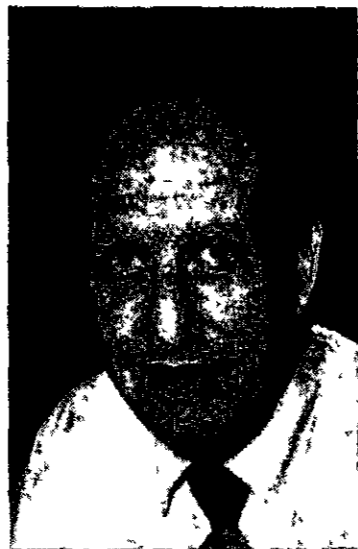
## Weatherwax leaves St Johns to take Roseville position

ST JOHNS — Harvey Weatherwax, St Johns city manager for the past 6½ years, announced his resignation to accept the city manager's position in Roseville.

The southern Michigan community is a city with a population of about 62,000.

In his letter of resignation addressed to Roy Ebert, mayor, and the members of the city commission, Weatherwax said: "It is with regret that I am hereby submitting my resignation as city manager of St Johns, effective Dec 2. I look back on my 6½ years as city manager in St Johns with gratitude for all of those who have helped make my job easier. I wish especially to thank the city commission, both past and present members, the city dept heads and their men, without whose cooperation I could not have done the job.

"I feel the city has an excellent staff that can easily carry on the daily business of the city until a new city manager is hired. If you wish I will be happy in any way to help in acquiring a replacement for the position.

"My resignation is not a reflection of any dissatisfaction on my part with any member of the city commission or staff. This new position offers the new challenges of a much larger city and, of course, a better salary."

Weatherwax will earn \$26,000 in his new position, compared to \$18,000 in St Johns.

Weatherwax came to St Johns when the city was experiencing economic difficulties. When asked, he agreed that helping to correct such a situation was a highlight of his service to St Johns.

During his stay in St Johns there have been many changes and he noted those with most impact physically have been new storm sewers, street paving and land annexation.

During the 6½ years Weatherwax has been in St Johns, the city has been able to reduce millage while others have been forced to raise theirs.

When asked why that has been possible, Weatherwax said, "Due to the raise in our state equalized valuation and re-assessment, the city commission agreed to

pass some of the raise back to the people." He added that new building in St Johns had also helped raise the state equalized valuation.

When asked, "Tom Hundley, former city clerk, was chosen to be city manager at Swartz Creek and now you've been asked to go from a town of 7000 residents to take the reins of a city of 62,000. With that in mind St Johns must offer a favorable impression to governments in other areas of the state. Has your impression been around the state that St Johns is considered 1 of Michigan's more progressive small towns?" He answered:

"Yes. The city's present charter was drafted in 1919 going to the commission-manager form of government. During this time, the city has had only 7 city managers. This way over the national average in time served by managers. It shows that, by everyone working together, even with a 1919 charter, progress can be made."

CHALLENGES  
Weatherwax viewed his greatest

challenge as city manager has been "reversing the St Johns money problems and staying in the black while reducing taxes some..."

Looking forward to his new position, he said "learning the city's problems and becoming acquainted with the area" will be immediate challenges in Roseville.

Putting himself in the shoes of his successor, Weatherwax said the manager's immediate challenges will be "finishing the storm sewer project and implementing Part II of the sanitary sewer grant."

Over the long range, he felt the new manager's greatest challenge to be "continuing and finishing the sanitary sewer grant and project. Keeping up with controlling the growth potential in St Johns will be a continuing challenge," Weatherwax concluded.

## United Way campaign tops goal

ST JOHNS — 1974 was a good year for the Clinton County Area United Way Campaign with contributions hitting 112% of this year's goal.

Clinton County United campaigners brought in \$28,000, \$3000 above the 1974 goal of \$25,000.

The figure was 25% above last year's total collected for United Way. Betty Smith, employed by Hancock Industries in Elsie was a co-winner of the 1st annual Marshall Award presented in the Capital Area United Way Campaign for outstanding workers.

She was presented the award for her outstanding job in soliciting contributions from Hancock employees. She visited each employee personally at their job locations to explain the needs and purposes of the United Way campaign. She was one of 30 nominated for the honor.

## Five receive prison sentences

ST JOHNS — Sentences were passed Monday, Nov 18 at the Circuit Court in St Johns for 5 men convicted of producing, packaging, and selling marijuana.

The men are: Armiral Guerro Rodriguez, 28, of 2260 W. Stoll Rd., Lansing; Jesse Lopez, 27, 412 S. Detroit St., Lansing; Ygnacio L. Bermedez, 21, 725 Carey St., Lansing; Raul Cortez, 27, 1615 Linval St., Lansing; and Enrique Astran, 37, 317 S. Mifflin St., Lansing.

All 5 men were found to be guilty by a jury, Oct 10 and were sentenced Monday, Nov 18, to a 2 to 4 year term with Michigan Department of Corrections. The defense attorney said there would be an appeal due to a question of legality in the search and seizure methods used at the time of arrest.

The judge has granted \$10,000 bond pending appeal.

At the time of arrest, the Clinton County Sheriff's Dept and the Tri-County Metro Narcotics Unit seized 1700 pounds of the illegal substance that had an estimated street value of about \$240,000.

## Orchestra sells fruit

ST JOHNS — The St Johns Orchestra is now conducting its Fifth Annual Citrus Fruit Sale. The fruit, large Texas oranges and Ruby Red grapefruit, is top quality US No 1 fruit from The Langdon Barber Groves of McAllen, Texas.

The fruit is freshly picked and shipped directly to St Johns by refrigerated truck. The fruit comes in 2 different size boxes, 20 and 40 pounds and will be delivered to your door in time for the holiday season.

