St Johns to elect 2 Commissioners

ST. JOHNS—St. Johns voters have the opportunity Tuesday, Nov. 6 to determine the winner of 2 City Commission positions up for election.

Running for re-election are incumbents Dr. James Grost and Jeanne Rand, challenged by John Arehart and Gerald Wilcox.

The 4 were picked to run in the Tuesday election following a summer election ballot with 6 candidates.

Following are brief background descriptions and statements from each of the candidates.

DR. JAMES GROST

Grost, 45, 894 W. Park, a St. Johns physician, has lived in the community for 20 years.

A graduate of Michigan State University, he obtained his doctor of medicine degree from the University of Michigan.

He has served on the City Commission since 1969, when he was appointed to fill a vacancy on the Commission.

He is a member of the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce, Rotary, St. Joseph's Parish, American Legion, Knights of Columbus, Michigan Association of Professions, County and State Medical Societies, American Medical Association, American Board of Family Practice. While a member of the Jaycees, he received the organization's Distinguished Service Award.

He and his wife, Inger, have 7 children, Kathy, Mike, Lynne, Eric, Mark, Tim and Karen.

Grost cited his reasons and goals for seeking re-election as: To continue further development of responsible city management policies of the past few years which have brought about a welcome high level of fiscal stability while maintaining overall tax rates at a level which is not excessive.

"To continue to encourage and expand the degree of citizen participation in city government that is exemplified by the achievements of the Park Board and the Parking Lot Board.

For the 1st time a solution to the long standing problems of storm water and sanitary sewage is available with the approving of the bond issue. It's a step in the right direction, but much work remains to be done.

Grost also cited his aims "To continue to encourage further development of an attitude in city government which inspires community trust and confidence. With this we can enjoy further orderly growth, meeting the needs of residents and, at the same time, remaining receptive and responsive to the desires of a better informed and increasingly involved citizenry."

JEANNE RAND

Jeanne Rand, 204 Oak St., is a native of St. Johns and is part owner of Jeanne's Beans

She is a graduate of Rodney B. Wilson High School and attended Wayne State University.

She has served 7 years as city commissioner; served 4 years as vice-mayor, 4 years on the City Planning Commission and is president of the Senior Citizen Housing Project. She also served as executive secretary of the American Red Cross in Clinton County for 4 years.

She is a member of the St. Johns Congregational Church.

She and her husband, Robert C. Rand have 2 children Ward Rand and Jim Smith.

Stating her goals as a commissioner she said, "I would like to be re-elected for another term as I'm concerned with the community of St. Johns and its citizens. Just recently, when we received Revenue Sharing money, I voted to drop 1 mill from the property taxes. I think my record over the past 7 years speaks for itself and my desire to be fair, but firm when necessary, for the good of the community and beneficial for the majority.

"I am not a joiner of clubs or social functions, but have devoted my time and energies as a public servant. My desire to acquire housing for the aged has not waned

and I hope to continue working toward that goal. My attendance record would speak of my dedication to city business as I have missed only 9 regular meetings in 7 years.

"Therefore I would like to be re-elected to continue the work I've been involved in and see some of the projects now started carried through to completion."

JOHN AREHART

John Arehart, 31, 410 E. Higham, has been a resident of St. Johns for 5 years. He is employed as a teacher in the St. Johns Public School system, and works on the Michigan Migrant Education Project during the summer months.

He and his wife, Kay, have 4 children, Elizabeth and Margaret, 6; Jim, 3; and Joe, 1. Arehart received a BA from the University of Notre Dame, and an MA from Western Michigan University.

He is a member of the St. Johns Education Association, where he has served as association representative, membership secretary, vice president, and chief negotiator of the professional negotiation committee. He is also a Jaycee, and has served on the board of directors and as internal vice president, was general chairman of the Clinton County Soap Box Derby, and is a member of St. Joseph Catholic Church.

Arehart is the 1971-72 St. Johns Outstanding Young Educator Award recipient.

Arehart said he believes St. Johns is a good place to live, but that it could be a better place to live if more people would become involved in public service. He also said that government should be responsive to the wishes of the voters, and said he will listen.

Arehart added that he welcomes the opportunity to serve on the City Commission the opportunity to study some areas of city government that could possibly benefit from change.

GERALD WILCOX

Gerald V. Wilcox, 36, 405 S. Traver, is also seeking election to the City Commission. A resident of St. Johns for 7 years, he is employed by the state as the drainage engineer.

His education includes a BS in civil engineering from Michigan Technological University and an MS in hydrology, also from Michigan Tech. He is a registered professional engineer, having passed the state board examination.

