Storm water problem

City discusses drains

After hearing a report from City Engineer Doug Weir, the St. Johns City Commission decided at its meeting Sept. 13 to petition the Clinton County Drain Commissioner to help deal with the storm water drainage system on the city's southeast side.

Weir's suggestion to deal with the drainage problem was to create a second route for the storm water to drain into.

"In the long run, having two routes would be better than enlarging the present route," Weir said. "Enlarging the present route would cause some damage to buildings and parking lots and things of that nature."

The board also approved a request by Sealed Power, Inc. for an addition to its existing plant. According to Plant Manager Jim Robinson, who was at the meeting, the new addition would house a water recycling station.

"This should help to substantially reduce our water consumption," Vice-mayor Donald Roesner said. "I think this

is a good project."

In response to a gentleman who spoke at the commission's last meeting in regards to a supposedly unsafe building at 411 N. Lansing, City Clerk Richard Colletta told the commission, "The city engineer and myself went to inspect the building, and we found that the main structural supports seemed to be in good condition.

"However, we did notice some other code violations, such as weeds and water in a tank outside. We spoke with the owner of the property, and he has agreed to spend up to \$100 making the improvements necessary."

In other action, the commission:

- Authorized the purchase of two pickup trucks from Bee's Chevy-Olds at a price of \$18,395.

- Authorized the hiring of G & M Painting Enterprises in Lincoln Park at a cost of \$13,000 to paint the city's water tanks.

- Approved a request by the Chamber of Commerce to close two blocks of Clinton Avenue on Sept. 30 for an art and produce fair.

Local girl killed in accident

Her teacher from last year remembered Sandra Woodruff as "a very bright little girl. And very friendly. She had a lot of friends," said Nadine Weyersberg.

Those friends got some tragic news Sept. 7, when they learned Sandra was killed in a car accident near Lansingburg.

Sandra, age seven, of 6228 St. Clair Rd. in St. Johns, was pronounced dead on arrival at Lansing's Sparrow Hospital after the car she was a passenger in hit a tree.

The car was driven by Elaine Marie Swarouth, 17, a foster child of the Woodruff's. Miss Swarouth was also taken to Sparrow Hospital, where she is listed in critical condition, according to the Shiawassee County Sheriff's Department.

Another passenger in the car, Sandra's three-year-old brother Blaine, was treated and released Sept. 7.

According to Shiawassee County Deputy Kevin M. McGuckin, the car was headed south on Meridian Road north of Kildare Road in Sciota Township at about 6:10 p.m. Sept. 7 when Miss Swarouth swerved onto the right shoulder of the road.

"The right two tires were on the shoulder for a while, and then she steered back onto the road," McGuckin said. "And then, for some unknown reason, she crossed over into the northbound lane and ran into a ditch. She drove for awhile in the ditch before the right front portion of the car struck the tree."

Because of Miss Swarouth's condition, deputies have been unable to question her as to the details of the accident.

"The case is still under investigation," McGuckin said, "but the hospital has told us it will be at least a week before we can talk to her. We just want to find out how much she remembers."

Sandra was a third grader at North Elementary School in Ovid, where a collection was taken up for her the day after the accident. Her teacher this year, Jerry Thomlison, organized the collection.

"They were talking about planting a tree in her memory," said Mrs. Weyersberg, who was Sandra's teacher in second grade. "And both the teachers and the school sent flowers."

"The one thing I keep thinking of," Mrs. Weyersberg said, "was this musical we had last year. Sandy had a speaking part in it and she was so cute in her part."

MPA challenges Cropsey bill

Small newspapers, including the one you are reading, could be threatened by a new bill introduced by 88th District State Representative Alan Cropsey, a Michigan Press Association (MPA) official says.

Cropsey, Republican nominee for the 30th District state Senate seat, has introduced a pair of bills to change the state's definition of a newspaper and open up government advertising to small newspapers' main competition, shoppers.

Cropsey would eliminate requirements that newspapers must publish at least 25 percent news to qualify for government advertising. His bill would lower the requirement to five percent, allowing local units of government to publish legal advertising in shoppers, or advertisers.

In a letter to Cropsey, MPA Executive Director Warren Hoyt says the MPA will "strongly oppose any attempts to weaken the present standards," and adds that his organization "respectfully questions your motivation, as well as reasoning behind this legislation."

"That's typical," Cropsey responded. "Whenever you try to change things, the powers that be and groups with vested interest that feed off it will get upset."

But Hoyt says the Cropsey legislation — House Bills 5934 and 5935 — will dilute the public's right-to-know intent of state laws requiring publication of meeting minutes and notices.

"Newspapers didn't write the laws," he said. "They were written by the legislature for good reasons. There are many state laws requiring segments of government to publish statutes. Our lawmakers felt if this information is made available to the public, we've got to use a responsible means of reaching the public."

"Shoppers are there for profit reasons. A newspaper, although paid, is there to cover the news as well, giving the reader a double-edged security for the public record," he said.

County bands prepare for another season

When the nights start getting longer, the wind starts getting nippy and the leaves begin their annual chameleon act, it's a sure bet that Friday nights throughout the country will soon be filled with the sounds of tubas and trumpets.

Yes, it's football season once again, and with it comes a new marching band season. The high-stepping musicians have been working hard — some of them since mid-summer — to provide football fans everywhere with pre-game and halftime entertainment.

The six high school marching bands in Clinton County are no exception. All of them, from the 35 members of the Pewamo-Westphalia band to the 150 marchers at St. Johns, have been diligently preparing for the new season.

And from the looks of things, there will be quite a bit of variety offered by the bands. Unlike past years, where every band in the country played "Star Wars" or "Superman" during halftime, this year's selection of music covers a wider range of styles.

Many of the bands will feature flag and rifle corps during their shows, adding to the visual display.

So before you head for the hot dogs during halftime, it might be wiser to stick around for the band show. For a

preview of what to expect from Clinton County's marching bands in 1982, here's a look at each one:

ST. JOHNS: The biggest band in the county — 150 strong — started preparing for this season Aug. 1, when the marchers spent a week at the Boyne Valley Lodge for band camp. The band's first halftime show featured a wide range of musical styles.

Under the direction of Walt Cole, the St. Johns band opened its season Sept. 10 during the Redwings' game with Owosso with "Aztec Fire," a fiery Latin number. After that came "Looking Through the Eyes of Love," from the movie "Ice Castles." "If I Had a Hamburg" (a comic takeoff on "If I Had a Hammer") and "Still" closed out the show.

Leading the band in 1982 will be drum major Don Laidler.

BATH: The Bath band opened the season Sept. 11 with a show featuring two movie themes — "Fame" and "Chariots of Fire." But it hasn't been all peaches and cream for director Dave Kressler to get his 52-member band ready for the first show.

"We didn't have a chance to go to band camp this year, and that hurt us," Kressler said. "And our first game is on a Saturday, so some of the kids can't make it. These things hurt, but we'll live through it."

The Bath band will be headed up by drum major

Angie Elden and will feature an eight-member flag corps.

FOWLER: The 89-member Fowler squad opened the season Sept. 10 when the Eagles hosted Maple Valley with a selection from "Annie" — "Tomorrow." Also on the first show was a Roman opener and "Georgia On My Mind," which featured a flag routine, said director Jerry Krause.

The band will be led this season by drum major Tony Myers.

