ST. JOHNS-The theater department of St. Johns High School will open its 1980-81 season with a production of the thriller, "Count Dracula." The show will be open to the public Nov. 21 and 22 at 7:30 p.m. Tickets for the show will be available at the door for \$1.

St. Johns Co-op out of red

ST. JOHNS-St. Johns Co-op manager Bill Campbell gets a gratifying feeling when he comes to work these November mornings and sees long lines of farmers waiting to unload corn.

His feeling is two fold. It means Clinton County farmers are having a good year and it also means that their faith in the 60 year old cooperative has helped pull it out of the bleak financial situation it was in a little over a year ago.

Campbell said crops in this area are "as good or better than they've been in quite a few years. Corn and soybeans have been excellent." He emphasized that farmer support for the cooperative has been "tremendous" and brought about a turn in their financial situation and given stability to the organization.

In September, 1979 the elevator had no cash to pay farmers for incoming soybean and corn crops and was \$400,000 in the red. Inflation had taken its toll on the 700 member cooperative, as it had many other such organizations across Michigan.

Last year's harvest was taken in by issuing farmers bonded non-negotiable warehouse receipts for all grain commodities for storage and grain bank, leaving the ownership in the farmer's hands until he elected to sell.

Campbell said a stockholder advisory committee is now actively involved at the Co-op working on the cooperative philosophy of getting as many people involved as possible. The advisory committee offers input into the organization and acts as an avenue back to area farmers. "The committee has been helpful in establishing policy and members oversee the monthly grain inventory," Campbell explained.

He said losses have been stabilized at the cooperative and

the business is showing a good profit through the first quarter of this financial year. That profit he credits to the volume of grain that has gone through the elevator this fall. "We're past the stages where they could shut the door on us," he emphasized.

Campbell said the Co-op has established a tighter control over grain movements and organized a better utilization of staff members, two big factors from a financial standpoint. "We need tight controls in this business," he related, calling the elevator industry a large volume, low profit margin business.

Since the first of July, one and a half million bushels of grain have gone through the elevator, 400,000 wheat, 400,000 soybeans and the rest corn. Monday, an estimated 20,000 bushels of corn were stockpiled on the ground waiting for drying. Campbell said the corn is coming in with about 23 to 24 percent moisture and the elevator is drying it down to 15 and a half percent. Corn is coming into the St. Johns elevator from as far away as Carson City and the Eagle area he said. Shipment out is mainly to the New England poultry industry.

Another success for the elevator this fall, mainly through the efforts of the Valley Marketing Co-operative, was the sale of edible beans to Mexican markets. Twenty-two cars of edible beans have gone out since the middle of September accounting for 27,000 bags of pinto and black turtle beans.

Valley Co-operative is a marketing organization formed by the St. Johns Co-op and five other co-operatives in the state.

"The colored bean market has been very good for Clinton County," said Campbell. It has increased net profits for farmers over other low profit crops." He indicated that it has also helped spread out the farmer's work load as beans are normally harvested early. Weather has played havoc with the harvest this year, however, making it "tougher to get them off the fields," but Campbell said yields were good.

Federal charges dropped against Bath Twp's former supervisor

BATH TWP.-Federal charges against Bath Township Supervisor Thomas Woodruff in connection with his alleged involvement with a nation-wide car theft ring were dropped Friday in Grand Rapids during a pre-trial conference. The reasoning behind the dismissal of charges was that "dead men can't talk."

Woodruff said Saturday in a telephone interview that he had no indication this kind of decision was going to be made. "I am pleased that the charges against me have been dropped," he said. "I am happy to be cleared."

The charges were dropped against Woodruff because the key witness in the case Michael Arend of Holt had unexpectedly died in August. The indictments were handed down in June naming Woodruff on four counts of a 46-count federal indictment. Approximately 30 people from several other states were also named in these indictments.

Woodruff however, is not as happy as he would like to be at this point. He lost his bid for supervisor just 12 days prior to this decision.

"I definitely feel this had a lot of bearing on my losing the election," he commented. "There was no reason for the people not to re-elect me except for this."

Not much is being said by either Woodruff or his attorney James Theophilis regarding the case because other local people will be standing trial beginning Nov. 24 in Grand Rapids.

Woodruff is the owner of Woody's Auto Sales in Bath. From the very beginning the 42-year-old businessman pleaded his innocence.

According to Woodruff on Sept. 18 his attorney brought up a request for dismissal which was almost two months before the November election. However, although the motion had been filed by the attorney the request was not heard until last Friday.

"I don't have any plans yet on what I'm going to do," he said. "I have a leave of absence from Olds Forge, so I could go back there. I guess it all hasn't really sunk in yet."

Woodruff indicated a complete statement would be made by himself and his attorney following the trails of the other persons involved.

SPEAKING TO LIONS

Economist paints bleak picture

ST. JOHNS-Economists from Michigan State University and the State House of Representatives painted a dismal pic-

ture for the state of Michigan over the next several years, speaking at the Lions Club's Professional Night last week.

Affirming that Michigan is in the "worse state of economy since the Depression," Warren Gregory, staff economist with the State House of Representatives, said we are "not necessarily on the way out" and that there is "going to be a period of 'Wow', before we get out of this."

If we look several years ahead, there is a bright note, according to Gregory. "It (the economy) will come back," he said as the auto industry builds "better products" and "learns to compete." He also emphasized that the nation as a whole will recover faster than the state of Michigan. In the nation there will be a modest recovery over the next year, but only because "it can't go any lower," he said.

Michigan, of course, is hurting because of its heavy reliance on the automobile industry. Michigan has fared worse than any other state, Gregory emphasized.

"We were caught without a product," he said, "and we don't have a product again this year. It will take at least five years before the industry has recovered and can meet the demand," he said.

Car sales were down 29.3 percent this last year, an unprecedented downfall. "Sales dried up and the market went away," he outlined.

The outlook for 1981, according to Gregory, is a third year of declining income. "Inflation will continue at double digit figures," he said.

The biggest culprit of all, has been the price increases in essential items. While overall, price increases have averaged 14.8 percent in the last five years, what hurt the most was that some items, such as fuels, went up 62.8 percent. "That's the biggest problem," he insisted, "increases in essential items have done the most damage."

With the consumer spending so much more for food and essential items, he has not been able to go out and buy discretionary items. "Many people also used up their savings and increased their debt," Gregory said, "striving to maintain their living style."

The state of Michigan's economy can, of course, be seen in the state budget problems, Gregory also indicated.

"The budget has declined over one billion dollars, or 20 percent in a year," said Gregory. "Sales tax revenues are declining every single month." He added, "Withholding tax collections have declined an unprecedented amount."

