Sinkhole dries up local wells

Seventeen wells in northeast Clinton County have gone dry as a result of a sinkhole which was formed two months ago, according to county Drain Commissioner Harry Harden.

The sinkhole is on the farm of Don Temple in Rochester Colony, about six miles northeast of St. Johns. It appeared next to a big oak tree on the bank of the Maple River.

"The erosion from the river was just wearing the river bank down," Harden said. "Finally, it broke through about two months ago."

According to Temple's wife, "It was just like a big explosion when it burst. The ground next to the river literally blew up when it went, and all the ground water started running into the river."

And that is what has created the problem, Harden said. The sinkhole has created a small ground water river, which flows into the Maple River and is drying up the wells in the area.

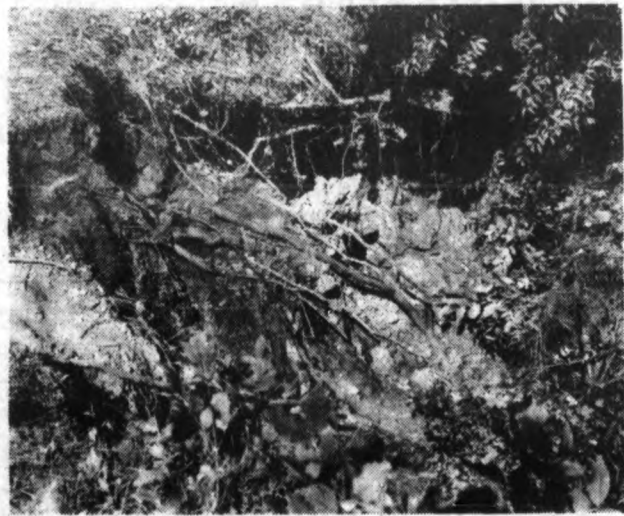
'It was just like a big explosion when it burst. The ground next to the river literally blew up when it went,' Mrs. Temple said.

"So far, the depleted water has caused 17 wells to run dry," Harden said. "The DNR (Department of Natural Resources) has been to look at it, and hopefully they'll be able to do something about the problem soon."

The hole, which is about 15 feet across and ten feet deep, has also been attracting a great amount of media attention, Mrs. Temple said.

"We've had hundreds of people out here already," she said. "Newspapers, TV stations — they even had a helicopter out here."

But even though the sinkhole has been a thorn in the side of Rochester Colony landowners, Mrs. Temple has found one bright spot. "It has caused a great deal of trouble," she said, "but the little cave it formed and the natural spring water river is actually quite pretty."

May be harmful to economy's health

Candidates agree with smokers on President's tax hike proposal

President Reagan is finding little support for his \$98.3 billion tax increase among smokers, waiters and frequent phone callers; and he won't get a lot of help from 10th District Congressman Don Albosta, D-St. Charles, or his opponent in November, Midland Republican Lawrence Reed, either.

Among other things, the tax hike presented by the President during a televised speech Monday night would double cigarette taxes and triple the federal excise tax on phone use, while stiffening regulations requiring waiters and others who receive tips to report the income.

"I haven't had a chance to go through it yet, but I have asked the (House) Committee on Ways and Means to make a summary for me," Albosta said the following morning. "Right now I am leaning against the bill, and it would have to have a lot of strong points in its favor before I'll support it."

One strong point could be a ten-week extension of unemployment benefits included in the bill, which could specifically benefit Michigan, Albosta said. But the Congressman called the benefit extension a "trick of the administration to pull a lot of people out for the bill."

"I think it's an admission of failure," he said of the President's proposal. "There's no question in my mind that there was a mistake in 1981," he said, referring to Reagan's three-year tax cut, which he said provided windfalls to oil companies and made it possible for many corporations to avoid paying taxes.

"With increases in defense ... we just can't find that much money here," he said.

Reed, meanwhile, had no reservations about his opinion of the President's proposed tax increase.

"The President was somewhat persuasive last evening, but I'm afraid I cannot support his tax package," he said Tuesday. "The average American cannot afford high taxes in a recessionary environment and neither can the economy as a whole."

Reed, who is an economics professor at Northwood Institute in Midland, has advised Congressman Jack

Kemp of New York, a proponent of so-called supply side economics and vocal opponent of the President's tax increase. "I would shy away from using a label to describe where I'm coming from," Reed said, "but I believe in less government, less spending and lower taxes. Government is too big and taxes and spending are too much."

"I haven't had a chance to go through it yet, but right now I am leaning against the bill," Albosta said.

"In spite of what the President said last evening, this is, in my belief, a retreat from the mandate of 1980," Reed says.

Reed said he supports Reagan on other issues, but expects little campaign help from the Republican administration in November.

Woman holding man hostage finally surrenders

A car chase which resulted in the recovery of a stolen truck and a woman who surrendered after holding a man at gunpoint were among the incidents reported by Clinton County law enforcement officials this past week.

• After holding a man at gunpoint for most of the day Aug. 7, Carolyn Hack, 314 W. Barnes, Lansing, surrendered to DeWitt Township Police, police said. Hack allegedly held the gun on Leo Underhill, Jr., 1171 E. Stoll Rd., DeWitt Township, at Underhill's residence, police said. Hack also fired a shot at Underhill through a door, police said. Plenty turn out

Volunteers plan to raise own hall

A group of Victor Township volunteers turned the first spade of earth Saturday in a groundbreaking ceremony for their new township hall. But they didn't set their shovels down and step aside for contractors; they're sticking around to finish the job.

Applying a little bit of old-fashioned barn raising spirit — and promising plenty of muscle — township volunteers have decided they could build their new town hall themselves and save some tax dollars. According to Township Supervisor Robert Remus, the do-it-yourself township hall will save at least \$33,000.

"We expect to spend about \$100,000 to \$110,000," he said. "Our lowest bid to have it done was \$143,000."

Remus said the volunteer crew includes skilled tradesmen in all of the critical areas such as plumbing and electrical wiring. He said volunteers will work mainly during Saturday "work-bees" and hopes the building will be completed next spring. "It may take some time," he admitted. "Not ever doing this before with township volunteers, it's hard to tell."

"We got the site half cleared and staked out," Remus said. "Getting started is the hard part. At least we got this far. We're off and running."

Township resident Paul Crandall was scheduled to show up Saturday morning at 9 a.m. with a bulldozer and a backhoe to clear top soil and dig a foundation at the site on the corner of Shepardsville and Alward roads.

As for workers, Remus said Friday he'd wait and see. "We had quite a few sign up last fall. But we'll just have to see how many follow through."

