County boosts Cropsey win

Voters in Clinton County helped boost State Representative Al Cropsey to a Republican primary victory over incumbent 30th District Senator Dick Allen Tuesday, according to unofficial totals.

Cropsey out-pollled Allen by a more than two-to-one margin in Clinton County, 4,522 to 2,171, County Clerk Jane Swanchara said after adding up preliminary totals at 2:15 Wednesday morning. Archibald Maine earned 80 votes, and Terry McCarthy earned 152 votes in Clinton County, Mrs. Swanchara said.

Reached at his "victory party" at 12:40 a.m., Allen all but admitted defeat in the 30th District, which includes Clinton, Shiawassee and Livingston counties. "It doesn't look good," he said. "We're ahead in Shiawassee by a little, but not by enough to offset Clinton."

At the time, Allen also maintained a slim margin in Livingston County, 2,334 to 2,262. Allen, who moved to a rented house in DeWitt after his Ithaca home was reapportioned out of the 30th District, had conceded Clinton County to Cropsey, a long-time DeWitt resident. Cropsey's conservative attacks on the moderate Allen's voting record during a bitter campaign, coupled with overwhelming support in Clinton County, pushed him over the top.

"Something has to turn our way and it's not going to come," Allen said shortly after midnight. "I think we're going to get beat, but I'm not going to concede yet."

Legal secretary Patricia McAvooy was the winner in the 30th District Democratic primary, garnering 1,145 votes to Theodore Underwood's 869. But Cropsey, who could not be reached for comment, should have little trouble against McAvooy in the traditionally Republican District this November.

IN THE 89th DISTRICT, Clinton County Republican Virginia Zeeb gave incumbent Gary Randall a run for his money before being edged by about 500 votes, early totals said. The former state employee totalled 2,284 to Randall's 2,788. They were followed in the Republican primary by DeWitt Township Treasurer Alta Catherine Reed, with 1,193, and Raymond Pineau, with 288.

In November, Randall will face 22-year-old Central Michigan University graduate Phil Stoddard, who was the winner in a two-way Democratic primary race against Fulton school teacher Donald Proko, 1,749 to 623.

IN TWO COUNTY COMMISSION CONTESTS, Earl Lancaster barely defeated Robert Wood for the reapportioned District Three representing St. Johns. Lancaster edged Wood by just 55 votes, 576 to 521, Mrs. Swanchara said.

In a race for the new District Two, Harold Martin outran Walter Nobis by a comfortable margin, 736 to 419. Martin will represent the Fowler and Pewamo-Westphalia areas. All four Republican incumbents were forced to run against each other when the size of the county board was reduced from 11 to 7.

A TAX LIMITATION PROPOSAL to eliminate the need for regular meetings of an eight-member tax allocation board was passed by a nearly two-to-one margin by Clinton County voters. The Property Tax Limitation Referendum, which was defeated two years ago, was approved by a total of 5,018 "yes" votes to 2,702 "no" votes, Mrs. Swanchara said.

BATH TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR RICHARD BROOK narrowly survived a recall attempt in the Tuesday primary election, unofficial totals said. Brook, accused of improperly reassessing his own property for a lower tax rate, earned 766 votes against recall to 633 in favor, sending the recall to defeat by a margin of 133 votes.

BATH TOWNSHIP VOTERS also approved a three-year, two-mill increase to fund their township police and fire departments. The proposal earmarks one mill for each department and will save the jobs of two police officers, local officials have promised. It was passed 891 to 465.

IN DEWITT TOWNSHIP, a similar proposal was soundly rejected, 992 to 542. DeWitt's one-mill, two-year proposal also would have been used to fund police protection.

DEWITT VOTERS also rejected a proposal which would have allowed rezoning of a parcel of land at the intersection of Turner and Clark roads for a new housing development. The rezoning request received 892 "no" votes to 619 "yes" votes, Mrs. Swanchara said.

BENGAL TOWNSHIP VOTERS okayed a proposal to fund road and bridge improvements. The two-year, one-mill increase was given 94 "yes" votes to 77 "no" votes, reports said.

WATERTOWN TOWNSHIP will not get an additional mill from voters to develop and implement a new township zoning code. A total of 371 voters said "no" to the proposal, with 221 approving it.

DeWitt Art Fair attracts local craftsmen, artists

Chuck Ruble and Russ Lincoln, a pair of DeWitt area wood carvers, will have a display set up at the Historic DeWitt Arts and Crafts Council Information Booth. They will display and demonstrate their relief carving and duck decoys, which are not for sale.

New this year to the festival are "Creative Capers,"

sponsored by the DeWitt Cooperative Preschool Inc. From noon to 4 p.m., kids are invited to participate in painting, puppet making, bubble-blowing and face-painting while parents browse the exhibits.

Performing a variety of music will be a group of local musicians, The Bucksaw Band. They'll play from noon to 5 p.m. and demonstrate early American dance.

To satisfy browsers' appetites, there will be Ox burgers, homemade pies, corn on the cob and beer. Carnival rides and games will also be featured, along with contests and raffles, reports said.



The circus is on its way to town

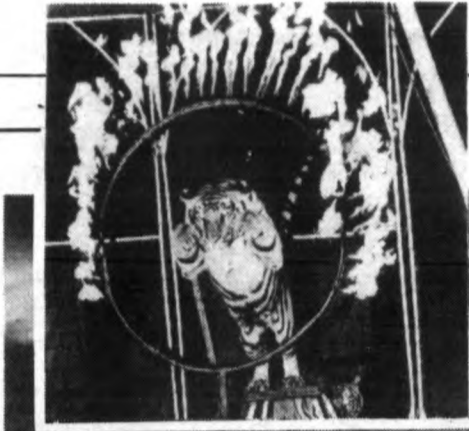
Clowns, jugglers and performing animals will arrive in St. Johns this weekend when the 1982 edition of the Franzen Brothers Circus comes to town.

