Commission re-appoints Robert Wood mayor

ST JOHNS -- St. Johns City Commissioners reappointed Robert Wood as mayor during their Monday night reorganizational meeting, with Roy Ebert selected as vice-mayor.

The 2 new members of the Commission, John Arehart and Gerald Wilcox, later added some spice to the normally staid procedure of appointing members to commissions and board.

Arehart objected to having to vote on members of the boards and commissions during his first meeting after being elected to City Commission.

Paul Maples, city attorney, said the system under the charter does provide such a difficulty after an election and agreed that it didn't give new members of the Commission, "much of a chance."

Arehart asked, "Is there any way to change this (the procedure)?"

Ebert said a nominating committee can be appointed by the mayor to study names proposed for the boards and commission and to seek new members to serve.

When the voting for the positions came up, Wilcox sent the procedure into a ballot situation by nominating several individuals besides those listed as proposed to succeed themselves.

The 1st concerned the Planning Commission. John Arehart was nominated and selected to take Roy Ebert's post as City Commission representative on the Planning Commission.

Then Lyle Hunton and Charles Coletta were nominated to succeed themselves as members on the commission.

Wilcox then nominated Tom Coleman and provided a brief background of his nominee.

A written ballot saw Coletta reappointed with 4 votes and Hunton reappointed with 3 votes. Coleman received 2 votes.

Roy Ebert was elected to replace defeated City Commissioner Dr. James Grosz on the Park Board. John Hannah nominated Jack Bertoldi and Kurt Becker to succeed themselves on the board and Wilcox nominated Roger Rasmussen to be a new member.

Bertoldi and Becker were both reappointed with 4 votes and Rasmussen received 2 votes.

John Hannah was named as the City Commission representative on the Parking Board and the names of Donald Roesner and Robert Thompson were nominated by Hannah to replace themselves on the board. Wilcox nominated Maurice Witteveen, a Highway Dept employee in the traffic division.

Roesner was reappointed with 4 votes, but Thompson and Witteveen tied with 3 votes apiece. A 2d vote provided the reappointment of Thompson, present chairman of the board. He received 3 votes in the 2d ballot, while Witteveen received 2.

The names of Walter Pearce and Ken Munger were nominated to succeed themselves on the Board of Appeals and the nominations were closed.

Virgil Zeeb was reappointed on Board of Review and Mrs. Roger Feeman was reappointed to the Library Board along with John Hannah as a member of the City Commission.

Clare Maler was reappointed fire chief and Harvey Weatherwax, city manager, was reappointed fire commissioner.

Richard Cornwell was granted an extension for 1-year to continue past retirement age on the fire department and will continue to serve as assistant chief.

In other business the Commission:

*Approved rezoning for Willard Searles

In the Sullivan Farm Subdivision,

*Commended the Jaycees and Jayettes for their sponsorship of a "highly successful" Halloween party.

*Approved the purchase of token meters with tokens to be paid for by city merchants to offer free parking to downtown merchants.

*Instructed the city manager to study posting of signs at intersections used by students on their way to school.

*Approved a request by the Chamber of Commerce to limit Christmas lighting in the downtown area to 5-10:30 pm.

*Moved to draft a resolution thanking Dr. James Grosz and Jeanne Rand for their past contributions as members of the St. Johns City Commission.

DeWitt Twp names new police chief

DEWITT TWP -- DeWitt Twp trustees announced Monday night the appointment of a new township police chief, replacing former chief Bruce Angell II, who was fired by the board Sept 10.

Named to the post was William C. Nash, 30, currently employed with the Michigan Law Enforcement Training Council in Lansing and a former Lansing police officer for 4 years.

He holds a bachelor's degree in police administration and master's degree in criminal justice from Michigan State University.

Nash is due to assume the post Nov 26. A controversy stormed when Angell was fired and Angell demanded a meeting to hear reasons for his dismissal.

