Fine arts touted in St. Johns

A committee of mothers from St. Johns elementary schools will have students cheering for the fine arts over the next two weeks with a series of programs that involves talent from high school students as well as community and outside groups.

The twelve member committee, which includes persons from five of the eight elementary schools and representatives from St. Joseph School and Community Resource Volunteers, has set up activities which include school visits by the high school drama class, a band and drama program, the Choralaires, and the high school orchestra. A special family night will feature an African dance group, The Pashami Dancers from Lansing.

All expenses for the activities will come out of PTO funds according to chairman Jenny McCampbell. "When we say the drama group is going to East Essex, that means the PTO is paying for transportation from the high school and the drama teacher's substitute," she explained.

Mrs. McCampbell had praise for high school personnel who she said cooperated with the idea and were very willing to participate. "We feel our high school does a good job in the fine arts area and that elementary students can benefit from it," she said.

"The elementary teachers are very excited about the prospect of this too," Mrs. McCampbell reported. "We feel it is important for students to have exposure to the fine arts."

Mrs. McCampbell said that members of the committee "realize that with tight budgets the school board doesn't have the money to sponsor things like this. Yet we don't want students to miss the opportunity."

Bill Tennant, orchestra director, said the music and drama departments were enthused at the chance to entertain elementary students. Music and drama students took top awards in district, regional and state

competition this year. "A lot of things are happening this year that haven't in the past," Tennant said. "We've had an exceptional year. More kids qualified for state solo and ensemble this year and two jazz combos are going to the state festival for the first time."

Band director Walt Cole said that the St. Johns music department demands a great deal of respect around the state. "One of the biggest kept secrets in the school system is the fact that St. Johns is recognized as one of the outstanding music departments in the state," he said.

While it is not unusual for the band and orchestra to go around to elementary schools to perform, this year it was dropped from planning because of a lack of funds. Cole said the opportunity is good for the high school students as well as the younger children. "Our kids like to perform," he said. "Performers need the chance to perform."

Cole also said that Fine Arts Week should be a time to recognize the benefits of the music and drama departments. "Some of these things, our young people will never have a chance at again," he said. "These things are important and no matter what happens with the budget, there is a way to do it."

Planning for bringing the fine arts to the elementary students include the drama class taking their award winning "Story Book Theater" to East Essex and Riley schools; a band and drama presentation at the high school auditorium for the three town schools and visits to all the schools from the orchestra.

St. Joseph plans activities involving community resources, a poet, weaver and craftsmen.

Committee members are Mrs. McCampbell, Mary Jane Boak, Ann Holm, Diane Woodbury, Myrna Weber, Pat Erhardt, Lynn Block, Barb Worrall, Alice Murphy, Krys O'Brien, Judy Parsons and Bill Richards.

Pashami Dancers scheduled

Area families will be able to join the fine arts celebration by attending an evening performance of the Pashami Dancers, Tuesday, April 7 at 7 p.m. at the high school auditorium.

Geared to a young audience, the performance will include a 45 minute presentation of energetic dances, colorful costumes and the exciting beat of the African drums. Afterwards, children and adults alike can swarm upon the stage where performers will answer questions, give lessons in a few dance steps and let children tap the drums.

The program is a "happy balance between watching and getting into the act."

Jenny McCampbell, chairman of the Fine Arts Awareness committee said Tuesday's performance was geared to families. She reported that area families can see the performance here at a much cheaper rate than it is offered in the Lansing area. "Our main idea is to get people exposed to this troupe," she said.

Five area PTO groups put up the money to bring the dancers to St. Johns and it is hoped that enough tickets will be sold to cover the expense. Participating are Riley, Central, Perrin-Palmer, Swegles and St. Joseph.

Prices are seventh grade - adult, \$1, kindergarten - sixth grade, 50 cents and pre-schoolers free. Family rates are available for \$5.

Board adopts new health concept

A new regional concept of funding for the Mid-Michigan District Health Department (MMDHD) was adopted by the Clinton County Board of Commissioners at their regular Tuesday morning meeting.

Joe Latoff, director of MMDHD presented a plan to the board which would erase the present inequities already incurred with the system. Currently Clinton County is paying for 37 percent of the total three county budget but only receiving the same services as Gratiot and Montcalm Counties which are contributing a substantial amount less in funds.

Clinton County allocates \$100,000 to MMDHD yearly while Gratiot pays 30.5 percent or \$81,652 and Montcalm pays 32.5 percent or \$85,940.

The concept Latoff provided to the board showed that each of the counties would pay 33 percent (or an equal

share) for the basic services of one sanitarian, one nurse, one parttime vision technician, one parttime hearing technician and 1.75 clerical personnel. If any of the counties wanted or needed more people, the individual county would pickup the cost on their own.

According to the plan each member county provides equal financial support, and receives equal staffing. Staffing would be adequate to provide minimum services. Each county may then add and pay for staffing above the guaranteed minimum level. Each county can then control the level of services in their county independent from the interest of the other counties in the district.

"These three counties are very diversified in their needs," said Latoff. "Yet presently, everyone is getting the same services to everyone's dissatisfaction."

The St. Johns Fire Department fought blazes at two business places this past week.

On Saturday, March 28 they were called to the Hitching Post Restaurant on North US-27 where the kitchen was destroyed from a fire caused by a pan of hot grease.