He wasn't disappointed. When Saturday arrived, sodid Crandall — in spite of a knee injury — along with about 25 or 30 township volunteers. "We got the site half cleared and staked out," Remus said. "Getting started is the hard part. At least we got this far. We're off and running."

The idea for a volunteer-built township hall was introduced by Remus last fall, when township board members decided they did not want to borrow \$33,000 to hire a contractor. Remus suggested they could use their \$110,000 budget to buy materials and use volunteer labor to save the difference in the \$143,000 bid.

"Basically, we'll come up with the same thing the contractor would have, but we won't be cutting any corners where the contractor might," Remus said. And if all that free labor saves even more than expected, the interior of the building may get special attention, he said.

"I encourage anyone willing to work on the hall to contact me," Remus said. His number is 651-5302.

• **SOPHOMORES** — Schedules can be picked up and locker assignments will be made Thursday, Aug. 26 from 1 to 3 p.m.

• **JUNIORS** — Schedules and locker assignments are available Thursday, Aug. 26 from 9 to 11 a.m.

• **SENIORS** — Schedules and locker assignments will be available Wednesday, Aug. 25 from 1 to 3 p.m.

Bus transportation will not be furnished Wednesday or Thursday, Aug. 25-26. Students unable to pick up their schedules should report the first day of school, Aug. 31.

Complaints prompt closing

Local BMX track gets the ax

After several residents' complaints prompted a decision that a race at a homemade bicycle motocross (BMX) track in St. Johns be cancelled and the track torn down, riders, residents and local officials finally worked out an agreement. The race on Aug. 17 could be held as scheduled, but the track would have to be torn down the next day.

The track was constructed on a vacant lot at the corner of Swegles Street and Clark Street owned by Tom Hutton. Area youngsters began building the track about a month ago, said Hutton, spending literally hundreds of hours working on it.

But after City Manager Randy Humphrey received two complaints about the track from local residents, Zoning Administrator Diane Edwards informed Hutton on Aug. 17 that since the area the track was in was zoned residential, it would have to be dismantled.

"Basically, we were caught in the middle," Humphrey said. "The people who called to complain were mainly complaining about the dust that was being raised and the noise the kids made."

"More than anything, though, they were concerned about the future of the track. When they started scheduling a race, the local residents just didn't know how big this thing was going to get."

When Hutton informed the riders of the decision, both the youngsters and their parents became very upset.

"What are they doing to our teenagers?" wondered Donna Holcomb, whose 15-year-old son, Mark, was one of the track's builders. "This track is such a positive thing. These kids have put so much time into this worthwhile venture, and then the city tells them to take it down."

"I've just never seen such a positive thing for the kids than this track. They're spending their time on

something good instead of playing Pac-Man with stolen money."

The decision to tear down the track also upset Hutton, who gave the youngsters permission to build it after setting up several rules — no swearing, loud noise or dangerous jumps.

"I have just heard all sorts of positive things about this track," Hutton said. "The more I think about it, the more upset I get, because I think of all the hard work the kids put into this. How can we teach them respect for government if they do all this work on something worthwhile and then the city tells them to tear it down?"

And as for the concern raised about the track becoming too big in the future, Hutton said, "I don't see that as any problem. School is starting in two weeks, and I'm sure the kids will not be spending as much time at the track then. This whole thing just doesn't seem fair to the kids."

After hearing that the track would need to be dismantled, Mark Holcomb and some of the other riders tried to work out a compromise with area residents and officials.

"We went door-to-door and talked to some of the residents, asking if we could just have the race tonight (Aug. 17) and then tear it down tomorrow," Mark said. "We finally got everyone's permission to do that. We're glad to have the race, but we're sad that we have to take the track down."

Humphrey stressed that the city felt extremely bad about the situation and wanted to do everything possible to remedy it. "I met with some of the kids, and I suggested they meet with the Parks Board," Humphrey said. "Maybe they can find somewhere to build a track where it isn't so close to other houses."

For the time being, though, the St. Johns BMX riders are still in search of a place to race. And as Mark Hutton put it, "We need somewhere to ride."

Teachers and board in Mexican standoff...

Teacher contract negotiations were stalled again following three hours of talks Monday, and a state mediator will be called in to resolve differences.

The announcement was made by St. Johns Education Association President Gary Congleton, who said the teachers' union, represented by the Ingham County Education Association, is asking for a nine percent raise with additional increment raises of three percent on Sept. 1 and six percent to be paid in a lump sum next June.

The school board, meanwhile, has stuck by its demand for a wage freeze, but has backed off from demands for cuts in fringe benefits, reports said.

Teachers are also asking for expanded longevity payments, an early retirement payment, increased insurance benefits, expanded leave benefits, increased aide time and a decrease in class sizes in combination grade classes, Congleton said.


However, through their chief negotiator, George Johnson of the Michigan Association of School Boards, school board members insist funds for teacher and other employee raises are not available (also negotiating contracts are secretaries and custodians; bus drivers and school aides are being pressured to renegotiate mid-way through their two-year contracts).

St. Johns voters rejected a millage increase in June which would have prevented combined grade classes, and administration budget figures say a wage freeze is

necessary to prevent further cuts in staff and programs. But Congleton says he doesn't believe the board's budget figures.

"The teachers are convinced there are funds available. In fact, we believe the fund equity (cash on hand) is much greater than the teachers or public have been led to believe," Congleton said.

Johnson, who is also the board's designated spokesman regarding negotiations, could not be reached for comment, but Congleton said attempts are being made to schedule a mediated meeting as soon as possible. School is scheduled to open Aug. 31, and teachers will meet to discuss negotiation problems on Aug. 26, he said.

...As administrators warm up to freeze

More than half of the administrators and counselors at St. Johns schools have told board members they will accept a wage freeze, putting more pressure on teachers as another round of contract bargaining approaches.

The announcement was made at a meeting of the St. Johns School Board Wednesday night, Aug. 11, five days before teacher contract talks resumed Monday, Aug. 16 — the last scheduled talks before school starts Aug. 31.

But it probably came as no surprise to board members. The original memo in which administrators proposed a wage freeze was sent to then board president Ron Huard on Jan. 25. The timing of the announcement was good news, however, Board President Robert Craig said.

"We're very pleased," Craig said. "Certainly I think this provides leadership on behalf of the administrators and counselors for all other employees and it certainly shows the administrators recognize the financial plight of the school district and that they're willing to do their part."

No formal action was taken by the board to accept the group's proposal, since all of the school system's 20 ad-

ministrators and counselors have not yet been heard from, Craig said. Letters supporting a wage freeze were received from 11 members of the group, which is not an organized bargaining unit, and "others are in the mail," Craig said.