OVID-ELSIE: The O-E band — with 117 members — spent the last week in July at band camp preparing for the season, according to director Roger Weyersberg. The first show will feature "Autumn," "Spanish Flea," "Dance With the Buffoons" and "Still."

Unlike the other bands in the county, O-E will be a corps-style outfit — a style of marching where the feet don't get too far off the ground. "I prefer that because it allows the students to work more on musicianship and less on marching," Weyersberg said.

The band, under the leadership of drum major Marianne Rees and assistants Terry Wooley and Becky Wakefield, will be very busy this season, performing at the Central Michigan and Michigan State band days, the Knights of Columbus Centennial Parade as well as the home football games. The O-E band has a 10-member flag section and a 10-member rifle corps.

PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA: The P-W band — smallest in the county at 35 — spent a week at Camp Kett Aug. 1-7 preparing for the season, according to director Mark Breza. The band opened its first show with "Black Saddles," followed by "Star" and "Perfussion," a percussion feature.

"We have a really short season, because we only have four home games," Breza said. "But we're going to some other events."

The other events are the Michigan Marching Band Festival, the Clinton County Festival (which every county band will attend) and the Leslie Invitational.

The two drum majors for 1982 are Patty Theis and Carolyn Arens. The band features a nine-member color guard.

Local church gets new minister

Rev. Michael R. Martin will be installed as the new pastor at St. Peter Lutheran Church, rural St. Johns, on Sept. 12. Rev. Martin is a native of Frederick, Wis., and received his Master of Divinity degree from Concordia Theological Seminary in Ft. Wayne, Ind. in 1979. He is the son of Alex Theodore and Edna Magalene (nee Paulsen) Martin of Wisconsin.

Rev. Martin graduated from Frderic High School in 1967. He attended Carthage College, Kenosha, Wis., where he graduated in 1972 with a BA in Sociology. From Sept. 1973 to May 1976, he attended Trinity Evangelical Divinity School, Deerfield, Ill., on a part-

time basis while self-employed. In Sept. 1976, he enrolled in the seminary in Fort Wayne, with his vicarage year from 1977-78 being spent at Golden Valley Lutheran Church, Golden Valley, Minn., under the supervision of the Rev. Roland O. Kosch.

Returning to the Fort Wayne campus in Sept. 1978, Rev. Martin completed his final year, graduating in May 1979 with his Master of Divinity degree, majoring in New Testament studies. He was ordained into the holy ministry in June 1979, at his home congregation, Immanuel Lutheran Church in Frederic. Then he went to Saint Stephen Lutheran Church, a mission congregation, Grimsby, Ont., as its full-time pastor, where he served the last three years.

Rev. Martin is married to Priscilla Jeannie Nickelsburg and they have two sons, Christian Paul and David George. They reside at 8964 Church Rd., St. Johns.

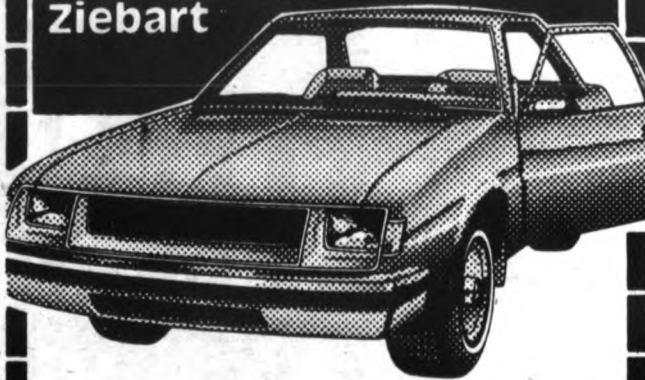

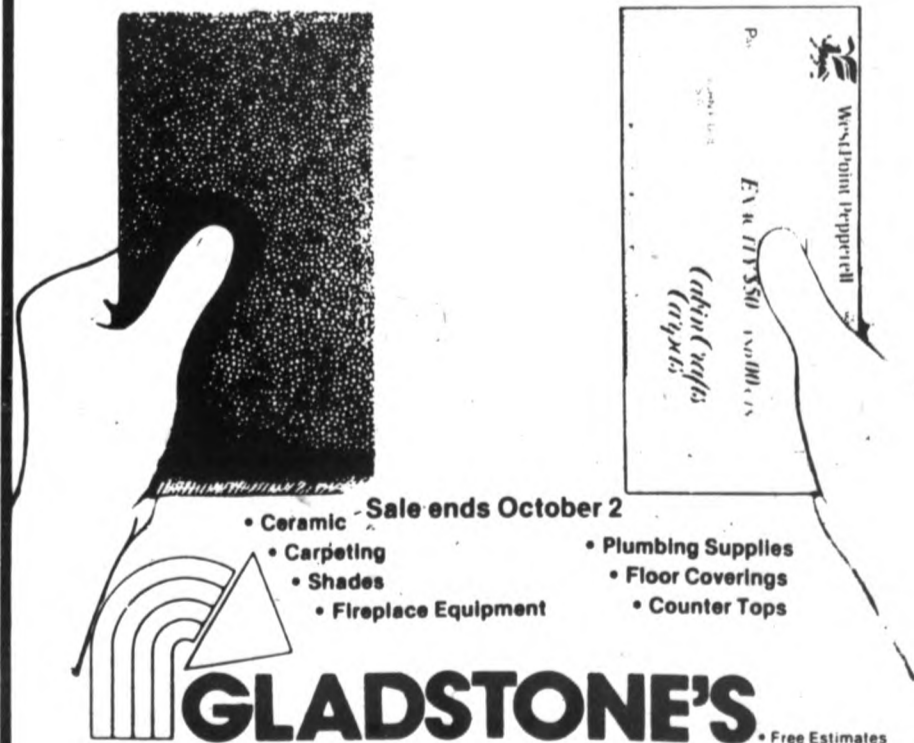

MPA: Change is 'penny wise and pound foolish'

But Cropsey insists his law could save tax dollars by giving local government officials a chance to shop around for savings on advertising rates, by forcing more competition for such advertising accounts, and by keeping local dollars in town in cases where no local newspaper is published (the present law requires publication in the nearest eligible newspaper).

Hoyt says the savings would not amount to much. He said the average expenditure for publication of county board meeting minutes for all 83 Michigan counties last year was only .0056 percent of total county budgets.

Last year, in addition to other legal advertising, Clinton County published some 330 inches of synopsis county board meeting minutes in the Clinton County News at a non-profit rate of \$1.85 per inch. The \$611 total represents about .015 percent of the county's roughly \$4.1 million annual budget.

"You're being penny wise and pound foolish because it (Cropsey's bill) would really cost the public in the end," Hoyt said. He pointed out rates for court-ordered legal advertising — a major portion of legal ads — are mandated by the legislature so no savings is possible. Also, many shoppers do not necessarily offer lower rates than newspapers, he said.

In Clinton County, the most profitable Shopper is the St. Johns Reminder. The Reminder has no non-profit rate, but its open news rate is a dime per-inch less than the County News'. Assuming the Reminder offered a non-profit rate of \$1.75, the county could have saved \$61 on publication of synopsis county board meeting minutes during 1981.

"This would offer the county and city fathers a choice of where to spend tax dollars," Cropsey said. Cropsey said his efforts were prompted by a suggestion from the owner of a shopper that has begun to publish some news

items, but would "rather not say" who the owner was or what shopper he referred to.

