## Democratic defeats are no surprise

# Republican candidates sweep the county

With the exception of Democratic Congressman Don Albosta, Republican candidates swept Clinton County in Tuesday's general election — to the surprise of almost no one.

According to unofficial totals reported at 2:30 a.m. from Clinton County Clerk Jane Swanchara's office, a "good turnout" of 20,769 voters cast ballots in the Nov. 2 election.

In the 10th District, incumbent St. Charles Congressman Don Albosta cruised to an expected victory over Republican challenger Larry Reed and Libertarian candidate William Spiers. Albosta garnered 51 percent of the vote in Clinton County, earning 8,908 to Reed's 8,212 and Spiers' 105 votes.

"I've never seen such a campaign. I'd say it was the worst in the country," Albosta said of Reed's effort to unseat him. "I really don't think they understand the political process. I've never seen a campaign where they just continued to attack the person."

Told at 11 p.m. that his race with Reed was just about dead even, Albosta called the tie a victory. "Voters in Clinton County are just as intelligent as anywhere else and they can see through a shallow campaign like that," he said.

Reed, 29, is chairman of the department of economics at Northwood Institute, and was supported by the National Conservative Political Action Committee. Albosta charged in the final days of the campaign. Reed accused Albosta of using tax dollars to finance campaign workers' salaries and at one point, issued a wanted poster in an attempt to get Albosta to debate him.

In the 30th District State Senate race, Republican Al Cropsey of DeWitt scored an easy victory over Democrat Pat McAvooy of Owosso and Tisch Party candidate Joe Milchak of Livingston County. Cropsey won by a 61 percent margin in Clinton County, with a total of 11,703 votes. McAvooy was second with 7,117, and Milchak earned 186 votes in Clinton County.

"We've got a victory party planned downtown and I just hope it's a victory," Cropsey said at 10 p.m., before vote totals started rolling in.

Cropsey ran a quiet campaign against McAvooy, relying on the district's majority of Republican voters to boost him to a win. He upset incumbent Richard Allen in the August primary election, following a bitter campaign.

In the 89th State House District, incumbent Republican Gary Randall of Alma had an easy win over Democrat Phil Stoddard of Hubbardston and Tisch Party candidate Jim Heppinstall of St. Johns. Randall earned roughly 58 percent of the vote in Clinton County, with 10,796 votes to Stoddard's 7,230 and Heppinstall's 412.

"I'm delighted," Randall said when reached at his Gratiot County headquarters. "I have no complaints with the way the campaign was run. Some of the issues faded at times on the other side, but I have no complaint."

Incumbent County Commissioners Richard Hawks and Roger Overway, both Republicans, also were reelected, both earning about 60 percent of the votes in their districts.

In the 5th County Board District, Hawks defeated Democratic challenger Steven Uptegraft by 509 votes, 1,521 to 1,012.

In the 6th County Board District, Overway won his race against Democrat Max Calder, 1,612 to 1,065.

Both ran in new districts drawn up in January by the county's reapportionment committee, and will serve on a smaller board. The reapportionment plan calls for only seven commissioners, compared to the old plan's 11.

In the Michigan Gubernatorial race, Republican Dick Headlee earned 57 percent of the Clinton County vote, with 11,267 votes to Democrat James Blanchard's 7,559 and Robert Tisch's 873. The Clinton County vote was not enough, however, and Blanchard was the winner, thanks mainly to high scores among Detroit area voters.

## Watertown citizens petition four

# Recall petitions turned in

Four members of the Watertown Township Board are facing a recall election because they voted Sept. 23 to settle the board's dispute with landfill developer Jerry Granger.

Supervisor William Vaughn Montgomery, Clerk Mildred McDonough and trustees John Fox and Forest Shipman are named on recall petitions which were filed last week with Clinton County Clerk Jane Swanchara. Once the petitions are certified by the clerk's office, an election date will be set, Mrs. Swanchara said.

According to Nancy Doell, one of the leaders of the recall drive, the board acted too soon when it decided to settle with Granger. "We just felt they didn't give it enough time," Mrs. Doell said. "So the night of their vote (Sept. 23), we had the petitions ready. Once they voted, we put in the names of the people who voted for the settlement."

