# Ionia man dies in plane crash

Robert Lee Lower, former mayor of Ionia, was killed Monday when his single-engine Beechcraft crashed in a wheat field near the intersection of Pratt and Wacousta roads in southwest Clinton County.

The crash was reported at 10:10 a.m. by Gerald Koepfen of St. Johns, owner of the field where Lower may have been attempting to land.

"I heard a big explosion like someone was dynamiting," Koepfen said, "but we never heard an engine." Koepfen said he was working with Don Heltene, and it was Heltene who saw the wreckage of the plane. The pair contacted the Clinton County Sheriff Department, which notified DeWitt City Fire Department.

No immediate cause of the crash was reported and a Federal Aviation Administration investigation is underway. Retractable landing gear on both wings was extended and Clinton County Sheriff reports said Lower had taken off from Ionia Airport about 25 miles northwest just prior to the crash.

Lower, 56, of 413 Baldie St., Ionia, was Democratic Chairman of Ionia County and held a private pilot's license for many years, reports said.

His body was torn from his pilot's seat and thrown about 20 yards from the seat and about 15 yards from where the fuselage of his low-wing airplane came to rest.

Wreckage was strwn over some 200 yards and both wings were ripped from the plane's body shortly after impact. The engine was found about 50 yards from the nearest portion of the airplane, across Wacousta Road.

Medical Examiner Dr. James Grost pronounced Lower dead at the scene from impact injuries and said there was no indication of a heart attack. An autopsy performed at Sparrow Hospital indicated Lower did not have a heart attack.

"His death was due to injuries sustained in the crash. There was no evidence of a coronary," he said.

Lower was alone in the White Beechcraft, model A-24-R, when the crash occurred. Skid marks in Koepfen's wheat field indicated the plane bounced after impact, throwing Lower clear.

Hungry Wolverines at White's three Flint stores and one store in Owosso took a bite out of MSU's local lead and won the overall contest by a narrow 135 cookies, 1,347 to 1,212.

# County board gets look at budget, tax roll

A new budget for Clinton County was looked over, then tabled by commissioners at a meeting Tuesday.

The \$5,205,001 1983 budget includes a four percent raise for 137 county employees and includes \$428,000 in revenue sharing from the state and federal governments.

The budget was increased by \$315,101 from a year ago, and is about 6.4 percent higher than last year's budget of \$4,889,900.

Property taxes rose by about \$33,000, and revenue sharing funds increased by \$20,000. The largest single increase from a year ago came from last year's general fund. The county had \$200,000 left over in last year's account, and the extra cash will be added to next year's general fund, giving the county \$500,000 in cash on hand for contingencies.

Interest collected from county funds also rose by \$110,000, thanks mainly to new investment plans and law changes which allow the county to put all of its money in one bank for a higher rate of interest and less administrative cost.

Areas where revenues dropped included a \$20,000 loss in Michigan Income Tax allocations from the state, and a \$16,000 drop in register of deeds fees.

"I think you can attribute that directly to less activity in that area," Administrator William LeFevere said of the register of deeds fee drop. He said there have simply been fewer housing starts and property purchases.

As for expenditures, most departments will be funded at or near the same levels of a year ago, LeFevere said. The exception is 109 non-union and 28 unionized county employees, who will receive four percent raises in 1983. Last year, the same employees were given six percent raises, LeFevere said.

County commissioners also were given a look at annual property tax revenues for 1982. The total equalized value of property in the county rose by about eight percent, from \$531,939,504 in 1981 to \$574,754,499 this year, reports said.

They agreed to levy 5.1395 mills, to be spread among local units of government and school districts. The millage is a reduction of about one-third mill from a year ago.

LeFevere said higher property taxes, resulting from higher property evaluations, made the millage reduction possible.

Board members are expected to vote on the budget at their next meeting Oct. 26.

