recall that although there were the personal hardships of World War II, not having enough fuel for every one's car did not mean the end of the world.

It was no picnic, reflected one, but it was still possible to get around. We had buses and trains, and they ran real well.

Hopefully, our children and grandchildren will be able to say the same thing to future generations.

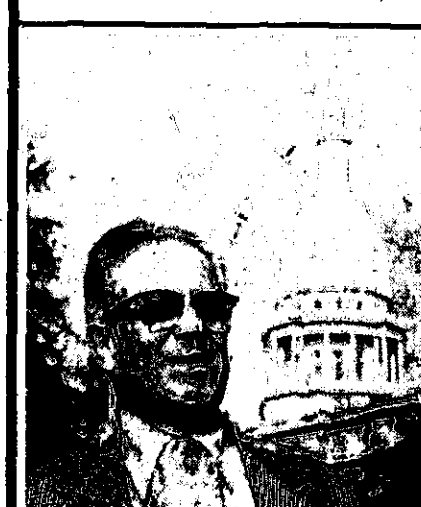

Estate planning workshop

Have you figured out what your property is worth lately? Would you like to keep it in your family when you are finished using it? Most people would prefer to keep their property in the family, but far fewer make provision to do so. If we haven't got your attention yet, perhaps we should ask you how many acres will it cost you to die? If you do not make specific arrangements for passing on your estate, it will have to go through probate and be distributed in accordance with the laws of Michigan.

On some of the larger farm estates in Clinton County this could result in the family paying taxes of \$40,000 more than would have been necessary if proper plans had been made. In some instances the tax difference could be even higher even in smaller estates there

could be a considerable saving, and perhaps even more important is the fact your estate will be divided in a way prescribed by law, rather than the way you would like to have it.

You can go to an attorney and get this job done, but if you don't understand some of the basic choices and don't know what you want to do, it will take a lot of time with the attorney to get things worked out.

In a workshop to be held November 9th, 26th and December 3rd we will be going through some of the alternatives. We hope some of the young people, as well as our senior citizens, will participate. It is well for both husbands and wives to take part, as this is complicated material, and the information gained by one can help supplement that of the

spouse. There will be a small registration fee and participants are urged to attend all three sessions, rather than part of the workshop. The first session will be held at Smith Hall and the next two at Central National Bank.

Doctors Ralph Hepp and Mike Kelsey of the Agricultural Economics Department of Michigan State University have developed the workshop and will be presenting a large part of it, along with your County Extension staff. Ron Huard of Clinton National Bank will be discussing the use of trusts in estate planning and Ray Heintzleman of Farm Bureau will be discussing the place of insurance. Acid preservation of corn

Organic acid treatment is another way of storing high moisture corn. Shelled corn with 15 to 36% moisture can be preserved by addition of propionic and acetic acids. Experiments in Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Canada have shown that mold growth was completely stopped in corn treated with an organic acid. Both propionic and acetic acid are organic acids. The corn was stored in piles on the floor protected only top and bottom with sheets of plastic or in unsealed bins.

Corn preserved with an organic acid can only be used for livestock feed. It cannot be used on grain intended for human consumption. Also, the acid inhibits germination, so should not be used on seed grain.

Amount of acid applied depends on the moisture content of the grain. The acid must coat

all sides of the grain to be effective. There are several applicators available which can apply the material to all sides of the grain effectively.

Acid treated corn must be protected from the elements. Because if rain or snow gets on the corn the rain moisture will be too high for the amount of acid used or the acid will be washed off and the corn will mold.

Organic acids are corrosive, so metal bins need to be protected by covering with plastic or a special paint.

It looks to me that organic acid treatment of high moisture corn is another way to prevent spoilage. It may be considered, as an alternative to drying, or to ensiling as high moisture corn. Also, where silo storage conditions are poor the use of organic acid treatment may be good insurance for preserving high moisture corn.

