Teacher strike is threatened

"We've got teachers ready to walk," Mike Gehoski said following a strike vote by St. Johns teachers Tuesday, Sept. 28. "There's a lot of frustration out there."

Gehoski, the teachers' chief negotiator in contract talks with the St. Johns Board of Education, said his group, the St. Johns Education Association, voted overwhelmingly to strike if the board does not back down on its demand for a wage freeze.

If progress is not made at the next negotiating session Oct. 14, teachers will give the board only one more session before walking out, Gehoski said.

"That decision is always used as a threat to the board of education," replied George Johnson, the board's negotiator. "I don't think the St. Johns board is going to knuckle under to that kind of threat."

He agreed the main issue is the wage freeze, and said as of Friday, Oct. 1, neither side was yet willing to budge. "That seems to be the way I see it," he said, when asked if a strike is possible.

"The key is the freeze," Gehoski said. "If there's no significant movement by the board to withdraw that demand, we will strike. If nothing happens at the next session, we will ask for mediation again, and if mediation fails again, that's it."

A state mediator failed to resolve differences at the last negotiating session held before the start of school, but teachers agreed to return to work under their old contract as negotiations continued.

At issue is the system's financial health. Administrators claim there is not enough cash on hand to give teachers raises. They say the general fund equity — surplus cash — is \$260,000. But Gehoski says the school has more money than they would like teachers and the public to believe.

"I really disagree with that," he said of the figure. Savings from teacher lay offs and resignations, increased property taxes from new housing, the sale of Olive Center School and the transfer of one-quarter of a mill from debt retirement to the general fund have made the system more wealthy than last year, he said.

"Let me ask you this," Gehoski said. "They've just spent \$30,000 to repave the high school parking lot, \$40,000 for a new phone system, and \$20,000 for a new roof at Central Elementary School. Does that sound like they're in trouble? I thought these are supposed to be tough times. If things are so tough, do you think these things couldn't wait?"

All factors considered, Gehoski said, the system's cash reserve is at least \$450,000 and may be as much as \$650,000.

"That sounds extremely exaggerated," Johnson replied. The wage freeze, he said, is "an extremely firm issue" as far as the board is concerned.

Another issue, Gehoski said, is class size. "They could at least talk about combination classes." Class sizes in the district's 14 combined-grade classes vary widely, he said, putting an unfair burden on some teachers.

"They range anywhere from 19 to 34, and that's just not fair," he said. "It's due simply to an unwillingness of the upper administration to address the problem. If you want to call that mismanagement, then it's mismanagement."

A promise to spread the student load evenly, plus concessions on other issues like additional bereavement leave, could persuade teachers not to strike, "but they would have to make a whole bunch of them," Gehoski said.

"I can't believe there's any greater issue than simply the money," Johnson responded, "because we've attempted to address other issues and have been repeatedly told there would be no resolution of those issues until the money issue is resolved."

Gehoski said he hopes a strike is avoided. "It's the worst that could happen," he said. "Nobody really gains from a strike." But if necessary, teachers will walk off the job, he said, giving an unplanned vacation to about 3,700 students.

"I don't think the board of education really believes it is an idle threat," Johnson said. "There's always the possibility they will carry through with it. But it's not going to make the board change their mind."

Johnson said he will meet with the board Wednesday night, Oct. 13 to reassess board positions in preparation for the next day's negotiating session.

Settlement upsets residents

Board, Granger settle up

After Watertown Township Board officials decided to settle their suit against the Granger Landfill Sept. 23, upset citizens began circulating petitions for the recall of board members who voted for the settlement.

On the advice of their attorney, Steve Schultz, the board decided to settle its year-long dispute with Jerry Granger. Granger had wanted to expand his landfill in Watertown Township 92 acres for the disposal of toxic wastes. Both the board and residents of the area opposed the expansion.

Schultz advised the board to settle the suit now because the law could soon change which gives townships the right to settle such disputes. When Granger expressed an interest in negotiating, the board settled.

The terms of the settlement require that the expansion be built 300 feet away from Grand River Avenue to keep the land in the township's tax base. In addition, Granger agreed to pay seven cents per cubic yard of waste into a trust fund which the township can use to

conduct groundwater testing or compensate area homeowners for a drop in property values.

"I feel that the decision was very premature, in that they did not do an adequate job of fact-finding before reaching a decision," said Jan Look, president of the People's Action League (PAL). "On a scale of one to 10, I would say the settlement was a five."

Because of the board's decision, Watertown and Eagle Township residents began circulating recall petitions for the six board members who voted for the settlement.

"We (the PAL) aren't conducting the recall movement," Mrs. Look said, "but from what I understand, they are very close to having enough signatures."

"I'm in favor of the recall because I don't feel the board acted in our best interests. They thought they were, but they weren't."

In a law suit Granger filed against the PAL after he lost a bid for a Special Use Permit from the Zoning Board of Appeals, a decision was expected today at 1 p.m. Clinton County Circuit Court Judge Randy Tahvonen is expected to rule in Granger's favor, Mrs. Look said.

CPR: Creative Programs by Ricki

Clinton County residents should feel safer these days, thanks to Rachelle Burk. Known as "Ricki" by friends and co-workers, Mrs. Burk has spent the past four years educating people about cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), a life-saving technique.

The Michigan Heart Association recently recognized Mrs. Burk for outstanding leadership in bringing CPR programs to Clinton County and named her Tri-County Heart Unit Volunteer of the Year.

As an education assistant at Clinton Memorial Hospital, Mrs. Burk performs many tasks, including orienting new nurses, providing educational programs for hospital personnel and the community, and other duties. But her real love is organizing and promoting CPR training.

Ricki literally glows when CPR is mentioned. "I get excited about helping others," she says. "It's very gratifying to teach someone how to save another person's life, especially when that someone has had no medical training in his or her background."

