## Board approves, rejects use permits

Two special use permits were approved by the Clinton County Board of Commissioners Tuesday morning, while another request was soundly rejected.

The board approved a request by Standard Aggregates, Colony Road, St. Johns for a special use permit to allow an aggregate mining operation on the northeast corner of Colony and Chandler Roads in Duplain Township. This decision concurred with the recommendation of the planning commission. The land is presently zoned agricultural production.

Two requests for seasonal fruit stands were also brought before the commissioners. The first, a request by Round Lake Fruit Farm on Round Lake Road was approved. The petitioners had converted a pole barn that was originally constructed for the storage of equipment to a farm market. Farm markets are permitted in the agricultural production district, but according to zoning regulations require a special use permit.

## Farmers view tax cut

Over 60 area residents gathered at Smith Hall in St. Johns Monday night to hear Ron Nelson, legislative counsel for

Michigan Farm Bureau, and Rep. Alan Cropsey explain how Proposal A, the tax reform proposal, would pluck the goose.

Proposal A reduces property taxes at the time of payment by cutting the property tax 50 percent on occupied homesteads on operating millage. It requires full reimbursement to local governments of the tax loss due to the 50 per

cent cut. It would raise the sales tax from 4 percent to 5.5 percent with all of the increase earmarked for return to local government.

The proposal also limits yearly property tax revenue growth to 6 percent, forces further cuts in State spending and allows assessment of farm land on

## White Cane drive starts

Local Lions Clubs will be selling miniature white canes, May 1-10 in the their annual drive that attempts to raise money for sight programs and draw the public's attention to two laws dealing with the unsighted.

According to Norman Beauchamp, chairman of the St. Johns drive, the public should be aware of two Michigan laws: 1) requiring all motorists to

stop at least 10 feet from blind persons carrying White Canes; and 2) requiring all public facilities to permit a blind person with a Leader Dog in harness to enter or use their premises.

Monies collected during White Cane Week are used to support the projects and institutions of the Lions Clubs. They go to the Leader Dog School in

Rochester which "graduates" 350 dog-student teams yearly; a home for aged blind persons; eye banks at Wayne State University and the University of Michigan, which assist in the restoration of sight; glaucoma clinics, eye examinations and numerous local community services, including the sight mobile and assisting needy citizens who need glasses.

In DeWitt Lions will be at the central four corners of the downtown area, at the Shop-Rite and Country Meadows Shopping Center, Friday, May 1 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday, May 2 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

St. Johns Lions will be out those same days, in the downtown area and at shopping spots including the IGA store, Krogers, Fishers Big Wheel and Arnolds. Beauchamp said this year's goal is \$1,000.

Bath Lions will be out two weekends, May 1 and 2 and again May 8 and 9, standing at major spots around the community, said Eric Hall, publicity chairman.

The new shopper will be introduced May 4, when 80,000 of the advertising publications will be delivered in the greater Lansing area including Clinton County.

