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Board takes back used desks

A misunderstanding has been blamed by St. Johns School Board members for their decision to play Indian-giver with 36 used school desks.

Board members rejected a bid from the month-old Eureka Christian School at their October meeting, and asked the school to return 36 used desks the following day.

The problem, according to board president Robert Craig, is that the desks were removed from storage and taken to Eureka Christian School before the board was given a chance to approve the sale.

The \$100 bid, Craig said, was a fair price, but most board members felt an explanation was in order. "One, we felt the removal of the desks was premature; two, we feel we should allow any interested parties to bid; and three, we would like their side of the story as to why the desks were removed."

As Pastor Doug Jones explains it, he misunderstood administrator Gordon Vandemark's instructions. "I asked Gordon if it would be okay if we tried them out before we purchased them, and he said okay, meaning, apparently, that it would be okay after the bid was approved. But I thought he meant immediately."

"It's so simple it's ridiculous," Jones said.

As a result of the misunderstanding, the desks were installed in the new school and students went to work cleaning them. "We cleaned them all up and we had to fix some of them," Jones said. "But they worked out beautifully."

On Thursday, Oct. 14, the day after the board's Wednesday night meeting, Jones got a call from Vandemark. He was told to bring the desks back.

"That's what I'm so upset about. We were told we couldn't have them, period, and we had to take them back. There was no effort made to straighten out the problem," Jones said.

Angered over the board decision, Jones said he called four board members. "I called Mrs. (Marian) Kurnez and Mr. (Peter) Apostol to thank them," he said. Mrs.

Kurnez and Apostol voted against the bid rejection.

Jones also says he called Neil Barnhart, who proposed the rejection after asking Craig during the meeting why board members were being asked to approve something that was already done. Jones declined to name the fourth board member he called, but said his calls resulted in a curious justification for the rejection.

"I was told board members were upset about some other unapproved purchase or hiring incident involving thousands of dollars, something about office machines and staff, and that our case just happened to come first," he said.

In other words, Jones said, he was told the board used the unauthorized desk transfer as an opportunity to send a message to the school administration. "I don't know if it's true and it might just be a rumor, but that's what I heard," Jones said.

Craig denied the board intended to use the Eureka Christian School bid as an example to the administration. "The board was concerned that since we have all those surplus desks, we should send a notice out and get some other bids," he said. "If the question is were we trying to make an example, the answer is no."

Jones says the board rejected his school's bid because they felt their authority was threatened. "The bid was rejected not because it was too low, but because we already had the desks. But it wasn't our intention to steal them."

He said the bid price of \$2.75 each was reasonable. The school has given away similar desks to other groups, and those sold in the past have gone for from \$1 to \$2, he said. "For a hundred dollars, we thought that was reasonable. There are so many desks out there."

More than 200 desks are stored at Greenwood Elementary, including those returned from Eureka Christian School. Does Jones want the same desks back?

"We'll definitely look somewhere else. I've had two phone calls today for a better price, so maybe in the long run it will work out even better for us."

"I don't want to close the door for the future, but on the other hand..."

French calls for a junior-senior truce

St. Johns Police Chief Lyle French is calling for a truce in the annual Junior-Senior War.

The event, which has been going on for the past 15 years, features kids from St. Johns throwing eggs, tomatoes, squash, "and sometimes even walnuts and rocks" at houses, cars and each other, French said. Reports indicate this year's War has been scheduled for this Saturday, Oct. 23.

"People get very upset when this happens, and I don't blame them one bit," French said. "We do our part to try and stop this, but we can't stop everyone."

French's part includes stepping up police patrols Saturday night and making arrests if necessary. "If they hit a vehicle with something and damage it, they can be charged with malicious destruction of property," French said. Other charges might include littering, he said.

What the chief is asking for is that the parents of the kids get involved. "They (the parents) have to know where their kids are going," French said, "but they don't seem to do anything to try and stop it."

"My fear is that it will take a kid getting seriously hurt or even killed before the parents get involved."

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Board votes don't win popularity contest

It was not a good night for the St. Johns Board of Education.

Decisions by members during their October meeting triggered attacks from parents, teachers, secretaries and even a Christian school.

In addition to complaints about busing (see related story), board members were criticized during the meeting and later for decisions on their search for a new superintendent, for ratification of a new contract for unionized secretaries, and for their decision to revoke the sale of 36 used desks.

