Allocations unchanged

The Clinton County Allocation Board agreed to split the 15 mills it must levy the same way voters set the millage split in the November, 1976 election.

The board agreed eight mills will go to schools, 5.8 mills to the county, one mill to Townships and .2 mill to the intermediate school district, at its preliminary hearing on Monday, April 20.

The board will hold its final hearing at 1 p.m., Monday, May 18, in the court house board room.

State law requires the 15 mills to be levied and allocated among the four groups. Last November, when voters failed to extend the fixed millage another four years, the county had to organize the allocation board to hold hearings and decide the formula. State law sets the minimum amounts the board must allocate at three mills for county, four mills for schools, 1 mill for townships and .1 mill for the intermediate school district, totaling 8.1 mills and leaving 6.9 mills to be divided among the four groups by the board.

Board Chairman is Ernest Carter, a former county clerk.

Home for aged next

Care Center underway

It was a big week for supporters of the Clinton Area Care Center. The loan with Farmers Home Administration was closed in a special ceremony last Wednesday morning and construction on the \$ 2.5 million nursing home facility started Thursday.

Board of Directors Chairman Jeanne Rand, called it "a dream come true," but on Thursday as she spoke to the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce, she admonished county residents that the project must continue until a home for the aged and a home for the handicapped are also built.

"Over the next 15 years the population of senior citizens will continue to grow," she warned. "We can't stop here."

She called the 108 bed facility "only the tip of the iceberg," saying "now we have to have a home for the aged. We are going to have such a population of older citizens and we will need a place for them. We are going to be part of that population," she said.

"Our roots are here and this is where we want to be when we need care. We don't want to send mother and father away to other counties, or our handicapped children. We've proven it could be done. Now we must go on."

The nursing home facility is being built on a 17 acre site and Mrs. Rand said that the master plan calls for a home for the aged, a home for the handicapped and apartments for the elderly.

"I think we are coming to a time when we have to come back full circle," she said. "We are going to have to take care of our own in our own homes as long as possible. I'm sure we will find over the next 15 years that we'll never have enough places for our elderly."

She said that the 108 bed facility will be ready to take patients in about nine months if all goes well. "The lawn may not be finished and the shrubs won't be in, but hopefully in nine months we can take patients," she said.

Construction is being done by J.C. Carlson of Grand Rapids who give a one year completion date from the day of ground breaking.

Mrs. Rand said that the facility will provide about 108 jobs. The board of directors is in the process of interviewing candidates for a director.

At Wednesday's loan closing, Paul Miller of Farmers Home Administration said that the 40 year loan at five percent interest was possible only because of the "tremendous community support shown to this project."

He said the local Care Center took half of the state's allocation for loans under the "community facilities" category. Calling it the largest nursing home project ever financed by FHA in Michigan, Miller said local contributions were the key to the loan. "Without that fund drive, that \$800,000 in cash from the people, we wouldn't be here today," he said.

"I want the Board of Directors and all of you who gave money and went out and worked to know it was you," Mrs. Rand said. "As the building proceeds you can all feel good. You can say, 'I was part of that.' And when the day comes and you need a place for mother or father or for yourself, it will be there."

The drive for local funds was chaired by Charles Colletta and the late Tony Kuntz. Pledges amounted to an excess of \$800,000 and are to be paid over a five year period. Donations can still be made by calling the Care Center office, downtown St. Johns.

County News teams up with green sheet shopper

The Clinton County News will be published on Thursdays, starting May 7, and a new classified ad section, the Green Sheet, will be added to the newspaper on that date, is was announced today by Zane Fox, vice-president and general manager of Lansing Suburban Newspaper Network (LSNN).

A new publication, the Green Sheet Shopper Clinton County News Edition, will be introduced May 4, Fox added, with total market coverage circulation of 80,000 in Lansing area communities.

By publishing on Thursday instead of Wednesday, The Clinton County news will be able to provide better and more in-depth coverage of government meetings which usually are held on Monday and Tuesday nights, said David Ray, editorial director and assistant general manager of LSNN.

The Clinton County News used to be published on Thursdays, said Managing Editor Sharon Randall, but the delivery date was moved to Wednesdays in 1969.

"The News is put together on Tuesday afternoon and is printed Tuesday night," Ray explained. "That means we can't always do a thorough job of covering Monday meetings, and stories on Tuesday meetings aren't published until eight days after the session."

"With a Thursday publication date, we can do a better job of informing northern Clinton County residents on the activities of their local government and schools, as well as continuing to provide sports and social news and features," the editorial director added.

The News will feature the new Green Sheet classified section, including want ads and display advertising from all of the Lansing area communities served by LSNN in Clinton, Ingham, Eaton and Ionia counties.

The Green Sheet will have green paper for its cover pages. Want ads appearing in the Green Sheet also will be published in the Green Sheet Shopper on Mondays, which means that the ad will be delivered to more than 100,000 homes and businesses in Lansing area communities

on Mondays and Thursdays.

A central classified department has been established in LSNN's East Lansing office, but residents of northern Clinton County may call a local telephone number (224-8902) to have their want ads run in The News and the seven other community newspapers and nine Green Sheet shoppers published by LSNN.