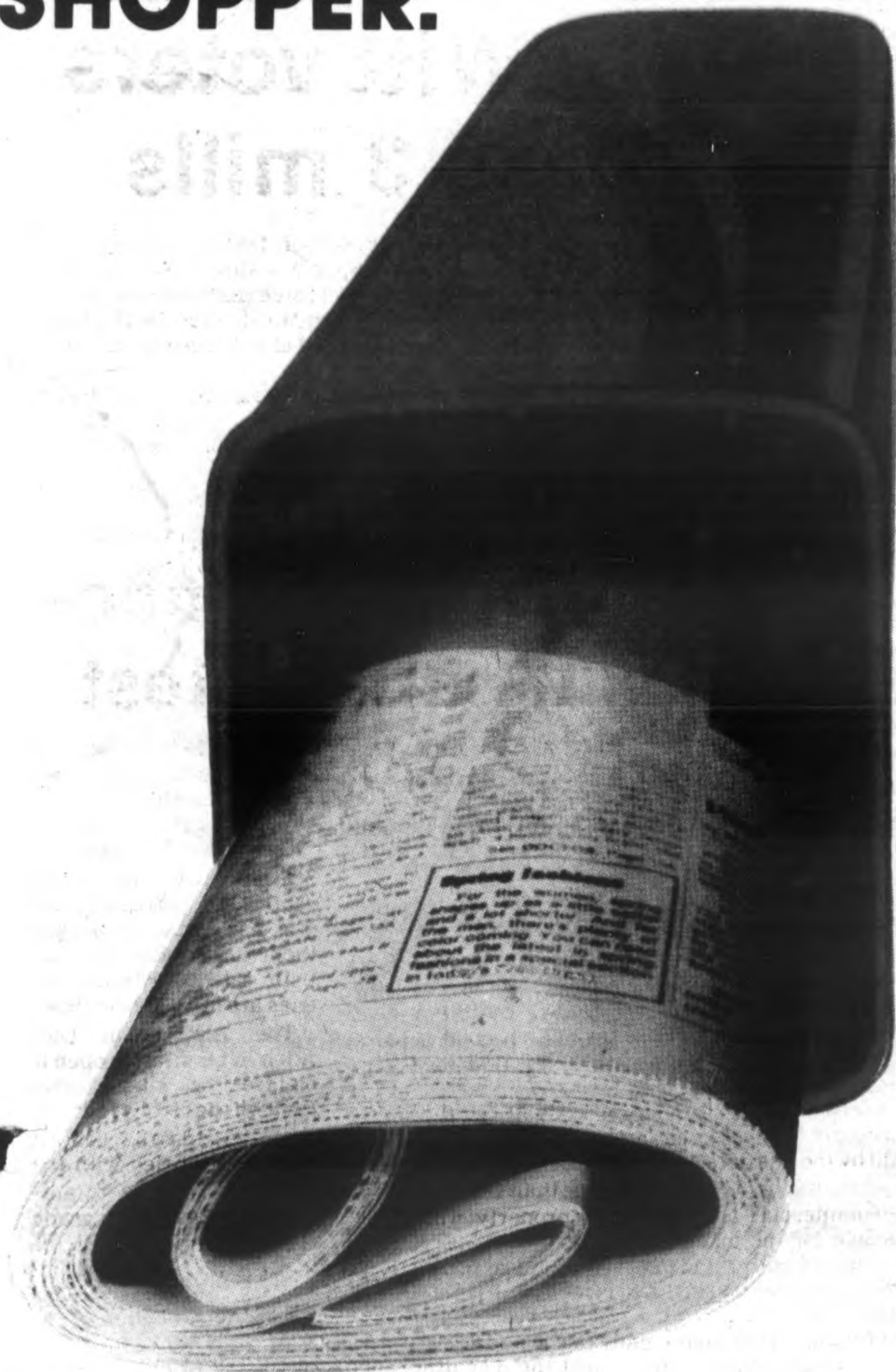

## City looks at refuse changes

The St. Johns City Commission is looking at a new method of financing residential garbage pick up and eliminating commercial and industrial garbage service, but has tabled the plan so residents can respond at or before the next meeting.

The new plan, according to City Manager Randy Humphrey, is expected to provide a fairer user-pay type system at a lower cost to the average property owner.

At present, the city levies a three mill property tax to finance garbage pick up and disposal. This tax is the same for all property and does not take into account the amount of solid waste generated by a particular property or the amount of service provided. For example, vacant property pays as much tax as a property with a dwelling. Businesses with small amounts of waste, pay as much as businesses that generate large quantities of waste.

Humphrey said most cities have gone to the user-pay type system and said St. Johns is looking at a plan being used successfully in Mason. Each property owner will pay a fee that bears a relationship to the amount of service received.

Except for the method of payment, little would change with the new system, according to Humphrey.

## DeWitt voters pass 3 mills

Voters in the DeWitt School District passed two millage proposals on the April 27 ballot which included the renewal and an additional three mills for five years. About 1183 voters turned out on Monday for the election. This is approximately one-third of the registered voters in the district.

"We feel very good about the passage of additional millage," said Steve Garrett, superintendent. "especially since a lot of other districts aren't passing millages."

Proposal I which was the renewal passed 907 to 248 or

Since Magnolia Week coincides with National Music Week, members of the St. Johns Morning Musicales, which is an affiliate of the National Federation of Music Clubs, will host a special tea, Wednesday, May 6 from 2 to 5 p.m.

Members of the club will also be on hand that afternoon to play the museum's cottage organ. A display of antique music and instruments, some on loan from members of the

music club, is in the dining room.

The museum is open until 8 o'clock on Wednesday and at 7 p.m. a slide presentation of early paintings from county artists will be shown. The show will also be shown at 4 p.m., Saturday, May 9, when the museum is open

Victor Township is on exhibit in the Township Room; there are new gifts on display; and a beautifully carved Baptismal Font from Fowler's Holy Trinity Church is on loan to commemorate the centennial of the church.