Compared to other food items, the price of the fruit has been held down.

There is only a 10¢ increase in a large box of fruit which is due to a freight increase. The small boxes are up about 30¢.

The sale will end Dec 2.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—His recent victory in the general election has garnered for Congressman Elford A. Cederberg (R-10th Dist) the title of a senior Republican in the United States House of Representatives.

Having served continuously in the House since Jan 3, 1963, Cederberg shares the honor with fellow Congressman John J. Rhodes (R-Arizona), and Bob Wilson (R-California), who have also served 11 consecutive terms.

## General Telephone asks for rate hike

General Telephone has applied to the Michigan Public Service Commission for authority to generally increase its rates, according to Jack Reitze, president of the company.

The second such rate application by the company in 14 years, General Telephone last applied for a general increase in rates in 1970.

The other utility servicing this area, Consumers Power Company, is also seeking to raise their rates. See story on Page 12A of this week's County News.

Specific proposed rates were not announced by the company. However, Reitze said General Telephone has requested increases in all basic rates and for most services.

Proposed rates will be published in newspapers throughout the company's operating area at least 30 days prior to public hearings which will be set by the MPSC, he said.

The requested increase in revenue would allow General Telephone to maintain service improvement and expansion, Reitze said.

General Telephone's current rates are based on the investment the company has in its "rate base" in 1970. Since that time, the company has invested an additional \$207 million in service improvement and expansion projects throughout its operating area.

TAXES, INTEREST, WAGES UP  
"Since 1970 our property taxes have increased more than 59% (from \$4.6 to \$7.3 million), the interest we paid on bonds and

short-term bank loans has increased over 111% (from \$6.2 to \$13.5 million), and salaries and wages have increased over 82% (from \$22 to \$40 million)," Reitze said.

"We want to continue our large scale improvement and expansion programs, but we'll need the additional annual revenue to do so," he said.

General Telephone's service improvement and expansion programs are financed largely by investor dollars, and not from dollars paid by customers for service, Reitze said.

NEED FOR INVESTMENT TOLD  
"Customer dollars paid for telephone service go toward the cost of providing that service and a return on the dollars invested in the company," he explained. "Therefore, we must earn a return on investment which is good enough to attract new dollars each year if we're to continue to expand and improve our service."

The requested increase in revenue would allow the company to earn an overall rate of return of 8.89%, only slightly higher than that authorized by the MPSC in 1971.

Reitze pointed out that, because of inflation and the resulting cost increases, General Telephone earnings do not approach the level authorized by the MPSC in 1971.

During the past 2 years, General Telephone has taken a number of internal steps to trim controllable expenses.

"The credit for our success in this area goes to our employees who have done an outstanding job in helping attain our cost-control objectives," Reitze said.

He said a series of cost-control and expense reduction programs since 1971 have reduced anticipated expenditures and its manpower requirements.

General Telephone now serves more than 566,000 telephones located in 540 Michigan communities. The company's operating area includes all or parts of 61 of the state's 83 counties.

## Probation violation brings 90 days in county jail

ST JOHNS — Lyle and Keith Mayers of rural St Johns were sentenced Monday to 90 days in the County Jail after earlier being found in violation of their probation.

The brothers were found to be in violation of their parole in connection with an incident in which a neighboring farmer's automobile was declared a total loss after 2 dead rac-

coons were placed in the car and left for a period of time.

The Mayers were on probation as part of their sentence stemming from charges of larceny of cattle.

Judge Leo Corbin moved not to revoke their probation, which would result in a prison sentence.

## Five players All-Conference picks Reflecting on the '74 Redwing football season

Reflections and tidbits on the 1974 high school football season: -ST. JOHNS and Alma dominated the West Central all-conference honor team with 6 players each. St. Johns finished in a tie with Waverly for the runnerup position; Alma tied Grand Ledge for the title. Grand Ledge landed 5 players on the all-conference team, Waverly placed just 2. Jeff Thornton of St. Johns was the only two-way choice, nailing down offensive guard and defensive back berths. He was joined by tackle Jeff Hazle and fullback Harold Wellman on offense and lineman Dan Whitmore and end Ted Loznak on defense. Alma's choices included 4 defenders and 2 offensive players, while Grand Ledge placed 4 of its 5 men on offense. Winless Ionia was the only team not represented on the team. -JEFF THORNTON was named the Redwings' most valuable player at the football awards banquet Nov. 10, adding to his all-conference honors. The 5-10, 165-pound senior co-captain was leading tackler on the team with 117 (86 of them solo, the rest assists), the top kickoff return man with 117 yards in 6 runs (19.5 average); and shared the lead in outstanding defensive plays. Thornton registered 3 interceptions, 2 fumble recoveries and 4 knocked down passes on the ODP list.

He tied Nick Koenigsnecht and Tim Knaus in knocked down passes. Whitmore was the other Redwing to total 9 ODPs, getting 5 of them by sacking the quarterback. He had the most fumble recoveries (3) and added one knocked down pass. Keith Haske tied Thornton as leading interceptor with 3. -OTHER AWARD WINNERS included Jeff Hazle as best blocking lineman, upback Harold Wellman as winner of the 101 Per Cent Award, running back, Gary Straus as most improved player, and Jeff Thornton as best hitter. -CAPTAINS NAMED for the 1975 squad were Haske, Whitmore and Koenigsnecht. -STATISTICALLY, St. Johns showed a preponderance of rushing in its offense. The Wings gained 83 1st downs on the ground to 19 in the air, rolled up 1,580 yards rushing to 394 passing. They ran 441 times and passed 80 times. St. Johns completed 34 of 80 passes, with Haske hitting 22 of 48 for 253 of the 394 yards. He threw all 6 Redwing TD passes. End Ken Randolph received 17 passes for 157 yards and 2 touchdowns to lead a list of 6 receivers. Offensively the Wings were balanced in the statistical charts. Wellman and Brian Pertler were leading scorers with 18 points apiece. Pertler scored 3 TDs against Holt in his best