"The more I'm involved in it, the more important it becomes to me," she said of CPR.

Ricki graduated from St. Johns High School in 1971 and attended Mercy Central School of Nursing in Grand Rapids. In 1974, she came back to St. Johns as a registered nurse and has been on the Clinton Memorial staff since. Starting out in pediatrics, she soon became head nurse of the hospital's special care unit. Her position provided her an opportunity to take a CPR class at Ingham Medical in Lansing, and that was the beginning of CPR for Ricki and for the many local residents she has trained since.

As her interest and enthusiasm grew, Ricki became a trainer, teaching CPR and training others to teach the technique. Now, as an education assistant, she is able to combine training and nursing. "Back in high school, I

was a member of the future teachers club," she said. "Now I am able to do both and I love it."

When Ricki started to advocate CPR training in 1978, she managed to get 18 classes scheduled. This year, since January, 44 local classes have trained 733 certified CPR graduates. "Community interest in CPR has grown tremendously," she said. "And I think that says a lot for St. Johns and its people."

Ricki sometimes misses daily contact with patients since she began concentrating on education, but working with people in local schools, government and industries also allows her to meet plenty of people, she says. "I feel like I'm needed there just as much as I am on the floor at the hospital."

When she's not thinking CPR, Ricki enjoys time with her husband, Gary, and their three children, Matthew, Melanie and Megan. Little League and Sea Lions keep the Burks on the go, but Ricki also finds time to be active in St. Theresa's Guild at St. Joseph Catholic Church. The Education Commission at St. Joseph School also benefits from her excess energy and she is working on her Bachelor of Science degree in public health education at Central Michigan University.

Lately, she's been busy gearing up fall CPR classes. "Fall is about our busiest time," she said. "People come back from summer vacation ready to tackle something new, or they've just learned that a relative has heart disease and they want to learn the CPR format."

Anyone can take CPR classes and they're offered at a variety of times to fit into busy schedules. New classes start every month and Mrs. Burk will be glad to schedule individuals or arrange training days clubs or organizations. "Some of the St. Johns teachers gave up a (free) day to learn CPR," she said. "It was wonderful."

Board retracts chief's firing

Confronted by a packed room at a hastily called special meeting Monday afternoon, DeWitt Township Trustees agreed to retract their firing of Police Chief Tom Aranow in return for his resignation.

In return, Aranow will receive full pay, fringe benefits and pension contributions until Dec. 31, when he intended to quit; and township officials must remove from his personnel file a letter from Supervisor Leonard Pung.

In the letter, given to Aranow Monday, Sept. 27, Pung fired the chief for "insubordination," citing Aranow's comments in a DeWitt/Bath Review news story published Sept. 23.

Pung's letter "shall be withdrawn and deemed to be of no force and effect ... as if said Notice of Termination had never been written, executed and delivered," the agreement drawn up by Aranow's attorney Michael Woodworth and Township Attorney Dick Robinson says.

Aranow's resignation was made effective Monday night, Sept. 27, and he has been replaced by interim chief Lawrence Jones. During the township's search for a new chief, Jones will receive the same salary Aranow was paid, about \$27,500 annually. "I assume if they want another chief, they'll have to pay for two at once," Woodworth said.

In his resignation, Aranow said: "It would not be consistent with, or otherwise further my career goals or objectives," to continue working for the township. Along with the settlement, the resignation was approved by all board members except Catherine Reed, who was absent.

Drain work could begin soon

Last minute loopholes were being closed Monday night as a group of contractors, property owners and township trustees in Bath and DeWitt were expected to sign a final agreement Wednesday, clearing the way for resumption of work on the Remy-Chandler Drain.

Bath Township Supervisor Richard Brook told trustees he met with DeWitt trustees and Clinton County Drain Commissioner Harry Harden most of the day Monday in an effort to tie-up loose ends on the project begun in 1975.

After hearing his report, trustees voted to call a special meeting Wednesday night at 5:30 p.m. If their attorney, Richard Robinson, finds the final contract in order, trustees will then be advised to drop their lawsuit against the project. DeWitt Township, which has also

According to Pung's letter, Aranow was fired because he made published comments in the DeWitt/Bath Review that: "I'm tired of political games interfering with my professional duties."

Pung charged that Aranow's statements were untrue and confronted the chief Friday, Sept. 28, the day after the news story was published, he said. Pung said it was then he offered Aranow several options and requested his resignation.

When Aranow refused, Pung fired him the following Monday afternoon. When the firing was announced at a board meeting that night, Aranow and his attorney said they would challenge the firing as a violation of the chief's freedom of speech, and asked for a public hearing. The hearing was set for Wednesday Oct. 6, but was moved up when a settlement was reached.

Had no settlement been reached, Aranow would have filed suit in Clinton County Circuit Court, Woodworth said. "If I'm exercising my legitimate constitutional right (to free speech), you can't convert that into a cause for my firing," Woodworth explained.

Woodworth also explained why Aranow did not request his job back. "Whenever an employer does something like this to an employee, the relationship is irretrievably broken," he said. "I had to tell him, 'You're not going to enjoy your work from there on, even if you survive the remainder of the contract'."

"Tom made no secret of the fact he would not wish to renew his contract. Now that he's leaving, I imagine he will be able to utilize this time to look for another position," Woodworth said.

filed a lawsuit, is expected to do the same, making it possible for the Inter-County Drain Board to issue bonds to pay back loans and finance completion of the project.

Concerned that voters might be asked to pay escalating construction bills, township officials in DeWitt and Bath filed suit to stop the project. Under the latest agreement, contractors are expected to agree to accept whatever payments can be divided up from a second assessment on taxpayers.

With an almost \$76,000 loan from Clinton County and more than twice that amount from Ingham County, work on the project can be resumed before frost sets in, drain officials hope. The project cost has risen by \$585,000 since 1978, and costs will continue to rise if the drain to relieve flooding in southern Clinton County, East Lansing and Lansing Township is not completed this year.