The Clinton County News will be delivered by mail every Thursday to paying subscribers.

Debutting Monday, May 4, will be the Green Sheet Shopper Clinton County News Edition, Fox said. It will be delivered free every Monday to 11,000 homes and businesses in northern Clinton County by the LSNN circulation department.

Green Sheet Shopper editions will include retail display advertising and want ads, the general manager explained, and the shoppers, too, will have green paper for its covers.

"The Monday delivery date, want ads from all of the communities we serve in the Lansing area and total market coverage, whether it's in one community or several communities or all of the communities we serve, will make the Green Sheet a valuable advertising medium to readers and advertisers alike," said John Fryer, who was named as LSNN advertising director March 30.

"And since we have our own distribution system of carriers and motor route drivers, we can guarantee timely, efficient and reliable delivery of the Green Sheet Shoppers to virtually every home and business in the communities we serve," added Circulation Director Bob Howell, a veteran newspaperman who joined LSNN last August.

"We have made these changes in order to better serve our readers and advertisers," Fox said. "We believe the 17 Lansing Suburban Newspaper Network publications offer all advertisers, ranging from merchants to people who buy and sell through want ads, the best coverage of suburban Lansing communities."

Daylight Savings Sale set

A look at holistic health

Good health is your own responsibility

(Editor's note: This is the fourth in a series of articles that correspond to monthly programs being offered to county organizations, clubs and schools by the Substance Abuse Center, 300 E. Sturgis, St. Johns. If you are interested in having a speaker contact the Substance Abuse staff.)

You've had cold after cold all winter. Ever wonder why? Could there be something there beyond the germs?

Promoters of holistic health say there is and maintain that everything has to be right in five different areas in order for a person to stay healthy.

Linda Hall of the Clinton County Substance Abuse Center says the theory is an interesting one and can teach people "how to live healthier lives."

Ms. Hall said that holistic health encompasses the idea

that people are more than machines that break down from time to time and need to be fixed. It looks at the whole person. "How we feel, act and function is a product of total person health and not just physical health," she said.

Holistic health looks at five areas: emotional health, spiritual health, intellectual health, social health and physical health. All these different areas are related and frequently improvements in one area will also improve other areas of health.

Ms. Hall said that most of the ideas practiced with holistic health are "common sense kind of stuff." She explained that the medical community traditionally approached health with the idea that we are mechanical bodies and when we break down, we fix them.

The idea of holistic health is that discomfort is a clue that something, somewhere is lacking or out of balance and appropriate treatment includes restoring balance. The holistic movement makes a connection between mind and body, she explained.

"The connections between the areas are logical and signs are there," she said. "We just haven't approached it before."

Emotional health is characterized by a person who can experience and express a wide range of feelings; expression is appropriate and no area of emotional experience is blocked or stifled. The person expresses and experiences love, joy, anger, hurt, sadness, fear.

Intellectual health is characterized by a person who is involved in stimulating and productive activity. Who can problem solve, think through situations or problems and analyze. Disfunction is characterized by boredom and apathy.

Spiritual health is characterized by a person who has a sense of meaning, a sense of belonging in society, and who knows where they fit in.

Social health is characterized by a person who can make and maintain a variety of friendships and rela-

Parenting workshops set

A six session program in parenting will begin, Tuesday, April 28 attempting to help make the job of raising children a little easier, and prove that "Families make the difference".

The seminar which will meet each Tuesday through June 2 is sponsored by 11 county groups and is held at the St. Johns Family Center at the First Congregational Church, St. Johns.

The focus of the Family Center is to provide parents with social and community activities, a chance to talk with other parents and discover ways parenting can be easier.

During the sessions, which run from 9 - 11:30 a.m., parents have an opportunity to be away from their children for a time, watch films, participate in open discussions and be involved in some fun activities.

While parents are sharing and learning, children are involved in planned activities that include creative play, group games, story times, songs, painting and drawing. Care is provided for infants from two weeks to children of five.

David Lord, spokesperson for the center, said the goals of the organization are "to decrease the stress and anxiety of being a parent and child together and to help people learn how to cope with these stresses."

He said the sessions aim at ways to increase confidence in being a parent and improve personal self-esteem and the parent-child relationship.

The sessions for children are geared toward learning skills in getting along with others as well as developing physical skills and learning about feelings.

Topics scheduled for parents in this Family Center program include:

April 28 - "Dealing with Discipline," led by Terry Cornwell and Bud Delavan, counselors with St. Johns Elementary Schools.

May 5 - "Fun Activities with your kids," by Krya O'Brien, art and dance teacher.

May 15 - "Children's Health" with Dr. Susan McCarter.

May 19 - "Regaining your personhood" a discussion with staff from the Clinton County Counseling Center.

May 26 - "Nutritious Snacks" and "Cracking Up Over Eggs" by Carol Butler, home economist with the Extension Service.

June 2 - "First Aid in the Home" with Wayne Wood-

bury, E.M.T.

Cooperating in the venture are Expectant Parents Organization, Social Services, The Substance Abuse Center, Mid-Michigan District Health Department, Clinton Memorial Hospital, MSU Extension Service, St. Johns Public Schools, Capitol Area Head Start, Clinton County Counseling Center, Intermediate School District and the St. Johns Ministerial Association.