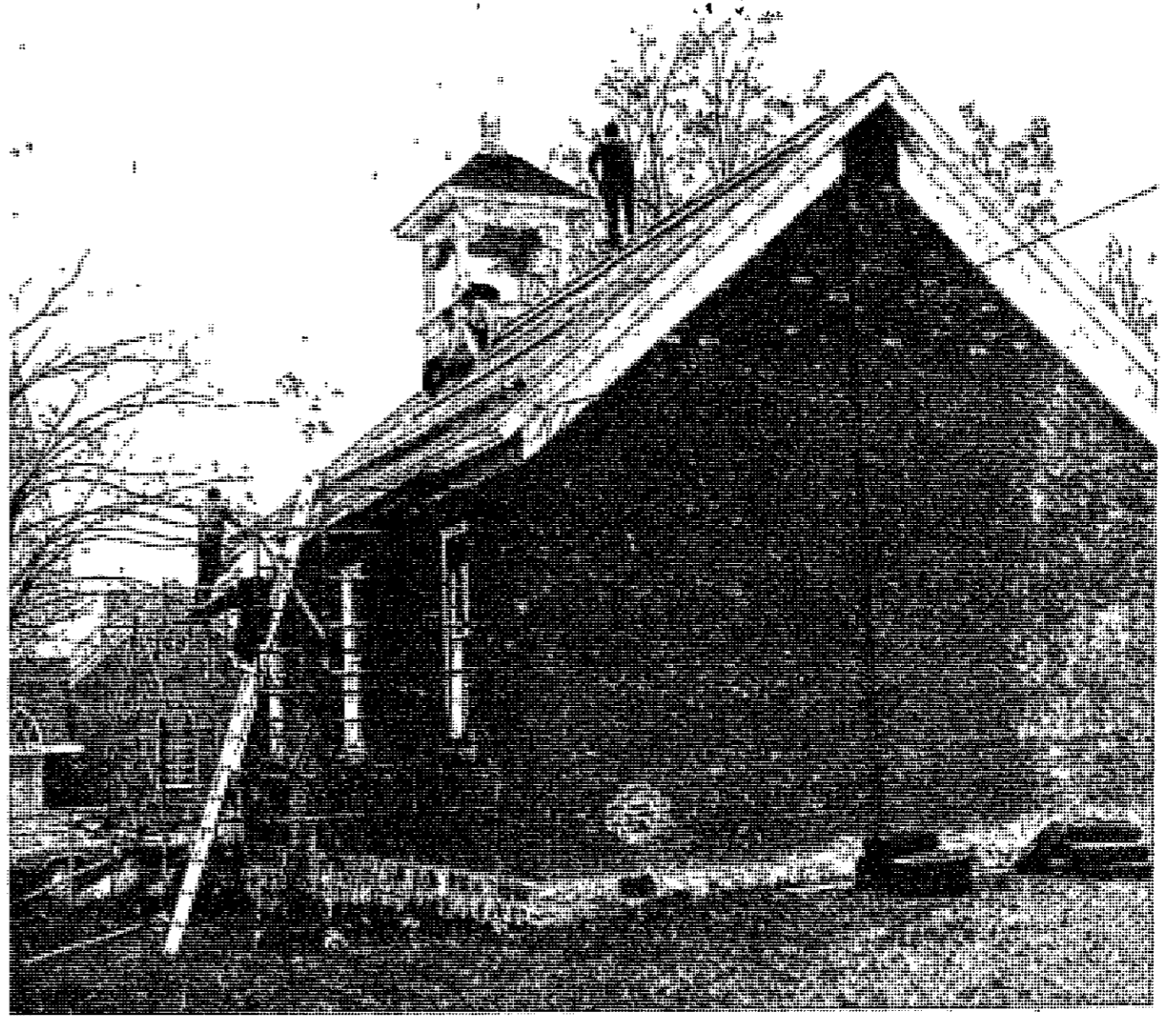
Wilcox is currently serving on the Little League board, is a past member of Rotary and the Chamber of Commerce, past City Planning Commissioner, Past City Planning Director, past City Drainage Engineer, was chairman of the board of directors of the United Methodist Church, was on the Red Cross board of directors, and on the Clinton County Country Club board of directors.

He is also a full member of the Michigan Society of Professional Engineers and Michigan Society of Planning Officials.

Wilcox and his wife, Marjorie, have 2 children, David, 12, and Sara, 5.

"I want to do something for the commission in my vocation," he told the County News. Wilcox noted that "nobody else on the commission has these qualifications.

He added, "The millage proposal for storm and sanitary sewers has now passed. I'm the only one running or on the City Commission with the qualifications to properly see the engineering, installation and inspection is handled as it should be.

Free blood screening tests available Nov 11

ST. JOHNS—Free blood-screening tests to detect diabetes will be available this year at Clinton Memorial Hospital, Sunday, Nov. 11, from 1 to 3 pm as part of the search for the more than 102,000 "unknown" diabetics in Michigan during the national observance of Diabetes Week, Nov. 11-17.

The program is being sponsored by the St. Johns Lions Club, Rotary Club, and Clinton Memorial Hospital.

Of the 22,974 persons tested during Diabetes Week last year, 435 were diabetics, 183 were potential diabetics, and 77 persons had "low" blood sugar.

An "unknown" diabetic is a person who has the disease but is unaware of it. The presence of diabetes may be indicated by excessive thirst, excessive urination, loss of weight, itching, constant hunger, easy tiring, slow healing of cuts and scratches, and changes in vision. In Michigan, diabetes is ranked as the 4th leading cause of death by disease, the second leading cause of blindness, and a contributing factor in half

of all heart attacks. Testing is limited to persons who are not known to have diabetes. Children with a family history of diabetes may be tested if accompanied by an adult.

The Michigan Diabetes Association, a United Way of Michigan agency, will provide the follow-up for "positives," those whose test is outside of the normal range, with a letter to the person tested and one to his physician indicating that further evaluation is needed. If you do not hear from the Association within 8 weeks, you may assume that your test result fell within the normal range.

Diabetes is most accurately detected by testing the patient after he has eaten a meal. Therefore, the following diets for breakfast and lunch are included: INSTRUCTIONS FOR YOUR 2-HOUR POST-PRANDIAL BLOOD SUGAR TEST

It is important to include all the following foods in the amounts listed in the sample

meal plans. DO NOT drink (other than water), eat, smoke, chew gum, candy cough drops, etc., following the meal until the blood sample is taken:

SUGGESTED BREAKFAST

- Fruit (banana, canned fruit or large glass fruit juice)
- 1 cup cereal (cooked or flakes). ½ cup milk
- 2 tsp sugar
- 2 pieces toast or bread
- 1 Tbsp jelly or jam
- Coffee or tea (cream and sugar if desired)

SUGGESTED LUNCH

- Vegetable or cream soup
- 5 crackers
- Meat or cheese sandwich (with 2 slices of bread)
- Dessert (cake, pie, pudding, etc)
- 1 cup milk

SUGGESTED LUNCH

- Hamburger and bun
- French fries or potato chips
- Dessert
- Large glass of pop (not diet)

Finish either of these meals 2 hours before you wish to take the test and report to the hospital 1 hour and 45 minutes later. Meals should be eaten within a 15-minute time period.

Driver pleads guilty to negligent homicide

ST. JOHNS—Jesse James Patrick of Chelsea, entered a plea of guilty Monday in Circuit Court to a charge of negligent homicide, a charge stemming from a fatal accident Sept. 4 on US-27.

Patrick was charged with unlawfully driving and operating a motor vehicle the wrong way on southbound US-27 in a "willful, reckless and wanton manner under the influence of alcohol."

A St. Johns resident, Thomas Cox lost his life when the vehicle driven by Patrick struck his car.

Proceedings were handled through the aid of an interpreter who assisted Patrick, who is a deaf mute.

Judge Leo Corkin defined the guilty plea as a type of nolo contendere plea (no contest) because Patrick claims he cannot remember the accident.

Because of the nolo contendere status, the prosecution presented 2 witnesses, Gordon Henry Harris who testified he saw Patrick driving north on southbound US-27 and later at the scene of the accident and Deputy Sgt. Donald Kennell, who investigated the accident, who said he "noticed the smell of alcohol coming from the defendant."

