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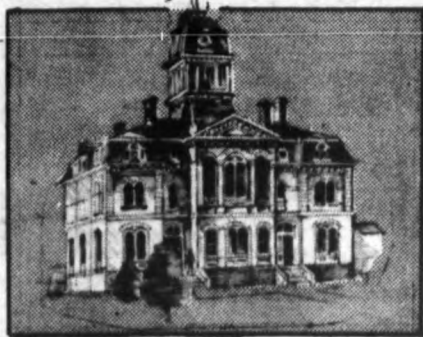

City will vote on utility renewal

Residents of St. Johns will have a chance to vote on whether Consumers Power should continue as the city's utility company, the St. Johns City Commission decided at its meeting Monday, Oct. 25.

"The city has a 30-year lease with Consumers Power, and that lease is up this year," City Manager Randy Humphrey explained. "They made a formal application to the city for a 30-year renewal, and the city accepted the application and put it on the table."

However, the election, which will take place in approximately four months, is largely a formality. Since Consumers Power is the only utility company serving this area, no other companies will make a bid, Humphrey said.

"It's one of those antiquated things from the old system," he said. "Since utility companies are so regionalized now, this renewal is nothing more than a formality."

The bill for the election will be picked up by Consumers Power, Humphrey said.

Earlier in the meeting, the commissioners heard a report from auditor Dale Abraham that the city is in sound financial shape. Abraham conducted the city's 1981-82 fiscal year audit.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Approved a request from the VFW to hold a parade in the city Nov. 11 starting at 10:30 a.m. The parade will start at Railroad Street and go to the Clinton County Courthouse.

- Accepted the low bid of \$2,127.21 from Hub Tire for the purchase of tires for two trucks and a loader.

- Heard a request from the Historical Society to let the society lease the house in the City Park. Jim Moore, appearing on behalf of the society, said the house would be used for the Clinton County archives. The commissioners decided to refer the matter to the Park Board and the City Attorney.

- Adjourned to closed session to discuss the Fraternal Order of Police negotiations.

Legal logjam broken

Drain work gets started

The last hurdle blocking a clean-out of the Remy-Chandler Drain was cleared Tuesday, and work on improvements was expected to begin Wednesday, Clinton County Drain Commissioner Harry Harden said.

The project, begun to relieve flooding following heavy storms in 1975, was delayed because Inter-County Drainage Board officials did not levy enough money to finish the project. Lawsuits were filed by contractors, a property owner and Bath and DeWitt townships, further delaying a second assessment.

Both townships dropped their litigation during the week of Oct. 18 after receiving assurances a second assessment would finish the project, and Clinton County handed over a check for \$75,966 Tuesday, following a Clinton County Board of Commissioners meeting.

With the Clinton County loan, the drain board can also obtain \$158,714 from Ingham County. "The only stipulation in the Ingham County loan was that Clinton County must also participate," Ingham County Drain Commissioner George Griffiths told commissioners.

The loans will be used to pay back the second half of funds owed to contractors. In return, contractors will begin work immediately, attempting to get most of the dredging project and overgrowth removal done before heavy frost sets in. Work will resume in the spring and should be completed by July 15, Griffiths said.

With the threat of lawsuits removed, drain board officials are authorized to levy a second assessment to finish the project. The second tax levy will be used to pay back county loans, then divided among contractors, the final agreement says.

One lawsuit remains, by Lansing Township property owners Mike and Pat Eyde. But Harden said both counties have asked that the suit be resolved before Dec. 31 in the interest of public health. He and Griffiths say the Eydes have little chance of winning their suit, which challenges the first assessment for the drain project.

Griffiths said the biggest benefit of getting the drain project moving again is potential savings to both counties.

"This defers the need for a lot of people to sue us," he said. "The contractors have told us, either the work gets done and they get paid, or they enter lawsuits."

Griffiths estimated future lawsuits could cost the Inter-County Drainage Board from one-half to one million dollars.

Another benefit will be prevention of serious flooding which occurred in 1975, and which has been repeated in DeWitt and Bath township farmers' fields on several occasions since, he said.

Many basements in the northwest quadrant of East Lansing were also flooded, along with portions of Lansing Township.

The settlement, in the works since January, 1981, came exactly one week before Griffiths faces challenger Ben Williams for his Ingham County Drain Commissioner seat in the Nov. 2 election.

"I didn't plan it that way," Griffiths said. "I wanted it to be done last August."

Laingsburg man killed in wood-cutting accident

A Laingsburg man killed in a freak accident was among the incidents reported by Clinton County law enforcement agencies during the past week.

• As he was sawing wood with his son and two grandsons Oct. 21, Melvin Houghton, 69, 12209 Peacock, Laingsburg, was struck in the head by a piece of wood thrown from his radial saw, Bath Township Police said. Houghton suffered massive head injuries and was taken to the hospital, where he was pronounced dead on arrival, police said.

• As he was hitchhiking on Northeast Street in Lansing Oct. 24, Ronald Little, 27, of Lansing was picked up by two white males in a blue vehicle, DeWitt Township Police said. The two males then pulled a shotgun and demanded Little's money, police said.

When he refused, the men fired a shot in the air. Little still refused, police said, so the men hit Little on the head with the gun and abandoned him on Stoll Road. Officers arrived and transported Little to Sparrow Hospital. The two suspects did not get Little's money.

• As he was heading east on State Road Oct. 19, a vehicle driven by Robert King, 46, of Okemos, struck a vehicle driven by Marc Applegate, 31, of Grand Ledge, DeWitt Township Police said. Applegate was cited for running a red light and transported to Sparrow Hospital, police said.

