## Teachers sign in wake of governor's budget axe

ST. JOHNS -- The St. Johns Education Association (SJEA) has announced that St. Johns school teachers ratified a new contract at a specially called meeting last week.

However, the tone of a news release by the SJEA indicated they are less than satisfied with the agreement.

In the release, it was stated:

"... With the information that the governor was going to cut school aid by a large percentage, the Association negotiations team reached a tentative agreement on the board's last salary offer. The association had previously decided to go to fact-finding to help settle the dispute over the settlement of the contract."

Joel Boyd, president of the SJEA, said, "Neither I, nor the team, felt good about asking our teachers to accept what we feel is an inadequate offer. The governor's cuts, however, ruined our case for fact finding. Many of our members are not satisfied."

"Boyd continued, "It is unfortunate that once again when the state is in an economic bind, public schools have to bear the brunt of the burden: why should the state of our economy hurt our children more than other segments of our economy? I look forward to a government that is committed to education as a necessity in our time."

The two areas that had previously stalled a settlement concerned the teachers' request for dental coverage and increased salary step increases.

In an earlier newsletter to staff members, Earl Lancaster, superintendent, explained that salary increases offered should also be considered with a 5% reduction in what had previously been deducted from a retirement contribution.

Lancaster said, "Last year the Legislature mandated that as of July 1, 1977, the retirement contribution (5% of all school employees would need to be paid by Boards of Education. In most peoples minds this action was long overdue."

"Had the 5% we have had deducted been exempt from income taxes and Social Security, it would not have been so bad, but for years, we had had it deducted and paid taxes and Social Security on it also."

"When the board picks it up, it will result not in a 5% gain, but, actually a 6% gain and even more depending on one's tax situation concerning dependents, exemptions, etc. In other words, when the board pays the retirement of 5% for each employee, it means that he would have needed at least a 6% increase in gross salary to take home the same number of dollars."

In regard to the governor's budget reductions, Lancaster included the following in a letter to Sen. Richard Allen: "I have just received a summary of the proposed budget reductions for education per the Executive order of the governor. Fully understanding the need for a reduc-

tion in state spending, I am writing this, not in a spirit of anger or despair, but simply to appraise you of the effect on our school

district's education program, so that when you make final decisions you have the facts in hand. "In our particular case, the reductions as they stand now will look like this:

1. 0.8% reduction of combined computed State Aid and Property Tax (\$4,477,824 x .008)	\$ 35,822.60
2. 35% reduction of adult membership (\$196,716 x .35)	\$ 68,850.60
3. Elimination of Reading Support Aid	\$ 7,000.00
4. 5% reduction in Transportation Aid	\$ 11,500.00
5. Special Education (estimated)	\$ 5,000.00
<b>Total Reduction</b>	<b>\$128,173.20</b>

Lancaster added, "It is true that we can make some cut. For example, we can eliminate student field trips, conferences for teachers and administrators and we can cut down on supplies."

"However, since about 83% of our monies are spent for salaries of personnel who are necessary to operate our program, and we are already 2 months into the year, it would be extremely difficult to eliminate any of them without a drastic destruction of education services."

## Varsity Night caps Redwing marching season for 1975

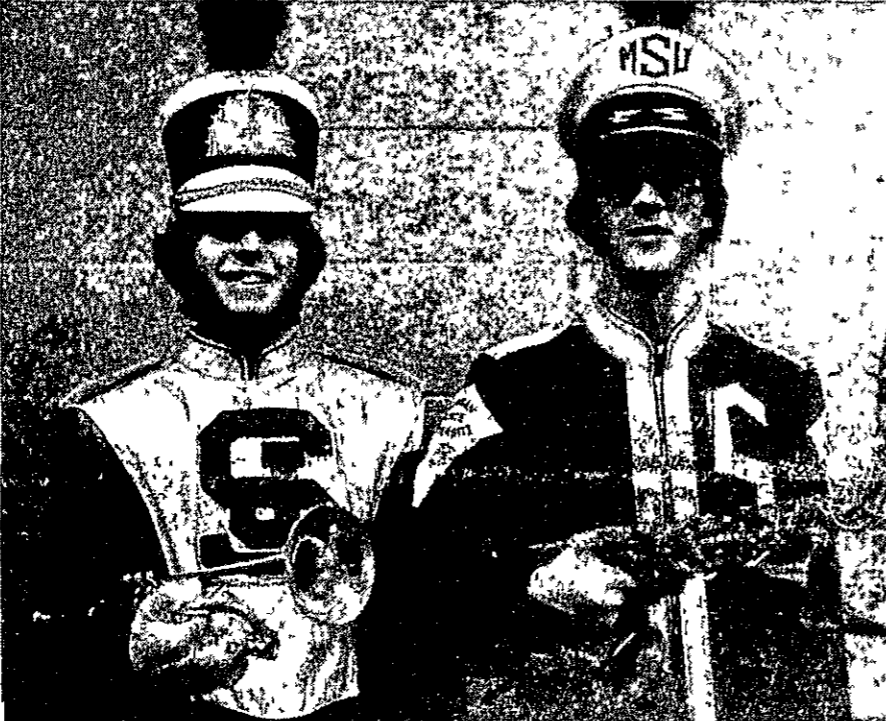

## Add Clinton County to disaster areas

ST. JOHNS -- Gov. William Milliken has asked U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz to add 9 Michigan counties, including Clinton County, to the 16 counties already designated as disaster areas of President Ford.

Storms and heavy rains between Aug. 21

and Sept. 6 caused an estimated \$100.3 million in crop losses in 25 Michigan counties.

The same storms did an estimated \$2.7 million in public and private damage in 16 counties. President Ford's earlier disaster declaration made farmers in those counties eligible for relief even though final figures

on the size of the losses in those counties were not known until last week.

Damage in Clinton County added to the list was set at \$8,440,540.

If designated as a disaster area, farmers in those counties will be eligible for low-interest federal operational loans.

## Bath names superintendent

BATH -- James Hixon is the new superintendent of Bath Community Schools. Hixon has been serving as acting superintendent since early September when former Superintendent Roger Carlson resigned unexpectedly.