A bigtop will go up at St. Johns City Park between 8 and 9 a.m. Sunday, Aug. 15, when animals are unloaded. The circus, sponsored by the St. Johns Jaycees, will offer two shows, at 2 and 4 p.m.

The circus will include more than 50 wild and domestic performing animals, including one of America's most unusual elephant acts. Also featured will be many international circus stars, reports said.

Reduced price advance tickets are available at Parr's Drug Store, Western Auto and Central National Bank's Southgate branch. Tickets are also available at the gate, at higher prices, a Jaycee spokesman pointed out.

A free preview of the circus will be held Wednesday, Aug. 11 at the Rodney B. Wilson Junior High School gym. Trades trim issues in latest teacher talks

Disagreement on an incentive for early retirement has stymied negotiations between teachers and the St. Johns School Board, but both sides are optimistic school will begin on time Aug. 31.

Negotiations were narrowed down by a series of trade-offs, then stalled during a session July 26-27 when the St. Johns Education Association (SJEA) introduced a plan to encourage veteran teachers to retire, SJEA Chief Negotiator Mike Gehoski said.

The plan calls for "incentive" payments to staff members with high seniority who agree to retire. Gehoski would not say how much the incentive payments might be, but using his estimates of savings based on salary differences between present staff members and new hires, it is estimated payments could be as much as \$4,000 per person.

Gehoski said the schools could save from \$8,000 to \$10,000 for each retired teacher over a two-year period by replacing their top-range \$23,000 salaries with entry-level salaries in the \$14,000-\$15,000 range.

He said there are two present staff members "just waiting" for an incentive to retire, and more who would likely follow suit later. "I don't know how it can't be (economical)," he said. "When you've got teachers making \$23,000 and you replace them with a young teacher at \$14,000, it's got to make a difference."

St. Johns Schools Controller Rick Terres disagreed the proposal would save money, and said the plan simply is not feasible for the district because of many variables.

The school board has appointed its chief negotiator, George Johnson, as official spokesman, but Johnson

could not be reached for comment.

Director of Non-instructional Services Gordon Vandemark declined to comment on the board's early retirement incentive position, but did confirm that many issues had been traded-off between the board and the SJEA, narrowing the list of issues to three: salary, fringes and early retirement.

Negotiations resume Aug. 16, and Vandemark said he expects school to begin as planned at the end of August. "We don't feel we're at a position where we have to worry about school starting on time, but that's their decision," he said, referring to the union.

Gehoski said he expects things to be ironed-out during the next negotiation session, but warned, "if the money is there ... there's a real possibility school will be delayed," if board negotiators stick to their demand for a wage freeze.

The board's wage freeze demand halted negotiations which were started last spring in an attempt to settle the contract early. Since then, the SJEA has filed an Unfair Labor Practices suit with the Michigan Employee Relations Commission which charges, among other things, that the board has attempted to use community pressure to coerce teachers into accepting a freeze on wages and fringe benefits.

A hearing on the suit is set for early September, but Gehoski admitted the charges will likely be dropped if a contract is agreed upon.

Final figures on how much money the district will get from the state will not be available until late October or early November, Gehoski and Vandemark pointed out, and negotiations could continue while teachers work. As far as salaries go, Gehoski said, the SJEA is looking closely at a recent settlement in Williamston's school district, where teachers were granted five percent in-

creases the first year and 12 percent increases the second year, Gehoski said.

The SJEA and teachers' groups in Bath, DeWitt, Ovid-Elsie and Fowler are represented by the Ingham County Education Association (ICEA), and like St. Johns teachers, they are currently negotiating contracts this year. DeWitt could be the first to settle, Gehoski predicted.

"They're moving along a little faster than we are. I think they're ahead of us," he said. DeWitt was also the only district in the county which did not request a millage increase from voters during the annual school election last June, and healthier finances could help resolve bargaining issues, Gehoski said. Whichever district in the county settles first is likely to set a trend for contract settlements, he said.

The SJEA and St. Johns Board have already resolved many issues, according to Vandemark and Gehoski. Requests dropped by the board include: a demand that teachers make up snow days; an increase in class sizes to 30; an increase in teachers' work days from six hours and 45 minutes to 7.5 hours; a one-hour reduction of secretarial time available to teachers; and elimination of library aides.

In return, teachers agreed to drop demands for: more supplies; extra aide time in combination classes; an increase in personal business days from two to four and permission to accrue them (it was agreed teachers can accrue four); an increase in bereavement leave days and broadening of those who qualify to include non-immediate family members and friends; extra pay and upgraded classification for department chairpersons; and a tie-breaker lottery system to determine layoffs where seniority is equal.

St. Johns commission discusses US-27 traffic snarl

Because of problems caused by the additional traffic at the intersection of US-27 and Sturgis Street, the St. Johns City Commission decided at its meeting Aug. 9 to speak with the State Highway Commission about ways to alleviate the problems.

The commission discussed ways to handle the additional traffic, which is being caused by the new Goff store and anticipated as becoming worse when the rest of Southpoint Mall opens.

"Once the new mall opens, the congestion there is going to do nothing but get worse," said Mayor John Arehart. "Some days, it's really a challenge trying to get across 27."

The commission put the issue on the agenda after hearing several complaints from citizens. Police Chief Lyle French then submitted a proposal which he felt would help alleviate some of the problems. French sug-

gested painting lines on Sturgis Street with the center lane designated for left turns only. He also suggested putting two "Left Turn Only" lighted overhead signs at the intersection.

It was then decided to have City Manager Randy Humphrey meet with the Highway Commission about the problem.

The commission also decided once again to postpone the institution of condemnation proceedings on the Oddfellows Building. The discussion first began last March, when the commission told the Oddfellows to fix their building and bring it up to code. Then after issuing several ultimatums to the group to repair the building or face condemnation proceedings, the commission decided to table the matter after hearing a report that the work should be finished within a week.