AT A MEETING called by the township board, Angell was not present, but was represented by an attorney who was to negotiate with the board over compensation from the board to the former chief.

Since Angell's dismissal, the post has been filled by acting chief Wayne (Gus) Wilcox.

Diabetic clinic draws 173

ST JOHNS -- A total of 173 persons took advantage of the diabetic testing clinic held at Clinton Memorial Hospital Sunday.

According to Dan Parsons, chief laboratory technician, of the 173 who attended the clinic 16 potential diabetes cases were discovered.

The age spread of the participants ranged from 15 years to 61 years of age, with the

youngest to be examined 3-years-old and the oldest 81.

The 1st annual clinic was jointly sponsored by St. Johns Rotary, St. Johns Lions Club, and Clinton Memorial Hospital.

Parsons termed the clinic a "tremendous success" during his Tuesday address to the St. Johns Rotary.

State schedules road work

State Senator William S. Ballenger (R-Delta Twp.) announced bids will be taken in Lansing Nov 21 on 3 separate Clinton-Greatnot County area highway construction and maintenance projects.

Included among the projects are:
o 9.7 miles of intermittent paving on US-27 in St. Johns and on M-21 from a point east of Scott Road near St. Johns to the Shiawassee County line, including construction of a right

turn lane for south-bound US-27 traffic at Sturgis Street in St. Johns and improving the radius of turn lanes on M-21 at Shepardville Road;

o Construction of roadside islands on M-21 at Main Street in Ovid; and

o Construction of intermittent 3-foot wide shoulders on US-27 from Round Lake Road near DeWitt north to M-57 in Greatnot County.

These jobs have an estimated combined cost of \$610,000, and the approximate completion date is set for August, 1974.

Bath Twp sells sewer bonds

BATH TWP -- Bath Twp sewer bonds were purchased last week by the First of Michigan Corporation at an effective interest rate of 5.5206%.

The bonds were originally sold for 5.26%

but legal objections to the sewer necessitated the 2nd sale, accounting for a \$170,000 difference.

Construction of the sewer is expected to begin after the delivery of the bonds.