At their Oct. 23 meeting, the Bath School Board made Hixon superintendent--giving him him a 3 years contract that is renewable annually.

Hixon, 43, has been with Bath Schools for 8 years and has been elementary school principal for the last 5.

Prior to coming to Bath, Hixon taught in Laingsburg and Lansing. Hixon earned a masters degree from MSU and is now finishing a dissertation for a doctorate degree from the same school.

A native of Tennessee, Hixon and his wife, Lou, have 2 boys, 17 and 11.

## Chloe Padgitt receives state-wide recognition

ST. JOHNS -- Mrs. Chloe Padgitt, Clinton County Extension home economist, was recently honored at the state Annual Cooperative Extension Conference held at Michigan State University. She received the Rookie of the Year Award given to an outstanding agent with less than 2 years' Extension experience.

She also received runner-up honors in the State Team Award, along with Lorraine Sprague and Phyllis Johncock, Gratiot and Shiawassee County Extension Home Economists. They were selected for their program in nutrition education for elementary school children, Vitality and Vittles. Over 1,500 children in Clinton County will be enrolled in it this year.

Mrs. Padgitt has conducted special educational programs for young families, migrant workers and the elderly. She represents Clinton County on the Tri-County Aging Consortium Board. In cooperation with several local agencies, she has helped

establish a Friendly Visitor Service for the county's isolated elderly.

A wide variety of workshops and classes have been conducted by Mrs. Padgitt. Topics range from parenting to recycling household items to family financial management.

Prior to joining the Extension Service in January, 1974, Mrs. Padgitt was an instructor in Family and Child Science Department at Michigan State University. She was previously a family living teacher in the Okemos Schools.

Commenting on the awards this week, County Extension Director, Jim Pelham, said, "they couldn't have found a more deserving person for the Rookie Award and the area team combination of Lorraine

Sprague, Phyllis Johncock and Chloe is indeed difficult to beat.

"Chloe has very definitely improved on a good family living program in Clinton County and has displayed rare perceptibility in determining family living

needs. Her efforts in developing programs of interest to all homemakers is to be commended and her progress with both the very young homemakers and senior citizens has been exceptional."

## Sewer rates remain the same-- for awhile

DeWitt Twp. residents won't have to worry about their monthly sewer usage rates going up--at least for right now.

The Township Board of Trustees decided at their Oct. 23 meeting to wait until after Jan. 1 before they consider raising the monthly user rate from \$10.50 to \$12.

They won't decide now because they want to wait until the audit of the County Department of Public Works (DPW) is completed and the Herbison Road treatment plant is turned over by the DPW to the South Clinton Sanitary Sewer Authority.

In a related matter, Township Attorney J. Richard Robinson presented the board with an ordinance that will allow those hooking into the sewer system to pay the \$1,400 tap-in fee by installment. At present, township residents can only pay the tap-in fee by cash.

The new ordinance will take effect 30 days after it is approved by the board. Even then, (See Page 19)

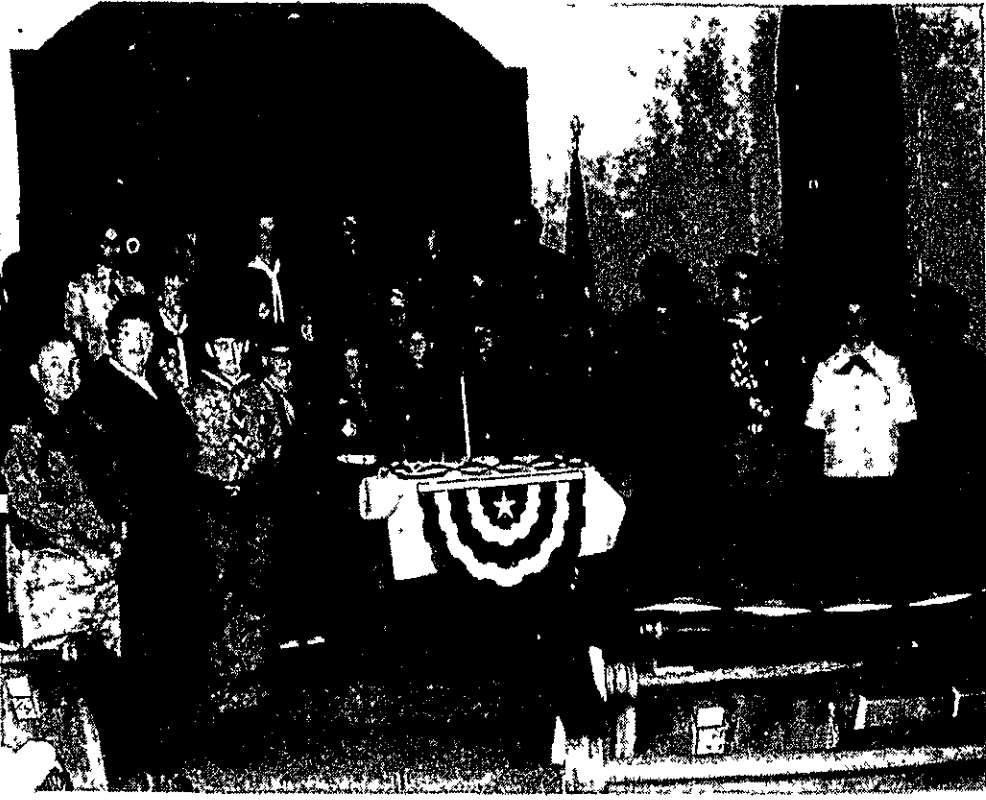

### Fuzzy transportation

Larry Claffin, 5900 Wildcat Rd., stands besides his 1963 Plymouth that's not just your run-of-the-mill used automobile. The surface of the body features purple and black nylon fiber. The fuzzy surface is applied upon epoxy with a 60,000 volt static charge that applies the fiber electrically to the surface. The surface lasts 10 years on the exterior and is completely permanent on the interior. How do you wash a purple and black fuzzy car. Claffin says the same way you wash any car—you can even run it through a car wash.

