US-27 alternatives-- here's the chance to have your "say"

LANSING -- Residents in Clinton and Gratiot counties are invited to one of a series of meetings on various transportation

alternatives to US-27, the Department of State Highways and Transportation has announced.

The meetings will be conducted by the private consulting firm of Wilbur Smith and Associates, hired by the Department to conduct a corridor and route location study involving transportation alternatives to US-27 from Lansing to Ithaca.

Four meetings are scheduled from 1 pm to 4 pm and from 7 pm to 9 pm on both Wednesday Dec 11 and Thursday Dec 12.

The Dec 11 meetings will be held in the Circuit Court Room in the Gratiot County Courthouse in Ithaca; and the Dec 12 meetings in the Clinton County Board of Commissioners meeting room in the courthouse at St Johns.

These are pre-planning meetings to provide citizens the opportunity to register their views on all aspects of transportation in the US-27 corridor at the earliest planning stage.

The meetings will enable residents to become acquainted with the planning process that will be used in developing criteria for a new highway or some other transportation facility.

Representatives of Wilbur Smith and Associates will be present at the sessions to explain maps, data and preliminary corridor alternative proposals. To further aid in understanding the process, the study staff will make overview presentations at 1 pm, 2:30 pm and 7 pm on both days.

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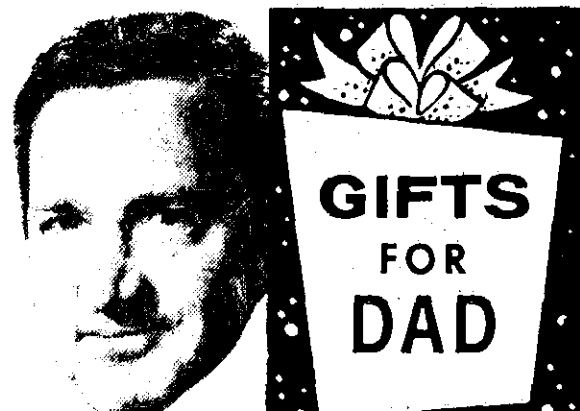

History group offers rare book

The Clinton County Historical Society is scoring a "second" for this past 100 years. The Society is offering a reprint of the 1880 "History of Shiawassee and Clinton Counties, Michigan" to the public of these counties.

The first such offering resulted in the now rare book published by the Singer Company of Philadelphia. The "second" offering by the Society is coming as a reprint of the rare original book.

The book offers a complete history of the 2 counties from their first settlement and trading centers, to the time of the late 1870's when the book was written. The book included a roster of Civil War veterans including their service record.

The Society is making only one change in the book, an index of all names and places listed. This will aid persons looking for names of relatives and place names.

Even if a person is listed but once, that name will appear in the index. The original book had no index, but did have a table of contents.

It also lists elected and appointed officials from the townships and counties from their first incorporation. It lists original land holders and describes the geology of the area and Indian and pioneer settlement.

The original 500 pages and the reprint, contain many pictures of pioneer homes as well as the more Victorian homes, some of which still stand today.

St Johns Redwings and Ovid-Elsie Marauders scramble for a loose fumble in the season finale.

Marauders give Redwings battle to end season

The best and the worst became official Friday night at Ovid-Elsie High's football stadium.

St Johns compiled its best varsity grid record in 4 years by topping O-E 14-12, while the Marauders slipped to one of their lowest marks in the highly successful reign of coach Mark O'Donnell.

The triumph was St Johns' 2nd straight in what has been a see-saw neighborhood series.

The Redwings finished the season with a 6-3 slate as Joe Gonzales made his head-coaching debut. It was the 1st 6-

victory year since Jeff Smith's state-rated troops went 7-2 in 1970. The Wings tied for runner-up honors in this year's tight WCAC title chase with a 4-2 record.

Ovid-Elsie, meanwhile, suffered a frustrating 2-7 year full of "almost wins."

The Marauders closed the Mid-Michigan B campaign with a 1-5 mark, placing 6th in a field of 7 teams.

Perhaps most frustrating of

all to the O-E camp was seeing an optimistic pre-season outlook dashed by a series of last-minute losses. The '74 Marauders included 21 seniors determined to improve on last didn't expect," said Redwing coach Gonzales. "We knew they could score points and we knew year's 2-6 record. Title contention was mentioned as a possibility, "if we get a few breaks and have no key injuries," O'Donnell had said. Friday's effort was representative of the season, agreed O'Donnell and assistant Bob Foreback.

"This is the way it's been all year -- turnovers have hurt," said the head mentor. "Tonight it was a fumble and an interception, and they set up both touchdowns. We played well tonight, and we have all season. But you still have to win on the scoreboard."

Ovid-Elsie dominated the 1st quarter and took a 6-0 lead before the visitors could catch a breath. By halftime the Marauders had a significant statistical advantage but trailed 7-6.

"They came out and hit us -- they did a couple of things we

they had a good offensive line. They blocked our sweep well. They were high, too -- there was a lot of spirit here."

One of St Johns' problems at the outset was field position, added Gonzales.