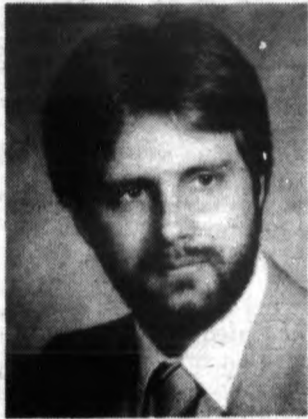
## Tournament heat

## ASK YOUR PHARMACIST

**Question:** I've been thinking about getting a jump on summer by visiting one of these new tanning booths that are springing up all over. But I wonder, can I get a nice, safe tan from one of these places?

**Answer:** The answer to your question is yes and no. A tanning booth can give you just as good of a tan as the sun can. However, a dark tan from any source is not necessarily safe.

The light used in a tanning booth is made up of two different types of ultraviolet radiation, ultraviolet-A (UV-A) and ultraviolet-B (UV-B). Unlike the sun, the light emitted from a tanning booth is mainly UV-A. This is probably fortunate since it is the UV-B type that causes skin cancer. This is not to say that the UV-A is completely safe. Although it hasn't been proven, many researchers feel that it is responsible for premature aging of the skin.

I guess the real answer is that although a nice tan may look healthy, excessive exposure to sunlight, whether real or artificial, is not necessarily good for your body. However, the tanning booth does offer a couple of advantages over the sun. First, since most of them use mainly UV-A light, the risk of skin cancer is probably lessened. Secondly, the exposure times at these places are carefully regulated to build up tolerance, something that is not always done by sunbathers.

There are a few precautions that you should take before getting your artificial tan. First, even though some may claim it isn't needed, wear proper eye protection, not only to prevent eye burn but also to eliminate any increased risk of cataracts. Next, use a tanning lotion to protect parts of the body customarily unexposed to the sun from sunburn. Also, if you are on any medication, check with your doctor or pharmacist to see if it will increase your sensitivity to the sun. Finally, use common sense and don't overdo. The skin is the largest organ of the body so please treat it kindly.

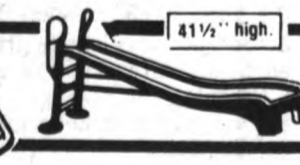

## Our opinion

### Bring 'em back

Declining enrollments are hurting school budgets as much if not more than inflation but according to figures from the St. Johns Community Education office, the district has from 600 to 1,000 more eligible students.

They are students who have dropped out of school at one time or another. They could enlarge enrollment figures and thus bring more state aid into the district, if only they could be found; if only they could be encouraged to come back to school.

Community Education Director John Furry says a reasonable estimate, based on population figures, would be that from 600 to 1,000 adults without a high school education live in the St. Johns district.

The trick, of course, is to find them and to establish program hours that will fill their needs. This year the Community Education program expanded to include daytime hours and that has proved to be an important move in helping citizens with afternoon and nighttime jobs and obligations "come back to school."

Another pressing need, and Furry recognizes it, is for child care of some kind for mothers with young children. Furry said his program will hopefully be able to provide more things in the near future, like auto mechanics and licensing; more business classes.

He said a new focus will be on career planning and changing of careers and re-training.

Furry estimates that 600 adult students without a high school education could bring as much as \$510,000 into the district if they returned to school half-time.

Without a doubt a "Come back to school" community movement could help school finances while helping adult students find out that they really "can do it after all," Furry maintained.

A community effort to encourage these adults without a diploma to enroll in high school completion courses, would enhance the school districts financial position tremendously.

If you can find a friend or neighbor and bring them back to school to enroll in adult classes for credit, you would help increase revenues by \$425 for one night; \$850 for two nights; \$1,275 for three nights and \$1,700 for four nights, according to Furry's figures.

Perhaps this is an alternative to increased millage. The students are out there, the teachers and facilities available. Let's help find them. Let's build up our student population. Let's become a community where everyone has a high school diploma.

# Seminar to teach employability



On May 14, the Chamber of Commerce is hosting an employability and job search seminar. The seminar will be held in the Community Room of Capitol Savings and Loan from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. There will be an admission charge and anyone interested in sharpening their employability skills is welcome.

The program will consist of Lansing Community College personnel from four departments and a panel of local employers and community representatives.

The Lansing Community College staff will address such issues as how to interview; how to write a resume; how to fill out a job application with accurate and concise information; and how to find a job to fit you. They will provide a look at career fields which are or will be in demand, as well as information on where the jobs are.

The local panel will provide participants with information on what they look for on applications and in interviews. They will give tips on training. The panel will also answer questions.