## TCRPC holds first water quality control meeting

The Tri-County Regional Planning Commission (TCRPC) will hold the first technical meeting of the region's quality control planning program, Nov. 6. According to regional planners, now is the time to get involved because the two-year project is just getting started. So, if you are interested and if you live in Clinton, Eaton and Ingham counties, planners are encouraging you to participate. Under the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency funded program, TCRPC and local governments will hammer out a pollution clean-up plan. Goals of the plan are to make the region's water safe enough for recreation and wildlife. The TCRPC stated in a news release: "With 4 out of the 15 most polluted rivers in Michigan located in our midst, the job won't be easy. Parts of the Grand and Red Cedar Rivers, all of Sycamore Creek, and a section of the Battle Creek River are on the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' polluted rivers list." To solve local water pollution problems, citizens, elected officials and technicians will be working together on 11 committees. Among these are land use, solid waste, water quality, agriculture, economic development, and flood control. Michael Scieszka, Tri-County's chief land use planner, explained that committee members will be looking for the most cost-effective way to plan and manage municipal and industrial wastewater, residual wastes, storm and combined sewer runoff, and nonpoint source pollution. Things like pesticides, soil erosion, litter and petroleum are called nonpoint source pollution because their origin is hard to trace. "Pumping huge sums into waste treatment plants is not the cure-all for pollution," said Scieszka. "For that reason, our attention will be directed toward fiscal policies, land management and nonpoint source pollution prevention." "Secondary and tertiary treatment facilities can help clean up domestic and industrial wastes, but they cannot curb runoff which washes junk, pesticides and oil into storm drains and streams every time it rains." The nature of the region's rivers and streams seems to compound the problem. "Low water flow over the summer months wipes out their self-cleaning process," said Scieszka. "Even when governments and agencies make sure wastes are 95% pure, the discharged microorganisms use up what oxygen there is during low flow." The results - impure water. At the Nov. 6 meeting, planners will explain where the water quality program will be headed during the course of the next 2 years. The meeting will be held at 9:30 a.m. in the Tri-County offices, 2722 E. Michigan Avenue, Lansing. Governor Milliken designated TCRPC as the Water Quality Planning Agency for the region in March, 1975.

## MSU receives grant to study pesticide effects on humans

EAST LANSING, Mich. — Michigan State University has been awarded \$38,000 from the Michigan Department of Public Health (MDPH) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to study pesticide effects on humans.

"EPA and MDPH will send us human blood samples from six states to be studied for possible chromosome damage. These samples will be drawn from persons who are regularly exposed to pesticides — such as farmers, migrants, pesticide manufacturers and pest control operators," says Dr. Roger Hoopingarner, MSU entomologist and grant recipient.

computer and studied together with the individual's biochemical and neurological records for any possible relationship to chromosome damage. The person's health and pesticide exposure history are also included in the study.

"Pesticides are usually screened quite well," says Hoopingarner, "but some turned out to be too persistent in the environment and some effects take time to uncover."

The purpose of the project is to reduce the waiting period needed to uncover dangerous pesticides. "The biggest threat pesticides pose to humans is damage to the reproductive organs or causing a cell to become cancerous," says Hoopingarner.

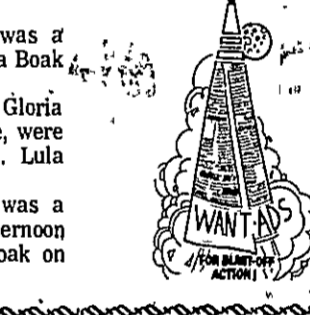
**Fowler**

## Jim's Column

### Livestock report

Jim Pelham  
Clinton County Extension Director

The outlook for beef and hog markets remains on the bright side well into 1976 but some softening may occur later on. The following report is compiled from information gathered by Dr. George Dike, Michigan State University agricultural economist.

#### BEEF

The October Crop Report added further support to the estimate of corn production, exceeding last year's level by 1 billion bushels. At first glance, expectations are that the market will soak up all the extra corn at considerably reduced prices.

This cheaper feed would result in more feedlot placements and an expansion in the hog industry, resulting in more meat on the market and somewhere down the road, lower live animal prices.

According to the October 20 report, indications are the marketing of fed cattle for the remainder of 1975 will average 9 percent under year-ago

volumes. Although numbers on feed as of October 1 were up only 2 percent from year earlier levels, placements are estimated to be increased by 23 percent.

If this actually happens, it will bring the next (Jan. 26) cattle on feed report more in line with the situation seen two years ago.

The December hogs and pigs report will be the next detailed hog release from USDA. With the current profitability of hogs and cattle and prospects of plentiful feed, it seems that placement for cattle on feed will continue the expansion on a modest level.

Though it is not clear what the preferred weight placement or kinds of feeding rates will be, it seems likely that heavier types will prevail in early stages of feedlot build up.

Such action would reduce some of the slaughter of nonfeds as has been seen, reducing total beef supplies in early winter and adding strength to slaughter prices.

Look for choice steer prices to be in the mid to low \$40's at Omaha before year end, followed by recovery of \$1 to \$2 in each of the first and second quarters of 1976.

Price weakness is expected in the third and fourth quarters when supplies of beef will be plentiful and pork supplies will be increasing.

#### HOGS

Hog production is likely to increase significantly with the 1976 spring pig crop. Withholding of breeding gilts from slaughter will further reduce hog slaughtering and help hold prices up this winter and spring.

Farrow to finish hog operations are expected to be profitable into the fourth quarter of 1976. For hog producers who need to tighten their planning, July and August 1976 hog futures were in the mid \$40s recently and along with forward contracting, could be considered as pricing alternatives.

## Bills Column

### Telfarm advantages

Modern farming requires an extensive record keeping system, and one of the best is Michigan State University's Telfarm system operated by the agricultural economics department.

It can be used with any type of Michigan farm operation from dairy to cash crop and roadside marketing.

Telfarm is a computer-based business analysis and counseling program for farm management designed to increase earnings.