Maple Rapids was called in to assist with water. Fire fighters were at the scene

for more than an hour.

Monday morning they responded to an alarm from Fishers Big Wheel where a fire started next to an emergency generator that malfunctioned. Fire Chief Clare Maier said merchandise piled next to the generator caught fire.

Since March 12 firemen have responded to 11 grass fires. The city issued a ban on burning on March 25 because of dryness and wind but it was lifted after the rain on March 26.

Persons wishing to burn must call the city police department for a permit.

The tornado siren will blow for one minute at noon this weekend and the first Saturday of each month until September, French said.

Witnesses say a semi-truck was parked on the west side of the southbound lane blocking the Barrett car from Miss Findley's view.

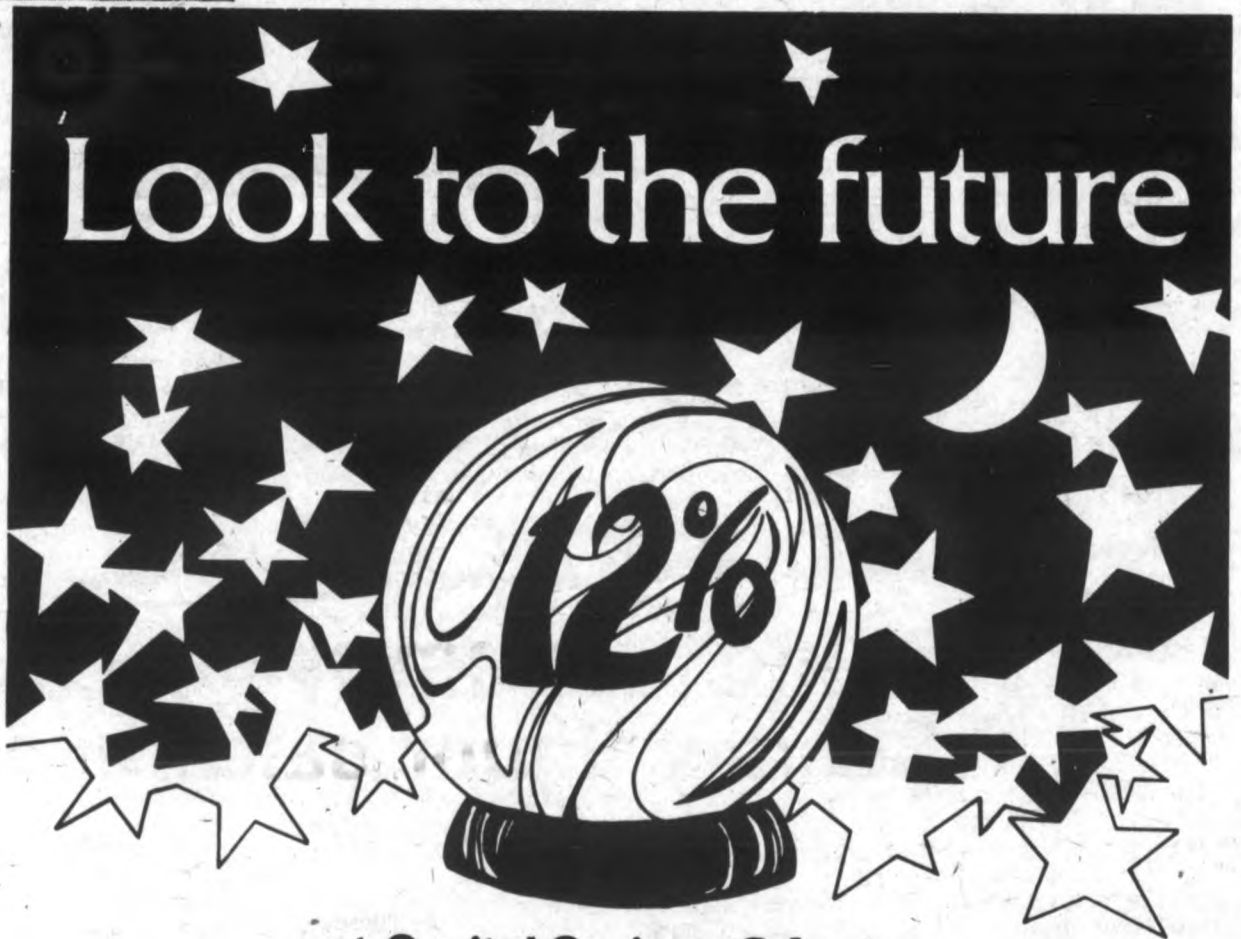
A purse was stolen from

Victor plans for new hall

Victor Township officials have announced that at the end of 1980-81 their books show a balance on hand of \$89,086.93. If all goes as planned, they also estimate that by this time next year they should be showing a balance of nearly \$30,000.

In 1980 the township purchased land for a new hall site. This expenditure accounted for \$33,000. In 1981 they expect to put \$100,000 toward the new building.

Township supervisor Bob Remus told a group of Victor residents at the annual township meeting that he has received estimates of about \$25 per square foot to build the new 6780 square foot township hall.

"I don't quite believe it," he smiled. "I think it'll be closer to \$200,000."

He continued, commenting that he thought that in the long run the township would be money ahead to borrow the money now to build.