It is no secret that it is hard to secure a job today. Whenever a vacancy occurs in any job market, employers are deluged with applicants. Many people

are entering the job market for the first time or re-entering after a lapse of a number of years. Some of these people are high school graduates and some are people who suddenly find themselves in need of employment. This workshop is aimed at all these groups.

Without any advertising of any kind, Union Savings and Loan received over 100 applications for two part-time jobs in their new office here.

The percentage of job vacancies filled from want ads is very low, less than 10 percent, and the more avenues an applicant can use to find employment opportunities the better the chances of finding a position. ## Senior Citizen Update

I have had several phone calls telling me the household hints I have given before were what they liked. So here are a few more.

**Cleaning the blender:** add a few drops of detergent, fill halfway with hot water and turn on for a moment, rinse and dry.

**The breadboard:** rub a cut lime over the surface to remove onion, garlic or fish smells.

**Broken eggs:** if you drop an egg on the floor, generously sprinkle salt over it and let it stand for 5 to 10 minutes and then sweep the dried egg into a dustpan.

**Iron skillets:** use commercial oven cleaner for the outside of the pan, let it stand for several hours and then wipe off grime. Rub oil inside the pan to season it.

**Copperware:** clean with toothpaste and rinse.

**Dishwasher:** run a cup of white vinegar through the entire cycle with dishwasher empty to remove soap film.

**Glass vases:** dampen the interior and sprinkle with toilet bowl cleaner, after 10 minutes wipe clean.

**Aluminum pans:** boil water with some white vinegar in pans with dark stains on the inside.

**Refrigerator odor:** a cotton ball soaked with vanilla or an open box of baking soda set on the lower shelf will eliminate odor.

# Personality Profile

## He makes volunteering a fulltime job

For most people volunteering is something which is done in one's spare time. For Ken Kralik of St. Johns, volunteering has become a way of life.

When Kralik became a member of the St. Johns Jaycees a couple of years ago he never dreamed his involvement would snowball into working with the 10 organizations. He estimates he spends about 40 hours a week doing some kind of volunteer work.

"Service organizations did a lot for my family when I was going up," he indicated. "I knew that someday I would pay them back."

Kralik seems to be paying back what his family received from the people in his hometown of Manistique more than two-fold now that he and his wife Vickie have made their home in St. Johns. In addition to being a member of the Jaycees, Kralik is active as a trustee for a volunteer first aid group, the Exchange Club, youth baseball, chairman of the St. Johns blood mobiles, in charge of sustaining membership drives for the Boys Scouts and the United Way, a member of the Council for the Prevention of Child Abuse, a firefighter, on the advisory board of the Senior Citizens and a member of the Chamber of Commerce.

The young man is employed as assistant branch manager of Capitol Savings and Loan of St. Johns.

"I guess I have spread myself a little thin," he said with smile. "Right now I'm in the process of establishing my priorities...finding out what I really want to do."

Kralik came to St. Johns three-years-ago from Lansing. Prior to this time he spent a year in VietNam while serving in the Army.

"With the position I had here at the Capitol, I felt I needed to become better known in the community," he said. "What better way is there to become known than to volunteer."

Ken and Vickie have also helped their 13-year-old niece who was neglected and abused by her own parents, by taking her in as one of the family. Ken says working with the Council for the Prevention of Child Abuse has really helped in dealing with and understanding the situation.

A beeper sits on Kralik's desk and halfway through the interview it went off. It could have meant the St. Johns fire alarm had gone off and he would have to don a helmet, rubber coat and boots over

his business suit, on his way to fight a fire.

As it turned out the the alarm was for another department.

"I joined the fire department because I felt there wasn't enough excitement in my life," said Kralik. "I found out not too long after moving here that they were a dedicated group of people, so when they asked me to join I didn't take too long to think out it."

So far he hasn't had to leave a customer when the alarm has gone off, usually it's when he is in bed or when he gets home in the evening.

"Being on the fire department is my fun time," he commented. "It's definitely exciting and makes me feel good to be a part of the organization."

Kralik's attitude is to take life day by day and if something can be put off until tomorrow it is. If not, well, then he sits up at home and does the job until it is completed.

"It's a hectic style of management, but somehow things seem to get done, I just can't answer how."

Ken and Vickie are the parents of a two-year-old son Justin. Ken says it "breaks his heart" sometimes when he can't spend all the time he wants with his wife and son, but he knows eventually he will have a lot more time to spend with his family.

"Vickie understands this is something I need to do," he said. "We've been able to talk things out and she agrees what I'm doing is for the betterment of our community."

Kralik says he has a big responsibility to kids. That's why he is involved in some many activities dealing with children.

