Big turnout of voters approves Fowler millage

Sports fans, music lovers and teachers in Fowler can rest easier following the district's millage vote Monday. Voters approved a 23 mill package, maintaining the status quo and averting possible program cuts, at least for now.

"We were really quite pleased," Superintendent Jim Andros said. "Basically we will work to maintain the same programs we had last year."

The same 23 mill request was rejected by voters June 14, by a narrow margin of 48 votes, 255 to 207. One reason the vote turned around in the latest attempt might have been a much larger turnout.

Almost twice as many Fowler voters went to the polls and the millage was approved by a wide margin of 128 votes, 437 to 309.

The millage package combined a 2.2 mill increase with 20.8 operating mills, a strategy which has often backfired in other districts and which failed in Fowler on its first try. But Andros said there was no other choice.

"If we had gone with the split (offering voters the increase separately) it would have been a give-away," he said. "They would have approved the operating mills and defeated the additional."

Fowler was listed as a "critical" district by the State Board of Education in a recent report which said the district

probably would not have been able to conduct an entire school year without approval of additional mills. It was among seven named in the Lansing area in which millage increases would be necessary for continued operation during the school year, State Superintendent Phillip Runkel said. But thanks to additional cuts in state aid to education announced recently, the district's extra millage will not allow any increase in teaching staff or programs, Andros said.

"With the recent executive order cut and with the state's economy as it is, we are expecting even lower state aid next year," he said. "We'll have to use our 2.2 just to keep things even. We really aren't going to increase anything significantly."

The only change in programs from a year ago, he said, would be the return of a half-time librarian to the staff.

"Last year we had no librarian at all," he said.

Fowler would have been forced to make cuts in sports and other extra-curricular programs and would have had to reduce its staff further without passage of the millage, Andros said earlier.

But with August's state-aid payments delayed indefinitely and more cuts predicted, the district is not out of the woods yet, the superintendent said. (For more on the state aid situation, turn to page 3)

Says MASB recruiter should be licensed

Headhunter says school's search improper

A Wacousta man says he will file a complaint with state officials charging that the Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB) has violated state licensing laws in its attempt to help St. Johns find a new school superintendent.

"I'm not out to get them. I'd just like to force the (state) Department of Licensing and Regulation to clarify the situation," Bob Donner said. "I'm not trying to put them out of business."

Donner says he became curious about the MASB's offer to help St. Johns find its next superintendent after reading a Clinton County News story published Aug. 19.

Donner, a self-described "professional headhunter" and co-owner of a Lansing professional recruiting agency, Shermtech Engineering Service Inc., took exception to the report that St. Johns had hired a "headhunter" from the MASB, Dr. Carl Brautigan.

He said Brautigan's fee of about \$2,500 is "way below normal for a professional headhunter."

"Obviously, he's getting a salary from someplace else. He couldn't make a living with a fee of \$2,500," he said.

(In fact, Brautigan is a part-time salaried employee of the MASB.)

So, to satisfy his curiosity, Donner said, he called the Department of Licensing and Regulation to see if Brautigan or the MASB were licensed or registered. They are not.

"According to the Michigan Occupational Code of 1980, Article 10, section 1003, personnel, placement or consulting agencies must be licensed if they charge a fee," Donner said. "If they don't charge a fee, they at least have to be registered."

Bill Wagner, Director of the Office of Complaint Analysis at the Department of Licensing and Regulation, said it is "very possible" the MASB is in violation of state licensing laws and should be registered, at least. He said the definition of an employment agency could exempt the MASB from licensing requirements, however.

"What the law says is that if you do this (aid in placement) all the time and that is your profession, then you require a license," he said. "But if you do it just once in a while, it isn't needed."

Brautigan says he has regularly assisted districts throughout Michigan in their search for superintendents since May of 1980, but said a license was not required since his services are not available to the general public.

In fact, he said, the MASB's exemption from licensing requirements was spelled out in a letter from William Ballenger in 1980, when Ballenger was director of the Department of Licensing and Regulation. (Ballenger recently ran, and lost, in a Republican primary race for the U.S. Senate.)

"I'd like to see that letter," Wagner said. "I don't see how Mr. Ballenger arrived at that conclusion."

But Norman Weinheimer, Director of the MASB, said although he couldn't find it at the moment, the letter is on file in his office. "They must have a copy too," he said referring to Wagner. Weinheimer said no license is needed by the MASB.

"We don't help them hire anybody," he said of the

MASB service to St. Johns and other districts. "All we do is advertise for them. We are not a placement service."

He said Ballenger's letter stated, with legal opinions to back it up, that since the MASB is not a placement service, no license is needed.

But, according to Brautigan, MASB helps develop criteria, develops a brochure to advertise open positions, helps in the screening process, teaches interview skills, compiles a list of applicants, critiques interviews and sets up visits with applicants.