Police arrest 2 in DeWitt

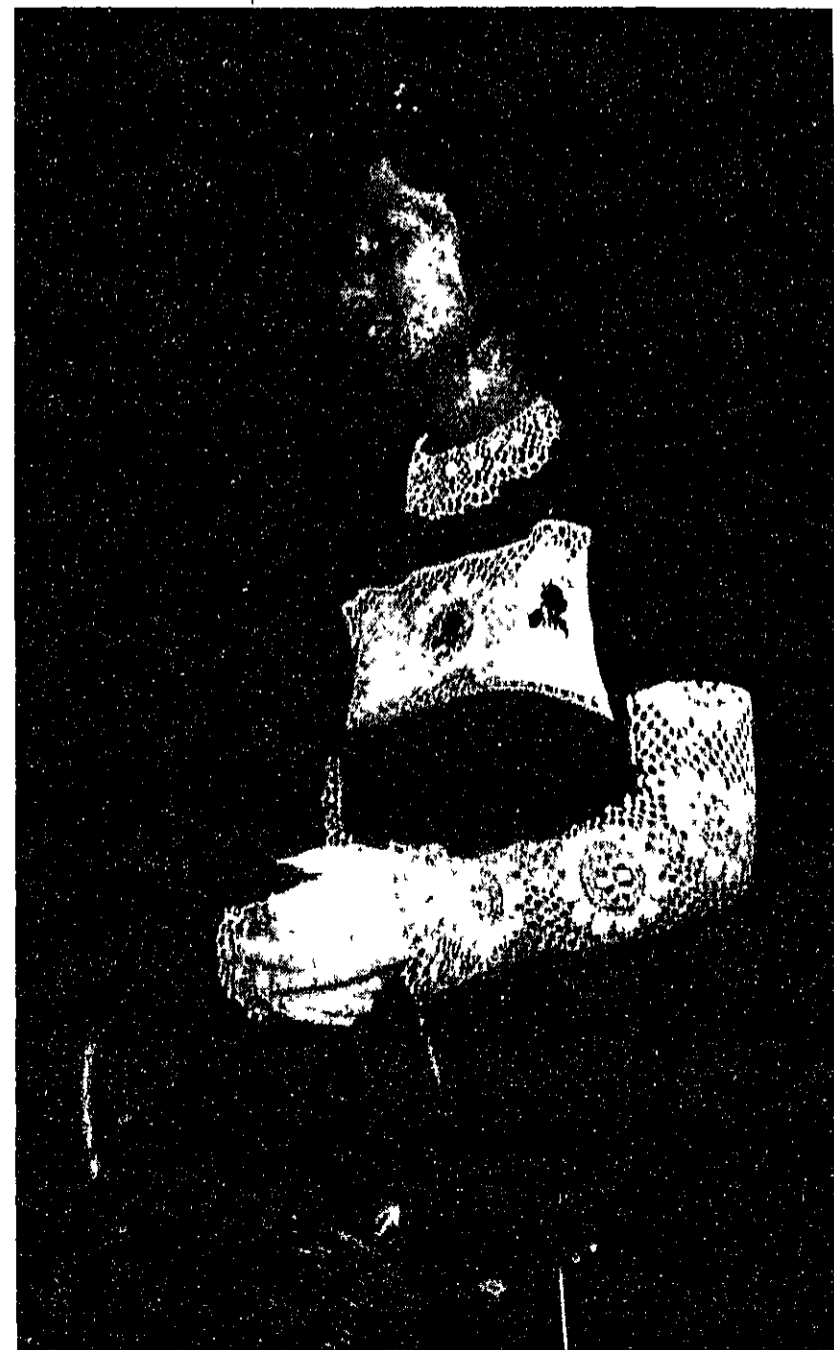

ST JOHNS - St Johns Postmaster Keith Mishler said he anticipated a big increase in the number of stamps by mail orders as the Christmas season approaches. "A lot of people are going to prefer ordering stamps by mail to going to the post office to purchase stamps," Postmaster Mishler said. "Most orders come from persons whose work schedules precludes trips to the post office, shut-ins, the infirm, and small businesses," he said. "However, we expect people of all ages and situations to write in for stamps during the Christmas rush," he said.

He reminded customers that they may order one or more of the

 - Sheet of 100 eight-cent stamps \$8.
 - Two books of eight-cent stamps \$4
 - One book of eleven-cent and two books of eight-cent stamps \$5
 - 50 stamped eight-cent envelopes (6 3/4" long) \$5.
 - 50 stamped eight-cent envelopes (10" long) \$5.
- A 40-cent fee is charged to defray the cost of postage, internal processing of checks, and other cost associated with this new service.

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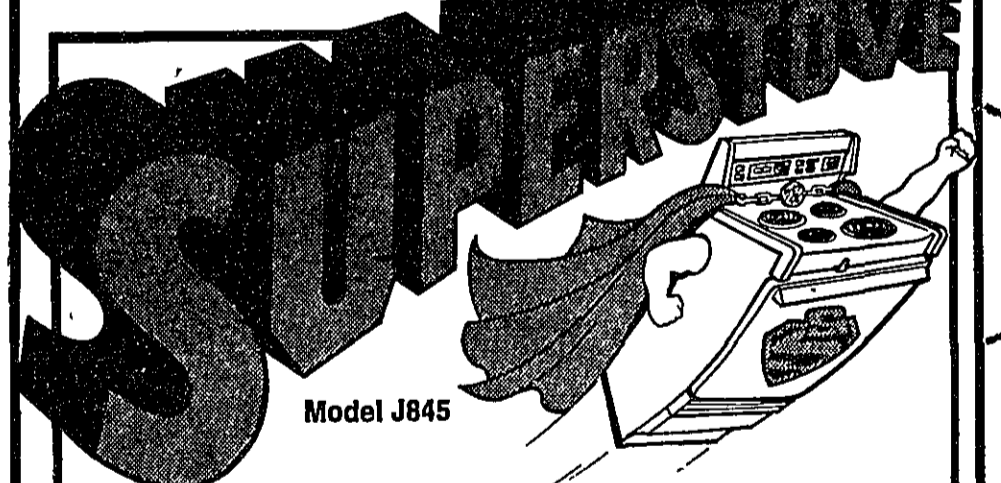
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Child Study Club meets