"Field position is the name of the game and we couldn't get good position right away."

Redwings Nick Koenigsnecht and Jeff Hazle rose to stop hard-hitting Paul Case on 4th and goal to go from the 18-inch line, giving the Redwings their 1st possession on their own 1 yardline.

Four plays later the Marauders capitalized on a short punt to march in for the 1st score.

Jack Bashore plunged the final yard of a 21-yard drive with :29 left in the 1st quarter. The extra point kick was wide to the left.

At that point, O-E had a 72-yard rushing total to St Johns' 6.

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ANNUAL STATISTICAL AND FINANCIAL REPORT

St. Johns Public Schools of Clinton and Gratiot Counties

The school year of 1973-74 was one of growth in the St. Johns Public Schools. The total enrollment grew from 4246 students in 1972-73 to 4409 for 1973-74.

The County Shared Time Vocational program continued to grow with the addition of Agriculture Mechanics which occupied a newly constructed building on the High School site, Health Services operating in space rented in the Clinton Memorial Hospital and Food Services which used Daley's Restaurant as an operating base.

The fiscal year ended on June 30, 1974, with a General Fund Equity balance of \$219,063.48 as compared with the balance of \$118,959 on June 30, 1973.

Because of increased property valuations within the District the debt levy assessment was reduced from 7 to 5 mills thus resulting in a decrease in property tax for support of schools of 2 mills. The rate for schools for the school year 1973-74 was 23.5 mills for operation and 5 mills for debt service making a total of 28.5 mills.

For the 1973-74 year the minimum Teachers Salary was \$8400 for a teacher with no experience and a B.A. degree, while the maximum salary for a teacher with an MA degree and 12 years experience was \$14,911. The average teacher's salary was \$11,785.

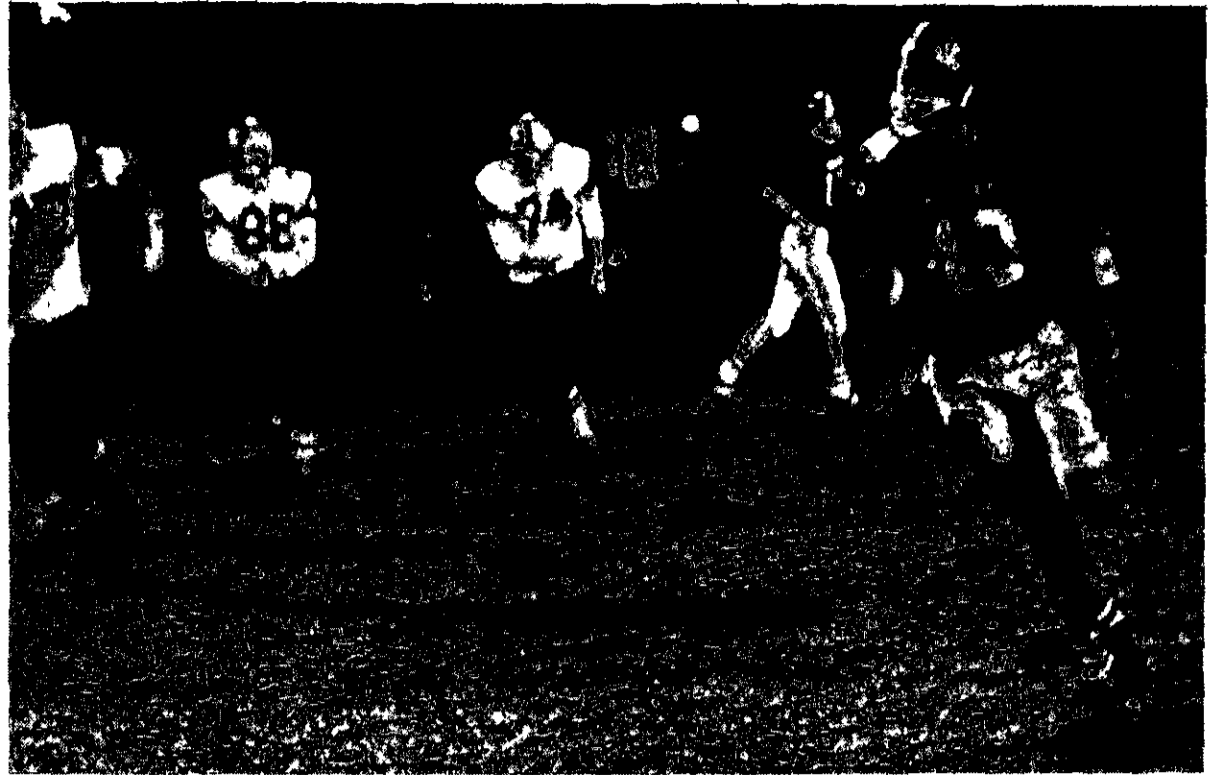
Graff had a good night in the air passing for 106 yards on 9 completions in 12 attempts.