One of the few decisions which did not draw unfriendly fire was a motion by board member Neil Barnhart to set a time limit on the often lengthy monthly meetings.

His proposal to set a limit of 11 p.m. was passed unanimously. In the future, board members must vote to continue meetings after the deadline, or remaining agenda items will be considered at the following meeting.

With the exception of routine items and approval of an award to retiring junior high teacher John Theuerkauf, who received a round of applause, most other board votes were less than popular.

For new superintendent

Leader needed, consultant says

HELP WANTED: A strong leader who can communicate well with instant credibility. Must be able to manage finances well, with strong academic background and standards.

You won't find this ad in your local newspaper, but those are some of the most important qualifications for St. Johns' new superintendent of schools, according to the consultant hired to find him or her.

"A significant number of people I talked to mentioned strong leadership, confidence, decisiveness and someone who can stand up to adversity," Dr. Carl Brautigam said. The Michigan Association of School Boards consultant said he talked to about 50 parents, citizens and school staffers, and heard a variety of comments.

"I was told someone who can communicate is needed. Someone fair, honest and open who can say no and make people listen."

Other words used to describe important attributes of the district's next superintendent included "innovative," "a good public speaker," "someone with charisma, an open mind and good writing ability," Brautigam said.

A good manager of both finance and curriculum is

Teachers' association president Gerry Congleton blasted the board for their refusal to allow him to sit in on interviews with candidates for superintendent. His request to participate on the three-member screening committee was rejected unanimously.

"I really think that board could use the input of someone in the community," Congleton said later. "I think their decision is very negative and indicates a lack of faith in the community."

"Right now, the credibility of the board is very low. I thought they might be able to earn some of that credibility back."

President Robert Craig recommended rejection of Congleton's request, on the advice of board consultant Carl Brautigam of the Michigan Association of School Boards. "I agree with Carl's recommendation that it only be comprised of board members," he said.

"I agree," Barnhart said. "We have to answer to what the superintendent would do."

The decision which drew flak from angry secretaries was a vote to grant a "four percent" raise to seven non-union secretaries. The raise for the previous year was approved following ratification of the unionized secretaries' contract for last year. The group has not agreed to a salary package for this year, but has agreed to accept a wage freeze in the unlikely event all other employee groups do also.

needed, he said, and the person who replaces Don Burns when Burns retires in January should have strong academic standards and top-notch credentials for instant credibility.

Those who said the next superintendent should come from within the district apparently equalled those who said the opposite, Brautigam said. He said 33 applications have been received from 14 superintendents, four administrators, four principals and 11 other job categories. There were 19 applications from Michigan and 14 from out of state.

Brautigam said he expects the number of applicants to double by the time final screening begins.

School officials say one local applicant, Athletic Director Steve Bakita, is among the candidates for the position.

The union agreement granted members of the St. Johns Educational Secretaries Association a nine percent raise for last year in a lump sum of \$10,000.

But a four percent raise for non-union secretaries, added to a 5.4 percent increase granted earlier in the year, would have given them four-tenths of a percent more than their union-member peers.

Union secretaries present during the meeting were surprised and angered, and association president Darlene Lawrence issued an angry statement the following day. But the issue was a misunderstanding, according to controller Rick Terres.

The actual amount of the non-union increases is below four percent, he said, and the figure was rounded off to make it easier for board members.

"There will be just pennies difference," he said. Top level non-union secretaries will receive \$6.93 an hour, compared to \$6.90 for union member counterparts, he said.

Board members were also criticized for their decision to take back some used desks from the Eureka Christian School, which had taken the desks out of storage prior to board approval. (See related story)

"It looks like a long night," board members said before the meeting began. They were right.

County gets fresh slate

Because of redistricting which has moved Clinton County from the 88th State House District to the 89th, voters here have the choice of three fresh faces in next month's election.

The new 89th takes in Clinton and Gratiot counties. The incumbent, Republican Gary Randall of Alma, is up for re-election against Democrat Phillip J. Stoddard, a 22-year-old Central Michigan University grad from Hubbardston, and St. Johns farmer Jim Heppinstall, who is running on the Tisch Party ticket.

Despite the fact he is running in Clinton County for the first time, Randall sees no problem in his ability to serve its people.

"I was born and raised in Gratiot County," he said, "and I feel that Clinton and Gratiot counties are very similar. They have a lot in common. I don't see any problem at all in being able to represent the people there."