This, Donner said, is counseling for the employer, and according to law, counseling employers or employees qualifies as a service to be licensed or registered under the Michigan Occupational Code's definition of "consulting agencies."

"If I have to be licensed and pay the state \$200 a year from the fees companies pay to me — which I disagree with anyway — then others out there who are collecting fees should too," he said. "If they can get an exemption, then why can't I?"

At \$200 annually, the licensing fee in question is one of the highest in the state, Wagner said. "For example, doctors pay a lot less than that," he said. At that rate, in the past three years the MASB would have paid \$600 had licensing been required.

Donner said Monday he would file a complaint against the MASB in "the next couple of days." If the complaint is lodged, an investigation will ensue, Wagner said. "We certainly would not do anymore than tell them a license is required," he said. "If they are operating under a letter which says they're exempt, I don't think we would pursue prosecution. We'd give them a chance to voluntarily comply."

But in addition to Ballenger's letter, there are other reasons the MASB should not be forced to be licensed by the state, Weinheimer said. He said paying licensing fees would be robbing Peter to pay Paul.

"We're a non-profit association," he said. "We're owned by the school districts of the state, so we are part of the state anyway."

County school district introduces low-cost lunches

Free milk, free meals and reduced-price meals for eligible students in Clinton County will be made available by the Clinton County Intermediate School District (CISD) again this fall, reports said.

The CISD policy was announced recently under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, Special Milk Program and United States Department of Agriculture's Donated Food Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria:

- One in family — income for free meals and free milk, \$6,080; reduced price meals, \$8,660.
- Two — free meals and milk, \$8,090; reduced meals, \$11,510.

- Three — free, \$10,090; reduced, \$14,360.
- Four — free, \$12,090; reduced, \$17,210.
- Five — free, \$14,090; reduced, \$20,050.
- Six — free, \$16,090; reduced, \$22,900.
- Seven — free, \$18,100; reduced, \$25,750.
- Eight — free, \$20,100; reduced, \$28,600.

Children from families whose income is at or below these levels are eligible. Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school.

The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility, reports said.

Red tape surgery is her specialty

Loretta Milow sat patiently through the involved explanation of how a St. Johns area resident had been caught in a sticky web of government red tape. "I'll be happy to report your problem to the Senator," she said with a smile when she had carefully recorded the tale of woe. Then, taking a sip from a McDonald's cup of Coke, she looked at the small crowd waiting in the Clinton County Probate Courtroom and said, "Next?"

As a constituent service representative for U.S. Senator Carl Levin, Mrs. Milow is used to listening to complaints and sad stories. It's her job to guide confused citizens through the maze of government agencies and regulations; to go to the top, if necessary, to straighten out problems with Uncle Sam.

"Have you filed an RBD form to change your RE status?" she asks a fellow who is trying to get back INTO the Army. "I never heard of one," the hopeful re-enlistee replies.

"It makes me feel good if I can help somebody," Mrs. Milow says later. The former Little Rock, Ark. resident says she enjoys meeting people and getting things done for them. She sees about 50 people a week and closes 40 cases a month: a batting average of just .200. But Mrs. Milow says she doesn't let the long odds get her down.

"I can really relate to some of these people's problems. When people say they don't have enough money to pay their bills because the check didn't come from the IRS or Social Security, I can imagine what they're going through.