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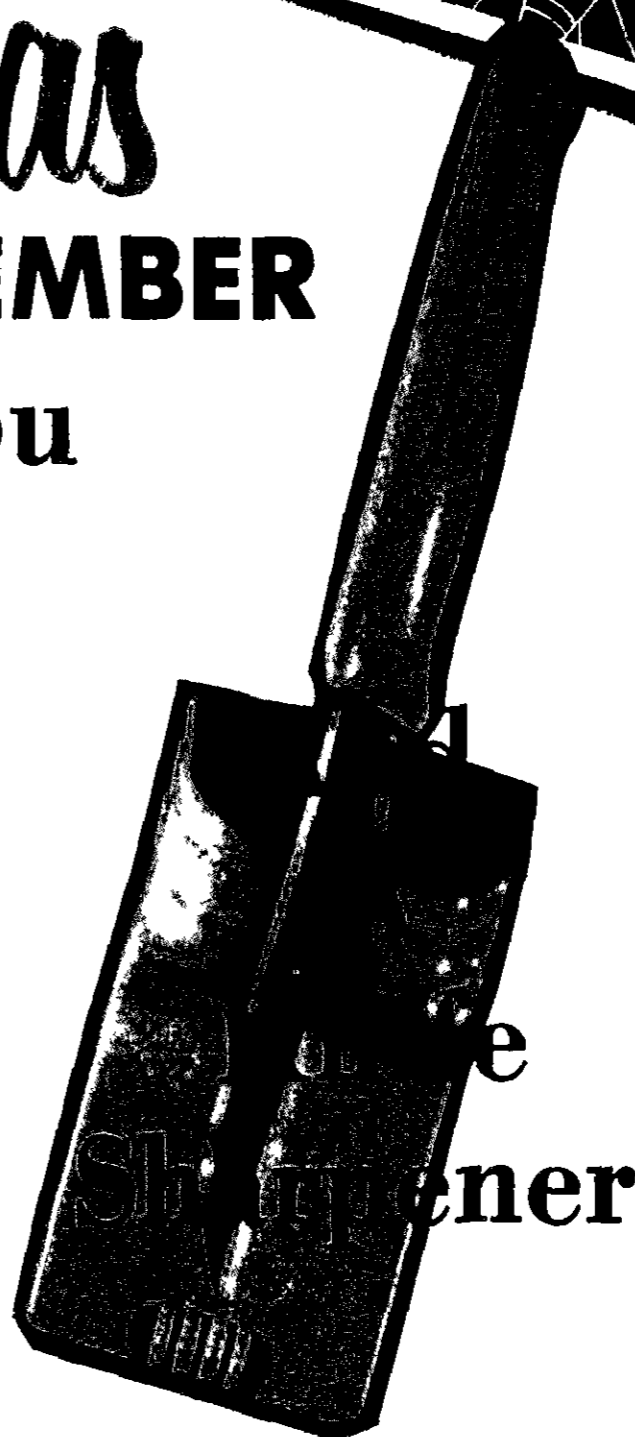
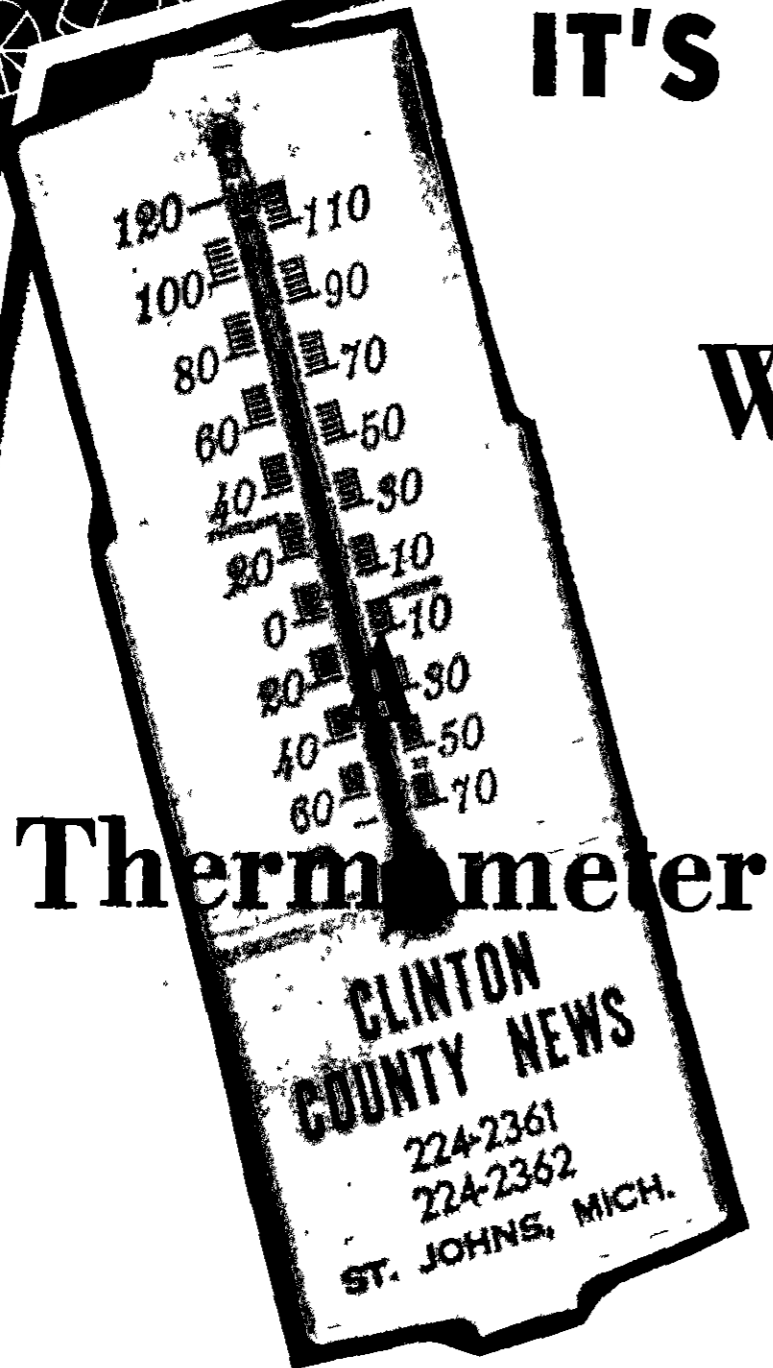
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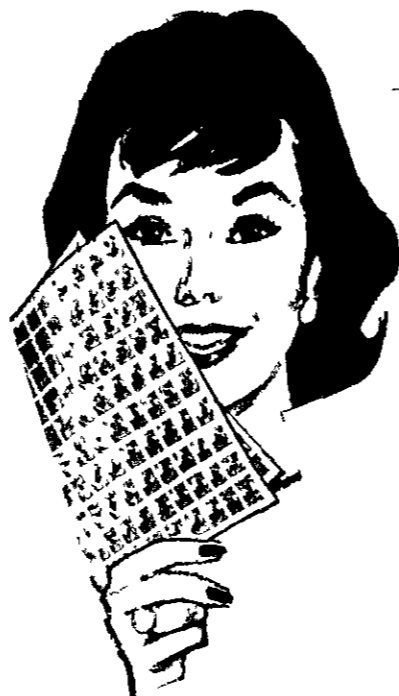