Stoddard, however, disagrees. "I think a very important issue here is that my opponent hasn't represented Clinton County before," he said. "The voters here need to look at his record thoroughly. I'm a resident of Clinton County, and I've lived here all my life."

All three candidates do agree on one thing — the state economy is badly in need of help.

"The Republicans and Democrats refuse to address the issues, which are runaway taxation and spending," Heppinstall said. "The solution to the problem is to reduce taxes. We need to put someone in office who will do that."

Stoddard feels the solution, at least in this area, is to attract more new businesses. "We need to set up a group of professional and working people to form a sort of commission," he said. "They would help to sell our district to other areas. In St. Johns, they're doing quite well with this, but we have to try and encourage more jobs to come to this area."

Randall, who has served two terms in the House, feels the solution is to have less government interference. "We just need to put politics aside and take a good, hard look at why businesses are leaving the state and then set about correcting the problem. We just have too much government regulation now."

Another issue the candidates addressed is legislators' salaries. The State Compensation Commission, which sets their salaries, is reportedly considering a pay hike for Michigan's legislators, currently among the highest paid in the country.

"I think we should take that commission and put it in a zoo someplace," Heppinstall said. "I favor a part-time legislature at half the present salary. That would save Michigan \$25 million a year."

Randall doesn't feel the time is right for such an in-

crease. "I would hope they won't be making any increases at this time," Randall said. "This is not the time to be raising salaries. And I'm not just saying this because it's election time. I was against it the last time they raised salaries."

Stoddard, however, criticized Randall for accepting the raise. "He supported the concessions for state employees and then turned around and accepted his raise," Stoddard said. "I feel that any legislator, in hard times, should lead by example and refuse any raises."

When it came to discussing his opponents, Randall said, "I've always tried to run positive campaigns and not downgrade my opponents. I want to continue that. I feel both my opponents are honest, capable people."

"But I feel the one thing we need now is someone with the greatest amount of clout in the legislature, who understands the system and can do the most for us. Because of the large legislative turnover, I should be one of the senior members of the Republican caucus after the election."

Stoddard, on the other hand, feels Randall should be replaced. "I have a philosophy which says if you're inactive and don't deal with a problem, you're just as guilty as the person who causes the problem. Mr. Randall is a good person, but basically he just sits by. He should have tried to deal with the problems."

Referring to Heppinstall, Stoddard said: "He lacks the broad picture. He sees the only solution to our problems as lowering property taxes, but it needs to come from many other areas."

Heppinstall said the only problem with the other two candidates is their party affiliation. "I have nothing at all against them personally," Heppinstall said. "They're both pretty nice guys. But they belong to parties that don't want to deal with the real problems."

One thing Heppinstall said he would strive for immediately if elected is to impose a tax on video games.

"We should have a \$5,000 franchise fee on all video games," Heppinstall said. "Not that I'm against the games, but there is an awful lot of profit being made, and some of it should go to the state. We should take the revenue from that and use it to help fund education."

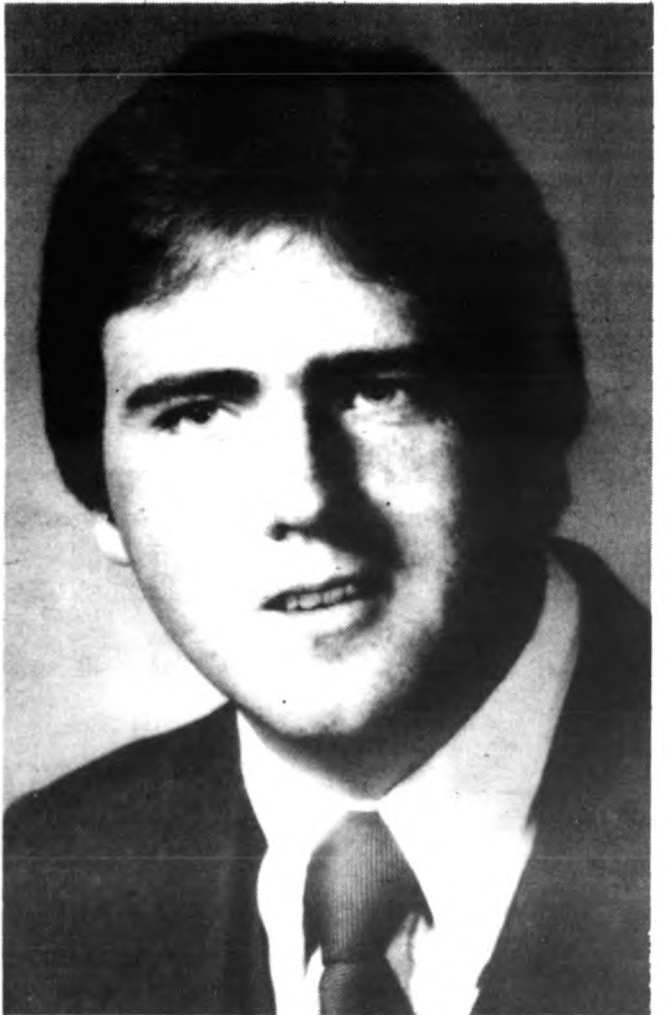
All three also indicated they are supporting their party's gubernatorial candidates. Stoddard is backing Democrat Jim Blanchard because "I feel we need someone new in there with a progressive mind and good ideas."