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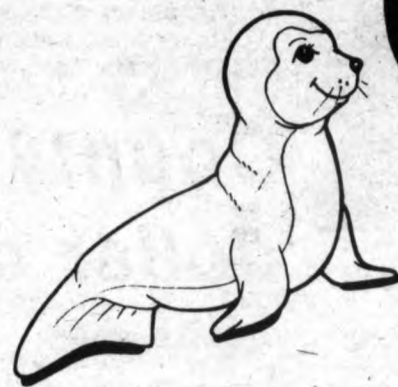

Fowler decides millage issues

In a move they hope will save part of \$121,346 in cuts, the Fowler Board of Education decided on a three part millage package for the June 8 election.

The action was taken at a regular board meeting Monday night, immediately following a public forum at which citizens gave their views on the proposed cuts.

The board will ask voters to approve a 19 mills for operating question which is the same levied this year. Also on the ballot will be a 1.8 mill question for operating which would raise approximately \$80,000. The third part of the ballot will be a request for a \$350,000 bond issue to build a shop addition to the high school.

The three issues will not raise the district's millage, Superintendent Gary Jackson explained, because nearly that many mills in debt retirement expires this year.

Jackson said the district would only be able to pass the millage questions with a "unified effort between the community, staff and administration."

Richard Feldpausch, a community member in the audience said Fowler could "be an example and inspiration to the communities around us." He asked the board and community to "be positive."

Citizens in the audience expressed concern over the \$121,346 in cuts. The strongest supporters were for the

sports program which amounted to a \$4,558 cut in middle school athletics and \$9,896 in high school track, baseball, softball, volleyball, golf, cheerleading and freshman basketball. Parents asked if they could raise funds to keep the programs and if volunteers could be used as coaches. Jackson answered yes to both questions but said language in the teacher contract was unclear about the volunteers.

Several parents and a teacher spoke against cuts in the Title I program, which offers one to one help for slower students and the suggestion that the librarian be replaced with an aide.

In other action the board approved a 9.5 percent salary increase for non-union employees; a 8.75 percent raise for principals and a 7.5 percent raise for the superintendent.

Jackson told the board that Fowler has the second lowest paid administrators in a five county area, yet they start their day at 6 a.m. and often are not home until 10 or 11 p.m. Administrators do not have a step increase, he said.

The board recommended raising the transportation charge for busing students to the summer swimming program in St. Johns in order to cover costs. Last year children paid \$2; they will be asked to pay a \$5 fee this year.

County's equalization hits billion dollar mark, director reports

Clinton County property reached over \$1 billion in true value in 1981, up from \$941 million in 1980, according to Equalization Director Leon Thelen, in his preliminary report to the board of commissioners.

Overall, the county's average increase is 13.02 percent, said Thelen at the board meeting Monday morning, April 20.

Agricultural property, up 16.5 percent, showed the largest increase, followed by residential property up 8.9 percent and industrial property up 4.8 percent. Commercial property was up 1.6 percent, while development and personal property showed no increase.

Agriculture has a multiplier of 1.7 and residential has a multiplier of 1.3, while the other classes have multipliers of one.

In other business, the board adopted the 1982 tentative General Fund and Federal Revenue Sharing budget to be presented to the county allocation board that was to meet later Monday morning.

Property taxes are up six percent. Total revenue for 1982 is \$4,682,402, \$32,000 less than in 1981.

Expenditures for 1982 are \$4,910,082, up seven percent from 1981.

In other action, the board agreed the county planning commission have nothing to do with the Farm Land and Open Space Act with regard to farm land applications.

Contractor answers accusations

A vinyl siding contractor who works in the Clinton County areas has taken exception to an article warning residents to be careful when signing contracts to have jobs done on their homes. The story was printed in the Clinton County News March 18.

David Olson of Rockford Builders said his company has been working in the area for five or six years and is in good standing here. He said the men quoted in the article, John Hanlon and Doug Gardner, both of Grand Rapids, had been fired by his company. Hanlon and Gardner say they quit Rockford Builders and that Olson owes them money.

Olson said the litigation he was involved in in Grand Rapids was through a former business he operated with a partner and that the case took place over six years ago. He said he has been in the siding business for 21 years.

Checking done by The News revealed that Olson is licensed as a residential builder in the county and, while we found two complaints registered against him with the State Department of Licensing and Regulations and one with the Better Business Bureau in Grand Rapids, all three have been settled.

The Better Business Bureau said they had little information on the company because their queries to Olson had not been answered.

"A lot of times it wasn't our fault when people complained," Olson stated. "We do from \$400,000 - \$500,000 a year in business and you're bound to have some trouble." He said one complaint filed against him was when the home owners had painted over windows after a fire and were angry when they would not open and another case was when a sub-contractor left a job unfinished. "I'll bet the Better Business Bureau doesn't say, 'the claim wasn't justified,'" Olson said.

