Clinton mayors serve around the clock

What's it like being a small town mayor?

For Lynn Thayer, DeWitt's mayor, it was easier for him to express his ideas. For St. John's mayor John Arehart, becoming mayor was just a "natural progression."

Thayer was elected mayor last year after serving as a councilman for two years.

"As a councilman I felt frustrated because I had ideas and they seemed to be going nowhere," said Thayer.

Although Arehart likes being a mayor, he says it's not much different than being a city commissioner, because of St. Johns weak mayor-strong manager form of government.

When Lynn became mayor the Thayer household went through a lot of changes.

"My policy has always been to 'call me' if you have a problem," he said. "And they do, all the time. But I'm not complaining."

When Thayer took over the job, he wanted to be involved in everything and know what was happening with regards to all aspects of the city. That meant a lot of hours and attending a lot of meetings.

"Whether I'm involved on every decision in the city is irrelevant," said Thayer. "But I have to know all the issues."

He added, "People hear rumors and it's better to know what's happening in advance, rather than having to find out later."

Thayer noted that being mayor of the city would be the perfect job if he was retired.

"When you're working fulltime, you do have to have an understanding employer, because it does take away from the job," he said.

While Thayer has only recently taken the reins of leadership in DeWitt, Arehart has been mayor of St. Johns since 1977. He became involved with city government in the summer of 1973.

"I really don't have a lot of power as mayor," Arehart said. "I preside over meetings, sign documents and represent the city at functions."

The most controversial issue Arehart has dealt with during his tenure was the removal of city manager Roger VanDyke. That's when he got the barrage of phone calls which really disrupted his family's life. But "it all goes along with the job," he said.

He added, "It hasn't been that bad over the years."

According to Arehart the big job for the 1980's in city government will be to continue to provide the same level of services to residents for the same amount of money.

Thayer's short term goal of office is to keep the city running smoothly which involves minor things like solving employee disputes. His overall goal is to devise a program for maintaining streets, improving the downtown area and keeping DeWitt as a bedroom community.

"The best we can do is direct the growth of the city," he said.

Thayer found out in short order that being mayor is a 24-hour a day job.

"It's a lot easier for people to collar me in the hardware store, rather than go to a meeting," he said. "I just wish I could make people understand I don't have all the answers."

As Arehart enters his second term as mayor, he has a few projects he would like to see completed.

First, he hopes the fire department will be moved into the new public safety building on State Street which will

Fowler's looking good

The village of Fowler is in good financial shape according to its president Carl Koenigsknecht.

Looking at 1981 in retrospect, Koenigsknecht, called bridge replacement and putting in a back-up generator at the sewer pumping station, the two major projects of the year.

Fowler replaced two single lane bridges on Clinton and Third Streets for a total cost of \$20,000. This is the last of several bridge replacements made in recent years.

"We replaced the bridges to eliminate the safety problem we thought we had with pedestrians, bikers and automobiles using them," said Koenigsknecht.

The generator at the sewer pumping station cost the village approximately \$7,000. The generator was bought to eliminate a problem with sewer backing up in homes when the village lost electricity.

"We didn't have a lot of construction in the village because of the economy," he said.

The village also spent \$25,000 in contracted street repair, which mainly consisted of resurfacing several streets. This was in addition to the regular maintenance done by village crews.

A storm sewer study was completed by village engineers, Fishback, Thompson, Carr and Huber, the village president reported, a move taken in effort to eliminate sewage back-ups and flooding.

"The study established priorities, and how to best spend our money to correct the flooding and runoff problem," said Koenigsknecht.

He noted the village

council was also in contact with Harry Harden, Clinton County Drain Commissioner and officials from Dallas, Lebanon and Essex Townships to discuss mutual cooperation in cleaning two drains, the Waltz-Sturgis and Fowler Extension Number 2, which are located just north of town.