Because of the influence of world markets on Michigan's agriculture, fluctuations in farm income can be severe. Through Telfarm, participants can stabilize these influences by knowing the current farm financial situation.

Telfarm is a cost sharing program to which the average member pays \$180 a year. All information is strictly confidential but is used as part of MSU's agricultural economics teaching and research program.

The program provides the following features:

#### BUSINESS ANALYSIS AND COUNSELING

This is a business comparison with other farms, individual counseling on business analysis and a computerized crop and livestock profitability analysis.

#### TAX FILING AND MANAGEMENT HELP

A 10-month summary for tax planning and management includes financial totals for a year with a Schedule F printout for easy tax filing. It also provides an up-to-date depreciation schedule including a summary of capital gains and losses, returnable investment credit and a basis for depreciation recapture.

#### CREDIT ACCOUNTS

All borrowing and payments may be reported by account number. Monthly reports will then show the balance owed on each account. Accounts receivable may also be reported and updated.

#### CASH FLOW SUMMARY

To account for the balance of all income and outgoing money each month, reporting must include credit accounts, off-

farm income, family living expense, plus all farm transactions.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENT

This is a net worth statement listing all assets and liabilities provided in the analysis report. It is the one true way to measure financial progress. Credit agencies often require this before granting a loan.

#### OFF-FARM BUSINESS

A limited amount of off-farm business venture, such as seed corn sales, may be reported separate from the farm so it can be reported on Schedule C tax form. The same can be done for rental of a tenant house for Schedule E.

#### TELFARM PAYROLL SYSTEM

The Telfarm speedboard payroll system is another option designed to satisfy labor record requirements and to reduce time spent in record keeping where large numbers of workers are employed.

Each month a payroll journal is submitted to Telfarm and the copy serves as a check ledger, providing a statement of earnings to the worker.

While good records are essential for the farm operation, they are indispensable for insurance settlements or court hearings. Telfarm maintains complete duplicate copies of all records of participants on tape, so if anything happens to the originals transaction information is still available.

Began in 1964, Telfarm has over 1,400 participants. MSU's farm record, keeping system dates to 1928, originally serving farmers in a three-county area. The program went statewide the following year, providing a simple year end business analysis.

The system became more detailed after World War II, and with the advancement of computers and growing complexity of farm operations, evolved to a system which can service modern agriculture in the future.

#### 30 YEARS AGO

Nov. 8, 1945

Donations totaling nearly \$3,000 have been received for the Clinton County Memorial Park Fund during the past week, according to a report from L. W. Wolf, treasurer of the Memorial Association. Gifts to the fund to date total \$31,574.

The State Supreme Court, in a far-reaching decision issued Monday, has declared that city, county, township and school district taxes must all be levied on equalized valuations.

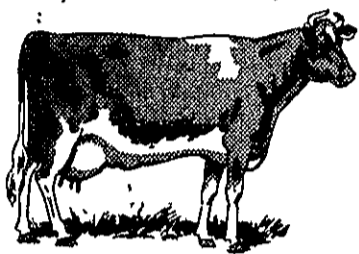

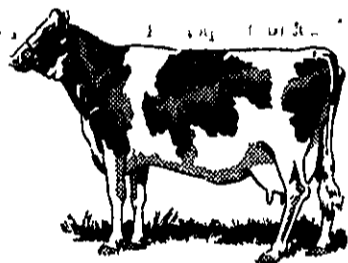

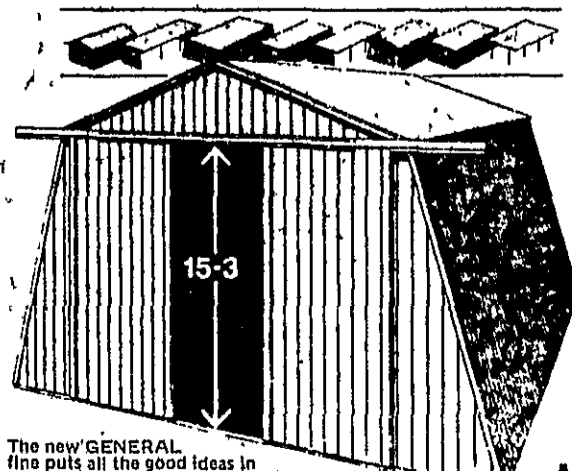

The middle 2 weeks in October I spent walking in the footsteps of America's forebearers. I left Lansing Oct. 8 going into Canada at Sarnia and on to Niagara Falls for the first night, the next morning crossing over into New York State and on to Bennington, Vermont where we visited the monument to the Battle of Bennington which was fought in 1779 and the museum.

Then we took the Molly Stark Trail across the Greene Mountains to Brattleboro, Vt. across the corner of New Hampshire and into Mass. The colors were glorious everywhere.

We arrived in Boston on Oct. 10 for 2 days. We went aboard the ship "Old Ironsides" in Boston Harbor which is still a ship of the U.S. Navy. We visited Old North Church, Faneuil Hall, Bunker Hill monument, Old State House and the campuses of Harvard, M.I.T. & Radcliffe.

We toured Concord & Lexington and the homes of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow & Louisa May Alcott. On the 12th we left early for historic Cape Cod where we stopped and went on board Mayflower 2, viewed Plymouth Rock and observed life as it was lived in the 1620s at Plymouth Plantation.

We went on to Provincetown and spent the night in Hyannis. Our next stop was Newport, R.I. where we toured the Breakers Estate, erected in the 1890's by Cornelius Vanderbilt, also visited Trinity Church built in the 1720's.

The next day we went to Mystic, Conn. where we spent most of the day at Mystic Seaport, a restored fishing village with over 60 buildings as they were in the whaling days. We spent the night at New Haven, Conn. and saw the Yale Campus.

The next day we visited the campus of West Point, this country's oldest military college. We went on to Bear Mountain State Park then on to Philadelphia for 2 days. Here we visited Independence Hall and saw the Liberty Bell, Betsy Ross' House and Christ Church where Washington worshipped and where 7 of the signers of the Declaration of Independence are buried.

