## Hopes loan will unravel legal tangle

# County chips-in to revive Remy-Chandler

Caught in a legal swamp known as the Remy-Chandler Drain project, Clinton County commissioners reluctantly decided to push-on Tuesday in hopes of getting the seven-year-old project completed before snow flies.

Conceived as an answer to flooding which followed heavy "gully washer" storms in 1975, the cooperative drain project between Ingham and Clinton counties has become a muddy miasma of lawsuits and legal questions threatened by steadily rising inflation. But thanks to negotiations by Ingham County Drain Commissioner George Griffiths and his Clinton County counterpart Harry Harden, final stages of construction could begin as soon as Sept. 15.

Commissioners were convinced by Griffiths and Harden during their Aug. 31 meeting, and agreed in an 8-3 vote (Walter Nobis, Harold Martin and William Lancaster voted "no") to loan the project \$75,966. With that amount and another \$158,714 loan already approved by Ingham County, the Inter-County Drainage Board will pay half of the bills they owe contractors for work already done on the open drainage ditch, and negotiate new contracts for completion of the project, Griffiths said.

"I despaired of ever resolving the project through the courts because of the amount of time it was taking," he said, "so I came up with this idea to negotiate some kind of agreement to get the drain done this year."

In return for half of their money now and promise of full payment later, contractors have agreed to drop litigation against the drain board, Griffiths said. That leaves just three lawsuits left, he said: suits filed by DeWitt Township, Bath Township and Lansing Township property owners Mike and Pat Eyde.

Bath and DeWitt townships are expected to drop their suits soon, Griffiths said. "The whole issue with the townships was if we have our act together," he said. Township officials were concerned they would get stuck with the bill and have refused to drop their suits until they are assured the Inter-County Drainage Board can finish the project, he said.

As for the Eyde brothers, the odds of their winning a settlement from the drain board are "absolutely minimal," Griffiths said.

He said the suit, to be decided by the Michigan Supreme Court, challenges the state's century-old drain code, and does not have nearly the legal standing of a similar successful suit brought by the Eydes against Delta Township two years ago. The Eydes are questioning the first assessment for the project levied on property owners through a bond sale at the outset, he said.

The Drain Board has been caught between a flood and high water, Griffiths said. A second issue of bonds to finance the project cannot be sold while litigation is pending. But neither can the board pay contractors or convince Bath and DeWitt townships to drop their suits without money to finish the drain. Funding for the project, which was known to be inadequate from the start, dried up and work stopped, he said. Meanwhile, the drain board was deluged with legal costs, Harden added.

"There's no free ride," Harden said. "These legal charges are quite substantial just to defend ourselves. Legal counsel seems to come out on top and the public ends up paying."

Without a loan to get the project going before the construction season ends, erosion damage to the drain will force the cost of the project to rise \$50,000 to \$100,000 by next year, Griffiths said. Mainly due to inflation, the project's cost has already risen by more than 43 percent since 1978, from its original price tag of \$1,415,000 to more than \$2 million.

In return for their loan, Clinton County will be "at the top of the list" to be repaid — including 13 percent interest — when the second bond issue is sold after all litigation is settled, Harden said. The Supreme Court will be asked to render an early decision in the Eyde

lawsuit, possibly within six months, commissioners were told.

But first, DeWitt and Bath townships' boards must vote to drop their litigation against the project. DeWitt is slated to meet Sept. 13, and Bath on Sept. 20, but one or both boards may be convinced to meet early in special sessions, Harden said. Both are represented by attorney Richard Robinson.

"You have to weigh the risks here," Harden told commissioners. "If this resolution is turned down today, the Ingham County (loan) resolution becomes void. Then

we're into a whole new ballgame."

Most commissioners apparently agreed with Richard Hawks of Bath Township and Roger Overway of DeWitt Township, both of whom voted yes, but expressed doubts.