Gregory also outlined that while unemployment in Michigan is not at its highest percentage at 11.9 percent (it was 13.7 percent in 1958 and 12.5 percent in 1975), there are more people out of work this year than ever before.

Are we going to get some relief? "No," Gregory answered. "Inflation will continue at 11 to 12 percent and basically in the essential areas. Food costs are expected to go up 15 to 18 percent in the next two months, topping significant increases of 15 percent in the past three months."

Ovid-Elsie and Bath face millage questions

CLINTON COUNTY - Both the Ovid-Elsie and Bath School districts will be seeking millage approvals from voters on Monday, Nov. 24. Ovid-Elsie is seeking three mills to help alleviate a financial crisis created after an audit revealed a \$300,000 deficit. For the fourth time this year Bath is asking for operating millage plus additional mills in separate proposals to reinstate programs which have been recently cut due to lack of money.

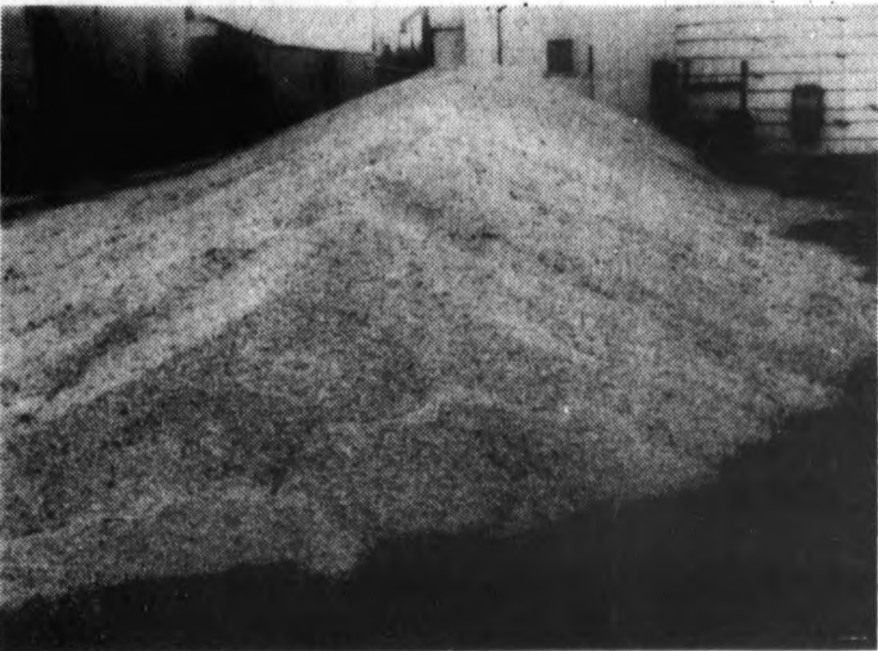
Ovid-Elsie has already made cuts totalling \$209,845 this year. The three mills would enable the district to balance the budget for this school year. In addition, the O-E School district is also struggling to repay a \$948,379 bank loan it defaulted on Aug. 31. Ovid-Elsie has not had a significant

millage increase in several years. Since 1975, extra operating millage has been raised 1.25 mills.

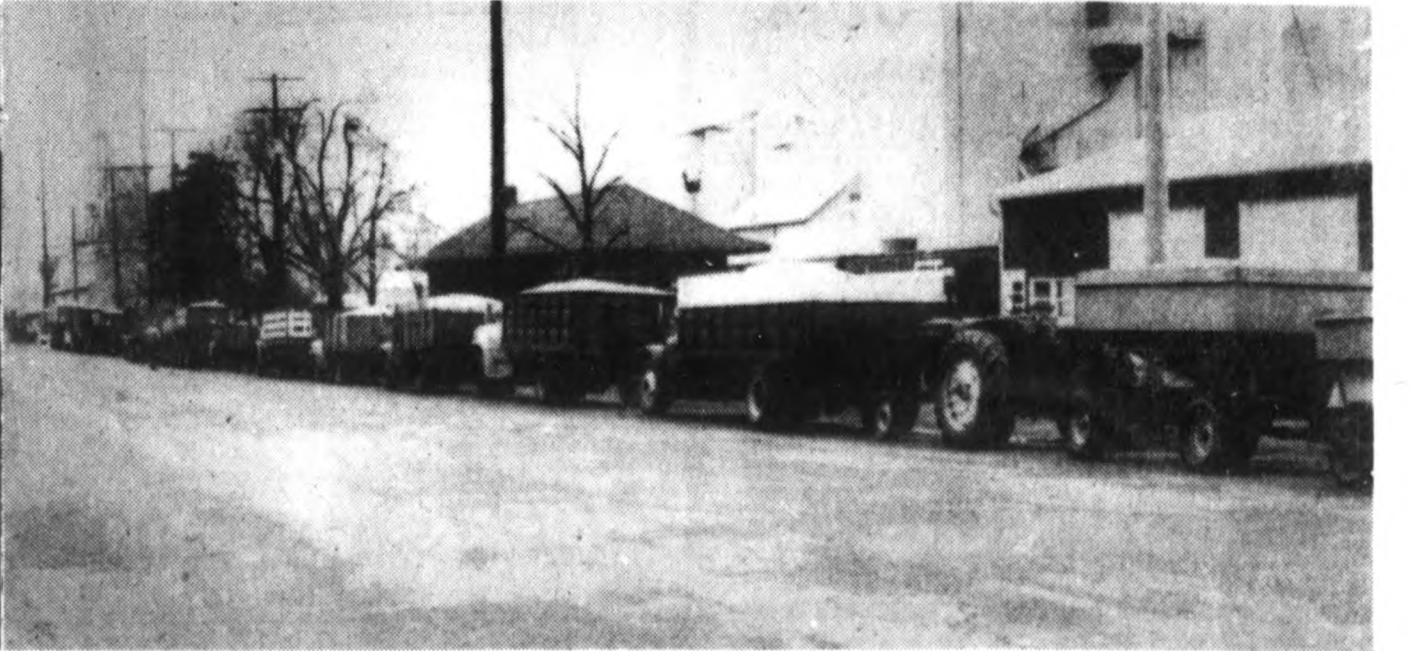
Bath on the other hand has cut out all extra curricular activities, in addition to cutting out elementary counselors, librarians, and the talented and gifted programs.

For Bath voters, Proposal A means okaying 20.68 mills to operate the schools. However, even if this passes, more cuts are in store for the Bath Schools.

Proposals B and C ask for two and one mills respectively. The passage of these proposals would mean the reinstatement of several programs and activities which were previously cut from the elementary, middle and high school curricula.

elevator. Corn is coming into the St. Johns elevator from as far away as Carson City and the Eagle area. St. Johns corn goes mainly to the New England poultry industry.