We also visited Benjamin Franklin's grave. We toured the U.S. Mint and made our own coins. We left on the 18th and visited the Amish in Lancaster County, Pa. and had dinner at the Good & Plenty Amish farm. From there we went to Gettysburg and toured the battlefields before heading back to Michigan.

It really was a wonderful trip and gave great insight into the background of our Founding Fathers. Now, after a week in the office, I am off to Williamsburg, Va. to continue my walk back into history.

# Fowler Eagles hold off determined Webberville 14-8

**FOWLER**—Somewhere along the line this season, somebody forgot to tell Webberville they weren't supposed to be a factor in the CMAC football race.

They played the upstart role again Friday, taking unbeaten Fowler right to the line before falling to the Eagles 14-8.

Earlier in the season, Webberville surprised the league with upsets over DeWitt and Potterville.

Friday night, Webberville knocked on the upset door and actually led Fowler 8-6 at the half.

Dave Schmitt picked up the first score of the game, giving Fowler a 6-0 lead with a 2-yard run. The try for conversion failed.

Then, in the 2d period, Webberville's Craig Snow connected with Larry Franks on a 14-yard scoring pass.

Snow carried in the conversion to put Webberville ahead 8-6.

Fowler came back in the 3d quarter and a determined Dave Schmitt powered over from the 3-yard line.

John Mueller carried in the conversion for 2 points and Fowler led 14-8, the eventual winning margin.

Schmitt did more than just score twice for the Eagles. He very likely prevented Webberville from scoring twice when he picked off passes by quarterback Snow.

Schmitt intercepted once on the 10-yard-line and the other pick-off came in the end zone.

Schmitt also put his foot to good use for the Eagles late in the game when Fowler was stalled deep in their own territory.

After Schmitt boomed one punt almost the length of the field, the kick was called back on a penalty.

So, in case anybody missed it the first time, Schmitt demonstrated again, kicking the second punt 80 yards with a little help from the wind and a couple of bounces.

Webberville's defense turned in a strong performance against Fowler and twice held the Eagles after they had driven inside the 10-yard-line.

The Eagles were stopped once on downs and Webberville ended another drive when they recovered a Fowler fumble.

Two Fowler touchdowns were called back because of penalties. The first was in the opening quarter when an off-sides infraction nullified a score.

A 4th quarter touchdown run of 14 yards by Dave Schmitt was called back on a holding penalty.

Offensively, Webberville held the edge over Fowler. They picked up 215 total yards while Fowler had 200 yards.

Webberville's offense Friday night was the type that can sting you at any time.

Their quick backfield several

times looked like they might go for the distance on quick openers. Quarterback Snow was also a strong part of their running game, carrying the ball himself of runs of 35 yards and 44 yards.

Alone on top of the CMAC, Fowler is assured of at least a share of the conference crown. The only way they could lose sole possession would be if they were to be upset by Portland St. Pats next week if Pewamo-Westphalia defeats Laingsburg.

St. Pats is 3-5 in the league. Pewamo-Westphalia holds 2d place in the CMAC with a 7-1 record, their only loss coming to Fowler in the 2d game of the season.

Fowler is currently in the running for a state play-off spot with 2 other schools in the region, Flint Holy Rosary and Beal City.

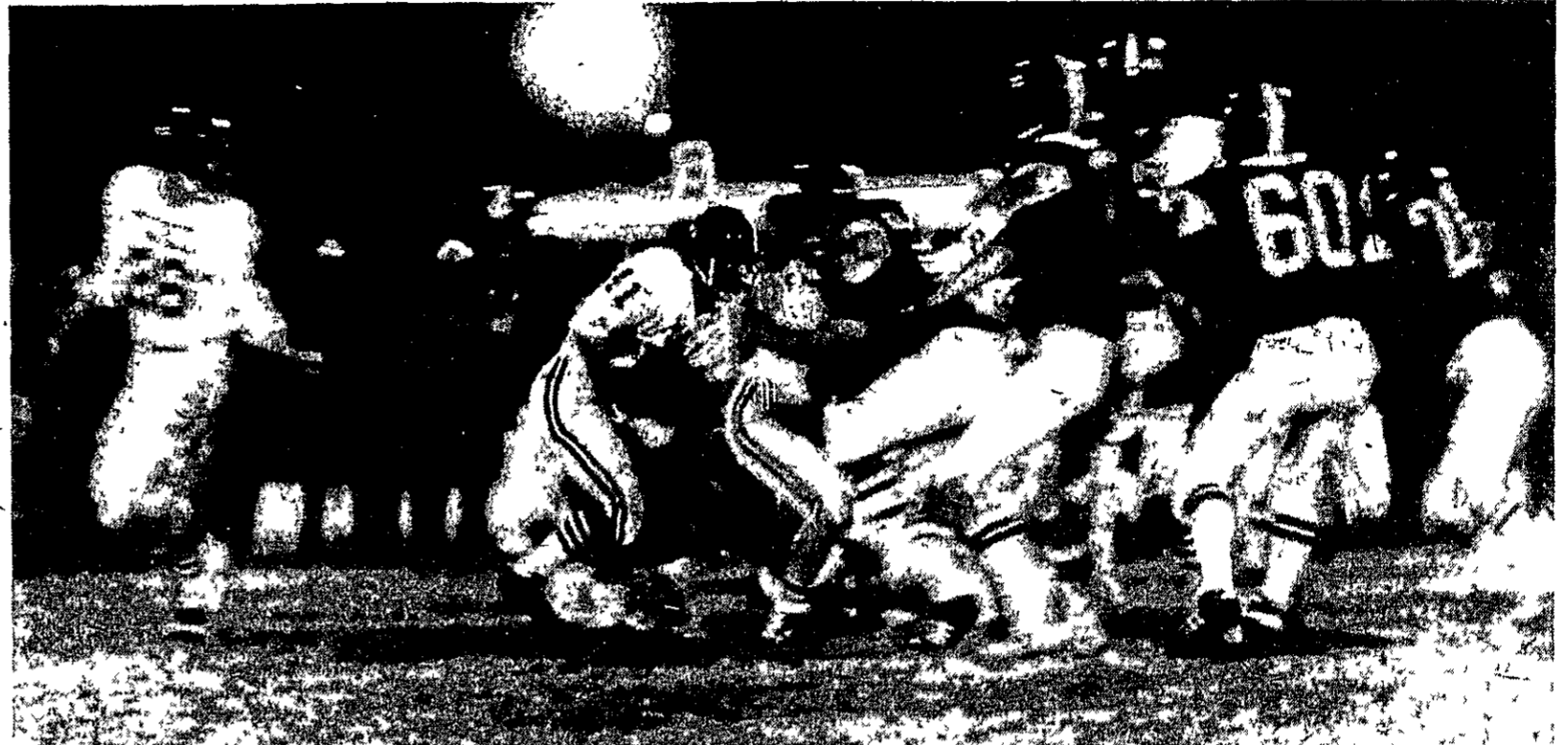
Beal City has a record identical to Fowler's, 8-0 and plays Holy Rosary this Friday.