"I should remind everyone that this was brought to the attention of the commission quite awhile ago," said Arehart. "Progress in fixing the building has not been

made in a timely manner. It just seems to me we're not doing anything different by tabling this, because we've just been tabling it for the last five months.

"I would say that if the work is not done by our next meeting, we shouldn't vote to table it again."

In other business, the commission:

- Approved a request from the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation to hold its annual door-to-door solicitation in St. Johns Sept. 19-26.

- Awarded French a plaque from the Automobile Association of Michigan commending St. Johns for having no pedestrian fatalities in the last nine years.

- Approved the purchase of another Handy Talkie radio for the police department, which would allow officers on foot patrol to communicate with the station.

- Approved the purchase of a submersible pump for the wastewater treatment plant.

- Adjourned to a closed session for a discussion on negotiations with the Fraternal Order of Police.

'Winnie the Pooh' will take the stage in St. Johns

A new community theatre group, the St. Johns Summer Toybox Players, will present the first of what they hope will become an annual event: a children's play performed outdoors in the band-shell in St. Johns Municipal Park.

The theatre troupe's first offering is "Winnie the Pooh," a play based on A. A. Milne's tale of a teddy bear brought magically to life. The show will start Friday, Aug. 20 at 7 p.m. Admission is free.

"The group was formed almost out of a sense of desperation," said director Kristan Tetens, a former St. Johns High School student and sophomore at Michigan State University. "A lot of the members worked on last summer's play, 'You Can't Take it With You.' But when we found out that Mr. Robert Koger, who directed that play, wouldn't be able to direct one this summer, we decided that there had to be a way to keep summer theatre in St. Johns."

Miss Tetens, who was student director under Koger for St. Johns High productions of "The Wizard of Oz" and "Dracula," said the idea for a permanent troupe to perform children's plays once each year was developed after the first play was selected.

"We wanted to perform

very much, and we think the people in the community would enjoy the chance to go to the park, relax and just have some fun with us," she said. "Winnie the Pooh' is the perfect play for us to start out with — it's a fun, light-hearted show. We picked it because of its appeal to all ages," she said.

The cast features both alumni and students of St. Johns High School. Portraying the title role will be Jenny Gentry, a junior who has been active in school drama. Also featured are alumni Kendra Bradley — who has acted and directed at Ferris State College — Gay Cobb, Barb Lehnen and Ken Schaefer, Miss Tetens said, all familiar names in local theatre.

Others to be featured in the production are Angie Magsig, Craig Paksi, Colleen McCarthy and Eric Hudson, who portrayed Jesus Christ in last year's "Godspell." Pat Magsig will handle technical aspects, Miss Tetens said.

"The cast is small, but has all the traditional members of Milne's fantasy — Pooh, Owl, Eeyore, Rabbit, Christopher Robin, Piglet, Kanga, Roo — the group is very enthusiastic and ready to perform."

The single show will run for about one hour and lawn chairs or cushions are suggested.

Teen, woman killed in two accidents in county

A 77-year-old Battle Creek woman and a 17-year-old DeWitt teen killed in separate traffic accidents were among the incidents reported by Clinton County law enforcement agencies this past week.

• On Aug. 7 at 10:50 p.m., Bath Township Police responded to a two-vehicle accident at I-69 northeast of Marsh Road. Police said that Steven Reed, 19, of 5706 Clark Rd. in Bath, was attempting to cross the median from the eastbound lane of I-69 to the westbound lane when he was struck broadside. 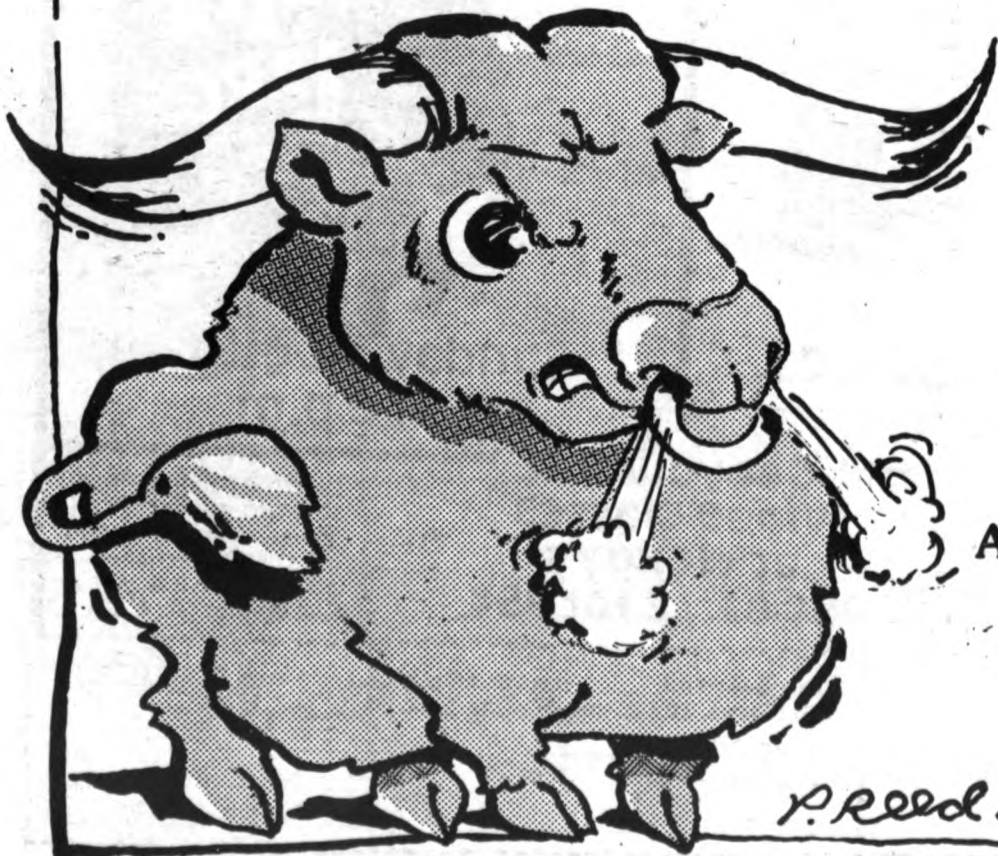