"We only needed 338 signatures on each petition, but we got almost twice that many," she said. "This whole thing really was a community effort."

Mrs. Doell said 667 signatures were collected on Montgomery's petition, 654 on Mrs. McDonough's and 661 each on Fox' and Shipman's.

"Naturally, we're disappointed and upset about this," Mrs. McDonough said. "I sincerely hope the people of

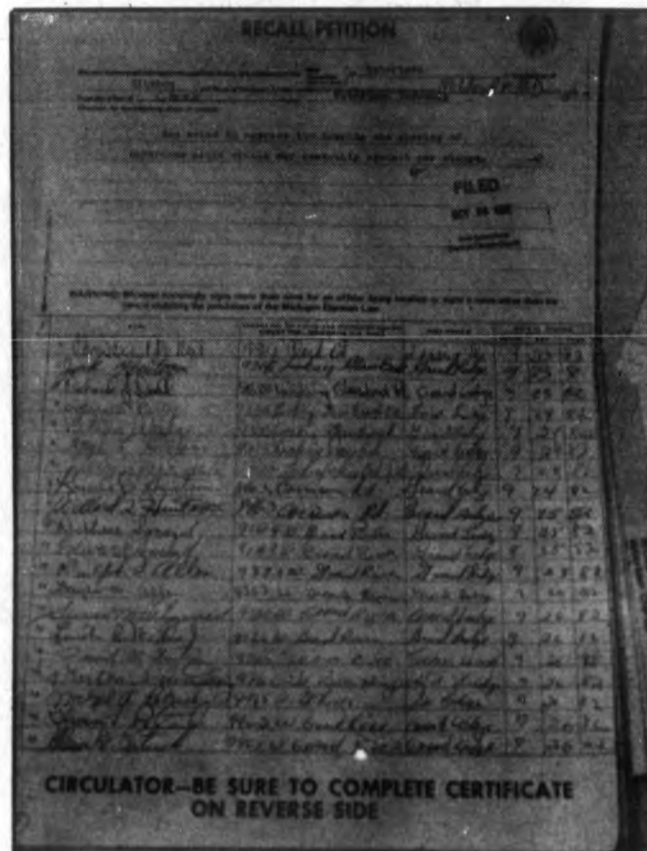
Watertown do some serious thinking about this before they vote. I still think we did the right thing, and I don't have anything to apologize for."

The board decided to settle its long-standing feud with Granger over his landfill on Grand River Avenue because, according to Mrs. McDonough, the law could soon change which gives township boards the right to settle such disputes. "We wanted to at least get some kind of settlement," she said.

Granger had wanted to expand his landfill 92 acres for the disposal of toxic wastes. The terms of the settlement require the expansion be built 300 feet away from Grand River Avenue to keep the land in the township's tax base. Granger also agreed to pay seven cents per cubic yard of waste into a trust fund which the township can use to conduct groundwater testing or compensate area homeowners for a drop in property values.

"I don't think a true picture of the settlement was presented to the people," Mrs. McDonough said. "Some people were under the impression that we waived the right to sue Jerry Granger if he didn't adhere to the settlement. That's not true at all. People just don't understand the issue."

Regardless, Mrs. Doell thinks the recall movement will be successful. "I believe it will go over," she said. "There is enough turmoil in the whole township right now, I think the people are going to vote for it."

# CMH offers diabetes test

Free blood tests to help detect diabetes will be offered by Clinton Memorial Hospital during Diabetes Detection Week, Nov. 7-13.

The screening will be held at the hospital from 1-8 p.m. Nov. 9-11, and is sponsored by the St. Johns Lions Club, St. Johns

Rotary Club, American Diabetes Association-Michigan Affiliate and Clinton Memorial Hospital Development Council Community Services Committee.

People who run the risk of developing diabetes are over 40, over weight and

related to diabetics. They should be checked once a year. An estimated 240,000 people in Michigan have diabetes, but do not know it, a hospital spokesperson said.

For best results, a meal high in carbohydrates with large amounts of starches

and sugars should be eaten two hours before testing.