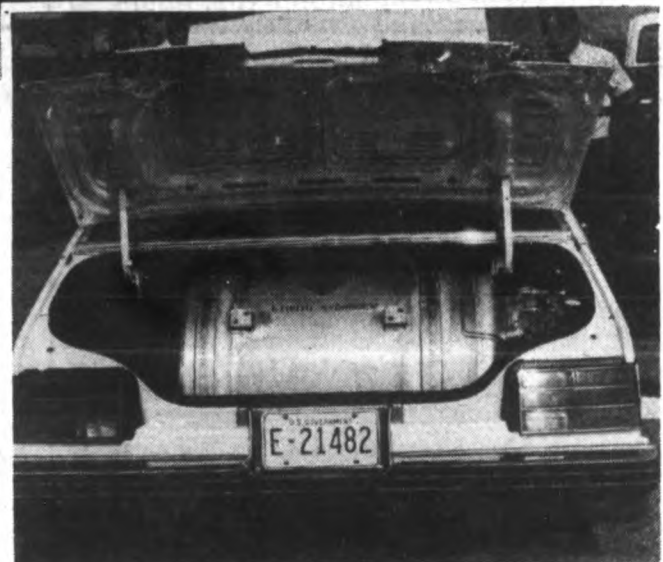
"Clinton County is the place where the drain is not finished and it's our people who will suffer, so it's to our advantage to approve it," Hawks said.

"I have reservations, but I want to see the project finished," Overway agreed.

# Hydrogen-powered automobile offers a glimpse of the future

On the outside, it looks like your basic 1979 four-door Buick Century. But try to fill it up at your local gas station and you'll run into some problems.

That's because it's not exactly your basic Buick Century. For starters, it doesn't run on gasoline. It uses liquid hydrogen — the coldest substance on this planet — as its fuel. And it has a 40-gallon tank in the trunk to hold the ultra-cold fuel.

The hydrogen-propelled car was in St. Johns this week on its way from Los Alamos, N.M. to Toronto. Escher-Foster Technology Associates, Inc., a St. Johns company, prepared the car for the Canadians, painting and cleaning it.

"Liquid hydrogen is the fuel you'll have to use when you have no more hydrocarbons in the world," explained Ray Tison, a senior associate with Escher-Foster. "But we have to do the homework now, instead of waiting until we run out of fuel in the future."

The huge tank in the trunk which holds the fuel was described by Tison as "a giant Thermos bottle," with insulation to keep the fuel below its boiling point (423 degrees Fahrenheit below zero.) The main problem with the car is the refueling, said Tison, because the liquid is so cold.

"That's what the Canadians are going to be doing with the car," Tison said. "It's going to be a rolling laboratory for them. They're going to test a new liquid refueling system."

The car was developed by the Los Alamos National Laboratory and the German Federal Aerospace Research Establishment, and so far has been driven over 2,000 miles on the liquid hydrogen fuel. Because of its interest, the Ontario-based Institute for Hydrogen and Electrochemical Systems volunteered to pick up the cost for the project, Tison said.

Aside from the fact the car is powered by hydrogen, it is otherwise a normal Buick Century. The only other differences are an elaborate fuel gauge and a small "hydrogen sniffer" in the car which tells the driver if there is a hydrogen leak, since the gas itself is odorless.

According to William J.D. Escher, the president of Escher-Foster, the most practical use of liquid hydrogen as a fuel of the future will probably not be in automobiles at first.

"It will probably be used first in trucks or trains," Escher said, "because those vehicles can have fixed fueling points. It will take longer before people start driving hydrogen-powered cars themselves."

# Health Department offers free influenza vaccines

Cold weather "flu" season is just around the corner, and local residents 18 or older can obtain free vaccines, thanks to the Mid-Michigan District Health Department.

Influenza viruses affect people of all ages, but most people recover quickly from the symptoms — fever, chills, headache, cough and muscle aches. Some cases can be more

serious, however, district health department officials warn. A small proportion of cases are particularly severe, they say, and flu victims can develop pneumonia or other complications.

In some past epidemics, about one case in every thousand has been fatal. Those at highest risk are victims of flu with chronic health problems like

diabetes, heart disease, lung or kidney trouble or other problems which can lower the body's resistance. Risk is also high for persons over 65.

The vaccine offered protects against A/Brazil, A/Bangkok and B/Singapore. There is no

charge for the vaccine, but donations will be accepted. The vaccine is available to all who are 18 or older at the following times and places:

### COMMISSION ORDER BOBCAT HARVEST REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission at its meeting on June 12, 1982, under the authority of Secs. 1, 2, and 3, of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, Secs. 38 and 39a, Chapter IV, and Sec. 1, Chapter V, Act 286, P.A. 1929, as amended, established rules for the taking of bobcats, during winter and spring.