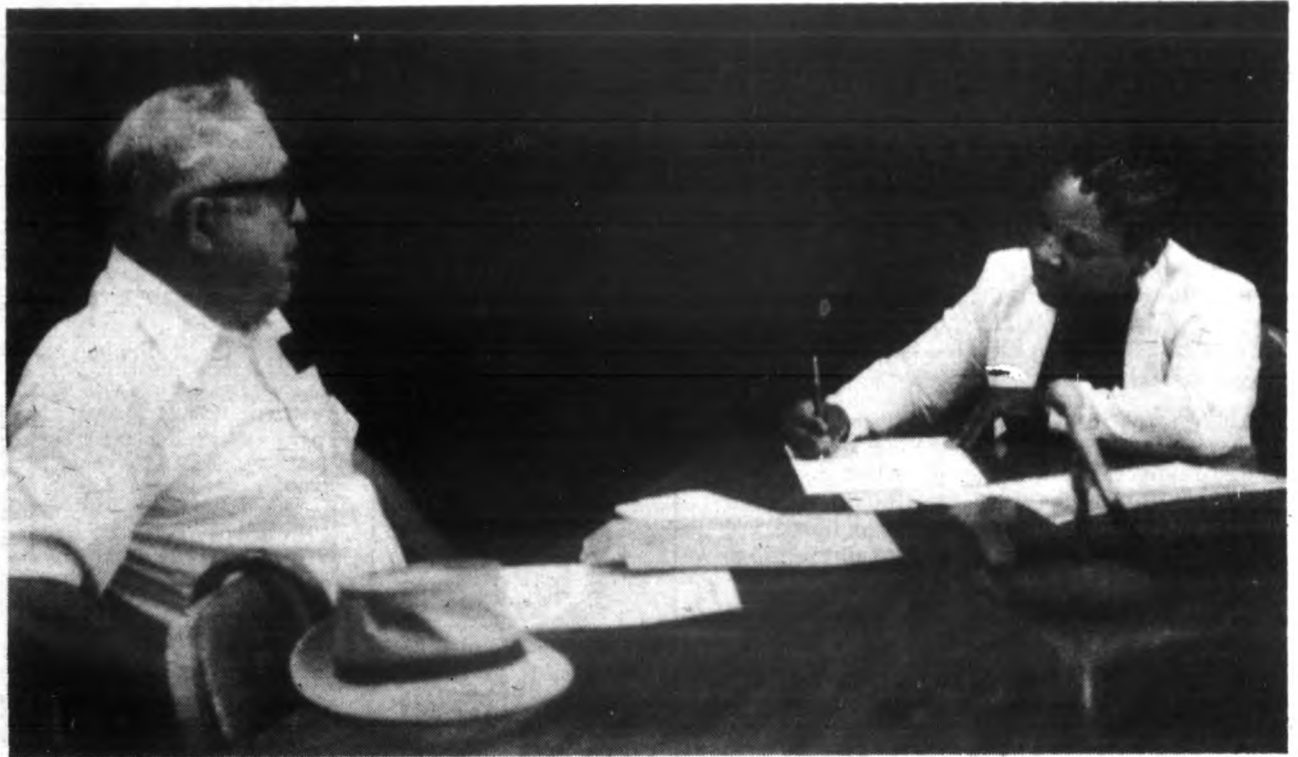
"When I contact the agency, I think of it as though that's my check."

Visiting St. Johns about once every other month since she took the job in May, 1981, Mrs. Milow has often arrived to find an empty room. Usually a handful of people show up, and on one occasion, a "record showing" of about ten farmers upset about federal grain policy were waiting when she arrived. "When we come, we're prepared that zero people show up, so we bring along work to do."

During her two years visiting small towns and cities throughout half of Michigan, Mrs. Milow said she's found the complaints in St. Johns and just about everywhere else revolve around two or three government agencies.

"Social security is at the top of the list," she said, followed by the military, the Veterans Administration (VA) and, usually around tax time, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

Complaints have increased lately, however, and Mrs. Milow blames the rise on a "direct response to the economy."



Howard Hess of Elsie told Loretta Milow he is upset about the way health insurance and social security payments have increased. "You pay in all these years when you don't use it, then when

"It's definitely related. We've had massive numbers of cases who have been denied their disability payments. The Carter administration implemented the review of cases, but it's definitely speeded up since the Reagan administration took office."

People on disability incomes for years or just months have been suddenly notified they are no longer eligible, she said. "Some of these cases can be quite depressing. We can't just tell social security to give them back their benefits. All we can do is tell them what they need to make a good case.

"Many times it helps to get them before an administrative law judge in person. Otherwise they're just another peice of paper."

Constituents with solvable problems can often get real help from Mrs. Milow and other constituent representatives, she said. Congressmen, Senators and their aides have access to agencies not available to the average taxpayer.

"For example," she said, "we have quite a few people who have problems with the VA or the IRS. What we can do is contact the congressional liaison in the IRS and say 'what is the problem?' These liaisons are there just for that purpose and we can get very quick results."

But many who show up to meet her when she comes to town are just there to blow off steam, Mrs.

you get older they raise the rates," he said, urging a national health insurance program. "It's like being penalized for getting old."

Milow said; and the most frequent topic is the President.

"People come and say they're mad at Ronald Reagan, they're mad at the way Ronald Reagan is messin' up things. What they want is someone to listen."

Mrs. Milow listens, filling out a form which will communicate their opinions and suggestions to Senator Levin's aides in Washinton. There, the opinion is compiled along with others on the same topic and presented to the Senator at regular briefings by staff experts on the subject.

"No matter how far off the wall the suggestion or opinion is, we treat them with the same respect," she said. Constituents who come in with compliments or complaints, offbeat suggestions or original solutions to weighty world problems each get a letter in reply, thanking them for their interest and stating the Senator's stand on the issue of concern.

The letters are prepared by staffers from a Levin library containing a wide selection of form letter replies on a variety of current topics, Mrs. Milow said.

"We might need a special section of the library for replies to a few people, but don't quote me on that," she laughed.