"The way I look at it is, if through my involvement I can get at least one kid to be half as active as I am in the community then it is worth the effort," he said.

The way Ken looks at service to his community is, "if you've got the time it's your obligation to work for your community."

"I'd rather do volunteer work than have the government say we are going to have to pay for these services," he said. "Too many people run to Lansing or Washington with their problems instead of handling them locally. In my opinion that's what causes more problems."

It bothers Kralik that more people aren't as active in their community, but what is especially worse is people who are members of an organization and are not active.

"It really bothers me when we're working on a project and we run into a snag because we can't get enough people to work," he said. "The majority of people my age aren't involved at all, and that hurts."

Kralik tries to keep Saturday afternoon and Sundays open so he can spend time

with his family. His only other outside activity is trout fishing, which he does once a year.

Kralik was recently nominated for Volunteer of the Year. He received a certificate of recognition.

"I just enjoy what I'm doing," he said.

79 percent of the electorate voted yes.

Proposal II (three additional mills for five years) passed with 54 percent of the vote, 620 yes to 523 no.

Proposal III (three additional mills for three years) lost by a vote of 416 yes to 671 no or 38 percent of the people voted yes.

Proposal (the Headlee limitation) also failed 528 to 596, with 47 percent of the voters saying yes.

"The board of education is very appreciate of the support the voters gave to the district," said Garrett.

Although part of the millage package passed some cuts will have to be made. The superintendent is projecting the amount of those cuts will be at the same level of cuts that were made this year.

"The amount of cuts made will depend a lot on the status of the budget at the end of the year," said Garrett. "We will try to make as balanced cuts as possible."

It is expected the school district will have a deficit of \$211,000 at the end of the 1980-81 school year.