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Parking vacation will be over soon

The vacation will be over soon. People who have been parking in downtown St. Johns have no doubt noticed the new time limits on streets and in lots, part of the new parking system which was adopted last April, have not been enforced lately.

"The reason for that is because we've been two men short," said St. Johns Police Chief Lyle French. "Officer Jack Plowman, who took care of the parking enforcement, has been off for eight weeks now. And Officer Terry Brock resigned Aug. 20."

Plowman's leave of absence was due to a hernia operation, French said. "But hopefully — and I'm keeping my fingers crossed — Jack will be back this week," French said.

Plowman's return will mark a return to parking enforcement in the downtown area, French indicated.

The new system, in which parking meters were removed and replaced with 10-hour permit areas and one- or two-hour limit areas, was adopted by the city commission April 26 and went into effect May 17. A delay in the delivery of signs and tickets held up enforcement for about a month, however.

Once the enforcement started, French said, the police department received a few complaints about the new system. "Some people said they'd rather have the meters back," he said, "but once everyone got used to the system and we worked the kinks out of it, things were much better. The complaints have started to level off."

Part of the new system also included the sale of \$10 permits which were valid in designated 10-hour parking areas. According to City Clerk Richard Coletta, 86 permits have been sold so far.

"I think the new system is working out pretty well," Coletta said. "There were a few problems at first, but now that they've worked them out, it's working pretty well."

The new system was suggested by a group of downtown merchants as a means of keeping the businesses there competitive with the ones at the new Southpoint Mall. The free parking downtown was intended to compare with free parking at the mall, and was also meant to prevent merchants and their employees from using spaces intended for shoppers.

"There are a lot of parking spaces available downtown now," French said. "The parking lots are still never totally full."

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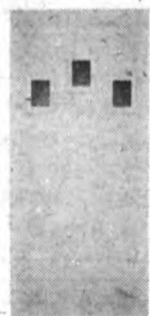
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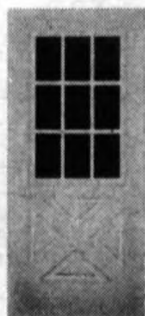
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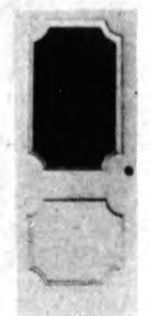

Free news worth its price

To the editor:

A while back I wrote a letter to the editor of the local Perry Newspaper, critical of local merchants' overpricing, unkempt and dusty shelves and cavalier treatment of customers. After three weeks, I telephoned the editor to learn why the letter had not been published. I was informed somewhat testily that it was not in the best interest to print it. Pushing a bit further, I asked what that could mean, since a bit of criticism might make storekeepers more aware of the impression they were giving. The response was simply that he, the editor, did not want to offend his advertisers by printing letters such as mine.

That, my friends, is what happens when advertising revenues become the prime concern. A newspaper may cost you some money of your own and not be mailed free to everyone in the area, as the Perry "newspaper" is. But you can be sure that we in Perry do not learn of the controversies in town as you so recently have in pre-election dialogue among readers and the current DeWitt police issues.

How desparately I wish the Lansing Suburban Newspaper Network could see its way clear to open up the news a little in the Perry-Morrice area. I get more news about events and accidents in the I-69 corridor from the DeWitt/Bath Review than I do in the local paper. You people may not get as much of the "Mary Jones visited her grandmother in Lansing last weekend" as we do, but you get the opportunity to speak out about the issues that trouble you. At the risk of coming out of the closet as a secret flag-waver, may I remind you that the ability to learn the details of your local controversies is what a free and open society is all about?

You won't get it from advertisers, I can assure you. I wouldn't want to be without advertisers, but I don't want their version of the news to be my only source, either, which is what will happen if newspapers lose their remaining income potential.

