ST JOHNS--The Clinton County Board of Commissioners voted again to buy the Hoag Funeral Home in St Johns for a District Court building Tuesday--but, it wasn't easy. Gerald Shepard introduced the subject again with a motion to purchase the property for \$135,000 with the understanding that Brigg's Realty had withdrawn from handling the sale.

After Shepard made his motion, supported by Alta Reed, Roger Overway raised a point of order. According to Robert's Rules of Order, such a motion to amend a previous motion already decided must be made by a member of the prevailing majority.

The prevailing majority were those 3 commissioners who voted against the purchase earlier. Although 7 voted in favor of the purchase with Derrill Shinaberry abstaining, such a vote requires a 2-3 majority to pass.

In the earlier vote, the 2-3 vote was prevented by "no" notes from Overway, Harold Martin and Duane Chamberlain. After Overway brought up the point of order, Shinaberry attempted to re-introduce the motion himself, but Overway again objected.

Referring to Robert's Rule of Orders, Overway quoted that the question must be raised by a member of the board who voted with the prevailing members during the previous vote. It was felt that Shinaberry could not re-introduce the motion because he did not vote previously, the 2d time a vote had been taken on the purchase of the Hoag property.

An opinion was asked from Jon Newman, prosecuting attorney, who said a change in the purchase price was a change in proposal, making such a proposal a new motion and also made it possible for the matter to be raised by any member of the board. Shinaberry then explained to board members that Brigg's Realty was no longer involved if the property was sold to the county and would not be receiving a commission from the sale.

Such a sale would be handled by a bank of Hoag's choice. Shinaberry then said he would entertain a motion for the purchase of the funeral home. After some moments of silence, Maurice Gove moved to purchase the funeral home building and property for \$135,000. The motion was supported by Shepard.

Overway then asked, "Who negotiated the \$135,000?" Shinaberry explained the figure was reached during committee action and Overway countered, "Why didn't we offer \$126,000 because he no longer has to pay a commission."

Shepard said because of the cash sale, contrasted to the earlier attempt by the board to purchase the property on land contract, the taxes will be higher on the

Overway said, "You can't expect the county to absorb his loss."

Martin, after some figuring, said the original price of \$140,000 minus the 10 percent commission came to about \$130,200. Shepard answered, "He wouldn't sell it that way."

Overway remarked, "It's our job to look out for the people of Clinton County and we're not--we're looking out for Hoag."

Shinaberry objected to the discussion of lowering the price because the broker's commission will no longer be paid to the Brigg's Company.

"The commission," he said, "should never have entered into it. When the Brigg's Company gave up the commission, we could be willing to pay the original price."

Shepard added, "When we announce our action to purchase, we put him out of business," referring to earlier action by the board to purchase the property. However, that sale was never consummated because it was learned the county could not purchase on a land contract basis.

When the vote was finally taken, the 2-3 majority was gained with Shinaberry voting because Briggs was no longer involved in the sale. Shinaberry removed himself from the last vote because he is employed by Briggs.

Voting for the purchase was Shinaberry, Dyle Henning, Gerald Shepard, Virginia Zeeb, Maurice Gove, Don Gilson, Alta Reed and William Hufnagel.

Voting against the purchase was Harold Martin, Overway and Duane Chamberlain. Shinaberry was asked by the County News what the appraisal price of the property was and he said a party informed him the land couldn't be purchased and a building built for \$200,000.

When the County News again asked what the appraisal was, another member of the board said that the county didn't obtain an appraisal but that Hoag had 2 different appraisals of the property listing the value at \$150,000.

The property is listed on the city tax rolls at a total value of \$68,000.

with Santa if they wish for a fee of \$1.25. All proceeds from the pictures will go to buy Christmas presents for needy children.