- Seasons:**
  - Zone 1 - Hunting and trapping, October 25 of one year through February 28 of the following year.
  - Zone 2 - Hunting only, January 1 through February.
  - Zone 3 - Closed to hunting and trapping.
- Shooting Hours:**  
7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. local time
- Areas:**
  - Zone 1 - The Upper Peninsula, except Bois Blanc Island and Drummond Island, which will be under Zone 2 regulations.
  - Zone 2 - Cheboygan, Emmett, Presque Isle, Oscoda, Otsego, Montmorency, Alcona, and Alpena counties; also Bois Blanc Island and Drummond Island.
- Registration:**  
Any person killing a bobcat shall present the whole animal at a Department of Natural Resources district office or other designated field office within 72 hours of the kill. There, a confirming seal shall be attached and information obtained from the licensee as to date, place, and manner of kill and other pertinent information deemed appropriate. No taxidermist or fur buyer shall accept, possess, or process in any fashion, a bobcat or bobcat pelt without the confirming seal attached. Sealing of pelts will qualify the fur for foreign export under regulations enforced by the Endangered Species Scientific Authority. Registration hours will be during regular working hours or where offices are open for some other purpose after hours.



# Schools report enrollment drop

They might not have been too happy about it, but summer officially came to an end for Clinton County school children this week with the beginning of a new school year. With the exception of Pewamo-Westphalia, every school district in the county opened their doors to students this week.

The biggest news for the coming school year is that every district in the county is expecting a decline in enrollment, ranging from a 115-student drop in Ovid-Elsie to a loss of 25 students in the P-W district.

• **ST. JOHNS:** School for the 3,770 students in the St. Johns school district began Aug. 31. School officials expect a decline of about 100 students from a year ago, the biggest loss coming from the kindergarten classes.

• **BATH:** In the Bath Community Schools, students reported to class Sept. 1. According to Superintendent Ken Dyer, enrollment in Bath schools is at 1,113 this year, down from 1,161 a year ago.

• **DEWITT:** DeWitt students started the school year Aug. 31. Superintendent Steve Garrett said his district was expecting a 98-student drop from last year, down to 1,682. Garrett also said one bus route was dropped from last year, but other routes would be enlarged to pick up the slack.

• **OVID-ELSIE:** Students in the O-E school district reported to class Sept. 1. Superintendent Dave Porrell expected student enrollment to be at 2,000 this year, down from 2,115 a year ago. Porrell also said one bus route in Ovid had been dropped, but that all the students affected had been notified of the change.

• **PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA:** Students in the P-W schools will report to school Sept. 7. Enrollment is down to 826 this year, according to Superintendent Roy Thelen, down 25 from a year ago. One bus route was also eliminated, Thelen said.

• **FOWLER:** School in Fowler started Aug. 31. Superintendent Jim Andros expected a slight decline in enrollment, down to 660 students this year.

Standing idle since school ended in June, bus fleets at school districts throughout Clinton County were ready to roll on Aug. 31 as students donned new school clothes and returned to pencils, books and teachers' friendly looks. (Photo by Buddy Moorehouse)



## Workshop for combined classes held

# Teachers go back to school

This time, the teachers were the ones sitting at the desks listening attentively and asking questions. They were the students.

The occasion was a workshop Aug. 26 for St. Johns elementary school teachers who will be teaching combined grades this year. Because of budget cutbacks, the St. Johns School Board was forced to combine grades at four elementary schools for the coming school year.

To help prepare the teachers for this new task, Elementary Coordinator Roger Feeman scheduled a workshop conducted by teachers from the Lansing school district who had taught combined classes in the past.

"Our aim was to bring all the teachers who will be teaching combined classes next year to this workshop," Feeman said. "We wanted to bring in some teachers who had handled this in the past, so our people could learn from them. We wanted them to be able to talk about organization, time schedules and the different curriculum."

The four neighborhood schools which will feature combined classes next year are East Olive, East Essex, Riley and Eureka, Feeman said. He indicated that East Olive and East Essex will have every class combined (grades 1-2, 2-3, 3-4, 4-5 and 5-6), while Eureka will have combined classes for grades three through six and Riley will have one

regular class at every level and one combined class at every level.

At the workshop, the 11 teachers from the St. Johns schools who attended asked a variety of questions to the three Lansing teachers, Marge Swartz, Joan Bouck and Pat Edington. Among the concerns raised by the local teachers was how to keep one grade busy while teaching the other grade.

One suggestion made was to have stations set up around the classroom so pupils could work on different things at the same time.

The teachers found the two-and-a-half hour session to be very productive, giving them some ideas for the coming year. "It was good to be able to share ideas with other teachers on this," said Lana Hurwitz, who will be teaching grades 4-5 at east Olive this year. "It's just going to take a lot more planning and preparation time."