Don't burn leaves in streets

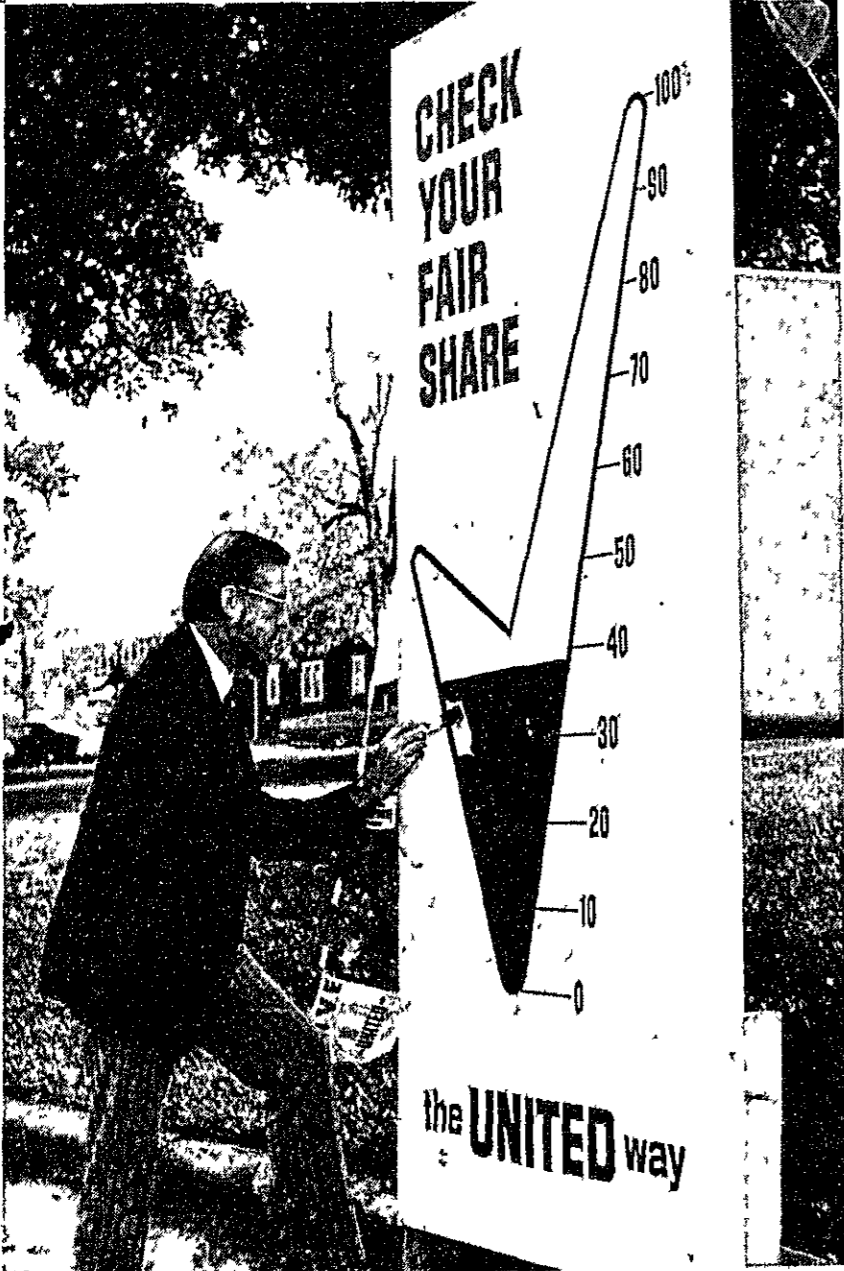
ST. JOHNS—Don't burn those leaves in the street—it's against a St. Johns city ordinance.

New telephone directory delivered

The new General Telephone directory is now being delivered to customers in Fowler, Fewam, Maple Rapids, Muir, and St Johns, Bill Langeland, district manager for the company, said today. More than 9,136 directories are included in the distribution.

"There are no major format changes this year, although the directory is larger because of expanded listings in both the yellow and white pages," Langeland said. "However, customers - especially new ones - may want to become familiar with the location of important information within

the directory." The directory includes an alphabetical index and table of contents on the inside front cover and a list for frequently called numbers appears on the inside back cover.

Langeland said a place to write in emergency numbers is located on Page One and instructions for all types of calls as well as a graphic description of both interstate and intrastate long distance rates appears in the introductory pages of the new directory.

"An explanation of the discounts applicable for dialing long distance calls direct is also

included," Langeland said.

The Michigan State law concerning threatening, obscene, nuisance or harassment calls is also explained in the new directory with the new edition, I suggest they carefully leaf through the old one," Langeland said. "Important

papers, letters and even money are sometimes placed in the telephone directory for safekeeping and then forgotten."

The main feature of the day's celebration will be the worship service patterned on the style of the medieval "mystery plays." Based on the Parable of the Good Samaritan, this modern morality play will take the form of a pilgrimage in which the

participants will identify with the roles of the Pilgrim, Samaritan, and Traveller. Highlights through the voices of the travellers will be the special concerns of the aging, single women, migrants, prisoners, draft resisters, blacks and other racial groups in our own nation, minorities in all countries, American military and business personnel on overseas assignments, and political refugees who have fled from their countries.

On World Community Day, local church women participate in the Church World Service Clothing Appeal by providing good, usable clothing for the disadvantaged and needy in many corners of the world as well as sewing cut-out garments.

All during the year, but especially on World Community Day, church women purchase \$3.00 Gift Certificates. These contributions may be designated for specific continuing needs such as blankets, shoes for children, self-help projects, etc, or for the "Where Most Needed" category which enables Church Women United to respond to emerging opportunities and to crisis needs.

In recent years, "Where Most Needed" monies have been used for hurricane victims in Texas, for flood relief in South Dakota and Pennsylvania, for people ravaged by war in Bangladesh and the Sudan, for medical supplies and vaccines in Sierra Leone, the Dominican Republic and Indonesia, for mother/child care clinics and nutrition courses in many areas.

explained what the company is doing to provide accurate and timely results locally.

"We've just completed the installation of a new traffic data system at our St. Johns central office which will provide us with much more accurate equipment usage information, allowing us to forecast what equipment we'll need and when we'll need it," he said.

He pointed out that, until now, the method of acquiring, processing, and analyzing telephone calling data was mainly a manual operation requiring an increasingly large amount of clerical time.

"Previously, someone had to personally visit each central office periodically, read the equipment usage meters every half hour of that day, and that information was compiled

manually later," the utility manager said.

"Now the information can be automatically transmitted at fifteen minute intervals direct to our division data collection center at Owosso where it is received on a teletypewriter printout readily available for computer analysis," he said.

In addition, Langeland pointed out that the daily readings of equipment usage could sometimes indicate equipment problems which would not normally show up through the past "spot reading" method.