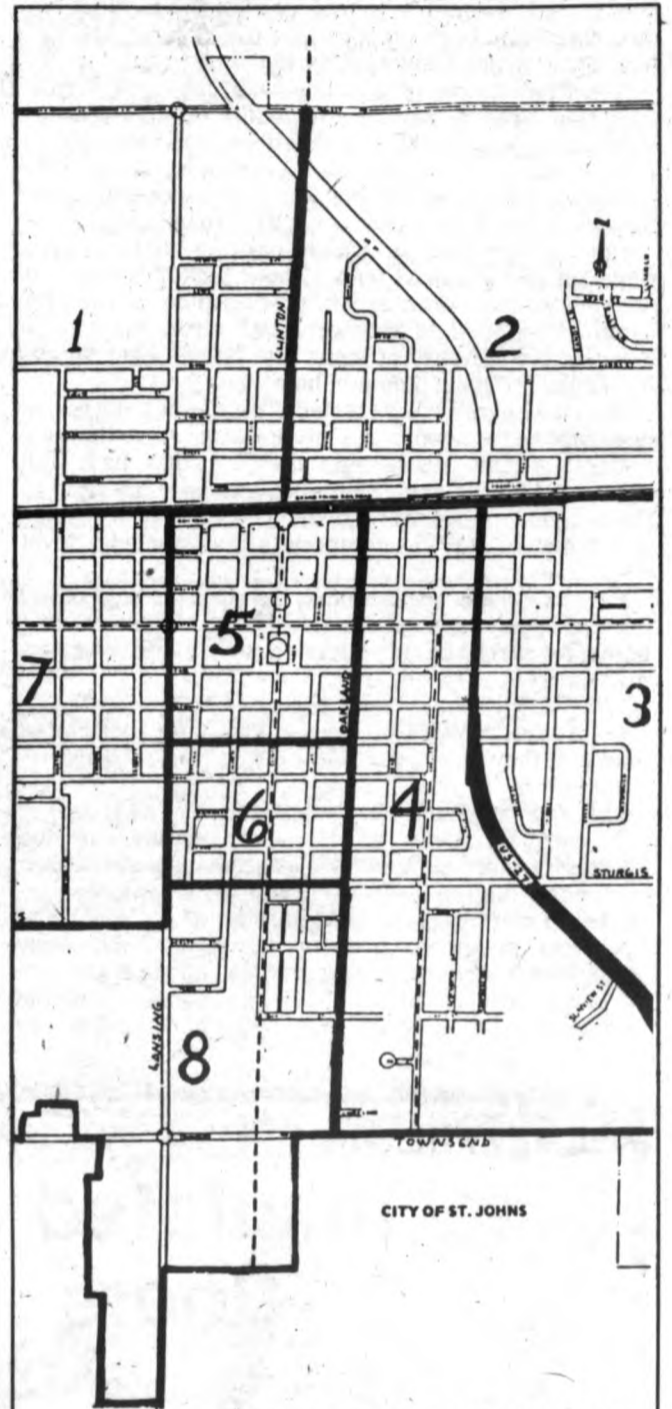

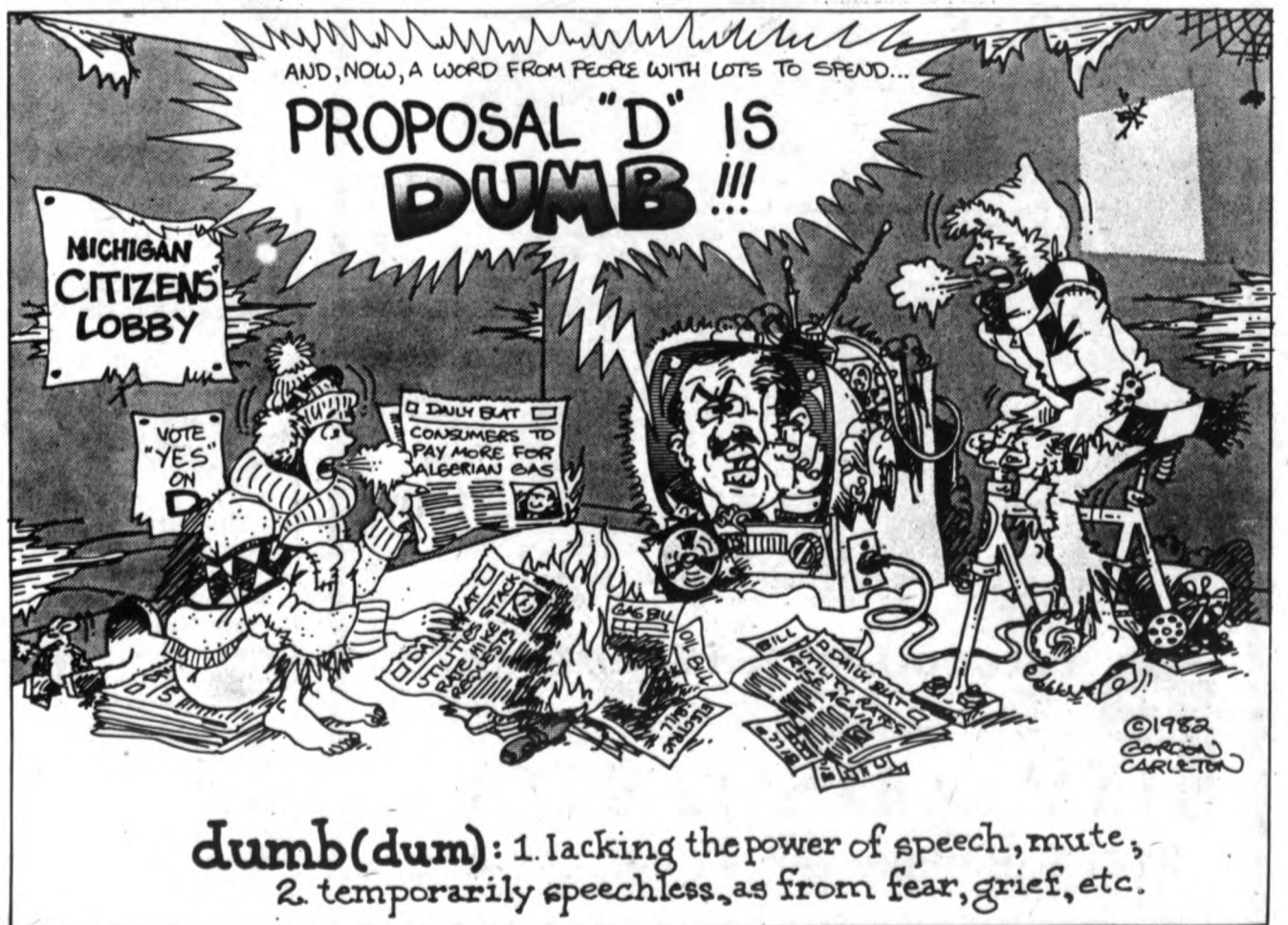

Enrollment drops

Enrollment in the six high schools and 42 elementary schools of the 10-county Catholic Diocese of Lansing declined from 14,147 in the 1981-82 school year to 14,064 for the current school year, according to the diocese.

Locally, St. Joseph Elementary School in St. Johns was the only one of three catholic grade schools in the county to show an increase. St. Joseph reported 295 students this year, up 23 from the 272 registered last year. Most Holy Trinity in Fowler had a drop of 18

students, from 193 to 175. St. Mary in Westphalia had an eight-student drop, from 278 to 270.

Across the diocese, enrollment in the high schools was down three students to 3,400. The grade schools showed a decrease of 80 students, down to 10,664.

"Given the economic conditions and the declining numbers of children in the school-age population, we consider that we are holding our own," said Bruce Fech, General Superintendent of Education for the diocese.