The major problems lie, according to Koenigsknecht, with an outlet north of the community and with two culverts under the railroad tracks which are not sized properly.

"We've had a lot of problems with people's basements flooding and

Hot lunch program continues to aggravate board

Last month Fowler School's hot lunch program was in the red. This month it showed almost a \$2,000 profit.

"This is impossible," said School Board Vice-President Clare Feldpausch. "How can they show a profit, when they served 100 less meals last month."

At their November meeting, the Fowler School Board decided to terminate the services of Canteen Food Services of Grand Rapids, an outside cafeteria firm which has been handling the hot lunch program since the beginning of the school year. The board also had decided to "hold off" on any more payments to the firm because of an additional \$750 fee for administrative services tacked onto the \$650 monthly bill.

"I can see where this report could be inaccurate," said Gary Jackson, superintendent at last week's December meeting. Jackson told the board he could not verify the validity of the report.

"I think they are just playing around with figures," said Treasurer John Rademacher. "I still don't think we should pay them."

The board also discussed problems which have cropped up in the last month concerning the food service company. One day, according to the superintendent, they ran out of food in the high school. Board members also complained that according to the superintendent's records, the food supervisor from Canteen Services, who shares her time with the Fulton School District,

was only in the school 12 hours one month. An additional complaint centered around the company changing its menus without telling anyone.

"The cooks just walked in here one day and everything was changed," said Mary Ann Chartrand, elementary school principal.

The board voted once again not to pay Canteen Services until a representative of their company is present at a meeting to explain what is going on with the cafeteria program.

Bill Armbrustmacher made a request to the board to have a fifth and sixth grade basketball program one night a week to teach basic skills.

"Right now there is no program for the fifth and sixth graders," said Armbrustmacher. "We have a chance to play against St. Johns and Pewamo-Westphalia, but can't."

Ms. Chartrand explained there has always been a fifth and sixth grade program on Saturday mornings beginning in March for both boys and girls.

"There is always a problem with the gym being available," she said.

Jim Andros, high school principal also noted that presently there is more emphasis on the seventh and eighth grade programs.

"In fact, we are trying to get more time for the seventh and eighth graders," he said.

The board decided to leave the decision up to the administration on whether to start the fifth and sixth

grade program in January.

Responding to a recommendation by Andros, a hearing was set for Jan. 4 to determine if two high school students should be placed on long term suspension. According to the principal, the administration can only suspend a student for 10 school days. Any suspension longer than 10 days must be authorized by the board.

The students have the option of having a closed hearing.

Adoptive families needed in Clinton County

Twenty years ago the future looked bleak for a boy like Michael. Having been permanently separated from his family, he would have likely faced a life of continual movement between institutional settings and foster families.

Today it's different. Children like Michael have realistic hopes for finding permanent homes and avoiding the emotional trauma that can so easily scar a young mind.

Luckily for Michael, adoption has come a long way in just the past two decades.

Michael is not a made-up boy. He's a real eight-year-old youngster who lives on the outskirts of Lansing and was recently removed from his family because of a long history of physical and emotional neglect.

"Michael has dark brown hair, blue eyes and is an active and appealing child," his fact sheet reads. "When he was two years of age, he suffered third degree burns on the nape of his neck, his back and buttocks. He has had several skin grafting procedures.

"Michael is in an emotionally impaired classroom. In

the past he was considered a behavior problem. During the current school year, however, he is doing very well and responds to his teacher. He is considered to have a learning disability and has perceptual problems."

His worker, Karen McGaugh of Family of Family and Children Services, wants to find Michael an adoptive home.

McGaugh, who provides adoption services to Clinton and Ingham counties, and other social workers in Michigan are becoming more and more adept at placing older and handicapped children (frequently referred to as hard-to-place children) as well as large sibling groups with permanent families.

Adoption workers used to place only healthy infants, believing that families were not interested in the harder-to-place child. They were wrong. Recent experience has indicated that just about any child can be adopted.