The specialized equipment necessary to record the equipment usage information and transmit it to the data collection center costs \$20,000.

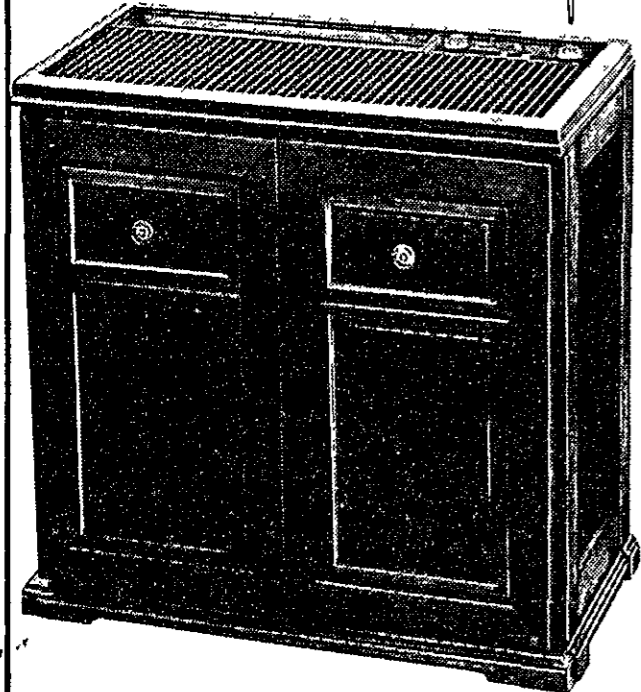

A costly St. Johns fumble was recovered by Grand Ledge who quickly took advantage of the break for another score. Muysenburg scored from the 1-yard line, climaxing a 23-yard drive. Again he added the extra point to give Grand Ledge a 21-14 lead.

Then, late in the 4th quarter, St. Johns marched 80 yards and Barz capped the drive by hauling in a 23-yard touchdown pass from Pertler with 4 seconds left in the game.

Trailing by 1 point, the Redwings went for the 2-point conversion, but Rusty Waggoner was stopped just inches short of the goal line.

Waggoner, who was injured in the game, topped the Redwing offense with 83 yards in 21 carries, his 2d outstanding game in a row. Last week he tore up the Hastings offense for over 150 yards.

Next in the rushing department behind Waggoner was

Harold Wellman, who carried the ball 6 times for 48 yards. Pertler had 28 yards in 7 carries and Barz carried the ball 3 times for 7 yards.

Pertler continued to be a potent weapon in the airways hitting on his 10 touchdown passes in the last 5 games. The junior quarterback connected with Barz and Lynch for 12 of the Redwings' 20 points. Ray Schueller picked up 20 yards for the Redwings on the receiving end of 2 passes.

Coach Ernie Becker said the offenses of both teams, however, caused St. Johns and Grand Ledge trouble in stopping each other defensively.

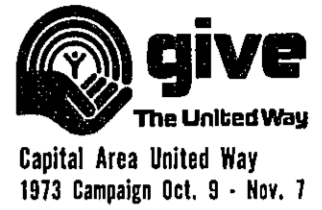

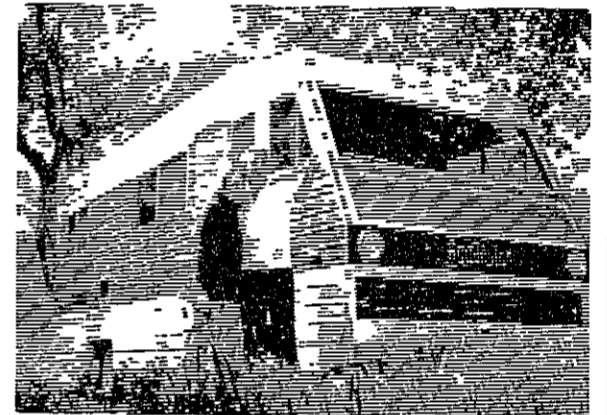
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Potent Pirate offense upsets Fowler 25-22

THE PIRATES went ahead again the 1st quarter when Walter scored from 8-yard line. The conversion attempt failed, but P-W led 13-8.

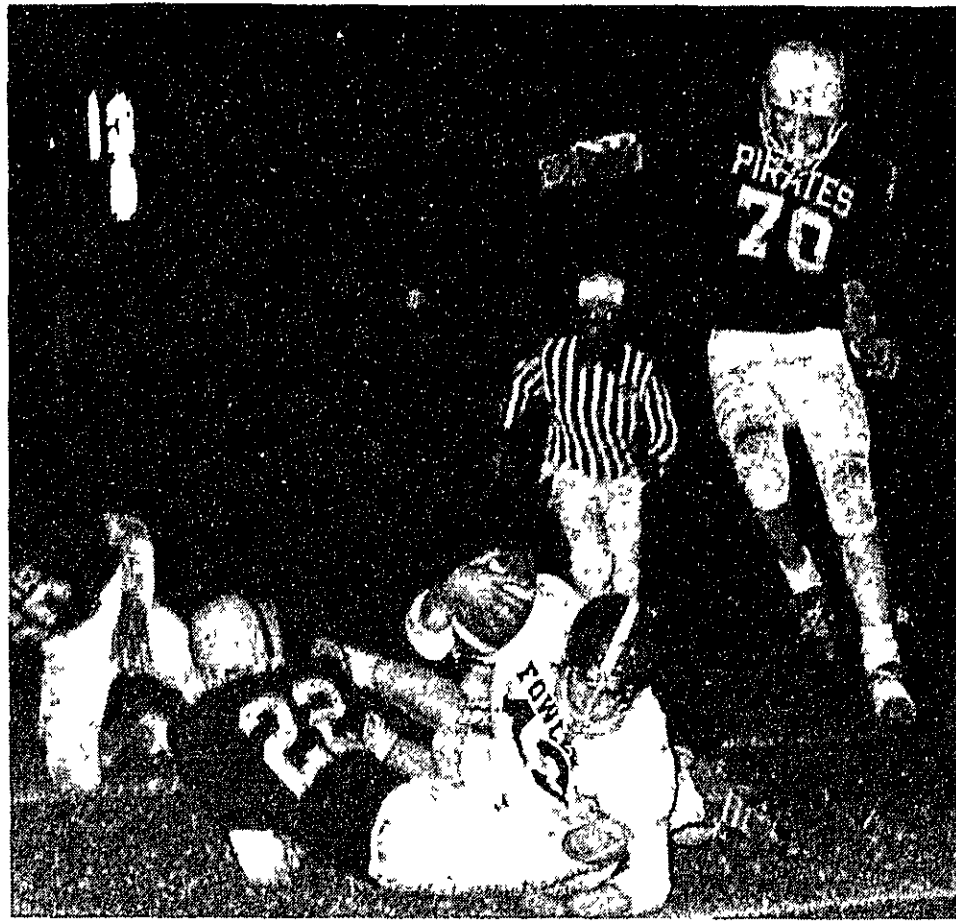
The lead changed hands once more in the 2d quarter when Terry Thelen scored from the 1-yard line, the conversion failed and Fowler led 14-13.

