Public asked to speak

The Fowler finance committee is expected to recommend \$121,000 in reductions for the 1981-82 school year and citizens will be given an opportunity to comment, Monday, April 20 at 7 p.m.

Superintendent Gary Jackson said the public budget reduction meeting will be held before the regular Board of Education meeting which starts at 8 p.m. in the Waldron Multi-Purpose room.

Job awarded

The city of St. Johns awarded the job of converting an eight-inch test well to a production well to the C.S. Raymer Co. of Grand Rapids in a special meeting, April 6.

The Raymer Company, which drilled the test well was low bidder on the conversion project at \$5,500.

After conversion of the test well, which is located on county property off Townsend Road on the city's south end, needs will be drawn up for pumps, power and additional equipment, putting the well into operation by the end of July.

City awards police station bid

The City of St. Johns awarded bids for the first phase of a new public safety building to an out of town contractor but resolved to pursue investigation into a policy that would give local contractors an

"edge" on such projects in the future.

The bids were tabled at the city commission's meeting last month when a tie vote held up the award. In question were a low bid by the Greenville Construction Co., of Greenville for \$40,600 and a slightly

higher bid of \$43,200 by a local company, Rademacher Construction.

Commissioner Don Roesner said he had been concerned that specifications on the job "were so loosely written" that they allowed for a difference in quality on the project.

After additional information provided at Monday night's meeting showed the two companies were using the same subcontractors for electrical work, Roesner said he would agree to the low bid.

Roesner and Commissioner Richard Starck said

they would like to check in to what other communities of similar size do in awarding bids. Starck said a possible answer would be to set a policy of allowing local contractors an advantage of a certain percent. "Our advantage would be in cases where call backs were necessary," he emphasized. "If the roof leaks, you call the local guy and he'll come back."

The Greenville company built the addition to Clinton Memorial Hospital, St. Johns Ford-Mercury and the County Service Building on Elm Street.

In other action the commission approved the land sale of a 50 x 150 foot area on the northeast corner of the Industrial Park site to Schwan's Ice Cream for \$7,500. The action was recommended by the St. Johns Industrial Development Corporation which was instrumental in acquiring the industrial site in hopes of luring new industry to St. Johns. The Schwan purchase is the first in the new park and does not include the cost of road and utility development.

A public hearing is to be held at the May 11 meeting of the City Commission on a proposed special assessment project for, street, curb, gutter and sidewalk on Giles Street.

The project is expected to cost an estimated \$83,850 according to a report by Ci-

Support Reagan, Dunn asks

Representing the new hope of the Republican party, U.S. Congressman James Dunn, 6th district, rallied the

Republicans of Clinton County at a successful Lincoln Day Appreciation dinner, April 9.

Speaking to a record Lincoln Day audience, Dunn proclaimed, "The issues we campaigned on are still an issue. The American dollar is trying to impersonate money."

He said Republicans must take up the cause and not talk about "Mr. Reagan's cuts" but "Mr. Reagan's package."

Dunn criticized the press for over emphasizing program cuts. "Consider the package," Dunn said, "less regulations, less taxes, and fiscally responsible spending."

He insisted that when the administration talked about budget cuts, they were talking more about less of an increase in budgets than about actual cuts.

"We are talking about actual cuts in bureaucracy," he said, saying that the Department of Energy "is in an unbelievable mess." He said Congress had given NASA \$55 million to develop new ideas for an automotive engine only to discover that they had only received \$50.1 million. "It takes \$4.9 million to take a check from Congress to give to NASA," Dunn lamented.

"We're asking you and we're asking the Democrats to just give us half a chance," he said.

Dunn told Clinton County Republicans that two parts of his proposed package aimed at helping the automobile industry have a good chance of being accepted by the administration. Dunn is asking for less regulations and for tax incentives to be applied towards re-tooling that will help the auto industry catch up with Japan. A third part of his package, asking for tax credits, probably won't pass, Dunn said. "David Stockman views the credits as a subsidy for the auto industry," he explained.

Brickley speaks on tax issue, realignment

When Lt. Governor James Brickley came to town last Wednesday he shared with the DeWitt Business Association two ideas. One was a ballot proposal expected to surface in 1982 dealing with the way the state operates its government. The other is Proposal A which is on the ballot May 19.

"Judging by the number of people here today, I guess I rank right up there with the Michigan State University basketball coach," Brickley said with a smile to the group.

He added, "I know it's only human nature for the public to harbor notions about a legislator riding a white horse to save them...however, what we really need to change is the nature of our institutions, not the nature of legislators."

Brickley said government was made inefficient by diffusing the power legislators are given.

"The only letters I get is why don't you do something...why are you so powerless? Not why are you so powerful?" he said.

Explaining that there are 85,000 governments in the United States and a half million elected officers, Brickley said it was enough for a congressional district.

"You're responsible for between 100 to 200 elected officials," he said. "I doubt that any of you could name 50. I can't."

He added, "It's a miracle that this political system works at all."

Brickley noted Michigan has the longest ballot in the country.

He commented that in the course of one day during a 12-hour period Americans can change policy dealing with education, regulations, defense, economic policies and spending with the election of one man-the president. In Michigan to do this, you have to vote for 36 people.

"This is not political accountability," he commented.