game at quarterback. Kevin Knight's kicking boosted him into runnerup scoring honors with 14 points. He knocked 6 of 13 point-after-touchdown tries through the uprights to go with 1 rushing touchdown. Four other players finished with 12 points each. Knight was leading round gainer with 538 yards in 154 carries (3.5 average) and Wellman was right behind with 510 yards in 117 runs (4.4) Haske was 3rd rusher with 171 yards in 55 rushes (3.1). The Redwings lost just 5 punts all year. They scored 114 points while giving up 70 St. Johns shut out 4 opponents enroute to its 6-3 record. Mt Pleasant's 20-point total was the highest opponent score of the season and came in the 1st game. -ST. JOHNS' DEFENSE recorded the best figure average points allowed over the season, giving up just 7.7 points a game (70 points in 9 games). Alma allowed 78 points for an 8.7 mark. Fifth place Charlotte slipped in ahead of the other 2 conference "biggs" with a 101 point defensive yield - Grand Ledge gave up 115 points, Waverly 129. -OFFENSIVELY AROUND the conference, Alma was the most prodigious with 228 points, a 25.1 average per game. Waverly cranked out 20.3 points a game with a total of 183, while Grand Ledge was just behind at 178 overall and 19.7 on the average.

St. Johns held Alma scoreless, allowed 7 points in a 1-point loss to Grand Ledge, and gave up 17 points in a 5-point loss to Waverly. CONFERENCE ODDITIES Ionia, finishing dead last with a 0-6 WC mark (0-9 overall), is on a 26-game losing streak. Seven of this year's losses have come by shutout. Ionia was blanked in its 1st 6 games, then stunned Waverly by ripping off 27 points - probably due to the resignation announcement that day by Waverly's coach, Bill Taft. Ionia was outscored 154-0 in the 1st 6 games, 239-33 for the season. That's a defensive average of 26.5 points a game and an offense of 3.2 points. Meanwhile, 5 of Hastings' 7 defeats were in shutouts. Charlotte played close to the vest against great team and humble squad alike. The Orange and Black skinned Ionia 13-0 and lost to Hastings 14-6, but lost to St. Johns only 0-4 and took Alma to 28-15, a relatively stiff resistance against the Panthers. Grand Ledge won by a scant 13-7 margin. Alma, meanwhile, showed its class in the MHSAA's paper playoff results, finishing tied for 5th in its Class B region and 17th in the state standings. It also blanked Mt Pleasant 14-0 in the season finale to gain its last 7-victory season in more than 20 years.

**PAIR UP WITH PEDWIN**

## Girls' basketball tourney to be held in St Johns

St. Johns mentor Beth Schrauben played under Chesaning coach Carol Kapnik when both were at Greenville High School. This year Chesaning is undefeated champion of the Mid-Michigan B league and itching to get a district title. Durand, meanwhile, comes off a good year in a well-balanced Genesee County B league. The Flint squad had a 13-6 overall record and a 10-4 conference mark with one game remaining before the tournament.

In the background lurks an improving Alma team which hopes to keep building momentum right through the tourney. The Panthers finished at 6-10 for the year and played their best game of the season while losing in the closest against St. Johns. Corunna brings in the worst record of the 6 teams with a 4-8 overall mark, but is looking to a pair of scoring guards for leadership in an upset bid against Durand. ## Marauders, Redwings meet head-on Thursday

To hear Mary Nutter talk about it, Thursday's girls basketball district tourney game between Ovid-Elsie and St. Johns may be something like sending out David's little sister to stone Goliath's mother. It's not that the odds are so great - it's just the difference in average height of the teams. "We probably have to respect their height the most," said Nutter, who also respects a few other things about the defending district champions: "They play good defense and they are excellent passers to the big girls underneath." Meanwhile, Beth Schrauben of St. Johns looks cautiously at the small Marauders: "We will have to play the best game we can play. We have not been shooting well this season. We've been getting the shots, but we haven't been scoring as well as we could. It ought to be an interesting game." Schrauben expects to start a team whose shortest members are tied at 5-6. At Ovid-Elsie this year that's tall. Debbie Long and Cherie Cole are the primary hopes at center - Long stands 5-7, Cole uncharacteristically tall for O-E at 5-10. Guard Brenda Cox is 5-2.

Redwings on the probable starter list include a pair of 5-6 guards and a front line averaging 5-9. It's been a good year at both schools, though each came off outstanding 1973 seasons. St. Johns lost its West Central title to a "super Ionia team" (in Schrauben's words) and still wound up a solid 2nd place with a 9-3 mark. The Redwings bounced back after 3 straight losses at the 1st of the season to score a season high of 85 points in a whitewashing of Waverly. "If we pull it all together and play that type of game, we will be okay," said Schrauben. "Against Waverly everything went right - we had everyone getting open and we had super passing. Jenn Ott and Linda Eisler scored in the 30s." Ott, the leading scorer with more than 100 points, is limping on a sprained ankle and is a doubtful starter for Thursday's clash with O-E. If unable to start, the 5-10 senior will be replaced by Eisler, a 5-9 junior and the team's leading rebounder with 18 a game. Linda Sperry, a 5-9 junior, will move into Eisler's forward spot along with regular Kendle Knight (5-10 senior), who is 2nd leading rebounder with an average of 12.