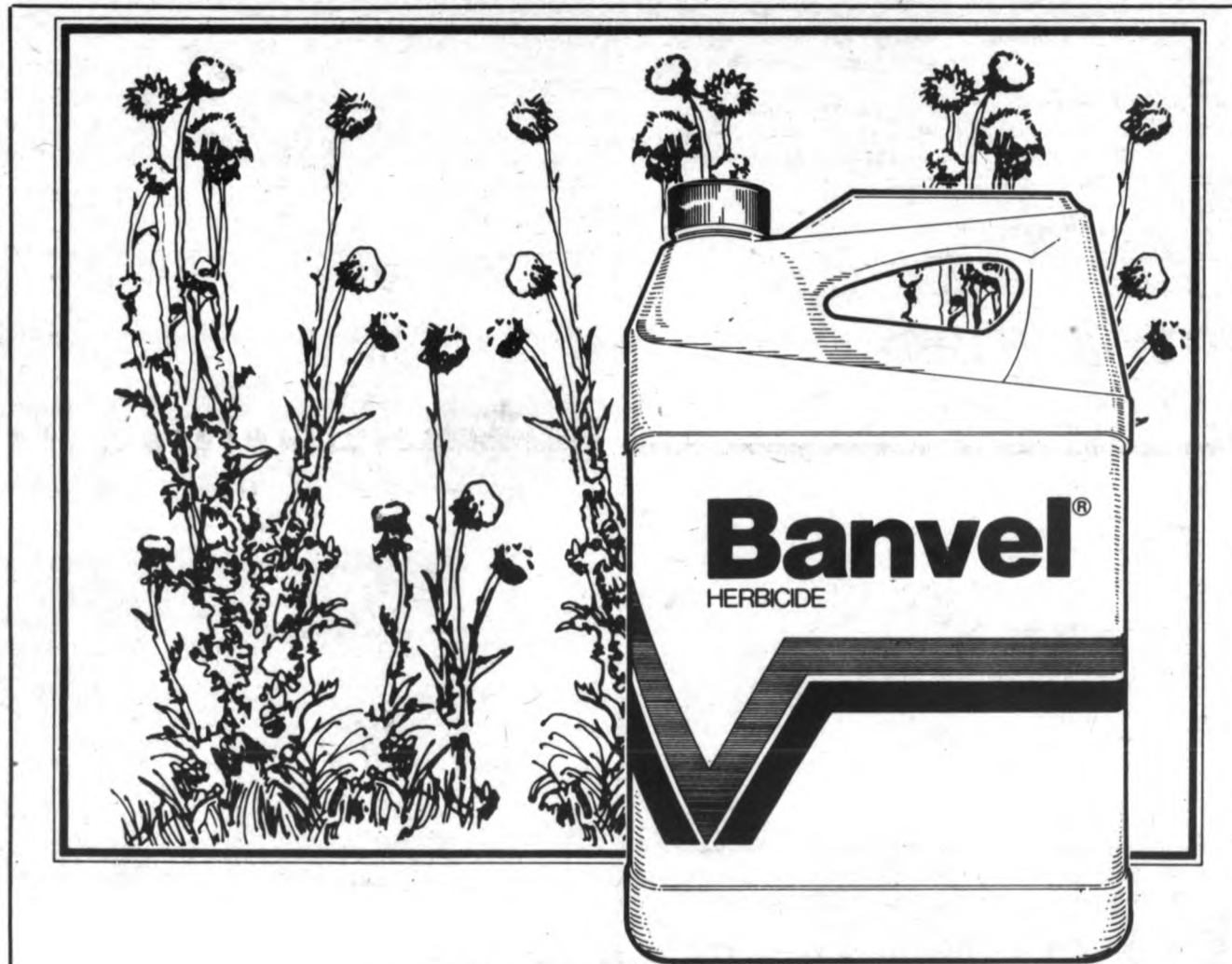

# Suspect Tylenol hard to find

MSU football coach Muddy Waters, who reportedly asked for a Tylenol following his team's drubbing in Ann Arbor last Saturday, won't find any in Clinton County — at least not the Extra Strength variety.

Pharmacists at all of the drug stores contacted by the Clinton County News said they removed Extra Strength Tylenol from their shelves shortly after hearing of seven Chicago area deaths resulting from cyanide-spiked capsules.

"We've taken the capsules off of our shelves," Jim Parr of Parr's Pharmacy in St. Johns said. "We've had quite a few calls and several people brought in partially full bottles to return them."

At present, until word is received from Tylenol's maker, Parr's will provide refunds only for full bottles, Parr said. "We've generally been telling people to hold onto it until we're sure what kind of refund we can make."

"There are just a lot of people worried about it."

Parr predicted the Tylenol-tampering murders will hurt sales of all capsules.

Gene Buckley, pharmacist at Revco in St. Johns, agreed. "I think they'll go to tablets," he said of Tylenol and other over-the-counter medication makers.

"We took them off the shelf when we first started getting people calling. We're averaging several calls a day," Buckley said. "I've been a pharmacist for 30 years and I've never seen anything like it."

Many who call are worried, he said, but most want to know what other type of acetaminophen — non-aspirin pain reliever — they can take. "We've been advising them to go with a generic."

Mothers with young children have called frequently, he said. Aspirin has been linked to Reye's Syndrome, so mothers are particularly concerned about finding an aspirin substitute, he said.

Like Parr, Buckley said the Tylenol deaths prove such medications are vulnerable to tampering. Both suggested an aluminum foil seal on the tops of all over-the-counter bottles, similar to seals on prescription drugs. "But if they really wanted to, they could even break one of those seals or put something in during manufacturing," Parr said.