"He's trying to act responsibly. He's looking at cost," Hoyt said of Cropsey. But there is more to the issue than cost, Hoyt said.

"Newspapers conscientiously try to maintain a balance of news and advertising. If their motives were purely profit making, they'd try to cut their ad ratio to 20 or 15 percent. This is what a shopper or throwaway does. It requires very little talent and the news is of a nebulous content.

"I don't really want to get into attacking shoppers. They have a place. But I don't think the public looks to a shopper for news. They look at it as an advertising medium."

Many more are looking to shoppers for news, however, and more shoppers are providing it, Cropsey says. The Reminder averaged about five percent news content a week ago compared to 24 percent in the County News.

Cropsey said the five percent figure will probably be

changed. "I'm not sure about the five percent," he said. "We put that in to see what type of response we would get. We're certainly very open to change."

His bill will probably not be considered by legislators this year, but Cropsey said it is one of the first things he would like to work on next year.

Our opinion

Bill would starve avid news reader

Those who know the news business know many newspapers have long been worried by loss of advertising revenue to shoppers.

Hiring and keeping qualified editors, reporters and photographers costs money: money which must be generated from advertising revenue. Shoppers which print little or no news can afford to underprice their newspaper competition on ad rates.

But if newspapers are worried, newspaper readers like you should be even more concerned about a bill recently introduced by Alan Cropsey, Clinton County's 88th District Republican Representative.

Presently, to earn the privilege of printing public information from local governments, a newspaper, as defined by state law, must carry at least 25 percent news and contain no more than 75 percent advertising. Under the Open Meetings Act, government bodies are required to publish meeting times, public notices, minutes and other information deemed important to interested citizens.

Although newspapers offer non-profit rates to local governments, some state legislators feel the cost of this legislation protecting your right to know to be too high; they have introduced bills to shorten the amount of information published or to eliminate the requirement entirely.

Now Representative Cropsey has taken another approach. Using the same "too costly" logic, he has proposed that the amount of news in a newspaper be reduced to just five percent, the amount presently carried in a few shoppers. He says local government officials should have a choice as to where they want to publish legal and insists competition would drive down prices.

What he neglects to say, however, is that such competition would also drive down the amount of news published; when only five percent is required, chances are five percent is all you, the reader, will get. And how much is five percent? Only one page of news in every 20 of advertising.

As for cost, studies show local governments could probably save very little, if anything, by advertising in shoppers. Rates for many legal advertisements are already established by law, and there is no guarantee that shopper rates would remain below those of newspapers once given the chance to compete.

In fact, given the opportunity to publish ads in two publications with nearly the same rates, local government officials could easily use their prerogative as a threat to newspapers which publish stories or editorials not to their liking.

We see nothing to recommend Representative Cropsey's bill and urge him to abandon his attempts to water down state standards defining newspapers. Whatever percentage he chooses, anything less than 25 percent will end up short-changing readers like you.

Cropsey's new definition will not make newspapers out of shoppers, but it might make newspapers a lot less "newsy."

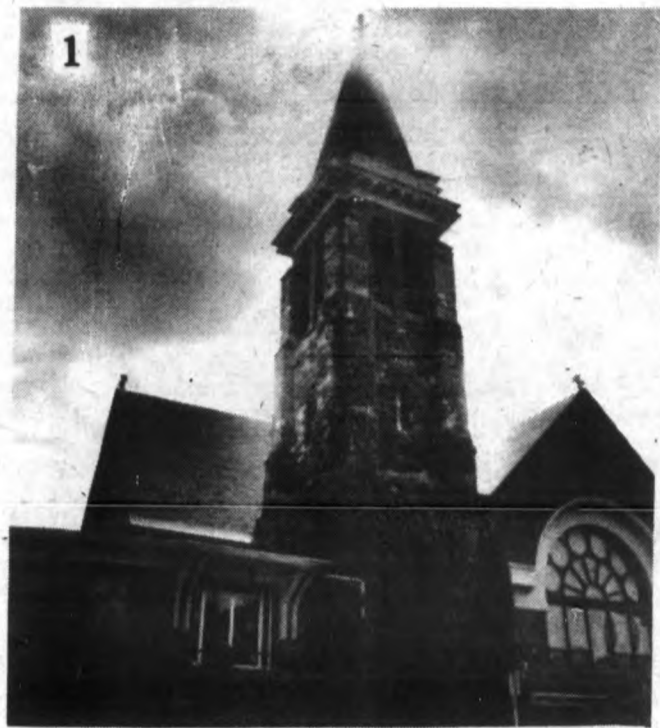

First Congregational Church

The simple Gothic-style First Congregational Church was built around the turn of the century of rough native boulders. It was trimmed with red pressed brick and sandstone. Its 19-square-foot tower rises 109 feet above the city and is clearly visible several miles west of St. Johns. An educational wing was added in 1975 on the site where a red brick manse once stood. The church's sanctuary seats 400 in an inclined semi-circle. Outstanding interior features include leaded glass windows and oak woodwork and pews.



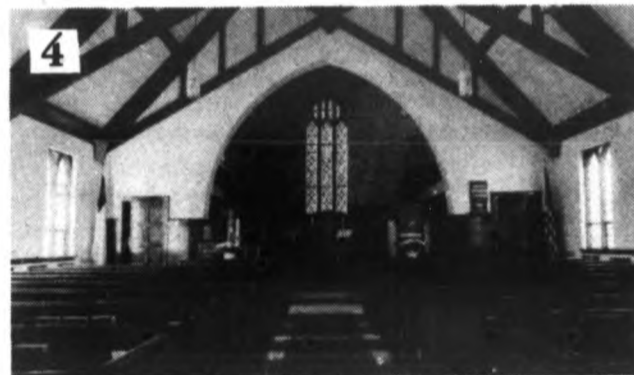

Paine-Gilliam-Scott Museum

Only the second brick house built in St. Johns, the museum is owned by Clinton County and is leased to the Clinton County Historical Society, sponsor of the home tour. It is now the oldest brick home in the city, since the first was torn down, and will feature unique historical displays and a new doctor's office.

Free Methodist Church

The only remaining church on Church Street in St. Johns is the 110-year-old Free Methodist Church. The original structure, built of soft red brick, was covered with stucco in the 1920s. In 1923, an enclosed tower was built after the original belfry was torn off during a tornado. Recent addition of a Greek Revival-style entrance and other improvements have further enhanced the church's exterior. Interior features include solid-oak woodwork and doors and an altar table and rails hand-built by Dr. Wesley Stephenson.



4
First United Methodist Church

The Neo-Gothic-style First United Methodist Church was erected after a fire destroyed an earlier church on the site in 1936. Its interior includes a sanctuary with stained glass windows and a smaller Mary Martha Chapel. Of special interest is the church's 11-bell carillon which was donated in 1916 by the John Hicks family, in memory of their mother. Originally played by hand from a room in the church tower, the chimes were electrified in the 1950s and are now played from a piano-type keyboard.