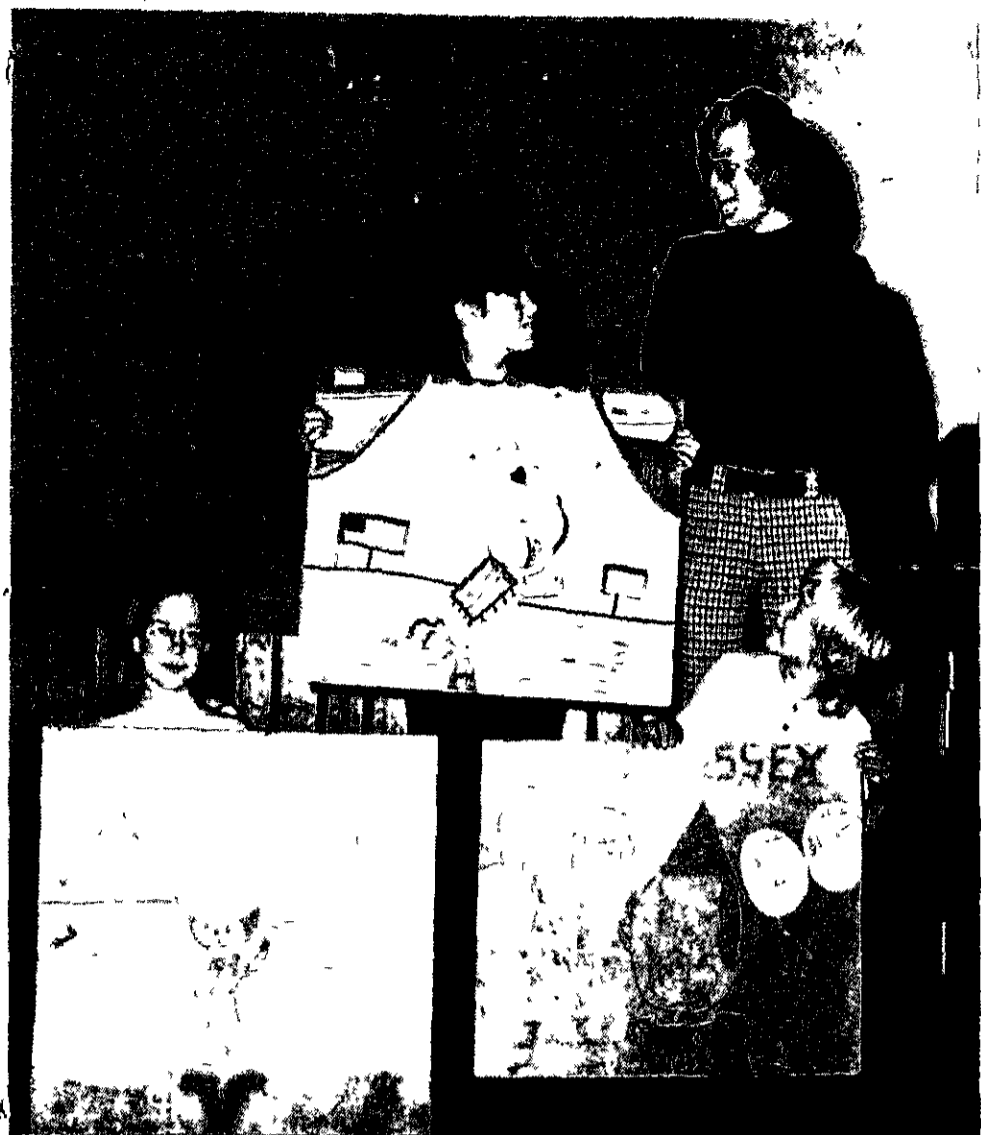

## DeWitt Twp Fire Dept to get new fire equipment

DEWITT - The DeWitt Board of Trustees voted unanimously to lease new equipment which would hopefully enable the fire department to receive calls more accurately than with the old equipment.

The new transmitter, radio, repeater, and micro wave transmitter will cost the township \$109.24 a month to lease, and \$4,407 to buy outright. The trustees voted to lease the equipment until April and if it proves satisfactory, then make the purchase.

The old equipment has proven to be faulty as noted by several of the trustees. William J. Purnes, trustee, commented "I feel something has to be done and done immediately. Some calls haven't been getting in. I'm afraid something bad will

happen in DeWitt and we won't get the call."

Approvals and rejections were made concerning the expenditures for the new modular unit which is being constructed to temporarily house the DeWitt township Police Dept. Approved were: outside lighting, cabinets and counter, and removal of excess earth. Rejected were: the drain electrical outlet pad, the slab for the water softener, and the protective air conditioning screens.

The debate on whether to approve or reject buying a water softener has been tabled for discussion at a later time.

The board approved the hiring of two temporary employees, a secretary for the police dept, and a building inspector. The salaries will be provided for by money from a federal grant which will last until July, 1975.