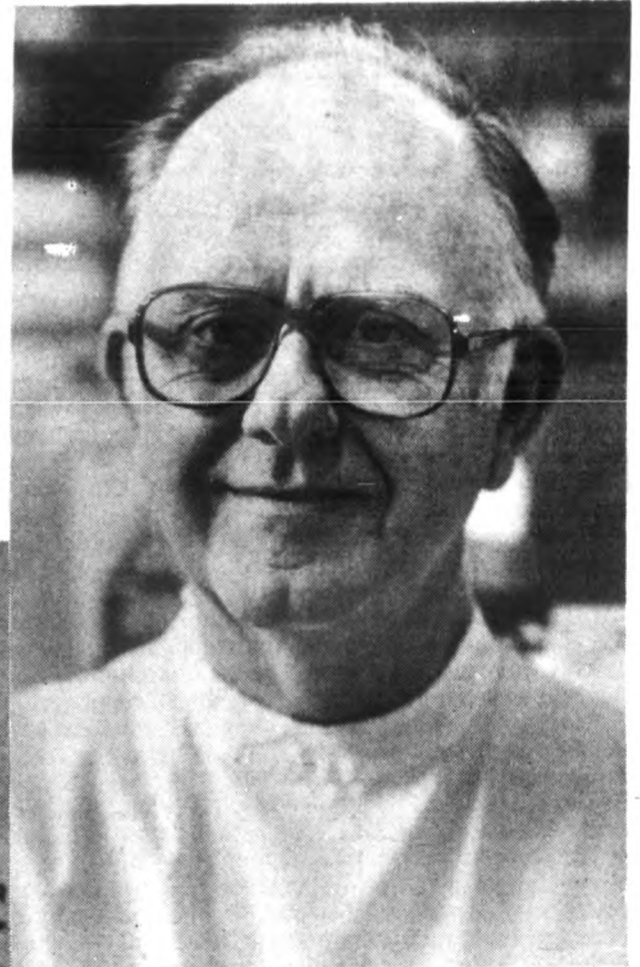
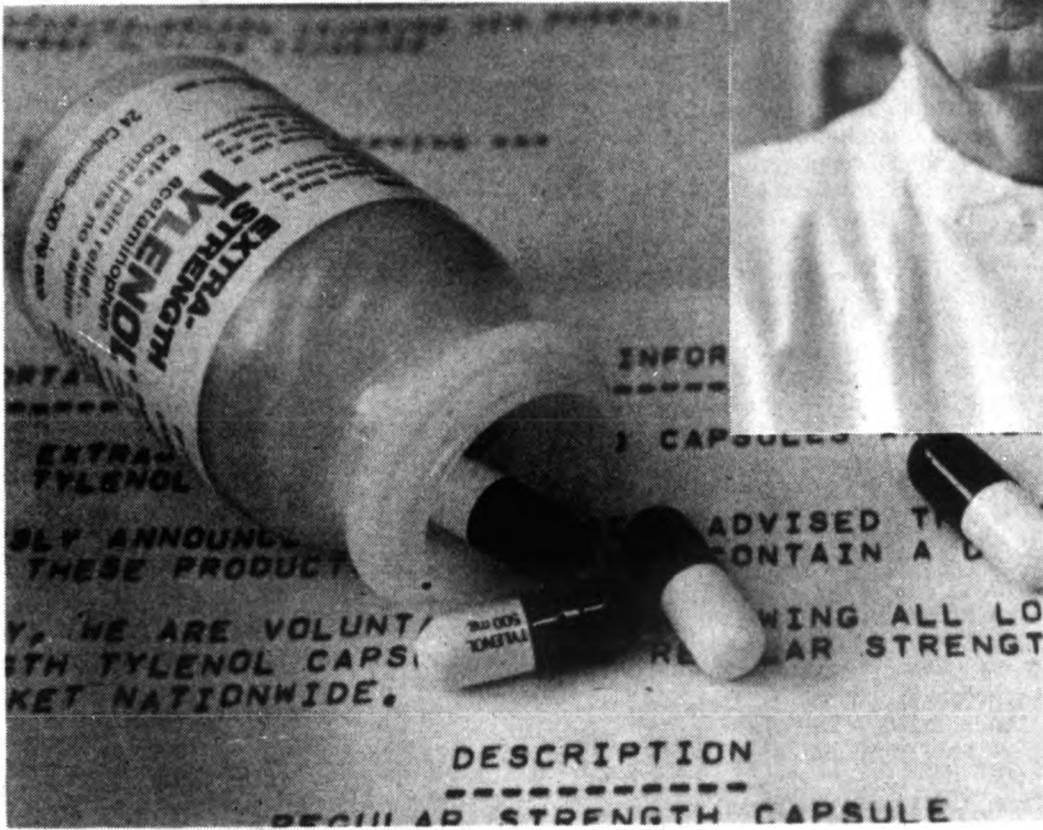
A pharmacist at Bath Pharmacy, who wished not to

be named, said Extra Strength Tylenol had been removed from the shelves there, along with all capsules bearing the Tylenol brand. And since the deaths were reported, no Tylenol products have been sold, he said.

Only one pharmacist, Parr, reported a sale of any Tylenol product in the past week. "I think we sold one bottle of children's Tylenol," he said.

"I took it off the shelf as soon as I heard about it," said LuAnn McEwan, pharmacist at Muir's in Deitt. "My concern was that I don't want anything on my shelf that will kill any of my customers."

"I don't care how it got there, I just want it off the shelf, period."

## Recovering from accident

# Ed Robinson is a contender

As a life-long physical-fitness buff, Ed Robinson has stayed in superb physical shape. That may have saved his life.

Robinson, 64, owner and operator of Ovid Athletic Club, was struck from behind as he was driving his motorcycle home Sept. 17, following a football game between Ovid-Elsie and Saginaw Bridgeport.

According to his friends, Robinson wanted to watch O-E quarterback Pete Hurst in action. Hurst had been working out at the Athletic Club and Robinson wanted to see the Marauder star perform.

It was raining hard when Robinson's motorcycle was struck by a car driven by Brian Stehlik, 16, of Ovid. Stehlik was uninjured, but Robinson was transported to Sparrow Hospital in Lansing, where he was listed in serious condition in the hospital's neurological intensive care unit. A hospital spokesperson said Robinson underwent surgery and still was listed in fair condition almost a month later. Clinton County Sheriff reports say the accident is still under investigation, since deputies have been unable to question Robinson.