"You won't get it any cheaper," agreed one resident.

"I don't want to put a monkey wrench into something we need," began Victor Township farmer Dennis Snyder.

"I think you people have done a good job (on the budget)," Snyder continued. "But I don't think any of us are facing the future the way we should."

Snyder continued by saying that as a farmer he couldn't afford to pay any more taxes.

Remus assured him that the township has no intention of asking for more millage to build the new hall.

"I couldn't vote more millage myself," commented Remus.

"Part of the reason we need a new town hall," Remus continued, "is that we found last fall that this location is very dangerous for elections. People were lined up clear out to the road, and we had a couple of close calls."

The question was raised as to what would become of the old hall.

Remus told the gathering that the land has to go back to the owner and that the township must leave the land

Clinton Commissioners approve Sunday liquor sales in county

Clinton County Commissioners voted to approve the sale of liquor on Sundays by a six to three vote Tuesday morning despite public comments which opposed the plan.

"Six days a week is enough," said Fran Motz, Greenbush Township representative addressing the fact that liquor is already available for sale Monday through Saturday.

Terry Hanekow, off-duty Clinton County sheriff's deputy commented he would also be opposed to the selling of liquor on Sundays.

"I thought I would be the only one against this proposal," said Commissioner Richard Hawks. "Either it's right or it's wrong, but I think we should let the people decide by putting it to a vote."

Jim Wollette, from Beck's Farm Market, addressed the board saying that there is already the sale of beer and wine on Sundays.

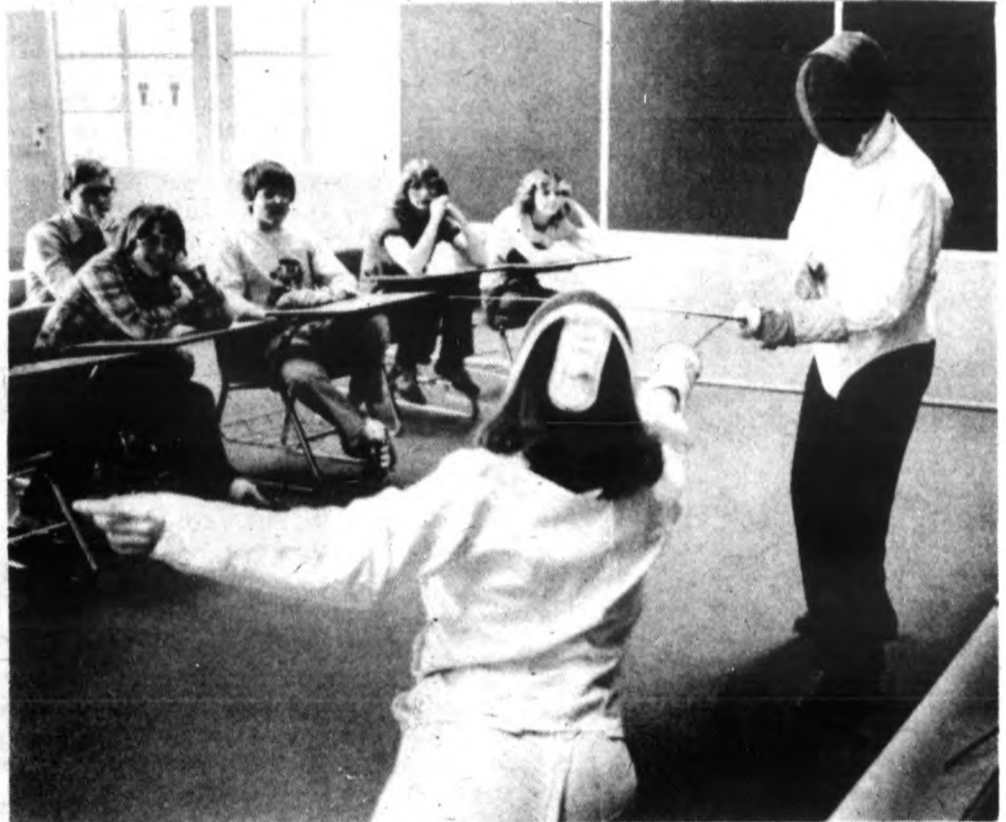
"We don't feel our own liquor sales will increase but because of our assets we feel it should be available," he said.

Joe Latoff, director of the Mid-Michigan District Health Department commented if the county really could "legislate abuse away." He added, "However, I feel strongly that any reduction in the sale of liquor would be an asset."

Those commissioners voting against the sale of liquor on Sundays were Robert Wood, Earl Lancaster and Richard Hawks. Commissioners Richard DePond and Glenn Webster were absent.

Commissioners also approved a special use permit for Granger's Landfill to allow the extraction of sand and/or gravel from a 94.5 acre parcel which is located adjacent to the east of the existing landfill.

Three residents from Wacousta who are opposed to another controversial expansion plan for the landfill,

I-69 route approved

Route location for a 20-mile stretch of I-69 Freeway between US-127 Freeway north of Lansing and existing I-69 near Perry has been approved by the State Transportation Commission.

The project is expected to be let for bids in 1984 with federal aid paying 90 percent of the cost.

The segment will fill one of the missing links in a highway network connecting with I-94 and the Indiana Toll road to the south and with I-94 and Ontario's 402 Freeway to the east.