"We are able to place a great many of the children that are available for adoption," said Don Haviland, an adoption administrator in the Department of Social Services' central office in Lansing. "Unless the children are multiple handicapped or part of a large sibling group, they are moving toward placement. This year alone we will have placed almost 1000 children in adoptive homes."

While many couples still line up at adoption agencies and wait many years for a healthy baby, a growing number of families are showing an interest in the hard-to-place youngster.

What is their motivation?

"It's hard to say exactly what motivates these families," says Arlene Atwater, an Ingham County DSS adoption worker who services Clinton County. "Each family is different. I do know, however, that where an adoption works, the family has an abundance of love. Where a family wants to save a child, it often doesn't work."

McGaugh agrees that it takes a loving family to accept an older or handicapped child. She also thinks it takes a lot of hard work.

"I've had adoptive families say to me that they never knew it was so difficult to be a parent," she says. "There's a lot of testing and acting out going on during the first few months of a placement. It's not always easy. But a lot of our families think it's worth it."

New adoptive families don't have to handle all the problems alone. There are counseling services as well as medical and financial subsidies that are available for most of the families adopting a hard-to-place child.

Before being approved for adoption a family submits a comprehensive written application and provides the agency with character references. Interviews are conducted to identify the family's strengths and weaknesses and to determine what type of child might be most appropriate.

The application process of the 1980s is much less rigid than in past years.

"We used to be so particular that all we really did was screen people out of the adoption process," says DSS's Haviland, whose two decades in the social work field has given him a unique perspective of the rapidly changing world of adoption. "Today, instead of quickly eliminating applicants, we spend more time with them exploring the concepts and realities of parenting. Little attention is currently being paid to financial status, religious affiliation and social class."

All Michigan adoptions must be approved by the probate court where the adoptive family resides. Thirty four adoptions were finalized in Clinton County during 1981, according to Clinton County Probate Court records.

Many adoptive professionals believe that some of the more rural counties have been largely untapped as far as recruiting adoption families. The three agencies that cover Clinton County — Catholic Social Services, Family and Child Services and Ingham County DSS — all are interested in expanding their recruitment efforts in Clinton County.

All three would like to find more families who could accept teenagers and physically or mentally handicapped children. There is also a need for racial minority families.

Michael and other hard-to-place Mid-Michigan children need permanent homes. Fortunately, they have workers like Karen McGaugh and Arlene Atwater who are convinced that those homes exist. Their job, as 1982 begins, is to find them.

The village president of 10 years noted there probably will be fewer dollars coming into the community from the state and federal governments.

"The Reagan administration is for com-

munities solving their own problems with their own funds," he said. "I tend to be a believer in that type of philosophy."

He was quick to note however, that Fowler had benefited from federal and state monies, especially with regards to their new water system which was partially funded with grant money.

Currently, Fowler has gotten back \$45,000 from the state via gas taxes, the

single business tax and other revenues. The village received about \$13,000 last year in federal revenue sharing monies.

"Those dollars are going to be getting harder to come by in the coming years," he added.

Because of the Headlee Amendment local taxes have gone down during the past four years, according to Koenigsknecht, but at the same time property taxes have gone up

because of county and state assessments.

"We are going to try to keep the current levy as low as possible," he said.

The millage rate was levied at 11 mills four years ago, but is down to about nine mills because of the Headlee Amendment.

Looking ahead, the president said Fowler residents will be looking forward to celebrating the village's 125th birthday in 1982.

also give city hall more room. Next the city will continue its search for a fresh water supply and thirdly he would like to see the land which was purchased for an industrial park become developed.

"A lot of cities our size have a much stronger industrial base than we do," said Arehart.

He noted the city is always faced with the need for more recreational facilities as people have more and more leisure time to spend.

Arehart says there are plans for a new ball diamond, skating rink and a bigger sliding hill for the children.