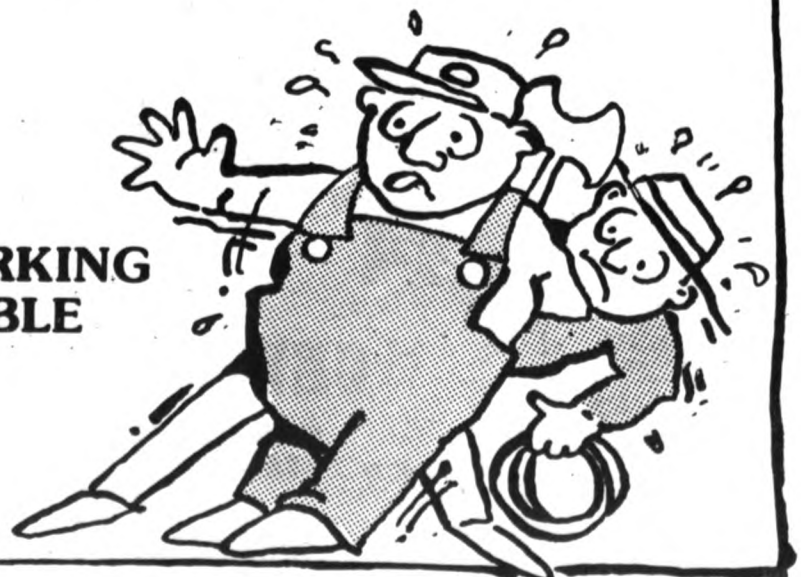

Farm market offers lots of variety, but few buyers

For variety and selection, you just can't beat the "Country Comes to Town" farm market, held every Saturday in St. Johns from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The market has everything from maple syrup to blueberries. Everything except customers, that is.

For while the market attracted a large number of vendors last week, the buyers weren't exactly showing up in droves.

"I don't know what's keeping the people away," said Judy Heppinstall, the farm market coordinator. "I really wish we could attract more people, because they don't know what they're missing."

Part of the problem, Mrs. Heppinstall thinks, is that people aren't aware of where the market is being held. "I talked to a man and told him that the market was on Maple Street, and he didn't even know where Maple Street was," she said.

Just for the record, Maple Street is on the west side of the Clinton County Courthouse, and that's where the vendors will be pulling up their cars and trucks and setting up shop.

The market is just three weeks old, having attracted

15 vendors the first week and 16 the second. At last week's market, everything from an alcohol cleaning fluid made from corn ("It's great for cleaning windows," Mrs. Heppinstall said) to fresh apricots were on

sale. "We're also going to put up a big sign this week, so people know we're here," Mrs. Heppinstall said. "And we're going to have a drawing for free produce."

Fowler appoints principal, plans millage meeting

Fowler residents can learn more about an upcoming millage proposal at a meeting to be held Aug. 16, school officials have announced.

Fowler's new superintendent, Jim Andros, announced the Millage Information meeting at 7 p.m. Monday in Waldron School will be open to all interested persons.

Andros said he will present a short talk on the schools' Aug. 23 request for 23-mills for one year. The proposal includes renewal of 20.8 mills and an 2.2 additional mills.

Andros said the meeting will be opened for questions and discussion following his presentation. The regular monthly meeting of the Fowler Board of Education will begin at 8 p.m. Andros also reminded voters absentee ballots are now available for the school millage election and can be obtained from the Fowler Schools superintendent's office.

At Fowler's previous board meeting, July 28, Richard Vitek of St. Johns was appointed principal to replace Andros. Andros, the former high school principal, was promoted to superintendent July 1 to replace former Fowler Superintendent Gary Jackson. Jackson took a new job as superintendent of a school district near Detroit.

Vitek, building trades instructor for the Clinton County Vocational Shared-Time program for the last seven years, was selected from a field of more than 60 candidates, Andros reported. He earned a masters degree in administration and vocational education from Michigan State University. Married, with two children, Vitek began his new job Aug. 2.

Also at the special meeting, Andros said, board members appointed Gerald Krause high school and middle school band director. Krause, former middle school director at Portland, is a Michigan State University graduate and took the Fowler band to band camp there during his first week on the job Aug. 2-6. The band will perform under Krause for the first time at the Most Holy Trinity Parish Picnic, Andros said.

Fowler sports fans got good news from a group of local athletic boosters recently, Andros said. The Fowler Athletic Boosters have agreed to give financial support to the Fowler School Board to maintain some of the sports due to be eliminated from the coming school year's budget, Andros reported.

The boosters have agreed to pay all costs except coaches' salaries for junior high boys and girls basketball, high school golf and cross country and freshman basketball. Any revenue generated by the subsidized programs will be used first to pay expenses under the agreement, Andros said.

Both the boosters and the school board are presently looking for qualified volunteers to coach, and anyone interested should contact the high school, reports said.

The schools will continue to administer the sports programs and schedule games and contests, reports said.