School officials say latest state cuts 'devastating'

Disappointment, concern and confusion marked the reactions of Clinton County school administrators to recent news of further cuts in state aid to education.

Education will "bear the brunt" of the next executive ordered budget cuts, State Budget Director Gerald Miller said in an announcement last week, but local school officials said they are not yet sure just how much damage to programs and finances the new cuts will cause.

"It's really too early to tell yet," Fowler Superintendent Jim Andros said. "We really haven't been told yet what the cuts will be."

Unique among county school districts, Fowler was headed for a millage vote Monday when Andros commented on the additional cuts. "Here we're asking for an additional millage and it might be eaten up by another reduction," he complained.

St. Johns Superintendent Don Burns was out of town, but Budget Manager Rick Terres explained the reason for confusion. "Right now the legislature is not even in session 'till next week, so we won't know until then how big the deficit is or how big the cuts will be," he said. "But we're expecting cuts and delays, cuts and delays. It doesn't look good."

"It's going to be devastating," Bath Superintendent Ken Dyer agreed. "That's another \$52,000 we're not going to get."

Like most districts in the county — all but Ovid-Elsie and Pewamo Westphalia — Bath is also negotiating new contracts with teachers. Costs for possible salary increases further muddy the financial waters, Dyer said.

"At this point it's too late to make program cuts but we may make cuts for the second semester," he said.

"And we're in negotiations right now and that will affect our budget."

DeWitt Superintendent Steve Garrett said his district has similar problems, further complicated by delinquent payments from the state.

An "indefinite delay" in state aid payments for August has been announced in a letter to all districts, and most local school officials said they don't ever expect to see their promised August payments. "We've just written August off," Terres said. He said St. Johns will have to borrow money earlier than planned to make their Sept. 10 payroll.

The delay has also caused a change in plans in DeWitt, Garrett said, forcing the district to borrow against state aid payments a month early. "Let's face it, it's \$103,000 plus interest less to spend on education," he said, referring to the August payment. He said the district was caught in a "Catch 22" by the state's delay. Because all districts' payments were delayed, many, like DeWitt, are being forced to borrow earlier. As a result, the state says it cannot process loan applications as quickly. "The state has told us while it ordinarily takes two weeks to process a loan it will take from four to six weeks because of the large number they have to process."

Garrett said a special meeting will be required soon to straighten out the loan details. Meanwhile, the affect of future cuts on the district is unknown, he said.

"Number one, we don't know what the cuts are yet," he said. "And the affect of cuts will depend a lot on the outcome of (teacher and staff) negotiations." Dyer said state cuts could also affect teacher demands.

David Porrell, Ovid-Elsie superintendent, was resigned to the cuts. "We're either going to have to find some way to raise more money — and it's not going to be

another millage — or we'll have to look at some more cuts," he said.

Porrell estimated the executive ordered budget reductions would cost his district from \$85,000 to \$100,000. "Cash-wise, we're in pretty decent shape," he said, referring to a loan of \$980,000 borrowed by the district in anticipation of tax collection. But state aid surgery could put the district back in the red ink it has finally climbed out of, he said.

"We could be in jeopardy again of going into a deficit. We just got out of a deficit," he said.

Most, though, agreed with Dyer that the cuts are probably inevitable. "I understand their (the state's) dilemma," Dyer said. They have a month left in their fiscal year and they don't have any money left.

"It's a very major problem, but we'll come through it."

Commission decides not to condemn building

After postponing the matter for almost six months, the St. Johns City Commission decided at its meeting Aug. 23 not to begin condemnation proceedings on the Oddfellows Building. The commission made its decision after City Clerk Richard Coletta reported that progress had been made in fixing the building up and it was no longer a threat.

The commission first began discussing the matter in March, when it was learned the north wall of the building was badly in need of repair. After issuing a series of ultimatums to the Oddfellows, the commission decided at its Aug. 9 meeting that if sufficient progress was not made in two weeks, condemnation proceedings would begin.

"The City Engineer (Doug Weir) and myself looked at the building and we feel the work has reached a stage where the building could not be classified as dangerous at this time," Coletta said. "With a little more work, it could last for a number of years."

The commissioners also heard a report from Kiwanis club member Lynn Weber that his club was interested in spearheading a drive to purchase "Jaws of Life" rescue equipment for the city. The equipment is useful in getting people out of vehicles they are trapped in.

"The fire department has equipment to help with this sort of thing," Weber said, "but none of it is as effective as the Jaws of Life. What the Kiwanis Club wants to do is get some of the other service clubs to help us raise the money for this."

The commission decided to table the matter until it gets more information on it.

City Manager Randy Humphrey reported that he and Police Chief Lyle French had met with Mike Jones of the Road Commission concerning the Sturgis Street-US-27 intersection. At its Aug. 9 meeting, the commissioners discussed the traffic problems caused by the new Southpoint Mall.