"I got a lot of good ideas about organizing my time," said Carol Kemsley, who will teach grades 1-2 at East Olive. "It was a good workshop."

Although this is the first time in almost 10 years that St. Johns schools have had combined classes, Feeman doesn't think the quality of education will be hurt.

"Our feeling, from the research we've done on this, is that the learning opportunities in a combined class can be just as effective as in a regular class," he said.

## Five people injured

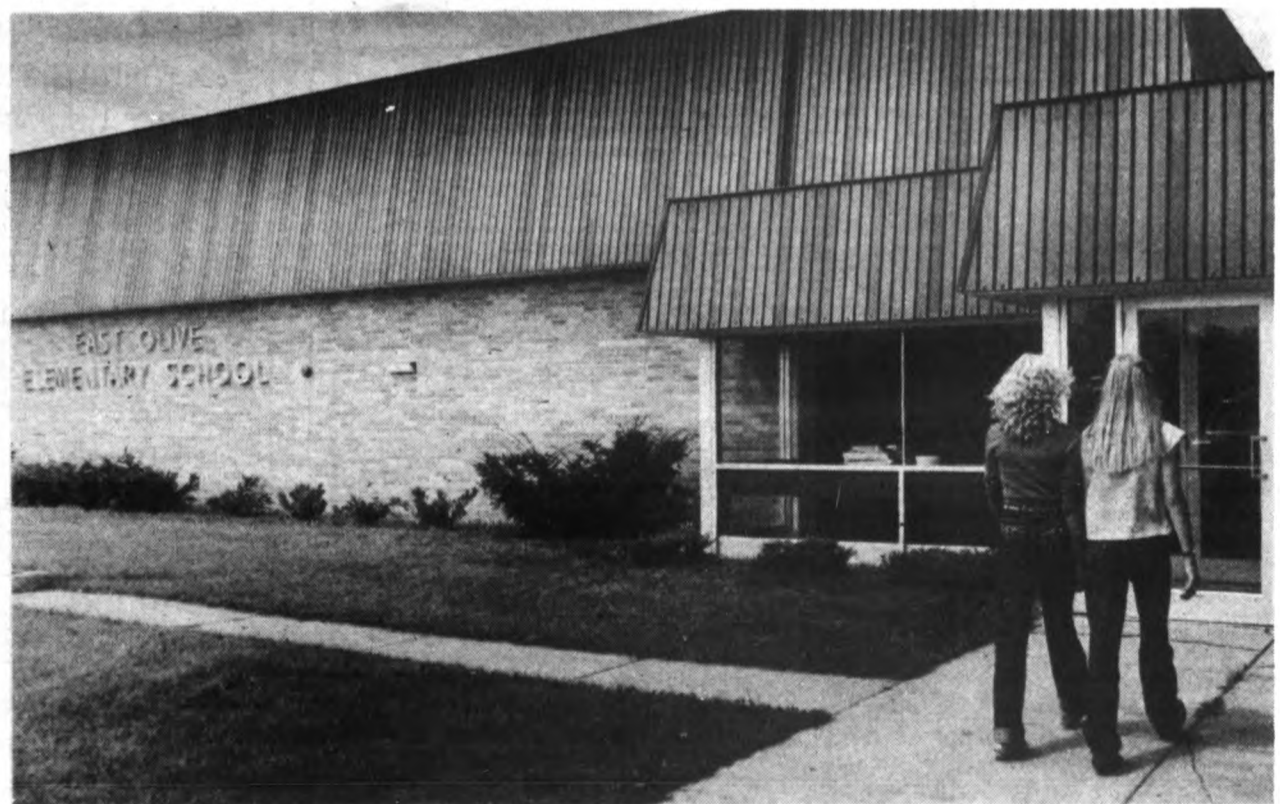

# Mediator can't break contract deadlock

A state mediator couldn't work out disputes between St. Johns teachers and the board of education, but school started on time Tuesday and teachers will work under last year's contract until a new pact is negotiated. "We didn't expect a strike, but you never know," Superintendent Don Burns said. "We all felt very good about getting an agreement worked out in which they will continue to work under their old contract."

However, it was the only agreement worked out between the two parties and their negotiators during a session Thursday, Aug. 26.

Through their chief negotiator, George Johnson of the Michigan Association of School Boards, the board has continued to press teachers for a wage freeze. They say school finances are too tight to afford raises. Teachers, meanwhile, continue to resist a wage freeze or other concessions, and have offered a plan for retirement incentives which they say could save the district

enough to afford raises. They say the district is not as bad off as board figures indicate, and have asked for a three percent raise during the coming school year and a lump sum of six percent to be paid in June.