• Two pickup trucks were stolen last week from Bill Fowler Ford, 11323 N. US-27, DeWitt, DeWitt Township Police said. On Oct. 19, a copper 1975 Chevrolet pickup was reported missing. On Oct.

21, a maroon 1982 Ford pickup was reported gone, police said. Police suspect license plate FWK-833 was stolen from the car next to the Ford and put on the Ford. The incidents are still under investigation.

• Five juveniles were picked up by St. Johns Police Oct. 21 for doing \$1,152 worth of damage to fresh cement at the 400 block of N. Ottawa, police said. The five allegedly wrote on, drove their bikes through and walked over the freshly poured cement, police said.

The following Resolution was offered by John Fox and seconded by Don Lowell:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWNSHIP BOARD OF THE TOWNSHIP OF WATERTOWN, CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, the Township Board of Watertown Charter Township has adopted Ordinance No. 5 providing for the acquisition of a sanitary sewage disposal system and providing for the operation and maintenance of said system; and

WHEREAS, the Township Board of Watertown Charter Township desires to amend certain portions of Ordinance No. 5 to provide for the installment payment of certain charges required under said Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Township Board of Watertown Charter Township has determined that such amendment will best serve the public and the citizens of Watertown Charter Township;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWNSHIP BOARD OF WATERTOWN CHARTER TOWNSHIP AS FOLLOWS:

1. That the Township Board believes it to be in the best interests of the citizens of Watertown Charter Township to amend Ordinance No. 5 to provide for the installment payment of certain charges provided for under that Ordinance and that, therefore, the Township Board proposes to amend Section 8, Paragraph A, Subparagraph A to read as follows:

II. a. Direct Connection Charges. From and After the date hereof there shall be paid on behalf of each single family residential premises, or residential equivalent, connecting directly to the sewer lines constructed by the Township, or on the Township's behalf a capital charge for the privilege of utilizing the facilities and receiving the services of the system in the amount of \$1,500.00, plus inspection/permit fees. Said amount shall be due and payable in cash at the time of application and no building permit or new construction shall issue until said connection fee has been paid in full. Except as to new construction, said amounts may be paid in twenty (20) equal installments, the first of which shall be paid on the date of application and on each anniversary of the application date thereafter until the charge shall be paid in full. The unpaid balance due shall be charged interest at the rate of 15% per year, which annual interest shall be paid in full at the time each installment is paid. All inspection/permit fees shall be paid in full at the time of application.

2. That the Township Board states hereby its intent to adopt at its next regularly scheduled meeting on November 8, 1982, the amendment to Ordinance No. 5 set forth above, said amendment to become effective upon final passage and publication.

3. That the Township Clerk be directed to publish a copy of this Resolution in newspapers of general circulation in the Township and have sufficient copies of this resolution available for public inspection at the office of the Township Clerk.

"Politics Makes Strange Bedfellows"

In this election year two Michigan civic leaders are surprised to find themselves involved in an unusual coalition to protect the interests of their constituencies.

James Barrett, president of the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce, and Stanford D. Arnold, secretary-treasurer of the Michigan State Building and Construction Trades Council, are working together with Citizens for Michigan Jobs and Energy to fight Proposal D. D is a controversial initiative, put on the ballot by the Michigan Citizens Lobby, which would eliminate the "automatic" fuel adjustment clause on utility bills but, because of hearing delays, could force utility companies to borrow money in order to continue operating.

Arnold's primary concern is jobs. Utility companies are the state's largest single employer of construction workers.

"If the MCL initiative is passed, the financing of construction will be seriously jeopardized," says Arnold. "And if utility construction projects are stopped, thousands of construction workers will be out of a job."

Arnold points out, however, that it is not only construction jobs that would be lost if Proposal D passes.

"Consider as well the availability of emergency fuel reserves. If utilities were forced to restrict their fuel supplies to avoid borrowing at today's interest rates, we could be caught short of fuel in the event of unexpected severe weather. And major industrial users are the first to lose energy supplies when fuel runs short. Then when bad weather hits, Michigan workers would be out of jobs — for days — even weeks."

Barrett's concern is for business and industry in Michigan, and the state's prospects for economic recovery. But the bottom line is still jobs.

"Proposal D is dangerous to Michigan's economic climate because it could have an adverse effect on our employment picture," says Barrett. "It also could cripple the long-range capacity of utility companies to offer reliable energy service at reasonable rates."

"It poses a very real threat to the capacity of utility companies to provide reliable, efficient service to industrial and commercial customers. As a result, prospective business and industrial energy users may think twice before saying "yes" to Michigan as the location for a new production plant or commercial facility."

Barrett and Arnold agree that the problem with Proposal D is

that it permits only one rate hearing before the Public Service Commission per utility at a time. That would be a cumbersome process that could lead to higher interest rates on operating funds — a cost that would be reflected in higher utility bills and could eventually result in service cut-backs.

Both men are backing another ballot proposal, Proposal H, which they say would "allow utility firms to recover, after Commission scrutiny, month-to-month costs of doing business in a timely manner, reducing their need to borrow operating funds at unreasonably high interest rates."

They are joined in the CMJE coalition by other business, labor and civic groups, plus the Michigan Farm Bureau and a number of individuals throughout the state.

Altogether, it is an unusual coalition of Michiganders fighting to defeat a proposal that would mean further economic disaster for the state.

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10th race gets dirty

Albosta says Reed uses 'character assassination'

Don Albosta, 56, of St. Charles, is married and has two children. He says he expects to spend about \$200,000 on his campaign for re-election.

Q. Who do you support for Governor of Michigan?

A. "Jim Blanchard. I haven't had time to get into everything he proposes, but I believe he will be considerate of my concerns since we have served together in Washington."