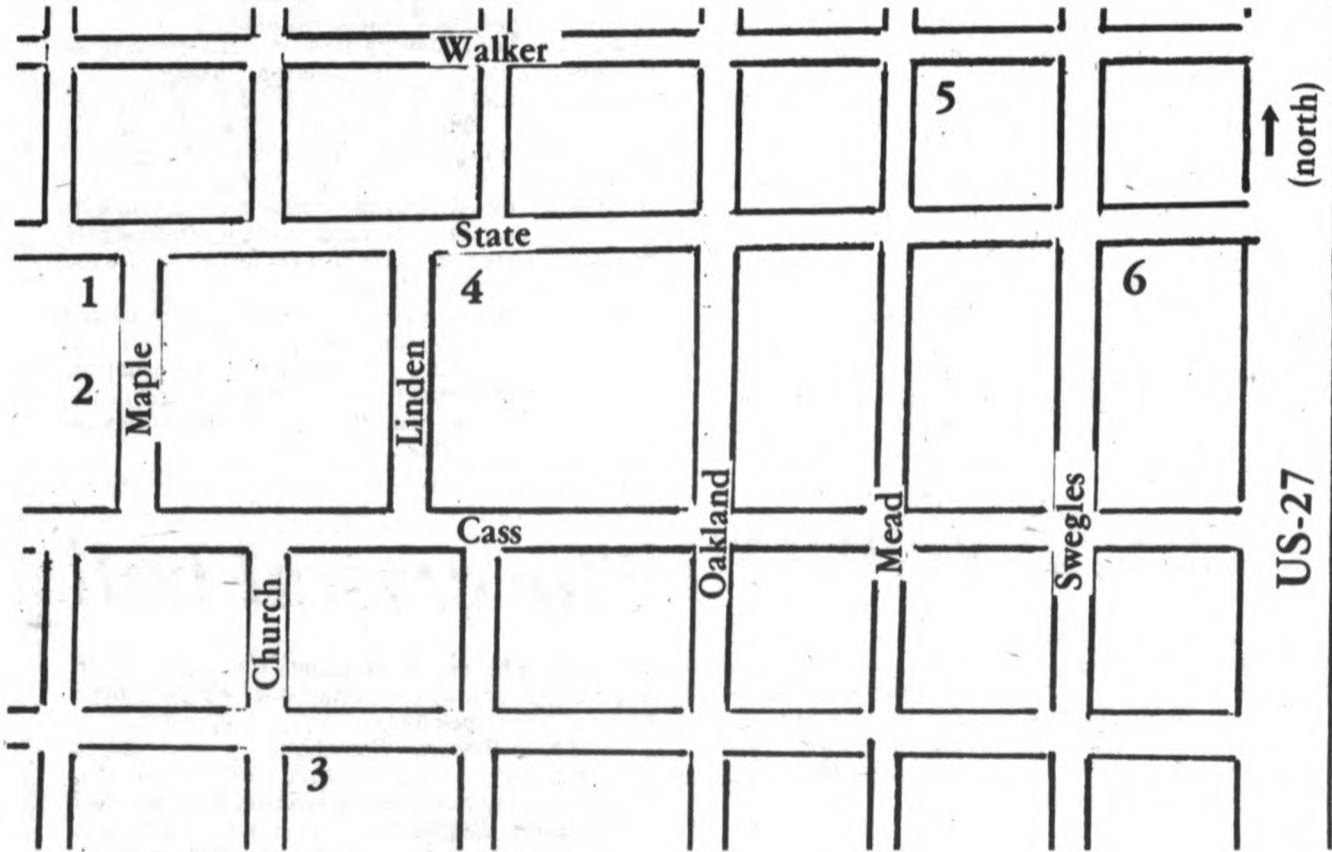

St. Johns Episcopal Church

St. Johns Episcopal Church was consecrated in 1898. The exterior beauty of the Romanesque-style red brick church is complimented by the quiet solemnity of its interior. The church and its newer parish school to the east enclose a "Garden of All Faiths." Of special interest are the many memorial stained glass windows.

The 1982 St. Johns Home tour will feature only one home and just a fraction of the stops included last year, but visitors and local residents will find plenty to do, organizers say.

The tour, which featured more than a dozen residences in St. Johns and DeWitt last year, will include four local churches, a museum and one home, a total of six stops. It will be held Saturday, Sept. 18 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tickets are \$3.

Betty Moore, organizer of the tour for the Clinton County Historical Society, said the tour is smaller this year because the society waited too long to request homeowners' participation. "We never appointed a chairman for the tour, and by the time we got around to asking people to include their home on the tour, it was already June," she said. "That just wasn't enough time for most people."

Titled "Bells, Steeples and Spires," the 1982 tour includes the 110-year-old Free Methodist Church at 305 Church St.; the First Congregational Church, across from the St. Johns Post Office; St. Johns Episcopal, at the corner of Walker and Mead streets; and the First United Methodist Church, across from the St. Johns Police Department.

Also included in the tour will be the Paine-Gilliam-Scott Museum located west of the Clinton County Courthouse; and a decorator's showcase to be held in the home of Robert and Jeanne Rand at 500 E. State St., organizers said.

The Rand home was built in the 1860s, and has been decorated for the tour by Clinton Home Center and Mark Roberts, two local home furnishings stores.

Along with the museum and a new addition at St.

Joseph's Catholic Church, the Rand home will also be available for viewing Sunday, Sept. 19 from 1 to 5 p.m., and on Wednesday, Sept. 22, from 2 to 8 p.m., Mrs. Moore said. Tickets for the second and third showings are \$1, she said.

Also featured during the tour Saturday will be an art show and sale, a street fair, craft sale, church meals and sculpting on the courthouse lawn in St. Johns by sculptor Glenn Rhines of Ithaca.

A farmers' market will be held the same day on Maple Street behind the courthouse, and special museum exhibits will include items from the Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1892-3 honoring the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America, Museum Director Catherine Rumbaugh said.

In the second quarter, Feldpausch plunged in from one yard out to up Fowler's lead to 12-0. The two-point conversion attempt failed.

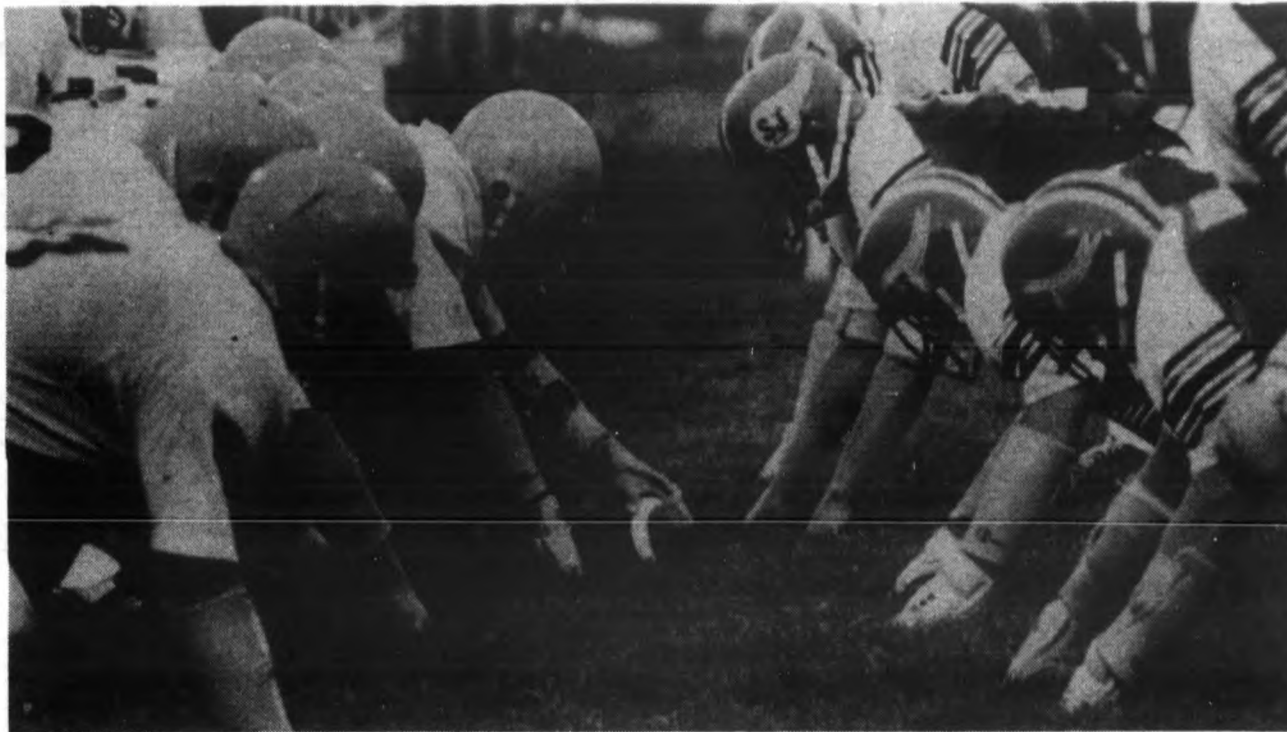
Feldpausch capped the scoring in the third period, when he caught a 25-yard pass from Goerge in the end zone. The extra-point kick attempt failed.