"Nothing has changed," St. Johns Education Association (SJEA) President Gerry Congleton said. Ased for his impression of the most recent round of bargaining, he replied, "Frustration and discouragement, because the board did not move at all from their position."

During the session with State Mediator E.J. onnors, board representatives admitted the district has \$260,000 on hand. But \$49,000 will be used to balance the coming year's budget, and an expected \$150,000 August state-aid payment has been indefinitely postponed due to state budget problems, they said. Further state-aid cuts are likely, they say.

Watching the talks closely are other employee groups — administrative secretaries and maintenance personnel — presently bargaining with the board. They, too, have been asked to accept wage freezes, and others whose contracts have not yet expired — aides and bus drivers — have been asked to re-negotiate for reductions in scheduled increases.

Also watching closely are most of Clinton County's

school districts. All but two are currently negotiating contracts with teachers with the aid of the Ingham County Education Association, which represents the SJEA. Ovid-Elsie teachers are under a contract and Pewamo-Westphalia teachers are represented by the Ionia County Education Association.

No contract settlements have been reached in DeWitt, Bath or Fowler, however, and school was expected to begin on time in all county districts.

Taks in St. Johns have been called off until more information about state-aid for the coming year is available, Congleton said.

# Public asked for super's job description

The final description may wind up sounding like a job for Superman, but St. Johns School Board members will go to the public to find out what kind of man — or woman — should replace Superintendent Don Burns.

Local parents, school staffers and just plain citizens will be given an opportunity to chip in their two-cents worth at a series of meetings to be held at local schools Sept. 21-23, Burns says. They'll be asked what the next superintendent's job requirements should be and what kind of person is needed.

The meetings are being arranged by Dr. Carl Brautigan of the Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB), who was awarded a \$2,000 contract by the St. Johns Board of Education Wednesday night, Aug. 25. For that fee, Brautigan and the MASB will help the school board find and interview candidates for the job.

A professional job recruiter from Wacousta has filed a complaint with the state's Department of Licensing and Regulation charging that Brautigan and the MASB are not licensed and are therefore in violation of state regulations.

But Brautigan has assured school officials no license is needed to perform his service, Burns said.

"He reassured me he felt that nothing would come of

this," Burns said of the complaint. "He said no license is needed and that the MASB went through all of this two years ago when they began offering the service."

MASB officials say they were granted an exemption from licensing regulations by then director of the Department of Licensing and Regulation William Ballenger. But Bob Donner, co-owner of Shermtech Engineering Service Inc. in Lansing, a professional "headhunting" firm, says no exemptions from the \$200 annual licensing fee he pays should be allowed. He has asked the state to "look into" his complaint.

Brautigan, meanwhile, began his recruiting effort during Wednesday night's special board meeting by introducing board members to a list of priorities.

He asked board members to take home and prioritize six key factors: educational requirements, experience, professional leadership, personal characteristics, special skills and any other desirable skills named by board members.

Burns said a brochure describing the job to candidates will be prepared and criteria for selecting a field of perhaps a dozen final candidates will be developed based on responses from board members, staff and citizens.

"I assume we will have at least one or two candidates

from within," he said. Salary for the job has not been determined, but Burns said "It will certainly be below mine." Burns has been paid \$37,000 annually since 1980, when his salary was frozen, he said.

Asked if the salary could limit applicants, he replied: "No. Usually salary doesn't come up until the final field of candidates is chosen, and most will have some idea what districts this size are paying."

He said board members also plan to visit the districts of the final job candidates to talk to those they have worked with. Interviews will likely begin in late October or early November, he said, with final hiring targeted for early December. Burns retires in January.

# Cash drain could be worse

"'Twas only back in '75,  
 "But hardly a man is now alive,  
 "Who remembers the famous heavy storm,  
 "When the Remy-Chandler did not perform."

Revoke our poetic license, if you will, but the fact remains: the Remy-Chandler will not drain. This unfortunate fact was first discovered when heavy rains caused flooding seven years ago. With insufficient funds — and foresight — an ambitious project to clean and repair the inter-county drain was launched. But thanks to poor planning and legal challenges, the Inter-County Drain Board soon found itself knee-deep in legal quicksand.

To the displeasure of county officials and distress of taxpayers, the drain project was stalled. Funds dried to a trickle when a hoped-for second bond issue was stalled, and lawyers representing a host of litigants have gladly mopped up the scant drops remaining.

