St Johns Commission fills clerk, assessor posts

ST JOHNS - A new city clerk and city assessor were named at the Monday night meeting of the St. Johns City Commission. Named new clerk was Randy Humphrey and named to the assessor's position was Bruce Wood.

Humphrey was previously administrative assistant to the city manager and zoning administrator while Wood is currently the assistant county equalization director.

Humphrey's appointment was effective immediately and Wood will take over his post Dec 10.

The city clerk's position was vacated with former clerk, Tom Hundly accepted the position of city manager in Swartz Creek. Humphrey, 24, 805 W. Park has been employed with the city of St. Johns since 1971 and is a 1971 graduate of Central Michigan University.

He and his wife Melanie have 3 children, Kerry, Sarah and Emily.

A 1967 GRADUATE of St. Johns High School, Humphrey is the son of Mr and Mrs Mike Humphrey of 705 S. Swegles, St. Johns.

Wood, 33, 600 W. Gibbs, has been employed in the County Equalization office for 3 years and 3 months. He has been assistant equalization director for the past 2 years.

A graduate of Harrison High School, he completed assessor's training at Michigan Technological University and received his level 3 certification from Lansing Community College.

He was city manager of Zilwaukee for 2 years and was city assessor in Sturgis for 2 years.

Wood and his wife, Donna, have 4 children, Terri, Frederick Bruce II, Tina and Traci.

WOOD WILL receive a salary of \$12,500 annually while Humphrey will receive \$11,500.

Wire bandits plead guilty

ST JOHNS - Copper wire brings a pretty good price these days and, evidently 2 young Bannister men and another from Ashley decided to take advantage of the market.

The only problem the wire they took for the copper was being used to supply electrical power and were attached to Clinton County farm buildings and power poles.

For their efforts, the 3 were arrested and arraigned in court where they entered pleas of guilty to charges of larceny.

Sentenced to \$100 fine and costs of \$100 a piece and conditional 90 day jail sentences were Roger J. Sigafosse, 18, Bath; William Wreggelsworth, 17, Bannister and Samuel Van Ethen, 18, Ashley.

Their jail sentences will be suspended upon completion of 18 month probation and restitution of \$295 each.

They had sold the stolen wire, plus 17 radiators, for \$822.30.

Arrests were made by the Clinton County Sheriff's Dept through the cooperation of a local salvage yard dealer who had been approached to purchase some of the merchandise.

Anonymous phone call leads to arrests

ST JOHNS -- An anonymous telephone call and an investigation of a separate incident led to the arrest of 2 Lansing men for the breaking and entering of a mobile home at Michigan Mobile Home, North East St, Valley Farms.

Detective Richard May of the Clinton County Sheriff's Dept acting on the anonymous telephone call and, at the same time, investigating a separate theft noticed stolen furniture from the mobile home in the home of the suspect. Two subjects, Joe E. Ceraulo, 19, 1525 N. High, Lansing, and Terry Tackett, 17, 1542 N. High were arrested and charged with the breaking and entering of an unoccupied dwelling.

Ceraulo entered a plea of guilty and was placed on probation for 2 years with the 1st 90 days of the probation to be

served in the Clinton County Jail. Tackett, who waived the right to a court appointed attorney,

entered a plea of guilty and will be sentenced Dec 10. Tackett requested the court to lower bond, originally set at \$2500 and the bond was lowered to \$1000. Assisting on the investigation were Deputy Terry Hanecho and members of the Lansing Police Dept, Detectives Ray Warner and Charles Shawnee.