It was the Pirates against the Pirates at Pewamo-Westphalia's field Oct. 1. Guess who won.

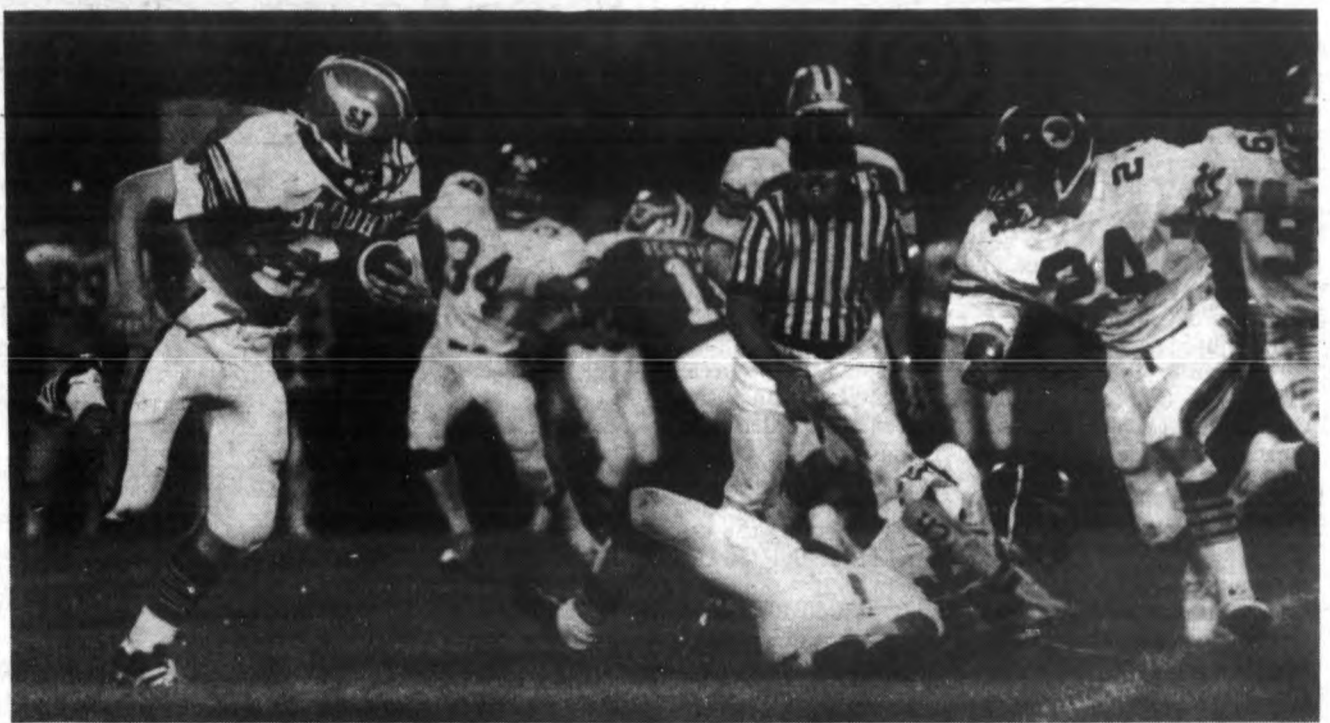

Redwings rattle Alma, 23-12

The bad breaks St. Johns experienced in the first half of its homecoming game with Alma would have broken most teams.

First it was an 85-yard punt return for a touchdown by Alma's Larry Mott in the second quarter.

Then at the end of the first half, the Redwings had two chances to score from the Alma one-yard line but couldn't push it in. A lot of teams would have folded at that point.

But not St. Johns. The Redwings erupted for 20 points in the second half to take a 23-12 win over the Panthers in a Mid-Michigan 'B' game. The win upped St. Johns' record to 2-2 overall, 2-0 in the MMB.

"That comeback in the second half was very important," St. Johns coach Joe Gonzales said. "It showed us that the kids can come back like that when they're down."

The victory, coupled with the 27-7 win over Corunna two weeks ago, puts St. Johns in the driver's seat to the MMB title. Corunna and Alma were considered the league favorites before the season started.

Against the Panthers, St. Johns opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 40-yard field goal by Jamie Werbish. "We're very satisfied with Jamie's kicking this year," Gonzales said. "He hasn't missed an extra point, and the only field goal he's missed was a 50-yarder in the rain against the wind. And he didn't miss that by much."

Alma came back for two TDs, on a five-yard pass from Eric Smith to Dave Spencer and the punt return by Mott. Both extra-point attempts sailed wide of the crossbar. That left the score 12-3 at halftime.

Then came what Gonzales described as the turning point of the game. Alma was driving toward the St. Johns goal line in the third quarter when Eric Slamka sacked Alma quarterback Smith on the Redwings' 22-yard line, causing a fumble which St. Johns recovered.

From then on, it was all red, as St. Johns scored on a one-yard run by Todd Elsea late in the third quarter. The two-point conversion try failed, leaving the score 12-9.

Then came Turning Point Number Two. With 11 minutes left in the game and St. Johns still trailing, Redwing QB Steve Gonzales hit Matt Downing on the run



with a pass. Downing outran all the Alma defenders into the end zone, making it a 51-yard TD strike which put St. Johns on top to stay. Werbish's extra-point made it 16-12.

"That was a beautiful play," Gonzales said. "Matt caught the ball on the dead run and just ran it in."

The last score was a 20-yard scamper by Bruce Riley, leaving the final score 23-12 after Werbish's kick.

The Redwings held a large statistical advantage in the game, piling up 344 yards total offense to Alma's 164. St. Johns had 16 first downs to Alma's 11. Individually, Elsea had 117 yards on 28 carries, while Riley picked up 102 on 17 carries. Gonzales was two-of-five passing for 63 yards.