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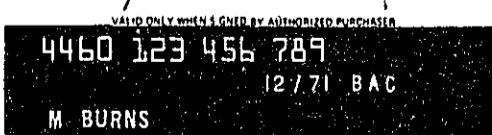

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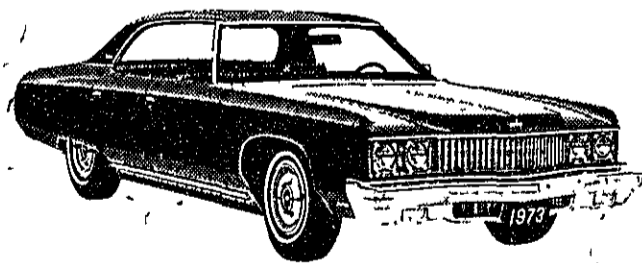

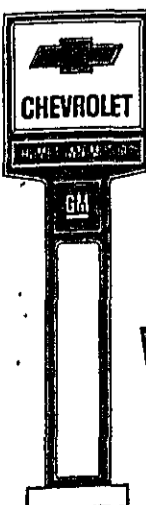

TO THE EDITOR

Dear Friends,
In November, 1971, June & I left Nashville bound for Tel Aviv, firmly resolved to make a dream come true - a dream of telling through film - the story of Jesus.

Though we were in Israel for one month in all - the project took eighteen months. I started out in June, 1971, studying the Gospels and bible commentaries. I talked to a lot of influential church people and a lot of film people and by November, when I went to Israel, I decided that if this film was going to be believable and as honest and real as I wanted it to be - that it would have to be done the way I felt it - not the way this or that preacher believed it or this or that church taught it.

We had a small crew. In all we took about 18 people from the States, my manager, Mr Hollif, several business associates, three employees of House of Cash and a small film crew, headed up by Academy Award Nominee, Robert Elstrom. We were stepping out n blind faith. Contrary to what a lot of people thought at the time, we knew exactly what we were setting out to do.

The concept of how we would tell our story slowly changed as we began filming. Robert Elstrom, our director, also portrayed Jesus Christ; and, as far as I could tell for that one month we were in Israel, Elstrom totally put himself into that role.

A strange thing happened, even from the first day, a feeling of reverence fell over the whole crew.

Many, many incidents come to mind from time to time. Going to Israel was like going home. I guess it was the songs that endeared Israel to me in the first place. From the time I was a little boy in the church back home, I remember hearing and singing the songs about Jesus and about Israel, The Holy Land. And, if you have had any kind of background like I have, you can't dip your hands into that Sea of Galilee without some kind of beautiful feeling going through you.

Up at the north end of the Sea of Galilee, near the Golan Heights, where we shot the scenes of Jesus and Mary Magdalene, as well as the John The Baptist sequence, we found hundreds, even thousands of bullet holes in trees and pieces of shells and shrapnel - the remains of the Six Day War in 1967. Finding things like this on a day when we were shooting a scene about Jesus made our film more important to us and made the whole thing even more meaningful to us.

Seeing those signs of the war kept us on the right track every day. We thought about not only that war, but all the other wars in history, especially the many wars where so much mindless slaughter has been carried out in God's name or in Jesus' name. From the very begin-

ning, down through the ages, these so-called "Holy Crusades", the Spanish Inquisition, even the blood shedding in Ireland today - goes on in the name of Jesus. And, many times I look back on it all with so much shame because if life was lived in the spirit of Jesus, rather than Name, there would be no slaughter.