When news of the accident got back to Ovid, the entire community rallied to show its support. A sign in the window of the New Era arcade on Main Street says, "We are all thinking about you, Ed." And in Ovid Taco Villa, a plastic jar sits on the counter, containing donations to buy Robinson some slippers and other items.

"I went to see him that night because he didn't have any family nearby," said Lyle Huntoon, a member of the Athletic Club. "I looked in the window while they stitched up the side of his head."

"After they stitched him up, the nurse came out and asked me how old he was. When I told her that Ed was 64, she couldn't believe it. He's in such great physical shape and that's probably why he wasn't hurt any worse."

"I saw the car that hit him," said Rick Bancroft, another Athletic Club member. "The front end was all smashed in. I don't see how anyone could survive after getting hit that hard."

Robinson purchased the Athletic Club a couple of years ago. Since then, he has started several new programs in Ovid. This past summer, a series of bike races from 14 to 100 miles long were held by the club, and all entrants earned medals for their effort.

In the basement of the club is a shooting range, one of its most popular attractions. Robinson recently installed a racketball court upstairs, and has started construction on another. He is currently sponsoring a weightlifting team, which competes throughout the area.

His involvement in athletics is certainly no surprise, considering he was a state boxing champ in Massachusetts in his younger days.

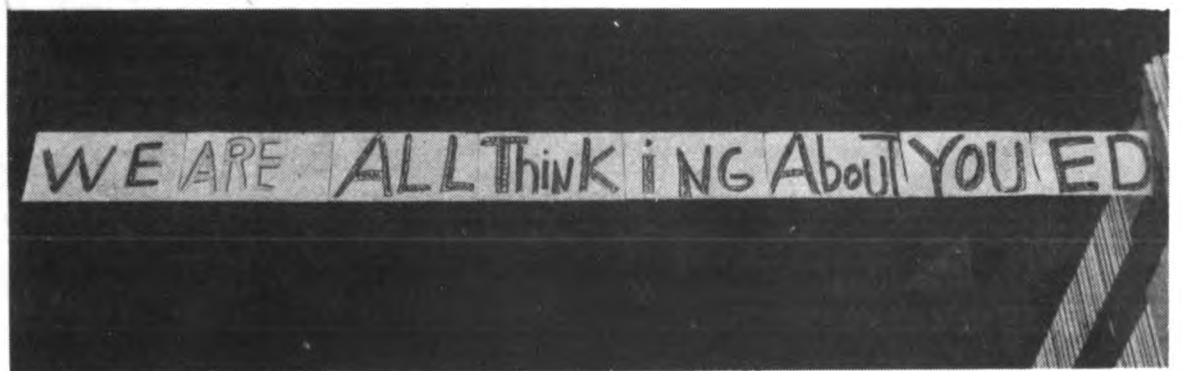
"He competed in the nationals as a boxer," said Huntoon. "He was supposed to fight Rocky Marciano once, but Ed's plane was fogged in so he couldn't fly to the fight. It would have been a great fight. I guess they were both undefeated at the time."

In addition to his work with the Athletic Club, Robinson is employed at Fischer's Big Wheel in St. Johns.

"I've been to see him several times in the hospital," Huntoon said. "Physically, he's doing much better, but he's still a little disoriented."

"But he's in good spirits. It's just really hard to see him inactive like that. It doesn't seem right."

## Office-seekers visit St. Johns

# Candidates dwell on jobs and economy

Of all the issues discussed at the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce's "Meet the Candidates" night Oct. 6, one came through loud and clear — the economy.

Speaking before a group of about 50 people in the St. Johns High School cafeteria, all the candidates present discussed the sad shape of the economy in Michigan and the nation, and said changes must be made.

"What we have to do is put our people back to work," said incumbent 10th District Congressman Don Albosta, D-St. Charles. "In this election, I can see a different congress coming in — one which is more concerned with the economy than with defense spending."

With the exception of gubernatorial candidates Democrat James Blanchard and Republican Richard Headlee, all candidates invited by the Chamber of Commerce attended the session: Albosta and his opponent in the 10th District, Republican Lawrence Reed; 30th State Senate candidates Republican Al Cropsey and Democrat Patricia McAvoy; 89th State House candidates incumbent Republican Gary Randall, Democrat Phillip Stoddard and Jim Heppinstall of the Tisch Party; and Robert Tisch, candidate for governor.

Speaking on behalf of Blanchard was Sarah Goddard Power, who is up for re-election to the University of Michigan Board of Regents. On behalf of Headlee, Jackie McGregor, a candidate for the State Board of Education, spoke.