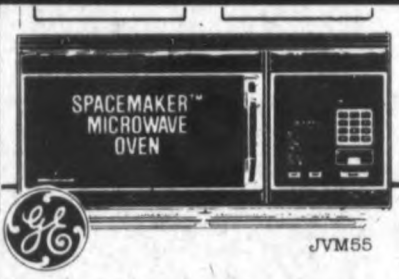

2 hurt in crash

SJ Board of Education accepts planning grant for Central School

ST. JOHNS—The Board of Education looked at two grants at its regular monthly meeting last week, approving one for a matching \$30,000 for survey and planning purposes in the renovation of Central school and tabling a Federal Equipment matching grant for \$91,500, for the vocational agriculture program.

While the board seems unable to make a definite statement about the fate of Central School, they voted five to one to accept the \$30,000 survey and planning grant from the federal Historic Preservation Grant program to be used to hire an architect to draw up plans for renovating the building. Board member Neil Barnhart voted against submitting the application for the grant. Paul Maples was absent.

Administrative assistant Gordon Vandemark told the board he strongly recommended accepting the grant for the architectural plans. "We can use it ourselves if necessary," he said, stating that the school has been "patched" since 1947. Bob Craig, board member, encouraged the approval saying he was for renovation of the nearly 100 year old school which he believes can be done for about \$800,000 as opposed to two million dollars for a new structure. "No doubt, but we're going to need that school," Board President Ron Huard said.

Principal Bill Swears and Ken Lashaway approached the

board with plans on matching part of a \$91,500 Federal Equipment Grant for the Vocational Agriculture programs but were turned down mainly because of their class proposal. Lashaway told the board he could use money already in his vocational budget to purchase some production equipment to be used for a land lab on 15 acres south of the high school. Also proposed was the purchase of some agricultural mechanics equipment. Leonard Puetz, board member, said the class proposal was not "in tune" to today's agricultural youngster. Lashaway's proposal would have allowed the purchase of used equipment including a tractor, disc, no-till 4-row, oil saver, drag and cultipacker to set up a hands-on lab type program. Puetz said the small scale operation would not be "realistic" to today's farming methods.

Swears said they would come back to the board with another proposal. The grant monies are only available this year.

In other action the board:

Tabled an administrative request to purchase a 16 cubic foot trash collector for \$4,500 and a surplus truck to put it on for \$50, asking for more documentation. Gordon Vandemark made the request telling the board that garbage pick-up, especially for the hot lunch program, was very expensive. "We are concerned with the increase cost of trash pick-up," Superintendent Donald Burns said. Savings would come in having custodial help operate the trash pick-up taking it to the transfer station once a week.

Citizens to look at school finances

ST. JOHNS—The Board of Education has approved the formation of an citizens advisory finance committee to study the school district's financial situation and offer advice.

Superintendent Donald Burns said each elementary Parent-Teacher Organization would choose a person and he and the president of the Board of Education would each appoint three committee members, making sure that the community as a whole was represented. The high school and junior high principals will also be able to appoint a member.

He suggested they look at people perceived and recognized as leaders in the community who would be interested in the committee's charge. He mentioned groups such as Farm Bureau, American Agriculture and local businesses.

The committee's charge will be to determine what resources and revenue the school is going to need the next few years and looking at the 1978 recommendations made by a citizen's committee in 1978 recommending elementary art and physical education.

Burns told the board that more people want to have an input into the decisions of the board of education. "This comes from a concern for rising costs," he indicated, saying that he believed that even though people are not able to support a millage, they were proud of what the board and staff has been doing to meet the needs of students.

Part of the financial concerns facing St. Johns is the depletion of the fund equity which is being used up this year to balance the budget.

Committee appointments will be made by the end of December with reports expected back to the board by the end of February.

Board member Leonard Puetz recommended that a public hearing be held to hear the committee's report.

Answering service in St. Johns

ST. JOHNS—An answering service that will provide round the clock, seven days a week service is being set up in the St. Johns area by Keith Fisher who also has plans to expand into DeWitt and Bath if the venture is successful.

Housed in the former Republican Headquarters in back of the Land of Oz store, Fisher's new business, The

St. Johns Telephone Answering Service, will have the capability to also serve DeWitt, Bath, Laingsburg and portions of Lansing. The service will provide seven day a week, 24 hour per day service to doctors, repairmen, business and residences.

Fisher, a DeWitt resident, owns the 11 year old Action Answering Service in Grand Rapids and is a member of the National Association of

Telephone Answering Exchanges.

According to his news release, there are over 2,400 such exchanges throughout the United States.

The service is expected to be open around December 15. Fisher said he will also expand to Ovid and Elsie if requests warrant it, namely two or more customers on an exchange or one client willing to pay a slightly higher fee.

The answering service will also provide other services such as desk and office rental, order taking, appointment scheduling, alarm monitoring, R.S.V.P. services, reservations, check-ins and notary service.

A special physician and surgeon exchange will be located in the same building but will operate as a separate division, catering to all medical, dental and

veterinarian professions. Persons wishing to enroll in the service can do so on a full time, business day only, or vacation or after hour basis. Discounts are offered to high volume users and those with two or more lines answered with the company.

More information can be obtained by contacting Fisher at 224-4300 or 669-3913. Fisher said his service will be hiring several local people.

Catholic School enrollment down

Clinton County's Catholic Elementary Schools join the rest of the area schools in declining enrollment figures, according to a report from the Diocese of Lansing.

The loss is attributed to the declining birth rate, but Father Robert Marine, Assistant Superintendent of Schools in the 10 county Diocese indicated that the decline is less than the public schools are experiencing.

Figures for the schools in this area show Fowler, Holy Trinity down to 206 students from 217 a year ago; St. Johns, St. Joseph School, down to 246 students from 251 a year ago and St. Mary in Westphalia showing a drop from 310 to 288.