"Still, there's always the possibility others in the group might object," he said, so the board delayed formal action until their September meeting. Meanwhile, a motion commending the group was passed, he said.

Not included in the group are Superintendent Don Burns, who retires in January, and business Manager Rick Terres, whose contract expires in December. Burns was one of the first to agree to a wage freeze when the board decided at a meeting last January not to increase his salary prior to retirement.

Most of the remaining school employees are either presently bargaining for new contracts or have been asked by the board to re-negotiate existing contracts for wage cuts and fringe benefit reductions.

Teachers, whose contract will set the standard for other groups, were back at the negotiating table Monday. They have refused to accept a wage freeze and disagree with the board's assessment of the district's financial plight. Craig said the move by administrators

could strengthen the board's bargaining position.

"We certainly hope it will provide a positive aspect, not only with teachers but with all employees," he said.

Although all but two county districts are also negotiating teacher contracts, the nearest recent settlement has been in Williamston, where teachers were granted raises of 5 percent and 12 percent over a two-year period.

"We have discussed what other settlements are taking place, but we simply will continue to look at our own financial status," Craig said. "We will continue to stay right where we're at," he said of the wage freeze demand.

If teachers are not satisfied financial need warrants a wage freeze, a strike is possible, Mike Gehoski, chief negotiator for the St. Johns Education Association says.

Fowler 'critical' state board says

Fowler's Aug. 23 millage election is "crucial," according to State Superintendent of Public Instruction Phillip E. Runkel.

The Clinton County district was among seven in the Lansing area named by Runkel in a recent news release citing districts in which millage elections "are crucial to their operation of a full year of classroom instruction in 1982-83," reports said.

Fowler voters will be asked to approve 23 mills — a 20.80 mill renewal and 2.20 additional mills.

"Because of the state's poor economic conditions, the districts can't look to the state for a 'bail out' to keep their schools open," Runkel said. "The education of

children is vital and the residents of these communities must assume the responsibility of supporting their schools during these difficult economic times."

Fowler voters turned down a similar request in June by a narrow margin, joining 49 other districts in the state to suffer millage election defeats at the annual school election.

The 50 districts were put on a "critical or serious" financial list by the State Board of Education. Fowler, which will be forced to get by with just 6.82 allocated mills if the Aug. 23 request is turned down, is considered critical, reports said.

Also named in the Lansing area were Fowlerville, Fulton-Middleton, St. Louis, Montabella, Portland and Stockbridge.

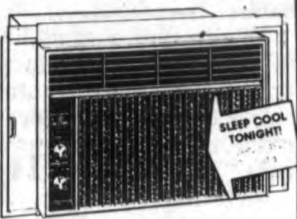

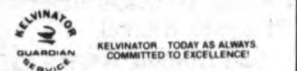

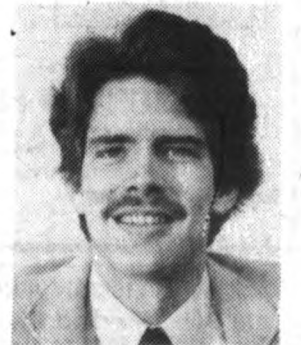

Board chooses method to choose superintendent

A professional "headhunter" will be hired to find St. Johns' next superintendent of schools, it was decided by school board members at their August meeting.

Board members will hire the talents of placement and personnel expert Dr. Carl Brautigan of the Michigan School Boards Association (MSBA) to conduct a search for the district's next superintendent, according to present Superintendent Don Burns. Burns retires in January.

Among other things, Brautigan will sample opinions from school staffers and local citizens to help define the right man or woman for the job, and will conduct an interview workshop designed to help board members ask the right questions, Burns said.

If Brautigan's full range of services — including search and selection of candidates and almost everything but the final interview and hiring decision — are used, his fee would be about \$2,500, Burns said. But

some services the MASB expert offers are not needed by St. Johns and the fee should be somewhat lower, he said.

Board members also considered hiring similar services from Michigan State University (MSU), but opted for MSBA's package because MSU's did not include contact with community and staff persons.

Also during the Wednesday night, Aug. 11 meeting, board members approved a plan which "resolves concerns" on the part of parents of East Essex Elementary students, Burns said.

Worried about their children being bussed to attend city classes as part of a board plan to remedy small class sizes, East Essex parents began complaining to the board soon after the plan was announced.

Instead of busing the rural students to the city, the board has decided to combine grades in all East Essex classrooms, pushing class sizes up to the limit of 28 students. The plan means more students will be taught in combined first and second grade classes, but makes busing unnecessary, Burns said.

Any new students arriving in the East Essex area,

however, may have to be bused, since class sizes are at the maximum, he said.

In other action, board members:

- Reviewed several policies, including use of facilities, priority for extra-curricular activities and athletics, and graduation requirements. "We do have, obviously, graduation requirements, but they have never been written up as a board policy," Burns said. Without a formal board policy, the requirements could be legally challenged, he said.

- Hired two new special education teachers, Shelly Gunther of St. Johns, a former Ionia teacher, and Pat Dorow of Williamston.

- Accepted bids from Jerry Hufnagel for roofing Central Elementary in the amount of \$29,180; from PJS Commercial for summer and year-round cleaning of facilities, totalling \$1,550 and \$19,900, respectively; and from Kraft-Sealtest for milk at 13¢ for white milk and 14¢ for chocolate. The milk bids mean no increase in prices, but costs could go up forcing price hikes later in the year, Burns pointed out.

Family reunion is held

Fifty six decendants of Issac F. Cressman, met at the South Bingham Cemetary and the Church of the Open Bilbe, Sat. July 24, 1982. A bountiful potluck dinner was served in the church basement, at 1 admist much visiting and reminising.

After a short business meeting, a little six year old Joey Sanchez, great, great, grandson of Issac F. Cressman, played several selections of his accordian. Arden Cressman read a brief sketch of the migration of Issac F. Cressman, from Penn. to Michigan in 1861. After attending Allentown Seminary for three years, he left school to enlist in the Union Forces, but was turned down for health reasons. He then came to Michigan and taught school in Pontiac. In 1863 he purchased a farm in Bengal Township, and in 1865 he purchased 360 acres in Bigham Township, where he raised his 10 children, and lived the rest of his life.

Eight of those ten children, and many of their decendants, are buried at

the South Bingham Cemetary. The group toured the cemetary, and observed 31 graves of Issac F. Cressman decendants. Many of the younger family members were very interested in learning more about their family roots, and their relationship to generations past.