The route approved by the Commission will extend from US-127 between Stoll and Clark roads and run north of Park Lake,

moving southeasterly to the existing four-lane highway near Upton Road in Bath Township.

Elsewhere in Clinton County the project calls for construction of an interchange at Webster Road and an interchange and connector to the existing highway just west of Upton Road. An interchange also will be built later at Chandler Road if traffic conditions warrant it.

Crossroad grade separations will be constructed at Chandler, Nichols, Center, Upton, Peacock, Colby Lake, Shaftsbury, Bath and Britton roads. State Road will be closed in Bath Township.

Board meetings moved

The St. Johns Board of Education will hold the next four of its monthly meetings at the country elementary schools starting Wednesday, April 11 at Eureka.

The key item on the agenda will be a report from the Citizen Finance Committee which has been studying the school's financial situation for the past several months.

The board determined at a previous meeting that decisions on millage needs for next year would be put off until after the committee's report.

Eureka Elementary School is located on the corner of Welling and Hyde Road in the northwest corner of the school district. The meeting is at 8 p.m.

All county youth, from age 9 to 19 are eligible. Prizes of \$25 Savings Certificates are awarded in four age categories as well as a \$50 grand prize for a boy and girl judged best of the entire show.

He added, "With this concept you get what you pay for, but maintain the efficiency of a district kind of concept."

Clinton County could stand to gain between \$10,000 and 12,000 if the concept is mutually accepted. This means instead of paying \$100,000 per year the county's cost would be reduced to \$89,000 or \$86,000 per year.

If the arrangement proves to be agreeable with the other two counties involved the concept would go into effect on Jan. 1, 1982.

"I have several concerns for Clinton County," said Latoff. "One is with the environmental situation and the other is not being able to have adequate immunization in the county."

Because the Clinton County Board of Commissioners agreed with the concept a joint meeting between all three counties is expected to be held sometime in June.

Tom Woodruff, president of the Clinton Development Commission requested that the commissioners appropriate front money up to \$25,000 to fund two drain crew foreman and one office person in order to continue existing drain maintenance crews from April 3 to Nov. 30. At least half of the workers on the drain crews are Title VI CETA employees whose funds will be cut off as of Thursday.

"It would be like a loan," Woodruff explained to the board. "These monies would be assessed to benefiting property owners. The majority of these monies would be returned to the county in the spring of 1982. The balance would be returned in the spring of 1983."

The reason for the split in returning the monies to county is because work that is done after September wouldn't come back until the following year.

"A couple of crews have been working in the county for at least two years," he said. "Their work has helped the drains tremendously and saved the taxpayers a lot of money."

Title 2B people who work 30 hours a week will still be on the job, according to Woodruff, but they would have no supervision.

The finance committee is meeting this morning (Wednesday) to discuss the proposal, although a decision might not be reached until a later date.

"I know something has to be done right away," said Roger Overway, chairman of the board. "But, everyone who has a CETA employee in their office has requested to have them continue working also. The county is in hard times and has very little money in the contingency fund, so some tough decisions are going to have to be made."

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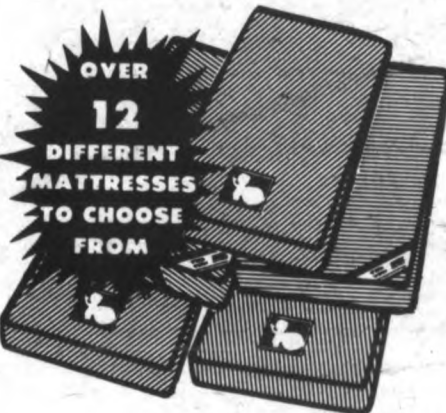

Underground house is energy efficient

"I'm not going to live in a hole in the ground," Alberta Stauffer said when her husband Mel started contemplating a hill on their farm property along US-27. He envisioned an underground house, easy to heat and maintain.

Mel, president of Lansing Electric Motors, liked new ideas, and his brother, Gene, a Vestaburg contractor wanted to build an underground home.

"I protested so much, he dropped the idea," Alberta confessed. "But then I started reading about earth homes and the more I investigated, the more interested I became."

Last weekend the Stauffers held an open house at their new underground home which had intrigued hundreds of visitors already. As expected, large numbers of people signed the guest register both Saturday and Sunday.

Cost of the 1,700 square foot underground home is comparable to a conventional house. Gene Stauffer estimates it at \$45 a square foot.

The walls of the underground home are poured concrete, enforced with steel rods. Iron beams hold up the roof, tiled with drains and covered with gravel and two feet of dirt. The side walls have a Styrofoam layer on both sides. The ceiling is pre-stressed hollow core concrete plank, painted white.

Retaining walls of poured concrete form to the contour of the slope and hold the hill back from the front of the house.

The Stauffers, who have already raised four of their five children, consider the house their retirement home and they have tried to make it as maintenance free as possible. With only one side of the home exposed, Alberta said the biggest maintenance job will be "mowing the roof." They used brick for the front of the house and vinyl eaves. The windows along the front are triple plated and require no painting.

The advantages of the underground home include low maintenance, low upkeep and low utility bills. While they splurged on two electric-door openers for the garage, they plan to be independent in heating. A special heat-a-lator fireplace will circulate the air in the living room and will also help heat the rest of the home. A circulation feature on the furnace pulls the air through vents in the ceilings.