Q. How would you work to improve the economy?

A. "I believe very firmly that our infrastructure in this country is breaking down. I don't think it would be any more costly to have people working than to have them sitting on their duffs, whether they be WPA projects or whatever you want to call them."

"We are fast becoming a second-rate nation because we are slipping very fast in education. Technical training is needed and we need to get people out of the welfare and unemployment lines. Also, to make social security survive, we need to get people back to work so they can pay into it."

Q. Where would you cut the federal budget?

A. "Cuts should be made in defense. There is \$30 billion worth of waste in the defense department and plans to spend \$21 billion worth of new nuclear weapons. I would throw that right out. We can destroy ourselves and the rest of the world 12 times over with what we have."

"Also, I would cut foreign aid. It's ridiculous to pay money to Saudi Arabia when their banks are splitting at the seams. Maybe they should be giving aid to us. Also, I would reduce aid to Japan and Western Europe and require them to pay more for their own defense."

Q. Should agricultural exports be used as a tool of foreign policy?

A. "Carter, Nixon, Ford and this administration have used the embargo or implied embargo with the Soviet Union, and that's the problem. We ought to become a reliable supplier and barter with nations. We could give them grain for so much value of something else, strategic materials or oil."

Q. What is your position on defense spending?

A. "Even David Stockman admits there is \$30 billion in waste. We need to improve our procurement policies and we could cut \$21 billion for new nuclear arms."

Q. Are we heading for a depression?

A. "Obviously, when the stock market varies so wildly there is a great degree of instability in our country. I don't think we could have the kind of depression we had in 1930, but ask any farmer in Clinton County if he's in a depression and they might even say its worse than it was in 1930."

"It's really the responsibility of congress and this administration to stop talking politics and come up with some solutions."

Q. How do you stand on gun control?

A. "I'm against any more gun control. We don't need it."

Q. How about abortion?

A. "I am against abortion."

Q. How about nuclear power?

A. "We ought to complete the plants we have started now and then take a good hard look at how we can improve the building of nuclear plants."

Q. Please address three areas of foreign policy: the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks; the Middle East; and the Western European-Soviet gas pipeline.

A. "I am in favor of a nuclear freeze if we have proper inspection on both sides. My own view of the Middle East is that the Israelis have helped us and have been a good friend. I don't condone killing other people by anyone, but whatever the case is, I think the Israelis have been a good friend."

"There isn't any way we will stop that pipeline. What right have we to tell a friend they can't trade with someone else when we ourselves are trading with the Soviet Union?"

Q. What is your opinion of recent takeovers of large businesses by other large businesses?

A. "I'm absolutely against that. The president has the authority to put pressure on the federal reserve to stop this use of money which is shrinking the money supply. We have to tell the rich person how to use his money so it will help us."

Q. Please comment on your opponents.

A. "It's been a very discouraging campaign for me. He (Reed) has continually put up a smokescreen around his reasons for being in this race. He has no proposals or workable solutions. The big question is, why is he even running."

"He's just trying to put up some kind of character assassination."

Editor's Note: Charges and counter-charges are flying back and forth between 10th Congressional District candidates as their race nears its Nov. 2 conclusion.

Incumbent Democrat Don Albosta has charged Republican Larry Reed with deceptive advertising, and Reed has charged Albosta with using taxpayers' money to fund campaign worker salaries. Albosta emphasizes his own experience; Reed backs supply-side theories and Reagan-omics. Libertarian candidate William Spiers says both are all wet, and offers some unique proposals of his own.

Spiers says opponents' behavior is 'laughable'

Libertarian Party candidate William Spiers, 29, is a production employee at Chef Pierre Inc., Traverse City. Married, he plans to move to St. Johns next month from Traverse City to attend Cooley Law School in Lansing. He says he will spend about \$500 on his campaign.

Q. Who do you support for Governor of Michigan?

A. "I don't support any of the candidates and won't vote for governor at all this time."

Q. How would you work to improve the economy?

A. "What I'm calling for is repudiation of the national debt, abolition of the Federal Reserve system, repeal of the 16th amendment (income tax amendment) and withdrawal of all U.S. forces from NATO."

Q. Where would you cut the federal budget?

A. "I would start with military spending. Also, I would like to see the departments of energy and education abolished."

Q. Should agricultural exports be used as a tool of foreign policy?

A. "I don't support the use of grain embargoes as a political or a military tool. In my opinion the U.S. government has no business being involved in foreign trade, period, with the exception of military weapons."

Q. What is your position on defense spending?

A. "I absolutely feel we should not cut it just a little bit, but drastically. I think we could safely take out 80 percent of the budget."

Q. Are we heading for a depression?

A. "In my opinion, we are in a depression, and it will become more severe. There's no question about that."

Q. How do you stand on gun control?

A. "I don't favor gun control."

Q. How about abortion?

A. "I differ from my opponents. I am strongly pro choice. One of the reasons I am running is because Mr. Reed is anti-abortion."

Q. How about nuclear power?

A. "The Libertarian Party has a peculiar position on this. We call for repeal of the Price-Anderson Act limiting liability for power companies. The act encouraged development of unsafe nuclear reactors. If it were repealed, the probable outcome would be there would be no nuclear power plants built."

Q. Please address three areas of foreign policy: the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks; the Middle East; and the Western European-Soviet gas pipeline.

A. "In general, the Libertarians want a strictly non-interventionist foreign policy. In other words, we don't mess in the affairs of any country."

"I don't favor making any agreements with the Soviet Union, period. I follow the Dirty Harry school of thought on foreign policy. I never saw Dirty Harry make an agreement with a bunch of crooks and I don't want to, either."