But, we came home from Israel with a rough film that was to be the fulfillment of our dream. A solid year of masterful editing under the direction of Robert Elstrom, has produced this - our life's proudest work.

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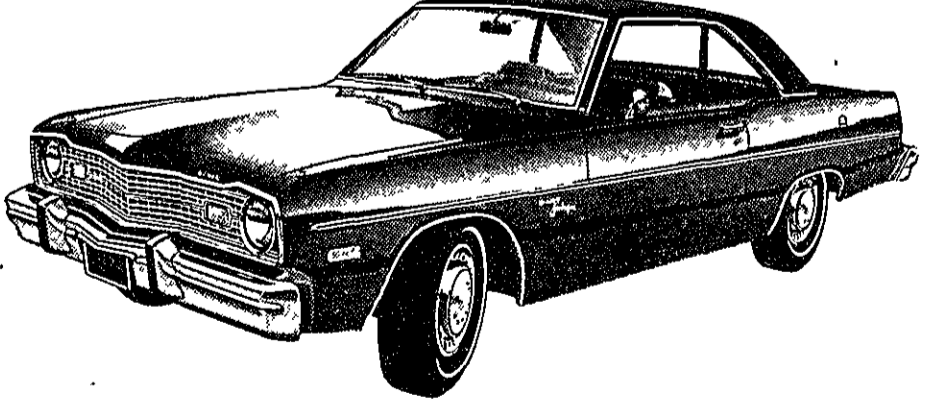
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Redwings smother Marauders 48-8

ST. JOHNS - St. Johns finished the 1973 season by rolling over Ovid-Elsie 48-8 Friday night. 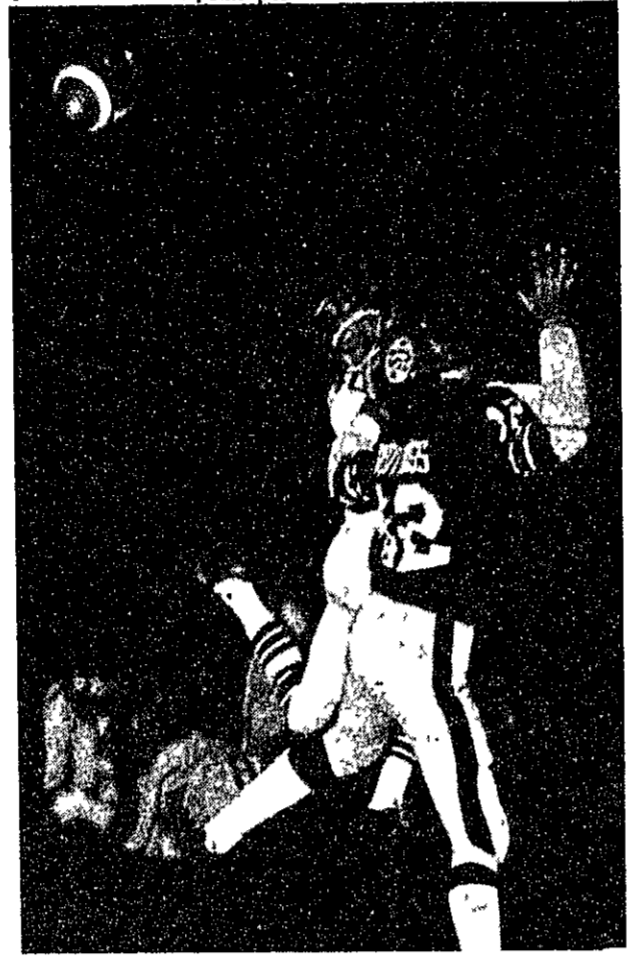

The Pirates are well stocked with veterans returning next year. The backfield, except for Randy Walter, will be back and only 3 spots on the line will be vacated by graduation.