Brickley's proposal is to stop electing the regents at the three major universities and have them appointed by the governor. He commented if tuition is too high or not high enough it could become an issue in a gubernatorial race. He said the same thing would hold true for members of the state board of education.

"Let's shift the responsibility to someone we do know," said Brickley. "This includes our Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals....There are a lot of reasons for changing the system."

Regarding Proposal A which will be on the ballot May 19, Brickley said, if people want this kind of measure they better take it while they can.

He said Governor William Milliken had tried to get this proposal passed eight years ago, but could get no support from the legislature.

"This proposal isn't anything really new," he said. "Property taxes have always been on the ballot...but they have always been tax shifts, this is a tax cut."

Brickley also noted there is a historic new phenomenal in the state legislature-to have the budget done before the end of the fiscal year.

"Some tough choices are being made with regards to cuts in social welfare, education and other programs," he said. "Public opinion pushed it."

Although he mentioned no group has really been back-

ing Proposal A he calls the measure a compromise, and "a darn good one."

"I fear the results if it doesn't pass," he added.

Roger Overway questioned Brickley about the proposal hurting rather than helping the sagging business economy of the state.

"This proposal isn't going to really hurt the business climate," he said. "We tried an income tax and that didn't work. Sales tax seems to be the least hated tax, so maybe this will work."

Mobile homes causing little uproar in Clinton

A Supreme Court ruling recently made the judgment that mobile homes can't be prohibited from going in anywhere a stick built home is put. In other places in the tri-county area this ruling has caused some problems, in Clinton County it has caused a lot of questions.

"A lot of people have been calling to get information on the ruling and find out how it applies to their particular situation," said Jack Nelson, director of the department of development control. "So far all there's been is a lot of questions."

Mobile homes must fit all the criteria of stick built homes such as with conforming size. Nelson and his department review each case and make determinations whether the mobile home fits in that particular area.

This is different from the criteria needed from people wishing to live in a mobile home park or subdivision.

"The criteria doesn't mean the mobile home has to be constructed like a house," said Richard Koenigsnecht assistant prosecuting attorney. "There's just certain standards that must be adhered to."

Nelson and his staff is presently working on a specific ordinance regarding the location of mobile homes which deals with aesthetic requirements, sizes, construction and skirting regulations.

They are working on the second draft of the ordinance which will be submitted to the planning commission at its next meeting. A mandatory public hearing will then be held. It will take at least 90 days before the ordinance will be implemented.

"I'm not aware of any violations, yet," said Nelson. "The biggest question we've been asked is if people can put mobile homes on private lots."

Normally, a building permit can be issued in one day according to Nelson, if all the necessary provisions and standards such as health and energy are met. It may take a couple days longer however, to get a mobile home through the zoning department, because there is a lot more criteria to determine now.

Only one petition with approximately 300 signatures regarding mobile homes has been submitted to the county zoning board at this point.

"Frankly, we were surprised when the Supreme Court ruling was handed down," said Koenigsnecht. "This directly reverses some long standing legal decisions."

He added, "I think once the judges have an opportunity to think over their decision, they might reverse it, especially because it was a four to three vote...they really made a big leap."

In Clinton County there are nine mobile home parks and one subdivision according to Tom Warstler, county planner. He noted it was rather a high number of mobile home parks for a county this size. Koenigsnecht added the close proximity to Lansing might have a bearing for this high number of mobile home parks.

Clinton County has always had two special provisions for mobile homes including one for health reasons and another for emergency fire shelter (temporary).

Last week the county adopted higher standards for mobile home parks than the state has according to a report from Nelson to the Clinton County Board of Commissioners.

The county board adopted amendments to the mobile home ordinance in compliance with the Mobile Home Commission Act, 419.


Some of the regulations include: shelter areas may be in conjunction with permanent park buildings, an ap-

proved anchoring system shall be installed on each mobile home, all mobile homes shall be skirted, internal roads must be surfaced, road widths must be delineated and curbing shall be installed on all internal roads.

Citizens Committee asks for defined ballot

Petitions for Board of Education posts at Clinton County schools are in revealing races at six schools.

The only school without a race on its June ballot will be Bath Community Schools where newcomer Dean Sweet Jr. is running unopposed. Sam Palmatier whose first term expires in June has decided not to run.

In DeWitt, three candidates vie for two positions. Incumbent Clare Boughton will face Thomas Kampainen and Kenneth Price. Ken Stevens, who has been on the board for eight years will not seek re-election.

St. Johns voters will

have to choose a candidate for one four-year opening from a slate of four. Incumbent Leonard Puetz will face Roy J. Ebert, Daniel Redman and Joianne Tennant. Puetz is completing his first term on the board.

Three candidates seek a four year post on the Fowler Board of Education. Incumbent Dorothy Bertram will face John Rademacher and Allan Armbrustmacher.

A two year position is also opening on the Fowler board. Ruth Ann Feldpausch is running unopposed for that.

Dr. Lars Anderson who will finish his first term in

June will not seek another term.

At Ovid-Else, incumbents Larry Martin and Frank Rivest will face

Wanita Byrnes and Robert Parker for two, four-year posts.

In Pewamo-Westphalia board member Carl Pfaff

will face four newcomers, Diane Hicks, D. Eileen Smith, Joan Thelen and Mary Ann Schmitt for two positions. Louis Pline decided not to run for

another term.