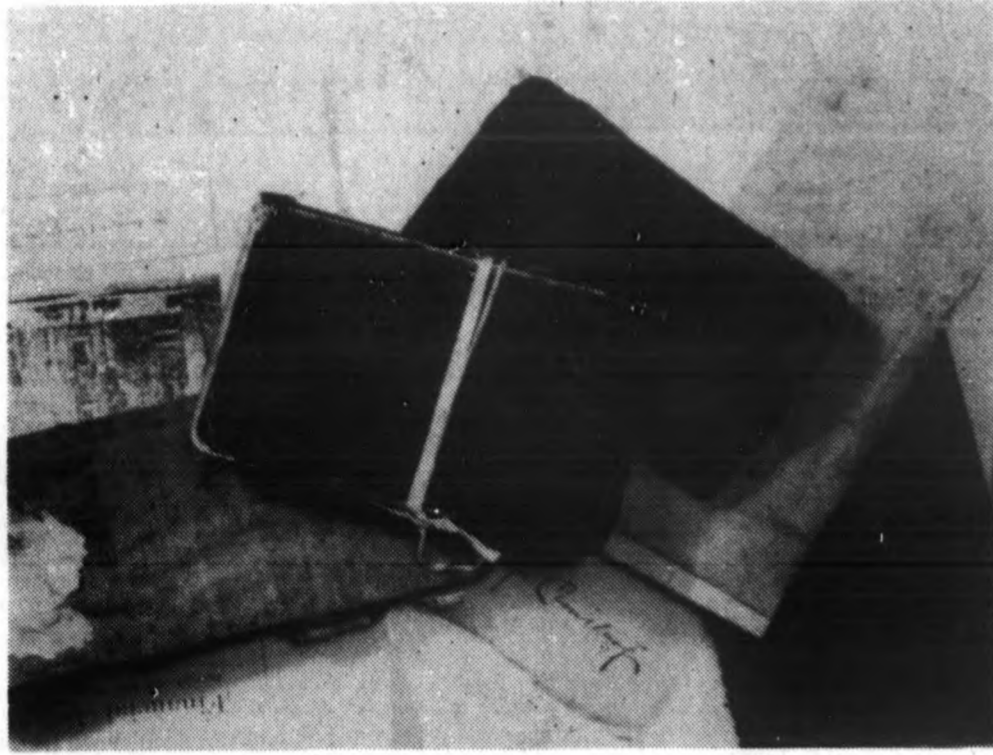

Historical Society studies old records

CLINTON CO. - The old records that people have stashed away in some far corner of the house or barn have become the target of a new project sponsored by the Genealogists of the Clinton County Historical Society.

At the next regular meeting of the Historical Society the genealogists will host a program about forgotten vital records. The meeting will be held in the basement of Capitol Savings and Loan in downtown St. Johns at 7:30 p.m. Thurs., Nov. 20.

The genealogists are interested in locating any old school, church, grange, family or minister's records. In short they are looking for any documents that contain the names of Clinton Co. pioneers.

Arlynn Gantz, president of the Genealogists, stresses the importance of these old records.

"Sometimes there is little to be learned about certain families," says Gantz. "This is what makes those old ledgers and records which are now gathering dust in the attic so important."

While the Historical Society does accept old documents for safe-keeping, the Genealogists are not asking that the records be donated, according to Gantz.

Rather they want to know where the documents are located in case someone wants to learn more about their family history at a future date.

In talking with Clinton County residents over the past few months, Gantz says that he is amazed at what people are dragging out of their attics. One man even had a diary of a day-by-day account of his ancestors' move to Greenbush Twp. from Ohio during the mid-1850's.

SENIOR CITIZEN UPDATE

I had great response from the kitchen hints I gave you before and several people said they had tried one or two. So, here are a few more:

Storing and Saving-To prevent scratches on your china plates, insert paper plates or napkins between plates as you stack them.

To preserve a news clipping, dissolve a milk of magnesia tablet in a quart of club soda overnight. Pour into a pan large enough to accommodate the flattened clipping. Soak it for up to one hour, remove carefully and pat dry. Do not move until completely dry.

When postage stamps are stuck together, place them in the freezer. They will usually come apart and the glue will still be usable.

Coffee tip-Before adding ground coffee to the percolator, drop a thimble or a small bottle cap over the center tube in the top, this prevents the coffee from spilling into the water.

Bathroom hints-Rub ordinary car wax onto your ceramic bathroom tiling to clean and refinish. Let it stand 10 minutes and buff or polish.

Use a typewriter eraser to clean spaces between bathroom tiles.

To prevent mildew, before hanging shower curtains, soak them in a salt water solution.

To remove mildew on shower curtains, wash in hot soapy water, rub with lemon juice, and let dry in the sun.

To clean mineral deposits from a clogged metal shower head, boil it with half a cup of white vinegar and one quart of water for awhile.

Soak a plastic shower head in hot vinegar and water mixture to unclog it.

To clean bathroom fixtures, dip a cloth in kerosene or rubing alcohol to remove scum and spots.

Miscellaneous-Club soda will give formica a shiny finish.

Glass tabletops can be cleaned with lemon juice and dry with paper towels or newspapers.

Small scratches can be removed from glass tabletops with toothpaste.

A good eyeglass cleaner is a drop of vinegar on each lens. It

will clean without streaks.
Soak dull or dark silver jewelry in a mixture of 1/2 cup of white vinegar and 2 tablespoons of baking soda. Then rub with a towel.

Keep costume jewelry from tarnishing by putting a piece of white chalk in your jewelry box.

If your shoes squeak, try applying linseed oil to the soles.

When painting, dip a popsicle stick into the paint. Later it will make a handy color guide to match colors when you shop.

When you are painting windows, soap the windows along side the trim. The paint won't stick to soaped areas of the glass.

Small paint splatters on windows can be removed by applying nail polish remover to them and wiping off.

When painting doors, coat the locks, hinges, knobs, etc. with petroleum jelly to prevent scraping later.

Store paint containers upside down with the lids tightly fitted to prevent skin from forming on the surface.

Soak brushes containing hardened paint in hot vinegar. Then wash in warm, sudsy water.

I took these tips from a book I ordered from a card company. I have not tried them myself, so try them at your own risk.

In talking with Roy Ellsworth a few days ago, he indicated that there is some concern as to how your project is progressing. I would like to bring you up to date on what has taken place and what will happen in the next several months.

Our staff has just completed the technical review of your Financial Feasibility Report, Feasibility Study and Preliminary Architectural Report. We have prepared our project summary, analysis of fund usage and a letter of conditions for loan obligation. These documents and your materials have been sent along with our recommendations to our National Office in Washington, D.C. We need their concurrence and approval in order to make a formal obligation of funds for your project. It generally takes three weeks for their reply.

We do not anticipate any major questions with your proposal. Assuming the proposal is approved by Washington, we

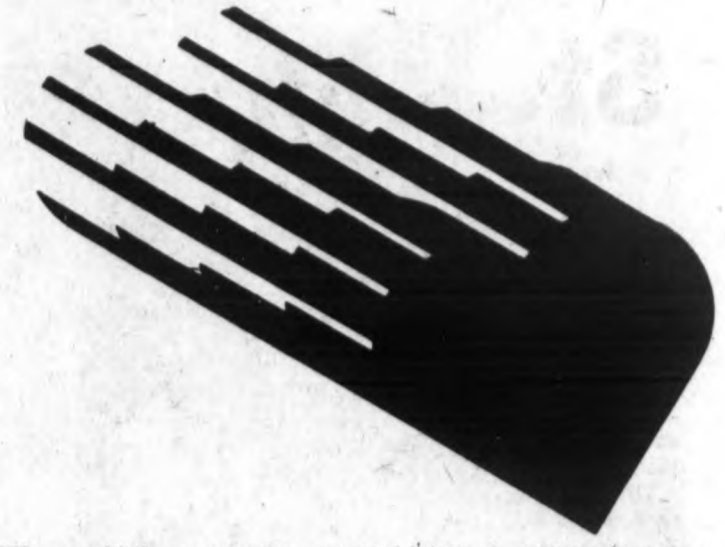
would then proceed to set up a letter of conditions meeting with you to make the formal offer and set aside funds in the amount of \$2,500,000 for your project. I would anticipate this date to be sometime near the end of November.