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Good prospects seen for '74 deer season

LANSING -- Wildlife biologists for the Department of Natural Resources see good prospects for Michigan deer hunters during the fall's firearm season which begins November 15.

Contributing to this forecast are several mild winters in a row, bumper crops of acorns, and continued habitat improvement by the DNR.

About 500,000 hunters are expected in Michigan fields and forests during the season and the DNR looks for them to take home anywhere from 65,000 to 75,000 deer, perhaps a little better than last year.

Predictions based on the 1973

season indicate the biggest number of deer will be taken in the following counties: Alpena, Montmorency, Oscoda, Alcona, Iosco, Ogemaw, Roscommon, Missaukee, Arenac, Gladwin, Clare, Osceola, Lake Mecosta and Newaygo.

According to surveys taken after the 1973 season, the buck kill in these counties was two or more per square mile.

However, these same counties, except for five, drew the highest concentration of hunters. All but Alpena, Alcona, Arenac, Osceola and Mecosta counties had 20 or more hunters per square mile.

What's the "luck factor" in hunting in Michigan?

"One hunter in eight or nine bags a deer in any given year," says Dave Arnold, DNR deer specialist. "Mathematically, your chances of success aren't any better because you missed last year, or worse if you were successful."

"I recommend the hunter to seek out areas with acorns, apples or of recent logging operations. He'll be more likely to see deer and enjoy the hunt," Arnold concludes. "Deer or no, you should bag yourself a lot of fun, get a little fresh air, and sharpen your senses for the winter ahead."

While the regular firearm deer season runs November 15-30, hunters are reminded by the DNR that antlerless deer season is shorter in the southern Lower Peninsula. The season there runs from November 15-21. This also applies to Management Area 45 near Frankfort and 67 around Shelby.

Antlerless season will run from November 15-30 in Areas 30, 36 and the eastern portion of 31 around Alpena. This is traditionally called "Club Country" with most land in private ownership.

There is no antlerless season this fall in the Upper Peninsula.

"Warm welcome" for hunters at some northern state parks

LANSING -- Michigan deer hunters planning to camp out during this year's firearm season should be aware the Department of Natural Resources is offering them a "warm welcome" at a limited number of state parks.

Hot water showers and heated toilet facilities remain open until December 1 at three state parks in the Upper Peninsula and 15 in the northern Lower Peninsula.

State parks offering these comforts in the UP are: Baraga; Porcupine Mountains, Union Bay Unit, and Tahquamenon Falls, Lower Campground Unit.

In the northern Lower Peninsula, a limited number of campsites will be available with heated showers and toilet

facilities at: Bay City, 175; Burt Lake, 100; Gladwin, 45; Harrisville, 100; Hartwick Pines, 46; Ludington, 120; Mitchell, 270; Onaway, 100; Orchard Beach, 25; Osceola Lake, 69; Rifle River, 80; S. Higgins Lake, 80; White Cloud, 80; Wilderness, 60, and Wilson, 80.