Randall, unlike some Republican candidates, is supporting Republican Dick Headlee. "He clearly presents the best program for dealing with this state's problems," Randall said.

And Heppinstall is throwing all his support behind Robert Tisch. "He's the only candidate there is," Heppinstall said. "He's the solution to the problems."

Freeze thaws during talks

Demands that teachers accept a wage freeze thawed slightly during negotiations Thursday, Oct. 14.

A teacher strike is still possible, however, if the St. Johns School Board does not agree to grant raises to all teachers, according to Gerry Congleton, president of the teachers' association.

"We both moved a little bit. They came off the freeze slightly," Congleton said. He said teachers, represented by the St. Johns Education Association (SJEA), backed down "significantly" from their earlier demand for a nine percent salary increase.

In return, board negotiator George Johnson proposed a step increase for 103 eligible teachers. The package would cost the district \$78,000, superintendent Don Burns says.

But Congleton said the offer is unacceptable because it excludes 56 teachers employed by the district for at least 15 years who do not have master's degrees. "It's nothing we could ever sell to our members," he said.

Unless a better offer is proposed at the next negotiating session Oct. 28, teachers will walk off the job, Congleton threatened.

At stake, he said, is the state of school finances. In his report on negotiations, Burns says the latest offer is the best the board can make. Concerned that the state may not make good on a deferred payment of \$171,000

next June, board members decided to cut their budget by that amount, he said.

But Congleton says the district is much healthier than board figures indicate. The board has relied on a June 30 audit released at their October meeting, which shows a cash fund balance of \$260,000.

Congleton says the actual amount is closer to \$500,000. He says the board improperly listed the transfer of \$50,000 from the teachers' pension fund as a loss in the general fund. "There's a very questionable error of \$50,000," he said. Also, he cites the sale of Olive Center School following the audit, which he said generated another \$40,000. Other increases, he said, are an additional \$100,000 saved in salaries for teachers laid off or retired since a year ago; an increase in tax revenues from Suntree Apartments; and changes in the state aid formula which he says will result in a slight increase in revenues.

"That's just a beginning of the monies available," Congleton said of the audit report figures.

According to Burns, the teachers made a counter offer to Johnson which would cost the district \$238,000. In addition to raises, the SJEA offer would expand funeral leave benefits; increase teacher participation in administration decisions; reduce class sizes in combination classrooms; increase health, dental and longevity benefits; provide an early retirement incentive; and increase the driver's education hourly rate from \$9.50 to

\$10.25. Johnson did not estimate the cost of the teachers' proposal, and neither side revealed the percentage of salary increase teachers have asked for.

"The board continues to be concerned foremost with the education of children," Burns said. "It has made the (latest) offer in an effort to provide the best possible education within the financial resources available."

Asked if the next negotiating session could avert a strike, Congleton replied: "We sure want it to. Once you have started school, a strike is really difficult, mostly for the kids."

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Auditor gives school system 'high marks'

Scattered throughout the large crowd gathered in the high school library for October's St. Johns school board meeting were red and white buttons which read "I do not want to strike but I will."

Teachers wearing the buttons were present to question the board about negotiations for a new contract, due to resume the next day, Thursday, Oct. 14, and to hear the system's audit report from accountant Charles E. Nihart.

Nihart said the system is in pretty good financial shape, and tried to resolve questions about the cash-on-hand balance, a disputed point in negotiations for a teacher salary increase. He said the district has about \$260,000 in cash available.

"That's a pretty thin fund balance," he said. Teachers, represented by the St. Johns Education Association (SJEA), have challenged administration budget figures which claimed a cash balance of \$260,000, insisting the district has more cash and can afford raises.