When checking with present and previous customers of Rockford Builders in the area, the Clinton County News found satisfied customers as well as unhappy ones. A St. Johns resident who pre-paid Olson \$4,800 on a \$6,800 job in late February waited five weeks to have the job started. This week the home is three-quarters finished, but Olson said the delay is due to difficulties in getting special sized windows for the home. He said companies are not stocking materials as heavily as they used to and

that any special size window takes from four to five weeks to be made and then shipping is sometimes a problem. "Everyone in this business has trouble with supply," he said.

A second couple who said their home was completed in a week and a half is concerned that materials used on their home were charged to their name and address, even though they had paid a substantial downpayment. They said they are still waiting for Olson to furnish them a lien release on the material, a guarantee on the siding and the forms necessary to get an energy tax credit.

Other people said Olson finished quickly or in a reasonable amount of time and they were satisfied with the finished job. They said Rockford Builders offered jobs at considerably less than other bids they received. Olson said he deals "right at the source"

in getting supplies so he can pass the savings on to his customer. "I pick up materials myself," he said, which saves in going through a lumber yard. He explained that he orders siding in such quantities that his supplier gives him free shipping which is also a saving to the customer.

Some former customers said they were not required to pay more than a third down to Rockford Builders before their job was finished. Olson said he had no standard way of requiring payment for his work, but tried to work out a system for each individual. "I try to organize that to the convenience of my customer," he said.

Olson said that he has had 17 jobs in the county this year and that all his jobs are referrals from former customers. He offers a \$50 rebate to customers making a referral that results in a job for Rockford Builders.

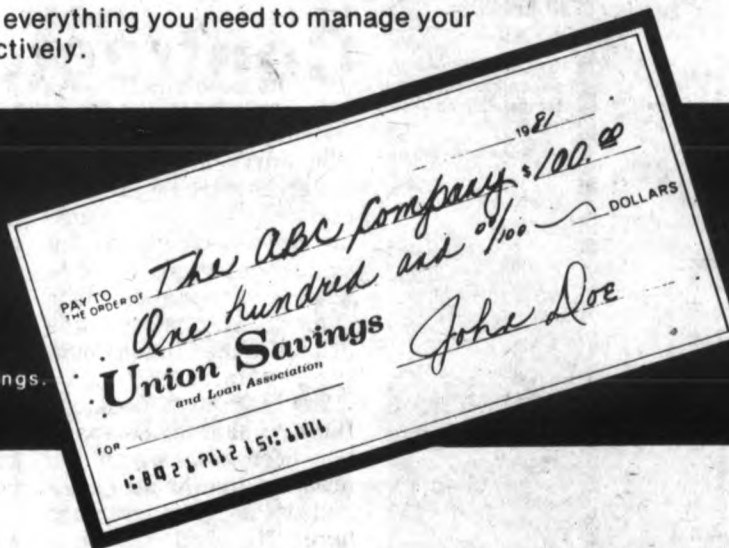
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Dr. Howe hospitalized

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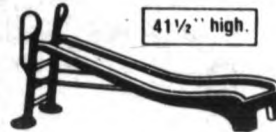

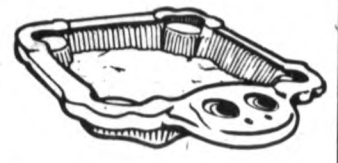

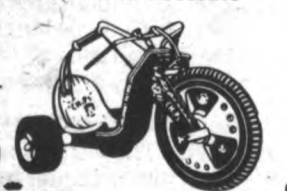

That urging by Miss Tranchell was to the right person. While Jeanne Rand does not like to take credit and the fact is that many, many people have helped, it is she that led the band wagon.

Her dedication is to be admired by all of the community. Now, what we must all do, is start the home for the aged project. The need is there and it will only increase.

When the fire whistle blows I often marvel at the short length of time it takes the firemen to arrive and the truck to be on its way.

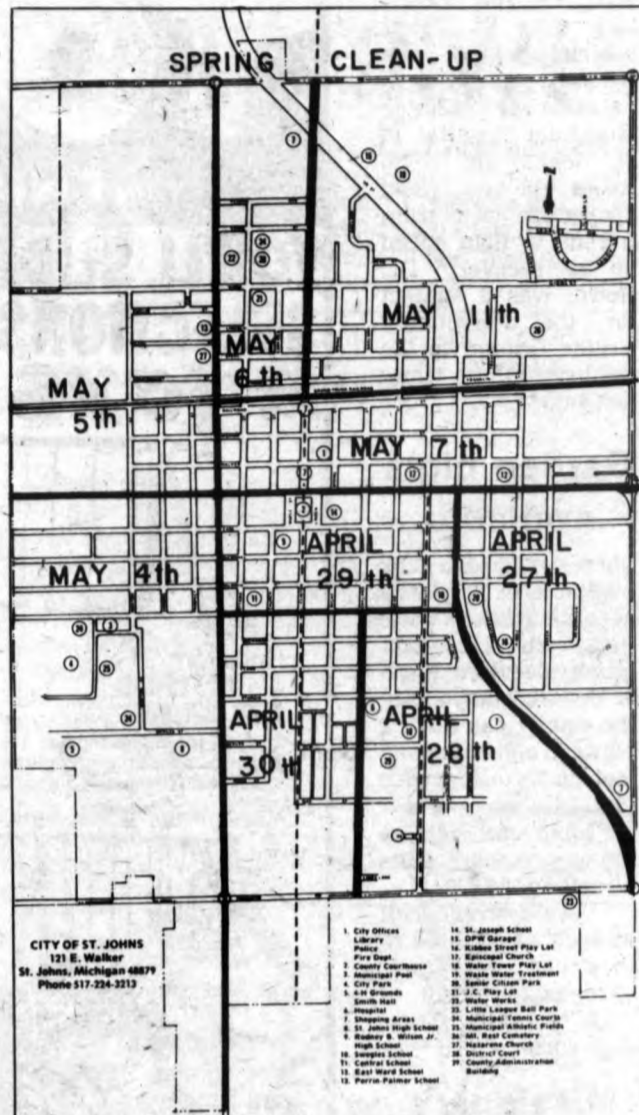
Saturday, it took just a little over a minute from the time I heard the whistle and I thought, "Maybe they