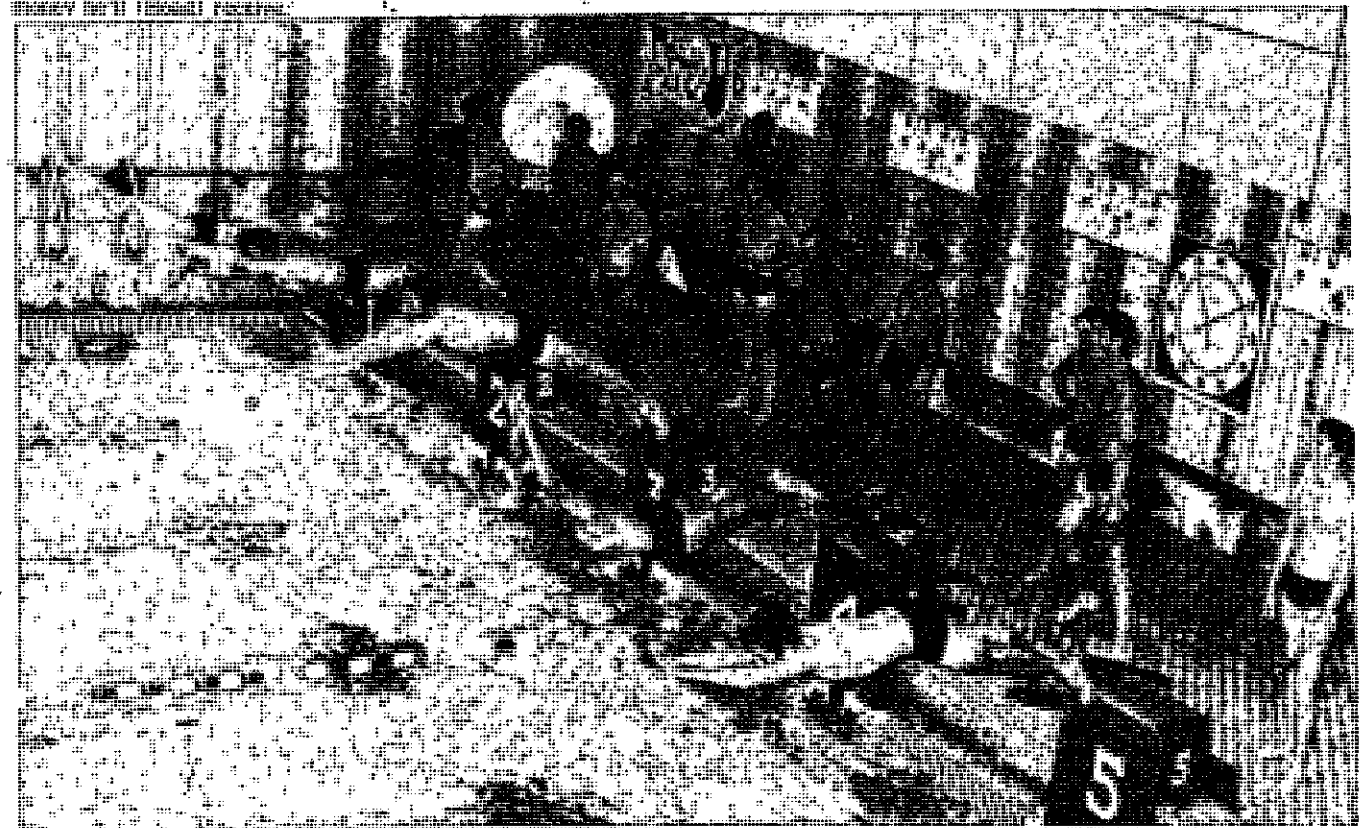

Steve VanVleet represents county at MJHA

The 39th Annual National Junior Horticultural Association Conference brought youth interested in horticulture from throughout the nation, November 2-5, 1973 in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. There were 189 4-H, FFA and other youth members between 14 and 21 from over 40 states participating in this National event.

Representing Michigan 4-H members included: Steve VanVleet-Clinton County; Penny Peprine-Ingham County and Marcia Browers-Marquette County. They participated in the judging, identification and information contest where they identified a selection of vegetables, fruits, flowers and

ornamentals as well as taking a written examination. The Michigan 4-H team placed 8th out of 17 4-H teams. Steve VanVleet was the highest Michigan 4-H'er in score as he tied for 8th place out of 64 4-H participants. Steve scored 71 out of 80 in judging 8 classes, 140 out of 160 on plant identification, 38 out of 40 on specialty (vegetables) and 134 out of 160 on the examination for a total of 383 out of a possible 440 points.