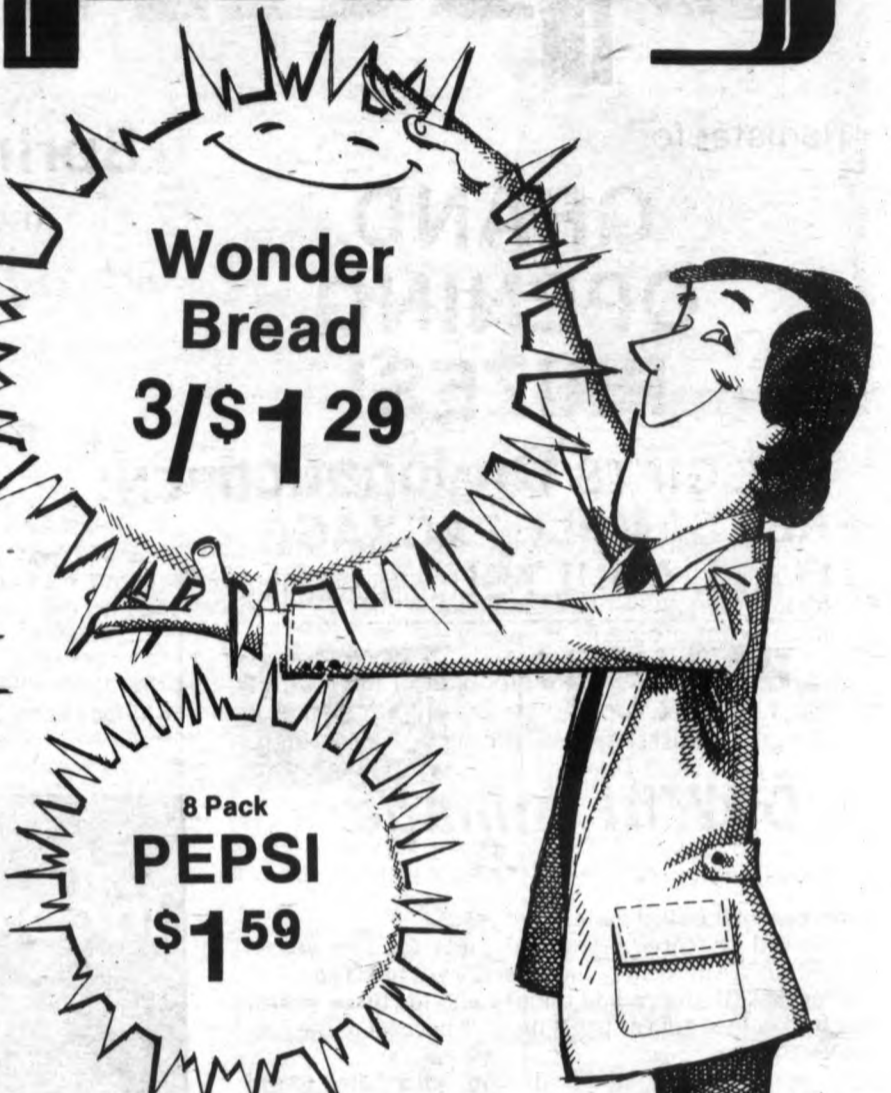

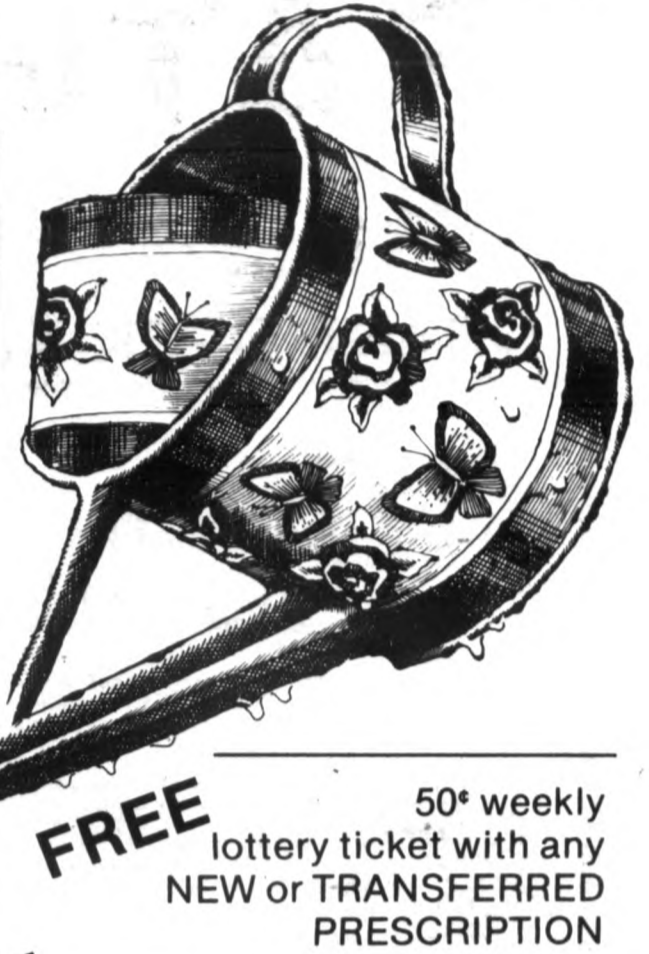

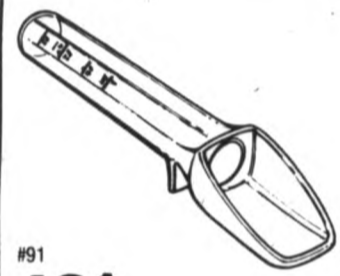

Walter pitched the first three innings for P-W. He batted and walked in the bottom of the third and stole a base, then when he

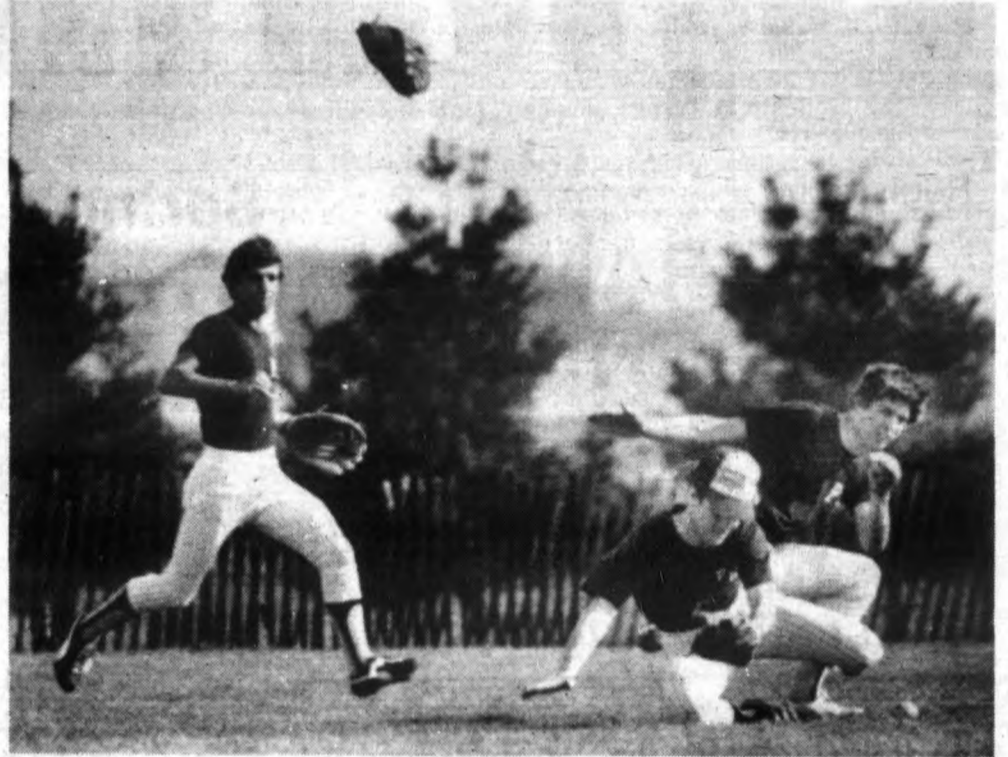
came out to pitch the fourth frame, Coach Steve Spitzley watched him walk the leadoff hitter on four pitches and elected to call on Thelen.