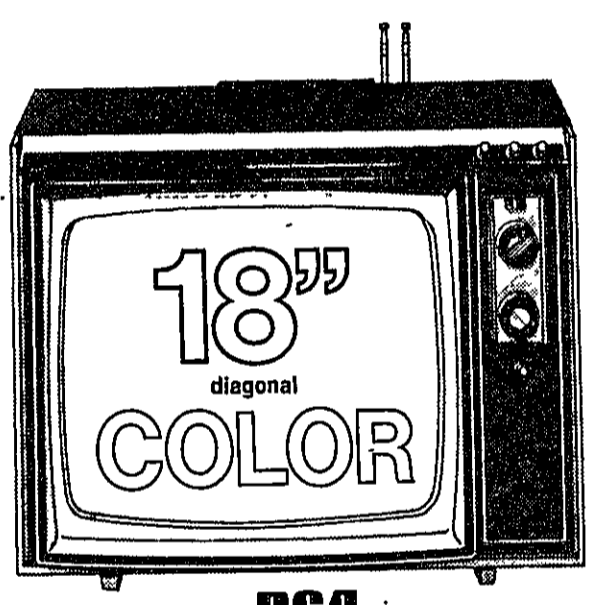

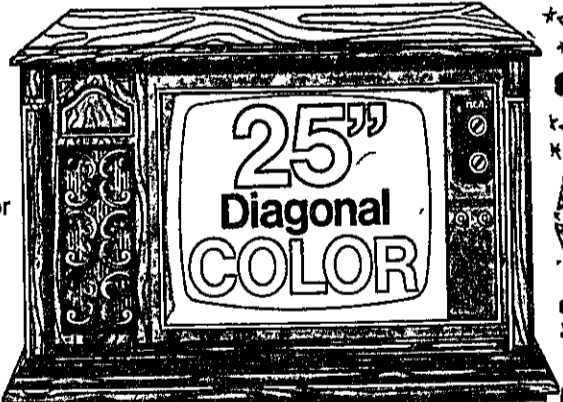

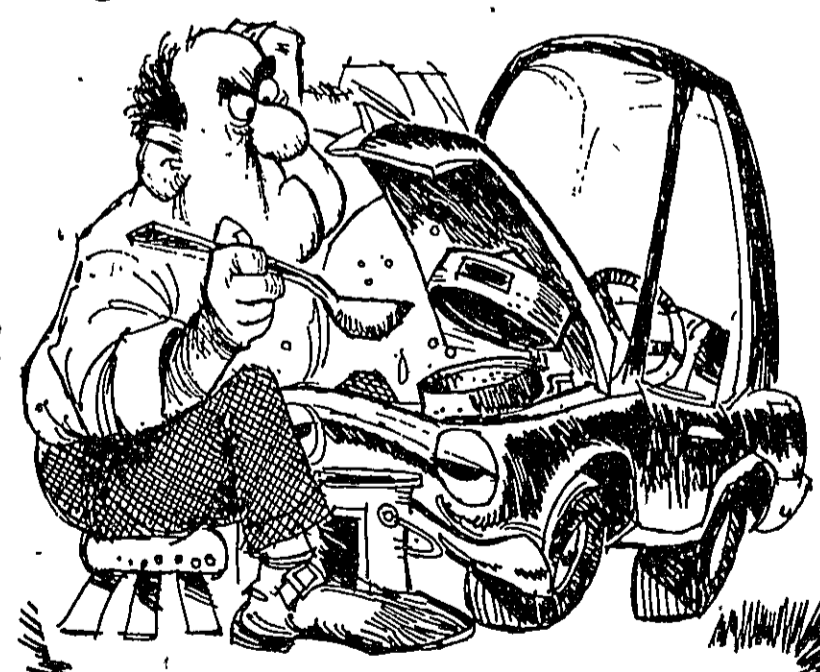

Folks do a lot of hand work as

hobbies or extra income on the side. I purchased a picture made by hand out of the stem of the straw into nice art.

Who would have patience in this country and, oh, over there, there are no litter bugs, and lots of flowers in the beautiful hills.

The country is the size of our Michigan.

**St Johns Morning
Musical meets**

Mrs Richard Jacoby presided over the Nov 15th meeting of St Johns Morning Musicales at the home of Mrs Raymond Torpey.
The background on the lives and works of Franz Schubert and Robert Schumann was given by Mrs Harold Lundy. Emphasis was placed on the romantic period and how these composers related to it. In this period artists no longer felt bound to the impersonal and rigid forms of composition. Instead, in poetry and painting as well as music, it became the fad for artists of all sorts to "wear their heart on their sleeve," and to cultivate exaggerated emotions. A much greater variety of style was used by the Romantic composers.
Franz Schubert stood first as a composer of songs in the early 19th Century and is to this day considered the greatest of all song composers.
To illustrate Schubert's remarkable song-writing gift, Hark, Hark, the Lark was sung by Mrs Roland Duguay and The Secret was sung by Mrs Clifford Lambert.
Robert Schumann, another Romantic, ideally combined his impulsive temperament with his musical nature to explore new sounds and expressions. He attempted nearly all forms of music, including symphonies, opera and oratorios, piano compositions and vocal solos with unusual piano accompaniment.
A piano solo played by Martha Lundy and the vocal solo, I Will Not Grieve sung by Nola Lambert revealed the psychological and spiritual imagination in Schumann's compositions.
At a previous meeting of the music club, the program notes were presented by Mrs Peter DeCamp on the composers