Thayer indicated projects move a lot slower than he likes, but he can't say he's really frustrated.

"But maybe that's for the best," he said. "When I got into it, I thought it would be nice to win half the battles. Now, I'd say I'm winning between 75 to 80 percent of the issues that are important to us all."

Thayer says he'll probably run one more time and then quit. Arehart who was recently re-elected to the city commission and voted mayor by his peers, says this is probably the last year.

"I've been on the commission for 12 years," he said. "I guess I should give someone else a chance."

The first time Arehart ran for office his family was very young and it really didn't matter to them. The second time his children had mixed feelings, but decided it would be alright for him to run again.

"This time I thought the kids would really oppose the idea, but they actually encouraged me to run," he said.

Thayer indicated that nothing can be accomplished without citizen committees.

"If anyone thinks a person can get rich being mayor, they are wrong," said Thayer. "Actually, I end up losing money, as do the other members of council."

Thayer's wife, Susan, says she likes to stay out of city business and keep a very low profile.

"I tell people I don't know what is going on and that's the truth," she said. "It's not up to me to answer people's questions."

Her husband quickly added that he won't let his wife get involved with any of the committees, because he wants to avoid nepotism.

"There are a lot of things Susan is good at but she'll have wait until I'm off the council," he said.

In conclusion, Thayer commented, "I wish I had an effective way to let people know I'm interested in what people have to say." He added, "You can fight city hall."

Businessman Syver Thingstad dies

Syver K. Thingstad, 75, of 4735 W. Grand River, Lansing, died Thursday, Dec. 24.

Mr. Thingstad had been an area resident since 1962, and was previously from Birmingham. He was a member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Lansing, a member of the Vestry, former senior warden and a member of the choir.

He graduated from Albion College and attended Eastman School of Music, Rochester, N.Y. and the Curtis Institute of Music at Philadelphia. He had been a soloist with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and several Detroit area churches.

Mr. Thingstad was a

member of the Lansing Chamber of Commerce; the Rotary Club of Lansing; the City Club of Lansing; Wacousta Lodge no. 359, F and AM; Lansing Lodge no. 196 BPOE; and other lodges and organizations.

He served on the Watertown Township board for eight years, and was elected township treasurer for his third term, and was a member of the township planning commission. He was also first president of the Lansing Metropolitan

Development Authority. He was a former member of the 3rd District Republican Committee and the Republican Executive Committee of Clinton County.

He developed and operated the Green Meadows Golf Course, now known as the Royal Scot course. He had been associated with General Motors Truck and Coach, the Material Handling Sales Corporation and MHS Parts and Service Corporation.

Change dominated County News in 1981

1981 has been a long year for the Clinton County News and her sister paper, the DeWitt-Bath Review. Changes started last January when we shrank to a tabloid size and continued through December when we moved our offices across the street.

Changing sizes was a jolt at first, not only for the broadsheet loving editor, but for some of our longtime readers. "What have you done to my newspaper?" one caller demanded.

However, enough of our readers liked "the little paper," which is the same size as the DeWitt-Bath Review, and they told us so. "It fits into my purse better," said one faithful customer who picked it up each week on her way to lunch.

We spent the early months of the year trying to get used to our new size and learning to write tighter and utilize our space better. Late in the spring another big change hit us as we introduced our Green Sheet shopper, a new advertising tool aimed at the merchant who is attracted to numbers and our papers changed to Thursday publications. At this time the DeWitt-Bath Review went to paid subscribers.

Newspaper people look down their noses at shoppers. Why would anyone want to put their valuable advertising dollar into spaces surrounded by hundreds of other ads? Didn't it better belong on a page with some prize winning photos and a story, feature or news, that would catch the reader's eye and hold it on that page? Wasn't it better to advertise in a publication that went invited (by paid circulation) into a home instead of dumped off at every house?