Because of the point system being used to determine state playoff teams, Holy Rosary could possibly be picked even if they lose to Beal City.

Holy Rosary is 6-1, but plays several schools out of the Class D division to earn extra points.

On Holy Rosary's schedule this year were 4 Class B teams, 2 Class C and 2 Class D schools.

So, conceivable, Fowler could finish the season undefeated with a state first place rating and still not qualify for state post-season competition.

downed Lakeview to threaten Bath's perch at the top of the region in Class C.

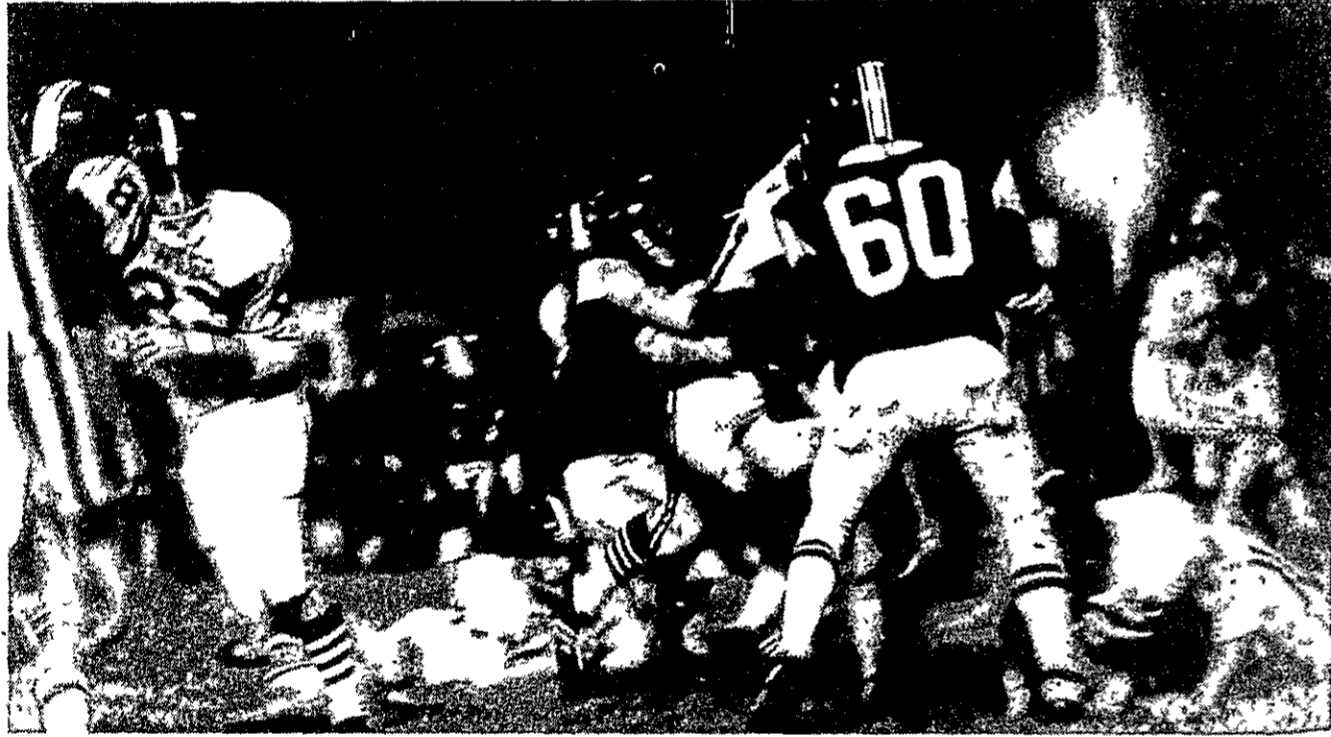
A victory Friday night over Monroe-Jefferson, while Portland has no more games, could vault the Bees back to the top.