Hurst passes Marauders to victory

The Ovid-Elsie Marauders started out this season the same way they played all of last season — racking up points as fast as the scoreboard could tally them.

The Marauders had an easy time with an outmanned Portland team, rolling up 21 points in the first half and 20 in the second to breeze to a 40-8 win Sept. 10 at Portland.

From then on, however, it was all O-E. Near the end of the first half, Hurst hit Baese with a 13-yard toss in the end zone. Baese fumbled the ball, but Marauder guard Mike Burl pounced on the ball in the end zone for the touchdown. The two-point conversion made it 21-8 at the half.

After the intermission, O-E fullback Mike O'Dell went 46 yards up the middle to set up Craig Coleman's six-yard run for the touchdown.

Leading the ground gainers for O-E was Ralph Soliz, who picked up 77 yards in five carries. O'Dell accounted for 70 yards in seven carries. The stingy Marauder defense, led by Dan Hill's 10 tackles, held Portland to just 95 yards total offense.

Even with the impressive win under their belt, O-E coach Russ Pope isn't letting his players get too confident. That's because Saginaw Bridgeport, a Class A power, invades O-E tomorrow.

"The Bridgeport coach told me he has the best team he's had since he's been there," said Pope. "His defensive line averages 215 pounds with his two tackles over 230 pounds each. It's going to be one of our strongest opponents of the season."

On Friday, Sept. 3 the Bath Seniors started receiving flu shots at 10 a.m. and shots in St. Johns were planned for 1:30 p.m. that afternoon. By the time the health department workers were ready to start, there were more than 100 people lined up at the Drop Inn Center in St. Johns.

What is influenza? It is an illness caused by influenza viruses and generally affects people of all ages. Usually, people with influenza, or flu, have fever, chills, headaches, a cough and muscle aches. They may also be sick for several days or even a week or so. Most people recover fully.

But a small portion of people get particularly severe cases of influenza and may develop pneumonia or other complications. The risk of complications and even death from influenza is highest for people with chronic health problems, like diabetes, diseases of the heart, lungs or kidneys; severe anemia; or patients taking medications which lower the body's resistance to infection. Older persons — 65 or over — are also considered high risks for serious influenza cases.

Having had a flu shot in the past year is no guarantee of immunity, since the viruses often change their chemical make-up.

Older persons and high-risk flu victims should get a vaccine every year, but most others do not suffer any serious complications and shots for healthy children and adults are not recommended.

Although some people complain of a sore arm for several days, most do not suffer any side-effects from flu shots. However, as is true with any vaccine or drug, there is a possibility of more serious allergic reactions.

One shot is recommended for persons 13 or older, and those who have received at least one shot in the last four years, regardless of age, are also protected by one shot. People who should check with a doctor before getting a flu shot include: those who feel ill or who have had any other type of vaccine in the last 14 days; those who are allergic to eggs; multiple sclerosis victims or those with any other recurring neurological disorder; and pregnant women.

- Sept. 27 — 1:30 p.m., Westphalia Nutrition Site.
- Sept. 29 — 1:30 p.m., Elsie Nutrition Site.
- Sept. 29 — 5:30 p.m., Fowler Nutrition Site.

There will be a make-up clinic Oct. 1, but reservations must be made with the District Health Department. Call 224-7772 for an appointment for the make-up clinic.

No appointments are required for the other scheduled times.

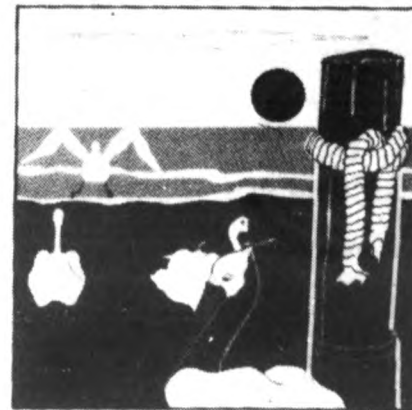

St. Johns board hears complaints about busing

More than 20 irate parents showed up at the St. Johns school board meeting Sept. 8 to voice their dissatisfaction with the new bus routes for the 1982-83 school year.

As a cost-cutting measure, the school district decided to eliminate two bus routes from last year, meaning some children would have to walk further to a bus stop or wait in a different place for the bus to pick them up. An estimated \$5,000 was being saved from gasoline costs, the board indicated.

The parents — some of them on the verge of tears as they spoke to the board — felt the safety of their children was being sacrificed for the money being saved.

"What kind of price tag are we putting on our kids' heads?" Al Manas asked the board. "How many dollars are being saved?"

The board heard 10 separate complaints on the issue. One of the main complaints concerned the intersection of Cutler and Francis Roads, where 12 students wait for the bus every morning. The parents said it was a very busy intersection and posed a safety hazard to their children.

"My child is worth a lot to me," said Rich Miller. "I think my child is worth a lot of money."

After all the parents had a chance to speak, Superintendent Dr. Donald Burns answered the complaints by saying, "Let me assure you, we have an experienced set of bus drivers. They all work for safety."

"We all know what has happened to the price of energy lately, and the board felt that when we started to reduce staff and cut basic programs, it only followed that bus routes would have to absorb some of the loss, too."

But the parents were still not satisfied, and the packed meeting room broke out in applause when one mother

said, "It's just criminal to risk the safety of our children for \$5,000!"

After hearing the complaints, the board decided to form an ad hoc committee, consisting of board members Peter Apostol, Thomas Irrer and Neil Barnhart, to deal exclusively with the bussing and transportation problem.

Earlier in the meeting, the board decided to accept the high bid of \$50,000 from the Olive Township Board for the purchase of Olive Center School, which has not been used by the St. Johns district for three years. In a letter to the school board, the Olive Township Board said the playground equipment would remain on the property, available for community use.

The money from the sale would be used first to pay off the \$9,765 debt the Olive school had and the remaining funds will be earmarked for maintenance and repairs throughout the system, the board decided.