its "use value."

Nelson explained the Farm Bureau position in support of Proposal A, while Cropsey explained why he does not support the proposal.

Under the proposal, farmland would be assessed on its value for farming instead of on its market value. Farm Bureau says this is a step in the right direction, explained Nelson. He added this Constitutional change is especially important to farmers.

After all taxes are shifted under the proposal, the State will have to cut

spending by more than \$250 million to make up for the entire property tax cut.

Cropsey said the tax cut affects homeowners and agriculture, but not commercial, and that is his primary objection to the proposal.

"Businesses don't have anything in this proposal to keep them in Michigan," said Cropsey. "In the long run, for the state as a whole, I don't think it is a good proposal because of the employment and business climate," he added.

The forum was co-sponsored by the Bureau and the Cooperative Extension Service.

**Embargo over; farmers elated**

"Michigan farmers greet the news of President Reagan's action ending the Soviet grain embargo with elation," said Elton Smith, president of the Michigan Farm Bureau in a Monday news release.

Smith reacted to the Friday announcement that Reagan was lifting the U.S. limitation on additional agricultural sales to the Soviet Union with enthusiasm for what he called "long overdue action."

"This Long overdue action will allow farmers to

make wiser management decisions regarding their future plantings," Smith said. "It also sets the stage for us to start rebuilding our image as a reliable source of agricultural products in the world market. Perhaps now we can begin to gain back some of the \$3 billion loss the grain embargo has cost American farmers."

The head of the state's largest farm organization said the nation -- and particularly Michigan -- needs a viable, growing

agriculture "and there was no way we could realize our fullest potential with the burden of the embargo holding us back."

Reagan's action fulfilled one of his campaign promises, a promise that farmers were confident he would keep if he did not allow himself to be influenced by Secretary of State Haig.

"President Reagan's action reinforces our faith in his word -- and our hope that he will leave future decisions regarding agriculture in the hands of the one person on his cabinet who knows and understands the needs and challenges of the agricultural industry," Smith said.