Several of out group are interested in re-establishing their links with the National Organization of Cressmans who have published a history of the "Crossman, Kressman, Cressman, Crissman, Crisman family". That group meets annually to study the genology of the Cressmans. There are several other published books on verious branches of the Cressman Family. There are committees at work on various projects, and some are touring Germany to so further research.

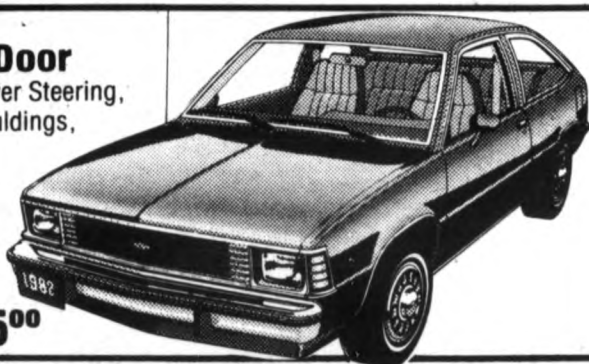
It was voted that our group hold the next Cressman Reunion at the South Bingham Cemetary and Church, at about the same time in July.

Then came Bronson

I always figured anyone who couldn't change their mind didn't have one to begin with, and I've found that changing horses in the middle of a stream can be refreshing, at least.

So, exercising what before ERA was only a woman's prerogative, we recently decided to change our flag. For all of you who haven't seen "Deadline, USA," that's the section at the top of page-one carrying the newspaper's name, publication date, cost and, usually, a boast like: "All The News That Fits is Printed," or: "Printed Since Before You Were Born." (In our case, our boast is: "Serving Clinton Area Readers Since 1856.")

Actually, that stuff about horses in the stream isn't exactly accurate: I didn't really change my mind. I never did like The Clinton County News' flag. The top of the courthouse in the center is practically invisible — it shows up just enough to get in the way of the "N" in Clinton and the "C" in County. In fact, if it weren't for the clock at the top, it could easily be mistaken for a Purple Martin bird house.

Don't get the idea we're breaking some long-standing tradition, though. The flag on the County News has changed many times. To prove it, I went through some back issues.

Before 1924, this paper had a split personality. It was two papers, the St. Johns Democrat and the Clinton Republican. The

publishers apparently decided the town wasn't big enough for both of them, however, and the papers merged, becoming the Clinton County Republican News (sounds like the Democrats got the short end of the stick in that move — their merger with the Republicans, in name at least, sounds more like a fly merging with a windshield).

About 40 years later, in 1964, the paper dropped "Republican" from the flag — which must be news to many in the county who still stop by to ask about their subscription to the Clinton County Republican.

When he introduced the name change, then publisher Ink White told readers it had nothing to do with an about-face — or even a left-face — in the newspaper's political stance. "It always seemed to me that a newspaper which tries to represent all the people in the area works under something of a handicap when its name may be repugnant politically to a sector of the people it serves," he said.

"Personally, in spite of hell and Goldwater, I remain a Republican and my political views will continue to be expressed on this page," he added, silencing the brief cheers from county Democrats. White's comments were made in an editorial page statement in the first issue with the new name and new flag on June 18, 1964.

Since then, The Clinton County News has remained the only weekly newspaper published in St. Johns. The flag has been changed three times in those 18 years, including the latest improvements, but the name has remained the same.

I hope you'll agree the new flag looks better. We also changed our standing heads throughout the paper for a cleaner look throughout (old heads with a new mast would be like wearing new shoes over holey socks).

We know looks aren't everything, but cosmetics can mean a lot when you're 126 years old.

The day a sinkhole swallowed me alive

exactly what had happened. But Mrs. Temple very graciously let me wash up in their house before I left. And I didn't hear anyone laughing, either. At least not while I was there.

I then went back to my car and decided that my pants were just too muddy to wear any longer. And there was no telling what they would do to the car's upholstery on the way home. So as I hoped no one was looking, I very quickly took off my pants and hopped in the car.

Now there was only one problem. The way my luck had gone that day, I was positive a policeman was going to pull me over for something on the way home. Imagine having to explain to an officer why you are driving into St. Johns wearing nothing but your underwear. 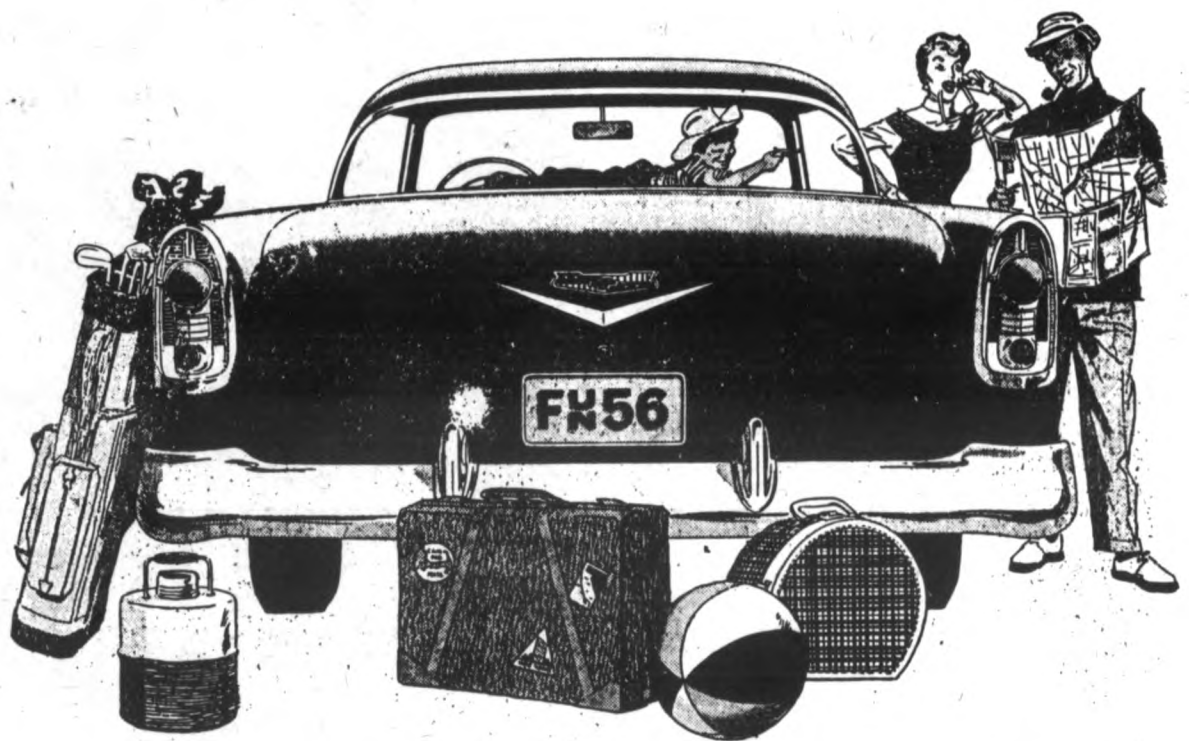