The board also denied a request from a resident of the St. Johns school district, Thomas Claycomb of 5591 E. Centerline Rd., to let the Ovid-Elsie district count the membership of his daughter, who attends school in Ovid-Elsie.

After learning the Claycombs actually lived closer to St. Johns High School than Ovid-Elsie, the board decided to deny the request. "It's the policy we're concerned about here," said Irrer.

In other business, the board:

- Heard a report from Burns that enrollment in the district is currently 3,620, down 97 from last year. "We're kind of relieved, because we had budgeted for a 100-student drop and we thought it could be as high as 150," Burns said.
- Set the district's debt levy rate at 1.94 mills for the current school year, down from 2.17 a year ago.
- Set up an ad hoc committee consisting of Marian Kurncz, Robert Craig and Lee Ormston to deal with board policies.
- Set the district's operating millage rate for the current school year at 29.75 mills, the same as last year.
- Accepted the low bid of \$1,875 from Gaffney Painting to paint the football bleachers.
- "Regretfully" accepted the resignation of John Theuerkauf, a math teacher at Rodney B. Wilson Junior High who has been teaching in St. Johns for 32 years.

Elevator closes

A year ago, when Westmac Inc. was given financing-aid approval for a giant new grain elevator in Eagle Township, other operators in the area said the "little guys" didn't stand a chance.

This year, when August ended, so did operation of Fowler's 63-year-old Farmer's Cooperative Feed Mill. Are the two connected?

"Westmac didn't help," co-op president Ralph Watts said. Competition from the new elevator took some customers away and contributed to the decline of the Fowler co-op, he said. On the other hand, though, it's not all that simple.

The elevator, which served about 40 local farmers, was as much a victim of high interest rates and a sluggish economy as it was of competition from the new big guy on the block, Watts says. And an embezzlement by a company official in 1979 — all but about \$10,000 of the roughly \$47,000 taken was recovered — didn't help either, he said. "It was a combination of factors," Watts said.

But what happened to the Fowler elevator could hap-

pen to others in the area, and Westmac would be to blame, according to Lon Smith, owner of Smith Brothers Elevators. As president of the Mid-Michigan Farm and Grain Association Inc., Smith opposed Westmac's application for financing aid from the Clinton County Economic Development Corporation (EDC), saying such low-interest aid for construction would give Westmac an unfair advantage over local grain elevators.

Smith and his group of elevator operators were unsuccessful and Westmac's EDC application was approved. The Newyago-based firm was granted tax-free EDC bonds to finance \$4 million of the \$4.3 million project.

Smith's organization, which includes elevator operators from Potterville and Charlotte in Eaton County — the Westmac project is on the county line — filed suit to stop issuance of the EDC bonds, alleging the EDC act was unconstitutional.

Arguing before the Clinton County Board, the Grain Association's attorney, Doug Inglis of Charlotte, said the project did not meet two important criteria for EDC approval: filling a public service and creating jobs.

In fact, Inglis and Smith argued, the project would probably eliminate jobs by putting other elevators out of business and by eliminating the need to truck grain to Toledo (Westmac ships grain directly to Toledo by rail).

Their suit was denied and is presently being appealed. Meanwhile, Westmac has filed a counter suit in Federal Court charging violation of anti-trust regulations. According to Smith, Westmac's suit says the Grain Association set prices too low and worked in collusion to prevent Westmac's project from getting off the ground.

Meanwhile, the litigation delayed issuance of the EDC bonds — about \$1 million in EDC bonds have been issued, a county spokesman said, and Westmac is waiting for better interest rates to ask for the remaining \$3 million. Westmac has filed an affidavit claiming losses of \$250,000 as a result of the delays, Smith said, and asks triple that amount in damages in a suit naming seven defendants, including the Grain Association, three elevator operators and their elevators: Frank Bowles of Potterville Elevator, Bert Post of Minor Walton Bean Co. in Charlotte, and Lon Smith of Smith Bros. Elevators in Sunfield, Lake Odessa and Woodland.

Smith was reluctant to discuss the case, but said he is sure the new elevator has cost his and other elevators business. "I can't answer with 100 percent surety, but I'm convinced in my heart that we lost business and others lost business," he said. "But then, that's assuming that the business belonged to us to begin with," he added.

"Our objection was the type of financing. Those who have EDC financing have a distinct head start over others," he said.

Westmac Manager Dave Owen scoffed at the complaint that his firm may have put Fowler's elevator out of business or taken business from others in the county. "They've been saying that for years and I guess they'll keep on saying it," he said.

As for comments on Westmac's financing and litigation, he replied: "We have no response at Westmac, period."

COMMISSION ORDER BOBCAT HARVEST REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission at its meeting on June 12, 1982, under the authority of Secs. 1, 2, and 3, of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, Secs. 38 and 39a, Chapter IV, and Sec. 1, Chapter V, Act 286, P.A. 1929, as amended, established rules for the taking of bobcats, during winter and spring.

- Seasons:**
Zone 1 - Hunting and trapping, October 25 of one year through February 28 of the following year.
Zone 2 - Hunting only, January 1 through February.
Zone 3 - Closed to hunting and trapping.
- Shooting Hours:**
7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. local time
- Areas:**
Zone 1 - The Upper Peninsula, except Bois Blanc Island and Drummond Island, which will be under Zone 2 regulations.
Zone 2 - Cheboygan, Emmett, Presque Isle, Oscoda, Otsego, Montmorency, Alcona, and Alpena counties; also Bois Blanc Island and Drummond Island.

4. **Registration:**
Any person killing a bobcat shall present the whole animal at a Department of Natural Resources district office or other designated field office within 72 hours of the kill. There, a confirming seal shall be attached and information obtained from the licensee as to date, place, and manner of kill and other pertinent information deemed appropriated. No taxidermist or fur buyer shall accept, possess, or process in any fashion, a bobcat or bobcat pelt without the confirming seal attached. Sealing of pelts will qualify the fur for foreign export under regulations enforced by the Endangered Species Scientific Authority. Registration hours will be during regular working hours or where offices are open for some other purpose after hours.