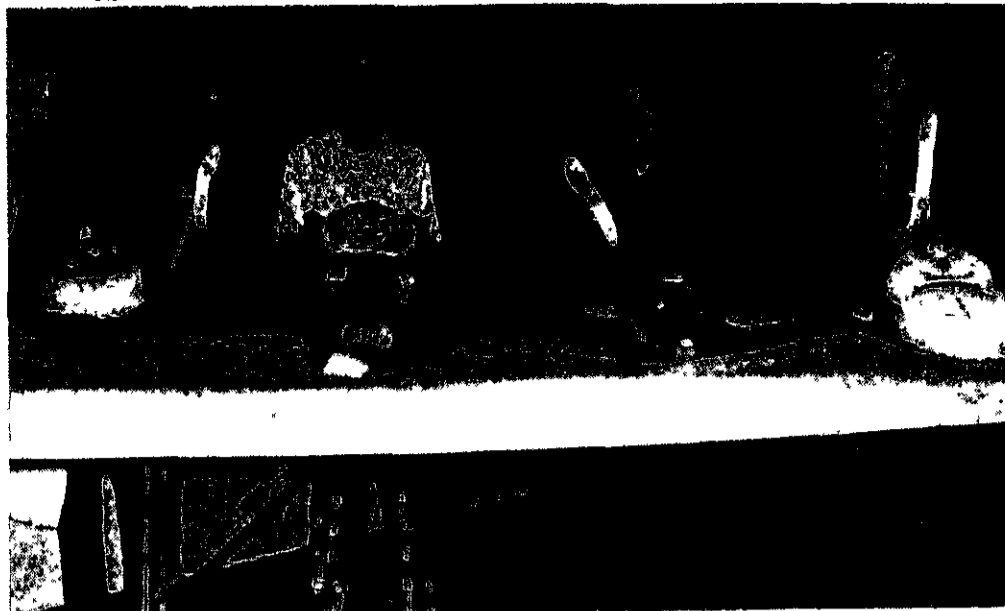

# Consumers Power asks rate increase permission

LANSING -- Consumers Power Company has appealed to the Michigan Public Service Commission for additional relief permitting the company to raise its electric rates sufficiently to produce another \$27 million annually.

The company has pending a general rate case authorization to increase electric rates to produce \$72,159,000 annually. In filing that case last April, the company also asked partial and immediate relief in the amount of \$54,659,000.

The Commission, in September, allowed the company interim relief in the amount of \$27,624,000 annually. Subsequently the Commission Staff concluded that the Company is entitled to at least \$56,068,000 in additional electric revenues.

Consumers now have returned to the Commission, citing critical need for additional partial and immediate rate relief of \$27,035,000 annually, pending an order in the

main rate case which is expected early in 1975. In its petition, the company says:

"During the course of this proceedings, Applicant's (i.e., the Company's) financial condition has continued to worsen, with its earnings per share of common stock declining from \$2.41 per share for the 12 months ending December 1973 to \$1.67 per share for the 12 months ending July 1974, and to \$1.43 per share for the 12 months ending September 1974. This earnings rate is far below Applicant's annual common stock dividend of \$2.00 per share. In addition, for the first time in Applicant's history, earnings on its common equity were negative for the third quarter of 1974."

The Company points out that, because of its dire financial condition and resultant inability to sell additional securities, it has had to reduce drastically its construction of new electric generating facilities, and to

curtail other work wherever possible.

Two months ago, the Company cancelled plans to build a 2,300,000 kilowatt nuclear generating station near Quanicasse, Mich., and deferred for one year construction of an 800,000 kilowatt addition to its coal-fired James H. Campbell plant near Port Sheldon, Mich.

Despite these reductions, the petition says, the Company's need for outside financing increased in 1974 because declining earnings left nothing to be plowed back into the business. The petition continues:

"It now is increasingly apparent that applicant cannot continue to carry on the construction program needed to meet the requirements of its customers unless the current decline in earnings is reversed at an early date, coverage ratios are improved, and investor confidence is restored in Applicant's securities."