LCC enrollment tops 13,000

LANSING - Fall term enrollment at Lansing Community College has skyrocketed to 13,290 students, a 24.8% increase over the student headcount of 10,640 at this time last year.

The added students also precipitated an increase in the number of credit hours, upping the total figure from 82,680 to 103,842, a 25.6% jump.

President Philip J. Gannon announced the figures and added that all five divisions of the College have experienced enrollment growth.

To keep up with the influx of students, LCC recently leased the former Cooley Law School building, which, after renovations, is now being used as a South Campus Fine Arts Center, and purchased hangar and office space at Capital City Airport for the Aviation program.

The LCC campus has grown from just a few classrooms in

the old Lansing High School building, where 455 students enrolled in 1957, to nine campus buildings, in order to accommodate the increasing enrollment.

In August, 1975, some of the booming classroom demand will be alleviated by the completion of the new Vocational-Technical building, which will add 18 classrooms and 27 laboratories. In addition, construction of Phase II of the Vocational-Technical - Physical Education building will be completed by Fall, 1976, again increasing the number of facilities available.

Dr. William Schaar, Dean of Student Personnel Services, said the number of students returning to LCC was a positive sign of student satisfaction. He attributed much of the College's growth to such features as low cost, high quality education, excellent faculty, innovative courses and a "students first" attitude.

Accessibility in location and packaging of courses was also mentioned. Because of student demand, more night classes have been added. To accommodate students, some classes are offered one night each week for three or four hours rather than three or four times a week for one hour sessions. This accomplished the same purpose without committing the students to several evenings on campus.

The number of part-time students has grown along with the increasing popularity of evening courses. The percentage of female and married students, and those over age 60 attending the College, has continued to climb.

In examining the factors involved in the College's growth, Gannon said, "We feel this increase is a response to the efforts of LCC to meet the demands of the community."

Chloe's Column

A child's play tells us

Last week we talked about getting reacquainted with your preschoolers. We discussed ways that you can help your child to develop through his play.

There are a variety of things you can learn from watching your child play. Let's consider some of these:

Children reveal their feelings and conflicts in play. You can begin to learn how your child's mind works by watching him. He shows what interests him most, and what he's learned from life around him.

Play exposes his hopes and fears, revealing things that bother or confuse him. It shows his skills and personality development.

Here are things you may want to observe:

- Notice how your child develops in play. At two years

- your child will need some guidance in meeting other children. He will play better by himself. A little later at three or four, he'll play better with other children.
- Watch for the roles your child takes in his activities. Is he the leader or the follower? Does he have a creative imagination? Notice to see how he holds his own with a group of children.
- Watch to see how he uses his experiences in play. Provide opportunities for your child to see different things. Trips to the zoo, or fire station, for example, give him new roles. Watch to see if he uses these experiences in his play.
- Listen while you watch. His words tell you what's on his mind and what is important to him.

Robert Borton, George Baird, Dave Pohl and Mrs Francis Dershem were introduced and welcomed. Bill Kissane presented Fran Motz with a gift on behalf of the board for his many hours of dedication and service as President for the past year.

Election of officers for the coming year were held and the results were as follows: Bill Kissane, president; Jack Anderson, vice president; and Doug Brook as the third member of the executive committee.

Marlie Drew, Director Field Services from Michigan Farm Bureau was introduced. He explained a Master Medical Program Proposal which would be a supplement to Blue Cross -

Blue Shield Comprehensive Coverage. Master Medical coverage would pay a portion of prescription drugs and other coverages not provided by the basic Blue Cross - Blue Shield contract. This will be discussed further at State Annual meeting in December at Grand Rapids.

With the business of the evening taken care of, the program was turned over to Mr and Mrs Jim Pelham from the Extension Office. They showed slides from their recent trip to England. It was interesting to see slides of farms in England and how their farming differs from ours in some ways. Following the slide presentation the meeting was adjourned.

State annual is one more step in Farm Bureau's process of policy development.

The process begins in community groups, progressed through county annual, now on to State Annual.

