## Litigants split on latest score

Even after the smoke cleared it was hard to tell which side had emerged victorious following the latest exchange of legal salvos between Granger Land Development and the People's Action League (PAL).

"We won one-and-a-half and lost one-half," PAL President Jan Look said of her group's effort to stop Granger from developing a hazardous waste disposal site in Watertown Township.

But according to Jerry Granger, the tally was reversed following Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen's decision in St. Johns Wednesday, July 25. "I don't know how they scored it, but of three motions, two went our way. If they had granted their motion it would have knocked us out of the batter's box. We were really encouraged by the fact that they didn't knock us out of the batter's box," he said.

Granger's attorneys filed the lawsuit against PAL in October, 1981, after losing to PAL in a bid for a Special Use Permit (SUP) before the Clinton County Zoning Board of Appeals. The SUP, which would allow Granger to expand their Watertown Township landfill to include an additional 90 acres for disposal of hazardous wastes, had been approved by the county board of commissioners, but was rejected by the county planning commission and the zoning board of appeals.

Three motions were before Tahvonen July 25. The first, by Granger attorney Gary Trepod, asked that an affidavit from former PAL President Eric Kauma be rejected as evidence. Tahvonen agreed to strike Kauma's affidavit.

The second, filed by PAL, asked Tahvonen to reject Granger's lawsuit because the firm did not file their appeal of the zoning board decision on time, and argued circuit court is not the proper place to decide the matter. Tahvonen rejected the motion, and, according to Ms. Look, said circuit court is the proper place for Granger to seek redress.

The third motion was not decided, leaving the lawsuit in limbo for at least another 50 days. Filed by Granger, it asks for a summary judgement that PAL had no standing to argue before the zoning board of appeals, hence that board's decision should be overturned.

Both sides claimed the judge's decision to let them file briefs over a period of 50 days was to their advantage, but Ms. Look and Trepod also admitted the final decision could go either way.

"We have maintained our standing before the zoning board of appeals," Ms. Look said. She said PAL would now be able to enlarge on the minutes of the zoning board of appeals meeting to prove the group had standing before the board.

But Trepod said Tahvonen's schedule leaves the door open for a decision favorable to Granger. He must file more complete briefs outlining Granger's arguments within 20 days. PAL must respond within another 20 days, and Granger gets the last word 10 days later.

Trepod was also encouraged that the suit had not been rejected. "PAL tried to have us thrown out of court, but that was denied," he said.

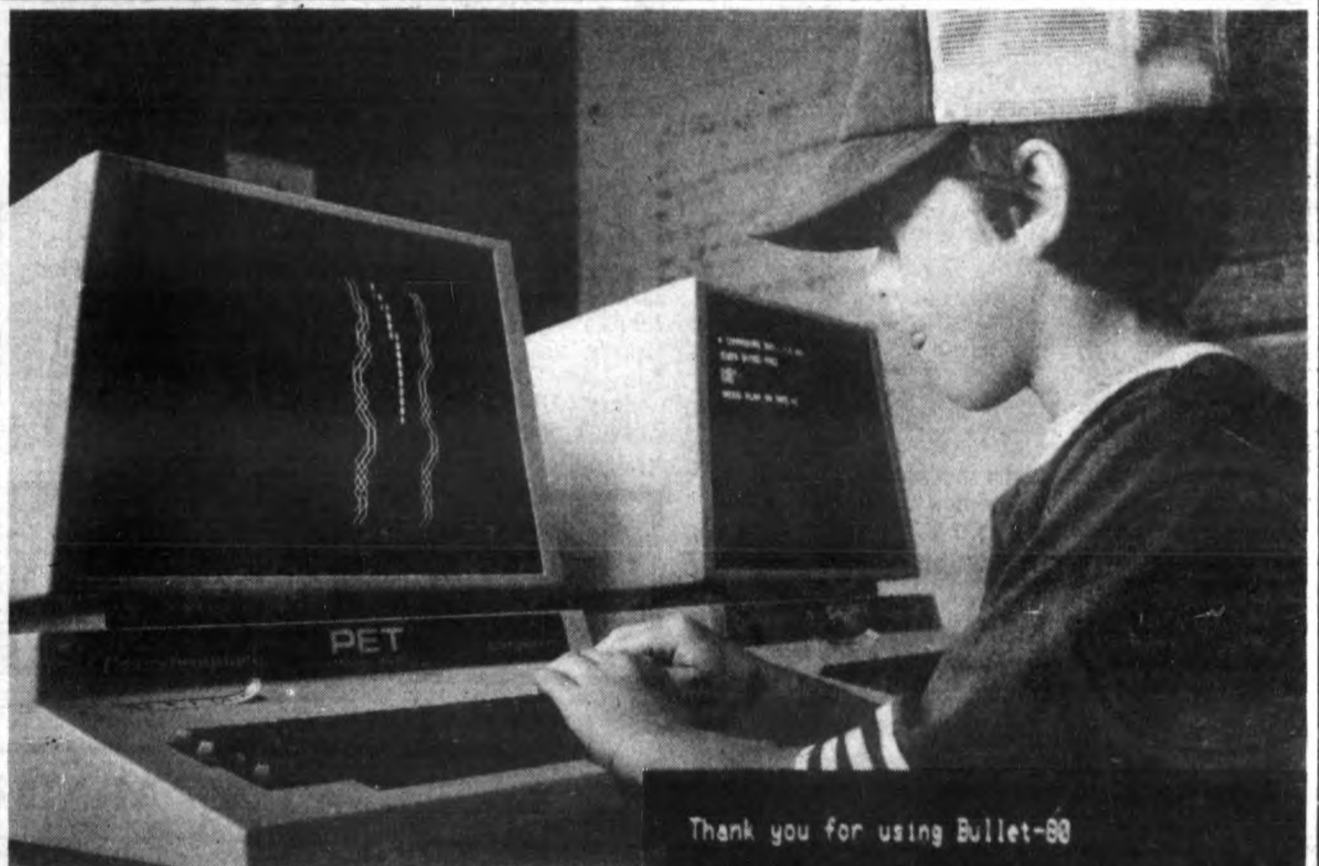
Trepod is also defending Granger in a suit filed by PAL in Ingham County Circuit Court which, he says, could end up in the Supreme Court. In that suit, now before the Michigan Court of Appeals, Judge Ray Hotchkiss barred Granger from obtaining needed permits from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources until legal problems are settled.

"We can do all the construction we can do, but we can't get the permits to operate," Granger said.

Granger's original SUP for operation of the entire landfill expires Sept. 19, he said, not on Aug. 3 as believed by PAL officials — an earlier appeal period was not included in the permit's elapsed time.

Both sides say they have no intention of giving up their long and costly legal battle. Watertown Township has asked voters on Aug. 10 to approve mills to develop a local zoning ordinance, which could regulate Granger's future. At present, though, local zoning is just "a fairytale," Ms. Look said, and restrictions on Granger must be imposed through legal channels.

But Granger said his firm already abides by state restrictions and is one of the best managed landfills in the state. "The bottom line is that people have to have a place to get rid of their refuse someplace," he said.

## Computer fear? Try CRV's cure

In offices conquered by the computer revolution, terms like "hardware," "menu" and "memory" have taken on new meaning. But for every convert, somewhere lurks a resistor: the type with "terminal" aversion to computers, who gets sweaty palms in the presence of Pacman and thinks "software" is plastic eating utensils.