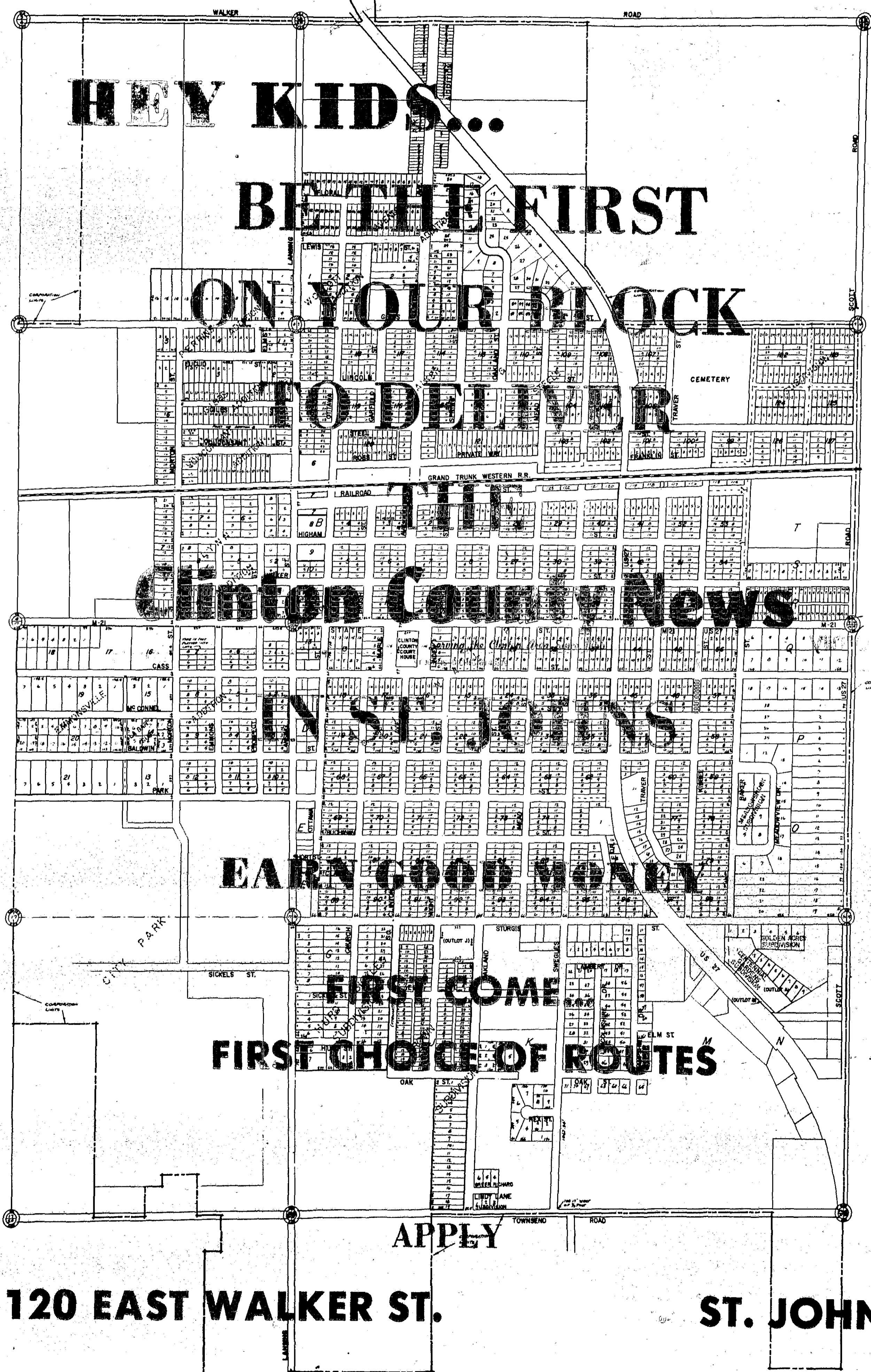

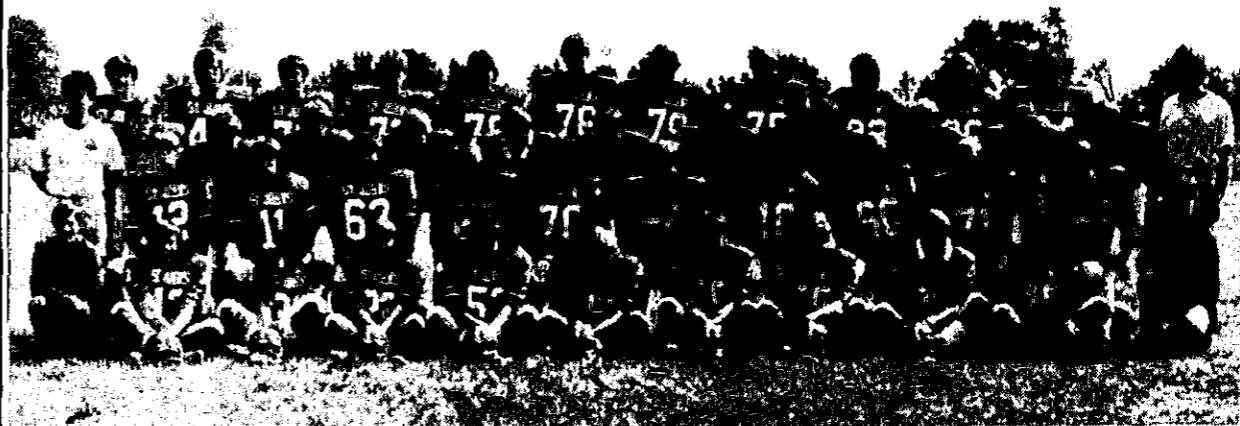

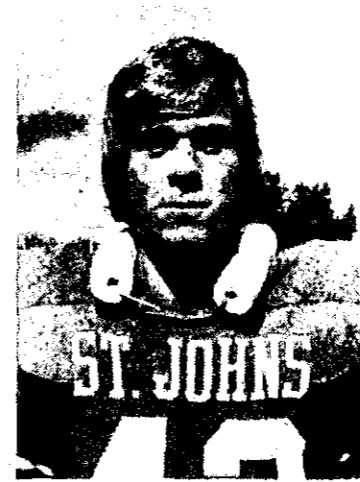

# Tri-County lists uses of \$3 million in LEAA funds

The Tri-County region has received over \$3 million dollars in Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) funds since this division of the Department of Justice was first created by the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act in 1968.

These dollars have been utilized by local agencies to finance a variety of criminal justice programs. Specific information on the use of these funds, and recommendations for future projects are contained in the recently completed

1976 "Comprehensive Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice Plan" for Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham Counties.

Over the past year, the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission (TCRPC) and the Region 6 Criminal Justice Coordinating Council were charged with identifying major criminal justice problems and addressing these needs in the regional plan. This was accomplished through:

- 1) An inventory of the criminal justice system within the region - police, courts, prosecution, corrections, and social services;
- 2) an analysis of crime statistics by jurisdiction;
- 3) An identification of regional needs, problems, and action-oriented options; and
- 4) a list of projects which respond to regional needs and problems.

This plan represents the first attempt to describe the criminal justice system on a region-wide basis. Richard Liles, TCRPC Criminal Justice Coordinator, pointed out that the preparation of the plan was significant in bringing about

cooperation between criminal justice disciplines. "It also provided the impetus for a combined approach in the development of future projects."

The priorities outlined in the plan provide the groundwork for weighing proposed criminal justice projects against the major needs of the region. "This approach is vital because of the limited amount of LEAA funds available," said Liles. Regional priorities are as follows:

- 1) There is a need to improve existing and/or establish new comprehensive crime prevention programs at all levels of the criminal justice system.
- 2) There is a need to strengthen and improve basic police services through: the addition of manpower, the expansion of training, the acquisition of equipment, the reduction of nonpolice functions through the coordination of social service agencies.
- 3) There is a need to improve the adjudication process by: reducing procedural delays in courts, reducing the time

between conviction and sentence, reducing court calendars through deferral and other supportive services, providing modern management techniques and expanding manpower, controlling the plea-bargaining process.