Persons discovered to have diabetes will be referred to a physician for further evaluation. For more information about testing and dieting, call Education Coordinator Kathryn Bangs at 224-6881, ext. 283.

## Granger insists expansion is needed

# Landfill full enough now, PAL says

If arguments continue at their present pace, a court-ordered decision on expansion of the Granger Landfill might read "Do not open until Christmas."

By then, the findings of the Clinton County Zoning Board of Appeals may be academic.

### News analysis

Jerry Granger and his attorneys were back in the county's circuit courtroom Monday night. So were members of the Peoples Action League (PAL), opposed to expansion of Granger's Watertown Township landfill by 92 acres — including a 26-acre hazardous waste disposal area.

Representing PAL was James Olson of Traverse City, one of the top environmental-activist attorneys in the state.

A crowd of about 60 was on hand, along with all five members of the board, Chairman Max Loudenberg, Earl Barks, Raymond Yerkie, Ronald Miller and Don Witt.

The only person lacking was a referee.

Nearly outnumbered by attorneys, ZBA members were tripped up repeatedly throughout the evening by questions and arguments about how the meeting should be conducted. By the end of the three-and-a-half-hour meeting, they still had not resolved the first item on their agenda, standing.

Granger attorney Gary Trepod favored a more formal courtroom-style approach and put his witnesses on the stand for direct examination. He argued PAL has not established legal standing to challenge Granger's Special Use Permit for expansion, originally granted by

the Clinton County Board and Planning Commission more than a year ago.

He used exhaustive evidence from several experts in an attempt to prove PAL and other residents near the landfill have not been damaged by Granger. He urged the ZBA to retract its decision a year ago to overturn the county board's okay, which led to a lengthy circuit court battle.

Two water quality experts, one from the State Health Department and another from the Department of Natural Resources, testified no contaminants from the landfill have been found in nearby wells.

Another Granger witness, of Snell Environmental Group, offered surveys and data designed to prove property values have not been affected by the landfill.

"I knew it was going to take this long," Trepod said following his lengthy presentation.

Olson, who presented PAL's side first, was incensed by Trepod's use of courtroom tactics. He said Loudenberg's statement at the outset of the hearing, prohibiting cross examination and demanding an informal hearing, convinced him such direct questioning of witnesses was not intended.

Olson twice attempted to question Trepod's witnesses, was twice told to direct any questions to the board, then was told any questions were out of order.

Following the hearing, however, Olson appeared confident the issue of standing would go PAL's way. "We did our proofs on standing," he said. "All of the rest of this is superfluous."

Olson's proofs included testimony from four men and women who live near the landfill who said PAL represents their grievance. "I'm aggrieved we have to

go through this grief to protect our community," Harvey Schoof said.

Olson also argued PAL has earned standing by pursuing the matter as far as it has, and told the ZBA actual damages are not required to prove standing. He said the threat of future water contamination from hazardous waste disposal run-off and leachate is damage enough.

In response, Trepod pointed out a directive Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen issued when Tahvonen sent the question back to the ZBA. "The board must find special problems not common to other property owners," he said. Tahvonen's directive was one of six he gave the board of appeals. The first on the list was standing.

Perhaps the most crippling blow to the PAL case, however, could be the board's decision not to hear any testimony regarding hazardous waste. Because hazardous waste sites are regulated by the state, board members have no authority to restrict them or consider restricting them, and testimony about hazardous waste disposal would be a waste of time, Loudenberg said.

"Our activity on that is preempted by the state," he said. "What's the use of us sitting here and listening to a lot of evidence if we have no power?"

Loudenberg's question is an appropriate one. Granger is fighting another battle for a special use permit for the same expansion on another front. Unless it is tabled, their request for a new SUP will be heard by the county's planning commission Nov. 10.

If the planning commission approves the request as they did last year, the matter will go to the county board, also in Granger's corner last time around.

And this time, thanks to a decision by county commissioners earlier this year, the Zoning Board of Appeals cannot veto the county's decision.

## Mills plans sports complex

A multi-million dollar sports complex featuring ball diamonds, soccer fields, tennis courts, ski trails, restaurants and pro shops is being planned in Watertown Township, the Clinton County News has learned.