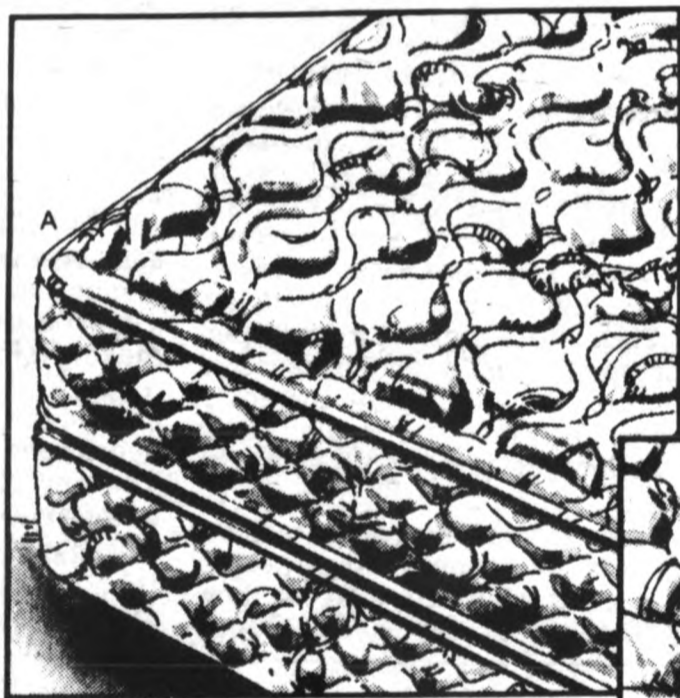

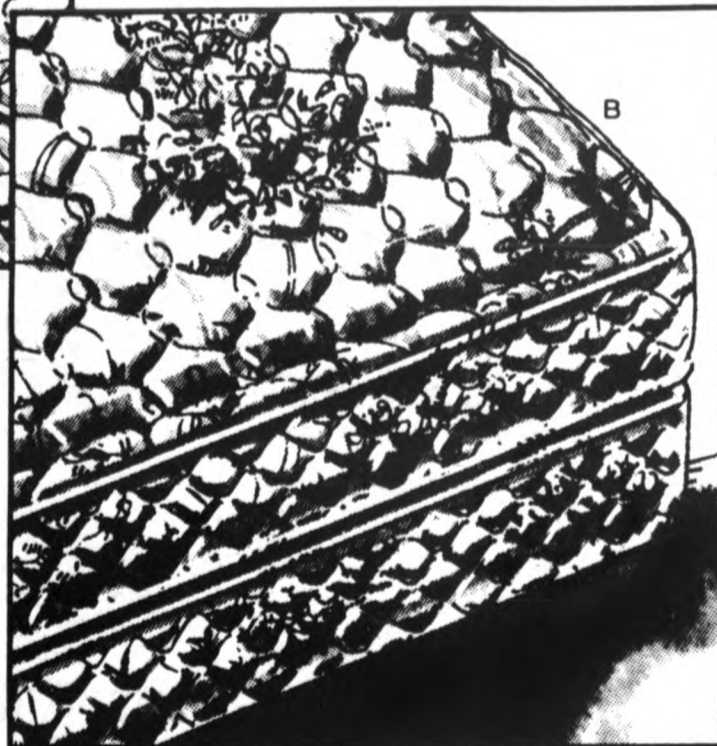

Harmful sign language

I can't be sure exactly when it was, but I think it was about the time I was a sophomore in college when I started to get the hang of proper grammar usage. It took me 20 years and dozens of English teachers before I finally learned the way this language was meant to be spoken and written.

You've all seen these signs. They have apostrophes in the wrong places or no apostrophes at all, bad spelling or numerous other grammatical infractions. We see these signs every day and don't think twice about the mistakes in them.

When I was 16, I worked in a fast-food restaurant which had a nice metal sign on the kitchen door. "EMPLOYEE'S ONLY" it read. It was one of those signs that looked like it was made by a professional sign company. Well, being the bright teenager that I was, I eventually figured out that "EMPLOYEE'S" in this instance was a plural, and therefore should have been "EMPLOYEES."

And that's exactly the problem kids today are facing. They see a sign with improper grammar or spelling in it and because it looks official, they think it must be correct. I can imagine English teachers ripping their hair out when they spot a sign with a case of bad grammar.

The main problem sign people seem to have is where to put in apostrophes. Many people don't seem to know where they go, so they figure it would be better just leave them out

altogether. Here, then, is a quick primer on where to stick your apostrophes: If Joe buys a bar, the sign out front should read "Joe's Bar," not "Joes Bar." Or if he wants to leave out the bar, he should call it "Joe's," and not "Joes."

Another big problem sign-makers have is with spelling. A store in St. Johns has a sign in it warning "Shoplifting is a crime! Violators will be prosecuted!" So all you violators, beware. Violators, on the other hand, apparently have nothing to worry about.

The point of all this is that our use of the English language has gotten bad enough without signs we look at every day making matters worse. Why can't the people who make these signs check on their grammar and punctuation before they put them up? It can't be all that hard, and it will save the hair of many an English teacher.

Maybe we should just enact an ordinance making signs with incorrect grammar illegal. Fine the offenders and make them change the sign. Twenty bucks for an illegal apostrophe and 50 bucks for a spelling error. The murder of the English language has gone on long enough.

Mistake's like these are serious and it's time to take care of the problem. Let's all start talking good again.

In a few days, the Clinton County Fairgrounds will be the center of activity as hundreds of young people and adults converge for the 1982 Clinton County 4-H Fair.

Over 1,300 county youth have already submitted entry forms for their projects, and Fair Secretary Mary Libey anticipates nearly 5,000 different projects. There will be 49 goats on display and on show in the Judging Pavilion Wednesday morning; 75 dairy animals will be shown Thursday morning; and 65 hogs, 67 sheep and 88 beef projects will be judged Tuesday. There are over 1,000 entries in the

various horse classes and 161 rabbits. There will also be lots of entries in poultry, small animals and dogs, and barns and tents will be full of 4-H animals during Fair week.

Smith Hall and the Quonset will be nearly full this year as 4-H'ers display their hand-crafted items. There will be 160 vegetable entries, 360 food entries, 395 in personal appearance, 159 in woodworking, 47 clowns and 774 different crafts entries, to name a few.

4-H'ers from throughout the county have been hard at work this year and will be proud of the opportunity to show off their accomplishments. This year's fair will include judging in each of the pro-

ject areas with trophies and awards to be presented Thursday evening, Aug. 19 in the Horse Arena, beginning at 7 p.m.