4) There is a need to bring about regional cooperation through coordinated programming in the areas of: communications, crime-specific planning, information systems.

5) There is a need to establish a Youth Services System for identifying and coordinating all youth serving agencies in order to prevent delinquency.

6) There is a need to continue upgrading local correctional facilities through improved rehabilitative programs and reconditioning of existing physical plants.

7) There is a need to improve the relationship between criminal justice agencies and the public through education, information, and the involvement of citizen groups.

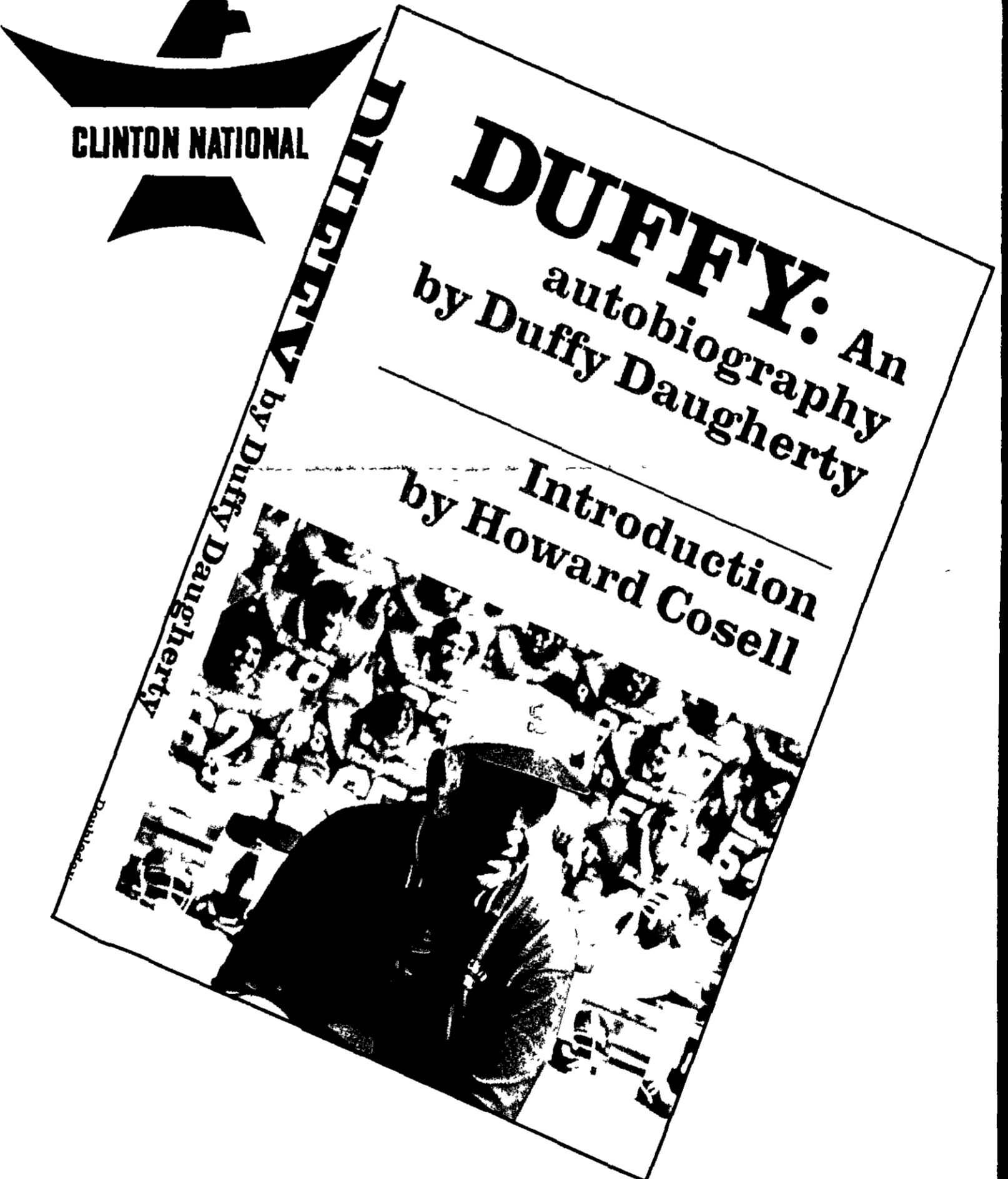

## Three months could earn veterans back pay

WASHINGTON, DC - Back pay is waiting for all veterans who served in the Armed Forces between October, 1972, and December, 1972, according to Congressman Elford A. Cederberg, 10th Congressional District.

The money, part of a pay increase, had originally been impounded by President Nixon. Congress later declared the action to be illegal.