But now, several years wiser and nearly a million and a half dollars poorer, drain officials in Clinton and Ingham counties may have finally found a way to finish improvements to make the Remy-Chandler Drain function again.

With approval of county commissioners in both counties, all that remains is cooperation by DeWitt and Bath townships' boards and successful resolution of a lawsuit filed by two Lansing Township property owners, Mike and Pat Eyde.

The Eyde's have little chance in repeating the success they had in a similar suit against Delta Township a few years ago, to hear drain officials tell it. But Delta Township officials can testify to the efficacy of the Eyde's legal arguments and to their costly results.

Whatever the outcome of the Eyde litigation, however, all units of government involved could do much worse than take a gamble on the present negotiated settlement. With construction costs — not to mention legal fees — rising faster than a gully-washer flood, the project can only get more and more costly. Also, erosion and weather damage to completed parts of the drain will cause costs for future construction to soar even higher.

Left with a choice of getting their money's worth by chipping-in another healthy loan or abandoning the project entirely, county commissioners in Ingham and Clinton counties have properly decided to finish what they started.

The alternative is another severe storm, followed by more flood damage and another deluge of lawsuits from citizens whose tax money has already been spent with the assurance the drain would be repaired.

We urge DeWitt and Bath township board members to drop their lawsuits against the project so that it can be completed — mother nature willing.

The only alternative is a different sort of drain: funneling tax dollars into the bank accounts of already well-paid lawyers.

## Senior citizen update

The Community Living Center, located on South County Farm Road just south of St. Johns, is under new management.

In the past, most of the residents living in the Center were aged people who did not have another place to live, and there were couples acting as caretakers for the facility. The people who live there now range in age from 19 to 72, and some are mentally handicapped. Because of this, there have to be people in charge who are trained and educated in this area.

Administrator Barbara Craig has a degree in social work with a psychology major. Debra Beckstrom is the resident supervisor who lives at the facility. She also has a degree in psychology. With these two in charge, the staff is able to handle most any kind of problem.

The residents are now involved with other agencies, including mental health, day treatment, substance abuse, adult education and the Department of Social Services. When an administrator develops treatment plans for patients, she works closely with these other agencies to insure that all goals are compatible.

Other changes that have been made deal with the residents' leisure time.

They now have their own kiln to fire ceramics and a facility newspaper in which many residents have their own columns. One person is interested in plants, and residents can discuss legal matters with a retired lawyer. Others pursue poetry, gardening, furniture refinishing, etc.

Outdoor gardening is something many of the residents like to participate in and it provides fresh vegetables for their table and canned foods for the winter. Strawberries and rhubarb also are canned for future use.

Once a week, they have someone visit to cut hair and give shampoos. A cake and a gift is provided for each of their birthdays. There is a music room in the basement and some of the residents play the piano and organize sing-alongs. (If anyone has a drum not in use, they could use one or any other instrument. Check around in your attic.)

Residents who are unable to bathe themselves are bathed by the staff. All are ambulatory.

All meals are planned as a balanced diet according to state standards. Many residents have to have their own special diets and these are provided for. Each evening at 8:30, residents get a snack.

Funding for the facility comes from Clinton County and from residents, either by private pay or from social security and general assistance.