An application by attorney John Ujlaky, on behalf of landscape architect and developer Bud Mills, has been filed with the Clinton County Department of Development and Control.

Mills, who proposed a similar development in Delta Township, was thwarted when voters there rejected his project in an election last June.

According to Delta Township planning officials, the Mills project is priced "in the millions" and includes a "very detailed site plan."

Clinton County planner Tom Warstler said Mills has applied for a Special Use Permit from the county's planning commission. His request, to be considered Dec. 8, names a 678 acre site bordered by Grand River Avenue on the north, just south of the end of Francis Road. The land is presently owned by Leon and Virginia Atayan, Warstler said.

The request was filed Oct. 22, and says the purpose of the project will be to "allow establishment of an outdoor commercial recreation establishment," including tennis courts, soccer fields, football fields, baseball fields, basketball courts, archery ranges, ice-skating, cross-country skiing trials and other sports. Also included in the request are restaurants, showers, retail shops, equipment rental facilities and retail shops, Warstler said.

## Grand opening is planned for mall

St. Johns' new Southpoint Mall will hold its grand opening celebration Nov. 16-21 with a magic show, local bands, a fashion show and other activities.

Food will be supplied by several mall tenants and the St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce. A video game arcade competition is planned, along with a ribbon-cutting ceremony and several contests, reports said.

## Tomorrow's trash

With the growing mountain of evidence regarding Granger Land Development's request to expand their Watertown Township Landfill, it would seem cruel and unusual punishment to ask the county's Zoning Board of Appeals to admit more evidence.

But that is our request.

During their meeting Monday night, members of the ZBA decided they would not consider any testimony regarding hazardous waste. Hazardous waste disposal is the province of the state, they argued, so why bother considering evidence about it?

To put it simply, we believe they must consider evidence regarding hazardous waste disposal because that is their responsibility.

It is the responsibility of local planners, county commissioners and, if necessary, members of the zoning board of appeals, to consider any possible hazards to the public from proposed projects.

Even if present hazards do not exist, such officials will be shirking their duty if they do not consider carefully the potential impact on our environment of a hazardous waste disposal site.

Tomorrow's problems can be solved, or mitigated, today. That is why zoning plans and boards to implement them are established. To pass the buck to the state and ignore testimony regarding hazardous waste would totally defeat the purpose of the hearings now being held.

## Special seniors

Say hello to the senior members of the St. Johns football squad. It's a group that includes guys like Beaver, Werb, Snuffy, Slammer and the Ace.

These guys, along with a few others, are the main reason the Redwings are 6-2 and the Mid-Michigan 'B' champs, instead of 2-6 and the MMB chumps. According to head coach Joe Gonzales, it's the best senior class he's ever had.

"I've had other individuals which were just as good," the coach says, "but I've never had this many good seniors on one team. And I've never had this much size."

Because of the team's success this season, many of these seniors are being looked at by the colleges. Three of the 12th graders with the best chance of getting a scholarship are Steve Gonzales, Tim Moore and Jamie Werbish.

**Steve Gonzales** — Everybody calls Steve "Beaver," but no one can remember why. It's not because he bears any resemblance to Ward and June Cleaver's television son; it's just a nickname he's had all his life.

Beaver plays quarterback and safety for the Redwings, and he does both quite well. Beaver also happens to be the coach's son, which has made him the target of some totally unnecessary abuse from a few classless fans in the past.

Ever since Beaver was inserted into the lineup as a sophomore, a few people who speak without the aid of a brain have showered profanities and abuse at him and his father. Beaver's only crime was that his father was the coach. The abuse bothered Joe at first, but after awhile, he quit worrying about it. Beaver is the best quarterback on the team, so Beaver will play, Joe said.

And Beaver has responded beautifully. He's probably the best run-pass quarterback in the league, and the colleges are hot on his tail. Central Michigan, along with quite a few smaller schools, are interested. But he doesn't know which one he'll go to yet. Or even if he'll play football in school.