But Nihart backed up the administration figures. He said the district is healthy and has been well run.

"They're doing a pretty good job of looking after the taxpayers' money," he said, referring to controller Rick Terres and the board. "I would rate the operation of this school year, even though it has been a year of adversity, very good. I would give them very high marks."

Members of the SJEA still are not satisfied with the figure, however, President Gerry Congleton said Friday. They say the June 30 audit does not include money saved by teacher lay offs, staff retirements since the audit and other funding changes. According to Congleton, the actual amount of money available is closer to \$500,000, which he says is plenty to afford teacher raises. (See related story.)

Also questioned at the Wednesday night meeting was Nihart's report that the system had \$27,000 left over last year in its transportation account.

Outnumbering teachers at the meeting were parents

present to criticize the system's busing plan. They demanded a return to door-to-door pick up of students, and said the present plan is unsafe.

Board member Peter Apostol, who headed an ad hoc committee to investigate complaints lodged at the board's September meeting, reported that the plan implemented by transportation supervisor Gordon Vandemark is working.

Apostol's committee of Vandemark, Superintendent Don Burns and board members Thomas Irrer and Neil Barnhart, toured bus stops in question and found all to be reasonably safe, he said. "We stopped at 15 bus stops. True, some are not one-hundred percent desirable with sheltered areas, but we saw none that were really dangerous," Apostol said.

"If we had all the money we could spend, we'd definitely recommend a return to door-to-door busing," he said. Such a program would cost \$10,000 more than the present plan, which requires students to walk, at most, one-half mile to bus stops, he said.

But parents said safety should come first. They criticized specific stops and expressed fears that their children could be molested.

"You did not touch on the subject of a child walking alone that long half-mile where there are no houses," Charlene Smith said. "My daughter hasn't done that yet because I won't let her. I wouldn't do that myself."

"We can't make a policy for each person," Apostol replied. "We have to look at the system as a whole."

"It's the parents' responsibility to decide how (students) get to that bus stop," Board President Bob Craig said. He pointed out the system is in its third year of the half-mile policy, and Apostol told board members most other schools in the state have been forced to adopt similar policies due to budget restraints.

But most parents present were not satisfied with the board's argument that money is too tight to afford a return to door-to-door busing. "If you think the half-mile policy is saving you money, you'll find out it won't when my four children go to another school," one angry man said.

Parents also challenged the savings of \$27,000, which

they said proved money was available. But board members said the money was an unexpected windfall which resulted when gasoline prices did not rise as fast as expected.

"It's plain to see nothing is going to be done," an angry mother said as she left.

Redwings take home MMB title

In many ways, it was a typical St. Johns-Ovid-Elsie game. Then again, in many ways, it was a very untypical game. For example, it's not every day you see a field-goal kicker throwing a touchdown pass to a quarterback.

But when all was said and done, it was St. Johns who came out on top, 30-7. The win was the fourth straight for the Redwings after two season-opening losses, boosting them to 4-0 in the Mid-Michigan 'B' and assuring at least a share of the league title.

Ovid-Elsie, on the other hand, dropped to 1-5 on the season, 0-4 in the MMB.

"I thought it was a very good team effort," St. Johns coach Joe Gonzales said. "That was as hard as we've hit all year."

And several players have suffered because of it. Members of both teams were roughed up in the very physical game, the most serious injury coming to O-E's Doug Betts. According to Marauder coach Russ Pope, Betts suffered a broken fibula and will be out for the season.

For St. Johns, the biggest injury was an ankle sprain suffered in the first quarter by quarterback-safety Steve Gonzales. It kept him limping on offense and out on defense for the remainder of the game. Coach Gonzales is hopeful a week of rest will have Steve ready for tomorrow's contest with Chesaning.

As for the game itself, Pope felt it was just a matter of St. Johns controlling the line of scrimmage. "They really hurt us on the line," Pope said. "St. Johns is just so good offensively, and the best thing they've got is (tailback Todd) Elsea."

Elsea did indeed have a very productive night for the Redwings, picking up 141 yards on 21 carries, a 6.7-yard average. "Overall, it's the best game we've gotten from Elsea," Gonzales said. "I would assume Chesaning will try to shut him down this week."

The Marauders certainly didn't. Elsea picked up two of St. Johns' touchdowns on runs of six and 48 yards.