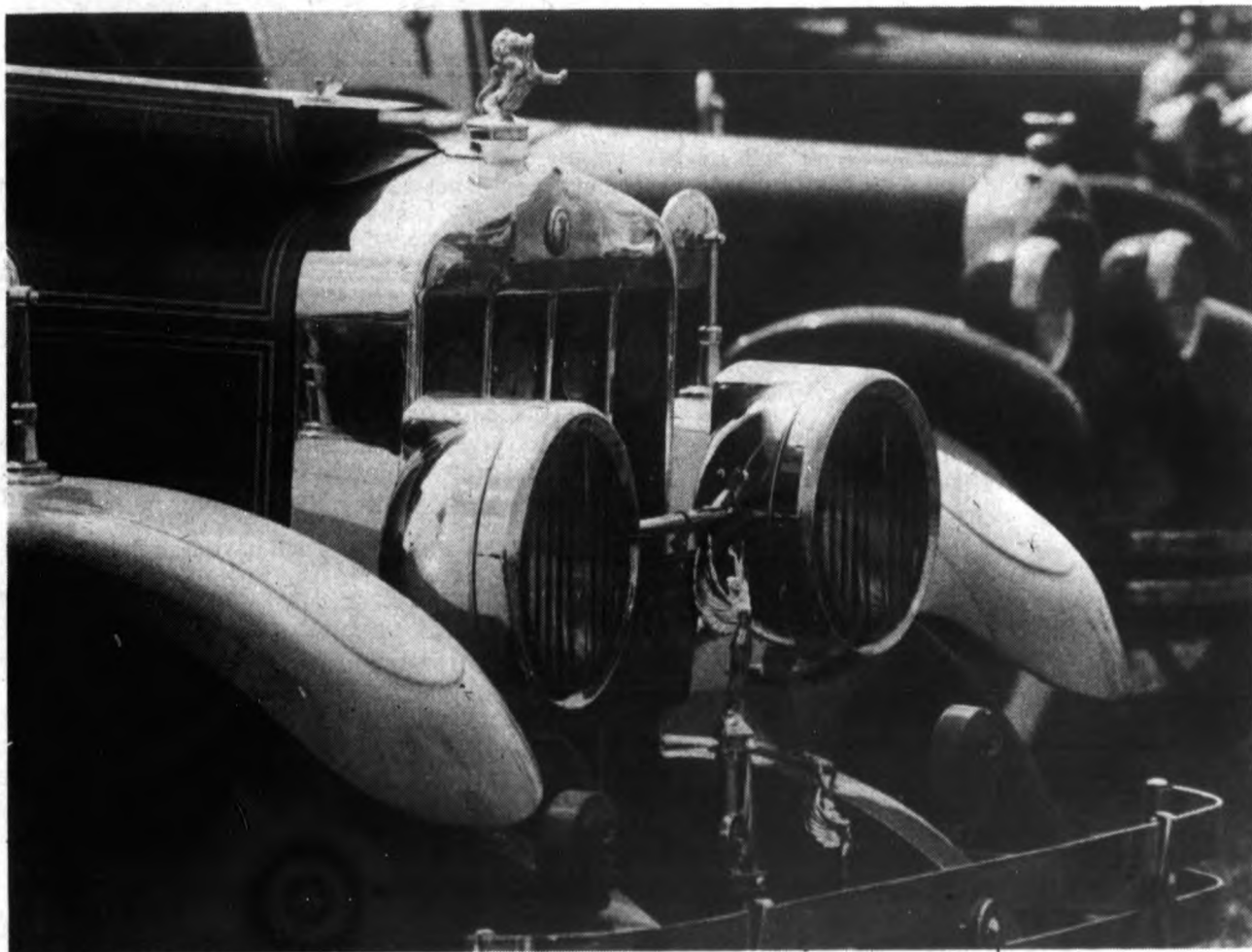


A bygone era

DeWitt wrestlers struggle in Iowa

With over 800 of the top high school wrestlers in the country on hand, no one said it would be easy for DeWitt's Jim Sinadinos and Doug Peiffer in the United States Wrestling Federation Junior National Championships.

It wasn't.

Sinadinos, who will be a senior at DeWitt High School this fall, posted a 3-2 record in the 123-pound Greco-Roman competition, but lost two straight matches in the freestyle event.

Peiffer, who just graduated from DeWitt and will attend Saginaw Valley State College on a wrestling scholarship in the fall, also lost two straight, competing in the 143-pound freestyle event.

The meet, which was held at the University of Iowa July 27-31, featured the best wrestlers from all over the country, according to DeWitt wrestling coach Randy Smith, who was one of the coaches of the Michigan contingent.

"As far as Jim is concerned, he did very well for his first experience at that level of competition," Smith said. "He made it to the top ten in his pool of 25 in Greco, which is very good."

"But this year made him hungry. He's definitely planning on going back next year."

One of Sinadinos' problems, according to Smith, was a shoulder injury he suffered in his first Greco-Roman loss in the tournament. "That really depleted his performance," Smith said. "It really affected him the rest of the way."

As for Peiffer, who was a two-time state champion at DeWitt, he was forced to add some poundage to make the 143-pound class. "He's normally a 132-pounder," Smith said. "He would have done a lot better if he wrestled at 132."

In addition to competing against the best grapplers in the country, the meet in Iowa City was also a chance for the athletes to impress the college coaches. Because the tournament is considered to be the best in the nation, it attracts virtually every college coach.

CML headed to Colorado for nationals

After a season in which the St. Johns Central Michigan Lumber (CML) Women's Fastpitch Softball team lost almost twice as many games as it won, the players weren't getting their hopes up for the Michigan Class A tournament.

Through Aug. 11, CML had a 14-27 overall record. Competing in the tough Michigan Women's Major Fastpitch Association, CML had a mark of 2-14 in league play, putting it in last place in the East Division.

So after CML got some outstanding pitching and defense to win the tournament July 30-Aug. 1 in Wyoming, it's understandable when coach Ken Schmitt says, "It's still like a dream for us. After the way our season had gone, winning the state tournament was very unexpected."

Well, the CML players better not plan on staying on Cloud Nine too long, because they have to get ready for the National Fastpitch Tournament Aug. 27-29 in Grand Junction, Colo. CML earned the right to compete for the national crown by winning the state title. And if the softballers thought winning the state tournament was tough, they haven't seen anything yet.