Johann Strauss and Felix Mendelssohn.
Two arias from the oratorio, St Paul and two selections as flute solos from Elijah were performed by Mrs Robert Rice and Mrs Jack Stenberg respectively showing the extraordinary talent of Mendelssohn as a composer.
Short selections from the many waltzes written by Johann Strauss were played by Diantha Witteveen.

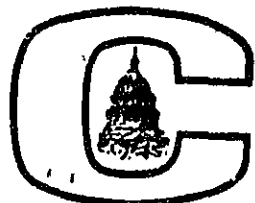

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TO THE GAS CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY

NOTICE OF HEARING ON GAS CURTAILMENT PROGRAM

On October 26, 1973, Consumers Power Company filed an application with the Michigan Public Service Commission in Case No. U-4453, which requests authority to adopt as part of its rate schedule a new Rule 15 relating to curtailments of gas service. Consumers Power Company states in its application that there exists in the State of Michigan and elsewhere throughout the United States a severe gas supply shortage, which shortage has made it necessary that many pipeline suppliers of natural gas, including Applicant's pipeline suppliers, substantially curtail deliveries of natural gas to their customers. Consumers Power Company also states in its application that greater curtailments of gas deliveries from its pipeline suppliers are expected in 1974 than those currently in effect, and that prudent operating practices make desirable the establishment of procedures whereby gas service to its customers may be curtailed in the event it is necessary to do so in order to maintain a balance between gas requirements and gas supply. Consumers Power Company further states in its application that it does not presently anticipate that it will be necessary to initiate curtailments under proposed Rule 15 in the near future, but that it cannot predict when a worsening in its gas supply situation and/or an unanticipated increase in demand may make necessary the initiation of such curtailments. As set forth in proposed Rule 15, Consumers Power Company proposes to establish six curtailment categories, as follows:

1. All commercial and industrial gas requirements for boiler use in excess of 8,334 Mcf per monthly billing period of customers served under the provisions of Rate "E" other than those requirements falling within Curtailment Category 6. Twenty-four months from the date of the order approving this curtailment procedure, this curtailment category will be consolidated with Curtailment Category 2.
2. All commercial and industrial gas requirements for boiler use in excess of 8,334 Mcf per monthly billing period other than those requirements falling within Curtailment Categories 1 and 6.
3. All industrial gas requirements other than those requirements falling within Curtailment Categories 1, 2, 4, 5 and 6.
4. All commercial gas requirements other than those requirements falling within Curtailment Categories 1, 2, 5 and 6; and all industrial gas requirements for plant protection needs or process needs in excess of 1,250 Mcf per monthly billing period.
5. All commercial and industrial gas requirements of 1,250 Mcf or less per monthly billing period other than those requirements falling within Curtailment Category 6.
6. Residential gas requirements and requirements for services essential for public health and safety; provided, however, that requirements for boilers which have alternate fuel capability shall not qualify as requirements for services essential for public health and safety without the express authorization of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

Consumers Power Company proposes to implement curtailments within the foregoing curtailment categories when necessary in the Company's opinion to balance gas requirements with gas supply, after giving effect to interruptions permitted by the Company's rate schedules. Curtailments could be simultaneously instituted in more than one curtailment category, provided, that no curtailment would be made of gas usage falling within any curtailment category during any period in which the gas usage falling within all lower-numbered curtailment categories had not been completely curtailed. Curtailments of less than 100 percent of the gas usage falling within a curtailment

category would be made pro rata, based upon the customer's historical gas usage falling within the category being curtailed. Any gas usage by a customer in excess of volumes authorized to be used would be subject to excess usage charges of up to \$15.00 per Mcf and would constitute sufficient cause for Consumers Power Company to discontinue gas service to the customer. The application of Consumers Power Company in Case No. U-4453 sets forth in more complete detail the manner in which the proposed curtailment procedure is to operate. The application, together with proposed Rule 15, is available for public inspection at the offices of the Michigan Public Service Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, and at each local office of Consumers Power Company.