During the conference the delegates attended the old fashioned Oklahoma Chuck-

wagon Feast on Saturday, visit the State Cactus Show, Will Rogers Gardens with a number of workshops from terrariums to leadership on Sunday. Tours on Monday included a visit to Moesel's Hort-Haven, Tommy's Cello-Pak, Farmer's Market, Oklahoma City Zoo, Furrow's, Inc., and the Scottish Rite Temple.

The National Junior Horticulture Association is a group for young people, age 14-21, who are interested in horticulture or related fields.

METRIC NOMENCLATURE

The basic unit of length in the metric system is the metre-which is a little longer than a yard. The unit of weight(mass)is the kilogram—slightly more than two pounds. The unit of volume is the litre—about a quart. Temperature is expressed in degrees Celsius —0°C (32°F) is the freezing point of water and 100°C (212°F) is the boiling point. There is no difference in units of time; they remain the second, minute and hour.

The metric system is a decimal system which is what makes it so simple to use. It goes like this:

- 1 metre (about a yard) equals 100 centimetres equals 1000 millimetres
- 1000 metres (about 1/2 mile) equals 1 kilometre
- 1 kilogram (about 2 pounds) equals 1000 grams
- 1 litre (about a quart) equals 1000 millilitres

As it must to all men, the time has come for me to say nuts to Nixon's tapes. Who cares? My son catches fleas barehanded and I can tell you who won the academy award for best supporting actress in 1940.

Scott Fitzgerald worked on the screenplay for 'Gone With the Wind.'" The book didn't know that. I was fantastic.

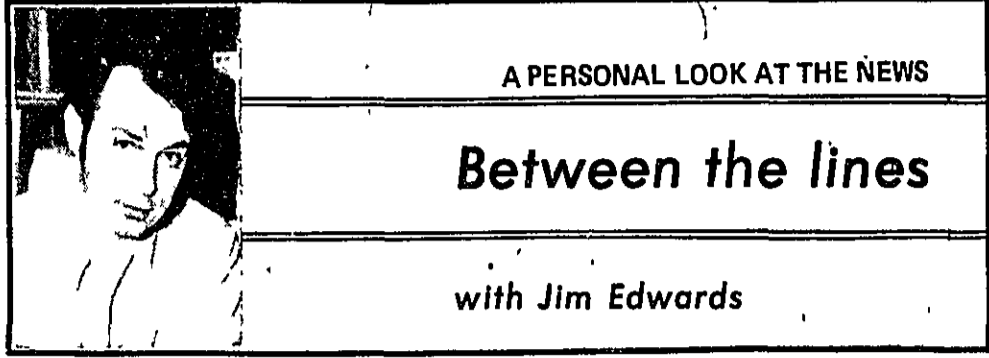
"Wake your mother up," I said. "She has got to see this incredible performance by her husband."

-Should be furnished with windows that reflect sunlight so Pa can watch the Lions on television on a sunny, Sunday afternoon.

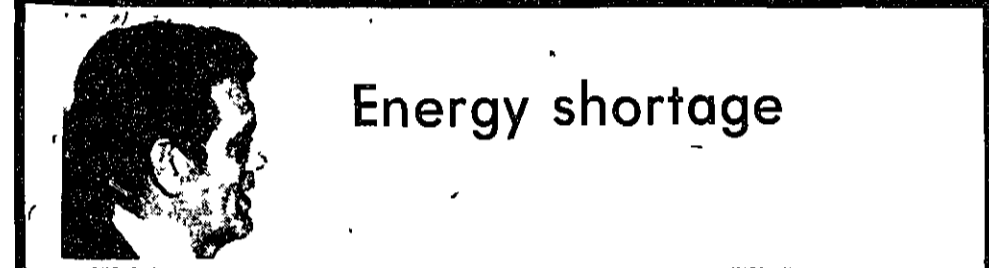
-Should have bathrooms that are not either a lot colder or a lot hotter than the rest of the house.