Clinton County will be represented in Grand Rapids by 13 delegates: Earl Barks, Neil Harte, Dave Morris, Fran Motz, Lee Ormston, Paul Seeger, and Dick Woodhams were approved at county annual to be delegates. Attending from the board of directors will be Bill Kissane, Jack Anderson, Doug Brooks, Mrs Francis Dershem,

Robert Borton, and Dave Pohl. These people will be discussing and voting on many issues confronting agriculture today. Some of these issues are: strategic grain reserve, export controls, land use, school and taxation problems.

The convention is open for all to attend and I would hope that some of you might be able to do so. I'm sure it would help you to understand the working of your organization.

One of the highlights of the meeting will be the Thursday evening banquet. Featured speaker at this time will be US Sec of Agriculture Earl Butz. Clinton County, at its annual meeting, passed a resolution commending Sec Butz for his efforts in standing up and

speaking for farmers. This will be a fine opportunity to hear the Sec first hand. In light of the recent government grain policy, Mr Butz should have some very important things to tell us.

Not to be overlooked are the commodity meetings to be held Wednesday, Dec 12. These meetings discuss problems and research development in such areas as dairy, field crops, and livestock.

Certainly there is something for everyone at State Annual meeting, and I hope to see many Farm Bureau members in Grand Rapids in December.

ANNUAL MEETING RESOLUTIONS

Following is a complete listing of the Resolutions considered by the members of Clinton Co Farm Bureau at the Annual Meeting held earlier this month:

1 National Affairs We oppose government held or controlled grain reserves. We favor farmer-held and controlled grain reserves. We ask that a study be made of the possibilities of a Grain Reserve held through the Farmer's Cooperative System. We believe the best system for production of adequate food reserves is to provide producers a reasonable profit incentive. Carried.

2 Export Controls We need to continue to export agricultural production if our country is to be able to buy imported oil and other goods. We support the free international movement of agricultural production. Carried.

3 Welfare to Strikers Be it resolved that we are opposed to food stamps and welfare payments to persons while on strike. Carried.

4 Whereas the present federal estate tax exemption of \$60,000 was adopted in 1942 be it resolved that this exemption be

raised to a level which more realistically reflects current property values. Carried.

5 Prayer in Schools Be it resolved that we favor proposed legislation in Congress which would permit voluntary prayer and Bible reading in the public schools. Carried.

6 SMV Signs Be it resolved that the news media and the insurance companies publicize and stress the meaning of SMV (Slow Moving Vehicle) signs. Carried.

7 Farm Produce Boycott After the experience of previous grape and lettuce boycotts we feel that this interferes with the normal flow of produce to the market place. Therefore we favor legislation that would eliminate secondary boycotts and their use to force unionization of farm workers. Carried.

STATE AFFAIRS
1 We reaffirm the 1974 Michigan Farm Bureau policy regarding the widening and improvement of the St Lawrence Seaway. Carried.

2 Transportation We urge the County Farm Bureaus whose members are served by the Grand Trunk Railroad line to cooperate in presenting

testimony on the U.S. Department of Transportation Railroad Reorganization Plan to be released Oct 29, 1974. Carried.

3 Land Use We must be concerned with the land use issue. Agricultural land is needed and should be preserved when practicable. We support county or multicounty land use planning with emphasis on impetus from individuals and local units of governments. Failure to act on the local level may bring about less desirable state or federal regulations. Carried.

4 Brush and Weed Control Railroads. Be it resolved that railroads cut brush and practice adequate weed control on all of their right-of-way areas. Carried.

5 Voter Registration Be it resolved that Clinton County Farm Bureau opposes any plan linking voter registration with the driver's license bureau. Carried.

6 Be it resolved that no riders should be put to any bill, only amendments that are germane to the bill itself should be allowed. Carried.

7 Throw Away Bottles Be it resolved that Clinton County Farm Bureau continues to

support legislation banning throw-away bottles and cans. Carried.