Ask the Judge

Question: After I die, I want my body to go to a state medical school for either transplant or medical research. Can this be done?

Answer: By all means. The Michigan Uniform Anatomical Gift Law provides that a competent adult may convey by gift or will, all or any part of his or her body following death. The law defines "state medical school" as the University of Michigan School of Medicine, the Michigan State University College of Human Medicine, the Michigan State University College of Osteopathic Medicine, or the Wayne State University School of Medicine. A gift of all or a physical part of the body may be made by will. The gift of a will-ed body becomes effective upon death without waiting for probate.

But the gift of a body may also be made in document other than a will. To be valid, a document must substantially conform to this form:

Under (a), (b), or (c) you may wish to consider if you want to designate a specific institution. Otherwise, a staunch Michigan fan might end up at State.

DeWitt's K8ZJU, she's ham of the year

You can call her a ham, you can call her K8ZJU, she's Lady of the Year for the State Amateur Radio Operators and winner of the Central Michigan Amateur Radio Club's Zeigenbein Award.

In plain English, she's Beverley Stoner of Airport Road, DeWitt, an avid and active ham radio operator with 20 years experience.

The state award was presented to Mrs.

Stoner at the state convention of Amateur Radio Operators in Muskegon recently. Last week, she became the first woman to win the Zeigenbein Award, named after Ralph Zeigenbein, an active member who was killed 20 years ago. The special award is given to the person judged most active in club and community activities.

Beverley's interest in amateur radio developed over the years as she watched her husband, Marion's participation in

the intriguing hobby. Marion has been a "ham" for 40 years. Last week he completed requirements and passed tests for the highest license attainable by an amateur radio operator, "amateur extra class." Beverley, who joined him in study and testing, passed her fourth class (out of five) "advanced" licensing which she said is tops for her.

"The fifth class license requires a lot of coding," she explained and she said she does not like that aspect of amateur radio operating. "You have to learn it, she said, referring to the International Morse Code, "but I like to use the microphone."

Amateur radio is the hobby of over 400,000 people throughout the world. It is a method of learning about electronics, and it gives its participants the opportunity to communicate with fellow citizens all over the world by short-wave radio.

Anyone can become a ham radio operator but must be licensed by the Federal Communications Commission. To get the license you must pass tests which require a knowledge of the regulations and some radio theory. An ability to send and receive International Morse Code is also required. The novice first class license requires only a five word-per-minute code test.

After passing the examination, the ham is then allowed to use the narrow bands of frequencies which are allocated exclusively for amateur operators. Transmission and reception may be by means of telegraphic code, voice, television or teletype, depending on the frequency, type of equipment and class of license held.

Mrs. Stoner said the aspects of ham radio operating are so varied that there is something of interest to every kind of personality. Some operators use code exclusively, others only send by voice. An operator can set up a "basic rig" including receiver, transmitter and antenna for about \$150 Mrs. Stoner said, but sophisticated equipment can cost up to \$5,000.

Amateurs provide many services to the public, they will send messages to any place in the United States free of charge; they work with Civil Defense and the Red Cross to provide emergency communications. Amateurs relay thousands of messages each month from servicemen to their families and friends at home.

Most message sending is done through a "net" which Mrs. Stoner explains as a meeting place on a particular frequency. She is the control leader of a net at 11:00 each day and said that a lot of military messages are handled by the people on it. She explained that the hams tune into the

net and pass messages along to the proper community where the telephone is used to relate a message to a particular family.

Most of the messages are to let a family know that the serviceman has arrived and that they are okay, Mrs. Stoner said. Sometimes it's to announce a birth or to pass along information in a family emergency.

Some nets are used for social purposes; there's a teenage net used this way, Beverley said, and others are used as a meeting place to exchange ideas.

"It all depends on your interest," Beverley said. "Some people only work DX stations (long distance) and some people may sit for hours waiting to get a message from a rare place."

There are also hams who are mainly interested in collecting QSL cards, which are postcards exchanged with people after a visit over the radio. "The cards are proof that you've talked with a certain ham in a certain place," she said.