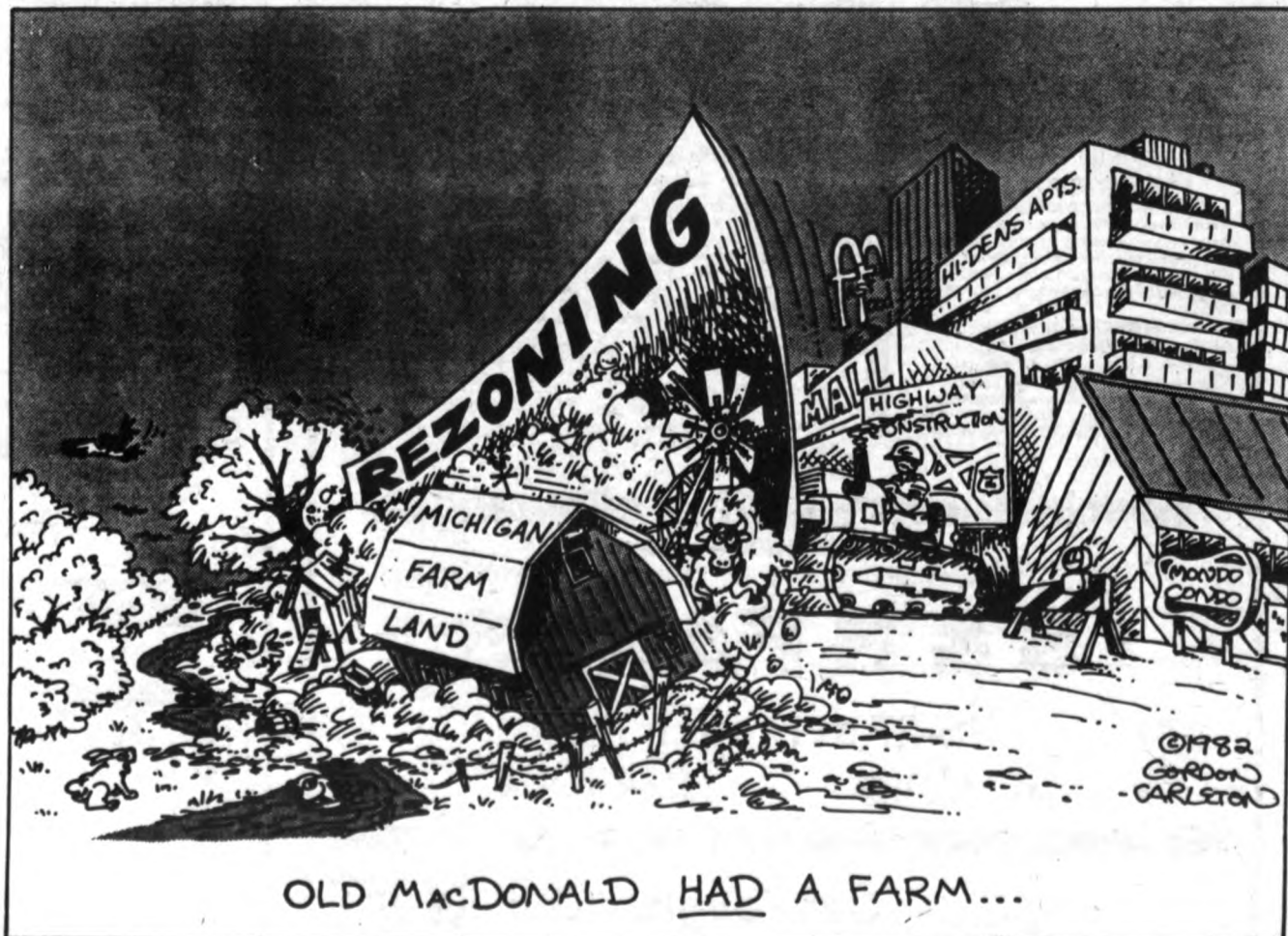
Ms. Craig says they are in the process of applying for a state license as an adult foster care home.

There are some CETA workers working there and it's a work placement site for general assistance people.

Kellie Doss is the recreation therapist. She directs art therapy and gives special attention to those

who cannot read or write with sign painting and other techniques. She is planning a recreation day at the park to include all foster homes in Clinton County.

Fire escape stairs have been built on each end of the facility and fire drills are now being held. It's all very interesting and they are doing a great job. So, until next time...

# Plenty deserve credit for 4-H Fair's success...

It's over! The 1982 Clinton County 4-H Fair came to a close last week, as projects were picked up, buildings cleaned and locked and borrowed equipment and supplies returned. We even put new locks and chains on the water hydrants — you wouldn't even know there had been a fair at all.

But for those who participated, that's not true at all. There are memories of all of the many good things that happened during Fair week that will live on with them.

Nearly 1,500 youths from across the county exhibited over 5,200 different projects. Many had the opportunity to visit with judges and to learn from their experiences. Some learned to be humble winners and some to be gracious losers and not to be discouraged when things don't go just right.

The food stand served thousands of people throughout the week and raised money to help support 4-H trips and awards for the coming year. Over 530 gallons of milk — that's 8,480 glasses — were sold at 10¢ each by the Dairy Diplomats in their effort to promote the dairy industry and 4-H programs. Over 500 fair-goers had their blood

pressure tested free of charge, courtesy of the Mid-Michigan District Health Department and leaders of the Eaglelite 4-H Club.

About 350 people celebrated the end of the 4-H Fair and enjoyed an evening of country-western music at the first concert held during the Fair on Thursday evening. Many more danced to the music of the Mello Tones as they entertained at the fairgrounds Monday evening.