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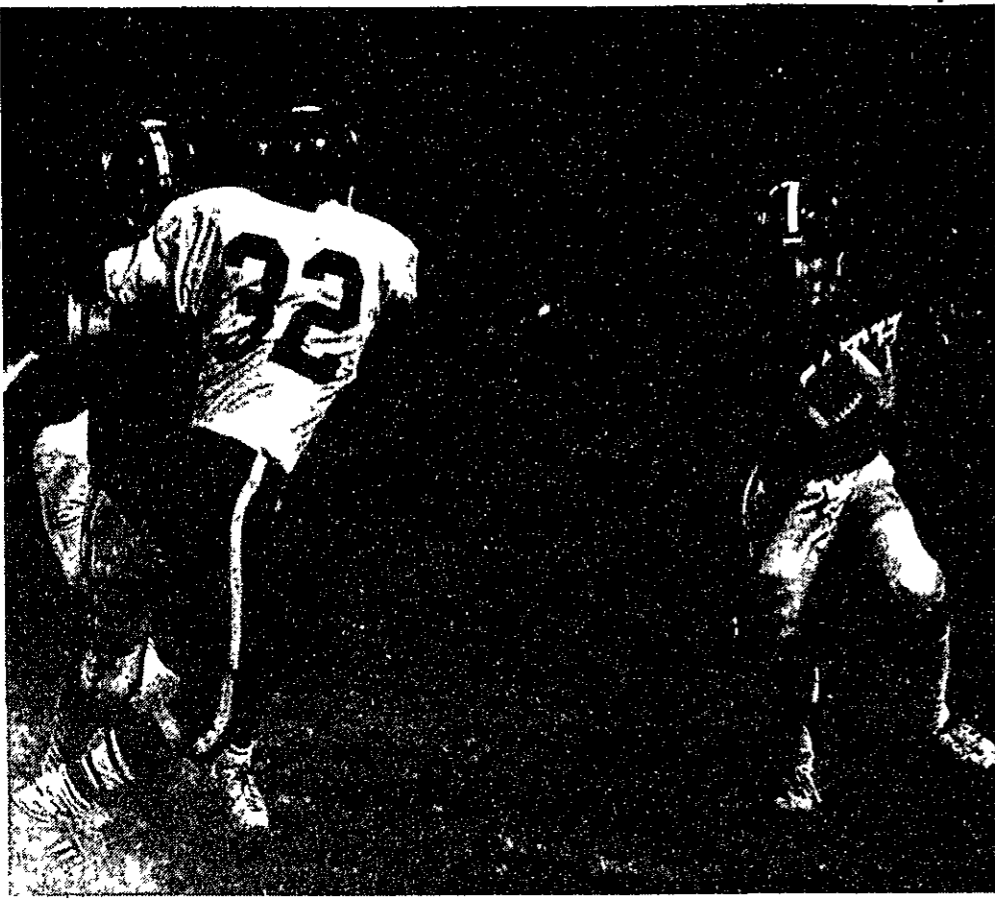
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Ovid-Elsie battles Swan Valley to very end, but loses 7-0

Upon resuming session Dr. Jose Linas and Richard Cooper from Community Mental Health appeared. Dr. Linas briefly reviewed the drug abuse program. He spoke on P.A. 56 - S.B. 568, known as "substance abuse service act". He asks that the Act 54 Board be designated as the coordination agency to administer the program. (The Board did approve a resolution designating the Mid-Michigan Health Office as the coordination agency 8-7-73). Chairman referred the matter to the Government and Personnel Committee for study and to make a report at the October 9th meeting.

They also request to transfer from contingency fund \$6500 (for blacktop) to line item 856, maintenance of other county property budget. Shepard moved, supported by Hufnagel, to approve the request. Voted and carried.

Probate Court Budget.

The committee recommends to the Board to transfer from contingency fund \$10,500.00 to line item 201, salaries. Shepard moved, supported by Gilson, to approve the request. Voted and carried.

Zoning Commission Budget. The committee approved the following:

1. The transfer from line item 966, vehicles, \$1200.00 and line item 967 office equipment, \$1000.00, to line item 802, salaries and wages-permanent, to cover zoning per diem which was omitted from the original budget.

The committee approved a request from Ben Swanchara to attend the Michigan Association of Animal Control Officers Convention at Cadillac, September 19th, 20th and 21st. Also approved was a request from Leon Thelen for he and F. Bruce Wood to attend an Advance Short Course for Assessing Officers at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, October 23rd thru 25th.

Overway reported on a hearing which he attended in Lansing August 15th on H.B. 5055 (Land Use Bill). The meeting was well attended but not very many persons were free to express their feelings. Those who did speak were both pro and con. Considerable discussion followed.

Chamberlain reported on the Road Commissions 1974 program. They plan to place a mat on eighteen (18) miles of road and will request \$300,000 for construction costs.

The Board recessed for lunch at 12 o'clock noon.

P.M. SESSION

On again being called to order, Arnold Minarik presented a request by Dale Martin for a Special Use Permit to operate a sand and gravel operation. (Duplain Township). Zeeb moved, supported by Reed, to approve the request as submitted by Dale & Carolyn Martin for a Special Use Permit to operate a sand and gravel operation on the following described property:

Commencing at the center of Section 31, T8N, T1W, Thence North 61 rods, thence West 104 rods and 8 links, thence South 61 rods, thence East to place of beginning; also the West 60 acres of NE 1/4 of Section 31, T8N, R1W, Duplain Township, Clinton County, Michigan, Except approximately 2 acres immediately surrounding a certain house and outbuildings situated on Hall Road.

In the discussion that followed, Commissioner Gove directed attention to complaints by persons living on Scott Road of the noise caused by the trucks, especially the night time hauling. The motion was then voted and carried.