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

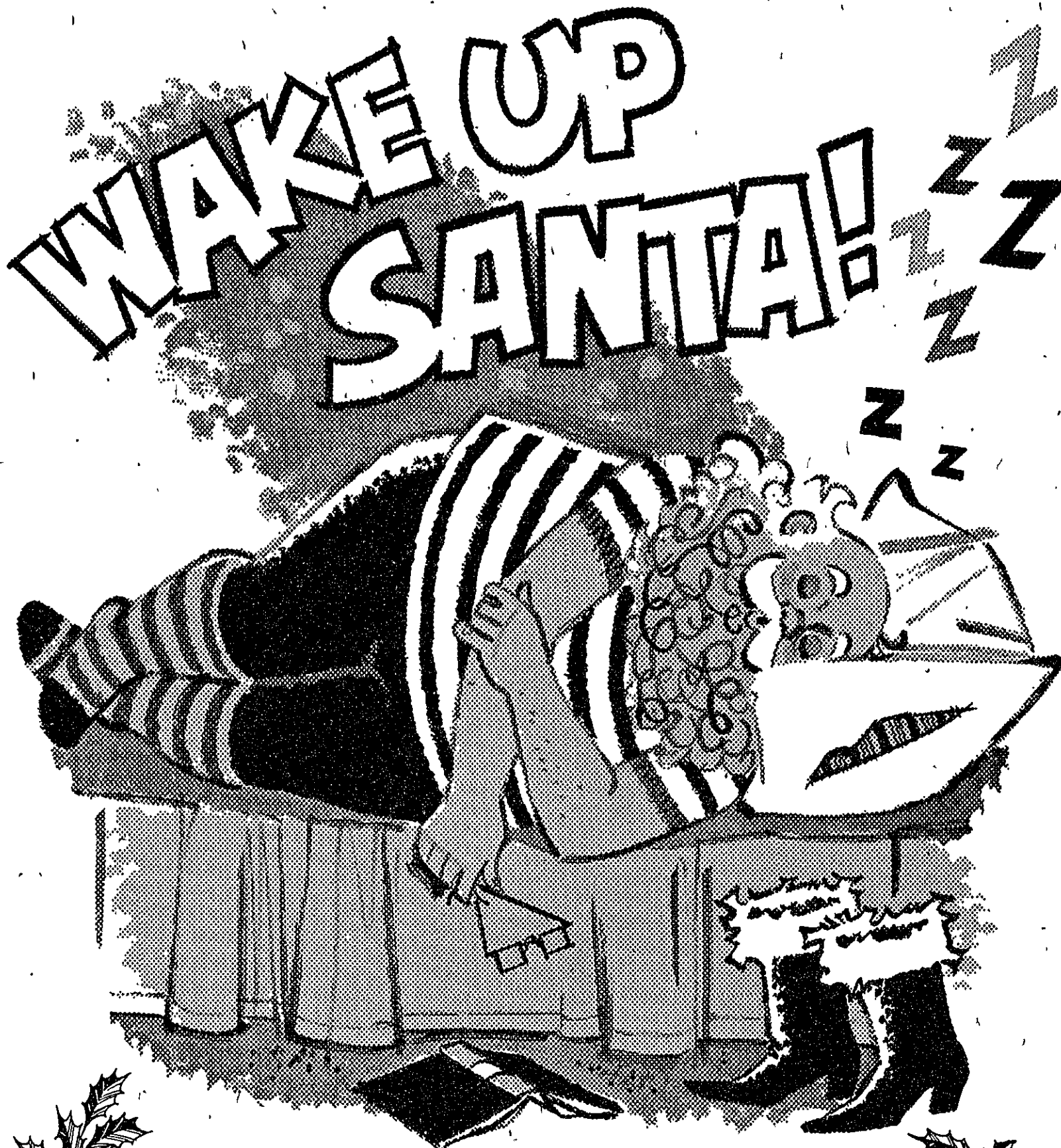

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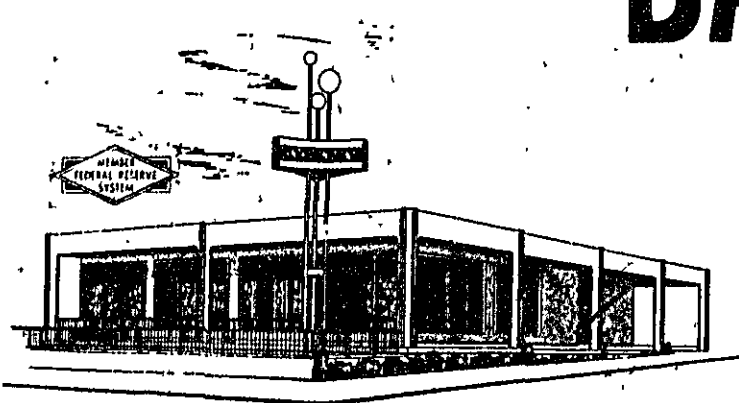

Besko at NLOP convention

DALLAS, TEX - More than 20,000 delegates, and their families convened here today for the 70th Annual Convention of the National League of Postmasters (NLOP).

Postmaster Donna B. Besko of Ovid is one of the delegates representing NLOP from the state of Michigan. During the week-long session, new officers will be elected and policies will be established conforming to the concept of the new Postal

Reform Act that Congress passed effective in 1971 revamping the entire US Postal Service.

Postmaster General E.T. (Ted) Klassen will be the featured speaker during the sessions along with the host Regional Postmaster General Carl C. Ulsaker and other postal officials from throughout the nation will be in attendance.

Founded in 1904, the League is the oldest organization representing Postmasters.

New money order available

A new money order with the limit raised from \$100 to \$300 per order will be available at the Ovid post office on October 13, according to postmaster Donna B. Besko.

Postmaster Besko said the new system can save both the customer and US Postal Service money. Buyers of the new money order will pay one fee - 40 cents - for money orders valued from \$50.01 to \$300. Fees for the lesser amounts will remain the same.

"Under the old system, a \$300 money order would involve three 40 cent fees for a total of \$1.20. The new system will provide a 2/3 reduction to 40 cents," Postmaster Besko said.

The Postal Service has centralized administration of its money order system at the Postal Data Center in St. Louis. It has the most advanced paper forms processing system of its type in the world and as a