All hot running water facilities in DNR's Region III, the southern Lower Peninsula, have been closed down for the winter.

While modern facilities are not available at many state parks, many others are open on a more rustic basis: some with electricity, others with cold running water and pit toilets. For information, contact local DNR district offices.

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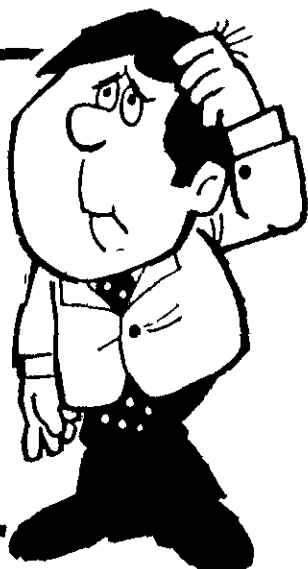
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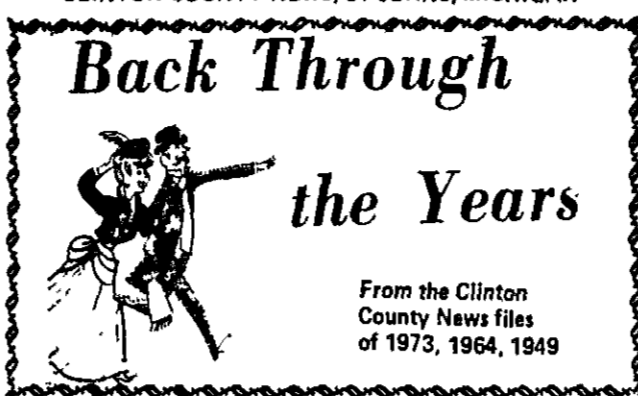

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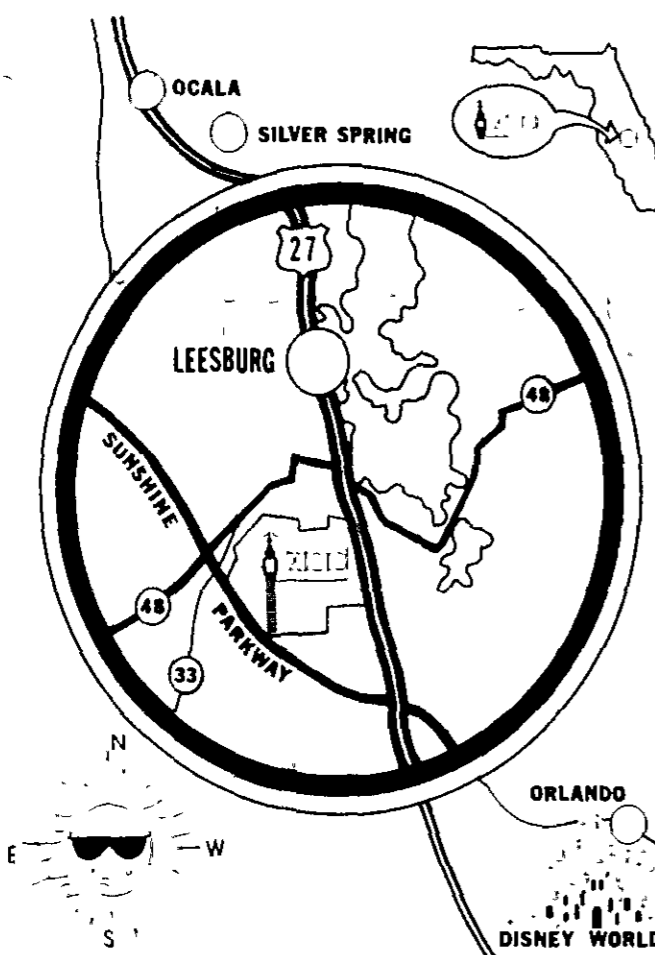

88th District Report by Stanley Powell State Representative

Everyone has probably heard by now that Democrats now control both houses of the Michigan Legislature.

In last week's election, the Democrats strengthened their majority in the House of Representatives by capturing seven seats. We Republicans lost seven seats, resulting in a 66 to 44 makeup of the House.

Republicans also lost five seats in the Senate giving the upper chamber a 24 to 14 makeup. Republicans currently hold 19 Senate seats and control the Senate because the tie-breaking vote rests in the hands of a Republican Lieutenant Governor.

With Democratic control of both Houses of the Legislature, legislation which is Democratically sponsored will undoubtedly pass through the legislative process much easier.

Even though the Republicans will continue as the minority party in the House and will become the minority party in the Senate, we Republicans can still play an effective role in the passage of legislation and implementation of programs.

The Task Force approach to problem solving that we have followed for the past 18 months has proven effective. Many of the programs proposed by the House Republican Task Forces have been implemented which I feel is a clear indication of how effective a minority party can be.

During the past two years, as the minority party, we have also been effective in providing the most significant tax cut programs in many years through Republican sponsored bills.