"On the pipeline, I think that a communist country like the Soviet Union would collapse of its own weight — no one can maintain that kind of empire without outside help. The Europeans are paying tribute to the Soviet empire. They are really the most incredible pack of fools, but that's their business."

Q. What is your opinion of recent takeovers of large businesses by other large businesses?

A. "That is not a problem. If companies want to buy each other up, that's their own business. Everybody's out to diversify."

Q. Please comment on your opponents.

A. "I've held no elective office. That's one of my great virtues. I'm not counting on winning the race, but I may affect the outcome."

"I would make a comment about Mr. Reed. I would contend that Mr. Reed is Don Albosta's straw candidate. That is, if Don Albosta had chosen his Republican opposition, he would have picked Larry Reed."

"I think it's laughable (Reed and Albosta's war of words), I really do. That ad about Albosta spending taxpayers' money for campaign workers — if that's the worst thing they can dig up about Don Albosta, we should all be happy."

"It also signifies that Larry is losing his battle. He knows he's lost. I predict he will lose by a greater margin than Dick Allen did."

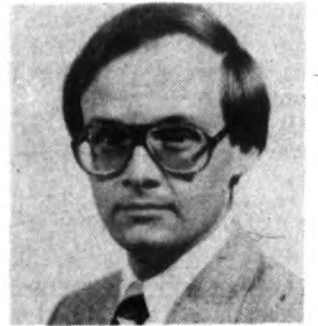
Reed says Albosta bent campaign finance rules

Lawrence Reed, 29, is chairman of Northwood Institute's economic department. A bachelor, the Midland resident has been an economist for six years. He is an author and former radio commentator and columnist. Reed says he will spend about \$200,000 on his campaign.

Q. Who do you support for Governor of Michigan?

A. "Mr. Headlee. We've been running a very independent campaign. I've never talked about his particular proposals, I've just put all the focus on my own campaign."

"I have my own ideas and share many ideas with Ronald Reagan and Dick Headlee, but I'm not a clone of either one."

Q. How would you work to improve the economy?

A. "I agree with the president on the general thrust of getting the federal government under control, but it's going to take a lot more cooperation from the big spenders, the democratic leadership."

Q. Where would you cut the federal budget?

A. "I think we need to pare back some predicted increases in defense spending and sharply reduce foreign aid. We should require our allies to be more generous in their own defense; and we should be less generous in welfare and food stamp outlays."

"I also want a provision in the law which would prevent Congress from raising their own pay in any year when the budget is in deficit. If we had that, we'd suddenly find a lot of creative ways to balance the budget. In the bureaucracy itself, I would eliminate the departments of energy and education, and cut subsidies to business, particularly big business."

Q. Should agricultural exports be used as a tool of foreign policy?

A. "I think we should become the OPEC of the grain business and just sell the daylights out of the rest of the world."

Q. What is your position on defense spending?

A. "I am opposed to the MX Missile, which costs about \$4 billion. We could save billions by requiring our allies to do more for their own defense, and we could save another billion by closing down obsolete military bases."

Q. Are we heading for a depression?

A. "I don't believe so, but I'm worried about a resurgence of inflation because of the high deficit and the inability of congress to make necessary spending reductions."

Q. How do you stand on gun control?

A. "I am opposed to gun control which has as its effect the penalizing of law abiding citizens. We should go after those who abuse guns with tougher penalties."

Q. How about abortion?

A. "I am pro life."

Q. How about nuclear power?

A. "I favor the development of nuclear power with appropriate safeguards."

Q. Please address three areas of foreign policy: the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks; the Middle East; and the Western European-Soviet gas pipeline.

A. "I support the President's efforts to negotiate a meaningful and verifiable arms reduction. In the Middle East, it's time we tell (Israeli Prime Minister) Begin to cooperate for peace or else face a cutoff of American military and economic aid. It's time we got tough with Israel."

"On the pipe line, I have mixed feelings. I'm inclined to think we should not have opposed that because someone will sell technology to the Russians if we don't and it has caused too much damage with our allies."

Q. What is your opinion of recent takeovers of large businesses by other large businesses?

A. "Answering in my capacity as an economist, mergers are not always bad. It's a case of bad government policy. We need more incentive to invest in new ventures and fewer tax advantages for this takeover kind of activity."

Q. Please comment on your opponents.

A. "His (Albosta's) charge that we are mudslinging is absolutely false and he knows it. It's simply his way of dodging the issues. And his behavior at the St. Johns Chamber of Commerce's forum (Oct. 13) was just unbelievably rude. It was the real low point of the campaign."

"We stand by and will document everything we've said about his voting record and public statements. Besides, I've been running a very positive campaign and have been far more specific on issues and solutions than he has."

30th offers choices

In Democrat Pat McAvoy, Republican Al Cropsey and Tisch Party candidate Joe Milchak, voters in the 30th State Senate District have three contrasting personalities to choose from.

Ms. McAvoy, a legal secretary from Owosso, is a newcomer to the political scene making her first try at elective office.

Cropsey is currently Clinton County's representative in the State House from the 88th District, having spent the last four years there. The DeWitt native is a lawyer by trade.

And Milchak, a systems-management designer for Ford Motor Co. and a part-time teacher at Schoolcraft College, says he is the candidate with the business know-how needed by a State Senator. He lives in Tyrone Township in Livingston County.

All three do agree on one thing, however — the state's economy needs help.

"Unemployment is without a doubt our biggest problem in this state," Ms. McAvoy said. "To get employment going we need to improve the business climate in this state. We've relied on the auto industry for too long, and we need to diversify. We need the small businesses to come to this state."

Cropsey sees jobs, taxes and government spending as one big related problem. "Those are all tied in together," he said. "We've got a very bad business climate in this state, with high worker's compensation costs. I feel we have to cut

back on state government to help remedy the situation."