"As you might have noticed, they've already painted lines on Sturgis Street designating the middle lane as left turn only," Humphrey said. "We should have the

lighted overhead signs up there soon."

In other business, the commission:

- Authorized bidding for seeding of the new softball diamond located at the south end of the football field at the City Park.
- Authorized bidding for the painting and repair of the water tower and the ground tank.
- Approved a request by the Jaycettes for the use of

the City Auditorium for their "Sesame Street Breakfast" for children Sept. 25.

- Approved a request by the St. Johns High School Student Council to hold a homecoming parade in the city Oct. 1.
- Approved a request by the Historical Society to hold its annual Home Tour and Crafts Fair Sept. 18. Maple and Linden Streets will be closed off for the Crafts Fair.

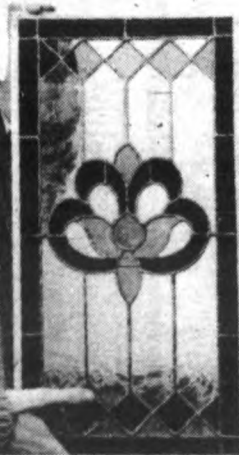

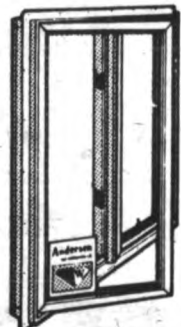

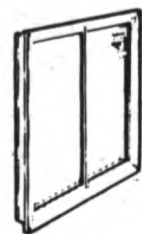

St. Johns man arrested in McDonald's robbery

The arrest of a St. Johns man suspected in an unarmed robbery at McDonald's was among the incidents reported by Clinton County law enforcement agencies this past week.

St. Johns Police arrested Anthony William McGregor, 19, 608 N. Clinton, Apt. 1, St. Johns, Aug. 22 and charged him with the unarmed robbery of a female employee at McDonald's restaurant on Aug. 14, police said. A large sum of money was taken from the employee as she left the restaurant with the day's receipts, police said. McGregor was arraigned Aug. 23 and bond was set at \$5,000. A preliminary hearing has been set for Sept. 1, police said. As of Aug. 24, McGregor was still lodged in the Clinton County Jail, police said. Police Chief Lyle French credited the help of citizens and McDonald's employees in

the apprehension of McGregor.

A two-year-old boy was hurt during the DeWitt Ox Roast Aug. 21 when he wandered onto the exit ramp of a ride and became hooked underneath it, DeWitt City Police said. There was no gate across the exit ramp of the ride, police said. The boy was taken to Sparrow Hospital, where he was treated for head injuries before being released, police said.

A 22-year-old woman was allegedly the victim of a sexual assault Aug. 16 while she was parked on Clark Road near Center Road, Clinton County Sheriff's Deputies said. The victim reported that after her car broke down, a 17-year-old white male sexually assaulted her before releasing her, deputies said. The victim was treated at Ingham Medical

Hospital. The incident is under investigation by the Sheriff's department and the Clinton County Detective Bureau, deputies said.

A white male in his 30's was greeting motorists as they exited US-127 near Stoll Road Aug. 16 by exposing himself, DeWitt Township Police said. Several law enforcement agencies received calls about the man, police said. DeWitt Township Police have applied for a warrant for the man's arrest, police said.

A Lansing man was arrested by DeWitt City Police Aug. 22 for drunk driving and trying to elude an officer, police said. Roger Rowland Crane, 32, of Lansing was stopped by DeWitt Police for erratic driving, police said. When the officer got out of his car, Crane took off. The officer stopped Crane again,

and Crane fled the scene again, police said. Crane was arrested and taken to the Clinton County Jail, police said.

Kids got shafted in BMX deal

Well, you got trouble, my friends. Right here, I say trouble right here in St. Johns. With a capital T and that rhymes with B and that stands for BMX racing.

Yes, a few people whose houses bordered a BWX (bicycle motocross) track built on a vacant lot on the corner of Swegles and Clark in St. Johns decided that BMX did mean trouble — for them, at least. So the residents called the city and raised a stink about the track, and the city regretfully told the kids who built it they would have to tear it down.

And that's just what the kids did. Following a race on Aug. 17, they dismantled the track the next day, just like the grown-ups wanted. The trouble is, the track never should have come down. The kids got shafted, plain and simple.

According to City Manager Randy Humphrey, who answered two calls from upset homeowners, there were several complaints about the track, which was built on a lot owned by Tom Hutton. First off, they said too much dust was being raised. Never mind that Clark is a dirt street and dust is raised every time a car drives past. And forget the fact that the racers regularly watered the track to keep dust down.