O-E got on the board first, however, as QB Pete Hurst connected with Kevin Baese on a pretty 43-yard scoring pass. Hurst's kick made it 7-0.

From then on, though, it was all St. Johns. The visitors evened the score on a nine-yard pass from Steve Gonzales to Chad Munger, followed by Jamie Werbish's kick. Elsea's two TD runs gave the Redwings a 20-7 lead at the half.

Werbish booted a 30-yard field goal in the third quarter to up the lead to 23-7.

Then came the kicker-to-quarterback pass. With the ball on the O-E 19-yard line, St. Johns set up for a field goal attempt. Coach Gonzales snuck Quarterback Gonzales in the lineup, however, putting him on the line. The center snapped the ball directly to Werbish, the kicker, while Gonzales made a break for the left side of the end-zone.

Werbish then lofted the ball to Gonzales, who made a great play, picking the ball off an O-E defender's helmet and falling into the endzone.

Werbish's PAT made it 30-7.

"The play of our backs was the best we've had all year," Gonzales said. "But our blocking was not as good as it's been."

Defensively, linebacker Bruce Riley had an outstanding game, picking up 12 tackles and intercepting one of Hurst's throws. Tim Moore, moved from defensive end to linebacker to help pressure Hurst, recorded nine tackles, while John Archaumbault also had nine stops.

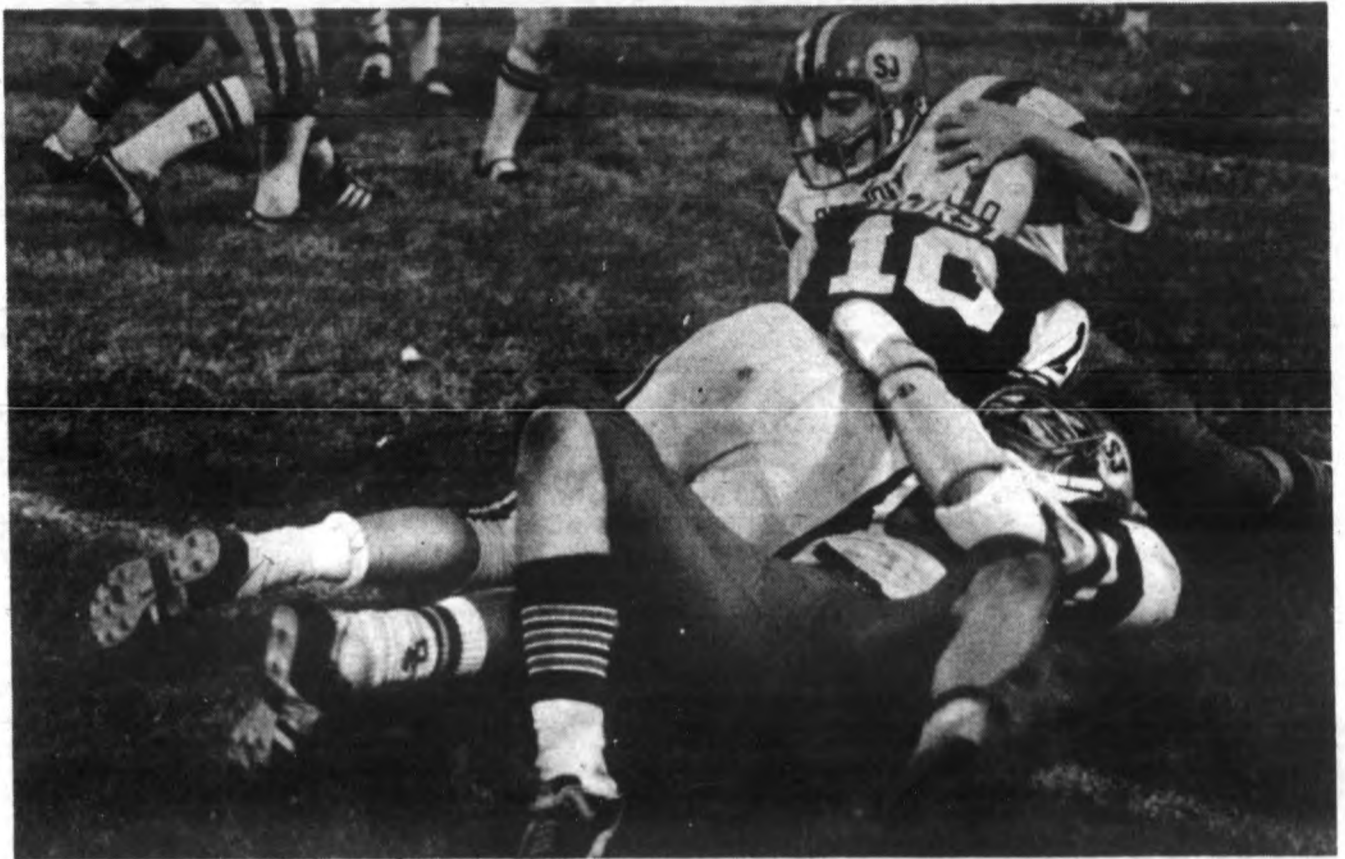
Also having a good game defensively for the Redwings was cornerback Ross Pope, Russ' son, who picked up six tackles in the game. "I thought we could run it past Ross a few times," Coach Pope said, "but every time we tried to, our receiver would come back and say 'Your son was right there all the time, coach.'"