Defensively, the Redwing pass defense was much improved, led by safety Gonzales, who broke up two passes in the fourth quarter. Chad Munger had 13 tackles, while Tim Moore had nine stops and John Keenoy six.

Next up for Gonzales' squad is a trip to Ionia, a team sporting a 3-1 mark this season. "Ionia is really surprising a lot of people this year," Gonzales said. "They beat Corunna last week. Their defensive line is quicker than the people we've been playing."

A big challenge for St. Johns will be trying to stop Ionia's 6-2, 205-pound running back, Todd Hummel. "We just can't let down now," Gonzales said. "We can't take anything for granted."

in six points for the Pirates.

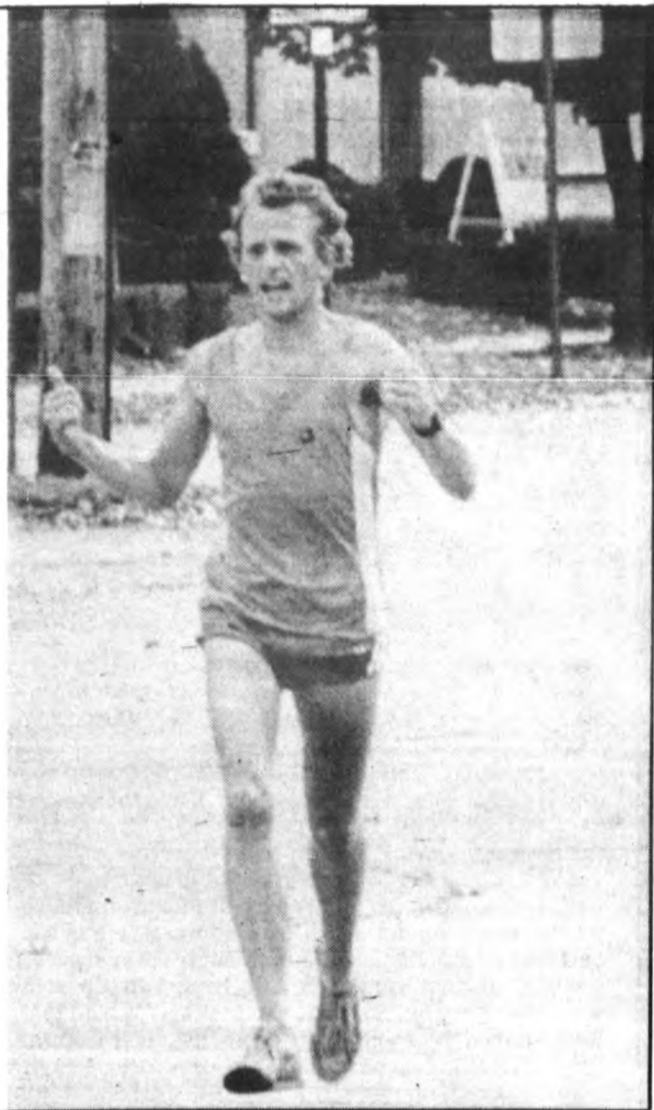

Meat cheaper?

Food shoppers will be greeted by lower retail beef prices at the meat counter during October. Supermarkets are cutting prices and promoting beef more heavily to reflect price decreases that have filtered down from producers and packers in recent weeks.

Consumers have already responded to the lower beef prices and heavier promotion by purchasing five percent more beef. Beef prices should continue to weaken for another month or so and then stay at the lower levels for a while. Cheap feed and heavy marketing of cattle are cited as the reasons for the lower prices.

Retail pork prices, on the other hand, are anything but low. The high pork prices are not expected to drop significantly before mid-1983.

Broiler prices have strengthened in recent weeks, and retailers will likely use them for an occasional feature. But beef will be the main meat promotional item for some time.

Fresh mushrooms are a likely ingredient in some of your favorite beef recipes. Excellent quality fresh mushrooms are now available in most supermarkets. The 1982-83 national output is up 10 percent, continuing an upward trend which started about 15 years ago. Michigan is the No. three producer of fresh mushrooms, and production here is up 5 percent, according to the Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service.

A huge crop of California table grapes will be on the market this month. Choose from the pale green Thompson seedless or the red Tokay varieties. A city, roadside or produce specialty market will also have Michigan Concord grapes (dark blue and very aromatic) and green Niagara grapes.

Barlett pears from California and Michigan will also be on the scene. The homegrown pears will be smaller, but they'll more than make up for it in flavor.

October is the month to search out novel varieties of apples, such as the Gala, a large yellow apple, blushed with pink. Other attention getters are the Newton Pippin, a huge cooking apple, and the Cortland, which is excellent for salads because the snow-white flesh darkens less readily than that of many other varieties.

After October, shoppers are limited to the Michigan varieties grown in commercial quantities. These include: Jonathan, Idared, Delicious, McIntosh, and, possible, Northern Spy and Rome.

As for fall vegetables, the biggest eye catchers are pumpkins and hard shell squash. Even the names of the



squash are unusual—turban, hubbard, butternut, acorn and spaghetti, which actually cooks up much like the pasta product.

Cauliflower production peaks in October. Excellent quality broccoli, Brussels sprouts, Chinese cabbage and other cabbage vegetables will be featured at markets this month. Though these are available throughout a good part of the year, prices rise after production peaks.

A good crop of potatoes, both in the state and nationally, means fresh potatoes will be featured often by budget-minded cooks. Onions and carrots, key ingredients in many main dishes, are also in good supply.

Forecasts of a good California tomato crop resulted in drops in the price of processed tomato products. That and a big dry bean crop mean shoppers with limited budgets can eat well during October.

Sew-for-profit seminar scheduled for small home businesses

People with sewing-related small home businesses can sharpen their skills and learn how to increase profits at an Oct. 22-23 seminar in Grand Rapids.