Secondly, the complainers said the kids were too loud. Well, kids are going to make noise whether they're riding BMX bikes on a vacant lot or 10-speeds on the street. It doesn't seem logical that eliminating the track would eliminate all the noise.

But the biggest complaint was that the homeowners didn't want the track to become too big. When the kids scheduled a race, the concerned citizens started thinking the track was going to get out of hand. First off, school is starting in a week, and the kids would not have been spending as much time there anyway.

More importantly, though, the track had gotten just about as big as it could get. There is only so much you can do with a vacant lot. What did the homeowners expect was going to happen? Did they think the kids were going to put in grandstands and schedule a whole slew of races? Before you know it, the crew from ABC Sports would have been trampling through everyone's gardens.

So those were the arguments against the track, and as you can see, they aren't really that substantial. But consider now the positive things about the track.

First of all, it was conceived and built entirely by the youngsters who raced there. For many of them, it was the first time in their lives they had shown such initiative and commitment to a project — the first time they had done something they could be proud of.

And anyone who saw the track had to be impressed. The kids had invested a great deal of time and money in fixing it up, and it showed. The race held Aug. 17 was well-organized and certainly didn't seem to be the product of a group of teenagers.

Another benefit the track gave the kids was that it allowed them to spend their time doing something worthwhile. If you had a 15-year-old son, would you rather he spent his summer working on fixing up a vacant lot or blowing quarters on Pac-Man?

Summer is traditionally the most boring time of the year for school kids, but a group of them had something fun and worthwhile to do this summer — until a few people spoiled it for them. Now the kids are back in the video arcades and riding their BMX bikes where they aren't meant to be ridden.

Anyone who saw the 27 kids in the Aug. 17 race had to feel sorry for them. They saw their whole summer's work destroyed because some people wanted the neighborhood to stay good and boring.

Those people got their wish. And that's the real trouble.

Fulton schools save cash

To the editor:

When the request for additional millage in Fulton Schools failed on Aug. 16, eight cuts were made to face a revenue shortfall. One of the cuts was the "Core Program" of extra-curricular activities available to students. The Core Program is the group of Board-sponsored student activities. Fulton's program includes class advisors, Future Farmers of America, Yearbook Staff, Driver Education, Summer Agriculture and some athletics. The Core Program has been significantly reduced over the last two years.

Rather than see these opportunities for students lost, school administrators and supervisory personnel forfeited pay schedule pay increases and earmarked the dollar savings for reinstatement of the Core Program. The total savings due to salary freezes and wage concessions to administrators, supervisors and secretaries amounts to nearly \$13,000. This is the only General Fund money budgeted for extra-curricular activities in Fulton Schools for 1982-83.

The parents of the Athletic Boosters Club have followed with a pledge of \$17,000 for reinstatement of Core Program activities. During 1981-82, this group raised nearly \$10,000, which was used to add eliminated activities back to the Core Program. At a special meeting on Aug. 18, individual Boosters pledged \$2,400 and over 75 membership cards were sold at \$5 each. Boosters have approximately \$6,000 in cash and pledges at this time.

The balance of the \$52,319 Core Program will be funded by an estimated \$13,500 in admission charges at school activities and \$9,033 in solicited funds and donations. The Fulton Board of Education approved this plan at a special board meeting Aug. 18 on conditions that a

Clinton County residents can get in on the latest round of free cheese give-aways, Capital Area Community Services has announced.