Energy shortage

When President Nixon last week asked all of us to do our part in the conservation of energy throughout the country, he made heroes out of a lot of us fathers.

Now, instead of being one of those "stingy old goats" who goes around turning out lights in empty rooms and turning down the thermostat, I find myself an energy-conscious, environmentally-aware individual who was far ahead of popular thought in the area of conserving our limited sources of energy.

This was brought home to me last week, not only as I listened to the President, but also as I participated in a hearing conducted by our House Republican Task Force on Consumer Affairs, called to review some of the state's problems in this area.

The hearing was held in Battle Creek, one of the regions of the state most severely affected by the present problem. We listened to natural gas and petroleum industry experts who explained the cause of the shortage as they saw it and to local people who are the most seriously affected.

Certainly, one short evening cannot bring out all the reasons for the shortage but I am convinced that one aspect of it has been an artificial regulation of the price of natural gas. The villain appears to be the Federal Power Commission which has regulated the price for which natural gas could be sold at the well throughout the country. The objective of this regulation was admirable: to provide this form of energy at the lowest possible cost to the consumer. And, no one can deny that, until now at least, we have enjoyed comparatively low natural gas prices. Compared to oil and coal, it is by far the most economical source of heat we have.

But, that regulation has had an unwanted effect. Because

the level at which the price was controlled did not provide a reasonable profit to the person who invested in the wells, he stopped investing and put his money to work elsewhere. You may recall a discussion in this column some weeks ago pointing out that investment as well as labor can go on strike and, in effect, this is what has happened in the petroleum and natural gas business.

Records show that in 1956 about 16,000 exploratory wells were drilled but only some 8,000 were drilled in 1972. Yet, responsible geologists estimate we still have around 40 years of potential reserves of natural gas in the ground based on present annual usage.

It's very much like the problem with the beef price freeze last summer. When a ceiling price was placed on beef which would not compensate the farmer for the production of it, he just stopped producing it.

I am not sure this is the only problem in the energy field. In response to the natural gas shortage, we turn to fuel oil but there is a limited amount of both the crude oil needed and the refining capacity available to produce it. From this same crude oil and same refinery must come the gasoline to power our automobiles; so, when we emphasize heating oil, we help create a shortage of auto fuel.

The accumulation of these problems has brought us to the present emergency situation. The long-range solution has to be in the use of the natural gas and petroleum reserves we have and in the rapid development of new sources of energy.

For the present, it seems we will all have to make some adjustments. We will have to change our habits of lighting, heating and auto travel.

But it needn't make us miserable. There are redeeming factors.

If driving a car at 50 miles an hour saves gas, it also saves dollars. At the rate prices are rising, those savings can be significant.

Similarly, turning down the thermostat, turning out unused lights and other energy-saving acts can all have a beneficial effect on the pocketbook.

So, if you dislike the inconvenience of conserving energy, just think of it as a way of beating the high cost of living.

This can be particularly gratifying to all of us "stingy old goats" who will now get to do our thing around the house in the cause of energy conservation and patriotism.

View from the Senate

The recurring question of why business and industry are leaving Michigan is back again and this time a State Senate committee, reflecting concern by the Governor and other state officials, is groping for the reasons and, if possible, the remedies.

There is no question but that there is a business exodus. State Treasury Department records for the last 20 years show that major Michigan business and industries are leaving the state at an increasing rate -- and when business leaves that means not only a loss of jobs but also curtailed state revenue.

So why are companies leaving?

Are state and local taxes too high?

Is the burden of unemployment and workmen's compensation levies too heavy?

Does it cost too much to build new plants or replace old ones?

Are union labor demands too excessive, thus making business and industry in Michigan unable to compete with plants in other states?

Off the cuff, investigators believe it may be a combination of all of these factors -- with perhaps some other factors as well.

The problem is to find what factors contribute most to the problem and to devise legislation to correct them, if possible.

A preliminary study by the Senate Corporations and Economic Development Committee already has produced some interesting findings.