For the Marauders, Hurst was eight-of-12 passing for 143 yards, most of the completions coming late in the first half when St. Johns was in a prevent defense. Jon Martin was the leading rusher with 27 yards on six carries.

The Redwings can win the MMB crown outright with a victory over Chesaning tomorrow, but Gonzales isn't taking anything for granted. "We've only beaten Chesaning once since 1976," he said. "If we aren't ready, we'll have to settle for just a tie for the MMB."

Pope doesn't see any problems for St. Johns. "Chesaning isn't going to give them any trouble," Pope said. "St. Johns is just the best team in the league this year."

As for the Marauders, Pope is optimistic his team can rebound with a win over Ionia. "I'm just hoping our kids don't get down and come out ready to play for our homecoming," Pope said. "I think we can handle Ionia."

The best team, at least for now, is Fowler. P-W gets to take on the 6-0 Eagles tomorrow.

The worst team is 0-6 Potterville. The Pirates took their turn to beat up on the CMAC doormat Oct. 15, winning 51-6. P-W coach Mike Folk was understandably happy with a win, but he didn't totally enjoy the rout.

"I just think it's too bad that a team as young as Potterville has to play in this league," Folk said. "They only had 16 kids dressed for the game."

The game was a total mismatch from the start. The first three plays the Pirates ran resulted in two touchdowns — a 47-yard run by Tom Schafer and a 42-yard pass from Ted Droste to Jim Weber.

The other P-W scores came on a 37-yard Droste-to-Weber pass, a one-yard plunge by George Heckman, a blocked-punt runback by Jeff Spitzley, a 19-yard run by Dan Hanes and a 56-yard run by sophomore Joe Trierweiler.

Potterville's score came after recovering a fumble on the P-W 15-yard line. QB Scott Nemith threw for the score.

"They (Potterville) were so happy when they got that score," Folk said. "If they get that happy over a touchdown, then I guess I'm happy they scored one."

Offensively, Schafer picked up 122 yards on just six carries — a 20.3-yard average. Droste was six-of-10 passing for 109 yards, two TDs and three two-point conversions. Weber had four catches for 103 yards, while Spitzley scored a touchdown and five conversions.

On defense, Paul Bearss, who played just half the game, picked up 16 tackles and a QB sack. Dan Thelen had 12 tackles.

"The game was good for us because a lot of kids who don't usually get a chance to play had a lot of fun out there," Folk said.

But then comes Fowler. "We're expecting a normal P-W-Fowler Game of the Century like we have every year," Folk said. "Fowler is much better than they were a year ago. I think it's an excellent team."

And while the Pirates still have a shot — albeit a long one — at reaching the Class C State Playoffs, P-W's goal right now is just to win the CMAC.