8 Sales Tax Removal Be it resolved that we oppose the removal of the sales tax from food and drugs. Carried.

9 Conflict of Interest Be it resolved that no individual should be allowed to serve on any county board which covers an industry or endeavor in which that individual is involved or has an interest (conflict of interest). Not Carried.

10 State Funding of Local Courts Be it resolved that we oppose the funding and control of local courts by the State of Michigan. Carried.

11 State Income Tax Limitation Due to the recent opinion by the State Attorney General, which in effect, extends the time for filing tax limitation petitions, we urge all Farm Bureau members to actively circulate petitions limiting total State taxes to 8.3% of personal income. Carried.

12 Agricultural Land Assessment We recommend legislation that will protect prime agricultural lands and require assessors to consider only agricultural factors in assessing land used for that purpose. To prevent misuse it may be necessary to have a "roll-back" tax feature in the legislation. Carried.

13 Noise Nuisance We urge more strict enforcement of the

existing laws requiring adequate muffler systems on motorcycles, snowmobiles and trucks. Carried.

14 Reorganization of School Districts In the past there have been introduced in the Michigan Legislature a number of bills providing for reorganization of intermediate and local school districts by a state committee appointed by the governor. Due to the failure of these bills to provide for a vote of the citizens we oppose this type of mandatory reorganization. Carried.

15 Professional Practices Act Bills have been introduced in the Michigan Legislature that would require all public and private school teachers to be licensed. We feel that the present qualification standards are adequate and oppose the new licensing proposal. Carried.

LOCAL AFFAIRS

1 Farmland Tax Relief We call upon our local township supervisors to be trained in the new Farmland Tax Relief Law. Local officials should take those actions necessary to make the new law's benefits available to local farmers. Carried.

2 County Roads Many Clinton County roads need improvements. We urge county and township officials to place the improvement and widening of county roads on a priority basis in 1975. We urge Farm Bureau to attend township meetings and bring this matter

to the attention of township officials. Carried.

3 Thanks to 4-H Youth Be it resolved that we commend the 4-H Clubs and other youth groups for their work in the trash pick-up and glass bottle program. Carried.

The following Local Affairs proposed resolutions are presented without recommendation:

4 Be it resolved that the term of office of the Clinton County Road Commissioners be reduced from 6 years to one 3 year term with a maximum of 2 terms for a total of 6 years. Carried.

5 Be it resolved that the County Road Commissioners be elected other than appointed. Not Carried.

6 Be it resolved that Clinton County join the Airport Authority. Not Carried.

1 Thank you to Secretary Butz, Secretary of Agriculture. Earl Butz has been standing up to consumer criticism of food prices. We commend him for his stand and urge him to continue his support of farmers fair share of the national economy. Carried.

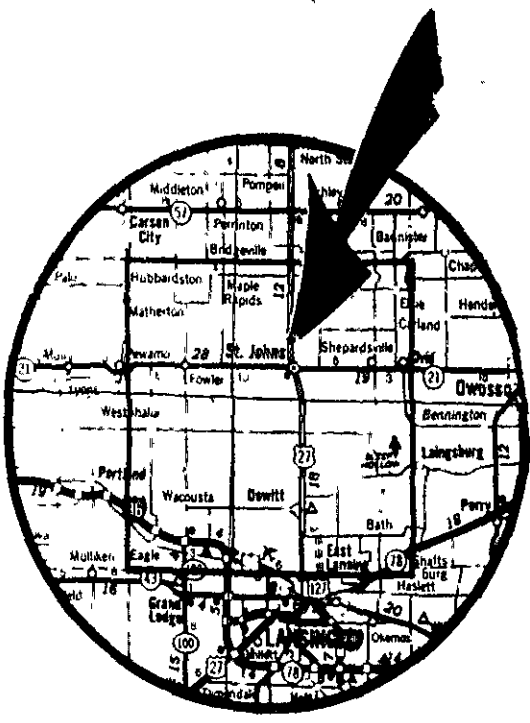