The Commission has scheduled public hearing on the application in Case No. U-4453 and has ordered that notice be given that:

A. A public hearing be held from 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and from 6:30 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. on December 13, 1973 in the Auditorium of the Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for the purpose of taking statements from the interested public concerning Applicant's proposed gas curtailment program.

B. Any interested parties may attend the hearing and participate, subject to the provisions of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure. Any party seeking to intervene in this proceeding, notwithstanding Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, shall file with the Commission, on or before December 13, 1973, an original and 6 copies of the petition to intervene, together with proof of service upon Consumers Power Company.

C. A prehearing conference will be held at 9:30 a.m. on December 14, 1973 in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for the purpose of exploring and, if possible, agreeing upon matters which will expedite the proceedings in Case No. U-4453 and including the following:

1. Determining the parties to the proceeding, the nature of their appearance and the positions they are taking in the proceeding.
2. Simplifying and defining the issues.
3. Establishing procedures for the hearing.
4. Specifying a further schedule of dates of hearing.
5. Expediting any other matters that may aid in the orderly conduct of the hearing and the disposition of the proceedings.

Summershine's candles will soon be among featured items exhibited at buyers' shows and plans call soon for national distribution.

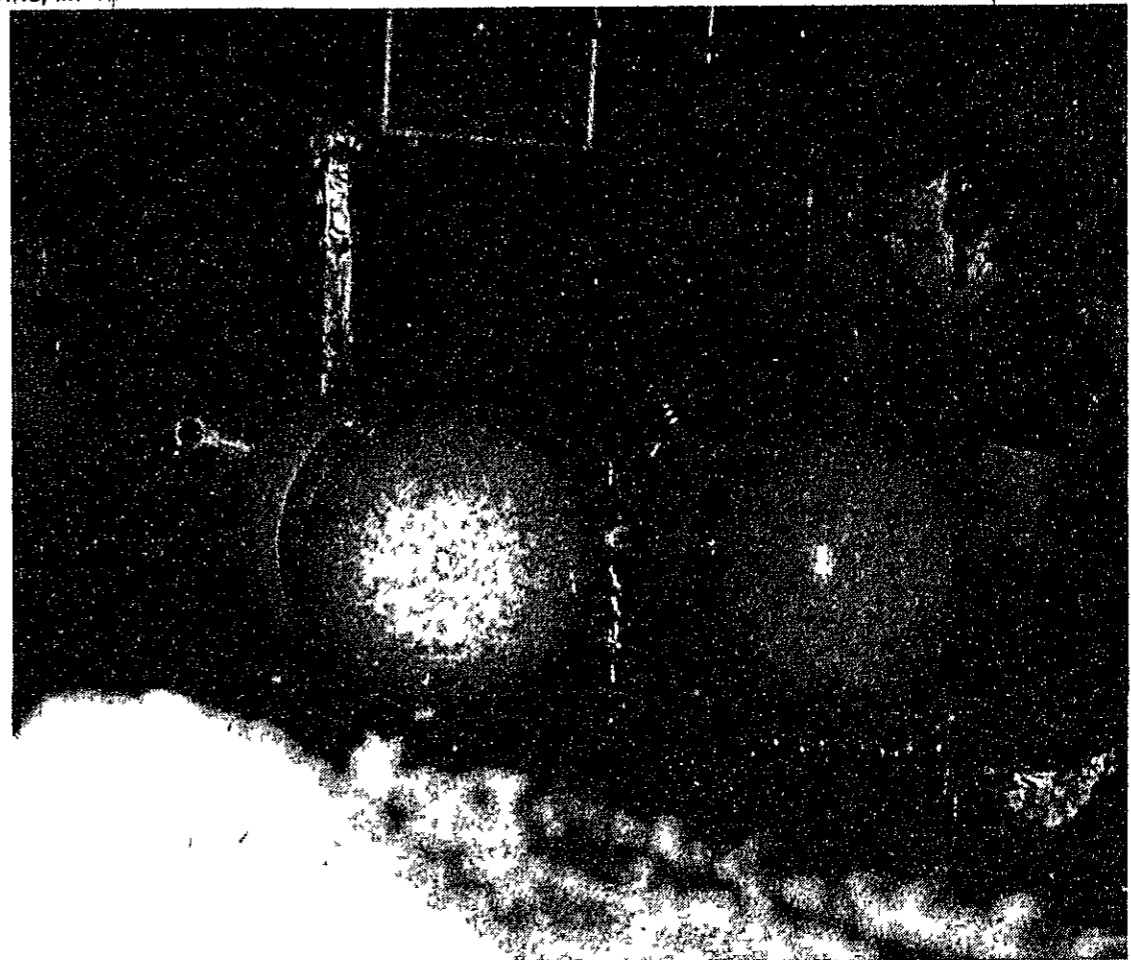
USING ABOUT 20-30 tons a week annually, the firm currently services about 200 accounts.