"A lot of us use the radio for public service work," she said explaining an active group in the Lansing area that work a "weather net" and stay on the radio during severe weather warnings. One of the members, Jim Holcomb who is the Civil Defense Director of Lansing is stationed at the airport during a weather net and the hams call into him.

She also refers to amateur radio operating as "working the world" and said that through the radio a ham makes friends all over the world.

"The messages that we send and receive mean a lot to the participants," she said. "They are messages that make people happy, and that makes us happy."

She said that hams also get involved in relaying messages for things like foot races.

Mrs. Stoner is a member of the Central Michigan Amateur Radio Club, the Michigan QRP Club (which specializes in running on very low power) and the TASYLs, a group of female hams of which she is a charter member and editor of the club's newsletter.

She also finds time for sewing, knitting and other handiwork. She likes to garden and freeze and can the things she grows. Beverley her husband take along their three cats and portable ham radios when they go camping.

While FCC rules have eased up in the last few years due to de-regulations, the Stoners said the challenge is still in amateur radio operating. "It takes skill and knowledge to get a license and perform," Beverley said.

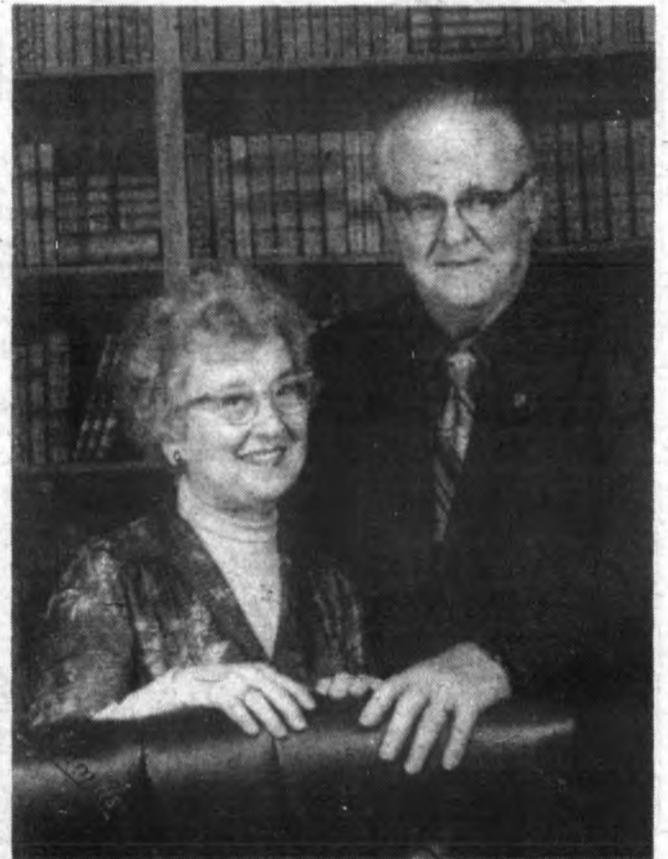

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Senior Center supporters say 'goodbye'

Maurie and Bernice Hoffman are leaving St. Johns. The well-known and loved couple, advocates of the federal nutrition program for senior citizens, are retiring for a second time.

They are off to a cabin in the woods near Lake, a small community in northern Michigan.

The Hoffmans came to St. Johns in 1975, making their home in the senior housing complex built by Fedewa Builders. Maurie had retired from Motor Wheel in 1972 and the couple decided to sell their home in Laingsburg where they had raised their five children.

They took to retirement like a duck takes to water and filled their days with meaningful activities. Maurie became the first male Red Cross volunteer at Clinton Memorial Hospital; they started driving other seniors to nutrition meals in Bath, DeWitt and Maple Rapids as well as St. Johns. They also drove medical "runs," taking older people to appointments. Maurie drove and Bernice went along as "co-pilot."

Their caring for others and their activity in senior citizen affairs soon earned Maurie spots on the Tri-County Consortium Board, RSVP and the Tri-County Nutrition Program. Last fall the couple were sent to a White House Conference on Aging held in Kentucky.

It was through participation in the various senior nutrition programs around the county that made them see the need for a senior drop-in center. Today the county seniors own their own building (with only a small mortgage), renovated by senior volunteer labor. Nutrition meals, which are low-cost, well balanced meals supported by federal funds, are held at this St. Johns site three days a week.

As the Hoffman's sat in these cozy surroundings last week, Bernice said, "It seems like a dream, now."

But the couple remembers all too well the tremendous effort that went into starting the first center two years ago. They collected 300

signatures from people who felt a center for seniors was needed. A grant that paid a director's salary was obtained but the seniors themselves were

responsible for upkeep, utilities, rent and all other expenses involved in the center.

They managed to get through their first year,

dollar by dollar. Income came in small amounts through raffles and bake sales and special events. Today those money making traditions continue and they are what keep the center going. On Mondays (except for the first Monday of each month) a public luncheon is held as a money maker. Monthly dances featuring the donated labor of the Stevens' Orchestra bring in funds.

The nutrition meals are important to the program but according to the Hoffmans the social aspect of the center is the prime im-

portance. "The biggest part is the social aspect," Maurie said, "and it always was."

"It does so much for so many people," Bernice echoed. "It helps a lot of people who are all alone."