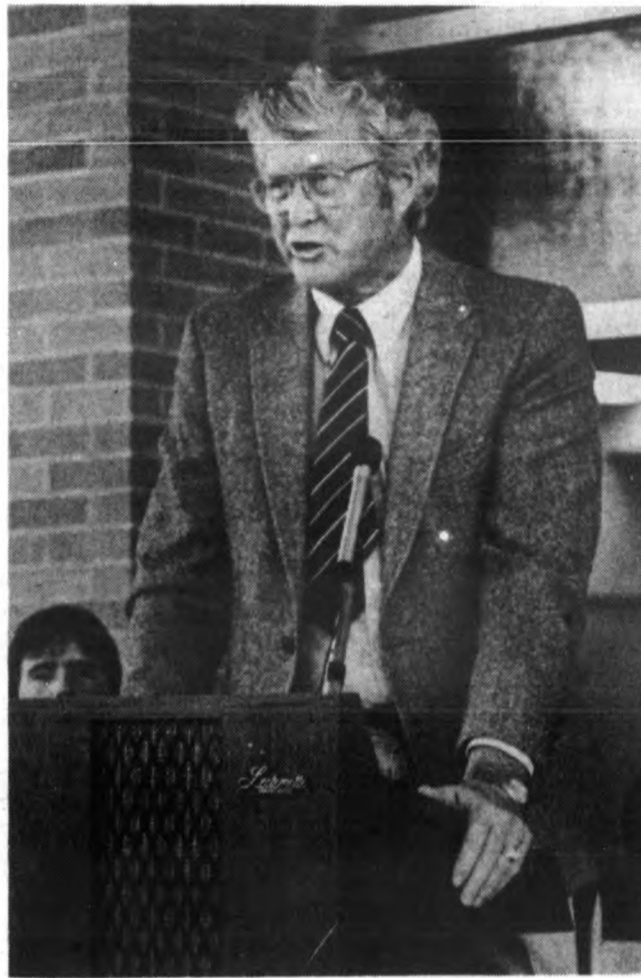
Most of the candidates who are currently in office said they have offered solutions to the state's economic woes, but no one is heeding their suggestions.

"There are those of us in Lansing who have been offering suggestions, but they haven't been accepted," said Cropsey of DeWitt, who is currently a State Representative in the 88th District. "The thing we have to do is put enough people in office who have good suggestions. We need to send these people to Lansing."

Agreeing with Cropsey, Randall said, "There are those of us who have been working hard, but we're fighting an uphill battle."

Randall's opponent, Stoddard, disagreed. "He's a good man, but he hasn't done anything," Stoddard said, pointing to Randall. "The Speaker (Bobby Crim of Davison) told me that 'Your opponent is one of those people whose name I didn't even know for the first year he was here.' He's just there."

Albosta spent a great deal of time talking about the build-up of the nation's military. "People are saying we

can afford more for nuclear weapons but we can't afford more for education," he said. "I can't buy that. Our military build-up is ruining us. It's pulling us down."

His opponent, Reed, a professor at Northwood Institute in Midland, answered: "The military budget is getting out of hand, true, but most of the cuts we must make should be from non-defense areas, since that's where the bulk of the budget is. Congress just needs to get its financial house in order."

Ms. McAvoy of Owosso, a legal secretary, said that some new faces in government might be a good idea now. "When I first entered this race, much was made of the fact that I was a newcomer," she said. "Well, in the last few months I've seen an awful lot of nothing from our elected officials. Maybe it's time to let some of us inexperienced people have a shot at it."

The Tisch Party candidate for the 89th House seat, Heppinstall, blamed the two major parties for the sad shape of the economy. "Taxes are the big issue here," he said. "The only thing wrong with these people up here is that they're members of the wrong party — they're Democrats and Republicans and all they want to do is raise taxes."

Tisch was by far the most vociferous speaker of the evening. The Shiawassee County Drain Commissioner spent a great deal of time attacking Headlee. "I'd like to go on all night and tell you about Dick Headlee and tell you how terrible his programs are," Tisch said.

"He doesn't want to have any limits at all on spending. Both the candidates for governor that you always hear about (Headlee and Blanchard) are moving so close together that you can't even tell them apart."

Speaking for Blanchard, Ms. Power endorsed Ms. McAvoy and said, "Jim Blanchard is the only candidate from either party who has been tested by tough economic problems. He's the only candidate who has experience in both Lansing and Washington, and I think that's important."

Replying for Headlee, Ms. McGregor said, "Headlee is the only candidate who has demonstrated he can turn a failing business around. He isn't what you would call a well-oiled politician. He's a sincere person."

The discussion was mediated by Ron Huard, former president of the St. Johns School Board. Following the two-hour program, the candidates milled among the crowd, answering questions.

## Candidate forum erupts in rhubarb over Albosta

"Disgraceful," "immature," "childish" and "rude" are some of the terms used to describe 10th District Congressman Don Albosta by some St. Johns residents who attended a Meet the Candidates night Oct. 6.

"Rude?" the Midland Democrat responded. "Anyone who says that is trying to orchestrate a scene."

The attacks on Albosta came in the form of two letters to the editor of the Clinton County News (see page 6) submitted Tuesday by Leon Brewbaker and Paul and Liz Nobis.

Wrote Brewbaker: "Mr. Albosta was rude and insulting. While his opponent (Republican challenger) Larry Reed talked positively about issues, Don noisily walked out of the meeting."

"I wasn't trying to be rude to Reed or anyone else," Albosta replied Tuesday afternoon. "I got up quietly and left. In fact I thought he spoke before me. Reed wasn't speaking at all when I left, it was (gubernatorial candidate Robert) Tisch."

Albosta said he notified moderator Ron Huard he would have to leave during the forum to attend two previous engagements, a meeting with farmers and a union meeting at Smith Hall.

"I sat there patiently for the better part of an hour. I was way behind schedule," he said.