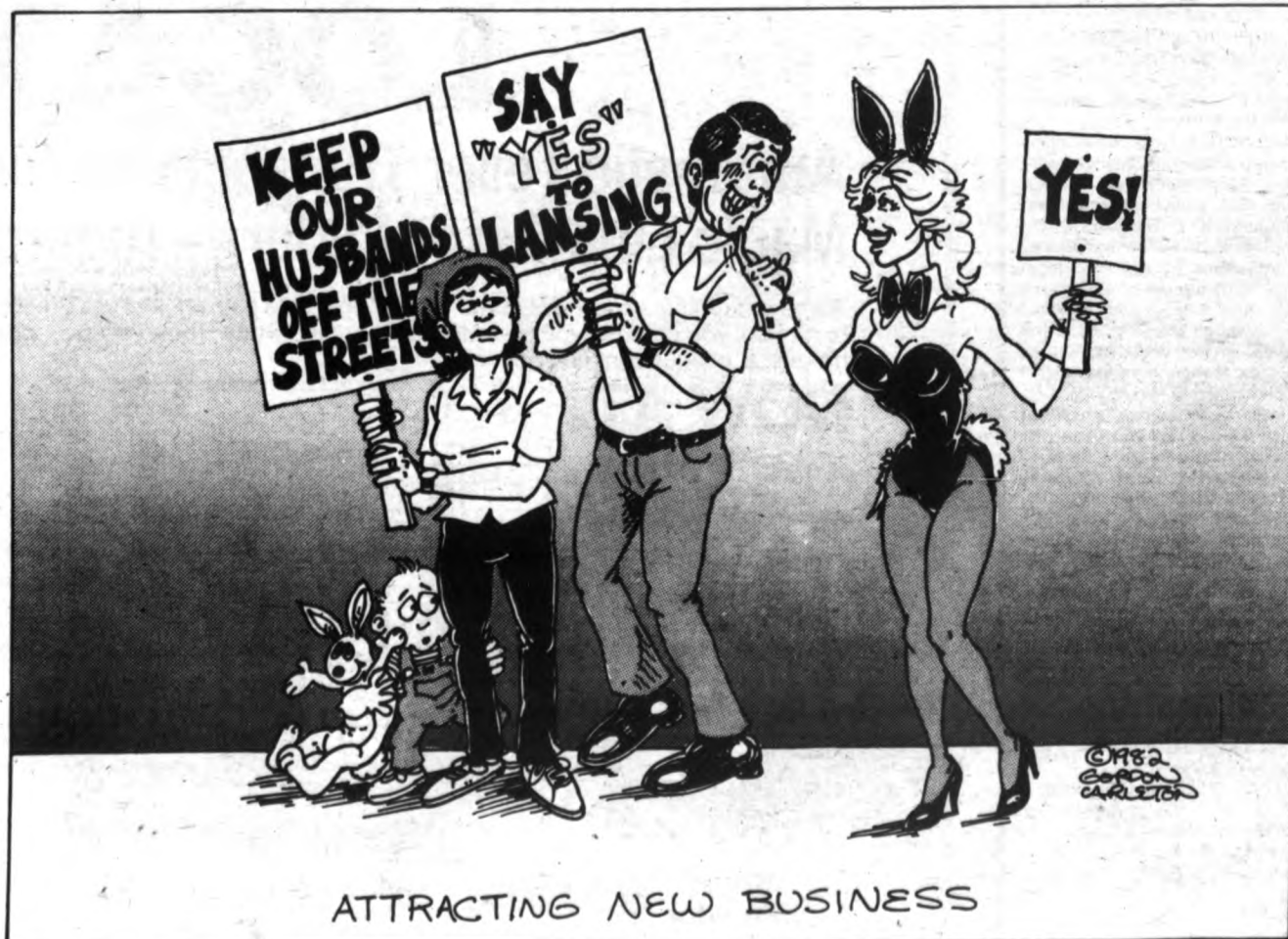

About 65,000 pounds of cheese will be distributed through outreach offices in the third distribution in Clinton, Eaton, Shiawassee and Ingham counties, reports said.

Those who have qualified for free cheese before need only bring personal identification. Others must bring proof of income, DSS documentation, current Medical Assistance cards, Food Stamp cards or current budget statements from ADC, General Assistance or Supplemental Social Security to qualify.

Social Security recipients must also bring proof of income. Income levels must be at or below the following:

- Non-farm family, one person — \$5,850; farm family, one person — \$5,013.
- Non-farm, two — \$7,775; farm — \$6,638.
- Non-farm, three — \$9,700; farm — \$8,263.
- Non-farm, four — \$11,625; farm — \$9,888.
- Non-farm, five — \$13,550; farm — \$11,513.
- Non-farm, six — \$15,475; farm — \$13,138.

A new look

DeWitt erases memory of 1981

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the fifth in a six-part series previewing Clinton County's high school football teams.

A message to all you DeWitt football fans: Don't be shocked when you get your first look at the team this season. With brand-new uniforms and helmets, the Panthers are going to look more like Wolverines this year. But don't worry — underneath the new exterior, they're still the same DeWitt Panthers.

Well, head coach Gail Thornton doesn't want them to be the exact same DeWitt Panthers, because last year's Panthers lost their first eight games before finally ending the season with a win over arch-rival Bath.

In fact, Thornton is doing everything he can to erase the memory of last season. Ergo, the new uniforms.

"We've just changed the mood from last year," Thornton said. "We wanted to change everything we could. We threw out some of the drills from last year that the kids just hated and we got new helmets and uniforms."

The new outfits will make the Panthers look just like the University of Michigan team — complete with the maize-and-blue (or corn-and-blue, if you prefer) winged helmets and blue jerseys with gold letters.

"The kids picked it," explained Thornton, who is a Central Michigan University grad and an admitted Michigan fan. "I left a book of helmet designs out for the kids to look at, and that's the one they picked. Then we had a vote on it, and it was 36-1 in favor of the new design."

Understandably, the one player who voted against the new design was a rabid Michigan State fan, Thornton said.