Gene envisions the Stauffers should be able to heat the home all winter with three cords of wood. He cited homes in the Traverse City area that are being heated for 85 percent less than a conventional house. A forty acre wood lot behind the home should furnish their fuel.

The large windows along the front of the home provide a dual purpose. They let light into the home and during the day will act as passive solar panels to catch and let in the sun's rays. At night, drapes will be used to hold the heat in. The windows also act as fire escape routes.

While you can stand in the living room and see the traffic whiz silently by on US-27, not once is there a feeling of being underground. Alberta has chosen bright colors for the walls and carpeting to lighten up the rooms and add warmth.

Gene has stolen every inch of space for storage units so the Stauffers will not miss a basement. The closets are large walk-in units and a huge pantry next to the kitchen provides extra storage space. They also have storage space in the 700 square foot garage.

For Alberta, who started her married life in a trailer 28 years ago, building this new home has been a special treat. "It felt so good to be able to say, 'I want that and that and that,'" she said. The third bedroom provides

her with the sewing room she has always wanted and the garage and patio areas will allow plenty of room for family and friends to picnic this summer.

WHAT REALLY IS A GENERIC DRUG ANYWAY?

Even though generic drugs have been around for many years, a lot of people still don't understand what they really are. Any drug really has two names. It has a common, or generic name which is universal. In addition, when a drug company develops a drug for market, it will often give the drug a second name, the brand name, which will identify that drug to that company.

When a new drug is developed, it is patented. The patent lasts for seventeen years and during this period of time no other company may market the drug. However when this patent expires other companies can market the drug using either its common name or by giving it a different brand name. In either case, it is referred to as a generic equivalent of the original drug or simply as a generic drug.

The generic drug is often a great deal less expensive than the brand name drug since the manufacturer of the generic drug does not have the enormous expense that is involved in the research and development of a new drug.

While generics can sometimes save you a great deal of money, many of the drugs in widespread use today have not been around for seventeen years, so a generic equivalent is not yet available.

Committee tries to upgrade hospital's image

(Editor's note: This is the first in a series of six articles dealing with the new Clinton Memorial Hospital Development Council. This month we will feature the Community Relations-Services Committee.)

"We have to make people aware that the hospital isn't only a place to go when they are sick," Mrs. Grost added.

The Developmental Council was started last year and is under the leadership of Brandon C. White, Jr. as chairman and Richard D. Wills, as vice-chairman.

"The basic concepts were there already," said Mrs. Grost. "As committees we picked up the ball and carried it."

She added, "We have to make the entire county feel that Clinton Memorial is their hospital, not just St. Johns' hospital. We really want people to know more about what goes on here."

Youth rides bike to win big

The biking magazines call him "Superboy." His friends and family simply know him as Andrew Soule, a seven-year-old boy who loves to race bikes and loves to win.

At the age of six Andrew was named the 1980 World Champion of bike racing even though he had only begun his career the year before when he was five.

"I was watching television one rainy day and my friend from next door asked me if I could go to the bike races with him," Andrew said as he explained how he got into the sport. "The next time I went I raced and took first place."

The young Bath Elementary School student was taped on the "Good Morning America" show while he was racing in Houston this year for the world finals. In addition, the following week he was also featured on a local Detroit television station while he was racing at the Silverdome participating in the "Super Kid Program."

While racing Andrew wears a red, white and blue star-studded outfit complete with built-in knee and elbow pads and special helmet.

Sponsored locally by Denny's Schwinn the first grader races a Schwinn SX 1000. He is also on a national bike racing team and is sponsored by Hutch of Maryland.

This is the first year the youth has raced all year-round. His parents Joyce and Tom Soule don't really encourage a lot of traveling however, because of school.

"However, starting in May, he races every weekend," Mrs. Soule commented. "In the summertime there's no problem because we are both teachers and have the time off. Besides, biking is about the only sport where we can all have fun together."

The Soules love the sport because everyone gets to participate. Tom acts as Andrew's coach while Joyce and his four-year-old brother Timmy act as the pit crew. Timmy has even competed in his first race and took third place.

Andrew learned the sport of biking at the Jack Pine Lodge track in DeWitt Township. He still races there and is looking forward to the first race of the year May 2.

His teacher Dixie Knoebel speaks highly of the youngster saying although he is a terrific racer he is also an all A student who is involved in a lot of extra activities.

By watching the older racers Andrew has developed a technique the racers in his own age group haven't mastered yet. He has learned through hard work and practice how to balance himself on the bike with both feet on the pedals at the starting gate. The other racers normally start the race with one foot on the ground.

"I guess I just want to travel to as many races as I can," he said. "I get to meet a lot of new people and am able to play with lots of kids like me. It's fun to travel and stay in motels."

The Soule basement is filled with Andrew's trophies which total well over 100. The trophy he won at the world championship in Houston was so large it had to be dismantled and put in the suitcases in order to get it on the plane.

"Andrew is very humble about his accomplishments," his mother said. "In fact, sometimes

he even gets embarrassed about it...but he usually keeps it all in prospective."

"I think what he is doing is great," his father added, "I played a lot of sports throughout my life and I have memories, but nothing can compare to what he has done."