But now there's hope for those who suffer from computer-phobia. Victims of almost any age — and a surprising number who are hooked on computers — can be found upstairs at the Community Resource Volunteers (CRV) office. Kids can be found watching screens that don't show "Dukes of Hazzard," as adults type out orders and commands which are — usually — instantly obeyed.

Ah, yes, computers can be wonderful. So says Bill Richards, who has organized computer classes at CRV for three years now. Richards introduces kids age six and up to the magic of micro computers, and helps adults reprogram their attitudes about working in an increasingly computerized world.

"All we've said is we want to do an awareness class about computers," Richards said. "We're not going to make programmers or word processors out of our

students, but we can make them more comfortable around computers.

"We try to tell the adults they shouldn't panic."

As anyone who has ever played Space Invaders can testify, computers can be fun as well as efficient. At CRV, students use games to learn. For example, they can learn a mini-lesson about the economy by programming their own lemonade business, or they can use a keyboard of graphics symbols to design computer art.

The entry fee of \$12 includes 10 hours of instruction — by one of five computer terminals programmed to teach beginners how they work — and a tape on which to record students' work.

Richards said the classes have attracted more students this year than ever before. Some are kids who love working with computers and come back each year — one teen ranked computers second to girls, another says sports and computers are all he's interested in. Others are working men and women who know they will soon be expected to operate keyboards hooked to screens and all of the hardware and software that goes with them.

What they will probably discover is what those using them already know: even computers can make mistakes.

## Chick pleads guilty in ingot theft case

One of the organizers of a theft-ring which took ingots of tin from St. Johns' Federal Mogul plant and sold them in Detroit and Chicago pleaded guilty July 26, just one day before his trial was scheduled to begin.

Larry Lynn Chick, 31, of 10136 S. Ely Hwy., Perrington, entered a guilty plea to a charge of aiding and abetting larceny of property more than \$100, according to Clinton County Chief Assistant Prosecutor Richard Koenigsnecht.

"At about five o'clock Monday night (July 26), he decided he'd plead guilty to the one charge," said Koenigsnecht. "His trial was scheduled to start at eight or nine on Tuesday morning. You can speculate forever on why he pleaded guilty. He might have thought there were a lot of risks if he went to a jury trial. He just thought it was the right thing to do."

According to Koenigsnecht, Chick admitted to havng

handled over \$60,000 — more than any other person involved in the incident — during the time the theft-ring was operating.

The thefts began sometime in 1979 at Federal Mogul, a company which manufactures bushings and parts for engine bearings. A lengthy investigation was then launched, using employee-surveillance cameras to videotape the thefts. The first arrest in the case was made in late 1981.

Approximately 12 people have already been sentenced in the case, with three or four more still awaiting prosecution, said Koenigsnecht.

"The other people convicted have been getting about one year to 18 months," said Koenigsnecht. "But those were different charges from Chick's." He said the maximum sentence Chick could receive is five years and a \$2,500 fine.

Sentencing has been set for Aug. 23.

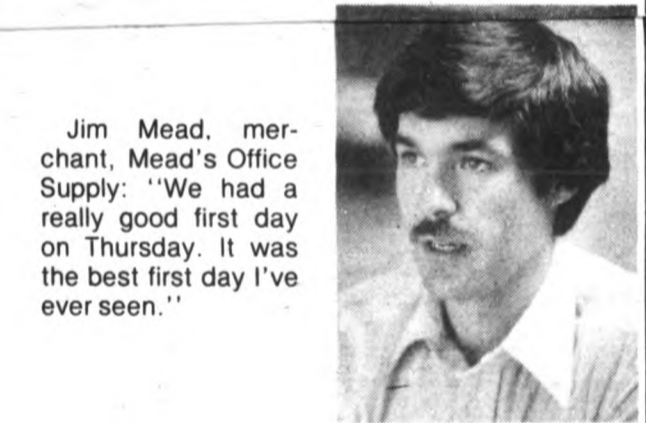

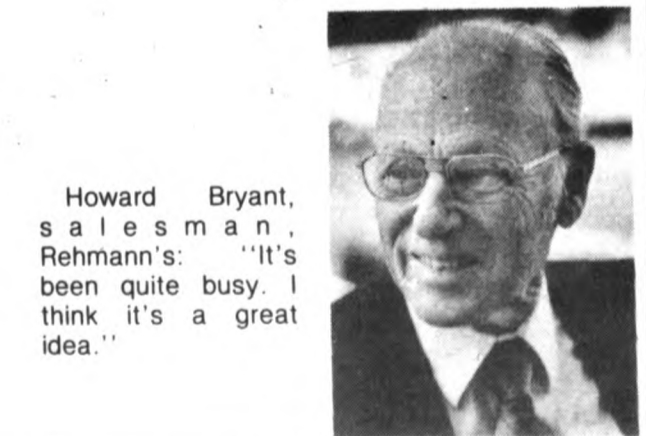

# School board not convinced about setting policy

New St. Johns School Board President Robert Craig couldn't convince fellow board members of the need for standing committees during a special meeting Tuesday night, July 27. They decided to continue appointing committees only when they are needed.

"There is a real value in having standing committees," Craig said. The board discussed the need and value of standing committees before adjourning to closed session for a discussion of teacher and employee contract negotiations. (See related story.)

But other board members were not so sure. Leonard Puetz and Peter Apostal both expressed concern that standing committees can become too administrative. Puetz recommended that they be appointed as needed, ad hoc, and his motion was approved.

Board members also discussed new ideas for the shared-time building trades program and a change in telephone systems.

High School Principal Bill Swears said he may have a solution to problems the building trades program has been having. Students in the program build houses, but the homes, like others on the market, have been hard to sell.

"Our concerns are with the poor marketing of these homes," Swears said. So, late last February, Swears and others began looking for a buyer for the soon-to-be built house. Instead they were confronted by a proposal from Royce Jordan.

Jordan, with the help of architect Terry Adams, has offered to supply house plans for the program along with financing to back construction. He also has offered property and a mortgage, leaving only labor and equipment to be supplied by the school. Board members decided not to make a decision until the proposal has been submitted to an advisory committee, but expressed optimism and approval of the offer.

Board members did, however, take action on bids from several phone companies for installation of a new phone system. They accepted a bid from Inter-connect Telephone Inc. (IT&I). IT&I will install a 16-line system with one central St. Johns High School number. There will also be two lines for long-distance calls to Lansing. The entire system would work from a central switchboard and no extra help would be needed, board members were told. The system is expected to cost an additional 14 percent.

Springing up again on the agenda was repair of the Central Elementary School roof. Gordon Vandemark obtained bids and offered his recommendation.

His backing went to Norman Rademacher, who bid \$12,260 to repair the tower, 200 feet of cornice, 400 feet of replacement roofing, repair existing gutter and 20 feet of install 20 feet of new gutter. Rademacher's bid was compared with Jerry Hufnagel's offer of \$18,005. Vandemark also recommended D.C. Byers Co. to do tuckpointing at a price of \$4,950. Board members accepted and passed both of Vandemark's recommendations. The work is scheduled to begin Aug. 16 and proceed while school is in session.

Vandemark then went on to discuss the bids for summer cleaning of Central and Perrin-Palmer Schools and asphalt bids for the high school parking lot.