With 22 of the best fastpitch teams in the country on hand, the national tourney looks to be extremely tough. "I would guess the best teams will come from the south," Schmitt said, "because they can

play all year round, but we've been trying to line up some games to get us ready. And we've been practicing a lot, too. We're just going back to the fundamentals."

In winning the state tournament, the fundamentals CML handled best were pitching and defense. It allowed no runs in four games, thanks to the superb pitching of JoEllen Smith and JoAnn McKim. Smith and McKim, along with Debbie Kent and Delores Thomas, will be counted on to carry the pitching load in Colorado.

"We're going to live and die by our pitching and defense," Schmitt said. "If we start making errors and our pitching falls through, then we just won't win."

But the coach is quick to point out that the hitting will also need to be improved. "We don't think that we can average two hits a game and go anywhere in the nationals," Schmitt said. "That's what we averaged in the state tournament, but our pitching and defense was just so great."

The players will depart for Grand Junction Aug. 25, and bearing the majority of their travel expenses will be CML owner and team sponsor Paul Welch.

"He's putting up an awful lot of money for us to fly out there," Schmitt said. "We are also having a few raffles and hings, but mostly, it's been him supporting us."

Size-wise, P-W looks tough to top in '82

It's a good thing Mike Folk knows how to coach football, because he probably couldn't make a living as a football predictor.

Looking at this year's Central Michigan Athletic Conference (CMAC) race, the Pewamo-Westphalia head coach semi-seriously concluded that "Fowler and Portland St. Pats will finish in a tie for first, followed by Potterville. We should be able to contend for fourth place."

According to some of the other coaches in the area, chances of P-W finishing as low as fourth are as likely as a blizzard in August.

"Pewamo-Westphalia is huge," said Fowler coach Steve Spicer. "I see them as being the definite favorite to win the league."

"Steve picks us to win the league every year," Folk said with a laugh. "And we've only done it once in the last three years. We go to this clinic together every year, and he always picks us to win and I always pick them to win."

Well, chances are Spicer will prove to have the clearest crystal ball this season. Folk's Pirates return nine starters from last year's team, which went 9-0, won the league and ended up as the number-13 team in the final Class C state poll.

And we're not just talking regular starters here. We're talking about some very big boys. Take, for example, the offensive line. P-W will once again have the services of tackles Dennis Kolp (6-1, 230 pounds) and Dan Thelen (6-0, 215), guard Dave Rademacher (6-1, 225) and center Chris McQueary (5-8, 203). All four were

starters last season. That's not just a big high school line, but it could probably rival some Big Ten teams as well.

The Pirates will also have tight end Jeff Spitzley (6-2, 200) and wide receiver Jim Weber (6-0, 170) returning.

Weber was the team's leading pass catcher last year and earned first-team All-CMAC honors. End Terry Thelen (6-2, 195) is also back, and may see some time on the offensive line as well.

In the offensive backfield, P-W is fortunate to once again have quarterback Ted Droeste calling the signals. As the starter last season, Droeste was named to the second-team All-CMAC squad. "Ted is an excellent all-around quarterback," Folk said. "He's a good runner and a good passer."

At the halfback position, George Heckman is back for his senior year. The 5-11, 170-pound Heckman gained 450 yards last season. "He's the quickest kid on our team," Folk said. "He's a good combination of speed and power."

Defensively, the Pirates will have Dan Pohl back at

the safety spot. Pohl was an All-CMAC selection last year, and according to Folk, "Dan might start at halfback for us this year, too. He's also our backup quarterback. He's a very valuable player to have."

Nose guard Mark Miller (5-10, 165) will also be back. Miller was a second-team All-CMAC pick last year. Other seniors who should be starters are fullback Dean Pohl (5-10, 170) and defensive tackle Paul Bearss (6-0, 185).

Some juniors who should fit into the P-W lineup include running back Tom Schafer (5-10, 170) and fullback Brian Thelen (5-8, 160). "Both of those kids are very quick," Folk said. "We might use them in the defensive secondary to utilize that quickness."

Another junior who should help give the Pirates some depth on the line is Jim Pohl (5-11, 165).

There also might be a few sophomores playing on the P-W varsity in 1982, Folk said. "The junior varsity team was undefeated last year," Folk said, "and there were eight freshmen starters on that team, so we might be able to use a few of those kids this year."

The best of the sophomore crop include Doug Nurenborg (6-0, 195) and "the strongest kid in our weight program," Folk said, Vern Miller (5-9, 195) and Tim Drac (6-2, 195). "At least one of those kids will probably play on the varsity," Folk said.

As for their schedule, the Pirates will be squaring off against three teams they've never played before. The reason, according to Folk, is to beef up the schedule and give P-W a better shot at making the state playoffs. "Of the three new teams, two are Class B schools (Eaton Rapids and Portland) and one is Class C (DeWitt)," Folk said. "We open against Eaton Rapids and they should be excellent. They finished second to Okemos in the Capital-Area Conference last year."

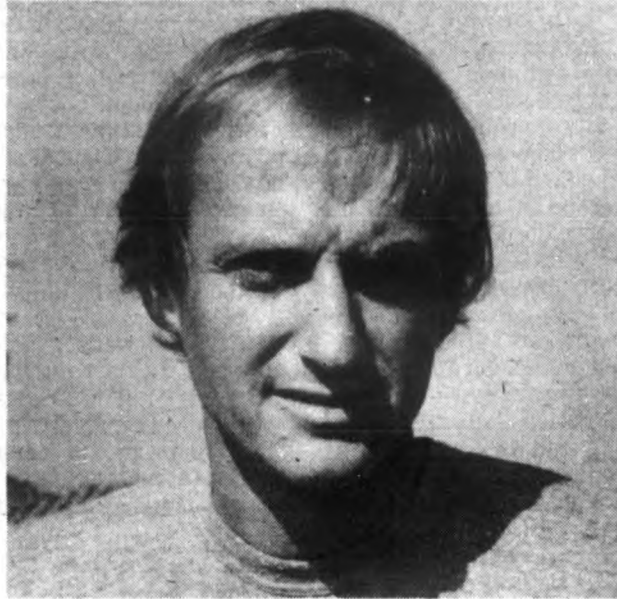
And even though his team will be bigger than any it

plays (unless he schedules a game against the New York Jets), Folk does anticipate a battle for the league title. "I don't care how many kids Fowler lost," he said, "Fowler is always tough on us. And Portland St. Pats has almost everybody back from last year."

"But our goal every year is just to win the league. The playoffs are nice, but they aren't everything. We just want to take the games one week at a time."