Mrs. Nobis, who was Clinton County Republican Party Chairman for 10 years and former vice chairman for the GOP's 10th District committee, said she thought Albosta did walk out during Reed's speech. "I think the incumbents spoke first," she said.

In fact, even Ron Huard, moderator of the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce-sponsored program, was not sure who

was speaking when Albosta walked out. "We did have a program, but I threw it out yesterday," Huard said. "We went by the order of their responses to our invitations, but there were so many changes at the last minute that our prepared agenda was not valid at all."

One last minute change was Albosta's appearance, he said, since the Congressman had not given notice he would attend.

"It was a last minute effort on my part to even be there," Albosta said.

Stories also differ as to what happened when Albosta returned to the meeting.

"It took an effort by the master of ceremonies just to get the Congressman to simply respect the rules of the forum," Brewbaker wrote.

During Albosta's absence, candidates were given a chance for closing statements, and his campaign manager, Pat Casey, spoke on Albosta's behalf.

"When he got back, he sat down on the platform and expected to be introduced to have his turn," Mrs. Nobis said. "There was a little rhubarb, nothing real big, but the Congressman was behaving in an ungentlemanly fashion. It was a little difficult to keep him quiet and required some finesse on the part of the M.C."

"That isn't so at all," Albosta said. "I simply got up and asked if I could make a closing statement, and they said no, Pat had already made one. And when I made the request, Reed's people were booing or something and making all kinds of noise."

"I told Pat he didn't tell me he had spoken for me, so I just laughed and sat down and they closed the meeting."

"He spoke to his aide when he came back," Mrs. Nobis said. "I had the feeling he probably knew (his turn was taken) but wanted to speak anyway."

"My opinion is very biased from my standpoint in Republican politics, but I still feel he was very rude."

# City hears complaint from truck bidder

The St. Johns City Commission heard a protest at its meeting Monday, Oct. 11 from a truck dealer who was not awarded the bid for the purchase of a new sludge truck.

A.M. Klinger of Burch Body Works was angry because his was the lowest bid submitted for a sludge applicator vehicle to be used at the city's wastewater treatment plant. His bid was about \$700 lower than the \$84,680 bid submitted by the second-lowest bidder, Ag Chem Equipment Co., Inc.

"We would like to know on what basis a higher bid was chosen and what criteria was used," Klinger told the commissioners.

City Clerk Richard Coletta explained Burch Body Works had indicated their vehicle did not exactly meet the specifications required for the vehicle.

"Their vehicle did not meet the specifications and we specified that there were to be no exceptions to that," Coletta said. "Our corps of engineers said that (not meeting the specifications) was irregular and their bid should be rejected."

But Klinger insisted his vehicle was just as good as the one Ag Chem was selling, saying it is impossible for any company except Ag Chem to exactly meet the specifications.

After hearing both sides, the commissioners decided to purchase the Ag Chem truck.

The commissioners also discussed a number of complaints received by the zoning board regarding "weekend businesses" set up in vacant parking lots along US-27. Most of the complaints dealt with people selling pictures and truckloads of furniture, Zoning Administrator Diane Edwards told the commissioners.

The commissioners decided to refer the matter to the city attorney.

This is a watershed era for the newspaper industry. Some newspapers will make it over "the financial hump" and some will not.