The company currently employs 2 full-time and 2 part-time employees.

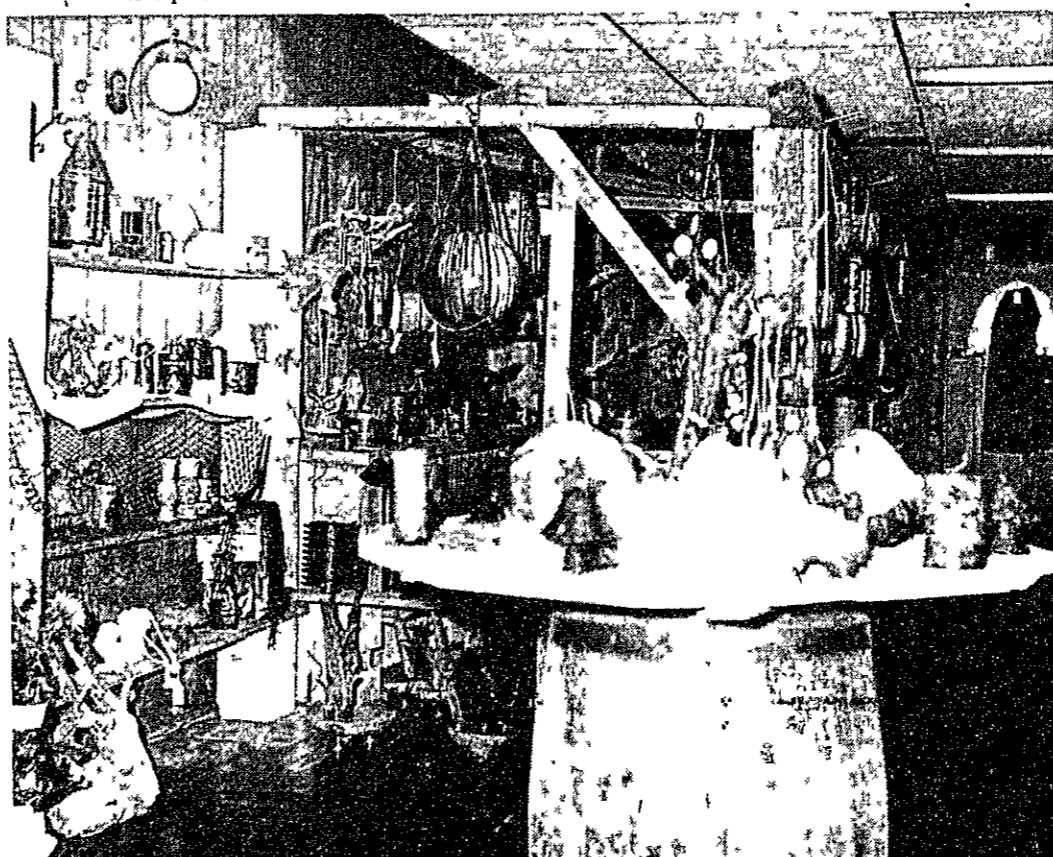

Trout and Salmon Regulations - Great Lakes and Connecting Waters

The Natural Resources Commission, under authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, and Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, orders that for a period of five years effective January 1, 1974, no person shall catch or attempt to take any species of trout or salmon from any waters of the Great Lakes or connecting waters or the Leland River or Lake Charleyoix and its connection with Lake Michigan except with hook and line and in accordance with the size and daily limits prescribed below or as may otherwise be provided by law.