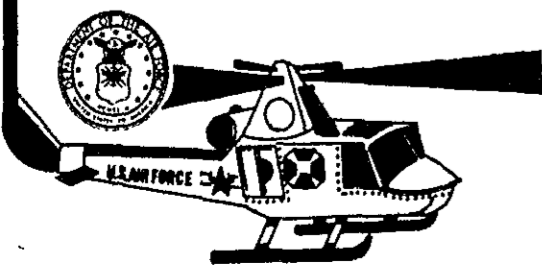

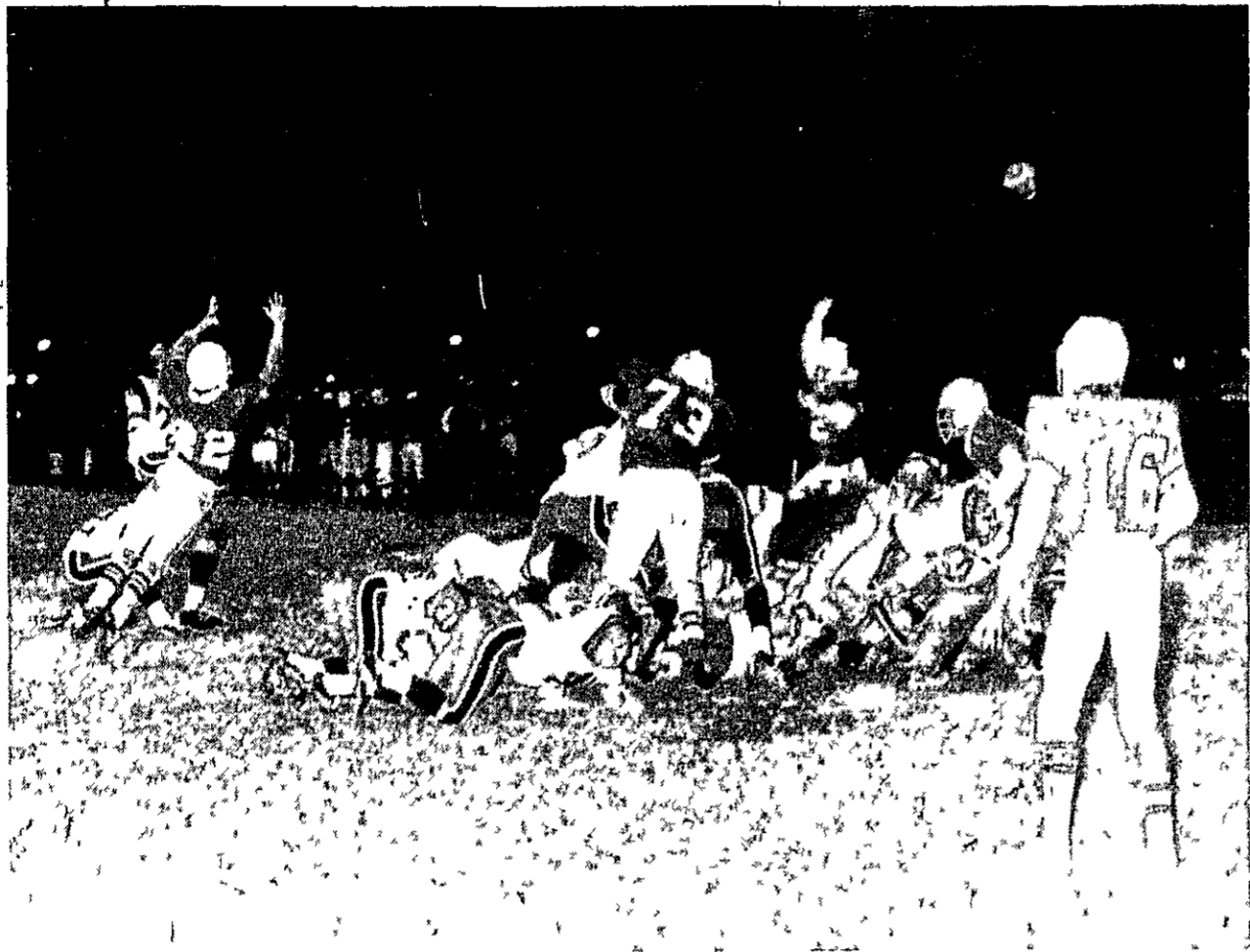

# Redwings down Mason 14-0, in state playoff contention



The extra point kick is off the mark, but St. Johns picked up all the scoring they needed with 14 points to down Mason 14-0.

ST. JOHNS -- For the St. Johns Redwings, it's getting to be a case of, "We beat you, now you beat somebody else."

The Redwings are currently in 2d place, shooting for a state football playoff spot and maintained their ground Friday with a 14-0 win over Mason.

However, teams the Redwings had beaten that would have given them added points in the playoff system didn't cooperate with victories.

St. Johns had beaten Everett and Grand Ledge and victories by those 2 teams against other schools earn playoff points for the Redwings.

But, there were no points to be had -- Grand Ledge fell to Okemos and Everett was upended by Lansing Hill. Hill had not won a game all season, but zapped Everett 14-10.

Meanwhile, St. Johns scored once in the 1st quarter and again in the 2d period and that was all they needed to pick up the 14-0 win over Mason.

Greg Hazle put the Redwings on the scoreboard in the 1st period when he hauled in a 6-yard pass from Keith Haske. The kick by Carl Bashore missed the mark and St. Johns led 6-0.

Nick Koenigsknecht set the stage as the first half was drawing to a close when put the Redwings in scoring position with an 18-yard run.

Jerry Bashore plunged in from the 2-yard-line, with time running out and Koenigsknecht ran in the 2-point conversion on a run.

St. Johns ground out 230 yards

on the ground and added another 6 in the air.

Mason finished the game with 158 yards rushing and passed for 32 yards.

Offensively, Koenigsknecht led the ground game for St. Johns, picking up 70 yards on 19 carries.

Mark Geller ran the ball 9 times for 46 yards. He also had a kick-off return of 28 yards and a punt return of 15 yards.

Quarterback Keith Haske was 1-for-2 in the air for 6 yards and had 1 pass picked off by the Mason defense. Haske added 33 yards rushing on 7 carries.

Rob Pulver was the big ball carrier for Mason and finished the game with 97 yards in 16 carries, for a 6.1 yards per carry average. Pat Hayhoe carried the ball 20 times for Mason, picking up 69 yards. Hayhoe had another 17 yards on 1 pass reception.

Defensively Ron Kingsbury led the Redwings in tackles with 8 solos and 4 assists.

Kingsbury also jarred the ball loose from Mason ball carriers twice.

Pet Kurucz and Ryan Pertler each turned in 10 tackles and Kurucz caused a Mason fumble. Mason fumbled 4 times and lost the ball twice.

Coach Joe Gonzales did not see the game as an outstanding performance by the Redwings, feeling part of it may have been caused by the let down after defeating Grand Ledge.

Gonzales said, "This was not one of our best played ball games and I feel that it was understandable after the big win over Grand Ledge."