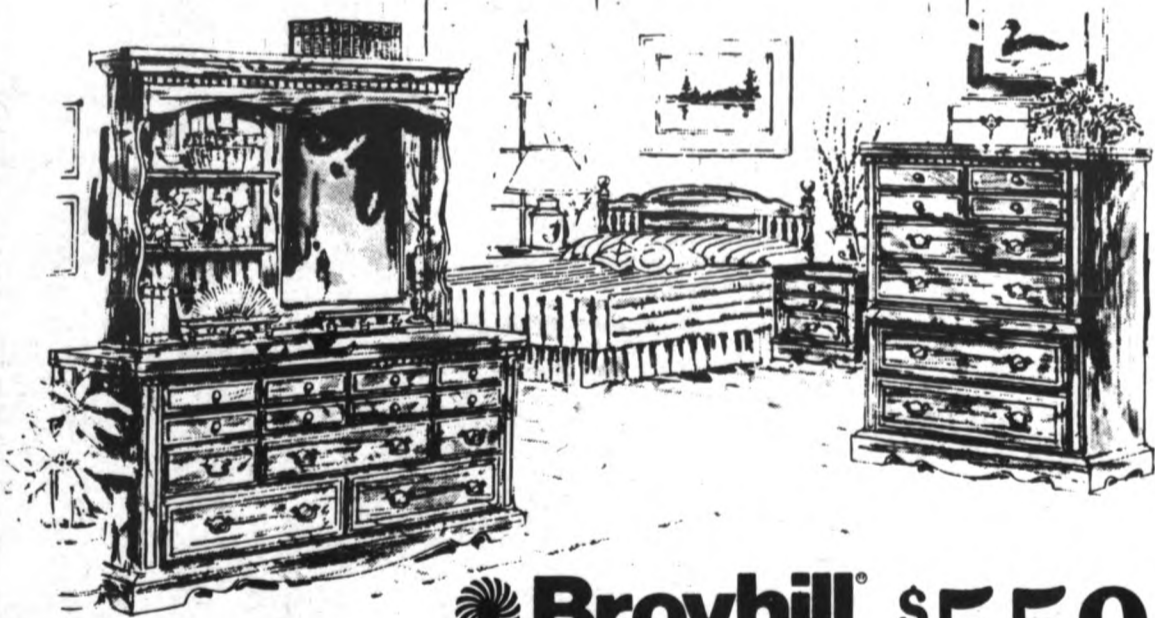

Townships refuse to okay Remy-Chandler work

Guiding completion of the Remy-Chandler Drain through local boards and the courts began to look more and more like a job for Henry Kissinger Monday night when the second Clinton County township decided to delay approval.

DeWitt Township's board did not discuss it during a regular meeting Monday, but the inter-county project was the topic of a lengthy meeting earlier in the day. The township has decided to not yet withdraw litigation which is holding up completion of the project.

The decision was made on the advice of township at-

torney Richard Robinson, who also advises Bath Township. Bath Board members made a similar decision the previous Tuesday, for mainly the same reasons.

Both boards say there is no guarantee contractors already involved in the project will accept the amount of money generated by a proposed second assessment. Without a promise in writing from contractors, they say, a third assessment on township residents could be forced by further litigation.

Already, the drainage ditch between DeWitt and Bath townships and Lansing Township and East Lansing is the subject of three lawsuits, and more are likely if work on the drain is not soon completed. In addition to suits by DeWitt and Bath townships, property owners Mike

and Pat Eyde of Lansing Township have tried to obtain legal relief from the first assessment.

Clinton County's board of commissioners gave their approval to an agreement, including a loan to the inter-county drain board, during their August meeting. If details can be worked out to convince DeWitt and Bath to drop their lawsuits, the drain project could be completed with funds borrowed from both Ingham and Clinton counties in anticipation of a second bond sale and second assessment, Clinton County Drain Commissioner Harry Harden says.

If not, the project will be even more costly as a result of inflation and additional litigation. Improvements to the drain were prompted by flooding in 1975.

Roses aren't bloomin' miracles; it takes planning

Rose planting time isn't until next spring. But now's the time to plan your rose planting and order your plants.

The first step is to decide what you want roses to do for you.

Deciding whether you want flowers for cutting, a border or background plant, summerlong bloom or a mass of accent color will help you narrow your choice.

Probably the best known and most popular is the hybrid tea rose. These bear large flowers, one per long stem. A wide range of brilliant colors is available. Plant hybrid teas if you want cut flowers or a landscape accent, suggests Dean Krauskopf, assistant professor of horticulture at Michigan State University.

For more flowers per stem, consider floribunda roses. The plants are a little smaller than those of most hybrid teas. The flowers are also small and plants tend to be slightly harder and more disease resistant. Though stems are shorter, floribundas are fine for cutting, as well as landscape accept plants.

Grandifloras, as the name implies, have large flowers

on medium to tall plants. In hardiness and disease resistance, they are similar hybrid teas.

Climbing roses are great for any place that needs a weeping or trailing plant. Some of the newer varieties bloom all summer rather than just once in the spring. Flowers tend to be about the same size as hybrid tea roses.

Shrub roses are fairly upright plants with old-fashioned, single flowers. They tend to be disease resistant, ever-blooming, easy care plants. They are especially well suited to use as background plants for summer annuals or perennials or other types of roses.

Old-fashioned roses bloom once in the spring. The rest of the summer, they are green thumbs. Flowers tend to be single, small and numerous. The plants are extremely hardy. Though not always easy to find, old-fashioned roses are still available. Some companies specialize in them. Others may be able to fill requests for specific varieties.

Miniature roses are not necessarily small plants—"miniature" refers to the flowers. Hardier than tea

roses, though not as disease resistant as the old-fashioned roses, the miniatures are great for flower bed borders.

Tree roses look like plants set on the tops of tall stems. The hand labor involved in grafting these plants makes them expensive. And the graft unions (the point where two parts are joined together) are the parts of the plant most likely to be winter-killed. To protect them Krauskopf recommends tipping the plants over and burying them under several inches of soil.

New varieties of roses are constantly being introduced, experts note. Trends in rose breeding seem to be toward shorter stems, more flowers, disease resistance and fragrance.

"Within five years, I expect to see hybrid teas on the market that will require little more than the old-fashioned roses," Krauskopf predicts. For information on rose varieties, sources, planting and other topics, Krauskopf suggests contacting a local member of the American Rose Society.

Without caution, lunch can 'sack' students

If your children regularly brown bag it when it comes to school lunches, make sure you follow a few simple steps to prevent food poisoning.

Food experts say that a combination of proper sanitation, food selection and temperature control will insure that sack lunches are safe.

When preparing lunches, make sure all containers and vacuum bottles have been thoroughly cleaned. Foil and waxed paper should not be reused.

A bag lunch which is not going to be refrigerated should contain only non-perishable foods. In this group are dry meats such as beef jerky and dried beef, cheeses and cheese spreads, peanut butter and jelly, fully cooked meats such as bologna and canned meats which are opened and eaten immediately.

If a sack lunch can't be refrigerated, items can be frozen ahead of time then placed in lunch sacks, where they should be thawed by lunch time.

However, since mayonnaise and salad dressing, egg salad, jelly, tomatoes and lettuce do not freeze well, these items should be avoided.

Working can clarify values for young

Part-time work during high-school or college, no matter what it is, can be an invaluable experience, said Jack Shingleton, director of Placement Services at Michigan State University.

"Even if students do things they don't like, that can help them make decisions later about a career. At that level, students can at least screen out things they don't want to do," he said.

He said he doesn't expect students to make a career commitment while they are in high-school, but they should begin thinking about it, particularly if they are interested in a field which requires math and science.

Shingleton said it's often too late to decide on a technical career in college, because the student has missed too many pre-requisites. Shingleton said he knows that jobs for high-school students are often hard to find, but added that students shouldn't ignore

the opportunities to learn about work before committing themselves to a career.

"I've had students tell me that one summer they had a labor job, and that convinced them they wanted to go on to college so they wouldn't have to do that for the rest of their lives," he said.

Shingleton said students often make the decision to go on to college to open up new avenues of opportunities.

He stressed getting work experience before graduation, even if it is not in the student's field.

He also said that talking to people in the profession, or visiting them on the job, could be helpful.

For those students trying to decide what they want to do with their lives, Shingleton suggested they take a look at their hobbies and outside interests to see how they would fit in with a full-time career.