His parents commented that the sport of biking is very safe, mostly because it is an individual type sport. In fact, they say he gets hurt more by playing in the house than he does out on the biking course.

Andrew concentrates a lot on the race before the start. He walks the race to determine at what point he should be at what time. He knows where the rough areas are of the course and what to look out for.

"He really thinks about the race," said the older Soule. "He knows everyone is watching him and he wants to do well."

Good sportsmanship is very important to the young racer. He shakes the other racers' hands whether he wins or loses.

"It's really a special thing to watch," Mrs. Soule commented.

The sport of racing has enabled the youngster to travel extensively throughout the country making stops

in Indianapolis, Florida, St. Louis, Illinois, Kentucky, Texas, and Pennsylvania.

Andrew can become a professional when he turns 16, but Tom says the best pros race when they are 18, 19, and 20.

"By a racer's early 20's he's normally out of it," Soule said.

There is a chance that the sport of biking may become international with the thought of it becoming an Olympic sport "a down the road kind of idea."

Andrew has been featured in several racing magazines including "Total BMX" BMX Plus" and "BMX Action."

"School is our main primary interest," said Mrs. Soule. "We stress how important education is and that it's a privilege to belong in sports."

Andrew is also involved in the Talented and Gifted program, in Junior Great Books, karate and wrestling in addition to swimming.

"We really don't want him to be a narrow child," his mother concluded.

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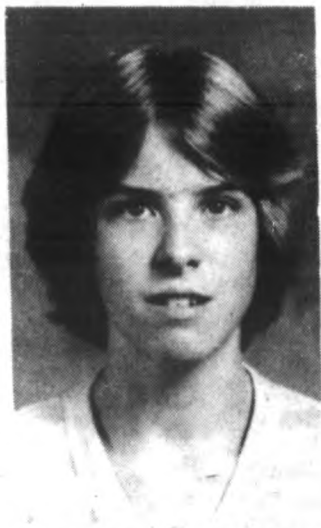

One Man's Views

Plenty has been written and said lately about the status of the Detroit Pistons. The NBA draft is less than three months away and two of the top 12 or so (depending on where Kansas City finishes) picks belong to Detroit. Thus the chance to take giant strides toward respectability and even the playoffs is there.

Pro basketball can be big in this state. All the Pistons have to do is qualify for the playoffs. Crowds of better than 20,000 will flock to the Silverdome if the team can just finish with as many wins as losses.

But if 20,000 will show up for a .500 ball club, imagine the Pistons as serious contenders for the NBA title.

Detroit has either the first or second pick (depending on the coin flip with Dallas) and Kansas City's first rounder, which means two of the top dozen players coming into the pro ranks will become Pistons.

Some say the players eligible for the draft don't make up a strong crop. That may be so when you talk of drafting in the third or fourth round, but there are easily 20 players who can start next year in the NBA and the thought of getting two of the best is an exciting one.

Before draft day rolls around, several intangibles have to be worked out.

Obviously, the Detroit organization has nothing more to ponder if it wins the coin flip and Ralph Sampson elects to turn pro. Open the vault and sign big Ralph. The same holds true with Isaiah Thomas. But what if the Pistons don't win the toss or Sampson and Thomas decide to stay in school?

It's likely both will be back for their junior seasons, although Thomas turning pro is a distinct possibility. For now though, let's assume the two stars won't be lured by the big bucks quite yet.

Remember the Boston Celtics traded the NBA's top pick prior to last year's draft. In turn they received Robert Parrish and Golden State's number one choice (third overall). The move has worked out beautifully for Boston, because instead of getting one great player, the Celts ended up with two. They used the draft choice from the Warriors to nab Kevin McHale, who along with Parrish helps make Boston the favorite to win this year's title.

The key point here is Boston made the right move and now Detroit must do the same. A team can't keep finishing at the bottom of the pack and wasting opportunities in the draft.

Unfortunately, there doesn't seem to be a team with a Parrish type, waiting to deal with the Detroiters. So help must come in the way of the two new faces the Pistons will get. Both players must be starters next year.

If Detroit has a strong suit now it's at the forward position. The likes of Terry Tyler, Phil Hubbard, Greg Kelser and Kent Benson don't rank as the best group of corner men in the league, but they are certainly capable. Center and guard are the team's biggest problems.

Dallas will likely grab a forward such as Mark Aguirre, Albert King or Al Wood. So whether or not the Pistons win the coin toss shouldn't matter. They'll still be able to get their man.

Say hello to Steve Johnson, Oregon State's 6-foot-11, 260-pounder with the soft touch and reckless style of play. He's a fine player when not strapped to the bench with foul problems. Johnson starts at center for the Pistons next year.

Next, Detroit has to land that starting guard. He can't be a Roy Hamilton or even a Larry Drew. Those two first rounders haven't been good ones for the Pistons.

Names like Rolando Blackman, Frank Johnson and Darnell Valentine head the list of available guards. All three may be gone when Detroit's turn comes up again, but how about Clyde Bradshaw of DePaul, Franklin Edwards of Cleveland State whom the scouts are drooling over even though he's remained in relative obscurity throughout college or Ray Blume, a teammate of Steve Johnson at Oregon State?

All of these guards can play and I'm not buying the talk that only Sampson can turn the Pistons around. If the two first round draft picks are spent wisely, this Detroit ball club can be vastly improved next year.