Certainly we don't have the votes to control the fate of all legislation, but we have and will continue to call attention to bad legislation that comes before us and suggest and fight for passage of amendments and substitutes to improve such legislation.

We have been very effective in a "watchdog" role in the past and I'm sure we will continue to be successful in this regard in the future.

AGENDA EXPLORES JOB DEVELOPMENT

Michigan has a job shortage. During the 1960's, the state added 625,000 new jobs and still had a 7.5% unemployment rate. It is estimated that during the 1970's an additional 825,000 jobs will be needed in Michigan.

Where will they come from? The main source of jobs is industry. Industry brings outside capital and raw materials to a state or community, then translates them into products which are sold for a profit. This produces not only the manufacturing jobs of the industry itself, but many other new jobs in professional, commercial and service work which spin off to meet the needs of the people employed in industry.

We believe the time has come to create a "New Michigan" image to convince business people that Michigan is the place to go. To do this, we must

encourage industrial expansion and job growth. People in and out of Michigan must realize that we are ready for new ideas and moving in new directions.

We believe that if we create situations in which private enterprises can operate profitably, they will expand their operations and provide the jobs we need in the 1970's.

Our House Republican Task Force on Economic Development produced Blueprint for the Seventies which was awarded first prize by the National Conference of State Legislative Leaders as the outstanding report produced by any state Legislature since January, 1972.

Among its recommendations are:

A Job Development Authority - Thirty other states already have varying kinds of authorities which make direct loans or loan guarantees to new or growing businesses. The money would come from bonds issued by the authority. The borrowers would repay the money with interest, so there would be no tax money contributed.

Tax Incentives - Michigan ranks 49th among the 50 states in incentives offered to industries. A tax credit is one means of giving industry a reason to invest in new plants, new equipment, new machinery, and jobs in Michigan. We propose that a 10% state income tax credit be allowed to industries which make such investments during the year.

We also propose that local

governments be allowed some flexibility in property taxes on industries which retain or add local jobs. Many competing states are already using this tool.

Minority Business - We propose that a state Office of Minority Business Enterprise be established in the Department of Commerce. It would provide assistance to endeavors owned or operated by disadvantaged persons whose disadvantages arise from cultural, economic, racial or other causes. Ethnic minorities, veterans, poor white businessmen and others would all be helped to help themselves.

Productivity - We propose establishing a State Productivity Council to bring labor and management together to find ways to increase productivity and thus help both to create jobs and curb inflation.

We further propose that employees of Michigan industries get "a piece of the action" by acquiring part ownership of their corporations. Employees who own stock in the company have a greater vested interest in its success in terms of productivity, quality, etc. To encourage business to cooperate, we propose a 1% state income tax credit for corporations which set aside up to 20% of their stock for sale to their Michigan employees.

Tourism and Conventions - Tourism is one of Michigan's largest industries. We believe we must treat it as a business. We have worked to have the Tourist Council shifted to the Department of Commerce. We

propose a Convention Bureau within the Council to recruit and plan business-oriented conventions in Michigan. We propose a credit on airline fuel taxes for those which will promote Michigan in their worldwide advertising.

Some basic reforms in our labor compensation systems are needed if we are to successfully encourage industry to stay and grow in Michigan.

Unemployment taxes on Michigan employers average 3.11% of payroll, compared to the national average of 1.8%. Our workmen's compensation costs rank among the highest in the country.

The tragedy is that these heavy burdens are not entirely due to the cost of providing benefits which we all agree are just.

Some employees have taken jobs only to qualify for unemployment benefits. Persons voluntarily on strike have collected unemployment. A killer has collected workmen's compensation because of employment conditions which allegedly caused homicidal mental problems. There is at least one case of a person collecting unemployment compensation because he was able to work but couldn't find a job and workmen's compensation because he couldn't work. We must close these and other loopholes.

Michigan needs an expanding economy. It needs new jobs. Labor and management must realize they have a common interest in these objectives and put aside their traditional rivalries for the sake of a prosperous Michigan.

Gen Tel says "Stamp it"

Customers who pay their General Telephone bills - or any other bills - by mail and fail to place postage on their bill payment envelopes will soon find themselves at odds with the new regulations of the U.S. Postal Service, according to General Telephone officials.

The post office has announced that, effective Nov. 17, it will return to the sender mail which doesn't have any postage. If there is no return address, the mail, in most cases, will be sent to the dead letter office for disposal.

"The effect of this new postal regulation on our customers should be obvious," Judd Perkins, public affairs director for General Telephone, said. "Bill payments mailed without postage will be delayed and in some cases even lost and customers may be charged with non-payment of telephone bills they think were paid."

Until now, mail without postage was delivered to addresses upon payment of postage due, a practice intended to take into account the fact that people occasionally forget to put a stamp on their mail, according to Perkins.

The legal counsel for the U.S. Postal Service cites recent abuses of the previous regulation as the reason for the new one.

"In recent months, a significant number of people have begun to abuse this regulation by deliberately omitting to put stamps on their business mail," Roger B. Craig, deputy general counsel, said. "Business houses, public utilities and other creditors, in order to receive their mail, have been bearing an increasingly heavy postage-due burden."