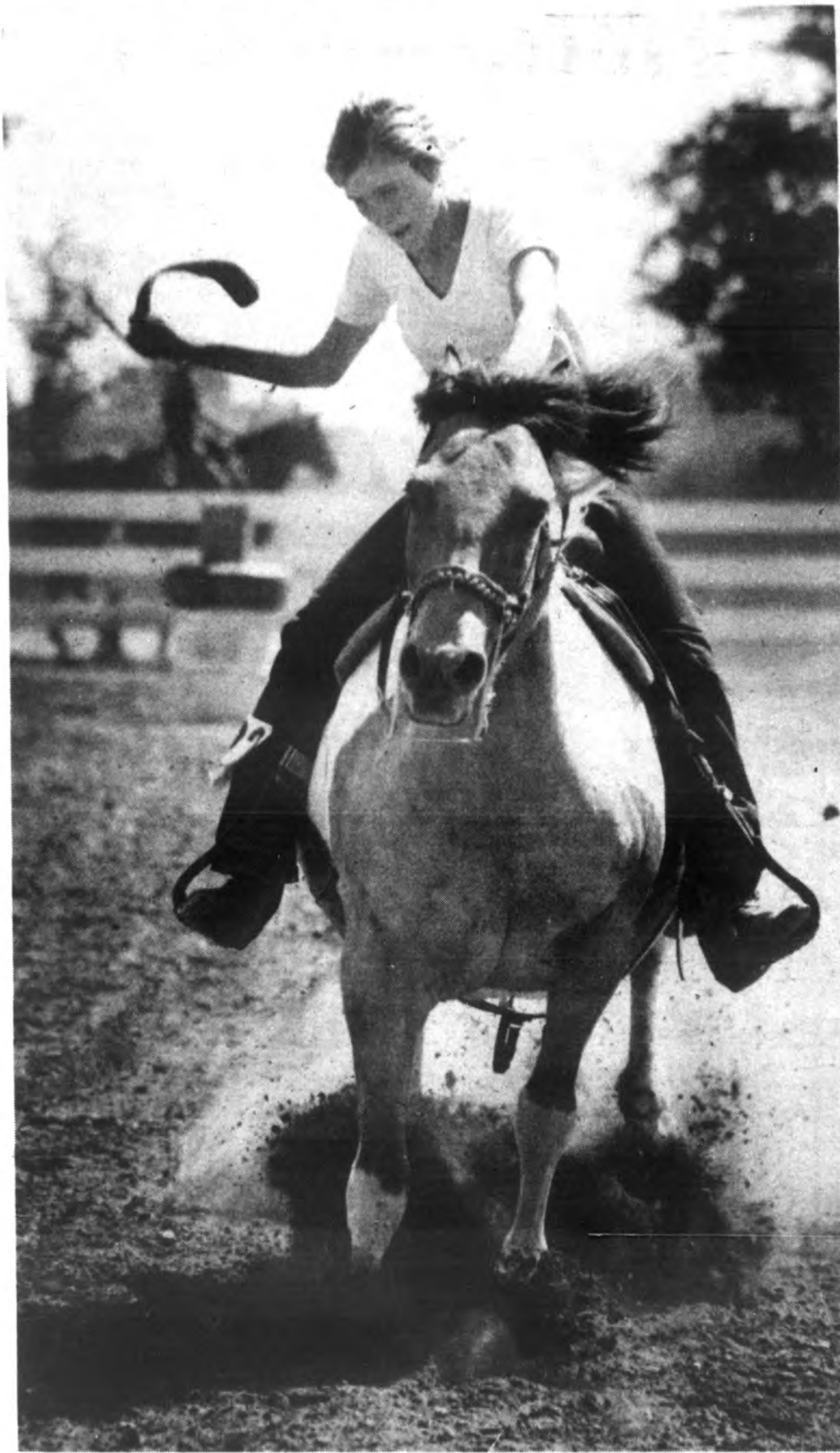
There will be music in the air as the fair begins and ends with special music programs. The Mellow Tones will play for a dance in the parking lot Monday evening from 8-10 p.m., helping to kick-off the week's activities. Then on Thursday evening, the Fair Board and WQTK will jointly sponsor a Country-Western Show featuring the music of R.C. Finnegan, Country Fever and Mike and Cathy Yeager.

Tickets are available from the Extension Office, radio station, Fair Board members and several other local outlets, as well

as at the fair and, of course, at the gate. Prices are \$3 in advance and \$4 at the gate. Proceeds will be used to help support 4-H youth fair programs.

Other fair attractions and activities featured this year will include: a hog roast Wednesday afternoon and evening; the annual Livestock Sale on Wednesday evening, beginning at 6 p.m.; a baby animal petting tent; and a commercial exhibit tent with both local and out-of-town exhibitors on hand to display their latest products.

All in all, the 1982 version of the Clinton County 4-H Fair should be one of the best, ever, and promises fun for everyone who attends.