Fulton voters will choose between Marlin Glazier and J. D. Diehl for one position on their board.

Transportation police refused

The St. Johns Board of Education turned down a Transportation Policy proposed by a citizens committee because it incorporated a ballot passed by district voters in 1949 which limited transportation to pupils within one mile of their school and within the city limits.

The old ruling was found last fall and recently revealed to a citizens committee compiling the transportation policy. Board members voted two to five not to accept the policy opting to take the matter to district voters on June 8.

The 1949 ballot would effect some 200 students who are currently being bused. The old policy followed state guidelines for transportation at the time but state rulings have changed. The corporate limits of St. Johns have also changed, and today, children living up to two miles from the high school are within the city limits.

Current practice buses all elementary students who live a half-mile or more from school and all high school students who live a mile away.

Spring clean-up set

St. Johns has its annual spring clean-up in motion with special trash pick-ups planned for a two week period which starts April 27.

The city's goal is to have "everything cleaned up by Michigan Week" according to Commissioner John Hannah.

Residents will be alerted to their pick-up schedule via a map to be published in the Clinton County News next week and through information in the city newsletter.

Fridays will be used to go back through neighborhoods to pick up trash for any residents who were late in getting their trash to the curb.

Citizens vie for school posts

The St. Johns Board of Education accepted a report from a citizens advisory finance committee last week saying that its influence would be seen in upcoming board decisions.

The board received the report in its April meeting held at Eureka Elementary School before an audience of about 75 persons. The committee was chaired by James Butler who has children in the Riley Elementary School.

Board President Ron Huard praised the committee saying that in his judgement their report was one of the best to be presented.

Superintendent Donald Burns said the board would be getting back with representatives of the committee "so they will know our position on it (the report)."

Bob Craig, chairman of the board's finance committee said the influence of the citizens committee would be evident in future actions of the board.

Among the committees recommendations was the suggestion that the board consider only one millage election and that itemized millage choices such as specific amounts for maintenance, sports and extra-curricular or transportation be presented on the ballot.

They urged the implementation of modes of "communication with the community to provide candid sharing of ideas, problems and solutions.

The committee opposed further reductions in the elementary programs including raising the size of classes to save money.

Also among the report was the idea to conduct a community survey similar to the one used in the Fowler school district asking citizens their priorities on school programs.

They also recommended that the board reopen contract negotiations with employees to see if agreement could be made for reduction in this area.

The committee also suggested that several low cost or no cost recommendations made by a 1978 citizen committee be implemented. These included a teacher evaluation program; guidelines for hiring and training aides and establishment of a testing program to insure that teaching objectives in all fields of study are being fulfilled.

The board is to meet Wednesday, April 29 in a special meeting at 8 p.m. at the administrative office. It is expected that the board's finance committee will make recommendations for next year's millage which must be determined by the first week of May in order to be placed on the June 8 ballot.

Senior citizens dropped from home companion program in county

Clinton County residents are among the 100 senior citizens who are no longer receiving services from the Capital Area Community Services' Senior Home Companion program. Since Jan. 1, 175 people in Ingham, Eaton and Clinton counties have been dropped by the home aide care program.

The Senior Home Companion program has provided light housekeeping, laundry, errands, grocery shopping, meal preparation, respite care, and physical and emotional support to over 700 handicapped senior citizens since March, 1979.

Dawn Hambly, Project Director said, "These services must now be cut because of the elimination of the CETA Title VI and Title IID programs which funded the employees' salaries."

According to Ivan W. Love, Jr., Executive Director of CACS, "The program will have to drop the remaining 250 seniors by August of 1981 when federal CETA funding is totally phased out."