One problem will arise from the new look DeWitt will be sporting, however. That will occur Sept. 17, when the Panthers travel to Pewamo-Westphalia. P-W adopted the Wolverine helmets last year, which will mean both teams will be wearing maize-and-blue wings on their heads when they meet. "Yeah," Thornton said with a laugh, "but at least our uniform colors will be different."

Despite all the changes for 1982, some things will remain the same for DeWitt — such as the 17 returning lettermen. Heading the list of returnees is linebacker Jim Seegraves, a 6-1, 200-pounder who was named to the All-Capital Circuit Conference team last season. Seegraves set a school record last year, piling up 108 total tackles. He also picked up 319 yards rushing as a spot starter at fullback.

"Jim is just a great player," Thornton said. "If he doesn't play ball in college somewhere, I'll be shocked."

Thornton also sees Seegraves as having that intangible among athletes — leadership. "He's a definite leader," Thornton said. "If he jumped over a cliff, there would be 38 other players right behind him." Good thing there aren't any cliffs in DeWitt.

Another key player returning is All-League center Jim Farhat, a 5-11, 175-pounder. Two players who earned honorable mention all-league honors are also back — linebacker Craig Hummel (5-10, 175) and defensive back Todd Thompson. Thompson should also see some time at running back this season, Thornton said.

Other seniors who started last year include defensive tackle Jeff Garlock (6-0, 185), offensive guard Ted Flynn (5-7, 155), nose guard Brian Schmitt (5-11, 180), defensive end Nick Seifert (5-11, 180) and quarterback

Ken Ragala (5-10, 165.)

Ragala was a starter at tailback last year, but Thornton decided he was needed at the quarterback spot this season. "It looks like he's going to work out pretty well," Thornton said. "It took him a little while to get his timing down, but he's going to work out fine."

Other seniors who should fit into starting roles this year include 6-5, 185-pound split end Jeff Backus, defensive lineman Quentin Higbie, split end Jeff Bordui, Jim Brown and Joe (no relation) Brown.

"Jim and Joe are good players," said Thornton. "They're going to have to play somewhere."

Other seniors who should be able to contribute include split end Andy Roman, defensive back Grant Smith and center Garry Puffer.

"Garry has asthma really bad," Thornton explained. "It's really hard for him to play until the first frost, but he just won't give up."

One junior who saw time as a starter last year will also be back. Tom Deak, a 5-10, 165-pound tailback, started the second half of last season as a sophomore.

Another junior who should be able to contribute is 6-3, 220-pound tight end Steve Holland. Holland is a transfer from Grand Ledge and should help give the Panthers some much-needed size.

Other juniors who are expected to contribute include defensive back Todd McDonald, running back Mike Mocere, offensive guard Jim Tingay, split end Tim Tounne and running back Joe Wheeldon.

Looking at his team, Thornton sees the linebacking corps as the best overall unit. "We're in great shape with the linebackers," he said. "We should have as good a set of linebackers as there is in the league."

But when he takes a look at the schedule, the excitement begins to wear off. "Our first four games are incredible," Thornton said. "It's probably the toughest schedule this high school has ever had."

In the first four Fridays of the season, DeWitt will play Haslett, P-W, Eaton Rapids and Okemos. Combined, those four teams posted a 32-4 record last year. "We could play great football those first four games and still be 0-4," Thornton said. "But I don't think that will happen. I don't think all four of those teams can beat us."

That's because Thornton thinks his team grew tired of losing last year. "Our guys are hungry this season," he said. "I think we're going to surprise some people."

If not in the way they play, at least in the way they'll be dressed.

ST. JOHNS PUBLIC SCHOOLS BUS ROUTES FOR 1982-83 SCHOOL YEAR

The bus routes for the 1982-83 school year will reflect some changes from the previous year. This happens because of declining enrollments and student population patterns. As in the past, some families will find it necessary to get their students to a designated bus stop on a main route of travel. If you see the bus route assigned to your neighborhood does not travel down your road, then you can expect a notice in the mail that will identify your designated bus stop.

Your bus driver will also be combining bus stops that are located close to each other during the first week of school. Other stops will be changed where an approaching vehicle does not have clear visibility of the entire school bus for a distance of 400 feet (a new state law).

All bus routes reflect the intent of the rules and regulations of the State of Michigan regarding the transportation of students.

The route number reflects the name of the route, not the number of the bus. So that you know which bus to ride, the number of the route will be found in the right hand window next to the entrance door. Drivers will not be assigned to a route until August 30th.

Shuttle bus runs in town will run from the following points for students attending the school listed below. All shuttles start after 8:00 a.m.

Bus Stop

East side - Perrin-Palmer Elementary School -- High School students only.

West side - Teresa Merrill School -- High School and Elementary students only.