But it's numbers that are important, we learned from our advertisers (and those who advertised elsewhere). So we joined the shopper game and The Green Sheet was launched. It's a good plan and a good theory and in time it's going to work. Ironically, we have picked up quite a following to The Green Sheet. Now we have people looking forward to our free Monday publication as well as our Thursday community newspaper.

Our subscription rolls have swollen and we go to 5,750 homes with the Clinton County News and 2,450, with the DeWitt-Bath Review. We're proud of that countywide total and proud of the coverage we give. Reporters are at 13 meetings a month, covering the county, St. Johns, Bath and DeWitt extensively. We have also assigned a reporter to more regular coverage of Fowler school board meetings.

We've also had our share of staff changes in 1981. The

job shop part of our business was sold and printer Dick Miller moved out of our building, becoming part of an Ithaca-based business. His new Print Shop is located on Clinton Avenue. LeaAnn French, part-time secretary went with him.

In the newsroom, Photographer David Olds took over for Bob Stern in the spring and at the same time Nancy Zeimen filled a reporting position Jean Martin left. Nancy in turn, stepped into the shoes of DeWitt-Bath Review news editor in late August when Sue Kiley White went on maternity leave. David Thomas joined our staff as a general reporter and Kevin Boggs took over sports assignments from Tim Jeffery.

In November, Boggs and secretary-bookkeeper, Eileen Erickson were laid off, so now Thomas fills the sports job. Kiley White is back in a part-time reporter position.

The advertising department underwent a number of changes as Betsy Conklin took over for Rhonda Gaffney in the spring and Bill Stoller replaced her in June. Advertising for the DeWitt-Bath Review is presently filled by three people, Karen Barrett, Randy Marke and Ed Missavage who have taken over customers previously handled by Diane Jackson and then Millie Mitchell.

Earlier this month we moved from 120 E. Walker across the street to 117 E. Walker. While it was a wrench for some of us to leave that old building where a newspaper has been published since 1900. We like the fit of our new office. Basically we're a newsroom and advertising office now. Circulation, billing, production and printing are all taken care of in other Lansing Suburban Newspaper Network offices and plants.

Tax tips

Area accountant offers tax advice

(Editor's note: Terry Hall, certified public accountant with Biggs, Hall and Hausserman, P.C., St. Johns has agreed to writing a series of tax tips for our county readers. We hope this article and those to follow, in the coming months will be of help to our readers in their tax planning.)

Now is the time that many taxpayers begin to think about compiling their personal income tax information for the current year. Highlights from the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 may be of assistance. Also included are some tax planning opportunities.

Lowered Rates For All Individuals:

Effective Oct. 1, 1981, all income tax brackets were reduced by 5 percent. Additional 10 percent cuts take effect July 1, 1982 and July 1, 1983.

Planning considerations: Take itemized deductions by Dec. 31, 1981 and defer income, if possible, into 1982.

Some examples of itemized deductions for consideration: You could pay your winter property taxes by Dec. 31, 1981, as well as medical and dental bills. Many doctors and dentists will accept credit cards which will qualify as payment if the card is used by Dec. 31, 1981. If you pay your state income taxes on an estimated basis, you could pay your last installment for 1981 by Dec. 31, 1981.

I recommend that you obtain a list of allowable itemized deductions and consider payment by Dec. 31, 1981 where possible.

Adoption Fees:

Up to \$1,500 in adoption fees, court costs and other expenses directly related to the adoption of children with special needs will be deductible. This change is effective Jan. 1, 1981.

Sale of Residence:

Effective July 20, 1981, the period during which taxpayers may purchase a new residence of equal or greater value than the sale price of the old residence to exclude the gain, is extended to two years before and after the sale of the old residence. With the prior law, taxpayers had an 18-month period for the roll-over benefit.