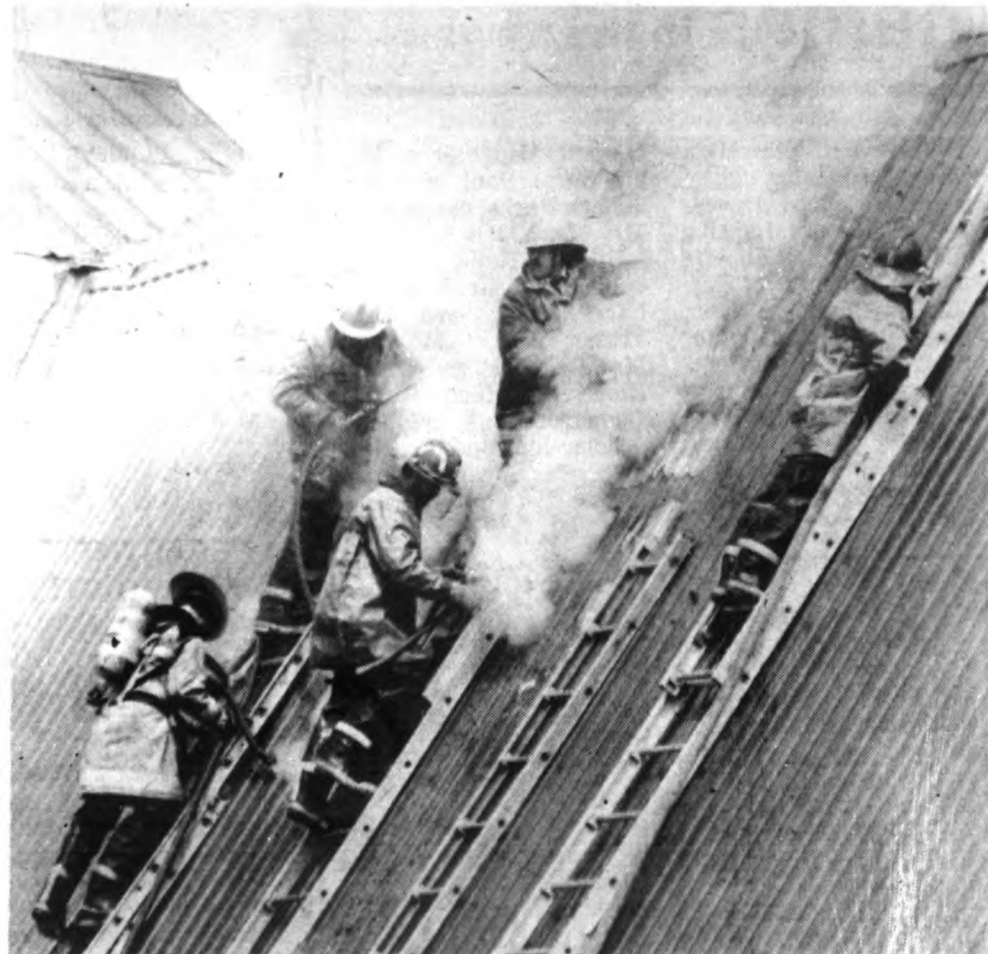

# Landfill rematch is a tag-team affair

A rematch which could make the "Thrilla in Manila" look like a playground hair-pulling contest will erupt in November, when Granger Land Development and People's Action League (PAL) slug it out over a plan to expand Granger's landfill.

Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen has ordered both back in the ring for on or before Nov. 12, to re-argue Granger's request for a Special Use Permit (SUP) before the county's Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA).

The permit would allow Granger to expand one of the last — and the largest — landfills in the Lansing area by 92 acres, including room for disposal of toxic wastes. PAL claims expansion will threaten local drinking water, but Granger says their Watertown Township landfill is one of the best run in the state and will not pose a threat to the environment.

In his ruling on a year-old lawsuit Thursday, Oct. 7, Tahvonen said the Board of Appeals did not collect a complete record of its September, 1981 hearing. As a result of PAL testimony at the hearing last year, the ZBA overturned decisions by Clinton County's board of commissioners and planning commission to grant Granger's SUP.

Tahvonen also said the ZBA did not adequately consider the impact of their SUP rejection on "essential public services." He ordered a more thorough look into the effects of limiting Granger's expansion: a look which could bring about a reversal of the ZBA's decision and a green light for Granger.

But the battle between Granger and PAL is looking

more and more like a tag-team match, as the zoning board, planning commission and county board are dragged into the fray.

Last month, while awaiting the outcome of litigation against PAL in Ingham and Clinton county courts, Granger re-applied for an SUP. And last year, following the ZAB's veto of their decision, the Clinton County Board voted to make their decisions binding, removing the right of appeal to the ZAB.

That means Granger's new request could be approved by the county board, giving the landfill the right to expand regardless of the ZAB's next decision. Round one of the rematch could be fought when the new SUP request is considered by the county's planning commission Nov. 10, two days before the ZAB hearing deadline.

The planning commission, which sided with Granger last year, will then refer the question to county commissioners, who also were in Granger's corner last time around. Unless a special meeting is called, commissioners can dispose of the problem at their Nov. 30 meeting, making round two before the ZAB meaningless.

Unless, that is, the ZAB reverses their decision first. In that case, according to Zoning Administrator Jack Nelson, Granger would be given the right to expand under their original SUP request, and any decision by the county board or planning commission would be academic.

"They'll have to weigh the evidence," Nelson said — and it looks like the evidence will be weighty, indeed.

Both sides will present a rerun of last year's testimony, and PAL, at least, will serve up some additional surprises. PAL President Jan Look says new evidence collected since the original hearing will be offered, and Pal could come armed with testimony from out-of-state experts and new water sample tests.

Jerry Granger could not be reached for comments on his firm's strategy, but Granger is expected by many to win by a PKO — a Political Knockout — in round three at the latest.

According to the latest line, more county residents use the landfill than live near it, and elected officials with the final say — county commissioners — are more likely to vote on behalf of the majority.

St. Johns gave up 218 yards rushing to Ionia Oct. 8. Redwing coach Joe Gonzales wasn't too happy about that.

Nevertheless, St. Johns beat Ionia, 35-12. Now that made Joe Gonzales happy.

The win put the Redwings firmly in the driver's seat to the Mid-Michigan 'B' title, giving them a 3-0 conference record, 3-2 overall. St. Johns is the only undefeated team in the MMB and can clinch at least a share of the league crown with a win tomorrow at Ovid-Elsie.

"I was very pleased with the way our offense played," Gonzales said, "but our defense was not as good as it should have been. We gave up more yardage than we should have on the ground."

But while the Redwings' rushing defense was lax, the pass defense was much-improved. A sore spot all season, the defensive backfield came of age against Ionia, allowing just 45 yards through the air.

"We defended against the pass quite well," Gonzales said. "We started doing better against Alma last week, but this was the best overall game our pass defenders have had."

Offensively, St. Johns rolled to a 21-6 lead in the first half. Todd Elsea scored the first two touchdowns for the Redwings on runs of six and 26 yards. Chris Loucks accounted for St. Johns' third score on a 43-yard run. Jamie Werbish kicked all three extra points.