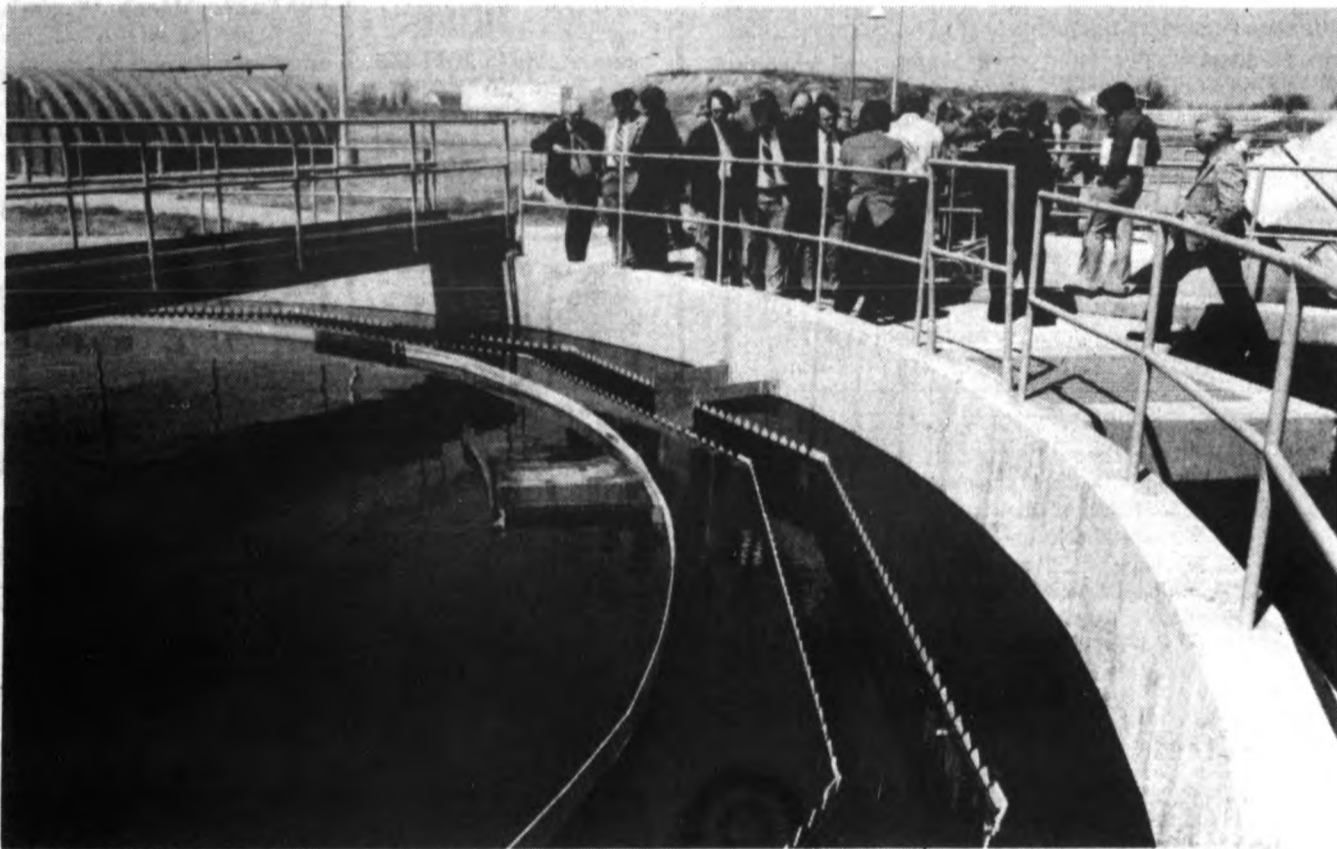
When these clients are dropped, the majority must go into nursing homes. Nursing home care costs the tax-

payer \$1,200 per month, Love said. The average cost for the Home Companion program is \$55 per month. In other words, for the cost of institutionalizing 20 people for one year, 25 workers could be employed to provide services to 450 seniors.

Julie Kepler, project coordinator said, "Prior to the inception of this program, many of the people in basic care nursing home facilities were inappropriately placed. They didn't need nursing care or 24-hour supervision. They just couldn't get the grocery shopping done or the laundry taken care of, or the bathroom cleaned, or the dishes washed."

Marion Owen, the information and referral specialist at the Tri-County Office on Aging said, "I have felt from many clients that this program lifts a great burden off their backs, and it's a relief to us. It's done so much for the seniors and for the workers. It's one of the most positive programs we have."

"It just does not make sense to eliminate this service to helpless seniors in the name of cutting inflation," commented Hambly.

Eureka boy hurt in car accident

A four year old Eureka boy was injured Friday when he took his father's car out of gear causing it to roll backwards and then fell out of the vehicle under the tires.

Richard Raymond Givens of 2502 E. South St., Eureka was taken to Carson City Hospital for treatment. Clinton County Sheriff's Department officials said he suffered a broken leg.

The victim's father, Richard Givens said he shut off the vehicle and left it in gear while parked in the post office driveway in Eureka. The child apparently took it out of gear, then fell from the car and was run over.

The Sheriff's Department handled a total of nine motor vehicle accidents this week; three resulted in injuries that needed treatment at area hospitals.

Jerry Paul Felzke, 51, of 213 W. First North St., Laingsburg was transported to Ingham Medical Hospital after he fell asleep and drove off Round Lake Road, hitting a cement culvert, April 11.

Lynne Marie Stump, 40, of 206 W. Buchanan, St. Johns was taken to Sparrow Hospital after an accident on US-27, April 11.

James H. Schroeder, 23, of 408 E. Grand River, Laingsburg was westbound on Round Lake Road and was crossing US-27 when he struck the Stump vehicle. Upon impact Schroeder's vehicle went out of control and went into a ditch west of the

highway. The Stump vehicle was left disabled in the middle of the two northbound lanes and no longer had lights operating.

A third vehicle, driven by Dennis H. Lebaron, 33, of Elwell was northbound and did not see the disabled vehicle until too late. Lebaron told officers he swerved but still hit the Stump car and went out of control across the highway, through a guard rail and down into a deep ditch.

Schroeder, who was treated for minor injuries at the scene, was cited for driving under the influence of liquor.

School officials reported that sometime between April 3 and April 6, two gate chains were broken to gain access to the school buses. ty Engineer Doug Wier, of which the city's share would be \$38,026. The remaining cost would be paid by a five year assessment to residents of the neighborhood at an

estimated \$25.64 per foot. The city will ask for bids to repair the tennis courts on the north side of the city park which are showing cracks and low spots. City Assessor Diane Edwards said these courts are the oldest owned by the city.

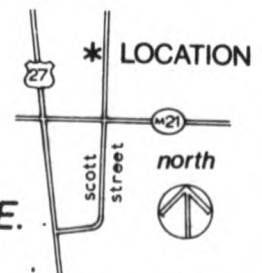

A dream came true this morning for volunteers involved in planning and fund raising for the Clinton Area Care Center as the loan with Farmers Home Administration was closed in action taken at the St. Johns Municipal Hall.