The "Sew For Profit" seminar, sponsored by the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service, will be held at the 28th Street Marriott Inn beginning at noon on Oct. 22. More than 20 workshops, several speakers and a variety of state and national exhibitors will be featured, says Isabel Jones, MSU Extension specialist in clothing and textiles.

"The workshops will cover a wide range of concerns,"

Jones says. "Some provide management information and others provide techniques to improve skills.

"One problem that many small business owners face is lack of contact with and knowledge of supply sources," Jones says. "At the seminar, they will have an opportunity to talk to suppliers, place orders or arrange for appointments with various companies."

In addition to the formal learning sessions, conference participants will have an opportunity to locate and meet people who do specialized services, or to offer their services through a specialized locator desk.

The seminar will deal with all areas of dressmaking, alteration, repair and other needle-related skills.

The registration fee is \$10 if paid prior to Oct. 4, and \$12 afterward. There is a special one-day fee of \$7 for people wishing to attend one day, and a family fee of \$15 before Oct. 4 and \$18 afterward.

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Experts say produce less milk or else

The options available to dairy farmers are tough but obvious, says Glynn McBride, Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service agricultural economist.

These options include voluntarily cutting back the volume of milk going to market, incurring governmental penalty for overproduction, or allowing market economics to reduce the number of dairy farms in Michigan.

"So far, the latter, harsh as it may seem, has been the pattern in recent years," McBride says. "As much as I dislike to see this unfold, I'm afraid this will probably continue to be the pattern unless dramatic change occurs within the industry during the next few years."

Milk production continues to far exceed consumption. The only new development is that congress says government is not going to continue shoring up prices by buying surplus dairy products.

The strongest signal from the feds to date is continua-

tion of the current price support level - \$13.10 per hundredweight (cwt.) - through fiscal year '84, plus authorization of the USDA secretary to deduct 50 cents per cwt. from the proceeds of all milk sold by farmers.

These funds will be paid to the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) to offset handling costs if projected

surpluses are 5 billion pounds of milk equivalent. This assessment, to be levied beginning Dec. 1, is not refundable.

A proposed second assessment of equal amount after April 1, 1983, is refundable, providing the farmer can prove an output reduction. The second assessment could go into effect if CCC purchases are above 7.5 billion

pounds of milk equivalent.

"This could mean that milk checks next year could average about 90 cents less per hundredweight than they do now," McBride says.

McBride urges farmers to resist the tendency to increase farm milk flow to overcome the decrease in cash flow. Instead, he recommends a vigorous cow culling - at least 5 percent - and increasing production of the remaining cows.

"With good management, the effect on net income will not be as tough to handle as the possible consequences of continuing the present production pattern," McBride says. "The vigor of the milk industry can be restored if all dairy producers do their part in reducing milk output."

McBride and a team of 30 CES campus specialists and field agents are ready to help dairy farmers develop management plans for farm survival. Team members can be reached through local county Extension offices.

Dairy assessment date changed

December 1, 1982, is now the date that dairy producers will begin being assessed 50 cents per hundredweight of all milk commercially marketed.

"The assessments were to begin October 1, 1982, but the startup is being delayed to allow producers time to comment on the rules that will implement the recent changes in the dairy price support program," says Mike Kovacic, commodity specialist for Michigan Farm Bureau.

The assessment is designed to offset part of the cost of the dairy price support program. An additional 50 cents per hundredweight assessment is authorized under the new law effective April 1, 1983. Producers who would like to comment on how the assessment is to be collected, and how the assessment program is to be administered, should write to: Director, Dairy Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA, Washington, D.C. 20250. Comment deadline is November 8, 1982.

Sale to Russians has little impact

The announcement that the Soviet Union is buying 750 thousand metric tons - about 30 million bushels - of U.S. corn has been welcomed by American Farm Bureau Federation President Robert Delano.

Noting that the sale, announced by Agriculture Secretary John Block, was the first transaction under last month's extension of a grains agreement with the Soviet Union, Delano said he saw it now only as a substantial sale, but as a healthy indication of renewed movement in grain trade channels with the Soviet Union.

However, the sale is not expected to have any appreciable effect on corn prices. With the large stock of feed grains expected for 1982-83, long-term improvement in corn prices is not anticipated until there are indications that Russia intends to buy more grain than last year. In 1981-82 the USSR purchased 7.7 million metric tons of corn, 6.8 million of wheat and 700 thousand tons of soybeans.

Birth defects and role of placenta studied at MSU

Links between birth defects in newborns and abnormal placentas are under investigations in a one-of-a-kind registry at Michigan State University.

The placenta is the endocrine organ which surrounds the unborn infant and serves as a lifeline from mother to child.

Pathologists at the Michigan Placental Tissue Registry are studying the connection between an abnormal process which destroys fetal red blood cells and blood vessels within the placenta, and stillborn infants or those born with birth defects.

Charles H. Sander, M.D., MSU pathology professor and director of the registry, says that analysis of the registry data reveals a significant association between an abnormal process known as hemorrhagic endovascularitis or HEV and otherwise unexplained stillborn infants.

HEV has been observed in more than 500 placental specimens sent to the registry by Michigan physicians, Dr. Sander reports. Placentas affected by HEV have been found in successive pregnancies of several patients delivering infants in distress or small for their gestational age.

Follow-up studies are underway on infants whose placentas have shown evidence of HEV to determine any long-range effects and possibility of recurrence. Involved is linkage of data from neonatal intensive care units in hospitals across the state to that collected and analyzed by Placental Tissue Registry researchers.

Unique in the U.S., the Michigan Placental Tissue Registry was founded as a diagnostic referral center to receive placental specimens associated with any abnormality in pregnancy. More than 1,000 placental specimens are received annually from Michigan physicians concerned with care of the pregnant patient.