The summer cleaning contract was given to PJS Commercial despite Vandemark's recommendation to stay with the previous company, Hur-Q-Clean Inc. Board members decided in favor of PJS' lower bid of \$1,550 compared to Hur-Q-Clean's \$2,335 bid. No decision was made as to which company would receive the yearly contract.

As for the asphalt bids, board members decided in favor of Vandemark's recommendation that \$34,000 be established as a ceiling for asphalt repair expenses. He said that amount would pay to begin patching the badly damaged surfaces at a cost of \$12.30 per square yard by Spartan Asphalt Paving Company.

Board members then adjourned to closed session at 10:45 p.m.

## Credit card fraud case

# New Yorker pleads guilty in scam

A 24-year-old man from Brooklyn, N.Y. has pleaded guilty to use of a stolen credit card, following the sentencing of his partner for possession of a stolen credit card.

Arthur Haynesworth pleaded guilty after his accomplice, Claude Lee Gibbs, 25, of Brooklyn, was sentenced to two years and six months to four years in prison.

According to Clinton County Chief Assistant Prosecutor Richard Koenigsnecht, the two were operating a phony credit card operation which covered five states and netted them over \$30,000 in the Lansing area alone.

"What they would do is obtain a credit card, through stealing them or whatever, and then they would use the cards to obtain money from banks," explained Koenigsnecht. "The numbers on the cards checked out, so the banks didn't know. They usually got \$450 to \$500 each time."

Koenigsnecht said the two made 55 different transactions in this area before being caught. "Gibbs is a veteran at this — he has a record," said Koenigsnecht. "Haynesworth was new at it, though. Basically, Haynesworth got nervous, and that's why we got them."

Haynesworth faces sentencing before Clinton County Circuit Court Judge Randy L. Tahvonen on Aug. 23.

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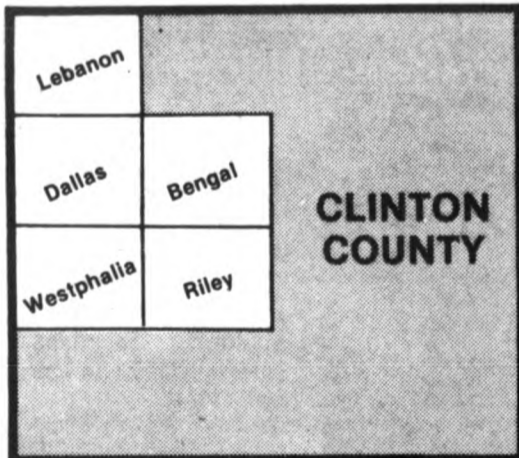

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# Fowler woman robbed

An armed robbery at a residence in Fowler and an East Lansing man arrested for drunk driving were among the incidents reported by Clinton County law enforcement agencies this past week.

The Rolfe vehicle then struck a vehicle driven by Robert Lutz, 59, of Corunna, police said. Gurden and his son, Jason, were both taken to Sparrow Hospital, where Jason was treated and released and Ronald is still a patient, according to a hospital spokesperson.

Rolfe was also treated and released at Sparrow. Lutz and three passengers in his car sought their own medical attention. DeWitt Township Police are investigating why Rolfe's vehicle was crossing US-27 when Gurden's vehicle hit it.

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# Fun is the key in St. Johns T-ball

It's the bottom of the third inning and the Wolverines are at bat against the Bears. Damon Wilcox of the Wolverines squints through the sun and looks out at the fielders. He adjusts his grip on the bat and eyes the ball. Damon takes a deep breath and then swings, connecting for a double over the pitcher's head.

Two runs score and the Wolverine bench erupts in a series of yells and high-fives. Who's winning? Who cares?

This is the world of T-ball in St. Johns, where fun and learning are the names of the game and no score is kept. But after a seven-run inning, the Wolverines are having a hard time keeping this in mind.

"Seven runs! We're winning!" shouts one of the Wolverines.

Coach Barb Wilcox hears this and admonishes her squad, "You root for the team, but don't worry about the score. The most important thing is you're learning how to play good baseball."

In addition to the no-score rule, there are several other distinctions which make St. Johns T-ball unique. Like the tee.

Because the youngsters playing T-ball are just six and seven years old, hitting a pitched ball is not the simplest of tasks. To solve this problem, the players are allowed to hit the ball off an adjustable rubber tee which stands at home plate. The result is a game where almost everyone hits and few strike out.

Another difference between T-ball and regular baseball is the ball itself. When six-year-olds start throwing baseballs around, there is no telling who or what will suffer. So to alleviate any possible problems, a soft, spongy baseball is used.

There are also 10 fielders on a side, as opposed to nine, and the outfielders position themselves much closer to the batter — just about even with the bases. And while men do the coaching on most other youth baseball teams, many of the coaches in this league are women.

"Because they play so early (9 and 10:30 a.m.), most of the men are probably at work," says St. Johns Recreation Director Rod Lounds.

Six boys teams and two girls squads make up the T-ball league, now in its third season. The boys are scheduled for seven games each, while the two girls teams play each other every Thursday morning.

"We don't keep records or anything or keep score," says Lounds, "because at that age, it's kind of ridiculous. They're just out there to have fun."

And while the players like to keep tabs on their run total, the no-score rule doesn't seem to bother them. "Everyone's kind of competitive," says Mrs. Wilcox, "but they don't really mind not keeping score."

Sometime, though, the players just can't rest until they know which side scored more runs. "They always want to know who won the game," says Becky Worrall, a coach on the Bears. "We always tell them it was a tie game."

Six teams — a six-way tie for first place. Just what every last-place team would love.

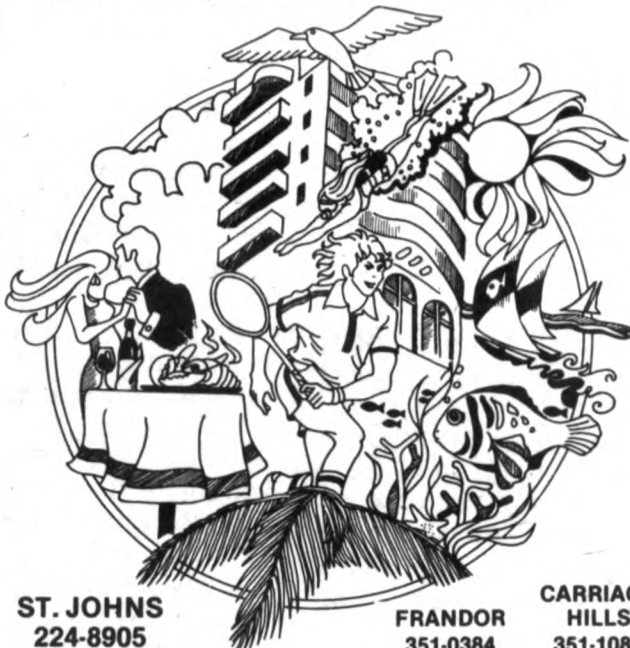

# Tax limitation vote could save dollars

During recent election years, voters have been bombarded by proposals and amendments to raise local millages, cut taxes or place limits on state spending.

When Clinton County voters go to the polls Aug. 10, however, they must take a close look at the Property Tax Limitation Referendum. This proposal will not cut property taxes, nor will it increase them — it may, however, save the county some tax dollars by eliminating the need for regular meetings of a tax allocation board.