And if the Pirates do finish as low as fourth in the league, as Folk predicted, expect a snowstorm sometime next summer.

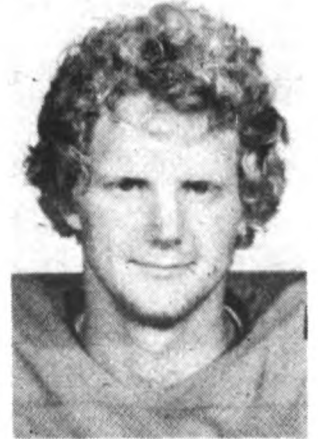
Three county gridders suit up for Saginaw

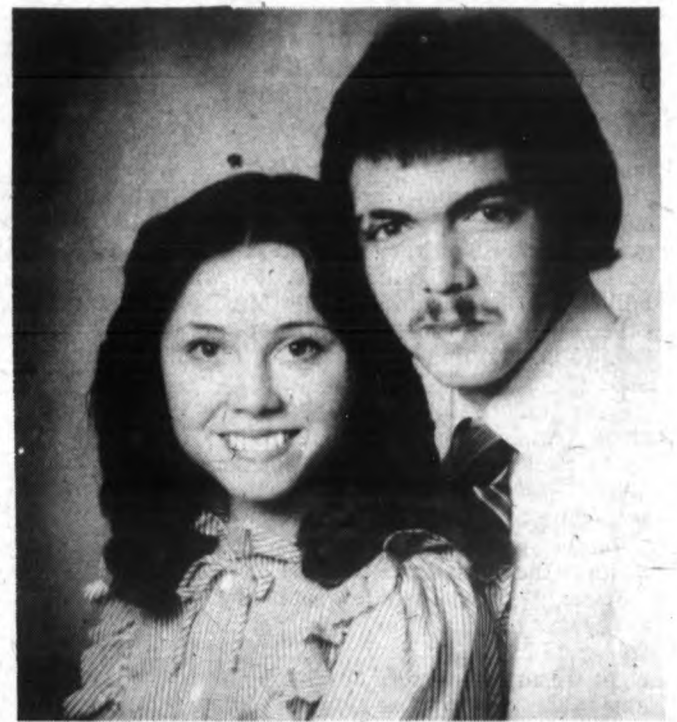

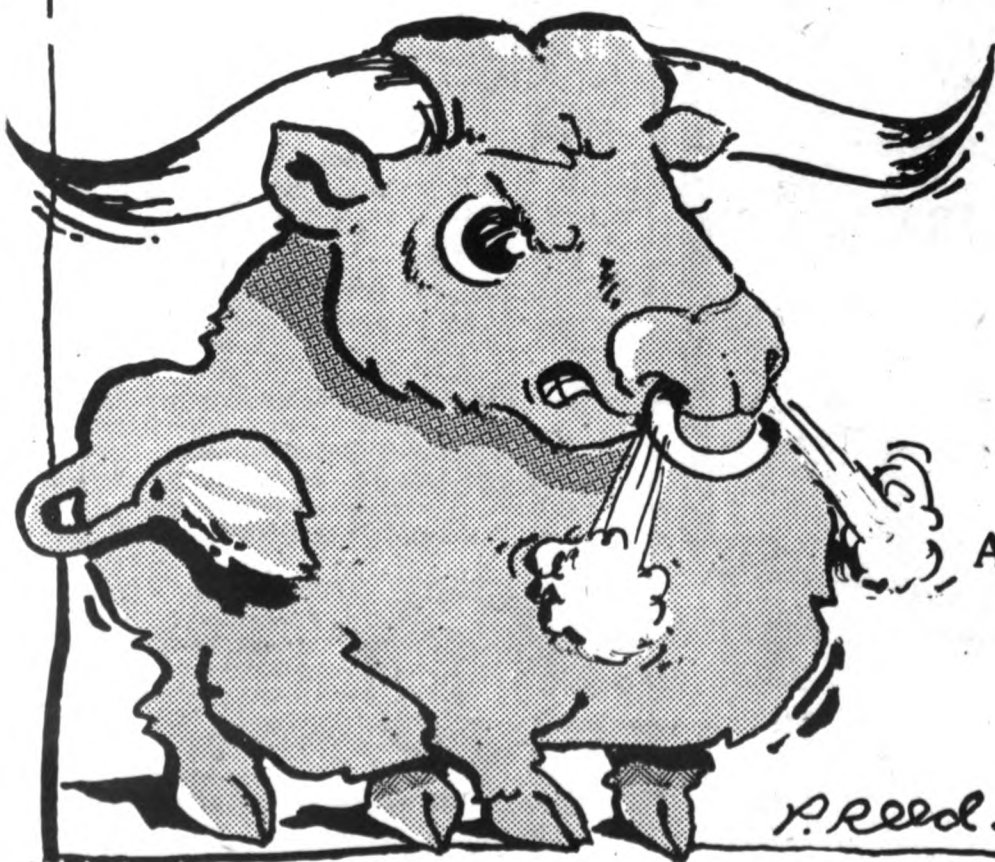

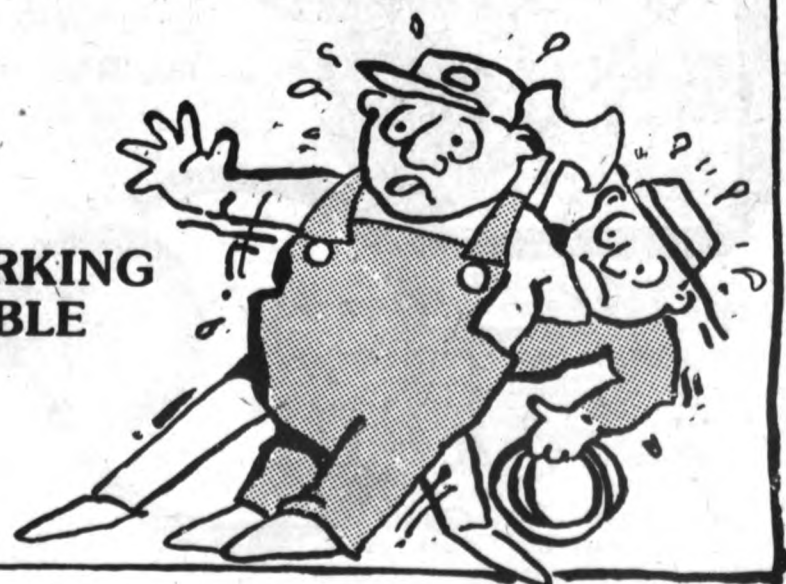

New program offered at Carson City Hospital

Starting Friday, Aug. 6, Carson City Hospital in conjunction with the physicians on its medical staff, will be providing access to a physician in the evening and on weekends when physician's are not normally available. Called the "After Hours Care Program", the new service is designed to provide continuity of physician care normally not available during the nighttime hours and on weekends.