Board chairman Jeanne Rand said the closing of the \$2.5 million loan at five percent interest for 40 years, "makes a dream a reality."

Construction can now begin and will very shortly, according to Mrs. Rand. The construction bid was awarded recently to J. C. Carlson of Grand Rapids. Architect of the project, Daverman Associates is also from Grand Rapids.

"Barring any delays, completion is projected one year from the date construction starts," Mrs. Rand said in a news release.

Pledges in excess of \$800,000 over a five year period have been made by area residents for the 108 bed facility that will provide basic, skilled and home for the aged care.

The center is to be located on Scott Road across from Fishers Big Wheel.

Senior Citizen Update

An important good health habit to point out is that of foot care. Of all the parts of the body, the foot seems to be the most common site for chronic and irritating disorders.

Corns, bunions, painful joints, nail abnormalities, and other minor problems are plentiful in later years. Many of the difficulties are related to poor care of the feet, and this can be minimized.

Minor infections should be treated immediately, especially in persons with diabetes or poor circulation when the consequences can be serious.

Another health habit to mention is care of the teeth. Although it is preferable to hold on to one's own teeth as long as they are serviceable, dentures usually become necessary in later years.

Most people over 45 also have gum disease. This can usually be kept to a minimum by brushing the gums as well as the teeth. In either case, it is not the toothpaste that is important. It is the mechanical action of brushing.

Because these problems are so common in later years; an annual dental check-up is very important.

There are many services available for seniors through the Mid-Michigan Health department.

The information I have given you was adapted from a presentation by Sr. Mary Honora Kreger, PhD, Administrative Assistant and Associate Professor, Department of Community Health Science at MSU and by Dr. William Thar of the Mid-Michigan Health Department.

Capitol events

I've been around the district now talking to some groups about the property tax ballot issue in May. My position on this issue is neutral at this point. I've said it's a little like daylight savings time. On that issue I had a personal preference. But we weren't making any new sun and I didn't see any reason that I should try to convince people to vote one way or another.

In this case we are shifting from property tax to sales tax for a large lump of our local school and government expenses. Is this good or bad? Neither, in my opinion. In total, it is about neutral. But for individuals, it does have significant effects. Some will be profoundly helped; others will lose. Take your choice in a well-informed way and I can easily live with the results.

As I talk to groups I hear cynics say "Look, you'll cut our property tax now and increase our sales tax. In five years our property tax will be right back where it was but we'll have the extra sales tax." How do I answer this? I tell them they may very well be right.

Look at two basic facts. Ten percent inflation doubles any cost every 7.2 years. In recent years local property tax has absorbed more than its share of school-cost-inflation because the State School Aid Formula has not been funded at an inflationary rate.

Between these two items it is very likely that after a reduction due to Proposal A passage your property taxes will return to their original levels in five years. Because the proposal does **nothing** about either inflation or the School Aid Formula.

The other side of that is, of course, that given these conditions, your present property tax will also double

over the next five years without passage of Proposal A. So while the cynics may be right, that is not a logical reason to oppose the ballot proposal.

This doubling can only be fought by meeting these other two conditions head on. Inflation is, in a way, a national problem that hopefully is being fought at that level. But school-cost-inflation can also be fought at the State and local level by limiting costly requirements and by innovative efforts in teaching, transportation and overhead.

The School Aid Formula must begin to absorb its share of inflation. The legislative reapportionment that occurred in 1972 shifted political power significantly to urban areas and a vast expansion of social services was the result. Outstate, generally Republican, efforts to keep education the top funding priority have been overwhelmed. The reapportionment that will begin in 1982 shifts power back outstate. Perhaps education can again become the State's number one obligation. If so, we can avoid doubling property taxes in the next five years whether Proposal A passes or not.

Leona Thayer's a College Week advocate

Leona Thayer of rural St. Johns has found a short learning vacation that can build up self-confidence, enhance marriage and family living, develop friendships and rouse latent ambitions.

She strongly recommends her find to people of all ages and both sexes and she can't say enough about what it can do for a house-bound "Mom."

An active mother of three, she maintains that College Week, which runs June 22 - 25 at Michigan State University, is a required course in better family relations.

An annual event on the East Lansing campus, College Week has been going on each June for more than 50 years. It's co-sponsored by the university and its Cooperative Extension Service and is open to people of all ages.

Participants choose from over 50 classes, plus numerous special tours, workshops, film festivals and sport activities.

Whether you want information about parenting, energy-saving window treatments, handling stress, weight control, financing local government, developing leadership skills, motivating others, financial planning, estate planning, or any of dozens of other topics, you'll find it at College Week.

"I wish everyone could go," Mrs. Thayer said. "The first thing it's for is self, she emphasized. "It's getting away from your routine, from the kids, from your chores. "And it's for your family and community, because everything you learn, you bring back and apply it and share it. Everything you learn at College Week is re-teachable," she said.

"The food is out of this world; the accommodations are wonderful," she advocated. While Clinton County residents are close enough to commute to the workshops and activities, Mrs. Thayer recommends staying on campus. "If you commute, you'll miss the fun things," she maintained. "There's all kinds of extra activities and special events to be involved in during the free time and evenings. You should go and get the total experience."