In the years since the Hoffmans have been involved in nutrition meals they have seen many changes. It started as a free program; today seniors pay 75 cents for a meal. Maurie thinks the meals are even more nutritious. "They use more natural foods, no white

DeWitt managed to get just one hit off Werbish and had only two walks during the contest which was called because of darkness after St. Johns batted in the fifth.

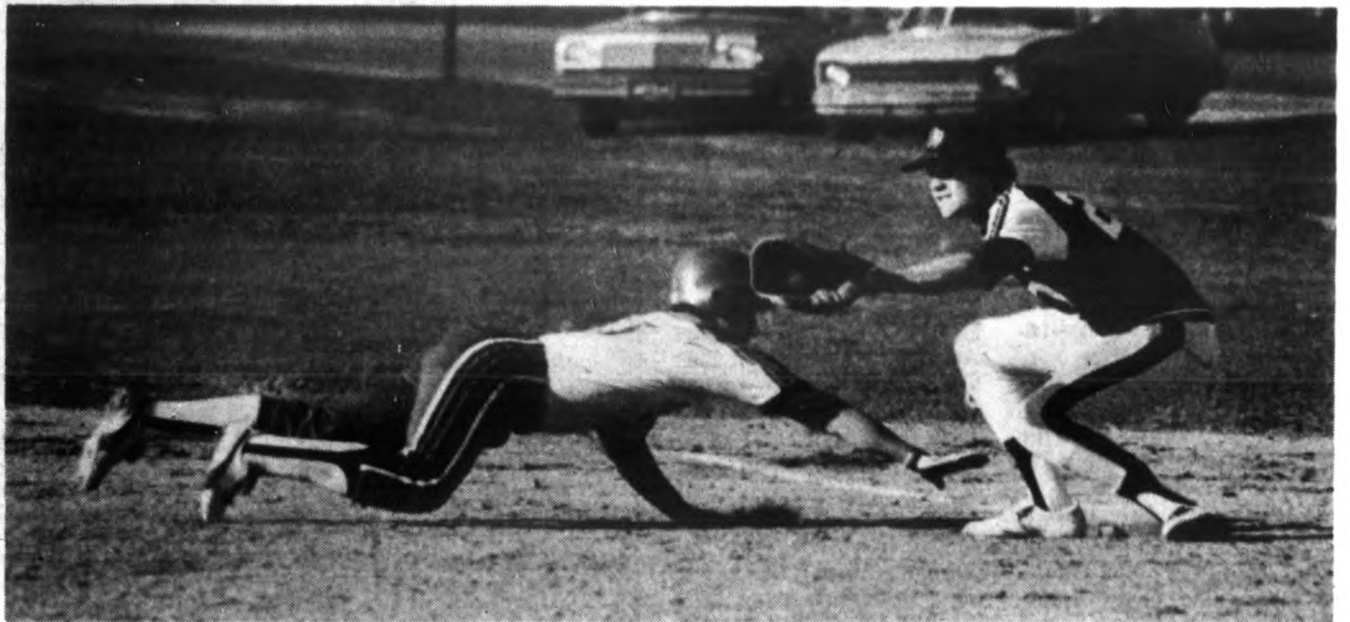
St. Johns had six hits off Panther hurler Tim Deak, but came up short 4-2 on the scoreboard.

tionships. Who develops a support system in the community consisting of a wide range of friendships from acquaintances, to mates, to confidants.

Physical health is characterized by a person who has lots of energy, who does not get sick, who is not accident prone, who eats, sleeps and generally feels well.

Traditionally we approach illness in terms of you're sick, you go to the doctor and get medication and fix it, that's it. A holistic practitioner would go one step further and explore other areas of his life.

"You would ask yourself, are you working too hard? Are you bored? Are you upset about something? Are you lonely?" Ms. Hall said. "To prevent further illness or chronic illness, it is necessary to address whatever is amiss in these other areas."

She explained that the whole idea is to look at discomfort in a different way. "What is this all about? Why am I feeling this discomfort? What needs to be different? are areas to be explored."

Westphalia has 'own' doctor

The tiny village of Westphalia, situated in the midst of some of the state's finest farmland, may not be all that big but it does have its "own" family doctor.

Dwight Schroeder, a kindly man who practices the art of family medicine, came to Westphalia nearly two years ago to work in the town's St. Lawrence Health Center. He promptly fell in love with the town and its residents and in December of 1980, opened a private practice there.

"I truly like small towns," Dr. Schroeder said. "The people are super here and, besides, I could see they needed a doctor."

Born in the equally small town of Mancelona in Michigan's northland, Dr. Schroeder began his career as a family doctor in the tiny community of Northport. A 1957 graduate of the Wayne State Medical School, Dr. Schroeder en-

joyed life in Northport so much that he remained in practice there until 1973 when he accepted a position as associate professor at his alma mater.

He moved to the mid-Michigan area in 1978 and took an instructor's post at Michigan State. There he remained until starting his own practice in Westphalia this past winter.

Schroeder's wife, Janet, is a third-year student at MSU's School of Osteopathic Medicine and Dr. Schroeder says she may well join him in the Westphalia practice upon her graduation.