Hundreds of visitors stopped by the baby animal tent and rode a horse, petted a llama, help a puppy or kitten and saw a variety of young animals.

These are only a few of the things that happened at the Fair. I'm not aware of another event in the county where so many people from so many different communities, with so many different interests and ideas and so many different reasons for being there have worked together to make something like the 4-H Fair happen.

I heard a Fair Board member talking to someone on the phone who was sure that all Fair Board members are paid. Well, nothing could be further from the truth. These nine members, their spouses and families contribute hundreds of hours, lots of miles and many other supplies throughout the year, getting ready for the 4-H Fair each year.

And they are only part of the total volunteer force who plan and coordinate activities, work on judging, supervise buildings, run the food stand and work with 4-H members all year long as project leaders.

After everything was cleaned up and Fair Board members could have been long gone, one stayed to watch two young 4-Hers' rabbits which hadn't been picked up yet. Another helped a little girl get her flowers entered and judged when the young contestant got sick. And these are just a couple of examples of the hundreds of ways the Fair Board members and volunteers help 4-H members all year long.

In addition, the tremendous support from the community deserves comment. The Rotary Club held their regular noon meeting at the Fair to show their support, The City of St. Johns loaned tables and swept the parking lot, schools loaned a stage and lots of help to move things, the sheriff's posse covered our security and parking needs, and many local businesses donated materials and help.

The 1982 Clinton County 4-H Fair is over. And thanks to many, it was a tremendous success. Now, on to 1983...

# New coach brings Bath spirit

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the last in a six-part series previewing all of Clinton County's high school football teams.

With a brand-new head coach, Robert Popp, leading the way, scenes like this have been commonplace on the Bath Bees' practice field.

Popp: "Come on, you guys, you're the Bath Bees! You sting like bees!"

Players: "Yeah, alright!"

Popp: "Who's number one?"

Players: "The Bees!"

Popp: "What did you say?"

Players: "THE BEES!"

Sound a little rah-rah? You better believe it. That's the style of Mr. Popp, who believes that getting a team psychologically ready for a game is just as important as preparing it physically.

"We're just trying to instill a winning attitude in the team," said Popp, who replaced Bill Waters as head coach. "We're trying to give them a lot of incentive to win. We want to make football fun for them."

And win a few games along the way, too, he hopes. Last year's Bees went 3-6 under Waters, but Popp feels this season's squad can do better.

"If we can avoid injuries along the way, I know we have the talent to win," he said. "It's just going to take a lot of determination on the part of the players and the coaches. It's going to take a lot of guts."

Indeed, the Bees will need to remain injury-free for them to have a successful year. According to Popp, only 37 boys (that's varsity and junior varsity) are out for football. That leaves almost no depth for the coach to rely on.

And a rash of pre-season injuries — everything from a kidney infection to a hand cut while washing dishes — haven't helped matters any.

But of the players who are available and healthy, Popp feels his team will be able to compete with anybody. Leading the way is Steve Oberst, a 6-1, 185-pound quarterback. "Steve has good size and fair speed, but he's versatile," Popp said. "He can run and throw well."

The backup at the signal-calling spot for Bath is sophomore Jeff Penrod. "He's pretty decent for a sophomore," Popp said.

The offensive backfield for the Bees will be a power-running outfit, with tailback Rick Rasmeyer and fullback Jim Reeves (5-11, 180) carrying the ball.

Up front, Bath will be led by linemen Paul Sump (6-1, 180), Steve Culver (6-1, 200) and Ed Beachnau. With such a small squad, it's a good bet those three will see a great deal of playing time on defense as well.

Describing his offensive philosophy, Popp indicated, "I am a believer that passing is part of, not a supplement to, an offense. We are going to be able to throw as well as run this year."

The new coach, who is making his debut on the high school level after coaching 11 years in the college ranks, said his team will show six or seven different offensive formations, "and we'll use a lot of action stuff. The main thing I'm trying to do, though, is maintain simplicity in our offense."

On defense, the backfield seems solid with Scott Heddens and Mark Barnett at defensive backs. Quite a few

players will be playing both ways, Popp said. "It would be nice if we had enough guys where I didn't have to do that," he said, "but we're just going to have to play some guys both ways."

As for the Ingham County League in which Bath plays, Popp is wary of last year's champ, Haslett. "They're supposed to be the team to beat," he said. "And Williamston is supposed to be good, too."

For now, however, the only game in Popp's head is the season-opener against Battle Creek Pennfield. "We're just going to go game to game," he said.