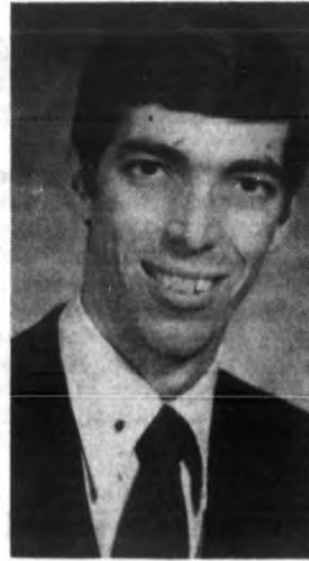
And Milchak repeats the main issue of the Tisch Party platform — property tax reform. "A survey by the Detroit News shows that 70 percent of the people in this state want property tax reform," Milchak said. "So we have to give it to them. And that number is even higher in this part of the state."

All three candidates agree the burden for education funding should be shifted away from property taxes. "I'm working on a proposal for the House right now which would shift the burden for education from local property tax to a local income tax," Cropsey said. "This would be collected by the state and would help eliminate local bureaucracy. But the key to our future is the education of our young people."

"The state has really put the burden on the people without taking its fair share," Ms. McAvoy said. "We need a tax shift away from the property tax."

Milchak agrees that property taxes should be lowered, and also would like to see all the money from the State Lottery going to education. "As it is now, the money from the lottery just goes into general revenue," he said. "We need to make sure that all of it goes to the state-aid education formula."

Discussing her Republican opponent, Ms. McAvoy feels Cropsey has proven to be an ineffective legislator in the House. "He's had four years there, and if you check over his record, I don't know what he's done," she said. "There's no reason

to believe he won't continue in the same way."

Milchak agrees. "He's been in office four years and he's been totally ineffective," he said. "Why should we think he's going to change?"

As for Ms. McAvoy, Milchak said, "She's a very nice person, but I don't believe she has the background which would make her an effective legislator."

Cropsey refused to comment on his opponents, saying, "I just feel that I'm the best qualified to serve. I have the background in Clinton County and I have the experience needed."

Ms. McAvoy feels her inexperience could be a plus "We need someone who can look at something with a fresh mind and say 'Well, why won't it work this way?'" she said. "And we need to improve the communication between the

people and the legislature. I'll let people know exactly what's going on."

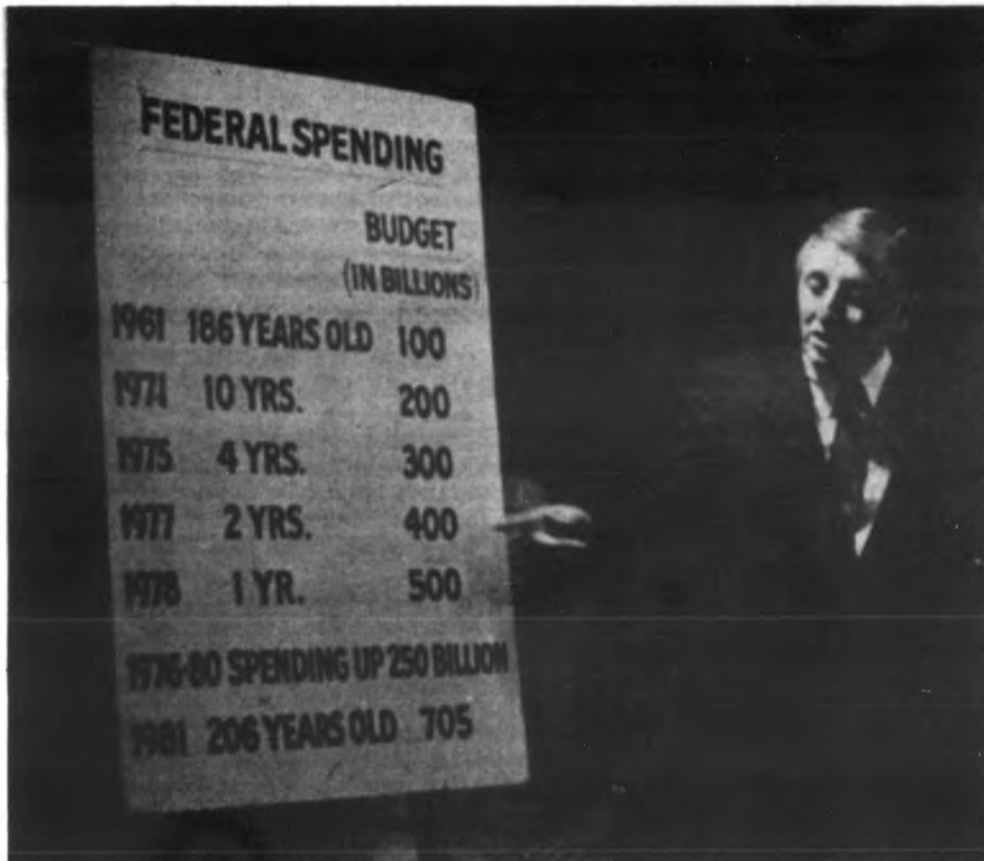
Noting his experience in business, Milchak feels he has the best background for the job. "We need more qualified business people in the legislature and not so many lawyers," he said. "I know how to create jobs. I can put those techniques to work in the state legislature."

All three candidates also voiced support of their party's respective gubernatorial candidates.

"Dick Headlee has a background of putting bankrupt corporations back on their feet," Cropsey said of the Republican. "He's what we need."

"I believe in Bob Tisch because of our party's platform," Milchak said. "We need property tax reform."