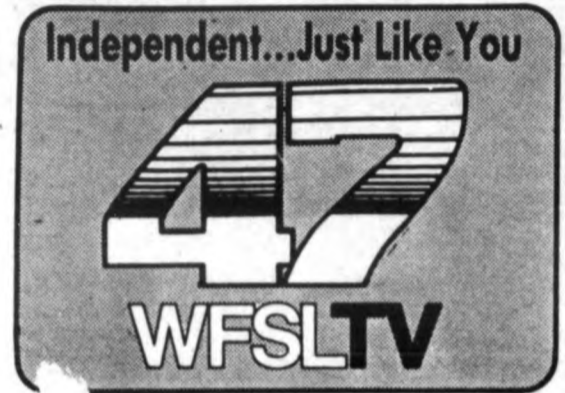

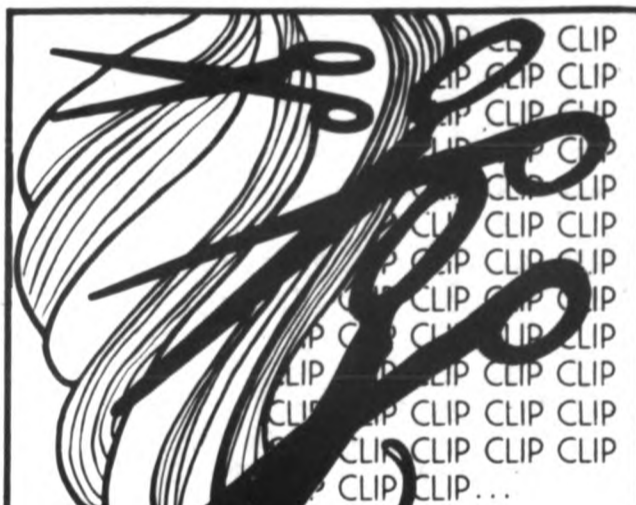

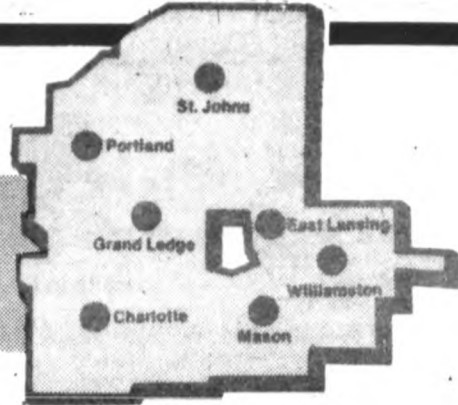

LEMON LOAVES

1 1/2 c. shortening
3 c. sugar
6 eggs, well beaten
1 1/2 c. milk
4 tsp. grated lemon rind
2 tsp. lemon juice
4 1/2 c. unsifted all purpose flour
4 1/2 tsp. double-acting baking powder
1/4 tsp. salt

Glaze
Grease and flour two 9 x 5 inch loaf pans. Cream shortening and sugar; beat in eggs. Add milk, rind and juice. Mix flour with baking powder and salt. Add to batter; pour into pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 1/4 hours, until lightly browned. Cool 20 minutes in pans; remove from pans. Place on squares of aluminum foil and glaze.
GLAZE: Combine 1/2 c. lemon juice and 2/3 c. sugar. Brush over tops and sides of loaves. Cool. Sprinkle with confectioners sugar, if desired.

AUTUMN POUND CAKE

2 1/2 c. sifted flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. baking soda
2 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 c. butter, softened
1 1/2 c. sugar
3 eggs
1 c. plain yogurt
1/2 c. canned pumpkin
1 c. chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Grease and flour a 9 inch tube pan. Combine first 5 ingredients; set aside. In large bowl with mixer at medium speed, beat butter until fluffy. Gradually beat in sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. At low speed, beat in half the flour mixture, yogurt and the pumpkin, scraping bowl occasionally. Add remaining flour mixture, beating until smooth. Stir nuts into batter. Pour into prepared pan. Bake 55-60 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack for 10 minutes. Unmold onto rack and cool completely. Frost top with a cream cheese frosting or merely sift powdered sugar over top.

BEST BROWNIES

1/2 c. shortening
2 one-oz. squares of chocolate
3/4 c. flour
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
2 eggs
1 c. sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1 c. nuts coarsely cut

Melt shortening, and chocolate together over hot water. Cool. Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Beat eggs until light and add sugar and then the chocolate mixture and blend. Add flour, vanilla and nuts. Mix well. Pour into greased and floured 8 inch square pan. Bake at 350 degrees 30 to 35 minutes. Cut in squares. Makes 16 squares. I usually double the recipe and sprinkle with powdered sugar when cool.

SOUR MILK MUFFINS

2 c. sifted flour
1/4 c. sugar
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 c. shortening
1 egg
1 c. sour milk or buttermilk

Sift together into mixing bowl the dry ingredients. Add shortening, egg and buttermilk. Blend with a cutting in motion, then stir until the flour is just moistened. The batter will look lumpy. Fill greased muffin cups 2/3 full. Bake 20 to 25 minutes at 400 degrees. Makes 12 muffins.