5. Fold in 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten.
6. Beat 1/2 c. ice cold water and 1/2 c. nonfat dry milk together with a mixer until stiff and mixture stands in peaks. Fold into gelatin mixture.
7. Turn into an 8 inch spring form pan that you have sprayed lightly with Pam. Sprinkle top with a mixture of 1/2 c. graham cracker crumbs (4 crackers), 1/8 tsp. cinnamon, 1/8 tsp. nutmeg. Chill until firm.

The Wharton Center: music, drama, fun

The new Wharton Center for Performing Arts on the Michigan State University campus is expected to go a long way toward strengthening Mid-Michigan's position as a cultural mecca.

The \$20.1 million center will be dedicated formally at 3 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 26. The Chicago Symphony Orchestra will headline the dedication performance.

Also on opening day, at 8:15 p.m., a benefit concert for the center's programs and special projects will be held. Birgit Nilsson of Sweden, a world-renowned dramatic soprano, will be soloist with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

First in the planning stages 11 years ago, the new center is named for former MSU President Clifton Wharton and his wife Dolores, who were both instrumental in raising funds for its construction.

The center, which features a 2,500-seat great hall named for Catherine Herrick Cobb, is seen as a showplace for both internationally-known performers and local talent.

The 3 p.m. concert will include a special dedication during intermission.

The brick and wood center was built without benefit of state funding. About \$7 million was raised during an extensive nationwide fund drive and the rest came from pledges, investment income and university funds. Another \$7 million is still to come from the sale of university land and a pledge of student fees.

Wharton, MSU's 14th president, contributed directorship fees he earned from major corporations. In 1975, \$40,000 he donated helped support a benefit concert that featured singers Lena Horne and Tony Bennett.

Additional funds Wharton donated were used to commission a \$30,000, six-ton steel sculpture for the center site. Another \$96,000 was later allocated to the center fund.

While at MSU, Dolores Wharton served on the Michigan Council for the Arts, the governor's special commission on architecture and the bicentennial commission.

She was active in the National Council of the National Endowment for the Arts. Now, she serves as a director of the Museum of Modern Art in New York City and is a recognized authority on contemporary art.

The Whartons plan to attend the special dedication ceremonies. "Simply seeing the magnificent new performing arts center come to fruition would be satisfaction enough, but to have our names be a permanent part of the center is a tribute that makes us extremely proud," they said.

"MSU has made a brave commitment to the performing arts with the construction of this magnificent new facility," said Ken Beachler, center director. "We want to give audiences a dramatic experience from the moment they walk through the doors."

When patrons do walk through those doors, they'll find a building decorated in earth tones. The center is designed for beauty, energy efficiency and barrier-free handicapper accessibility, Beachler added.

While the 2,500-seat great hall is an impressive area for performing, not all productions will require a theater of that size. Smaller productions will be held in the 600-seat festival stage, a theater-recital hall patterned after the Shakespearean theater at Stratford, Ontario. Both halls are designed for excellent acoustics and views.

The festival stage is named in honor of Margaret Ewert McGoff.

Both MSU's theater and music departments have productions lined up for the center. Student musical groups are also planning performances.

Non-university groups using the center include the Lansing Symphony Orchestra and the Opera Company of Greater Lansing.

Future performances already scheduled include the Broadway plays "Evita" and "Barnum," musical groups like the Concertgebouw Orchestra of Amsterdam and the Vienna Boys Choir, dance troupes like Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater and the Zagreb Grand Ballet.

The center will be quite a change for arts patrons used to attending productions at the University Auditorium and Fairchild Theater. Those buildings, built about 40 years ago, were designed to accommodate a campus which had about only 6,800 students.

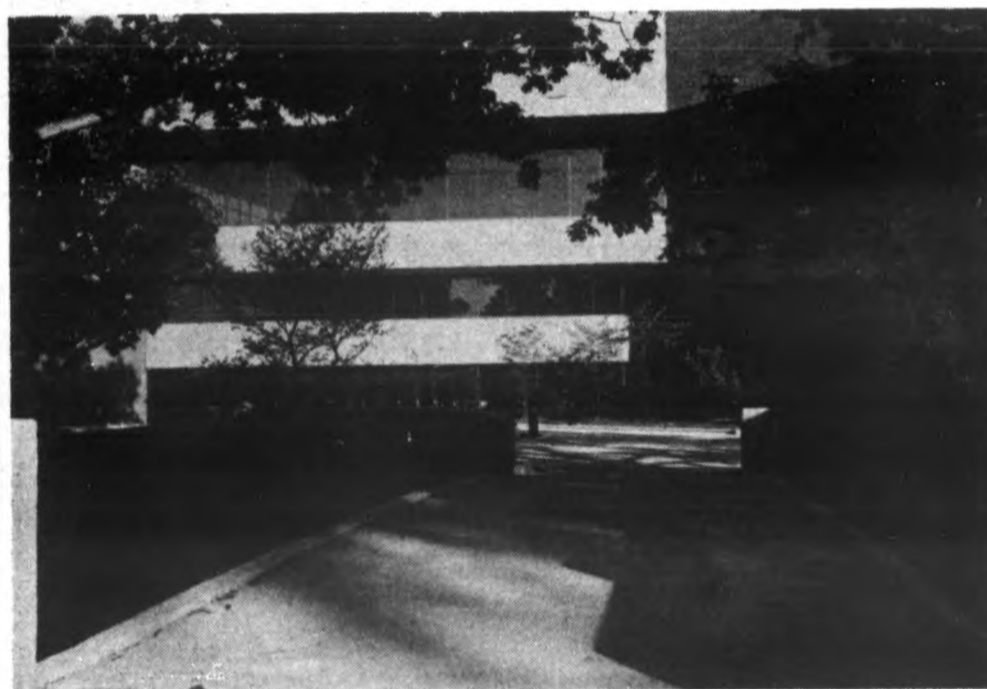
"Fairchild Theater was designed primarily for movies and the one play produced each term. Obviously, our needs have changed since then," Beachler said.

Admission to the dedication concert is by invitation, but some seats may remain for the public, Beachler said. Interested persons should call 355-6686.

The center is at Bogue Street, between Wilson Road and Shaw Lane on the MSU campus.

A 565-car parking ramp adjacent to the center is still under construction.

Although this is the formal dedication, the center has been opened for preview performances. One was for the center's construction workers and suppliers and the other was for the MSU campus community.

State's birth rate reflected in rising kindergarten enrollment

Michigan's kindergarten class is about 5 percent larger than last year's, when kindergarten enrollments were their lowest in 30 years, according to researchers.

Researchers say the increase in kindergarten enrollment is not as great as the national level's.

Nationally, the number of live births hit a low of 3.13 million in 1973 and the numbers have increased steadily since 1975. In 1981, an estimated 3.6 million children were born in the United States.

In Michigan the number of live births hit a low of

131,378 in 1976 and climbed to 145,563 in 1980, but dropped back down to 141,579 in 1981.

The researchers have found that the kindergarten enrollments in Michigan are also affected by the state's depressed economy, which has forced many young families with school-age children to seek jobs out of state.

In four of the past five years, for instance, fewer youngsters have registered for kindergarten in the state

than were born five years before. In 1981-82, for instance, about 1.2 percent fewer students registered for kindergarten than were born in 1976, a drop of about 1,300 students from the expected kindergarten enrollment.

This enrollment reflects elementary-aged statistics. The elementary enrollment will bottom out in the latter part of the 1980s and the secondary enrollment won't stabilize until the mid-1990s, say researchers.