result of this efficiency the Postal Service expects to save about \$1.6 million a year," Postmaster Besko said.

She said a new money order imprinter will replace the punch machine now in use. "The imprinter is based on the same method of printing as the credit card imprinters used in department stores, restaurants and gas stations. It is designed to save time and effort at the postal window," Postmaster Besko said.

A three-part carbon interleaved money order form replaces the card form that is now in use. Postmaster Besko says the larger customer receipt will be less easily misplaced, contains a complete record of when, where, and in what amount it was purchased, and will allow the postal service to provide faster claim service through machine processing.

The new money order form meets American Bankers Association standards for rapid handling and processing. Recipients of money orders will be able to cash them at 42,000 post offices and stations and 23,000 banks and branches.

Kissing her good-bye wouldn't have been the same. And where would the high school band have stood as it played me off to war? I'm talking about romance in the railroad depot.

There was an unspoken agreement that Mother would wait until we got home before she squealed to Dad about how many times I let the furnace go out, or forgot to haul the ashes out to the curb (I was 2 years old, but Mother had a whip). The depot was for enjoying.

I REMEMBER the huge window sills. A kid could stretch out full and look down the track for his dad's train. There was a magnificent, head-high urn in the john. I could have taken a shower in it. The floor was palace-marble, the ceiling was higher than a mountain, and voices echoed like in a Ken Maynard canyon.