The county collects a total of 15 mills regardless of whether the proposal is passed or rejected. The referendum, if passed, will merely establish the traditional division of the 15 mills for the next six years.

This will save the cost of paying tax allocation board members their expenses to meet regularly to do the same thing

# Election letter rule gets re-explained

We received several letters from readers during the past week which we are prevented from publishing by our letters policy.

Several weeks ago we outlined and explained our policy concerning letters prior to elections, but we would like to reiterate some points for those who may wonder why their letter was not included.

First, we will not publish form letters from candidates or groups.

Second, we do not publish letters which simply endorse a candidate without addressing any issues in the campaign.

Third, we will not publish letters in the final edition before an election which may prompt a response or rebuttal from an opponent or opposing faction, since no time for such reply would be available prior to election. The only exception to this rule concerns letters which introduce new evidence or arguments while responding to a previous letter.

This is our final edition before the Aug. 10 primary, and several letters had to be omitted for one or several of the above reasons. We welcome your letters following the primary in response to our opinions or to those of others and will continue to publish letters on candidates and issues up to the week before the general election in November.

# Allen deserves nod in 30th

Dick Allen and Al Cropsey are slugging it out as Republican primary opponents seldom do, and local voters have a rare chance to see beyond the personal attacks to some significant differences on important issues in their 30th District State Senate race.

Both men have plenty of experience in state government — Allen as 30th District State Senate incumbent and Cropsey, his challenger, as representative of the 88th State House District.

The two do vary on many important issues, however.

On abortion, we support Allen's pro-choice stand. We believe, as he does, that this moral decision should be left to individuals, and should not be outlawed or regulated by the state.

On the state income tax, Allen voted for a temporary tax increase, which he says was the only alternative. Cropsey opposed the increase and says he has filed suit to block the increase. We support the tax increase, and support Allen's vote, if not his reason: In fact, the legislature had plenty of opportunity to come up with alternatives: the state's financial crisis has not been news to any during the last legislative session, or for several before that, we hope.

A temporary tax is needed to preserve the integrity of many state programs which could unravel without sufficient funding. Although unwelcome — bad always is — the TEMPORARY tax is necessary.

Cropsey has also made an issue of welfare spending. Unfortunately, "welfare" has become a perjorative term which can include all kinds of programs, including many cherished by those who complain loudest about government "handouts." In Michigan, our astronomic unemployment figures mean these very programs are needed more than ever; also needed is a new awareness about what these programs accomplish to eliminate the knee-jerk reaction to "welfare."

We do agree with Cropsey that many areas of state government — particularly universities and schools — are top heavy, staffed by an unwieldy ratio of administrators to employees. Here is a legitimate area where spending could be cut, and we hope Allen takes note.

However, we feel Representative Cropsey's views on state government — that there is wholesale government waste, that many institutions thrive on too-fat budgets, that many of our problems can be solved by cutting social services in favor of other programs — are simplistic and outdated, designed to appeal to taxpayer's pocketbooks, not to their best long-term interests. Significant cuts have been made in many areas, and most have seen their affects or felt them in profound ways.

Issues facing Michigan are complex. Your waste in government may be my essential program. Seeking a path through our state's economic swamp will require cooperation and communication in both parties and between parties. We fear Representative Cropsey's stand is too inflexible, his politics too individual.

We support Dick Allen and urge Clinton County voters to vote for him on Aug. 10.