Craig said the costs of the Postal Service "have likewise

greatly increased." While the new regulation is aimed at those who deliberately omit postage, it could create hardships for those who inadvertently fail to stamp their letters, Perkins said.

General Telephone's cost for non-paid mail for 1974 will be approximately \$1300. The company serves 565,000 telephones located in 540 Michigan communities.

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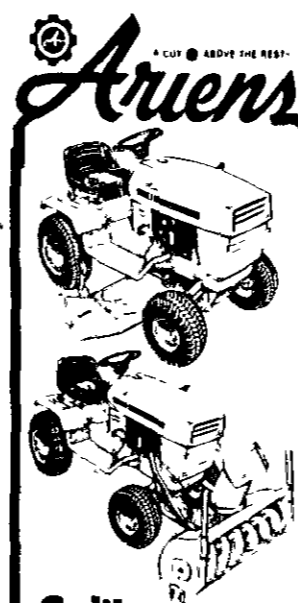

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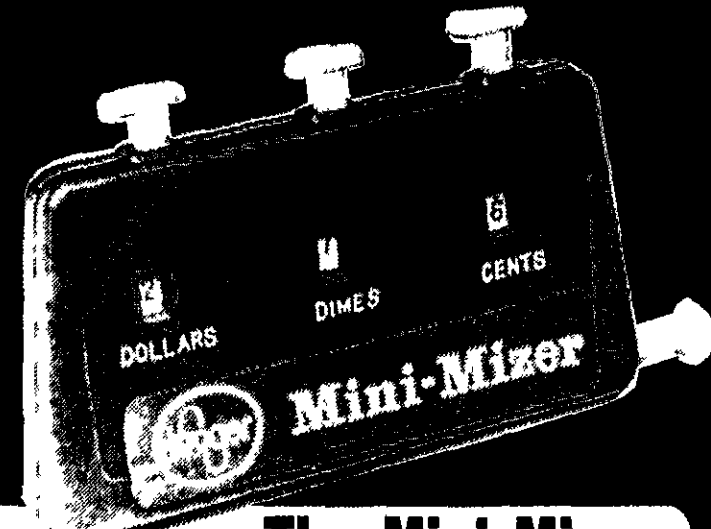

Thanksgiving talk

Having trouble deciding what size and kind of turkey you should buy for Thanksgiving? Look for the USDA grade mark US Grade A poultry is the finest available. But all inspected poultry is nutritious and wholesome.

When buying whole, ready-to-cook turkeys weighing under 12 pounds, allow 1/2 to one pound per serving. For larger birds, allow 3/4 to 1 pound per serving.

Most homemakers buy the tender young hens and toms 15 to 18 months old. Roasting-age young hen turkeys of all breeds may weigh five to nine pounds, ready-to-cook; the toms 9 to 15 pounds. These are small meaty turkeys such as Beltsville Whites.

Slightly larger breeds - white Holland, black, bourbon red and the Narragansett are available. These ready-to-cook hens weigh about 8 to 11 pounds; toms 11 to 18 pounds.

Broad breasted bronze and the new large whites are the largest turkeys. Ready-to-cook hens average about 10 to 15 pounds, toms 16 to 30 pounds. Fully matured hens or tom turkeys are occasionally found on the market. They're less tender than young hen and tom turkeys and have hardened breastbones and coarse skin. Do not roast these turkeys. Braise them in a covered roaster or cook in a pressure canner.

Serve a safe Thanksgiving Meal. The smell of turkey, dressing, and pumpkin pie is in the air. But is it safe to eat that scrumptious meal? It will be if you follow food safety precautions when preparing the Thanksgiving feast.

Thaw your turkey in the refrigerator. Place a tray under the turkey to catch the drippings. The turkey will thaw in one to three days, depending on the turkey's size.

If you thaw the bird quickly, put it in a waterproof plastic bag. Seal tightly and defrost in cold water. Change the water frequently.

Never let the turkey thaw at room temperature. Spoilage bacteria will have an excellent chance to grow.

Cook the bird thoroughly to an internal temperature of 180-190 degrees F. Don't partially cook the bird and finish cooking it later. Spoilage bacteria grows between 40°F and 140°F and can survive in the partially cooked turkey.

If you cook the dressing inside the bird, cook until the meat thermometer inserted into the stuffing reaches at least 165 degrees F. Never stuff the turkey the night before cooking.

If you buy a commercially frozen stuffed turkey, do not defrost it. Place the frozen turkey directly into the oven and follow cooking instructions on the package.

When the meal is over, refrigerate the turkey immediately. Remove the stuffing and refrigerate it separately.

You want your guests to enjoy a great meal and feel great the next day, too. So use precautions when preparing and serving dinner. Make this Thanksgiving a safe holiday.

bleeding from the wounds, bleed the animal or soak the cleaned animal 8 to 10 hours in a solution of one tablespoon salt per quart of water.

For tender meat, wait 24 hours before cooking young game. Older animals should be aged several days and par-broiled.