"However, if we are to remain in contention for the state football playoffs, we cannot afford a mental let down against Ovid-Elsie."

Gonzales indicated Ovid-Elsie's losing record this season is no reason to treat the game lightly. "O-E is a good ball club," he said, "which has had some tough luck this season. Our scouts tell us that if we let down, we will pay the price to O-E. They report that Ovid-Elsie has some good runners and could gain a great deal of yardage if we don't play good defense."

The Redwings finish out the regular season against the Ovid-Elsie Marauders Friday night in St. Johns, capping an outstanding season for St. Johns.

Although the Redwings started the season with a loss, it was a strong performance against Mt. Pleasant. It was the first time St. Johns had scored against the Oilers and the final score was a close 14-6.

The Redwings then defeated Charlotte in the first conference game and, from then on, it was 1 victory after another.

They have earned the West Central Conference title with a perfect 4-0 record with wins over Charlotte, Ionia, Hastings and Grand Ledge.

In non-conference action, the Redwings knocked off Corunna and Mason, with the highlight of the season being a surprise to our Lansing neighbors when Everett came to town and went home on the losing end of a 13-8 score.

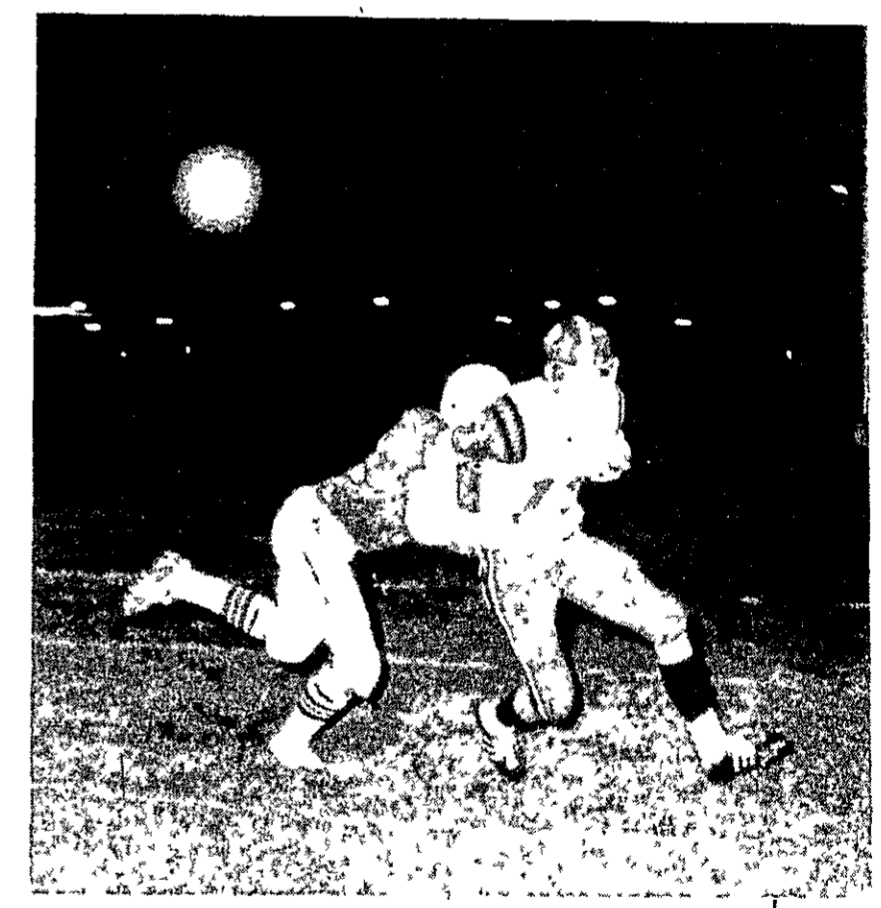

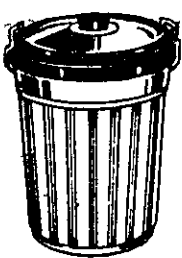

## Report progress at Sleepy Hollow

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the State Department of Highways and Transportation have told the county in letters to the County Board of Commissioners that they won't pay for the upgrading of roads leading to and from Sleepy Hollow State Park in Victor and Ovid Twp's.

This means that the county will very likely have to assume the financial burden of upgrading Price and Shepardsville Roads to accommodate the expected increase in traffic the new park will bring.

The Commissioners and County Planner Dennis Dunningan, don't think the county should be required to pay for the necessary upgrading (since the park is a state facility) and plan to ask both departments to reconsider their positions.

In related matters, the county board heard at their Oct. 7 meeting from DNR officials that the man-made Lake Ovid in the park is rapidly filling. Officials also said that the department plans to hold public hearings in St. Johns in the future to get some local response on what kind of traffic should be allowed on the lake.

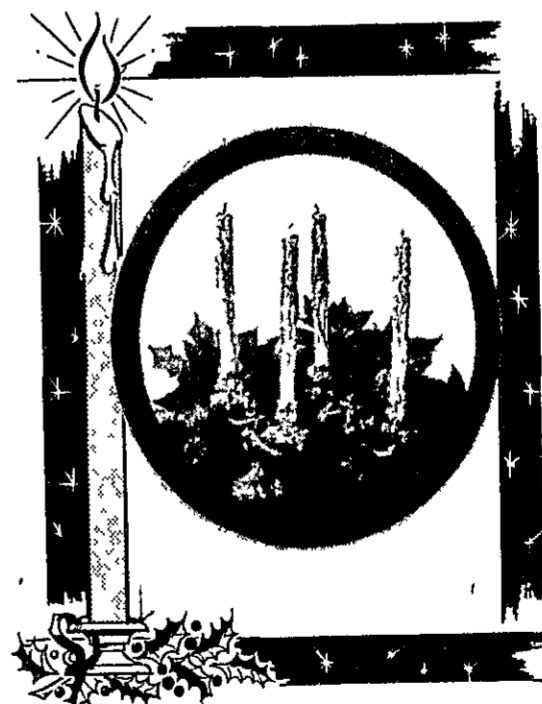