I understand this may cause delays for the architect in preparing final drawings and bidding of the project before your Certificate of Need expires. While Farmers Home Administration (FHA) does not encourage applicants to proceed with this more costly part of the project, it by no means would prohibit your authorizing your architect to do so under your agreement with them. You must understand that the Clinton Care Center is responsible for any cost incurred and that FHA cannot guarantee funding of the project until the actual obligation is secured and all loan closing conditions have been met. The letter of conditions will spell out all the requirements that are to be met. Once these have been completed, bids taken and closing instructions issued, a closing would take place, a contract would be signed with the contractor and construction would commence.

I hope this gives you a general idea of what lies ahead of us. We will notify you as soon as we receive word from Washington.

There's more on dried flower arrangements, camping, holiday decorations and keeping your pet healthy.

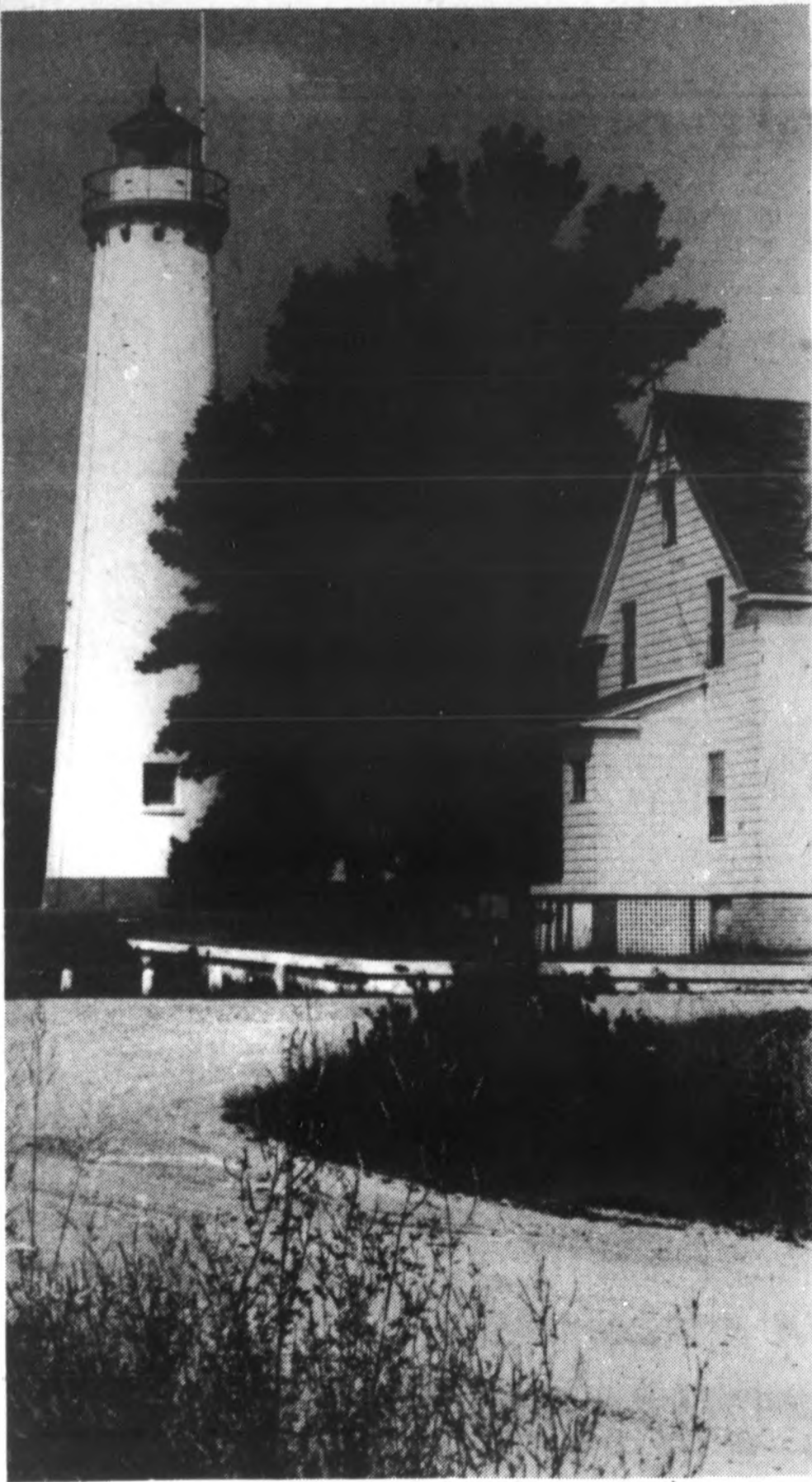

Personality Profile

St. Johns veterinarian announces retirement

After returning from a six-month long tour of Europe, St. Johns veterinarian Dr. Nelson Howe and his wife, Margaret, have reluctantly decided to retire.

"It took a lot of debating whether we should retire or what," said Dr. Howe.

"There doesn't seem to be any half-way," Mrs. Howe continued. "We finally concluded that we would just have to quit completely. We have people coming from all over this part of the state, and I've never felt right about saying that we're not taking on any new patients."

There were many factors to be taken into consideration, they say. If they had tried to continue on a part-time basis, the pet hospital would have to have been kept open and heated. Daily records also would have been a problem because of Mrs. Howe's failing eyesight.

Now their 18 hour-a-day, seven-days-a-week service to the animal owners of the community has come to an end.

After graduating from the school of veterinary medicine at Michigan State in 1935, Doc spent two years testing cattle in Texas and working for the government.

In 1937 when the Howes decided to go into private practice, they set up their first home and office combination at 300 N. Lansing. In the garage behind the house they set up just six cages.

The practice they had bought from Dr. Gohn was confined exclusively to large animals.

"It was mainly a horse practice in those days," Doc recalled.

The concept of providing medical care for pets was just coming into vogue.

"The first day while we were putting the shingle out, a young lady came along and asked if we would do dogs," Mrs. Howe said. "We said 'Yes' so she went home and brought her dog right over."