And there was that great lunchroom where the sandwiches were already made and wrapped in wax paper. I always wanted one of those sandwiches but Mother said I'd spoil my dinner (gruel, served in an old tomato can on my cot next to the furnace).

Mostly I remember when Dad's train screamed to a stop. I would run up and down the platform, trying to spy him through a window. Which car was he on? Which kid would see him first? There he is! And I got a hug and a quick rub against his whiskers. Mother and my sisters got big kisses on the mouth. Then, on the way through the depot, Dad might muss my hair and ask me something about the Detroit Tigers. It was a real nifty time.

In later years, the old depot was my portal to World War 2 and back. Several furloughs began and ended there; oh joy, oh misery. Her name was Noreen and the kisses were sweet but she married another. Glenn Miller and Frank Sinatra put it in music.

THERE ARE more memories. I also used the depot to go to college, and to go to my first newspaper job. But enough nostalgia. If you're over 40, you get the point. . . .

Some things change and some don't. Dad died but I still have Mother to kid about the gruel. I'm growing old, but there is still a little boy inside of me. He is the part of me that remembers echoes in the depot and scratchy whiskers and Dad asking if Hank Greenberg hit a home run yesterday.

I'm glad that little boy didn't have to welcome his father home in a mobile office trailer, for gosh sakes.

88th District Report by Stanley Powell State Representative

Legislative activity and progress were about normal last week. We had many committee meetings, two party caucuses and the usual rather noisy and rather confusing formal sessions. The flood of new bills and resolutions hasn't subsided. More pour in each day, much faster than we are processing those already being considered in our committees or on our daily calendars.

THE FUEL CRISIS

I know that it is hard to imagine that there really is a fuel shortage in our nation. Many of us are not affected by the current problem except to run into an occasional situation where your favorite gas station is closed or operating on reduced hours.

But, it appears to me that the fuel shortage is real and not contrived as some would have us believe. The reasons are many and varied, but the major problem appears to be the lack of crude fuel, complicated by the fact that many of our fuels used in the past are not ac-

ceptable for environmental reasons. The whole situation is very complex. In the long run, the solution must be found in locating new sources of crude fuels and perhaps making some environmentally unsound fuels safer for consumption. These solutions must come from private enterprise and from governmental sources.

In the meantime, it would help to find ways for the consumer to cut back on what appears to be an insatiable demand for more energy. In short, we need to become "energy conscious." There are many ways, for instance, that each of us can take steps to conserve fuel in our homes through heat-conservation.

The Governor's Task Force on Fuel Supply and the Michigan Department of Commerce have issued a list of fuel saving tips that I would like to pass along to you. Here are some things you can do to save fuel and cut costs without costing you any money.

-Turn down your thermostat 2 degrees every other day until you find the least temperature at which you can be comfortable.

-Turn down your thermostat at night (and during the day also if everyone is away all day).

-Close doors and turn off heat to unused areas of the home.

-Close drapes and pull your shades at night.

-Change furnace air filter frequently to maintain efficiency (at least once a month).

"Balance" system by regulating heat directed to each room) to eliminate a waste of heat in "hot" areas of the home).

-Open shades and drapes on sunny days.

-Do not hold outside doors open for conversation.

-Clear all obstructions away from registers and grilles, such as drapes, rugs, chairs and so forth which would restrict air movement.

-Close fireplace damper when not in use.

-Turn down your thermostat when away for the weekend or on vacation.

-Wear heavier clothing at home.

According to figures released by the Department and the Task Force, if you set your temperature down by 10 degrees from 75 degrees overnight, you can save 11 per cent on your fuel. So you see, there are things that each of us can do.

In addition, we could all help by cutting back on our driving habits. Is it really necessary to drive down to the corner store? Do we really have to take that Sunday drive, or can we find something to do around the house?

If government and private industry can work together to find new and better sources of energy and if each of us can do our part in conserving energy, we can make it through these difficult times.