For instance, almost none of the state's leading companies currently is planning any expansion in Michigan.

In fact, many of them are phasing out -- or planning to phase out -- their operations in the state.

Most of them show decreases in the percentage of property they own in Michigan compared with the United States as a whole, and payroll percentages are down.

For instance, Chrysler Corporation's Michigan payroll percentage has dropped from 88 to 62 in 20 years, and its percentage of property in Michigan is down from 75 to 56 since 1952.

North American Rockwell's property ownership has dropped from 34 percent in 1952 to only 3 percent currently, while its payroll is down from 32 percent to only 4 percent in Michigan.

Many other companies report similar figures.

One company, thinking of adding to its Michigan facilities, found Texas with much lower pay scales, fringe benefits and utility costs and could build the same plant in Texas for about 3.5 million compared with as much as \$5.3 million to \$7.9 million in Michigan.

The Senate Committee is concerned not only with finding

ways to keep businesses from moving out of Michigan but also with making the situation in Michigan so attractive that new business and industry will want to move in.

A study predicts that, in the current decade, Michigan will have an estimated 823,000 new persons in the labor market. Obviously, it's important that jobs be found for these people.

Ironically, while the Corporations Committee will hold a series of meetings in the next three months and report its findings to the Legislature by next spring, a bill which is very unpopular with business and industrial leaders is currently pending before another committee, the Senate Labor Committee.

Identifiable as HB-4143 (it's already cleared the House), the measure would wipe out the week's waiting period before people out of work for any reason would be eligible for unemployment compensation benefits.

Labor unions are strongly endorsing the proposal, contending that employees who are out of work must eat the first week as well as succeeding weeks and that their families suffer by having to wait for money to come in.

They contend there is no more a moratorium on bills the first week a person is off the job than during the tenth week. They say that, if payments are not made the first week, they may have to be made later in the form of welfare payments.

Opponents of the proposal contend that doing away with the week's waiting period would, in effect, encourage unions to strike because the benefit payments would help subsidize the strike.

Auto industry officials are strongly opposed because they contend the proposal would add millions to the cost of manufacturing cars each year because of the annual brief shutdowns for model changes.

Corporation officials contend that they already are at a competitive disadvantage with companies in other states because of the high cost of unemployment and workmen's compensation and that the elimination of the week's waiting period would just compound the problem.

Interestingly, I included the following question on the waiting week in my 1973 legislative questionnaire mailed out earlier this year:

"Presently, a worker who is laid off his job through no fault of his own cannot begin receiving unemployment compensation until the second week after he is discharged. He can later receive compensation for that first week if he obtains a new job within 13 weeks. If he never gets another job, he never receives compensation for that first week although he will receive full benefits for all other weeks up to a maximum of 26. Although some oppose it because they think it will discourage discharged workers from looking for new jobs, a bill is before the Legislature which would scrap the so-called "waiting week" provision in present law and allow a laid-off employee to begin picking up unemployment compensation during the first week. Would you support it?"

The results were as follows: Men: Yes, 44.5 percent; No, 48.2 percent; Undecided, 7.3 percent. Women: Yes, 45.4 percent; No, 43.6 percent; Undecided, 11.0 percent.

Fertilizing house plants

Do your house plants look sick? They could be diseased, more likely the problem is due to poor growing conditions - improper fertilization for example.

Too much fertilizer may stunt plant growth and cause wilting or even death. Too little fertilizer can result in loss of leaves, fewer flowers or discolored foliage.

Here are a few suggestions on fertilizer use:

--Actively growing plants may need fertilizing every 4 to 6 weeks. Nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium are the nutrients that are usually needed most.

--Don't add fertilizer to dormant or inactive plants.

--Fertilize less often during Michigan winters - once during the winter season should be enough on most house plants.

--Liquid fertilizers are generally the easiest to use. Follow the manufacturer's instructions.

--Slow release dry fertilizers may be added to the soil surface to provide the plant with a steady supply of nutrients or

they may be incorporated in the soil mix before potting.

--Never apply fertilizer to dry soils; this could injure the roots. Water the plant and wait an hour before fertilizing.