Farm folks: What do the statistics show?

What are the real differences now between farmers and non-farmers?

A recent survey by U.S. Department of Agriculture researcher Vera Banks says farm residents are older, more likely to be employed and have an income that is still well below that of non-farm families. Farm population continues to drop, too. In 1920, 30 percent of Americans lived on farms. That figure has now dropped to 2.6 percent.

Here are some of her findings:

-The median age of the farm population is 36 years, compared to 30 years for non-farm residents.

-Farm men outnumber women. There are 107 men for every 100 women on farms. This compares to 88 men for every 100 women in the non-farm population.

-Seventy two percent of farm women are married and living with a spouse, compared to 54 percent of non-farm women.

-Farm women bear more children, and are less likely to be employed than non-farm women.

-Unemployment of farm residents ran only three percent last year, compared to the non-farm average of eight percent. But, there is a leading factor in that statistic. Even when farmers lose needed off-farm work, they're still not counted as unemployed.

-Farm families continue to trail their non-farm counterparts in total income. In 1980, the total income of farm families-including both that earned on farms and non-farm jobs-averaged \$15,775. This compared to \$21,151 for non-farm families. The survey also shows that nearly one third of the farm families earn less than \$10,000 annually; only about a quarter of them earn \$25,000 or more. By contrast, only about 18 percent of the non-farm families earn less than \$10,000 annually and 40 percent of them earn \$25,000 or more a year.

Trends in state's agriculture subject of conference

The current trend of Michigan's agricultural market is one of the production areas to be examined during the Animal Industries Resource Conference Nov. 10-11 in East Lansing.

Open to state livestock, dairy, poultry and pet animal producers, the two-day session will be held at the Harley Hotel (corner of the Jolly Road exit from I-96 and Collins Road).

"The purpose of the conference is to provide producers the latest technical and economic information on Michigan's animal industry," says Paul Kindinger, assistant director of Extension for agriculture and marketing programs at Michigan State University.

"The conference also helps develop a better relationship among people involved in Michigan's livestock industry."

The \$31.85 registration fee covers meals and conference costs. Arrangements for lodging must be made on an individual basis.

Stoves hamper breathing, doctor says

A pilot study conducted by a Michigan State University pediatrician shows that woodburning stoves, used as the primary or substantial source of home heating, are a significant factor in the breathing problems suffered by pre-school children. This has special significance for Michigan, with its tradition of woodburning.

In 1981-82, Richard Honicky, M.D., a former American Lung Association fellow, and other doctors from Michigan State University, studied 31 of the Clinical Center's pediatric patients and compared them with a control sample of other children matched for age, sex and home town.

The findings showed an increase in coughing episodes at night during the winter months among children exposed to indoor pollution by woodburning stoves.

Dr. Honicky also noted a difference in the children's tendency to wheeze. In woodburning homes, 71 percent of the children wheezed during a cold and 55 percent did without a cold. In the control sample, only 19 percent wheezed during a cold and none wheezed without a cold. He said that wheezing is a "distinct sign of an airway problem."

Persistent coughs, especially those lasting more than six weeks, also spell trouble, he said. The researchers checked whether the children coughed four or more days in a week. None in the control sample did, but 45 percent in the woodburning sample did.

Dr. Honicky also found that children with respiratory disease had aggravated symptoms in their wood-heated homes.

He suspects that unburned gases are causing the respiratory problems in healthy children and those with lung diseases. He wishes to further research the link between woodburning stove use and the occurrence of recurrent breathing problems in Michigan pre-schoolers living in homes heated by woodburning stoves. He also wants to discover how the woodburning stove ranks with other lung-aggravating sources of indoor air pollution such as exposure to cigarette smoke, cooking with gas, asthma in the family and the use of formaldehyde urea foam for insulation.

"Because conversion to woodburning stoves is on the increase as a means of cutting down on heating bills, it is extremely important to resolve any questions about

them," Dr. Honicky said.

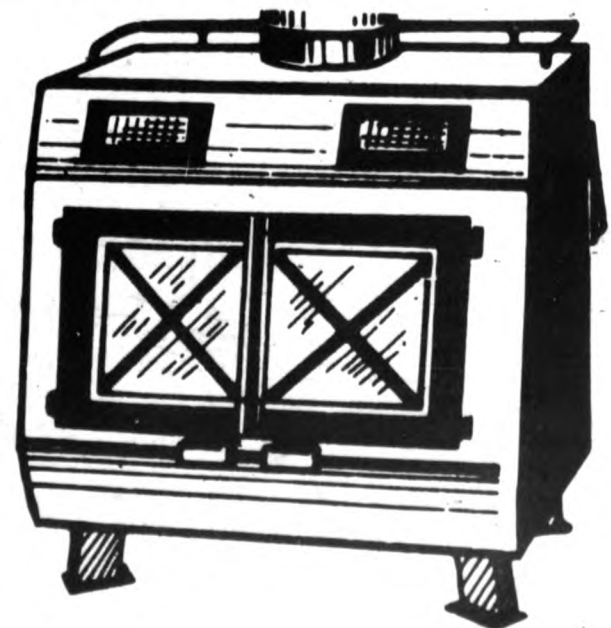
Although many types of woodburning stoves are in use, most of them function similarly to the most popular types-the Franklin Stove. The Franklin-type stove operates as a delayed composter of wood, releasing carbon monoxide, particulate carbon, carbon dioxide, sulfur dioxide and possibly aldehydes into the atmosphere.

Therefore, the question arises whether hydrocarbons and other hazardous constituents in the wood are being sent into homes, being produced in increased concentrations in the ambient air-a factor that might account for the higher incidence of respiratory problems.

And, in this situation, are there any possible changes in either the design of the woodburning stoves or in the design of homes that might eliminate the problem?

Dr. Honicky's study is the first on woodburning stoves to be published.