"It has come to my attention that many veterans don't even know that they are eligible for the retroactive paycheck," Congressman Cederberg stated. "In addition, the various military services have found it

impossible to locate or contact the thousands of veterans who served at that time." Congressman Cederberg advises all veterans who are eligible to include their name, social security number, former rank, date of separation, any changes in rank during the noted time, and current address in any correspondence with the following finance centers:

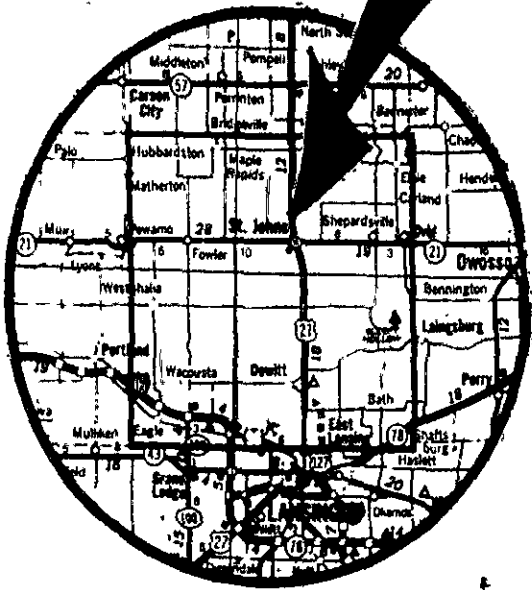

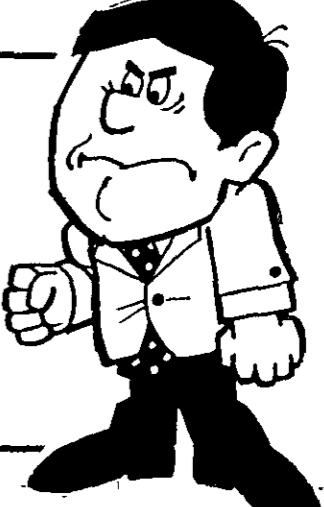

## Marketing the 1974 corn crop

With corn market prices at harvest time the most favorable in over two decades, farmers are debating whether to store or sell their 1974 crop at harvest, according to Walter Wittenbach, Chairman of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Mary Michigan corn farmers were hard hit this year with a cold, wet spring causing late planting and then the mid-summer drought stunting growth and capped off with early frosts in September and October. While some farmers had extremely poor crops, he noted, the estimated production

of the Michigan corn crop is still nearly 116 million bushels; the third highest in history topped only by the record harvest in 1972 and 1973.

Wittenbach stated that with no Government stocks to threaten the market and avid interest by foreign buyers along with the lowest national corn crop in four years, market prices could prove quite volatile. He hedged his analysis somewhat by saying that there are so many factors affecting the corn market such as number of cattle and hogs on feed, increased transportation costs, and this year because of the poor quality, quality discounts will be substantial. Each farmer will have to make his own market analysis to determine whether to sell at harvest time or store for a possible better price later on.

Wittenbach pointed out that the county loan rates range from \$1.08 to \$1.15 per bushel throughout Michigan and that commodity loans will be available on the basis of where the corn is stored. This is intended to encourage the flow of corn into principal consumption areas. Loan rates are up in most Michigan counties and information on the county loan rate can be obtained from the local county ASCS office.

He added that market prices tend to decline during the harvest season and prices for new crop corn may drop from current levels. Producers with storage space available in approved warehouses or on the farm may be interested in holding their 1974 crop corn for market later in the season. He pointed out that many producers who used the loan program in recent years have netted considerably more by marketing their crop later in the season. More and more producers are taking advantage of the price support loan program in their marketing plans, but there are still many producers who have a general tendency to market their grain on the spur-of-the-moment basis which often results in accepting a lower price for their crop.

He noted that this year any farmer who produces corn is eligible to obtain a loan. The requirements for having to have a corn base or allotment or to sign up under the Feed Grain Program have been removed. Details for obtaining information on the 1974 commodity loan program can be obtained from the local county ASCS office, Wittenbach said.

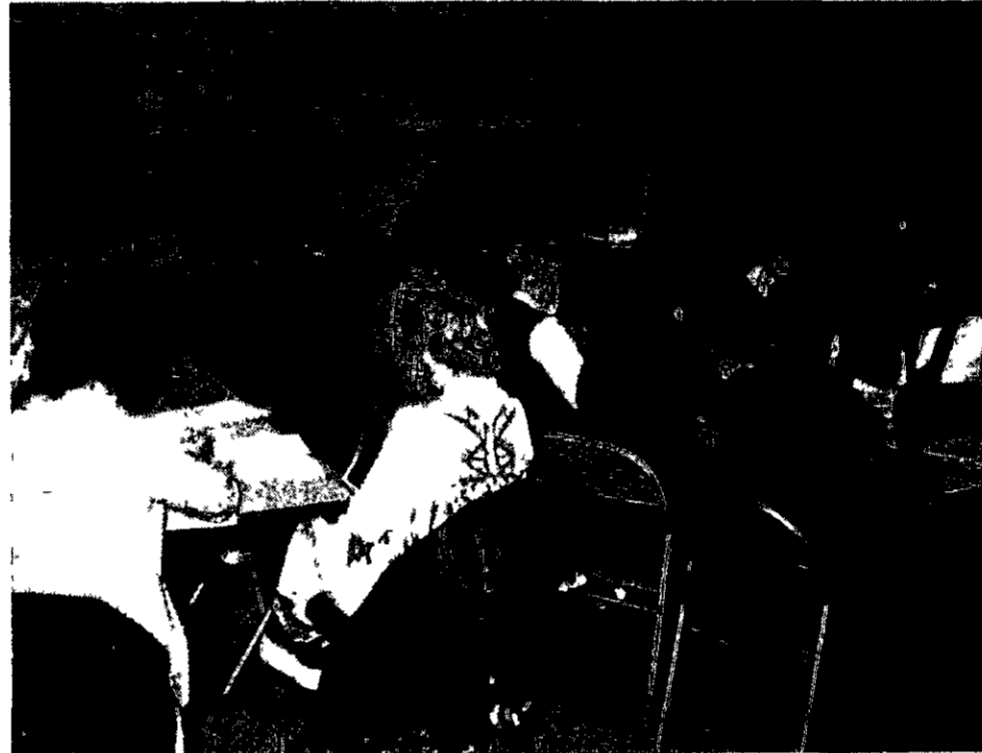