Because wild game tends to be drier and tougher than domestic meat, cook at low temperatures in moist heat, Lasher suggests. To prepare pheasant, use any moist-heat chicken recipe. Pheasant meat is similar to chicken but drier.

Duck meat is usually served rare, Lasher points out. Wild duck meat is dark and dry, and should be cooked in a covered roaster with strips of bacon on the breast.

Wear rubber gloves when cleaning rabbit, and cook the meat until well done to avoid tularemia, or rabbit fever. Warty growths on rabbit legs, head and other body parts are harmless.

With ruffed grouse, or partridge, prairie chicken, woodcock and sharp-tail grouse usually only the breasts are served.

When preparing beaver, racoon or bear, remove all fat from the meat to avoid string flavor and odor. Serve bear meat well-done. Even after long roasting, bear meat is pinkish when first cut, but darkens.

1974 soybean yield 3rd largest on record

Despite an early rain at planting season, a mid-summer drought and an early frost, the Michigan Crop Reporting Service predicts that this year's soybean yield will be the third largest on record.

Last year's crop was the largest ever, with 693,000 acres planted to soybeans in Michigan yielding 24 bushels per acre.

This year a acreage was down a bit, to 610,000 acres, and predicted yield is 21 bushels per acre with half the crop harvested.

Dr. Milton Erdmann of the Michigan State University Crop Science Extension Service said that this year has changed attitudes among farmers and agriculture technicians.

"We are still dependent on rainfall, a frost still hurts us and we have learned that we can still have crop disasters," Erdmann said.

"Better technology and more fertilizers are not the entire solution," he said.

"We are a little bit more humble this year, because we've been reminded that we're still dependent on the weather."

Soybeans are processed in Indiana and Illinois, where oil is removed for use in margarine and the protein part of the soybean is sold as high-protein feed.

Most of the feed will be bought by dairymen, who must use high-protein feeds to get high milk yields.

With the price of grains high in comparison to that of milk, Dr. Erdmann said he sees two steps that dairymen may take to show a profit this year.

"They can buy the feed and cull their herds to remove cows that don't produce well," Erdmann said, "or use less of the high-protein soybean feed, which will reduce the milk yield per cow."

He said consumers can expect a rise in milk prices either way.

"The price of margarine is close to that of butter now, and this is also a reflection of the high price of soybeans," Erdmann said.

The use of soybeans as hamburger extenders has had little effect on the soybean market.

"Human consumption of soybeans may have accounted for one-half of one percent of last year's crop," Erdmann said, "and it may be up to two percent this year."

"It's all in the way you look at the figures. Human consumption of soybeans has quadrupled, but it's still negligible compared to the amount used as feed for livestock."

Wild game tips

Much of the nearly 7,000 tons of dressed meat taken each year by Michigan hunters and trappers never reaches the table due to mishandling by hunters or misgivings by cooks, says Bill Lasher, Clinton County extension agent.

For good-tasting wild game, use special care both in the field and in the kitchen.

In warm weather, clean and wipe dry body cavities of game birds as soon as possible, Lasher advises. Do not remove feathers or use water until ready to cook. In cool weather, birds may be carried through the day without cleaning.

Clean abdominal cavities of small mammals. Bear and deer the day they are killed. Remove splintered bones, shot and fur from wounds.

If there is little natural cleaning rabbit, and cook the meat until well done to avoid tularemia, or rabbit fever. Warty growths on rabbit legs, head and other body parts are harmless.

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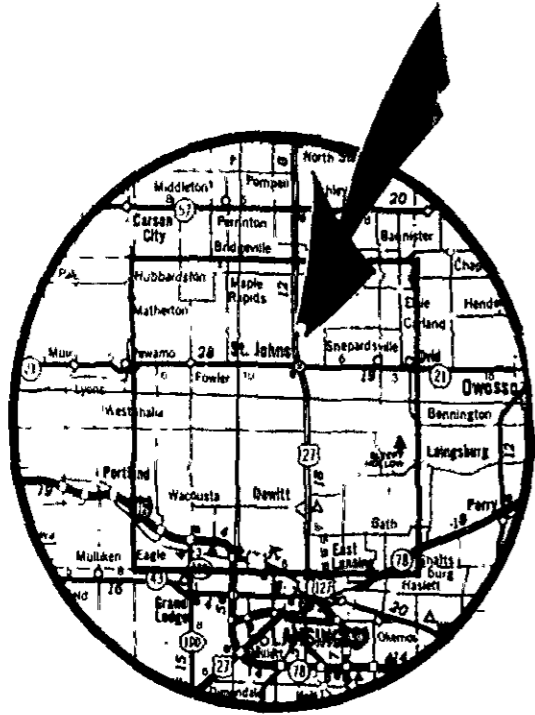

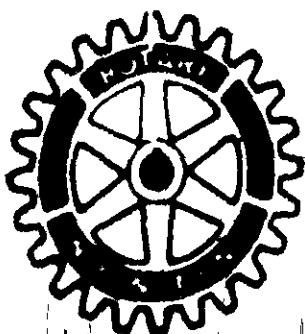