There are new places to visit, like the planetarium and the botanical gardens. Participants can catch a play at the Okemos Barn Theatre or go out on the town.

"If you've never gone to college, you'll get a taste of that and know what the kids

go through," she said. On the first morning, participants pick out the three classes they want to take and plan their free time also. "You plan your whole four days," Mrs. Thayer said. "You have to make choices and that's hard."

No one will feel out of place at College Week according to Mrs. Thayer. "When you're a first timer, the old timers will help you out." She said participants need comfortable shoes, "Maybe even track shoes, because you do a lot of walking." The dress is casual and comfortable.

College Week is well planned by experts according to Mrs. Thayer. They've thought of everything, she said. There's an emergency telephone number for babysitters and a system to get messages to the participants.

Meeting other people with the same concerns is another highlight and advantage of College Week. The first time Leona went, she took a workshop in self-esteem, hoping to pick up ways to help one of her children who was having some adjustment problems. She also took a parenting class and said it was very helpful. "Most of us in the class had younger children and we were able to express our particular problems and thoughts," she explained.

She also took a class in canning and she has put that new knowledge to work preserving the products from her large family garden, filling rows and rows of shelves in the basement.

This year's theme for College Week is "Families Make a Difference," and Leona believes in that. When she first went to College Week, it was on a whim, and she didn't know much about it. "I had been in Extension for about two years and I was trying out any new thing that came along," she said. While it wasn't that easy to just pack up and leave home for four days, she thinks everyone should try to do it. "It's worth every bit of planning and trouble," she said.

This year when Leona goes, she won't have to worry about where the children will stay. She'll be leaving new baby, Alan and her two junior high age children, Coleen and Paul, with her husband, John, who will be home on vacation. "Actually, it's going to be a special time for them, too," she said. "I feel we are all going to benefit by my going."

Applications and a complete list of College Week classes are available at the Extension Office in St. Johns. Registration is due by June 1. Scholarships are

also available. Leona emphasized that College Week is not limited to Extension members and 4-H leaders. "It's for everyone," she said.

Her own interest was sparked through Extension and she is an advocate of that group, too, which she describes as a method of "expanding your mind while using your hands."

"I like people, I like to be with people, I like to work with people," she said, "and Extension helps me do it." Next year Mrs. Thayer will be the president of her extension group, The Country Daisies,

and she was quick to point out that Extension was "not just for country ladies."

"We are always looking for new members," she said. "If anyone is interested they just call the Extension Office." Projects include arts and crafts and cultural activities. "It's a learning, educational organization," Mrs. Thayer pointed out.

She and her husband, who works for General Telephone, have been in St. Johns for 16 years. She is also active at St. Joseph Church where she is on the Altar Society Board.

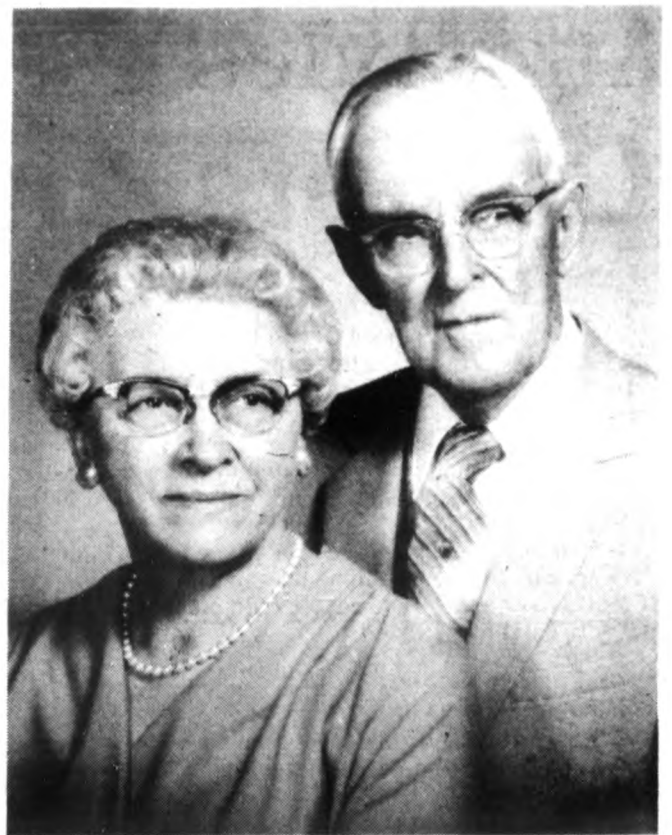

ASK YOUR PHARMACIST

Now that spring is here, everything is once again starting to grow. Unfortunately, that also includes poison ivy. Did you know that the rash caused by poison ivy and its cousins, poison oak and poison sumac, is actually an allergic skin reaction? And as such only 40-70% of the American population is susceptible?