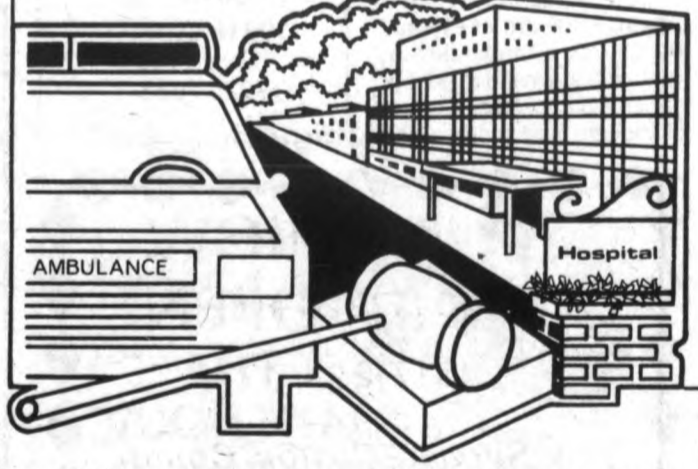

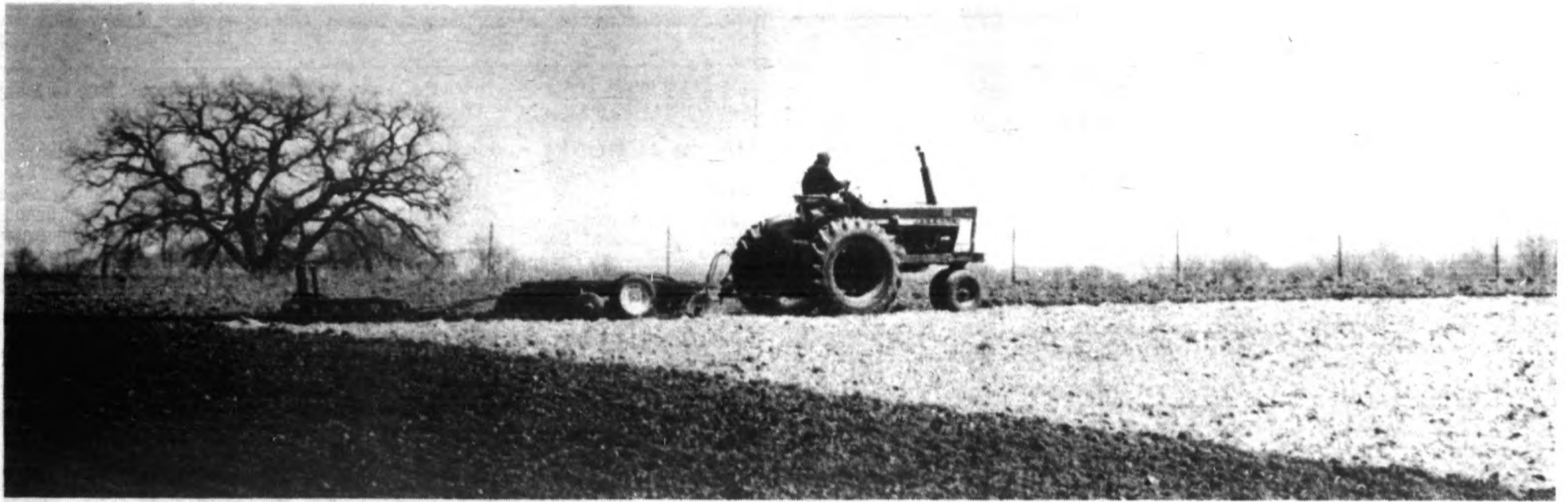

Bud Nobis, commissioner was the only board member to vote against the request.

"A person shouldn't have to get a special use permit to have a seasonal farm market in an agricultural district," commented another commissioner Richard DePond.

Jack Nelson, director of developmental control, indicated this was a more intensified use because it deals with not only products grown on the Round Lake Fruit Farm but also other products.

"Maybe someday we'll wake up to the fact that if we want business in Clinton County we shouldn't penalize them for starting a business," added Nobis.

Another request for a seasonal farm market by Lloyd Moody, Eagle was denied by the board because there was not adequate parking facilities and the additional traffic volume could not be handled by the private drive leading to the market.

There were six letters submitted by residents opposing the farm market and one letter from a neighbor not opposing the operation.

A grain elevator project was given preliminary approval by the board to begin construction in Eagle Township near the Eaton-Clinton county line. The grain will be moved from the county by train.

John Williams, president of the company called Westmac noted the elevator will be 185 feet high and eliminate many farmers from having to go to Toledo to have their grain hauled.

The elevator has a 2.3 million bushel capacity and is a spurline of the Chessapeake Railway system.

"This will save about 600,000 of diesel fuel per year," said Williams.

The elevator will employ five fulltime people and 12 fulltime people at harvest time.

Some commissioners expressed concern of this new elevator putting existing elevators out of business.

"Smaller elevators do a different kind of service for the farmers," said Williams whose business is based in Newaygo.

Commissioners Glenn Webster and Nobis voted against the elevator project.

Members of the Clinton Development Corporation were at the meeting expressing concern over liability now that they were not directly in charge of any employees.

Chairman of the Board Roger Overway indicated the county was gearing down in its operations and fundings because they were getting less monies than ever before from the federal government.

The board voted to look at the situation and study costs factors to determine if it would be possible for the Manpower office to handle the employees.

B. An approved anchoring system shall be installed on each mobile home, in accordance with rule 605, 606, 607 of the Mobile Home Commission rules as amended.

D. All internal roads shall be surfaced in accordance with AASHTO standards.

E. Road widths have been delineated.

F. Curbing shall be installed on all internal roads.

G. On-site vehicle parking has been regulated.

H. Individual mobile home site fuel oil systems shall be underground.

Ordinance No. 6 becomes effective the day following its approval by the Department of Commerce. The effective date is April 18, 1981.