And Ms. McAvoy put it simply: "I'm supporting my party's choice for governor."

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Attendance an issue in Sixth District race

Attendance is the big issue in a race to represent the county's 6th District seat on the board of commissioners.

Representing the City of DeWitt and most of the northwestern half of DeWitt Township, the 6th District is one of two contested seats. It's the site of a contest between incumbent Republican Board Chairman Roger Overway, 47, of DeWitt, and Democratic challenger Max Calder, 43, of West Clark Road in DeWitt Township. Calder is chairman of the Clinton County Democratic Party.

Fall concert set

The three choirs will offer a variety of sounds. Featured will be Rhoda Hughes, Brad Massey, Tim Maier and Mike Humenk, all Regional Honors Choir selections. The four will audition for state honors in December.

Two popular songs, "They're Playing My Song" and "Evergreen" will be performed by the Choralaires.

The concert is free to the public.

Both agree paring of the county board from 11 commissioners to seven under a reapportionment plan adopted last January will put a strain on working members of the board.

"My main reason for running is that all five board members who are unopposed are retired people. I have nothing against them and I have worked with them in the past," said Calder, who served on the board twice, from 1975-76 and 1979-80. "But I think the county government should represent all segments of the society — working people, retired people, businessmen, everyone."

Calder, who has lived most of his life in Clinton County, is a pipefitter at Oldsmobile in Lansing, a job which may make it even more difficult for him to serve, Overway said.

"For someone like Max Calder, it will be difficult. He has to be there on the job for eight hours," Overway said. "I'm a little more flexible about my job."

Owner of Overway State Farm Insurance Agency in DeWitt, Overway has been a resident of DeWitt for 17 years. He has served five two-year terms on the board, including three as chairman.

Both also agree the reapportionment plan changed representation for DeWitt Township. Calder says the township will suffer since it does not have one commissioner for the entire township. "Part of it is with Bath, part with Watertown, part with Olive, Ovid and Victor

townships and a little bit with the City of DeWitt," he complained. "If Overway is reelected, DeWitt Township will not have a single representative," he said, pointing out that Overway lives in the City of DeWitt.

"I've been a county commissioner for two different terms and I realize each commissioner works hard for their own district. And with DeWitt Township in the minority, the largest township in the county would not get represented."

"He's absolutely right DeWitt Township has no single representative," Overway replied, "but the township is in fact now represented by four out of seven commissioners. I think that's adequate representation."

Both say they opposed the reapportionment plan, and both stress their experience with county government.

"I realize the odds aren't all that favorable for me winning, but I have served before and know what the job takes. If I do win, at least I've got a working knowledge," Calder said.

He also cited five years as chairman of his party, plus his experience as present chairman of the DeWitt Township Planning Commission.

Overway says his experience speaks for itself. "I like politics and I think I've done a good job in Clinton County. I think I'm very knowledgeable about running the county, and in a time like this, that's what it takes."

"We run the county like a business, and we're in good shape. I think a lot of it is a result of my efforts."

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Candidate Richard Hawks gets challenged

Many DeWitt Township residents will share their county commissioner with Bath Township following the Nov. 2 election, under a redistricting plan adopted last January.

Competing to represent all of Bath Township and an L-shaped portion of southern and eastern DeWitt Township are incumbent Republican Richard Hawks and Democratic challenger Steven Utegraft.

Hawks, 46, of 14275 Chandler Rd., has represented the 11th District under the old apportionment plan for six years. During his three terms on the board, he has been chairman of the physical resources committee and sits on finance and personnel.

Like board chairman and fellow Republican Roger Overway, Hawks is a State Farm Insurance Agent. He has an office in St. Johns. And like Overway, he says his job allows him time to attend more meetings than his opponent may be able to attend.

"I think I decided to run mainly because I enjoy doing it. As far as the amount of work involved, even though we will do more work with a smaller board (the commission has been reduced from 11 to seven), since I'm

self-employed and have my own business, I am able to arrange my schedule to attend all of the meetings."

His opponent, 31-year-old Steven Utegraft of 103 Britany Rd., DeWitt Township, a production worker at Oldsmobile in Lansing, disagrees.

"I will be able to attend meetings," he said. "At Olds, we have a number of county commissioners, mostly from Ingham County. Olds has always been very cooperative that way and they've never had any trouble making a single meeting."

Hawks stresses his experience on the board, and his work on committees like the Department of Public Works, the Capitol Area Transportation Service and Tri-County Manpower. He says he has attended 97 percent of his assigned meetings, and predicts plenty of work ahead for the smaller board.

"I think the board has to continue to be very conservative in spending and hiring of people, because with the people opposed to paying any more taxes and cuts from the federal and state governments, we will have less revenue to spend."

Utegraft, a union representative alternate and graduate of the United Auto Workers Leadership Institute, says he knows how to represent people and will not be afraid to "rock the boat" on behalf of his constituents.

"I am basically ambitious and aggressive," he said. "I won't sit back and let things slide like the present commission does. That's one of my complaints."

Utegraft said he would like to see more economic development activity in Clinton County to compete with Ingham County. He says he is against the I-69 project through Clinton County and opposes expansion of Granger Landfill, "which the people are against, but the commission will pass right over their heads."

If elected, Utegraft said he would work for more creative sentencing, involving community service for minor offenses, and hopes to serve on committees dealing with the environment and law enforcement, which he says has been cut too far.

Hawks says he hopes to continue working on his present committees, and will also contribute his time to make sure the county can make necessary renovations on the county jail to meet state guidelines as economically as possible.

Hawks, who has lived in the district 32 years, told DeWitt Township trustees at a meeting Monday night he hopes to attend all of their meetings as he has done while representing Bath Township.