However, the real question is; what do you do if you realize that you've just walked barefoot through a poison ivy patch? First get out of the patch. Second, go inside and remove any clothing that might have come in contact with the plants since clothing can spread the condition to other areas of the body. Next wash the area with soap and water or with an organic solvent. While some studies have shown that washing isn't necessarily effective, it won't hurt. (Keep away from your eyes)

If the rash is going to develop, it probably won't occur for at least 12 hours. However, if it does develop, it will first appear as small red blisters which will soon begin to weep and itch. The rash is usually self-limiting and will disappear by itself in 14-20 days. Severe cases involving large areas of the body may, however, require medical treatment by a physician. In most cases, treatment is aimed at reducing discomfort and clearing up the rash as soon as possible. Astringents, such as zinc oxide, calamine and sodium bicarbonate (baking soda) solution are often used to dry up the blisters. Contrary to popular belief, the fluid from these blisters will not spread the condition nor will they transmit it to someone else. During this acute phase when the blisters are present, greasy ointments should not be used and cleaning the area should be done by sponging gently with tepid water. To alleviate the itching, local anesthetics, such as benzocaine and antihistamines applied to the rash, may be used with some degree of success. If all else fails, remember next that prevention is the best treatment...so wear shoes.

This is normally the time when high school baseball teams are still working on fundamentals of the game and trying to ready themselves for the start of the race for a league title.

You expect to see errors, as many as three or four by each team. You also expect to see the pitchers somewhat ahead of the hitters at this stage.

DeWitt's baseball team has defied the norm thus far. The Panther infielders haven't been booting grounders or throwing the ball all over the park. Through the first four games, DeWitt has committed only two miscues.

Instead of struggling, trying to find the groove at the plate, Panther hitters appear to be in mid-season form.

Prior to the start of the season, Coach Frank Deak was fully aware of his team's talent. If there was a question mark, it was the pitching staff.

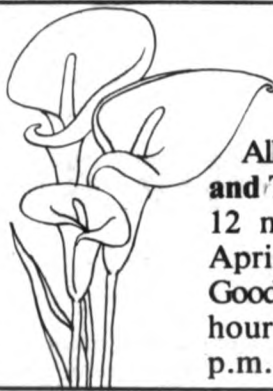

Monday's scheduled game with Potterville was postponed. The Eagles host Olivet tomorrow and visit St. Pat's Monday.



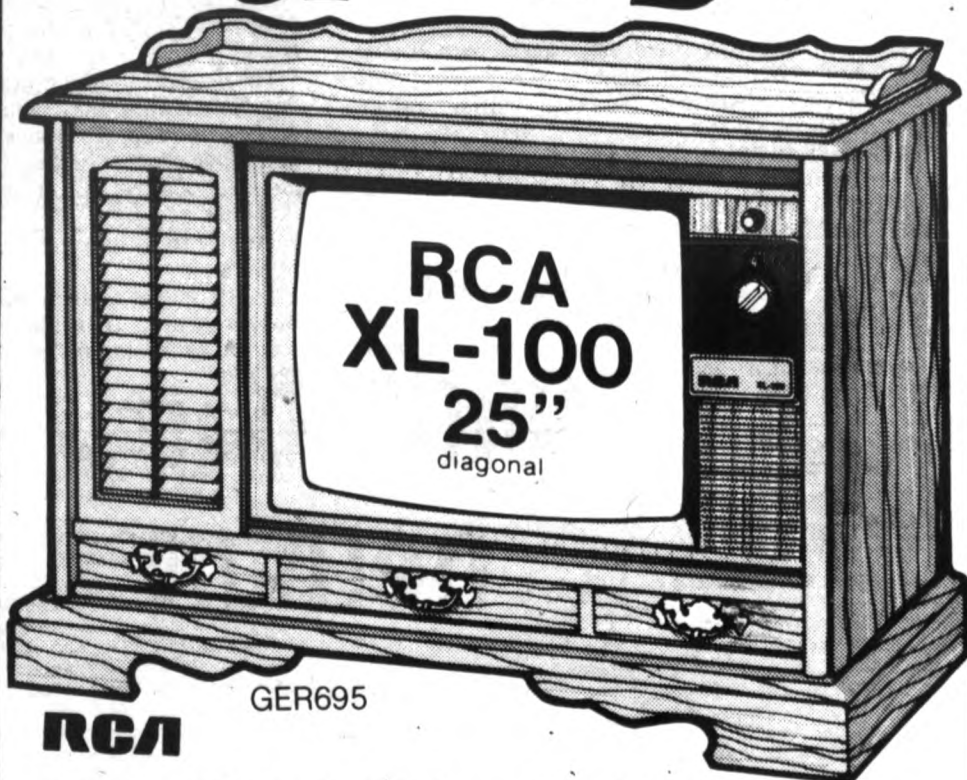
Fowler's Julie Pung comes in to score a run in the fifth inning of the Eagles' opening game win over Ashley.

Dairy Tour explores innovative farms

Despite threatening skies and strong winds, the 1981 Clinton County Dairy Tour proved to be an enjoyable and helpful experience for upwards of 200 farmers.

The tour is designed to give farmers the chance to view procedures and share ideas with their fellow workers from around the county.

This year's excursion also took the participants to a pair of dairy farms in Gratiot County as well as two farms in Fowler.

A group made up of four interested farmers and a representative of both the Production Credit Association and the county Extension committee selected the farms for the tour. Each of the four farms offered something different and were not necessarily selected on the basis of being the biggest or most productive.

Cliff and Gloria Thelen's 317-acre farm, where cows are milked in a double 4 herringbone parlor, was the first stop on the tour. The Thelen Farm is located on Bauer Road.

Crops include corn, soybeans, alfalfa and wheat.