In 1939 a realtor friend suggested that they might want to look over the old Perrin-Palmer-Walling home on N. Clinton Ave. At that time it had been vacant for 18 months.

"I told them we wouldn't be interested in anything so large," said Doc. "I did have a friend in Lansing who was looking for a studio, so we went to look at it for him."

For all we know the friend may still be in need of a studio because the Howes fell in love with the old Italianate house.

"I shoveled 26 tons of coal that first winter," Doc recalled.

"Our daughter Doris was a year old and just at the stage where she wanted to be on the floor," added Mrs. Howe. "I kept leggings on her all of the time because it was so cold in here."

With an architect and interior decorators to guide them, the Howes have since accomplished a complete structural restoration of the house. Finish work which remains to be done on the exterior has been postponed because of the increase in taxes such improvements would cause.

"We just decided to fix it up inside the way it should be," he explained. "We really enjoy our home."

The Howes' son, Nelson, is now an artist in New York City, but it is their younger child, Doris' birth which received the most local notice at the time.

About that same time Doc had acquired a new hunting dog. The setter had found a pheasant which his master had managed to capture alive. Doc had proudly presented himself and the bird at the office of the Republican News. What he had forgotten until after he left the office was the fact that he had been sent to the newspaper to place the birth announcement.

"There you've got it," wrote editor Schuyler Marshall. "That's what a bird dog or a race horse will do to an otherwise perfectly respectful and indulgent parent. When a man starts going nutty about some fine animal, he forgets everything... even the fact that his wife has presented him with a beautiful baby girl a few days before."

For a while Mrs. Howe had trouble seeing the humor in the incident, but now the story has become a favorite family memory.

"I was so mad," she recalled, "that I tore up the article. Now I wish I had a copy to show Doris."

In August, 1942 Dr. Howe entered the army as a 1st Lieutenant. While they were stationed in Colorado, he worked at inspecting food supplies and even gained recognition for a victory garden he set up on the post.

"They picked me to run the garden, I guess, because I was the only one with a farm background who had the time," he recalled.

Following the war, the Howes returned to St. Johns to resume their practice.

"We've always catered to whatever came along," said Mrs. Howe. "We've taken care of gerbils and white mice. In the spring the children usually bring in a few baby rabbits and birds that have fallen out of their nests."

The Howes especially remember the monkey that Dr. Wohlers used to board with them occasionally.

"At first we thought it would be fun to have it in the waiting room where people could see it, but it gave off such a terrible odor that we had to move it," she began.

The monkey finally ended up staying in the basement of the clinic.

One day after Doc had been working around the monkey, he was called away suddenly to look after a cow.

"I must have still had the scent of the monkey on my clothes," he said, "because that cow just about went crazy. I'm sure she would have killed me if she could have gotten to me. It was the wild animal scent that did it to her."

Their recent six months vacation has given Dr. and Mrs. Howe a lot of new things to think about.

They joined a travel group in Chicago and flew to Germany where they picked up a new Volkswagen camper. After spending a short time with their group, they set off on their own to explore Europe and the British Isles.

Language was often a problem for them. Mrs. Howe had majored in French and minored in German at the University of Michigan. Doc still had the Latin he learned in veterinary school to fall back on. Still they had some interesting adventures.

"We have had an agreement through the years," Doc began. "I was to do the grocery shopping while Mother stayed home to take care of the phone and the door. So I did all of the shopping on our trip."

Often Doc had to guess what packages contained, and sometimes he didn't guess right. One time he bought a yellow plastic bottle with a picture of fruit on it.

"He opened it cautiously and said, 'I don't think this is orange juice,'" she laughed. "It turned out to be some kind of olive oil."

"We came back thoroughly convinced that we should be teaching at least two foreign languages in all of our schools," he said.

Now that they are home their plans for the future are indefinite. Doc seems glad to be home, but Margaret says she is ready to go traveling again.

"We've been happy with our career," Dr. Howe concluded. "We were lucky to be doing what we liked to do."

French road farm given historical Centennial Farm designation

The farm belonging to Howard R. and Lois Hess at 6815 French Rd. has recently been designated a Centennial Farm by the Division of Michigan History. This means that the land has been in the continuous possession of the same family for 100 years or more.

In 1880 Peter Hess and his

wife Mary came to Clinton Co. from Pultney, New York and purchased 80 acres in section 21 of Duplain Twp. from Alton O. and Nellie L. McEuen.

On the land was an old cheese factory. They converted this into a house by adding a wing with two

bedrooms and a kitchen. In the 1930's the upright portion of the house was raised to make room for more bedrooms upstairs.

"We used to sleep in there before it was fixed up," recalls Howard Hess, the grandson of the original owner. "In the winter we'd wake up with snow on top of

the quilts."

Hess still has many items around the farm that belonged to his father, John Jacob Hess, and his grandfather, Peter.

A few years ago he found a metal stencil in the old goose house out back. It carries the words "Peter Hess Pultney, N.Y." Such stencils were used by farmers to label grain bags, according to Hess.

Other evidence of an earlier settlement has come to light around the farm. In addition to the cheese factory, a chair factory and sawmill once stood on the site. The foundation of the chair factory can still be seen under the present granary. All of the businesses were moved down the road to the Colony before the Hess family settled on the land.

"There used to be a log cabin across the road," said Hess. "My grandfather didn't want any close neighbors so he bought a few acres over there too."

In the past Hess has farmed and was in the lumber business, but he has since retired.

Hess pointed to several stately trees in front of the house.

"My dad set out these maples when he was nine years old," he said. "We've got one oak tree down on the river bank behind the house that measures 15 feet around."

Hess is now interested in the reforestation of the farm, he says.

Mrs. Hess says that they have contacted Consumer's Power for their Centennial Farm marker. Now they are waiting for another batch of the large metal signs to be printed so that they can display it proudly in their front yard, in front of the old cheese factory that Peter Hess turned into a family home.