Utegraft says he just wants to get involved. "I would say that over the years, as Lansing has expanded the base of people in the area, this district is more responsive to a Democratic or more liberal viewpoint on the issues," he said.

"I'm not bashful to fight for the people I'm representing. I will stand up for the people's rights and won't take a back seat."

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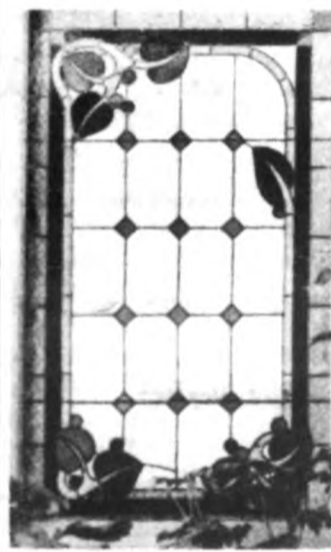
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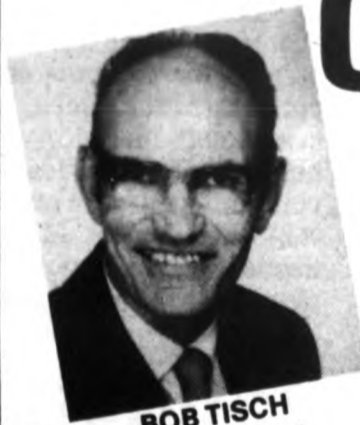
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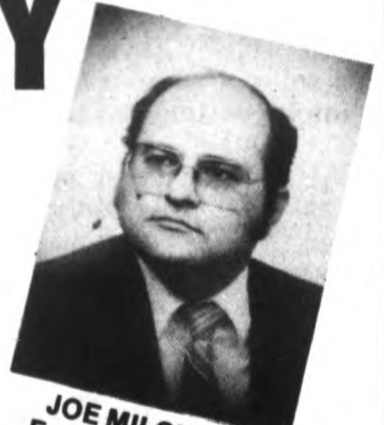

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Our picks for Nov. 2

Mudslinging match clouds issues

Thanks to the exchange of vitriolic verbiage in the 10th District Congressional race, it is hard to separate truth from fiction.

Incumbent Don Albosta says Republican challenger Larry Reed has taken to mudslinging and character assassinations because he has no stands on issues.

Reed says the same of Albosta, but insists his is a "positive campaign" — meanwhile digging up accusations regarding Albosta's questionable use of tax dollars to recompense campaign aides following his last campaign.

Even Libertarian candidate William Spiers, who admits little chance of even coming in a close second, has thrown a few verbal punches, mostly in the direction of Reed.

It's a pity.

With the economy causing sleepless nights throughout the land, hot spots in the Middle East and Central America, Soviet intervention in Poland and dwindling cooperation from our European allies, there is certainly no shortage of real issues to be addressed by Congressional candidates.

And with the present state of affairs in Michigan, representation in Congress can be crucial to an economic recovery; there is simply no excuse for allowing such an impor-

tant race to degenerate into the kind of campaign the 10th district battle has become.

With little debate on serious issues to enlighten voters, the campaign more closely resembles a championship fight: it is not enough for Mr. Reed or Mr. Spiers to score evenly with Congressman Albosta; they must clearly wrest the title from the incumbent by proving themselves better equipped to hold it.

Neither has. Mr. Spiers began at a disadvantage, with little backing and no experience. Mr. Reed, who looked strong in the early rounds, soon lost points, in our opinion, for hitting below the belt.

Although Mr. Albosta is not one of Michigan's most effective Congressmen, he may be one of the most effective when it comes to staying in Congress. Furthermore, we believe his economic recovery plans are sounder than Mr. Reed's, and hope his experience and standing in Congress will make him a more convincing voice on behalf of Michigan and the concerns of the 10th District.

We urge a vote for Democrat Don Albosta in the 10th Congressional District.

Crospey record hits a sour note

The 30th State Senate race has been a quiet one compared to last summer's scorching Republican Primary battle between Alan Crospey and Dick Allen.

After surprising many with an upset win over Allen, Crospey has been content to coast to what looks like a sure victory over Democrat Pat McAvoy and Tisch Party candidate Joe Milchak. That's probably good strategy, but not too helpful to voters.

The Republican Primary all but eclipsed Ms. McAvoy and Mr. Milchak, leaving many to wonder how Mr. Crospey's solutions to state problems stack up against the general election competition. After taking a look, we believe not too well.

As usual, we are getting the same refrain from Mr. Crospey: Reduce government waste. This ready solution to a variety of problems strikes some of the same simple chords hammered so loudly and monotonously by the Tisch Party. In fact, Mr. Milchak and Mr. Crospey have a lot in common: both would solve a wide array of state problems by simply cutting taxes and state government.

If the solution is so simple, however, we must ask why Mr. Crospey has not achieved his goal while serving as 88th District State Representative.

He blames Democratic control and lack of

cooperation by other legislators. He says he has tried to introduce bills to reduce taxes and cut government waste, but his lone voice has been drowned out by special interests.

Is everybody out of step but Al?

Or is it possible that some of his more extreme viewpoints and oversimplified solutions have alienated other legislators, making his efforts less than effective?

We would naturally be inclined to favor Clinton County's own for the Senate, especially with legislative experience as a recommendation. But considering Mr. Crospey's erratic record of introducing or proposing legislation of highly questionable efficacy, and his lack of success in getting cooperation from other legislators, what might have been plusses must be chalked up neutrally, at best.

The alternative? Ms. McAvoy.

Her apparently well thought out solutions to economic problems sound logical and should be given a chance to work before the clamor for tax cuts forces further crippling cuts in state services.