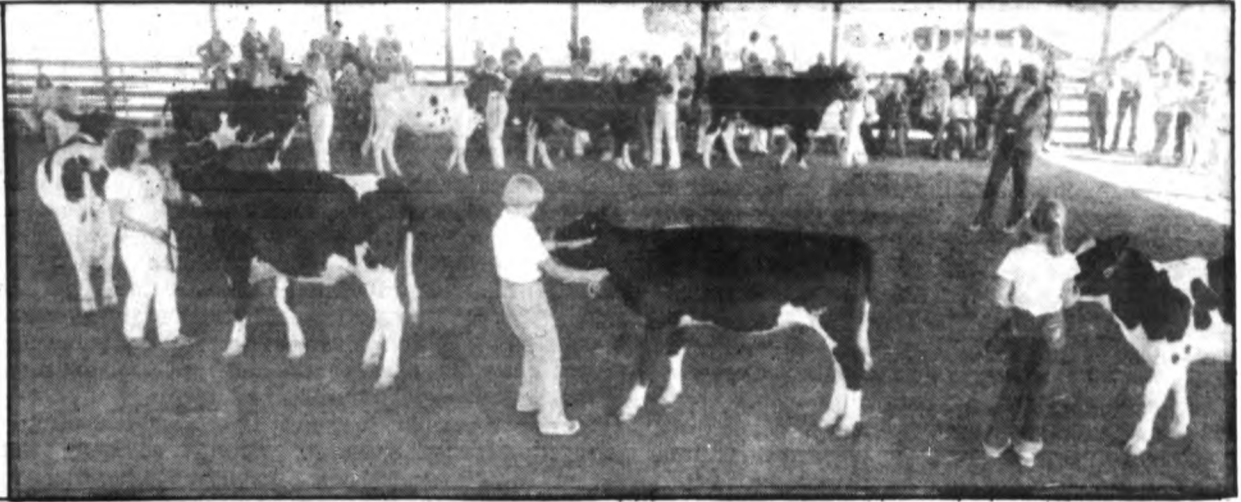

Ovid-Elsie will pass away in '82

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the third in a six-part series previewing Clinton County's high school football teams.

"We like to throw the ball here at Ovid-Elsie," said O-E head football coach Russ Pope.

No kidding. And Rembrandt liked to paint a little.

All the Marauders did last season was set school marks in almost every passing and total offense category, thanks to Pope's philosophy that people don't come to football games to see the fullback run it up the middle.

"I don't believe in that three-yards-and-a-cloud-of-dust stuff," Pope said. "Our fans pay to see exciting football and that's what we give them."

And the O-E fans can expect more of the same from the Marauders in 1982, because Pete (aka "Pistol Pete") Hurst, who passed his way into the record books last year, is back for his senior season. The 6-1, 155-pound quarterback completed 67 of 131 passes for 1,011 yards last season, with 10 of the tosses going for touchdowns.

"He's pure grace and coordination," said Pope. "Anytime a guy can throw for a thousand yards in high school, that's tremendous. A lot of colleges are going to be taking a look at him this year. He's the key to our whole team."

Giving the Marauders some depth at the signal-calling spot will be junior Wade Kioski — if he decides to play football, that is. Kioski is wavering between playing football or just concentrating on basketball. "If Wade plays, that will give us the best 1-2 quarterback punch around," said Pope.

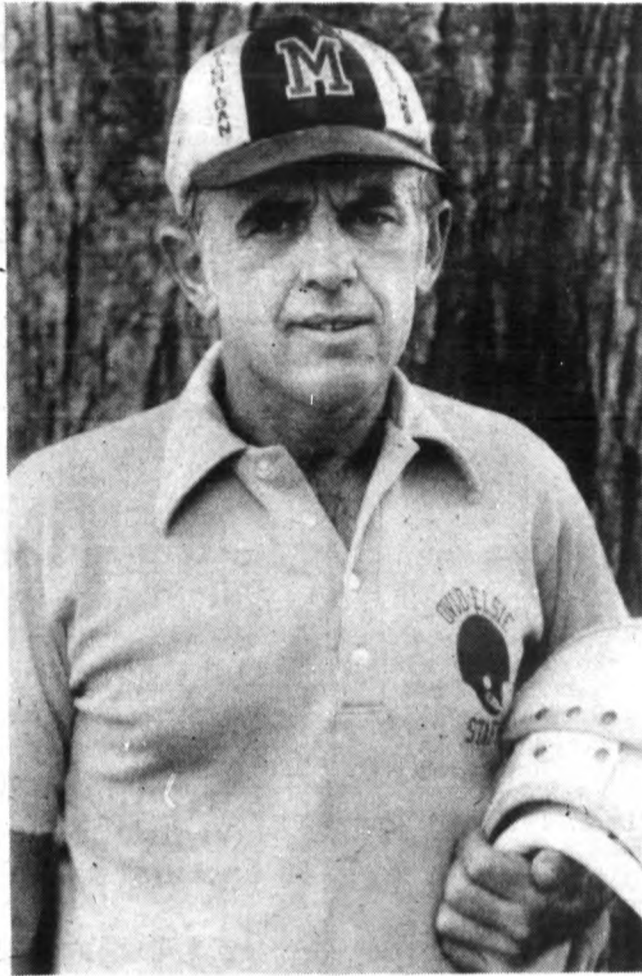
All in all, 14 starters will be returnin from last year's 4-5 squad. Part of the Pope philosophy is to avoid playing kids both ways. "We'll only have three or four kids playing both ways this year," said Pope. "I like to get everyone in, and kids know that if they play for Pope, they'll get to play."

Leading the returnees on offense are co-captains Hurst and Craig Coleman, a tailback who accounted for 66 points last season while averaging six yards a carry. Coleman's 4.6 speed in the forty should also be a big help to O-E.