Next the group moved to the T and H Dairy Farm on Wright Road, where Herb

and Virginia Thelen are partners with Ken and Sue Halfman.

T and H Dairy uses a mixer wagon for feeding the cows. This produces a total mixed ration which perfectly balances the feed allowing the herd to get all necessities in one bite. It is estimated that 85 percent of all dairy farms will be using this method within five years.

The farm has a unique aspect in that it has a slatted floor in the free stall area. The slats have been in use since January.

Following the group's break for lunch which was sponsored by the PCA and Federal Land Bank, the tour led to Gratiot County. Stops were made at Friesen Farms on South Luce Road and at the Ken and Duane Pendell Farm on South Begole Road.

Another important point brought up during the tour was the input of wives on the farms.

Clinton County Agricultural Agent Roberta Wieber stated, "As an educator I want to be sure I can get to the wives as well as the husbands because they're all in there working."

The tour was made possible by the Co-operative Extension service.

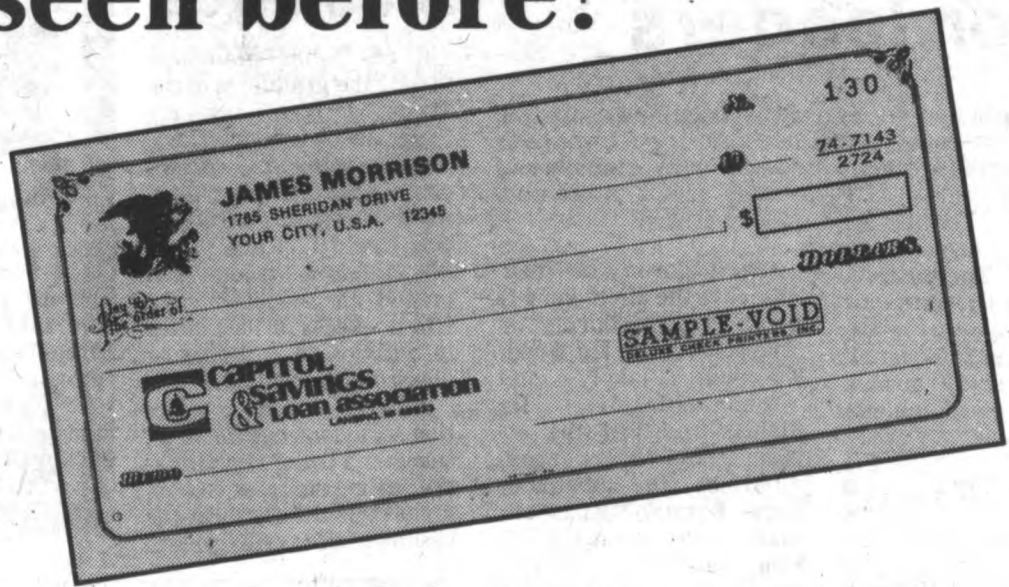

"He puts on a great show," he said, referring to the performer who would soon grace the stage of his bar. "In 1963 when I graduated, Chubby Checker was really big. You couldn't touch him then. If someone had said he was going to work for me some day, I wouldn't have believed it."

Sain kept watching the door as more and more people entered. Tickets sold for \$12 and \$15, and Sain said he expected to "break even" on the two performances.

"It's a great experience. I mean when people hear Chubby Checker is going to be right here in Pewamo, well, a lot of people don't even know where Pewamo is," Sain said.

The members of the Checker band milled around, playing pool and eyeing the ladies. A long table was stacked with bright red and yellow t-

shirts, bearing the great one's name.

A congenial man, nearly as round in the middle as he was tall and wearing a western hat of straw trimmed with feathers, introduced himself as Charley Davis, Checker's road manager. "I've been with Checker for three years now," he said. "Before that I was with Peter Frampton, but things didn't work out, so I left and came with Chubby."

He issued some brief and random facts about his boss, such as the fact he makes his home "just outside Philadelphia" and that he is married to a former Miss World. "She comes out with us sometimes," he said.

"The life is tiring at times. These entertainers are spoiled and they're used to people giving them things. We can't smoke on the bus, Chubby hates smoke."

He paused to light a cigarette.

"Man, sometimes it's 20 hours without one. Drugs are there if you want them, like anywhere. I handle Chubby's business, like motels, materials, set-ups."

He checked his watch, got up and headed toward the bus.

The bar was nearly filled for the 3 o'clock show and completely filled for the 7 o'clock performance. A band called Full House started off the show. Then the Checker band, all members sporting the short hair styles of the early 60s, took the stage and started the Twist.

Soon Chubby Checker himself ran in from the bus, dressed in silver lame trousers and boots and a red brocade jacket with black velvet lapels.

Before long the audience -- and the employees -- were twisting and shaking to the fast-paced music. Twisting in their chairs, on the floor and in the doorways, everyone got into the act.

One elderly man with a cane even got out on the floor to attempt an arthritic version of the Twist.

Songs such as "Blueberry Hill," "A Whole Lot of Shakin' Going On" and "Twistin' USA" had everyone, including the bouncers, out on the dance floor.

Checker had contracted for a 45-minute show and at 8:15, the road manager stepped up, grabbed Checker by the hand and led him out the rear door.

The day Chubby Checker came to Pewamo won't be forgotten.