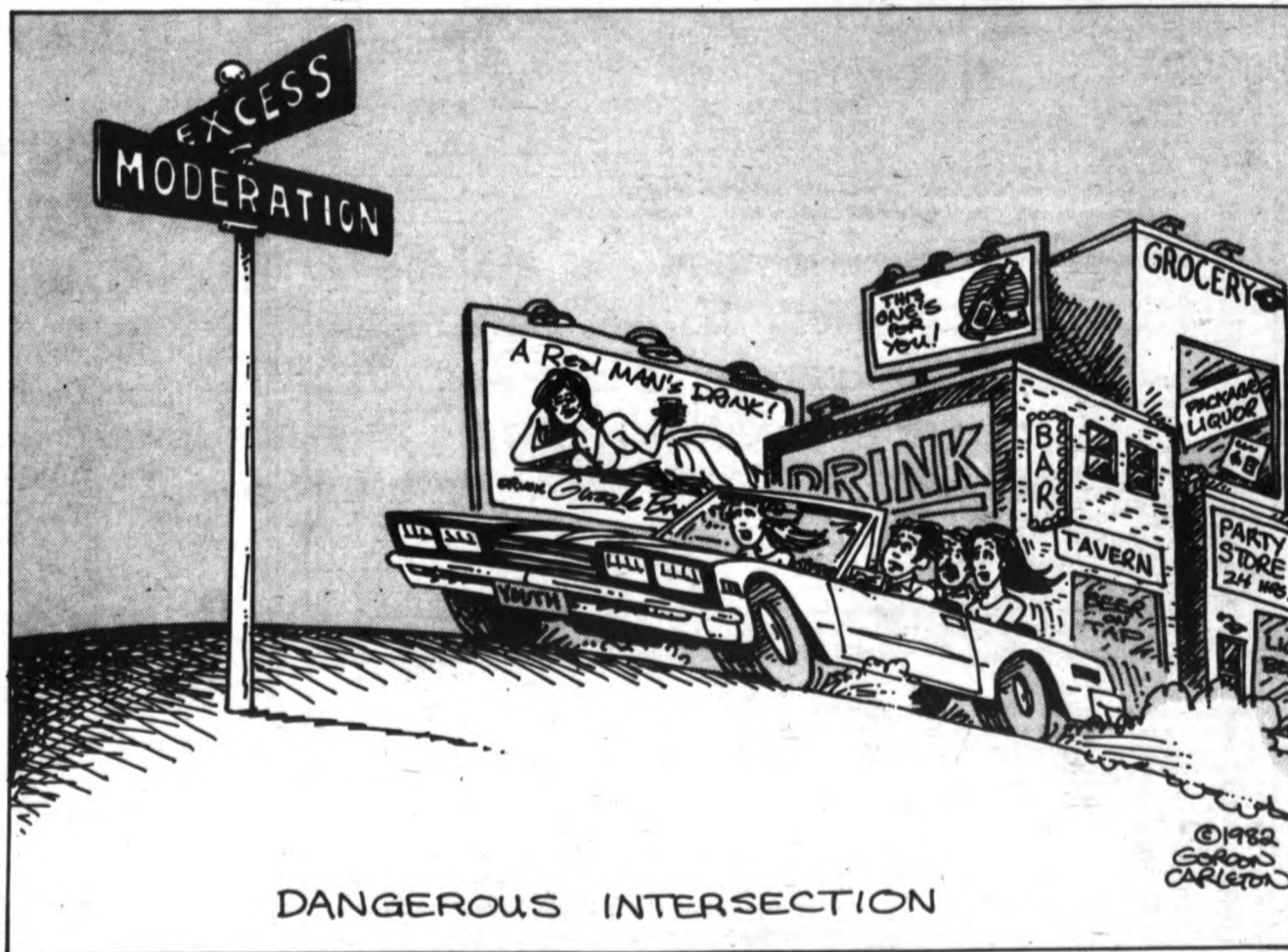

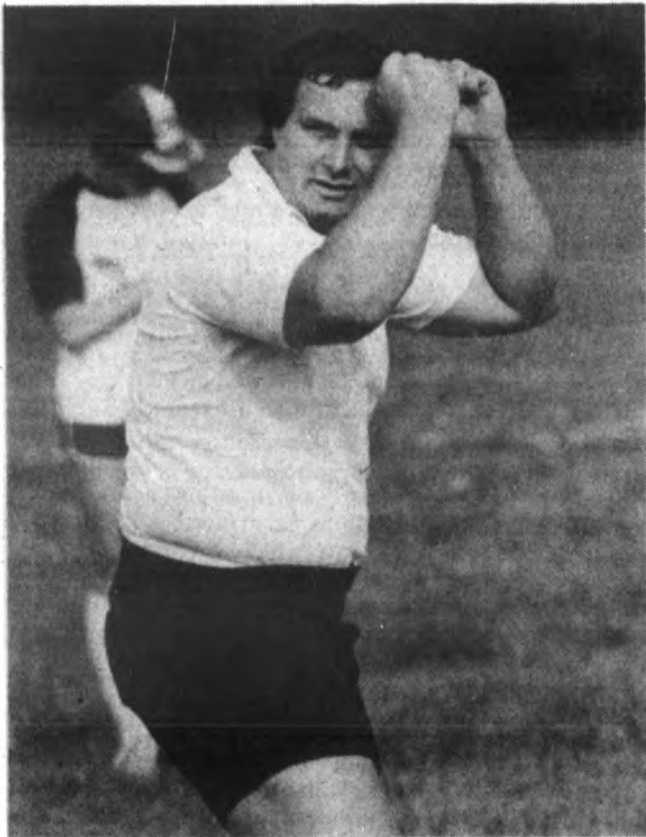

## Bath needs grid coach once again

It's already starting to become a habit. For the third time in as many years, the Bath High School football team will be starting the season with a different head coach.

Bill Waters, who succeeded Gary Grady as the Bees' field boss last year, has resigned to take a job at an Atlanta high school as a teacher and assistant coach.

"I'm glad for Bill," said Bath Superintendent Ken Dyer. "But we're really sorry to see him go. He did a real nice job for us. He had a good rapport with the kids."

But Dyer said whoever gets the job will not be in a particularly enviable position. "It's going to be hard for whoever comes in," he said. "He'll have to familiarize himself with the program, get his assistants, and do all of that in just a couple weeks. It's not going to be easy."

Waters, the son of Michigan State University football coach Muddy, compiled a 3-6 record in his year at Bath.

You have to feel a little sorry for head coach Steve Spicer and his Fowler Eagles. Not only did Spicer lose the majority of his starters from last year's squad to graduation, but he also lost one of his top returnees to a knee injury.

Dave Koenigsknecht, who started at quarterback last year before being switched to tailback, injured his knee last season and — on a recommendation from his doctor — won't be suiting up for the Eagles this year. Koenigsknecht is probably the best high school long jumper in the state, and he has decided to concentrate on track for next year.

"Anytime you lose a kid of Dave's caliber, it's going to hurt you somewhere," Spicer said. "We're really going to miss his speed."

And as if that weren't enough, Spicer might also be forced to play without the services of another top returnee, running back Glen Feldpausch. "Right now, Glen is wavering between playing and not playing," Spicer said. "He doesn't know whether or not he wants to play football or just concentrate on basketball. We're really hoping he'll play for us."

There are, however, some starters from last year's 6-3 squad who will be back. Not many, mind you, but some. The short list is headed by senior Dale Wohlfert, a first-team All-League selection at defensive end last season. Spicer looks for Wohlfert to help carry the defense this year.

Another key returning player is co-Captain Mike Fox. Fox will start at defensive and offensive tackle for the Eagles. The other captain is Jim Farley, who will also be a two-way starter, playing defensive back and tailback.

Aside from those three, however, the rest of the Fowler lineup is filled with question marks. Some players who Spicer is sure will be starters include tackle Doug Simon, defensive tackle-center Jeff Koenigsknecht and nose guard Dean Stump — all seniors.

Some juniors who should be able to contribute heavily include offensive guard-defensive end Scott Rowell, defensive-offensive end Dan Hufnagel, offensive end-defensive back Scott Ruhl, quarterbacks Steve George and Bob Simon and offensive-defensive back Tom Simon.

"At quarterback, Steve George, Bob Simon and Tom Simon are all going to be battling it out," said Spicer. "They're all good players."

There will also be two sophomores on the Fowler var-

sity this season. Dan Simon will play linebacker and Bill Kohagen will play wherever Spicer decides he fits in best. "He's a big kid and he can play a lot of positions," Spicer said.

"We don't have a lot in numbers," the coach said. "We'll only have about 23 kids playing. And only eight of those are seniors."

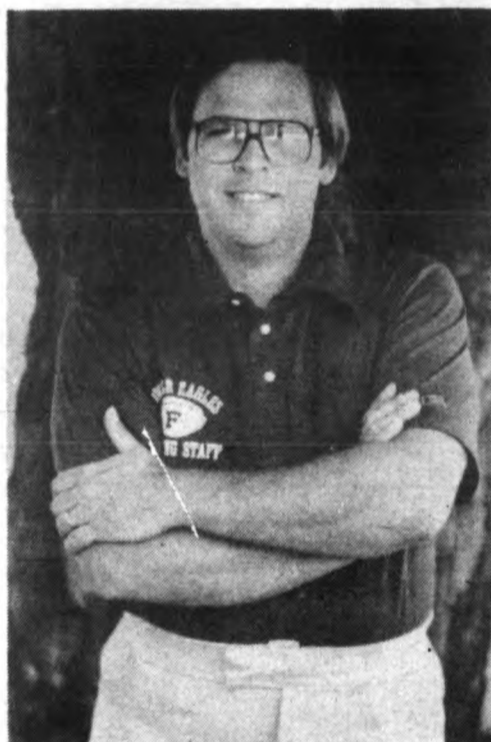

# Hengesbach out for season after surgery

For Lansing Community College basketball player Warren Hengesbach, the season has unfortunately already ended.

Hengesbach, a 1979 graduate of Pewamo-Westphalia High School, will be out for the season after badly injuring his knee during a practice July 26. He underwent knee surgery the next day, according to LCC coach Art Frank.

"Warren was running down the court and he went to catch a pass," Frank explained. "The pass was a little behind him, though, and when he turned, he misplaced his foot and just twisted the knee. He had been pretty injury-free through his whole career."

As a result of the accident, Hengesbach suffered a severed cruciate ligament and some cartilage damage.

The surgery on July 27 was performed at Lansing

General Hospital by Dr. Herbert Ross and included a revolutionary new ligament transplant which makes Hengesbach's future much more optimistic.

"Before, the recovery rate for an accident like this was about 10 percent," said Frank, "but with this new technique, it's about 80 percent. His surgery went well."

But even if Hengesbach does recover fully — as Frank expects — the 6-2 forward-guard will definitely have to sit out the 1982-83 season. And that could put a damper on Frank's aspirations for a national junior college championship.

For in Hengesbach, the Stars had a player who averaged 15 points, seven rebounds and three assists a game. He was named the Most Valuable Player of last year's state junior college tournament, which LCC won. He has one more year of junior college eligibility left before he would have to transfer to a four-year school.