The visiting Redwings added two more scores after

the intermission, on a one-yard run by quarterback Steve Gonzales and a 21-yard Gonzales-to-Steve Furry pass. Werbish kicked one extra point, while Danish exchange student Jess Bendixen kicked the other.

Coach Gonzales was very pleased with the play of his offensive line, which allowed St. Johns to pick up 305 yards on the ground. "Eric Smith, Jamie Werbish, Steve Vandemark and Chad Munger have been our most consistent blockers all year," Gonzales said. "They did an outstanding job against Ionia."

The coach also had words of praise for junior Brandy Wells, who started at center in place of the injured Eric Thum.

Todd Elsea benefitted from the blocking of the Redwing line, picking up 121 yards on 20 carries. It was the third straight 100-yard game for Elsea. Fullback Bruce Riley gained 90 yards on just 12 carries.

Defensively, safety Gonzales was the standout, intercepting one pass, knocking down another, causing a fumble and making eight tackles — three of which saved touchdowns.

Riley was the leading tackler for St. Johns with 14 stops, while Munger had nine and Tim Moore seven.

Next up — a trip to Ovid-Elsie for a game with the Marauders. "We don't dare look past Ovid-Elsie," warned Gonzales. "We don't dare relax. They have a potent offensive attack, and they're really going to be testing our defensive backs."

"This is probably our biggest rivalry. A win for Ovid-Elsie would make their season, so we'd better be ready."

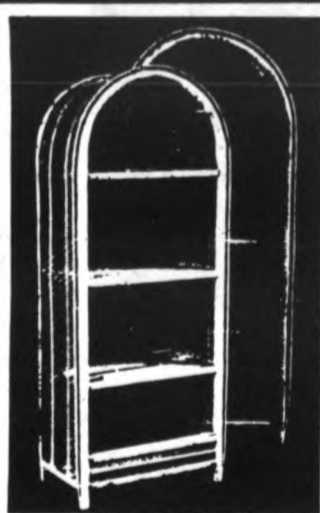

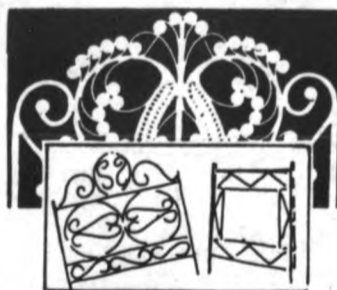

# First annual CROP Walk planned in city

Did you know that right now 50 million people are starving to death? That one out of nine people is malnourished? That millions of people lead crippled lives because of malnourishment?

"People are often bombarded with statistics like these, and usually ask 'What can I do? I am only one person.'"

Bob Gillette has an answer. The minister of three area churches is chairman of the first annual CROP Walk in the St. Johns area. To those who want to do something, but don't know what, he replies: "Walk!"

The CROP Walk is sponsored by the St. Johns Ministerial Association to raise money which will go to Church World Service, an ecumenical agency whose main objective is to not only fight world hunger, but get

to the causes.

Karen Pease, who chaired arrangements for the walk, has enabled people to decide how far they want to walk. Three routes have been mapped out through town, and walkers can decide whether they are good for one mile or ten miles.

Several other people are also helping to make this CROP Walk a success. Bill Richards in charge of publicity, while Jody Smith has kept busy recruiting local service organizations. In charge of registration is Sally Pope. George Hanson and William Hankard, two local clergy, have also been drumming up enthusiasm.

Response has been good so far, Gillette said. "There appears to be a lot of interest. It's going to be fun. We hope we can get lots of people to get out and support the walk."



Leaders who received special recognition for having participated for three, five, 10, 15, 20 and 25 years were introduced and thanked.

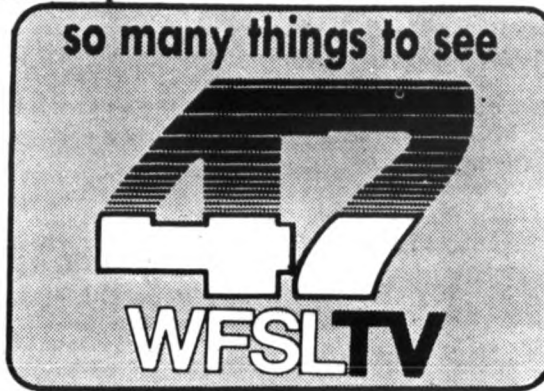
Among them were 15-year leaders Richard Vitek, Virginia Martin and Rita Thornton. Edna

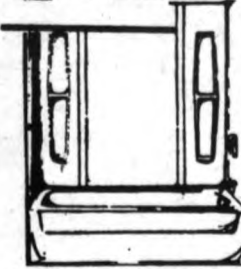

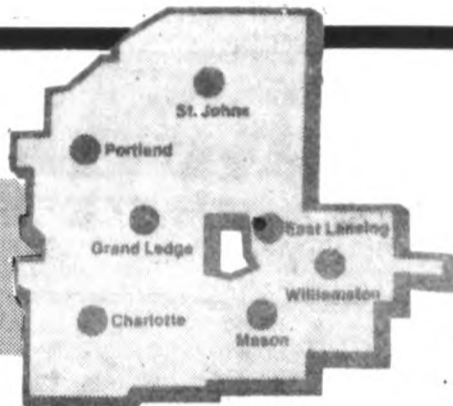