Individual Retirement Accounts:

The Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 made considerable changes for the tax laws covering individual retirement accounts, but the changes do not take effect until tax years beginning after Dec. 31, 1981. Therefore, if you are not an active participant in a qualified plan, your planning opportunities are: 1) you may open an individual retirement account and contribute the lesser of \$1,500 or 15 percent of earned income, 2) if you have a non-working spouse, you may contribute the lesser of \$1,750 or 15 percent of the earned income of the working spouse, or 3) if both spouses work, each may contribute the lesser of \$1,500 or 15 percent of earned income.

Your IRA plan must be established by April 15 and contributions to the plan must be made by April 15. These dates may be extended in the event that you have an approved extension.

A long trip to a leukemia center in Seattle, Washington was unsuccessful.

Readers had a glimpse into lives of special people

We had another form of courage in the enthusiasm of Andrew Soule of Bath who was named 1980 World Champion of Bike Racing when he was only six years old. He loves to race bikes and he loves to win and our portrait of Andrew in April, showed him in a room full of trophies, some taller than he was. Later this year, Andrew gave them all away to Special Olympics, "so other kids could enjoy them."

In Nancy Puetz of St. Johns we found a quiet, content wife and mother who had found a way to give something of herself without leaving her cozy home. Mrs. Puetz is a braille and she spends hundreds of volunteer hours each year turning out reading materials for the blind through the State of Michigan Library. She said she discovered how important the service was on her first piece of work, a poison chart for a blind mother.

We are using Romaine DeCamp, community relations coordinator for Clinton Memorial Hospital as our year's representative of our county's career women. Of course there were many more, Mary Rademacher of St. Johns city offices; Ann Boynton, nurse; Cleo Desprez, St. Johns librarian; Jane Means, Bath teacher and law student; Jane Austin, the WQTK radio jock, Jody Smith, St. Johns Chamber of Commerce director and Diane Edwards, St. Johns city assessor. Romaine makes a unique profile because she built a very rewarding career for herself at the hospital using the talents she gained by serving as a volunteer herself.

Speaking of volunteering also means speaking of Ken Kralik who was St. Johns' number one volunteer until a promotion took him to DeWitt. Ken's profile was an inspiration to all of us who keep saying we're too busy to get involved. His activities included work with Jaycees, Boy Scouts, youth baseball, blood drives, United Way, the Council for the Prevention of Child Abuse, the Senior Citizens and Chamber of Commerce.

In Walt Kyes we found a special dedication in many years of service to the Intermediate School District board of education. Kyes became a main force in a countywide effort to do more for the area's handicapped children and the district's special school was eventually named for him.

Another citizen with a dedication to young people is Ed Lenon, longtime youth baseball coach who took on an additional team after his retirement this spring from the Michigan State Police. Lenon said he would rather watch his little leaguers play than any professional team.

Our profile column found a special love for community and church in Dee and Mary Allen of Maple Rapids. They were honored in August for a combined 125 years of service to the United Methodist Church. On Sundays you'll find them there, she at the organ and he adding his tenor voice to the hymns of the day. They have been married for 59 years.

Headstart cookbook hits market

Titled "A Cookbook of Headstart Family Favorites," the new publication contains dozens of recipes by Clinton County residents and a few by Ms. Crocker.

The proceeds from the sale of the cookbook are to be used for equipment at the Headstart playground which is located on the grounds of St. John's Episcopal Church.

An example of one of Gwen Nash's seasonal recipes is her Christmas fudge which is made as follows:

Christmas Fudge

- four and one half cups of sugar
- one tsp. salt
- one stick oleo or butter
- one (14 oz.) can evaporated milk
- one (12 oz.) pkg. chocolate chips
- four bars German chocolate

one (4 oz.) chocolate bar or one bag milk chocolate pieces

- one and a half pt. marshmallow cream
- two tsp. vanilla
- four c. nuts

Boil sugar, salt, oleo and milk in large heavy saucepan, 8 - 10 minutes. Start timing after mixture reaches full gentle boil. Remove from heat. Stir in chocolate until smooth. Add marshmallow cream and vanilla. Stir in nuts. Quickly pour into desired pan (lightly buttered). This makes a huge batch of fudge. If you put it in a 13 x 9 inch pan it will be about one and one half inches deep. It will take several cookie sheets.