Dr. Schroeder, himself of German stock, expressed pleasure with the Westphalia community and its 800-odd residents for their acceptance of his medical practice. Though he currently works days for the State of Michigan and only holds evening office hours, he said he fully anticipated being able to

offer a full-time practice to the Westphalia community in the near future.

"I'm really very satisfied with the manner in which things are working out," Dr. Schroeder explained. "They're going every bit as well as can be expected and the outlook (for a full-time office) is good."

That comes as good news for the community. It had been sometime prior to Dr. Schroeder's arrival since Westphalia last had its "own" M.D.

Dr. Schroeder anticipates that St. Lawrence Hospital in Lansing will gradually "phase-out" its clinic in favor of establishing another in yet another nearby small

town. He currently leases office space from the hospital which, in turn, leases it from a group of town residents. When the hospital does eventually pull out of Westphalia, Dr. Schroeder says he will begin leasing his office space directly.

"I came to Westphalia largely by accident," he noted, "but I'm glad I did. I wanted to work for myself again and, since I've spent all but six years of my medical career in small-town practice, I'm convinced there is no better way of life."

Becoming a part of the Westphalia community has proven a wise move for both Dr. Schroeder and for the town itself.

Amending Article 5, Section 5.2.6 of OR-1-78, The Clinton County Zoning Ordinance entitled Trailer Dwellings Prohibited.

This section is being amended to conform with a recent Supreme Court decision whereby the Court held that units of government could not specifically limit mobile homes solely to mobile home parks.

The amendment if adopted would allow mobile homes to be placed on individual sites in the A-1, Agricultural; R-1A, One-Family Rural Residential; R-1B, Low Density Residential and R-1C, Medium Density Residential zoning districts in the unincorporated areas of the County when the following standards are met which would ensure that said unit compares favorably with stick built housing:

A. The mobile home shall be constructed in accordance with the Michigan Building Code for R-3 or R-4, Residential Occupancies.

B. The mobile home shall be placed upon and secured to a permanent foundation in accordance with the Michigan Building Code and the manufacturer's installation instructions.

C. The wheels, axle and tongue which make transition possible shall be removed.

D. Skirting shall be installed if the unit is not installed upon a basement or crawl space. The skirting shall be in accordance with Act 419 of 1976, The Mobile Home Commission Act.

E. The roof of the mobile home has a pitch of at least 3 in 12.

F. The ratio of the mobile home length and width shall not exceed 3

to 1.
G. The mobile home shall meet dimensional requirements for the district in which it is situated as delineated in Article 6, Section 6.18, Schedule A of OR-1-78, The Clinton County Zoning Ordinance.

The text also allows mobile homes to be placed in designated mobile home parks and mobile home subdivisions when located in a RT, mobile home development district.

Secondly, the text would allow individual units to be placed on lots pursuant to approval by the Clinton County Zoning Board of Appeals for medical reasons or when a single family dwelling is damaged by fire.

Case ZC-15-81 - Text Amendment - Flood Hazard Areas

The entire section addressing flood hazard areas in Article 5, Section 5.10 has been deleted and replaced with language which complies with the regular phase of the Federal Flood Insurance Program.

The purpose of the Article is to significantly reduce hazards to persons and damage to property as a result of flood conditions in Clinton County, and to comply with the provisions and requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program, as constituted in accord with the National Flood Insurance Act.

A summary of its contents are as follows:

1. The text delineates the flood hazard overlay zone.

2. The text sets standards for a development permit and sets standards for flood hazard reduction.

3. The text sets base flood elevation standards.

4. The text sets standards for mobile homes in flood prone areas.

Part II Article 3, Section 3.5.2 has been amended by adding a new section (F). The section requires the submittal of certain flood hazard area application information.

Article 3 has been amended by adding a new Section 3.3.8, which specifies flood plan management administrative duties.

Article 4, Section 4.4.4 has been amended by adding a new Section E which delineates the powers and duties of the Zoning Board of Appeals pertaining to mapping disputes.

Article 4, Section 4.4.5 has been amended by adding a new Section D which specifies duties and powers of the Zoning Board of Appeals pertaining to variances.

Section 5.10.9 has been added which relieves the County of Clinton for any liability pertaining to flood damage.

Article 14, Section 14.1 (F) has been amended by defining the following terms:

1. Area of special flood hazard
2. Base flood
3. Development
4. Flood or flooding
5. Flood hazard boundary map
6. Harmful measures
7. Mobile home
8. New construction
9. Flood plain
10. Substantial improvement

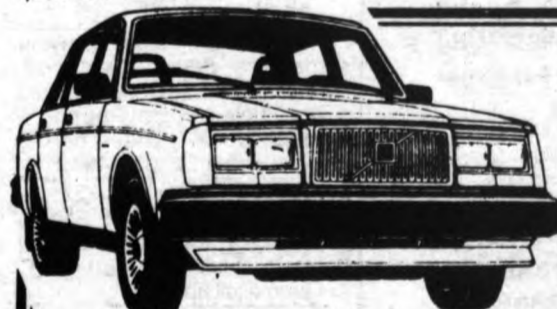