Species - all species of trout and salmon; open season - may be taken at any time; size limit - 10 inches; daily limit - five singly or combined, but no more than 3 lake trout from Lake Michigan, Lake Charleyoix, and its outlet or the Leland River. Approved August 10, 1973.

"If It Fitz . . . 3 cheers for elation"

Having written a particularly potent paragraph, I picked up my typewriter and joyfully smashed it to the floor. Then I threw both arms toward the ceiling and jumped up and down on my desk. You would have thought I'd scored a touchdown.

WHY NOT? You've seen the football heroes. When Joe Widend scores a TD, he winds up and throws the ball into the ground as hard as he can. This is called spiking the ball. Sometimes, a well-spiked ball bounces out of the stadium. This has prompted team owners to insist that taxpayers build them new stadiums with domes, so as to eliminate the loss of balls.

I CAN'T go along with this. It has been proven that nets are an effective way to save footballs. Many teams have hung nets behind their goal posts. My purpose was to point out the value of demonstrated elation—such as in spiking a football—and to suggest that the idea might be useful in fields other than gridirons. When a man finishes a job well done, he should be allowed the liberty of showing his satisfaction, even to the point of making an ass of himself. A sigh of exhaustion may be enough for some men, but it is really a putrid thing compared to screaming and jumping out of your underwear.

I CAN SEE it now . . . The doctor leaps onto the operating table and spikes his forceps into a neat incision, thus etching the sign of the Blue Cross on an abdomen. The lawyer completes a successful pole-vault through a transom and celebrates by joyfully filling the air with 6 million \$100 bills donated to the Committee to Reelect the President by the Mexican Association of Laundromat Operators. The newspaper columnist, having married a source close to the White House, makes the occasion noteworthy by going over Niagara Falls in a barrel full of unimpeachable sources, veteran observers and close friends of Julie Nixon Eisenhower.

View from the Senate

It's almost time for Michigan's elderly citizens (65 years and older) to start preparing to take advantage of part of the tax reduction that was voted for them by the Legislature early this year.

In fact, in many instances, it will not be necessary to wait until next year to file for their property tax refund. This can be done as soon as the person knows how much his or her property tax and "household income" will be for this year. "Household income" is all income received by the claimant and spouse, including Social Security, retirement benefits, disability payments, as well as any public assistance given in cash, pensions and annuities, and workman's compensation.

Under the new law, the amount of relief a senior citizen will receive on his "homestead" — the place of his actual residence — will be based on a sliding scale. If the household income is less than \$3,000, the state will refund all of the property tax. If between \$3,000 and \$4,000, all property tax over 1 percent will be refunded; if from \$4,000 to \$5,000, the rebate will be all taxes paid in excess of 2 percent; between \$5,000 and \$6,000, the rebate is based on 3 percent of income; and, if more than \$6,000 property tax, in excess of 3.5 percent is rebated.

As an example, a person with total household income of \$5,400 would be able to deduct \$162, or 3 percent, and subtract that from the property tax paid.

Renters may consider 17 percent of their annual rent paid as property taxes and figure their refund the same way. The maximum credit or rebate for either taxes or rent is \$500.

Property tax relief will be received as a credit against state income tax liability. If the

property tax relief exceeds the income tax liability, the claimant will receive a refund just as income tax refunds now are received.

THOSE WHO do not have to file an income tax can apply for their property tax relief directly on a simple short form (MI-1040CR) to be provided by the State Treasury Department. The forms are also available through such places as banks, post offices, city halls and branch offices of the various state departments. Township supervisors and city assessors also will have the forms, and help in filling them out.

By filling out the refund forms early, persons may receive their rebates in time to use it to help pay their tax bill. To insure this, it is best to apply for rebates in December.

For this year only, senior citizens will get double relief because they will still be entitled to their homestead tax exemption, which will be repealed next year.