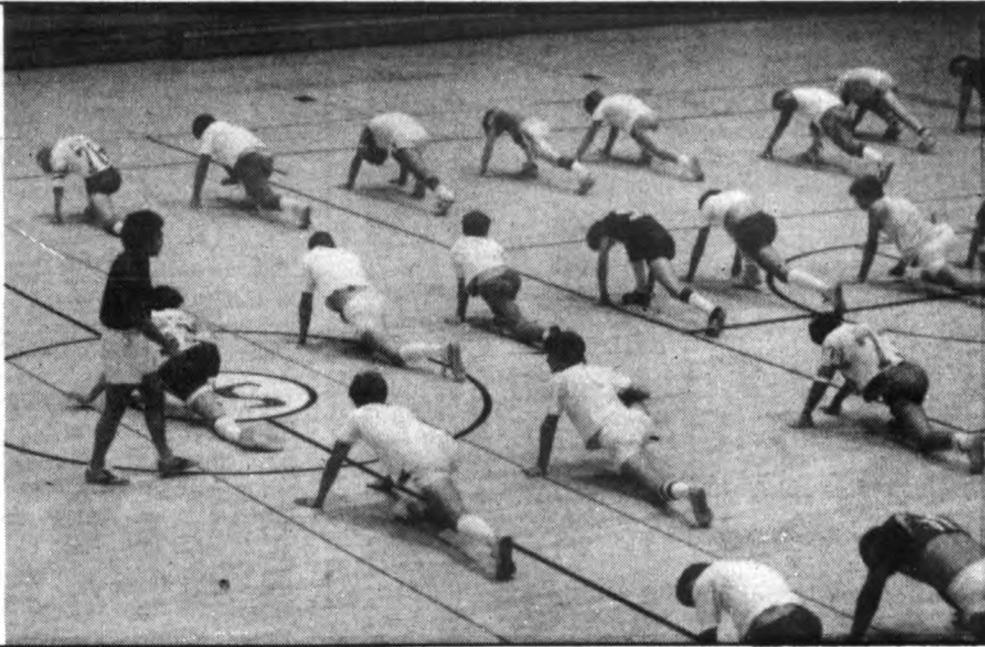
"With all of the people we had, we really thought this was going to be our year," Frank said. "We thought we had a good chance at the national title. This puts a little bit of a damper on it. We're really going to miss his points."

"More than that, though, we're going to miss his leadership and experience. Warren always seems to make the big plays in the big games. Everyone's just going to have to take up the slack."

As for Hengesbach, "He's a little bit disappointed, of course," said Frank. "But he knows that when you become involved with athletics, the possibility of getting injured will always be there."


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

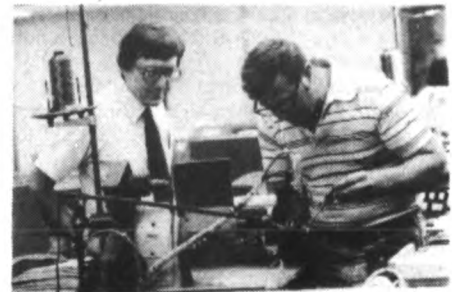

(B) Amending Article 6, Section 6.5.2A by adding the following new definition of single family dwelling.

A. Single family dwellings, structures, either constructed on the site or manufactured off the site and which are designed and used for the complete living accommodations of a single family and complies with the following regulations:

Exception: Beams and girders spaced not less than 4' o.c. may project not more than 6" below the required ceiling height.

All other rooms, including hallways and corridors shall have a ceiling height of not less than 7' measured to the lowest projections from the ceiling.

3. The single family dwelling, including mobile homes and manufactured housing, shall have a minimum exterior breadth/corner/width of 20'. Breezeways, garages, porches, and other appurtenances shall not be considered part of the required 20'. The minimum dimensional requirement is not intended to prohibit unusual, creative or unique architecture and design.

4. All single family dwellings shall comply with the pertinent building code. If the dwelling is a mobile home, all construction, plumbing, electrical apparatus and insulation within and connected to said mobile home shall comply with the "Mobile Home Construction and Safety Standards" as promulgated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, being 24 CFR 3280 as amended. Additionally, all dwellings shall comply with the applicable roof snow load and strength requirement.

5. The dwelling shall be placed upon and secured to a permanent foundation in accordance with the Michigan building Code and where applicable, the manufacturer's installation instructions.

6. Skirting shall be installed if the dwelling is not placed upon a basement or crawl space. The skirting shall be installed in accordance with Act 419 of 1976, the Mobile Home Commission Act.

7. If the dwelling is manufactured off the site, it shall be installed with the wheels removed. In addition, a dwelling shall not have an exposed towing mechanism, undercarriage or chassis.

8. The dwelling shall have a roof with a pitch of at least 2 in 12. (Earth sheltered homes being excluded from this requirement.)

C. Amending Art. 6, Sec. 6.6.2(A) by adding the following language: As per Sec. 6.5.2(A) herein.

D. Amending Art. 6, Sec. 6.8.2(A) by adding the following language: As per Sec. 6.5.2(A) herein.

#### Case ZC-21-82 Text Amendment-Site Development Requirements for Gravel Extraction Operations

(1) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(A) in the following manner: Delete paragraph A entitled **Excavation of Soils and Minerals** and replace it with the following new language:

##### 1. EXCAVATION OF SOILS AND MINERALS

A. **Introduction:** This ordinance recognizes that certain soil and minerals are fixed in location, are rare, and nonrenewable in nature. The purpose and intent of these provisions is to provide for the use of these areas which have significant mineral deposits such as sand, gravel, peat, muck, shale, clay, or other natural mineral deposits except crude oil, and which if mined for such deposits under regulations of this section, insures that doing so will not constitute a hazard to the public health, safety, and welfare. The intent of this section is also to insure proper reclamation of mining sites, and to provide for proper environmental management during the site planning, operational and reclamation stages of the extraction process.

This section of the ordinance applies to excavation of areas subject to mining, which means an area of land from which material is removed in connection with the production or excavation of peat, muck, sand, gravel, clay, shale or other natural minerals deposits, except crude oil, by surface or open pit mining methods, the land on which material from the mining operation is deposited, the land on which a reservoir is used in the process, and any auxiliary land which is deemed a part of the operation.

\* Excavation of soils and minerals means the extraction of sand, gravel, peat, muck, topsoil, clay, rock or other earthen materials or minerals in the regular operation of a business or manufacturing operation for the purpose of sale or exchange. Included in the regular operation is processing, or manufacturing, stockpiling, removing the overburden lying above a natural deposit of a mixed material and mining directly from the natural deposit thereby exposed, by mining directly from a deposit lying exposed in the minerals natural state and also inclusive is all mining below the water table or that mining which upon its cessation will result in the creation of a body of water of any size. The excavation of soil and Minerals does not include excavation or grading preliminary to a construction project; grading or filling incidental to improvement to the land or for agricultural or residential ponds provided the spoil material is not sold, is not intended to be sold and remains on the property where it was excavated.

The above described activities may be authorized in the A-1, Agricultural Production, M-1, Limited Industrial, and M-2, Heavy Industrial zone districts by the Clinton County Board of Commissioners by issuance of a special use permit.

(2) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.2(1) in the following manner: Add the following to the existing sentence after A-1 district: "the M-1, Limited Industrial and M-2, Heavy Industrial zone districts".

(3) Amend Section 6.25, "Schedule G in the following manner: Place the letters SUP in the line designated as surface mining under the heading M-1 and M-2.