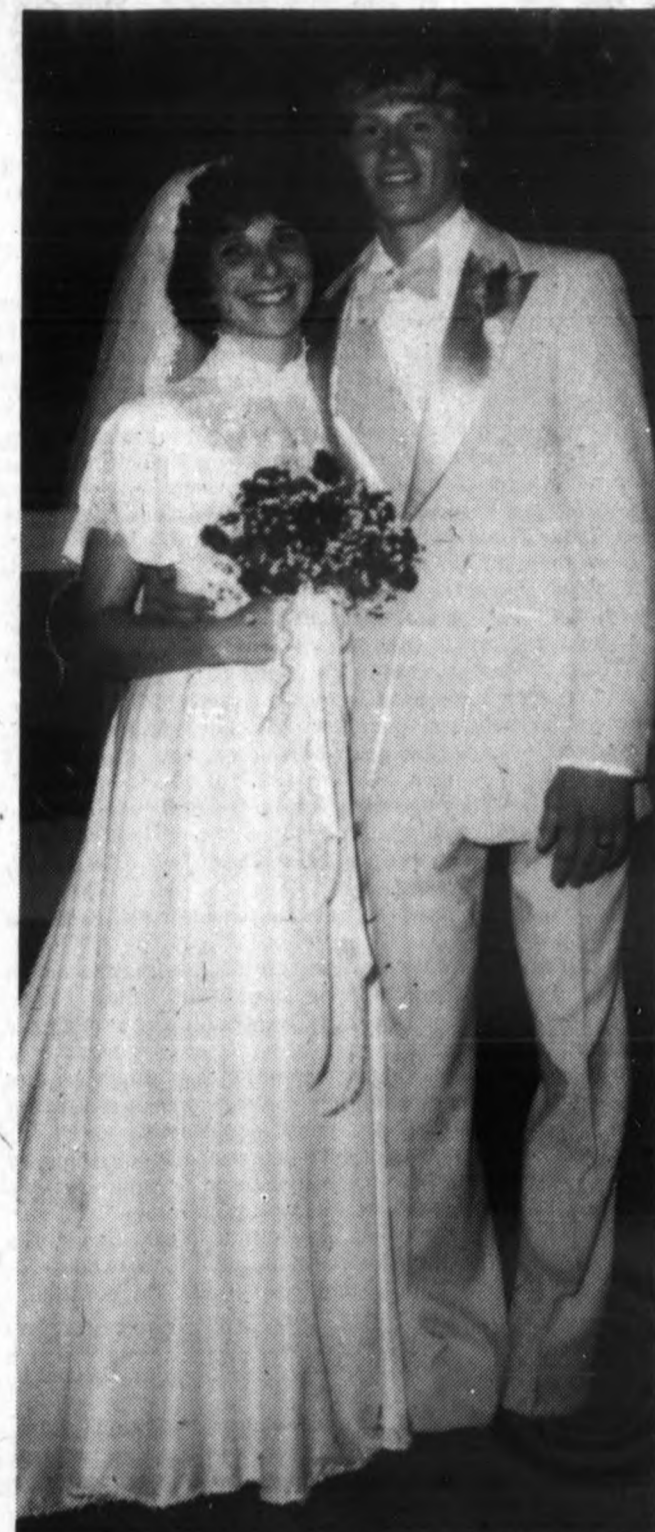

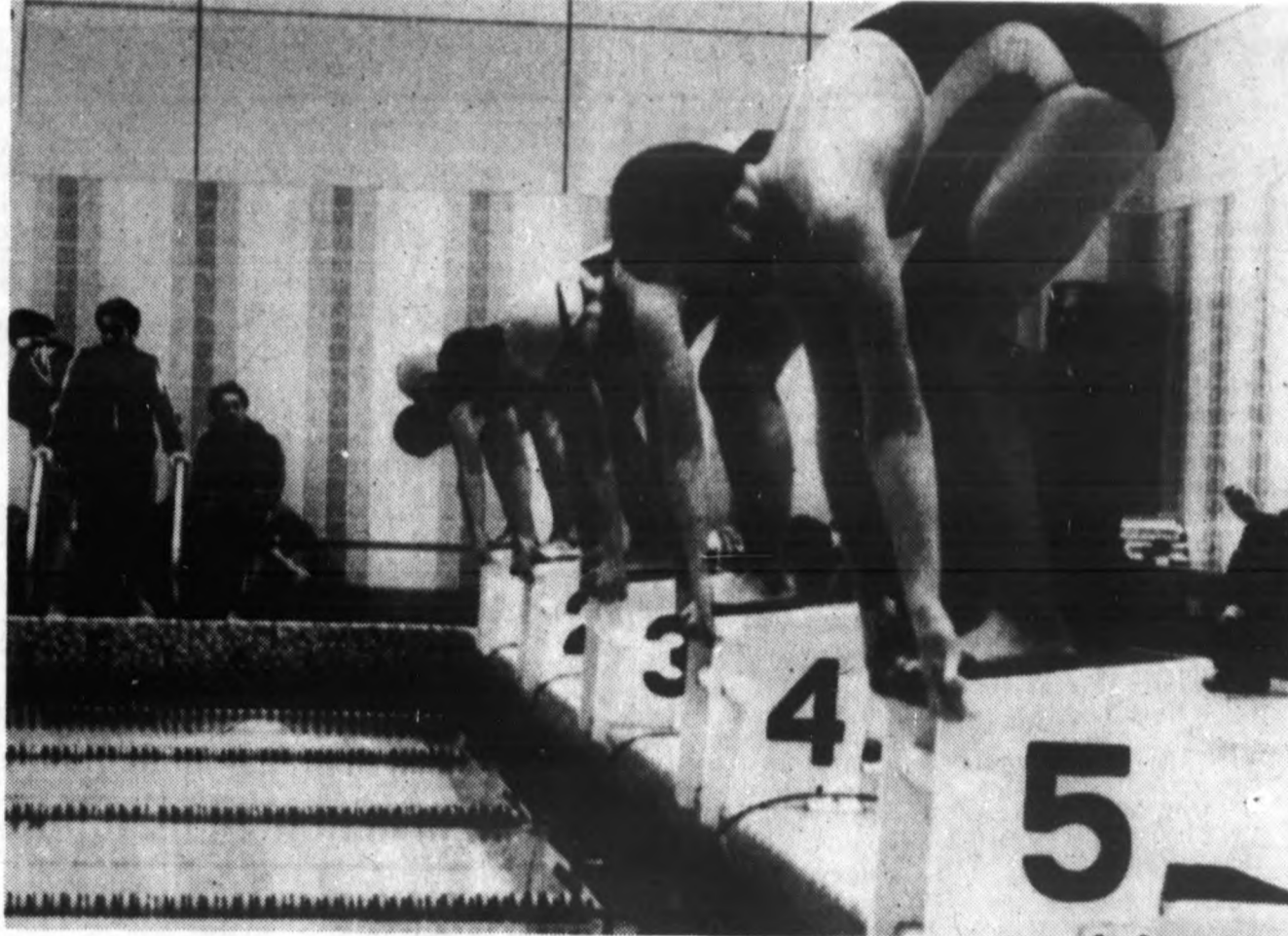
Every Redwing player got into the scoring column. Lori Kus was tops with 16 points, followed by Kim Kloeckner