The tax relief law passed this year also provides for an income tax deduction by in-

creasing the exemption of senior citizens from \$2,400 to \$4,000, but this will not apply on income earned this year.

TO CORRECT a situation under which owners of about 10,000 homes valued at less than \$2,500 would have to pay taxes next year, the Legislature is expected to take action to make it unnecessary for them to pay property taxes if their income is less than \$3,000.

Sturgeon Size Limit Increase

The Natural Resources Commission, under authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, orders that for a period of five years effective January 1, 1974, no sturgeon may be taken or possessed from the waters of this state of a length less than 50 inches. Approved August 10, 1973.

GREAT LAKES SPEARING REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, under authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, hereby orders that for a period of five years effective January 1, 1974, on the Great Lakes and connecting waters, it is unlawful with spear or bow and arrow to take (a) walleye, sauger, Atlantic salmon, coho salmon, chinook salmon, pink salmon, or splake; (b) perch except on Lake St. Clair during January and February; (c) northern pike except during January and February; (d) muskellunge except during January and February on Lakes Superior, Michigan, Huron, and the St. Marys River; (e) sturgeon except during February. Approved August 10, 1973.

Bulb gardening indoors

Forcing is the procedure for bringing bulbs to early bloom indoors. It is started in the fall when all bulbs must be planted to begin root development. Many major bulbs - including tulips, hyacinths and daffodils; and many minor bulbs such as muscari and scilla will grow successfully indoors, say Michigan State University horticulturists.

Crocus and hyacinths will bloom indoors as early as late December and January; tulips and daffodils will follow a short time later. Hyacinths, perhaps the easiest bulb flower to force, can provide the fragrance of spring indoors this winter.

Bulbs for force-blooming must be large, firm, clean and free from scars. Avoid "bargain" bulbs.

Containers must be at least twice the depth of the bulb to provide adequate space for root systems to develop and should have drainage holes in the bottom. Metal, ceramic, wood, plastic or clay pots will all give excellent results. When using new clay pots, soak them in water for 24 hours before planting.

Light soil is the key to successful forcing. If the soil can be compacted in a tight ball, it is not appropriate. A combination of garden soil, peat, and sand is

desirable, if a commercial potting soil is used, add peat and sand. Do not use fertilizers - the bulb contains its own food supply for the first season of growth.

Place a few pieces of broken clay pots or flat stones over the drainage hole to prevent clogging. Next fill the pot with enough soil so the tip of the bulb reaches the top edge of the container when placed on top. Place the bulb on top of the soil - do not press it into the soil. Pushing the bulb can damage its base and hinder root growth. Pour the remaining soil around the bulb, leaving the tips visible. Water thoroughly.

Place as many bulbs as will fit in the pot without touching each other or the sides of the pot. Plant tulips with their flat side facing the edge of the container. This side will produce the first board leaf and form a symmetrical border around the pot.

Place the pots in cold storage, 40-50 degrees F., for at least 14 weeks. During this period, bulbs will develop an extensive root system. The pots must be covered or kept in complete darkness and watered regularly.

If indoor cold storage is unavailable, dig an outdoor rooting bed in a shady part of

the garden. The bed should be one inch deeper than the height of the tallest container. Spread a layer of sand or pebbles on the bottom of the bed to assist drainage. Set the pots and over them with two inches of sand, vermiculite or shredded styrofoam. Then cover the area with a three to six inch layer of soil.

Dig a trench around the bed to allow excess water to run off and to provide access to the bed when it is time to lift out the pots. Water regularly until freezing weather arrives. Mulch to prevent deep frost damage.

After 14 weeks, check for adequate root and stem growth. Stems should be two to three inches tall and roots should be visible through the drainage hole or circling the inside of the pot. If growth is insufficient, continue cold storage for another week or two.

Transfer the pots that have developed roots and shoots to a cool bright room where the temperature is between 50 - 60 degrees F. Water regularly, keeping the soil moist at all times.

Flower buds will appear a few weeks after bringing the pots inside. At this stage the pots are ready to bloom and can be placed anywhere in the home. Keep away from direct heat or drafts and water regularly.

Forced bulbs prefer cool temperatures - 60 to 65 degrees F. If possible, move pots to a cooler location during the night.