(4) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(C) General Site Plan Requirements in the following manner:

a) No. 4 Delete the word Cell and replace with the word

##### Phase.

b) No. 4(f) delete the entire subsection and replace with the following language:

f. Description of location of each phase, number of acres included in each phase, estimated length of time to complete each phase and the amount of time projection to complete the entire project.

c) Add a new subsection 11 as follows:

11. Measures to be taken by the applicant to control noise, vibration, dust and traffic.

d) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(D) in the following manner: Delete the entire section entitled REHABILITATION and replace with the following new language:

##### (5) D. RECLAMATION DURING OPERATION AND FOLLOWING TERMINATION OR ABANDONMENT:

Progressive Reclamation: 1. All phase units shall be reclaimed progressively as they are worked out to the extent that they shall be reasonably natural and inconspicuous and shall be reasonably lacking in hazard. All slopes and banks shall be graded to angles which do not exceed 3' horizontal to 1' vertical.

Sufficient topsoil shall be stockpiled on the premise and promptly redistributed on abandoned areas or where extraction operations have been substantially discontinued for any period in excess of 1 year. Such areas shall then be seeded with at least temporary protection the first year and by the second year permanent seeding to stabilize the soil lessen soil erosion potential and encourage proper growth. Seeding and fertilizer shall be applied according to the Soil Conservation Service Technical Guide IV G, Standards and Specifications for Critical Area Plantings.

(6) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(E) in the following manner: Delete section (E) entitled SITE DEVELOPMENT REQUIREMENTS in its entirety and replace it with the following language:

##### E. Site Development Requirements:

1. Setbacks in which no part of the mining operation may take

place, excepting ingress and egress shall be as follows:

a. Excavation shall not take place less than 20' from any adjacent property line.

Exception: The Clinton County Planning Commission may authorize the complete removal of material to an adjacent property line in situations where 2 extraction operations share a common property line, provided authorization is received from both property owners.

b. Excavation shall not take place less than 50' from any county designated primary road right-of-way.

Exception: Excavation may take place to within 20' of the road right-of-way provided the excavated area is backfilled and stabilized within 1 year of excavation. It shall be the responsibility of the operator to contact the Department of Development Control prior to excavation.

c. Excavation shall not take place closer than 20' from any county designated secondary road right-of-way.

d. No fixed machinery shall be erected or maintained within 100' of any property or street right-of-way.

2. **Fencing:** The Planning Commission shall in establishing the requirements for fencing of the operation take into account the scale of the operation, the population density in the surrounding area, and the potential hazard to the health, safety, and welfare of the public of Clinton County. If fencing is deemed a requirement of the special use permit, the Planning Commission shall specify the type and location of the required fencing.

3. Interior access roads, parking lots, haul road loading and unloading area shall be oiled, watered or chemically treated so as to limit the nuisance caused by windblown dust.

4. **Ponded Areas:** Should the final result of the excavation result in the creation of a water body, the periphery of the excavation shall be graded to a slope not to exceed 3' horizontal to 1' foot vertical to the seasonal low water level.

(7) Amending Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(F) in the following manner: Delete subsection 2 and 4 in its entirety and replace with the following new language:

2. A mining area shall be reclaimed by an operator pursuant to these rules, by the end of the permit period or within the time set forth in the operator's reclamation plan approved by the Planning Commission.

4. **Equipment removal:** Upon cessation of mining operations, the operating company, within a reasonable period of time not to exceed 12 months thereafter, shall remove all plant structures, buildings, stockpiles and equipment.

(8) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(H) in the following manner by adding the following new paragraph after paragraph number two. In determining the area for which guarantees must be supplied, the Planning Commission may consider the following:

a. Any area stripped of topsoil or overburden.  
b. Any area from which material is extracted.  
c. Any area utilized for stockpiling extracted material, overburden and topsoil.

d. Any area which from a past year of operations has not been fully rehabilitated on the annual anniversary of the issuance of the special use permit.

e. Any other land determined by the Planning Commission as integral to the operation, which is directly deemed by them to warrant protection under financial guarantee.

(9) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1) in the following manner: Delete Sec. L entitled VIOLATIONS and replace with the following new language:

L. Violations: Violation notices shall be issued pursuant to the provisions delineated in Art. 3, Sec. 3.8 of this ordinance.

(10) Amend Art. 14, Sec. 14(F) by placing the following definition of mineral in alphabetical order.

**Definition of Mineral:** Mineral means an organic or inorganic substance in the earth having a consistent and distinctive set of physical properties and composition that can be expressed by a chemical formula and includes, but is not limited to, coal, iron ore, copper, silver, gold, uranium, gypsum, stone, gravel, sand, clay, peat, muck, topsoil or shale.

#### Case ZC-22-82 Text Amendment - General Standards

Amending Art. 7, Section 7.1.7(A) **General Standards** in the following manner: Delete standards 1-6 and replace with the following new standards.

1. The proposed use, activities, processes, materials, equipment and conditions of operation will not be detrimental to the public welfare, persons or property by reason of excessive noise, fumes, dust, glare, traffic or objectionable odors.

2. Essential public facilities and services such as roads, fire and police protection, drainage facilities, refuse disposal, schools are adequate for the proposed use or are capable of being adequately provided for.

3. Requirements for additional public services and facilities which will be created by the proposed use will not be detrimental to the economic welfare of the community.

4. All standards set forth in this zoning ordinance will be complied with.

5. All administrative requirements pertaining to the issuance of special use permits have or will be complied with.

6. The proposed use, activities, processes, materials and equipment and conditions of operation shall be consistent with the objectives of the Policy Determination Study and Future Land Use Map.

Specifically, prime agricultural soils as defined by the Clinton County Soil Conservation Service; wetlands protected by P.A. 203, The Goemaere-Anderson Wetland Protection Act; and lakes, rivers, streams, county drains, major forests, water recharge areas and major mineral deposits.

#### Case ZC-23-82 Text Amendment - NONCONFORMING USES

Amending Article 13, Sec. 13.3 in the following manner: Delete the entire subsection and replace with the following language:

(a) No such nonconforming use shall be enlarged or increased, nor extended to occupy a greater area of land than was occupied at the effective date of adoption or amendment of this Article.

Case ZC-24-82 Text Amendment - Definition of Prime Agricultural Soils

Amending Art. 14, Sec. 14(F) in the following manner: Add the following definition in alphabetical order.

**Prime Agricultural Soils:** Prime farmland is land that has the best combination of physical and chemical characteristics for producing food, feed, forage, fiber and oilseed crops, and is also available for these uses (the land could be cropland, pastureland, rangeland, forest land, or other land, but not urban built-up land or water). It has the soil quality, growing seasons, and moisture supply needed to economically produce sustained high yields of crops when treated and managed, including water management, according to acceptable farming methods. In general, prime farmlands have an adequate and dependable water supply from precipitation or irrigation, a favorable temperature and growing season, acceptable acidity or alkalinity, acceptable salt and sodium content, and few or no rocks. They are permeable to water and air. Prime farmlands are not excessively erodible or saturated with water for a long period of time, and they either do not flood frequently or are protected from flooding. Examples of soils that qualify as prime farmland are Palous silt loam, 0 to 7 percent slopes; Brookston silty clay loam, drained; and Tama silty clay loam 0 to 5 percent slopes.

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# Proper harvest techniques produce more

August is the main harvest month in the vegetable garden, and there is plenty elsewhere in the landscape, too, agree Michigan State University Extension specialists.