Leon Thelen presented approximate costs for a county wide re-appraisal of the county as submitted by a number of different firms. They range from a low of \$189,000 to \$315,000 based on 21,000 property descriptions. Tax mapping, aerial mapping and tax parcel numbering were all topics of discussion. The County Assessing Officers will meet Tuesday September 11, 1973 and hopefully a committee can meet with them. Chamberlain suggests a county wide re-appraisal scheduled for 1975 with the Townships sharing the costs.

Hufnagel presented a request for an easement of right of way by General Telephone Company for a communications cable on the County Farm.

Zeeb moved, supported by Martin, to approve the request of the Social Services Department to improve the tenant house at the County Farm. (Health and Property Management Committee recommend this). Voted and carried.

Reed moved, supported by Gilson, to pay the bills for the month of August in the amount of \$24,743.25 as approved by the Audit Committee. Voted and carried.

Gove moved, supported by Overway, to authorize the Telephone Company to install the cable on the County Farm as

requested. Voted and carried.

Commissioner Henning reported on Chief Justice Kavanaugh's statements made at M.A.C. Annual Meeting relative to the State assuming jurisdiction of the Court system. They plan to take over District Courts by July 1, 1974. The matter was discussed.

Martin moved, supported by Shepard, to approve payment of Commissioners expense accounts as presented. Voted and carried.

Hufnagel moved, supported by Gilson, to recess until Wednesday, September 5, 1973 at 9:00 A.M. Voted and carried.

Meeting recessed at 3:30 P.M.

Wednesday September 5, 1973

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners resumed session Wednesday September 5, 1973 at 9:00 A.M. Chairman Shinabery called the meeting to order. Roll was called and quorum reported. Present were Derrill Shinabery, William Hufnagel, Maurice Gove, Donald Gilson, Duane Chamberlain, Roger Overway, Dyle Henning, Alta Reed, Virginia Zeeb, and Gerald Shepard. Harold Martin was excused due to illness in the family.

Chairman called on P. Berardo, Bath charter Township Attorney, who briefly reviewed the Bath Charter Township sewer situation. He then presented a Bond Resolution for Clinton County Sanitary Sewage System No. 4, (Charter Twp. of Bath) in the amount of \$3,550,000. (The total cost of the project to be \$4,297,684). State and Federal Grants will provide the difference. The matter was discussed. Shepard moved, supported by Zeeb, to adopt the Bath Charter Bonding Resolution as presented. On a roll call vote those voting aye were: Derrill Shinabery, William Hufnagel, Maurice Gove, Donald Gilson, Duane Chamberlain, Roger Overway, Dyle Henning, Alta Reed, Virginia Zeeb and Gerald Shepard. Voting nay - none. Martin absent. Ten (10) ayes, None (0) nays, One (1) absent. Motion declared carried unanimously.

BOND RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO DEFRAY A PART OF THE COST OF A SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM IN THE COUNTY OF CLINTON TO SERVICE THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF BATH IN SAID COUNTY; PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS RELATIVE TO SAID BONDS AND THE SECURITY THEREFOR.

WHEREAS: The County of Clinton, Michigan, acting by and through its Board of Commissioners and pursuant to the authority conferred upon it by Act No. 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended, did by resolution duly adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members-elect of said Board of Supervisors, establish a Department of Public Works in and for the County of Clinton for the administration of the powers conferred upon the County by said Act; and

WHEREAS: Pursuant to the authorization of Section 2 of said Act No. 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended, a Board of Public Works has been appointed and is functioning as the governing body of said Department of Public Works and

WHEREAS: The County, by and through its Board of Public Works, and the Charter Township of Bath, have entered into a contract for the construction, financing, operation and maintenance of a sewage disposal system in the Charter Township of Bath in said County; to be known as "Clinton County Sanitary Sewage Disposal System No. 4 (Charter Township of Bath)" to provide sewage collection and disposal service for areas of the Charter Township of Bath in need thereof, which said contract is herein set forth in full and made a part of this resolution, as follows; and

WHEREAS: Said contract has been duly approved by resolution of the Board of Public Works, the Board of Commissioners of the County of Clinton, and the Township Board of the Charter Township of Bath, and has been fully executed by all the parties thereto; and

WHEREAS: Plans, specifications and estimates of cost of the sewer improvements comprising the present scope of said Clinton County Sanitary Sewage Disposal System No. 4 (Charter Township of Bath) (described in paragraph 1 of the contract, and therein referred to as the "SYSTEM") have been prepared by Fishbeck, Thompson and Carr, Engineers of Lansing, Michigan, and have been duly approved by the Board of Public Works; and

WHEREAS: State and/or federal grants in the amount of Seven Hundred Forty-Seven Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-Four Dollars (\$747,684) are anticipated to assist in the construction of said project; and

WHEREAS: Under the provisions of said contract the Charter Township of Bath has obligated itself to pay a part of the cost of said system financed by the issuance of bonds of the County by paying the installments, plus interest, as specified in paragraph 10 of said contract, and has further obligated itself to levy taxes, annually, to the extent necessary, for the purpose of meeting said installments, which taxes are without limitation as to rate or amount, all as provided in paragraph 11 of said contract; and

WHEREAS: The County now proposes to issue its bonds, as authorized by said Act 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended, in anticipation of and secured primarily by said contractual obligation of the Charter Township of Bath, to provide the necessary funds to pay a part of the cost of constructing said system, and all things necessary to the authorization and issuance of said bonds under said Act 185 having been done, and the County of Clinton being now empowered and desirous of authorizing the issuance of said bonds; and

WHEREAS: The Board of Public Works has approved this resolution and recommended its adoption by the Board of Commissioners of Clinton County;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF CLINTON COUNTY, as follows:

- Section 1. Wherever used in this resolution or in the bonds to be issued hereunder, except where otherwise indicated by the context:
 - (a) The term "County" shall be construed to mean the County of Clinton, Michigan.
 - (b) The term "Township" shall be construed to mean the charter Township of Bath, Clinton County, Michigan.
 - (c) The term "Board" shall be construed to mean the Board of Public Works of the County of Clinton, Michigan.
 - (d) The term "System" shall be construed to mean the sewer mains, laterals, interceptors, pumping stations and all necessary appurtenances comprising the Clinton County Sanitary Sewage Disposal System No. 4 (Charter Township of Bath), as described in paragraph 1 of the contract, as set forth in the preamble to this resolution.
 - (e) The term "CONTRACT" shall be construed to mean the Contract heretofore made and executed between the COUNTY and the TOWNSHIP as set forth in full in the preamble to this resolution.
 - (f) The term "CONTRACTUAL PAYMENTS" shall be construed to mean the installment payments required to be made by the TOWNSHIP to the BOARD pursuant to the provisions of Section 10 of the CONTRACT, and pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds authorized by the provisions of this resolution.