In fact, as I watch this year's playoffs unfold, I'll have something in the back of my mind.

Next season's playoffs will include a surprise team, the Detroit Pistons.

Goerge will also fill the role as the team's leadoff hitter after hitting .309 in 1980. Much of the same can be expected in Goerge's fourth varsity season.

Patty Wieber is set to handle most of the catching duties. Smith calls her young catcher, "the best I've seen in a long time as a freshman." Wieber has two years of experience with Snyder's Oilers, a summer-league fast-pitch team in Fowler and should become a four-year fixture with the Eagle varsity ball club. Her potential is unlimited.

Several candidates are still vying for infield positions and it's likely all will see plenty of action.

Junior Connie Feldpausch will split her time at first base and at third. She can handle both spots defensively and looks for a big season in her third year as a varsity player.

Becky Klein, a sophomore, has shown a good bat and tremendous quickness, making her the frontrunner in the battle for second base.

Another sophomore, Julie Pung, will play shortstop. She saw considerable action at the position as a

freshman and was highly impressive with her glove.

Senior Cindy Weber should also help out with the shortstop duties as well as play some third base. She missed most of last season with a broken wrist, but is now ready to contribute with her fine all-around talent.

Two other solid ball players, junior Ginger Bozung and sophomore Becky Kohagen, will split time at third base and first.

Moving to the outfield, senior Mae Farley anchors left field, junior Diane Klein has a lock on center and junior Kim Schafer will play right.

Farley was a first team all-leaguer in 1980, hitting .396 with 23 runs batted in. The RBI total was second on the team. Farley also possesses a cannon-like throwing arm.

Klein, a good fundamental ball player, is highly adapt at moving baserunners along with her bunting and ability to hit behind the runner. She drew 17 walks last year and is always steady defensively.

Schafer is set for her third year of action. Her fine glove rounds out a superb trio in the outfield. Senior Patty Wirth should also see her share of action, both in the infield and in the outfield, while sophomore Karen Thelen looks promising and will get playing time at second base.

While Fowler still looks like a young ball club, it is an experienced one just the same. Last year's CMAC co-champs, Bellevue and Portland St. Patrick's, figure to be strong again and Smith points out it's highly unlikely any of the teams in the conference will get through the campaign unscathed.

Picking a favorite is difficult at this stage, but it's safe to say Fowler should be as strong as any of the rest of the competition. The season gets underway April 9 when Ashley comes to town.

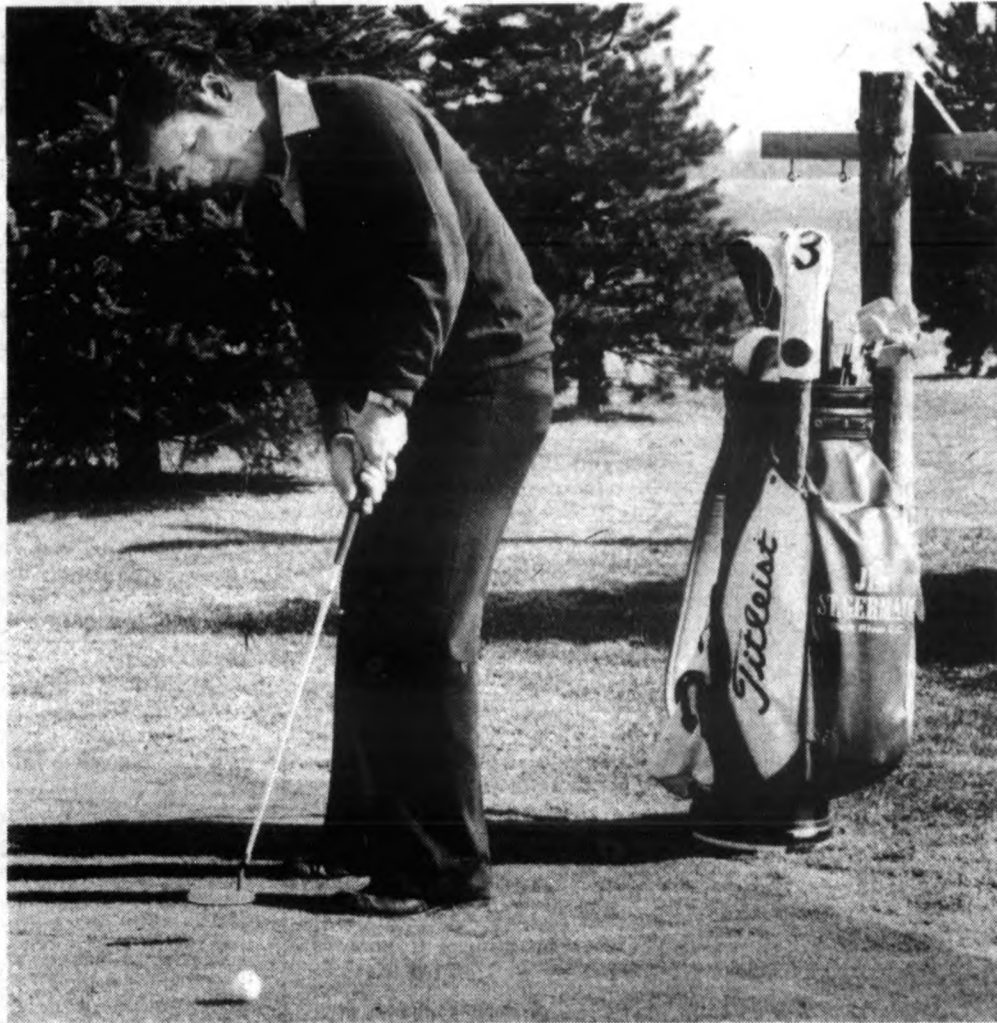

"That was a tough one to take. We had a great year and then it ended like that. This year we may not have as good a record because our league is going to be so tough, but we're thinking districts from the start," Baird pointed out.