- This month it is timely to do the following:
- establish a new lawn or renovate an old one between Aug. 15 and Sept. 15. MSU research has shown this to be the best time to establish a lawn in Michigan;
  - seed bare spots in established lawns, loosening the soil before seeding firming it afterward and keeping the newly seeded area moist will promote quick germination; use seed of improved turfgrass varieties that are compatible with the grass that's already growing there and adapted to the lawn environment; that generally means improved Kentucky bluegrass in sunny areas and a mixture of bluegrass and red fescue in the shade;
  - plan to apply a complete fertilizer to established lawns around Labor Day;
  - if you suspect sod webworms or grubs are damaging you lawn, get expert help to identify the problem and recommend controls;
  - cut back the foliage of perennials as they begin to die;
  - take cuttings from wax begonias, geraniums, impatiens, fuchsia and coleus to grow indoors this winter; all cuttings may not form roots, so take more than think you'll need;
  - pinch the faded flowers and seedheads from annual flowers so they'll keep producing blossoms until frost;
  - pinch the faded flowers and seedheads from annual flowers so they'll keep producing blossoms until frost;
  - plant day lilies and peonies; divide and replant overcrowded iris, peonies and lilies if you haven't done so already;
  - prepare beds for spring flowering bulbs and order bulbs for planting late this fall;
  - stake and tie tall dahlias as necessary; remove some of the lateral buds and thin the side shoots to encourage plants to produce larger flowers;
  - harvest potatoes after the plant tops die;
  - harvest onions for storage after the tops turn brown and fall over; cure the bulbs for a week in a well ventilated area before storing;
  - keep picking summer squash, cucumbers, peppers and tomatoes to keep plants producing;
  - thin and/or transplant vegetables seeded last month;
  - plant beets, radishes, spinach, lettuce, beans and peas for a fall harvest; sprinkling diazinon in the planting furrow will help control maggots in root crops;
  - spray tomatoes with tomato sprays containing copper or mancozeb to control blight or leafspot diseases;
  - check sweet corn for damage by corn earworms or European corn borers; if necessary, and if larvae are less than one-fourth inch long, treat developing ears with Sevin;
  - control cabbage worms and loopers and tomato hornworms by hand picking and/or spraying with bacillus thuringiensis; this is a bacterial disease of caterpillars sold under the trade names Dipel, Thuricide and B.t.
  - blanch standard cauliflower varieties by wrapping the leaves around the heads when the heads are two to three inches in diameter; harvest when heads reach six inches. (If left covered too long in warm humid weather, heads may rot.) Green purple, and self-blanching cauliflower varieties do not need this treatment;
  - if wilt diseases knocked out your tomato plants, make a note to buy resistant varieties next year; for extra insurance, avoid planting tomatoes and their close relatives — peppers, potatoes and eggplant — where any of these crops or strawberries grew this year.
  - treat severe infestations of lacebugs on sycamore, honeylocust and other ornamentals with Sevin, malathion or Orthene;
  - avoid fertilizing trees and shrubs now; the resulting flush of late growth would not have time to harden off before winter;
  - check trees and shrubs planted in the past year or two to make sure they are not being girdled by guy wires or ropes; be sure always to remove wires, nylon ropes, plastic and other nondeteriorating materials from the root ball, trunk and main stems at planting time;
  - let aphid predators take care of ire numbers aphids in maple trees; the aphids cannot do any erous harm this late in the growing season, and spraying would wipe predators and other beneficial insects;
  - yellow leaves with green veins indicate nutritional deficiencies in landscape ornamentals; azaleas and oaks showing these signs are suffering from iron deficiency; maples, manganese deficiency; plan to apply iron or manganese chelates to the soil or place implants to trees next spring;
  - remove and destroy bagworms feeding on ornamentals; spraying with insecticides will not be effective now;
  - and prune and destroy blackberry and raspberry canes that bore fruit this year; they won't bear again, and they could harbor insects or disease organisms.

**GARDEN SOUP**  
We enjoy this soup for its good taste and low calories.

1 med. onion, chopped  
1 tbsp. diet margarine  
3 med. potatoes, peeled and diced  
2 medium carrots, peeled and sliced  
1 med. stalk celery, sliced  
2 tbsp. chopped parsley  
4 chicken bouillon cubes/or (5 c. stock)  
salt and pepper

In a large, heavy, non-stick kettle or Dutch oven, cook onion in margarine. Add remaining ingredients and 5 c. water. Cover and simmer 40 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Serve as is, or puree in a blender and reheat. About 55 calories, serves 8.

**CHILI SAUCE**

2 c. onions  
1 c. green peppers  
1 c. red peppers (1/2 c. red hot peppers and 1/2 c. red sweet peppers)  
1 and 1/4 c. brown sugar  
3 c. vinegar  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 c. mixed spices tied in a cloth

Chop all vegetables and mix in a large kettle with rest of ingredients. Cook until thick about 2 hours. Pack in hot sterilized jars and place in a water bath for 15 minutes. Makes 10 pints.

**ZUCCHINI PICKLES**  
I am sure all gardens are producing lots of zucchini by this time. Here is another way to use this abundant vegetable.

Cooking time: about 15 minutes  
Water bath: 15 minutes  
Yield: three 16 oz. jars  
4-5 zucchini, about 2 pounds  
1/2 c. coarse salt  
1/2 c. sugar  
1 1/2 c. white vinegar  
3 tbsp. dry mustard  
1 tbsp. ground ginger  
1 tbsp. curry powder  
6 pepper corns

Rinse unpeeled zucchini, and cut into half-inch slices. Layer with salt in a large bowl. Cover bowl with a towel, and allow to stand overnight. The next day, drain and rinse zucchini in cold water and place in a heavy kettle. Combine sugar, vinegar and spices in a heavy saucepan. Heat to boiling. Boil for 5 minutes and pour over squash. Heat to boiling. Cook 5 minutes or until just tender, do not let it get soft. Spoon hot mixture into hot sterilized jars, and seal. Cook in a water bath for 15 minutes.

**OVEN CHICKEN SALAD**

2 c. cubed cooked chicken  
2 c. celery slices  
1 c. toasted bread cubes  
1 c. mayo  
1/2 c. toasted almonds  
2 tsp. grated onion  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 c. grated cheese  
1 c. toasted bread cubes or crushed potato chips

Combine all ingredients except cheese and one cup of cubes. Pile lightly into greased 3 qt. casserole. Sprinkle with cheese and cubes (or chips). Bake in a 450 degree oven for 10-15 minutes. Tuna may be substituted for the chicken.

**GREEN PEPPER JELLY**  
A nice idea for Christmas gifts, if you don't eat it all up before the holidays. Serve with meats as you would mint jelly or use a jelly with bagels and cream cheese.

1 c. cored, ground green peppers with seeds  
1/2 c. cored, ground long, hot green chili peppers (or banana peppers)  
6 1/2 c. sugar  
1 1/2 c. white vinegar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 bottle (6 oz.) liquid fruit pectin  
green food coloring

Combine green and hot peppers, sugar, vinegar, salt in a saucepan. Simmer 10 minutes stirring occasionally. Strain and return strained liquid to boiling. Pour in pectin. Boil 1 minute. Stir in food coloring. Pour into hot, sterilized jelly jars and seal with 2 part lids. Yield: 5 c.