Section 2. The plans, specifications and estimates for the SYSTEM, as prepared by Fishbeck, Thompson and Carr, Engineers of Lansing Michigan, are hereby accepted and approved, and it is hereby determined to be advisable and necessary for the public health of the COUNTY to acquire, construct and complete said SYSTEM as provided in said plans and specifications.

Section 3. The CONTRACT, as set forth in full in the preamble hereto, is hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

Section 4. The total estimated cost of acquiring and constructing the SYSTEM, including payment of incidental expenses specified in Section 6 of this resolution, which total estimated cost is Four Million Two Hundred Ninety-Seven Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-Four Dollars (\$4,297,684) is hereby approved and confirmed.

Section 5. The estimated period of usefulness of the SYSTEM is determined to be not less than fifty (50) years.

Section 6. For the purpose of defraying a part of the cost of said SYSTEM, including payment of engineering, legal and financing expense, and interest on the bonds for a period of twenty-four (24) months, there be borrowed the sum of Three Million Five Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$3,550,000), and that in evidence thereof there be issued the bonds of the COUNTY in the aggregate principal amount of Three Million Five Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$3,550,000) which bonds are sometimes hereinafter referred to in this resolution as the "BONDS".

Section 7. Said BONDS shall be designated CLINTON COUNTY SANITARY SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM NO. 4 BONDS (CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF BATH), the principal of and interest thereon to be payable primarily out of the CONTRACTUAL PAYMENTS required to be paid by the TOWNSHIP pursuant to the CONTRACT, and shall consist of seven hundred ten (710) bonds of the denomination of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) each, dated as of November 1, 1973, and payable serially as follows:

- \$ 50,000 on November 1 of each of the years 1977 to 1985, inclusive;
- \$ 75,000 on November 1 of each of the years 1986 to 1991, inclusive;
- \$100,000 on November 1 of each of the years 1992 and 1993;
- \$125,000 November 1 of each of the years 1994, 1995 and 1996;
- \$150,000 on November 1 of each of the years 1997, 1998 and 1999;
- \$ 75,000 on November 1 of each of the years 2000, and 2001;
- \$100,000 on November 1 of each of the years 2002 to 2005, inclusive;
- \$125,000 on November 1 of each of the years 2006 to 2011, inclusive;
- \$150,000 on November 1 of the year 2012; and
- \$175,000 on November 1 of the year 2013.

Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate or rates to be determined on public sale thereof, but in any event not exceeding seven and one-half per cent (7 1/2%) per annum, payable on May 1, 1974, and semi-annually thereafter on November 1 and May 1 of each year, both principal and interest to be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at a bank or trust company located in Michigan qualified to act as paying agent under State or United States law, to be designated by the original purchasers of the bonds, who may also designate a co-paying agent, which may be located outside of Michigan, qualified to act as paying agent under the law of the State in which located or of the United States, both of which shall be subject to approval of the BOARD. All bonds shall have proper coupons attached thereto evidencing interest to their respective dates of maturity.

Bonds maturing in the years 1977 to 1995, inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

Bonds maturing in the years 1996 to 2013, inclusive, shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the County, in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after November 1, 1988, at par and accrued interest payment date on or after November 1, 1988, at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, plus a premium as follows:

- 3 percent on each bond called for redemption on or after November 1, 1988, but prior to November 1, 1992;
- 2 1/2 percent on each bond called for redemption on or after November 1, 1992, but prior to November 1, 1996;
- 2 percent on each bond called for redemption on or after November 1, 1996, but prior to November 1, 2000;
- 1 1/2 percent on each bond called for redemption on or after November 1, 2000, but prior to November 1, 2004;
- 1 percent on each bond called for redemption on or after November 1, 2004, but prior to November 1, 2008
- 1/2 percent on each bond called for redemption on or after November 1, 2008, but prior to maturity.

Thirty days notice of the call of any bonds for redemption shall be given by publication in a paper circulated in the State of Michigan, which carries, as part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds, and in case of registered bonds, thirty days notice shall be given by mail to the registered holder at the registered address. Bonds so called for redemption shall not bear interest after the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem said bonds.

Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and the COUNTY Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute said BONDS, when issued and sold, for and on behalf of the COUNTY, and to affix the seal of the COUNTY thereto, and to execute the interest coupons to be attached to said bonds by causing their facsimile signatures to be affixed thereto. Upon the execution of said BONDS and the attached coupons, the same shall be delivered to the COUNTY treasurer, who is hereby authorized and directed to deliver said BONDS and attached coupons to the purchasers as hereafter determined by the BOARD, upon receipt of the purchase price therefor.

Section 9. Said BONDS and the attached coupons shall be payable primarily from the CONTRACTUAL PAYMENTS received by the BOARD on behalf of the COUNTY, for the payment of which the TOWNSHIP in the CONTRACT has pledged its full faith and credit pursuant to the provisions of Act 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 6, Article IX, of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, the TOWNSHIP has covenanted and agreed to levy taxes annually to the extent necessary to provide the funds to meet the CONTRACTUAL PAYMENTS, when due, in anticipation of which the bonds are issued, which taxes are without limitation as to rate or amount. All of such CONTRACTUAL PAYMENTS are hereby pledged solely and only for the payment of principal and interest on the BONDS.

Section 10. Pursuant to the authorization provided in Act 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended, the full faith and credit of the COUNTY is hereby pledged for the prompt payment of the principal of and interest on the BONDS as the same shall become due. If for any reason there are not sufficient funds on hand from the CONTRACTUAL PAYMENTS to pay the principal of and interest on the BONDS when due, upon written notification by the BOARD to the COUNTY Treasurer of the amount of such deficiency, the COUNTY Treasurer shall promptly deposit into the debt retirement fund for said BONDS the amount of such deficiency out of COUNTY funds. If it becomes necessary for the COUNTY to so advance any such moneys, it shall be entitled to reimbursement from any surplus from time to time existing in the fund from which said principal and interest are primarily liable, or from any other legally available source. The COUNTY recognizes and covenants that to the extent necessary to provide funds to meet its full faith and credit pledge herein provided, it is obligated to levy ad valorem taxes against the taxable property in the COUNTY, which taxes, pursuant to Section 6, Article IX, of Michigan Constitution of 1963, are without limitation as to rate or amount.