The Panthers won the Capital Circuit by two full games in 1980, but the memories are of a mediocre Perry team wiping out a 2-0 deficit in the seventh inning, then winning 3-2 in nine innings.

Baird is again optimistic and he can hardly be blamed with the likes of nine returning letterwinners.

If pitching is the name of the game, then DeWitt has a leg up on most teams. Linda Noch, a first team all-leaguer returns after compiling a 15-3 record on the hill in 1980. She has the ability to pitch almost every day and will be heavily counted upon to take the Panthers to the promised land.

Noch also carries an impressive bat and will certainly not miss turns at the plate because of a designated hitter. She hit .340 last year and Baird figures she could easily improve this time around.

The infield of Brenda Lass at first, Jenny Carey at second, Suzi Dalman at short and Mary Kay O'Shaughnessey at third, looks outstanding.

Lass comes off a season in which she earned second team all-state laurels. She compiled a .439 average while showing excellent bunting skills. Lass handled first base almost flawlessly, with just one error in better than 130 chances.

Carey, a second-team all league outfielder last year, moves to second base in her junior season. Baird explains she's a natural at second with her soft hands and athletic ability. Carey hit .330 in 1980 with 21 runs batted

in and will likely fill the number two spot in this year's batting order.

Dalman, also a second team all-leaguer last year, is a superb all-around player. In addition to enjoying a fine defensive year at shortstop, she compiled offensive stats such as; 35 RBI's, a .439 batting average and 14 of 14 in the stolen base category. Pencil Dalman into the third spot in the order.

O'Shaughnessey did a fine job with the glove at third last year and showed a strong arm. The 1980 season was her first year out and with the experience she gained, her junior season could be a big one.

DeWitt's best hitter could be Kim Gower. She drove in 36 runs in 1980 and compiled a .360 batting average enroute to a second team all-league berth. Gower will handle the catching duties and occasionally serve as the designated hitter.

When Gower doesn't catch, junior Kris Crego will take over. Crego lettered last year and has shown a good quick arm behind the plate.

The lone certainty in the outfield is Tami Newman. She was the Capital Circuit's first team all-league centerfielder last year and much of the same is expected in 1981. Newman hit .365 and stole 11 bases for the Panthers last season. She figures to bat fifth.

Newman also has instructions to take anything she can get to, roaming the outfield with her fine speed and excellent arm.

Julie Brown and Jeanne Marriott will see action in left field while Lori Boughton and Patty Lusty are expected to share right.

Junior Renee Pline will help out with the catching duties and Julie's sister Kris Brown, a sophomore should see some third base action.

Charlotte and Eaton Rapids look to be the ball clubs capable of giving DeWitt the most trouble, but if all goes as expected the Panthers could very well claim their third Capital Circuit crown in four years.

St. Johns coach Jan Szymczak, whose team opens its

regular season Apr. 14 at DeWitt knows the kind of talent the Panthers have and had this to say. "We're expecting to have a real good season and we'll find out just how good we might be when we go to DeWitt for our opener. They're as good as anybody we'll face."

That loss to Perry may indeed become just a thing of the past by the time this year's Panther team hangs up the spikes.

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

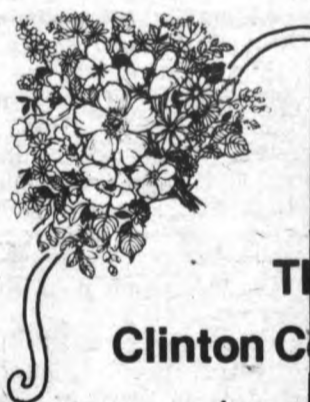

the way they found it before the 100-year-old hall was built.

Remus asked for a motion that the township put all of its revenue-sharing money into roads again this year. The motion was made, supported, and carried.

Among the improvements planned for 1981 are two new bridges on Alward, and road work on Babcock south of Round Lake Road and on Hollister between Round Lake and Alward roads.

The cost of a paving project on West Victoria Drive will be divided three ways among the township, county road commission, and the Lake Victoria Property Owners Association.

"We're getting those roads (around Lake Victoria) pretty well covered," said Remus. "At one-third the cost, it makes a good deal for everyone."

The township budget allows for payment to two fire departments again this year. St. Johns is asking \$492 for stand-by, while \$3,000 is budgeted for the Laingsburg department.

According to Remus the township already owns a one-quarter share of the Laingsburg fire department. The new hall, he says, is being built with a garage that could house a fire engine sometime in the future.

"We're not just building for ourselves today," Remus commented. "We have to look at what the needs of the area will be in the future. We really don't know how fast we're going to grow."