With proper fertilization and care, plants can be a source of beauty and enjoyment for your house throughout the year.

Another summer is gone and the lawn mower retired in favor of the snow shovel. A number of fine fall days still remain, and they offer an ideal opportunity to give your home grounds a landscape check-up.

Here are a number of landscape maintenance chores a check-up might reveal.

--Apply wood chips or

mulches or other organic materials of the areas around trees and shrubs.

--Remove extended growth of ground covers which have overlapped sidewalk, drive or patio areas.

--Reshape the boundaries of walks and driveways to encourage users to follow intended pathways.

--Remove or recycle objects, including weeds, which tend to detract from the basic quality of the landscape.

These maintenance activities are as much a part of the home landscape as the design and layout itself. Take care of them now, and get a start on next year's outdoor living season.

Institutes, Resource Personnel Workshops, and other projects.

This year, it is the intent of the Instructional Improvement Implementation Section of the NSF to support implementation projects involving a spectrum of activities under the general headings of dissemination of information and curriculum utilization, within a variety of grade levels in the K-12 range, and involving different types of target groups - teachers, administrators, leadership specialists, and others.

Because the amount of proposals submitted each year exceed the NSF funds, the opinions of panelists who make up the evaluation team are considered invaluable to the Foundation in helping judge which proposals are most worthy of support.

The members of the NSF evaluation panel will meet Thursday, Nov. 15, in Arlington, Virginia. The meeting ends Saturday, Nov. 17.

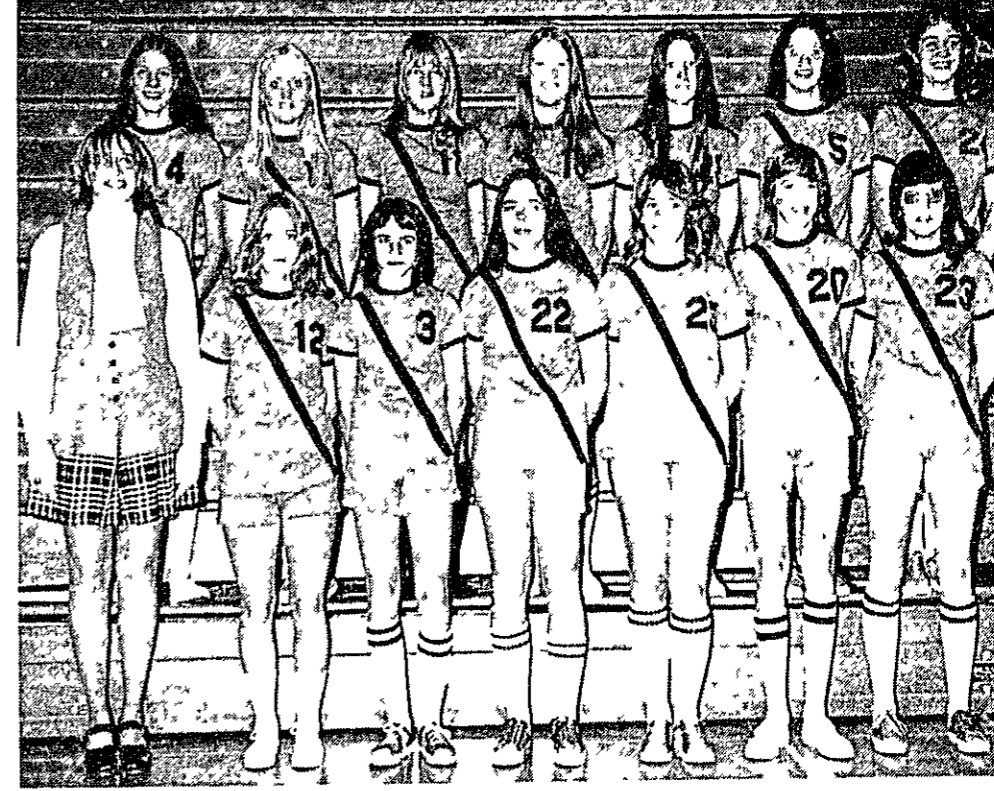