Section 11. It shall be the duty of the BOARD, after the adoption of this resolution and the sale of the BONDS herein authorized, to open a special depository account with the bank or trust company designated as paying agent for the BONDS, to be designated DEBT RETIREMENT FUND - CLINTON COUNTY SANITARY SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM NO. 4 (Charter Township of Bath) (herein sometimes referred to as the "DEBT RETIREMENT FUND"), into which account the BOARD shall deposit all CONTRACTUAL PAYMENTS as received and into which account any advances made by the COUNTY pursuant to Section 10 of this resolution shall be deposited. The moneys from time to time on hand in said DEBT RETIREMENT FUND shall be used solely and only for the payment of the principal of and interest on the BONDS, or to the extent of any surplus to reimburse the COUNTY for any advances made pursuant to Section 10 hereof.

Section 12. The operation, maintenance and administration of the SYSTEM, and the acquisition and construction thereof, shall be under the overall jurisdiction and control of the BOARD as the agency of the COUNTY. The provisions in the CONTRACT relative to the leasing of the SYSTEM to the TOWNSHIP, and the operation, maintenance and administration thereof of the TOWNSHIP or its sub-lessee, subject to the supervision and control of the BOARD, are hereby recognized, approved and confirmed.

Section 13. Said BONDS and the coupons shall be in substantially the following form:

Nothing contained in this resolution or the CONTRACT shall be construed to prevent the COUNTY from issuing additional bonds under the provisions of Act 185, Public Acts of Michigan, 1957, as amended, for any of the purposes authorized by said Act, but any such bonds shall in no way have any lien on or be payable out of the CONTRACTUAL PAYMENTS pledged to the payment of the BONDS of this authorized issue except such additional bonds as may be necessary may be issued, to complete the SYSTEM, pursuant to the authorization provided in Section 16 of the CONTRACT.

Section 15. (a) The COUNTY, and the BOARD, as the agency of the COUNTY, will punctually perform all of its obligations and duties under this resolution and the CONTRACT, including the collection, segregation and application of the CONTRACTUAL PAYMENTS in the manner required by the provisions of this resolution.

(b) The COUNTY, and BOARD as the agency of the COUNTY, will apply and use the proceeds of the sale of the BONDS for purposes and in the manner required by the CONTRACT and this resolution.

(c) The COUNTY, and the BOARD as the agency of the COUNTY, will maintain and keep proper books of record and account relative to the application of funds for the construction of the SYSTEM, and the CONTRACTUAL PAYMENTS received pursuant to the CONTRACT, or advanced by the COUNTY. Not later than three months after the end of each year, the BOARD SHALL CAUSE TO BE PREPARED A STATEMENT in reasonable detail, sworn to by its chief accounting officer, showing the application of the proceeds of the sale of the BONDS, the cash receipts from the CONTRACTUAL PAYMENTS or advances by the COUNTY during such year and the application thereof, and such other information as may be necessary to enable any taxpayer or any holder or owner of the BONDS, or any one acting in their behalf, to be fully informed as to all matters pertaining to the construction of the SYSTEM and application of funds therefor, or for the payment of the BONDS, during such year. A certified copy of said statement shall be filed with the COUNTY CLERK and the TOWNSHIP CLERK, and a copy shall also be sent to the manager or managers of the account purchasing the bonds.

Section 18. The BOARD is hereby designated for and on behalf of the COUNTY to (a) prepare and submit application to the Municipal Finance Commission for its approval of the issuance of said BONDS and the form of notice of sale as required by law; (b) prepare form of notice of sale, fix a date of sale, conduct the sale, and accept the best bid received at such sale; (c) publish such notice of sale, after approval thereof, the THE BOND BUYER of New York, New York, and in the CLINTON COUNTY NEWS of St Johns, Michigan, at least seven (7) full days prior to the date fixed for sale; and (d) do all other acts and take all other necessary procedures required to effectuate the sale, issuance and delivery of the BONDS.

Section 19. All resolutions and parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this resolution are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.

Section 20. This resolution shall become effective immediately upon its passage.

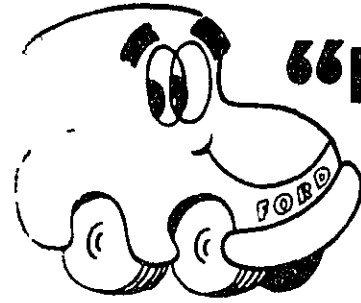

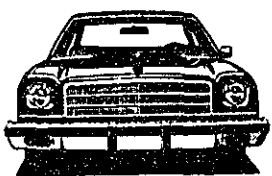

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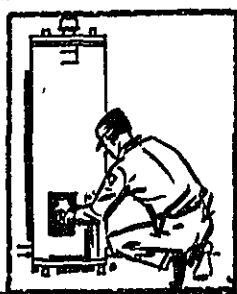

A great amount of time and effort in behalf of the hospital's patient population are required to insure a "Merry Christmas" for all patients. It takes time for clubs and civic organizations, churches and schools to formulate plans in order to participate in the Christmas effort at the hospital.

Organizations within the 34 county area assigned to the institution are invited to begin now to make plans to take part in the Christmas activities for Traverse City State Hospital's patients. Volunteers will begin wrapping gifts Nov 12. The hospital would like to receive as many of the gifts as possible by that date. Gifts should not arrive later than Dec 7, 1973.

The sorting and wrapping of all gifts take much time and effort on the part of our volunteers, and it must be completed by the 21st of December. Each year Community Relations Department obtains lists of all patients on all wards, on which their needed or desired items are indicated.

The hospital tries to provide gifts on the basis of this list as much as possible, but it can do so only if gifts arrive early enough.

The Spiro Agnew Show, seen on TV Oct 15, will soon become a weekly series. Famous crooks from all over the nation will be given 30 minutes each, minus commercials, to explain how they were framed.

The series will be sponsored by the American Bar Association as part of its pension program. This is because 99 percent of all famous crooks are lawyers. Prevent chore-time tragedy

your chin; get a good grip and lift slowly, keeping your back straight. Use leg muscles for most of the lifting. Carry sacks on your shoulder taking the strain off your spine.

About 1 in 10 farm accidents involves animals. A normally docile animal may charge, kick or bite in some situations. Female animals protecting young; male animals protecting

females, and sick or injured animals are unpredictable. Hogs and most pets also will fight to obtain or protect food. Federal farm safety law prohibits any employee under 16 from working in the yard, pen or stall of a bull, boar or stallion kept for breeding purposes. Nor can an employee under 16 work with cows or sows with newborn young, unless the farm is owned or operated by the youngster's father or legal guardian. When handling a horse, always let him know where you are and what you're doing, by talking to him or touching him gently without sudden movements. Run your hand down his leg before lifting his foot, so he isn't startled.