Although Ms. McAvoy is inexperienced, we believe her fresh ideas and persuasive charm could make her an effective representative in the State Senate. More than ever, Michigan needs new ideas, not a medley of once-popular oldies from the hit parade of simple solutions.

Experience gives Randall the nod

Because of redistricting which has moved Clinton County from the 88th State House District to the 89th, voters here are faced with a fresh slate of candidates.

The incumbent in the 89th is Republican Gary Randall of Alma, a two-term veteran of the House. His challengers are Democrat Phillip Stoddard, a 22-year-old Central Michigan University grad from Hubbardston, and St. Johns farmer Jim Heppinstall, running on the Tisch Party ticket.

Of all the factors involved when it comes to picking a candidate, one of the most important is experience. An experienced candidate doesn't need to spend time learning the system and usually has a stronger voice in the legislature.

Certainly experience isn't the only tangible to consider, but in the race for the 89th House seat, it seems to be one of the most impor-

tant. For that reason, we recommend Randall.

With a high legislative turnover expected, Randall should be one of the senior members of the Republican caucus after the election. That added clout should help him make his colleagues aware of our concerns. With so many representatives struggling to be heard, every advantage is needed.

Stoddard has presented what he feels are solutions to some of the state's problems, and some of them seem quite viable. He simply lacks the experience which would make him the most effective legislator this District could send to the House.

Heppinstall, like most Tisch Party candidates, is too one-dimensional. His primary concern is taxes, for which he has a variety of plans; but like many Tisch Party candidates, he seems very weak on other issues.

P-W tops Fowler for CMAC title

Perhaps Mike Folk put it best. "I don't think high school football gets any better than P-W versus Fowler," the Pewamo-Westphalia head coach said.

And on Oct. 22, with more than 2,000 fans crammed into Fowler's tiny stadium, nobody was any better than P-W. The Pirates squeezed past Fowler, 8-7, to win the Central Michigan Athletic Association title for the second year in a row.

"Winning the title was our major goal this year," Folk said. "From 1962 to 1982, we only had one championship at this school. Now we have two in two years. We're very pleased."

The win upped P-W to 6-1 on the year, 5-0 in the CMAC. It was the first loss of the year for the Eagles, who dropped to 6-1, 4-1 in the CMAC.

The game itself was just as close and tense as they come. Fowler jumped on top in the first quarter on a four-yard run by Glen Feldpausch. The score capped a 77-yard, 17-play drive which included a 15-yard Tom Simon-to-Jim Farley pass. Bob Simon's kick made it 7-0.

The Pirates struck back in the second quarter, as Dan Pohl returned a punt 10 yards to the Fowler 40. Five plays later, Tom Schafer scooted into the end zone from seven yards out for the score. The TD was set up by an 18-yard George Heckman run.

Then came an important decision by Folk. It was still early in the game, so do you go for one point or two?

"We had to go for two points," Folk said. "Jeff Spitzley is a very good kicker, but we wanted to get the lead. By going for two points, we would let everyone know where the game stood."

So P-W quarterback Ted Droste rolled out as if to pass, but elected to run instead. He dove into the corner of the end zone, scoring the two points with no room to spare.

That made it 8-7, and that's where it stayed. Fowler mounted a good drive in the third quarter, moving all the way to the P-W 20, but Pohl ended the threat by intercepting a Tom Simon pass on the goal line. "That was



the play of the game," Folk said.

Folk and Fowler coach Steve Spicer were in agreement — the fans certainly got their money's worth. "They witnessed a great high school football game," Spicer said. "P-W is just an excellent team."

"Our kids were very relieved and tired after the game," Folk said. "And they were very impressed with Fowler."

Statistically, the Eagles rolled up 245 yards total offense to P-W's 211. Tom Simon led Fowler with his seven-of-12 passing for 82 yards. "Tom threw awful well," Spicer said. Farley picked up 76 yards rushing on 23 carries, while Feldpausch had 73 yards on 13 tries.

For the Pirates, sophomore Joe Trierweiler led the way with 69 yards on 10 carries, while Heckman had 62 on 14 carries. Droste completed four of his ten passes for 52 yards.

With the fans lining the field three and four deep all the way around, Fowler recorded its biggest day at the gate ever. "We took in \$3,800," Spicer said. "That's by far our biggest gate ever."

The Eagles have a chance to rebound tomorrow against 1-6 Genessee, a team with only 15 varsity players. It might seem like a mismatch, but Spicer isn't taking any chances. "We know we've got to win our last two games if we have any chance at the playoffs," Spicer said. "Genessee could be tough."

As for P-W, the Pirates will travel to Portland tomorrow to face the Red Raiders, a Class B squad. "We're real close to Portland, so a lot of our kids know their kids," Folk said, "and they want to beat us real bad. That's the problem we have."

to the Maid of Honor's, and carried a single burgundy rose accented with burgundy forget-me-nots and streamers.

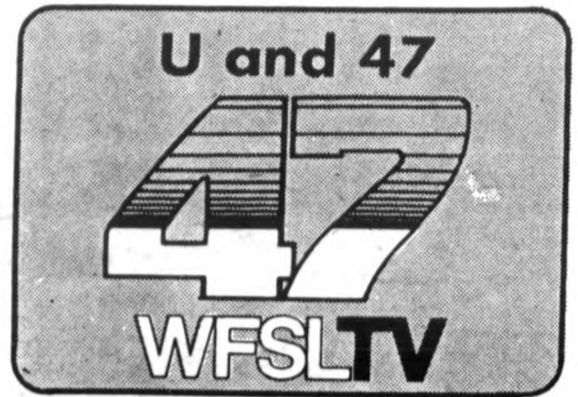