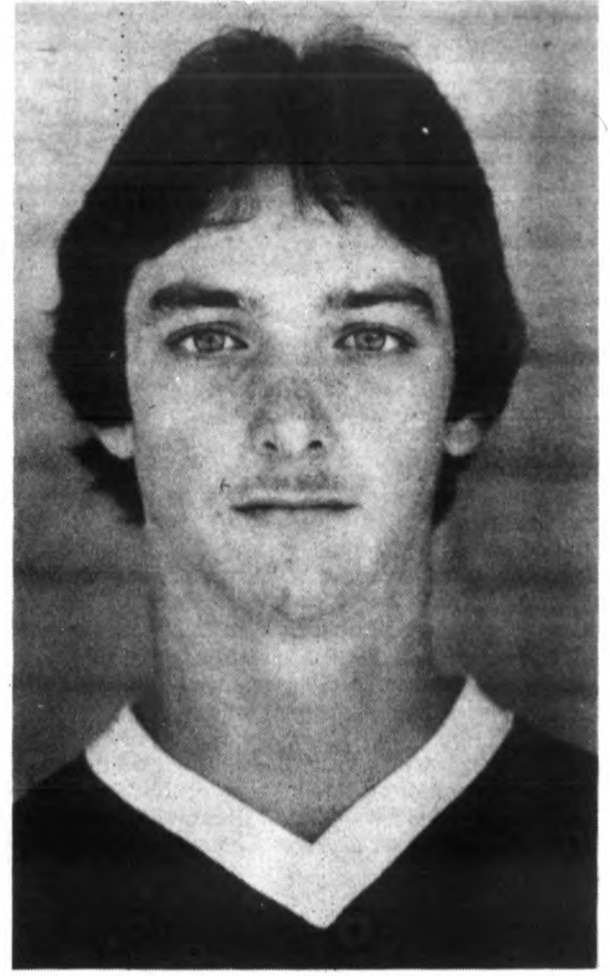
Also returning to the backfield is 228-pound fullback Eric Schroeder. On the receiving end of Hurst's aerials will be ends Kevin Daese, Dan Bukoviak and Scott Martin. Pope looks for all three to be improved.

On the line, the Marauders return center Al Ward, guard Mike Burl and tackles Keith Kamora and Doug Betts. At 215 pounds, Kamora holds the distinction of being the biggest member of the line.

Defensively, Pope hopes his squad improves from last season. "We could score great last season," he said. "We just couldn't stop anyone else from scoring." The

Marauders tallied 140 points last year, while their opponents accounted for a very high 160.

"This year, I'm going to put more emphasis on speed than on bulk," Pope said. "We're going to attack more on defense instead of letting them come to us."

Returning to the defense is leading tackler Kamora, who had 75 stops last year at defensive tackle. Also back is defensive end Tad Coleman, who had 68 tackles last year despite missing two games.

Other key returnees include cornerback Steve Gardner, defensive back Don Phillips and linebacker Dan Hill, who has recovered from a very bad automobile accident suffered last year.

Pope will also be counting heavily on his juniors, led by running backs Mike O'Dell (who gained 889 yards on the junior varsity squad last year) and 6-3, 198-pound John Martin. Other top juniors include defensive

players Scott Gardner, Joe Rodriguez and Kevin Vanetta.

"We should be a pretty good team," summed up Pope. "I'm not worried about experience at all. This is my fifth year as the head coach, and this team has as much or more talent as any I've ever had."

Unfortunately for Pope, however, most of the school his team plays are bigger than O-E. "We're Class B this year," he said, "but we thought we were going to drop to C. It's going to be pretty rough playing all those big schools."

As for the Mid-Michigan "B" Conference, which the Marauders play in, "I think Alma, Corunna and St. Johns are going to be the ones to beat," Pope said. "All three have a lot of experience and talent. They've got all those three-year letterwinners back at St. Johns, so they'll be good."

Returning the compliment, St. Johns head coach Joe Gonzales said, "You want to know who's going to be tough? Ovid-Elsie is going to be tough. They've got a lot of good players out there."

Also on the schedule for the Marauders this season is Linden, a team O-E has never played before. In fact, Pope isn't even sure where Linden is. "But from what I understand, they went undefeated two years ago," he said. "I hear they always have good crowds there, so it should be a good game for us."

And if things go as usual, it should also be a high-scoring game.

Competition is tight in Ovid bicycle races

When Jeff Shepard and Dave Spousta decide to break a bicycle race record, they don't monkey around.

Take, for example, the 100-mile race sponsored by the Ovid Athletic Club Aug.

8. The old record for the race was seven-and-a-half hours, set last year. The new record, as set by Shepard, is just under that. Just under by three hours.

Owosso's Shepard cruised through the course, which took in five counties, in four hours, 37 minutes and 30 seconds.

Right on his tail at 4:38.00 was Spousta. Also finishing the race in impressive fashion were Frank Hart of St. Johns in just under six hours, and Larry Helvie of Owosso in 7:05.00.

Shepard and Spousta averaged just about 22 miles an hour. And according to Ed Robinson, the owner and operator of the Athletic Club and founder of the races, that's a first-class time in any 100-mile race anywhere.

"I was really surprised we did it that fast," said Spousta, a resident of St. Johns. "I was figuring we would do it in about five-and-a-half hours."

Seeing Shepard and Spousta cross the finish line together and in record time is certainly nothing new in Ovid this summer. Aside from one 34-mile race which Shepard missed, the two have been first and second in every race this summer, and each time a new record has been set. Usually, it's been Shepard first, Spousta second.

That may be partially due to the fact that Shepard, who is 19, is the race-wise veteran, having raced for two years now. Spousta, who is 26, is the rookie, making his first try at racing this summer.

"But you're just such a strong racer," Shepard said to Spousta after the race. "I need to push you all the time to try and get you tired."

On Aug. 1, however, it was Shepard who ran out of steam. Spousta sprinted to the

finish line of the 50-mile race that day to finally beat his arch-rival. "I just got lucky last week," Spousta said.

Luck, skill or whatever the reason, the close loss gave Shepard some added incentive to win the 100-miler. "I had to beat him this week," Shepard said, "because he beat me in the 50-miler last week."

This is just the second summer the Athletic Club has sponsored the races. "We did have a 20-miler two years ago to see if there would be interest," Robinson said, "but last year was the first year we had a race every week. And Jeff Shepard won almost all of the races last year, too."

Shepard and Spousta will have four more chances to compete in Ovid this summer, finishing with another 100-mile marathon. Only four people competed in the first 100-miler, however.

"The most interest seems to be in the shorter races," Robinson said. "We get a lot more of the younger kids in those. But I'm hoping we'll have a lot more people in our last 100-miler. We're going to give out a two-foot trophy at that last race."

And with Jeff Shepard and Dave Spousta pushing each other along the way, it's a good bet there will be another record set, too.