The new program will be operated out of the Hospital's Emergency Services Department, but with fees less than those required for Emergency Room services. According to Dr. Harry Devore, the Hospital's Chief of Staff, the new program is designed to address the chronic dilemma of people needing physician care in off hours but not really having a true emergency. "The After Hours Care Program is simply a way of saying we have a responsibility for

your good health 24 hours a day. At the same time, we do not feel the patient should have to pay for emergency visit when it is not truly an emergency".

The After Hours Care Program will be available to anyone from 7 p.m. in the evening to 5 a.m. the following morning, Monday through Friday, and weekends from 7 p.m. Friday to 5 a.m. Monday. Patients utilizing the service should go to the Emergency Room entrance on the west side of the hospital off of Third St. leading to the hospital from Michigan

Highway 57. Parking is available directly across the street from the Emergency Room entrance.

Basic charges for the After Hours Care Program will be about the same as for a physician office call, pointed out Bruce Traverse, Administrator of Carson City Hospital.

As a normal hospital policy with Emergency Patients, if an After Hour Care Program patient's physician is a member of the Carson City Hospital Medical Staff, the physician will automatically be

notified of their patient's visit and receive copies of all the results, ect. Patient's with existing family physician's will be instructed to receive follow-up care, if necessary.

anyone regardless of physician on the Hospital's their affiliation with the Medical Staff.

FRESH APPLE BUTTER CAKE

Next month those delicious cooking apples will be ready. Save this recipe for that special Sunday dinner.

- 1 c. butter
- 3 eggs
- ½ tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. nutmeg
- 3 c. peeled chopped apples
- 2 c. chopped walnuts
- 2 c. sugar
- 1 ½ tsp. soda
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 3 c. flour
- 2 tsp. vanilla

In bowl, beat butter and sugar until creamy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add flour, soda, salt, cinnamon, and nutmeg and vanilla. Fold in chopped apples and nuts. Pour into greased and floured tube pan. Bake in a 325 degree oven until toothpick inserted comes out clean (about 1 ½ hours). Let stand 15 minutes, before removing from pan. Spread on the following glaze:

SHERRY GLAZE: In pan stir 1 ½ c. sugar and ½ c. sherry. Cook, stirring constantly until syrupy (about 2 minutes).

MYSTERY FUDGE CAKE

The mystery is the addition of green tomatoes to make this a delicious, mysterious and moist cake.

- 2 ½ c. flour
- ½ c. cocoa
- 2 ½ tsp. baking powder
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 c. finely chopped walnuts
- ¾ c. butter
- 2 c. sugar
- 3 eggs
- 2 c. coarsely grated or minced green tomatoes
- 2 tsp. grated orange peel
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- ½ c. milk

Mix flour, cocoa, baking powder, soda, salt and cinnamon in a medium size bowl; stir in nuts.

Cream butter and granulated sugar in large mixer bowl; beat in eggs one at a time. Stir in tomatoes, orange peel and vanilla. Add flour mixture alternately with milk. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Spoon batter into greased and floured 10 inch tube or bundt pan. Bake until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. About 1 hour. Cool cake in pan 15 minutes; remove from pan. Cool completely on wire rack. Sprinkle with powdered sugar if desired.

LOW CALORIE CHEESE CAKE

You don't have to give up everything good just because you are watching your weight. Makes 12 servings at 155 calories each. Serve this desert for your whole family.

1. Mix 2 envelopes Knox unflavored Gelatin, ¼ c. sugar and ¼ tsp. salt together thoroughly in the top of a double boiler.
2. Beat together 2 egg yolks and 1 c. skim milk. Add to gelatin mixture and cook over boiling water, stirring constantly until gelatin is thoroughly dissolved, about 8 min.
3. Remove from heat; add 1 tsp. grated lemon rind; cool.
4. Stir in 3 c. creamed cottage cheese (24 oz.) sieved, 1 tsp. lemon juice and 1 tsp. vanilla. Chill, stirring occasionally until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon.
5. Fold in 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten.
6. Beat ½ c. ice cold water and ½ c. nonfat dry milk together with a mixer until stiff and mixture stands in peaks. Fold into gelatin mixture.
7. Turn into an 8 inch spring form pan that you have sprayed lightly with Pam. Sprinkle top with a mixture of ½ c. graham cracker crumbs (4 crackers), 1/8 tsp. cinnamon, 1/8 tsp. nutmeg. Chill until firm.

ZESTY ITALIAN SAUCE

A nice sauce for lasagna, pizza or other similar dishes.

- 54 med. tomatoes cut up (36 cups)
- 3 tbsp. brown sugar
- 1 ½ tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. pepper
- 3 large chopped onions
- ¾ c. snipped parsley
- 6 cloves garlic, minced
- 3 tbsp. each: snipped fresh basil, fresh oregano, fresh thyme
- 3 bay leaves

Remove stem ends and core the fully ripe tomatoes. Cut up the tomatoes and let stand in colander 15 to 20 minutes to drain. In a 10 quart dutch oven combine the tomatoes, brown sugar, salt and pepper. Bring to boil, stirring occasionally. Boil gently, uncovered, 1 hour, stirring occasionally. Puree through food mill; return puree to pan. Add onions, parsley, garlic and basil, oregano, thyme and bay leaves. Boil gently uncovered, 1 ¼ hours or until it reaches the desired consistency. To process: pack hot sauce into clean hot pint jars, leaving 1 inch of headspace. Adjust lids. Process in boiling water bath for 55 minutes. To freeze: Remove sauce from heat; cool. Pack in pint freezer containers, leaving ½ inch headspace, label and freeze. Makes 5 pints of sauce.

- 1 c. heavy cream
- ¾ c. superfine granulated sugar
- 1 env. unflavored gelatin
- ¼ c. water
- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese
- ½ tsp. vanilla

Spray a 4 cup mold lightly with PAM. Combine sour cream and heavy cream in a medium-size saucepan. Beat in the sugar; place the pan over very low heat to warm. Sprinkle gelatin over water in a cup to soften. Place cup in a saucepan with hot water to dissolve and liquify. Stir into the warm cream mixture; remove from heat. Beat the cream cheese until soft in a medium size bowl with electric mixer. Stir in the cream mixture gradually with the vanilla, blending thoroughly. Pour into prepared mold. Refrigerate 4 hours or until firm. Unmold on a pretty serving plate and surround with fresh fruits and berries.