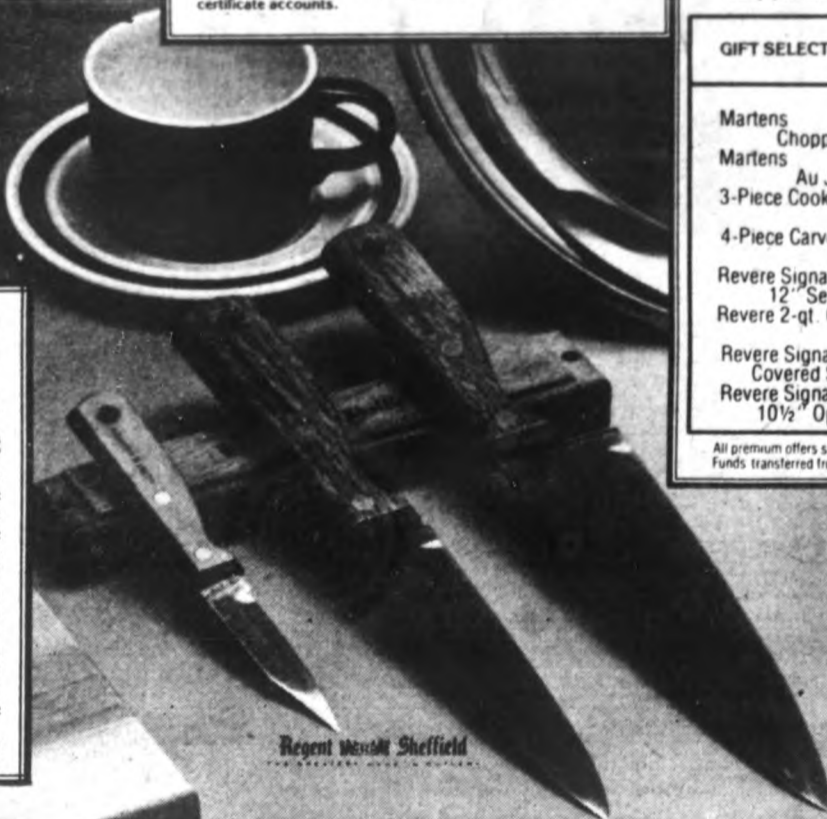

Just ask a Zachary

Baby names have become a mouthful

There was an Angel, a Bethany, a Mical, Joshua and Jesse, two Zacharys and a Kileen that made their way into the world this fall. But where did their parents find these names? And whatever happened to the names like John, Mary, Tom and Sue?

According to Irene Armbrustmacher, head OB nurse at Clinton Memorial Hospital, a lot of the names come from the popular soap operas on television. Other times, she noted, couples make up names or use a combination of names. There also seems to be a trend to take Biblical names like Isiah, Abraham and Sarah.

"Twenty years ago it appeared there was at least one Mary and one Joseph in every Catholic family," said Mrs. Armbrustmacher. "It sure isn't that way now."

Gretchen Muehlenbeck, a fourth grade teacher at Perrin-Palmer Elementary School, has seen a lot of different and unusual names on her class list since she became a teacher.

"One year there were a lot of Lisas, Scotts and Marks," Mrs. Muehlenbeck commented. "In 1977, it

seemed like Michael, Laurie and Debbie were the more popular names."

She noted Mike has always been a popular and will probably continue in its popularity among parents.

The spelling of each child's name has become a real challenge for teachers in recent years also. Take for example the name Laurie. It can be spelled Lori, Lorie, Lorrie, Lauri or Laurry. According to the young teacher, just because it is a common name doesn't mean it has a common spelling. This year alone four out of 25 children's names in the fourth grade were misspelled.