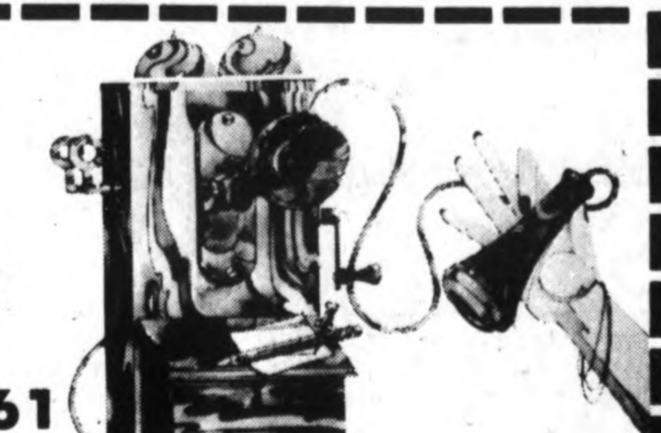

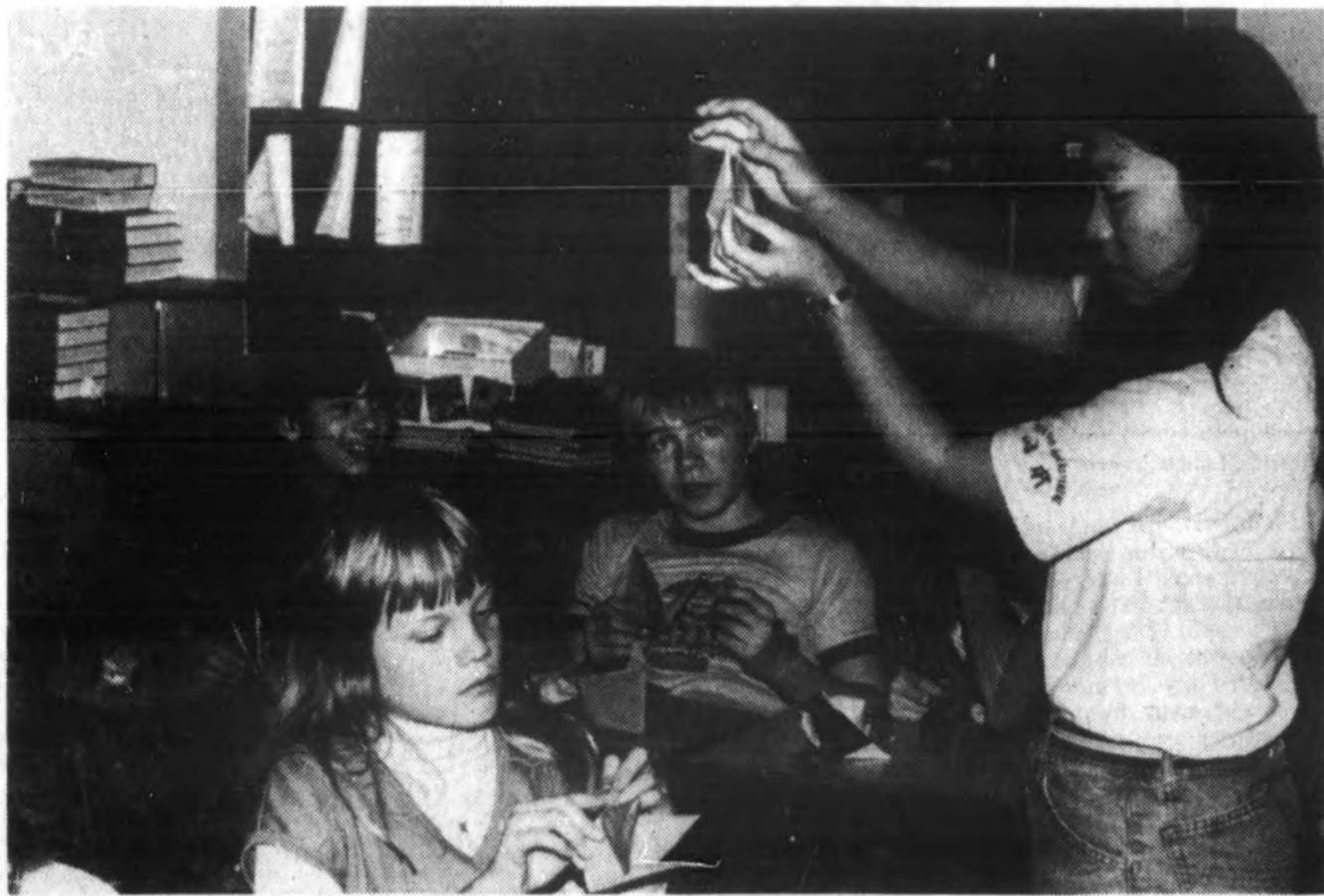

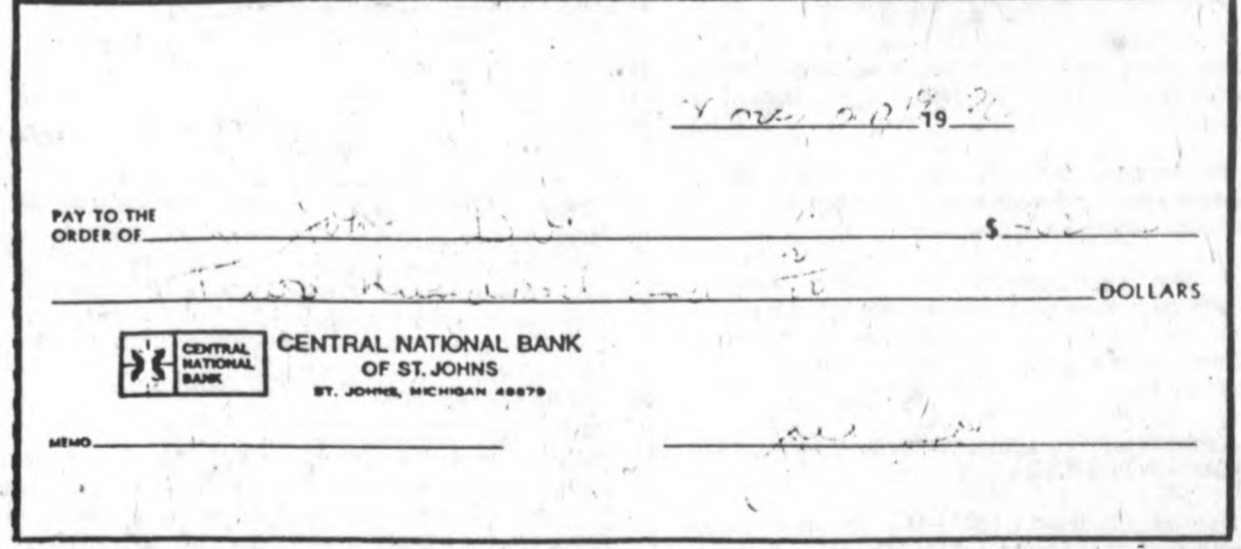