Some of the more unusual names, Mrs. Muehlenbeck has had, were Sunday and November, Niamiah, Zachary, Thaddius and Tabitha.

"Some of these are pretty heavy names for a five-year-old," she said.

She also noted that she knows of three youngsters under a year old that have been named Jesse.

"That seems to be the 'now' name," she said. "People have to be getting a lot of these names from television. Although adults tend to look at some of these names

and question their origin, Mrs. Muehlenbeck asserts that once a child starts kindergarten, the name goes with the face and most young children don't seem to mind.

"Most children go by a nickname or a different version of their name," she said. "But then again there are other children who are never called Johnny or Charlie, it's always John or Charles." She added, "In fact, some children are very emphatic about being called by their given name."

From her years of teaching Mrs. Muehlenbeck has come to learn the ethnic background that goes with a name, especially since she has had some Ceasars and Estellas in her classes.

"Parents should remember that some names are very hard for youngsters to pronounce and even harder for them to spell," she said. "I've even tried to look at children and try to guess what their names might be, but lately I haven't been right too many times."

County high school teams had more than their share of team and individual championships. Excitement abounded as it seemed that almost every game, meet or match was decided in the last seconds or in overtime.

Not only was it the high school stars who excelled, but a number of "older" and "younger" competitors turned in quality performances.

Below, in our review of 1981, we list just a few of the outstanding athletes and their performances that made 1981 such a great year for Clinton County sports.

January

JEFF CASLER scored 36 points, grabbed 11 rebounds, dished off five assists and added seven steals to lead St. Johns to a 64-60 basketball win over Waverly.

DONNA HECKMAN paced her Pewamo-Westphalia teammates to first place in the Clinton County News Volleyball Tournament by defeating DeWitt 15-3 and 17-15.

JERRY PETERS of St. Johns won the 119-pound wrestling title at the Bath Invitational.

SPENCE BEAUFORT led the St. Johns boys' gymnastics team to a double-dual win over Ionia and Harper Woods Notre Dame. The victory upped the Redwings' record to 5-0 for the season.

February

JEFF LEHMAN scored 20 points as Bath defeated Dansville 59-51 to snap an eight game losing straight for the Bees.

STEVE SPICER of Fowler High School was honored as the 1980 Class D Football Coach of the Year.

DOUG PEIFFER of DeWitt won a state wrestling championship at 105 pounds by defeating Tim Eberhard of Harper Woods Lutheran East 10-0 in finals at Crisler Arena in Ann Arbor.

MIKE HUMPHREY of St. Johns High School was named Michigan's High School Coach of the Year for 1980.

JEFF BACKUS of DeWitt set a school record of 1:02:7 in the preliminaries of the 100 yard backstroke at the Capital Circuit League meet.

March

MARK CARTER scored 19 points as Ovid-Elsie won its fourth district title in five years by defeating Durand 82-63.

JOHN ELLIS coached his final game as head coach of the Pewamo-Westphalia basketball team in a disappointing defeat in the district finals to DeWitt. The Pirates finished with a 20-3 record and a CMAC championship.

DARLENE CERNY paced the St. Johns girls' gymnastics team to first place in the Ionia invitational tournament. The Redwings won with a team score of 88.55.

April

LLOYD FELDPAUSCH smashed a three run homer to lead Fowler to an 8-7 win over Bellevue.

BRUCE FEDEWA beat his DeWitt opponent, 6-2, 6-2 and St. Johns coasted to a 7-0 tennis win over the Panthers.

DOUG NOCH of DeWitt pitched a three-hit shutout to beat Williamston 4-0. It was the sixth straight victory for the Panther baseball team.

CINDY FAGGION set a school record of 32.3 in the 220 low hurdles and won the high jump as she paced DeWitt to a 75-51 track win over Lansing Catholic Central. Faggion also ran a leg on the winning 440 relay.