He's a very articulate and intelligent young man, and probably could get an academic scholarship somewhere. If he does decide to play football, though, chances are it will be at CMU or Alma College.

**Tim Moore** — Tim won't admit it, but his nickname is "The Ace." He doesn't seem to like that name, so we'll just call him Tim. He's 6-3 and 200 pounds, so whatever he wants to be called is just fine.

Tim plays linebacker for St. Johns, moving there three weeks ago from his old defensive end spot. Do you like playing defense, Tim?

"Yes."

Why?

"I like to hit."

His opponents won't argue the point.

Tim probably has the best chance among the Redwings of seeing action in college. He has the size and the banzai attitude coaches love. On the field, Tim is one of the hardest hitters in the MMB. Against Ovid-Elsie three weeks ago, several O-E players had to be helped off the field because of Tim's hits.

Off the field, though, he comes across as very shy and soft-spoken. He wouldn't hurt a fly, unless of course the fly was wearing a football uniform.

Like Beaver, Tim is also a standout at basketball. He has a reputation on the playgrounds of St. Johns as a premier slam-dunk artist. "How do you want it dunked?" asks coach Gonzales. "He can do it one-handed, two-handed, behind his head..."

All this dunking got Tim into trouble last year, though. He hurt his back during basketball season because he jumped and landed wrong. He won't be playing basketball this year. "I'll probably get a job," he says.

Football was always his first love anyway. He also loved the move to linebacker. "I really got into the action more," he says. "I got to hit more." He smiles when he says this.

Tim has been getting contacts from a number of big-time schools, including Michigan State and CMU, as well as several other Mid-American Conference schools. "I'll probably go to whichever school offers me the most," he says. "I'd like to major in business."

Any of the schools would no doubt love an Ace in the hole.

**Jamie Werbish** — Most high school coaches would give their right foot for a right foot like Jamie's on their team. Jamie, or just "Werb," if you prefer, is easily the best kicker in the MMB, and probably one of the best in the entire state.

He's been coming on real strong this season, and as a result, the colleges have started to take notice. Jamie was scheduled to take a trip to CMU last weekend.

Jamie also plays offensive tackle for the Redwings, but his real forte is booting the ball. He is usually automatic on extra points, and kicks field goals with regularity. His best this season was a 40-yarder against Alma, but he's booted a 52-yarder in practice. Not many high schoolers can do that.

"I just really like kicking," Jamie says. "I was in punt, pass and kick for four years when I was younger, and I've been kicking a football all my life."

That's because kicking is a family affair with the Werbishes. Father John was the kicker at St. Johns when he was a student there. Uncle Al, the current Redwing basketball coach, was a kicker at Adrian College. And little brother John is the kicker on the St. Johns junior varsity. "I've been around kicking ever since I was a kid," Jamie says.

Some of the other seniors who have been getting attention from the college ranks include:

**Todd "Ovid" Eisea** — The 5-8, 160-pound tailback might be a little small for some schools, but Ferris State, Kalamazoo College and Olivet College are all interested.

**Eric "Snuffy" Smith** — At 6-1 and 205 pounds, several schools like his size. Grand Valley State is among the ones interested.

**Bruce "Riley Odoms" Riley** — Another running back on the small side, the 5-9, 170-pound fullback has been contacted by Ferris State.

# Strikes threatened in three county districts

Unless compromises are reached by Thursday, Nov. 11, teacher strikes could shut down two Clinton County school districts by the following Monday, sending home more than 5,000 St. Johns and DeWitt students.

Bath teachers are also threatening a strike which would idle another 1,094 students there. At issue in all three districts, and in negotiations at Ovid-Elsie and Fowler public schools, are teacher raises.

Teachers in St. Johns will be the first to strike Nov. 12 if their demands for a four percent salary increase are not met by the school board. The increase is negotiable, according to St. Johns Education Association (SJEA) President Gerry Congleton, but the strike deadline was approved by teachers Tuesday night: if the board does not grant an across-the-board percentage raise to teachers, they will not show up for work Friday, Nov. 12, he said.

Congleton and Chief Negotiator Mike Gehoski met with board negotiator George Johnson and other board representatives Thursday, Oct. 28, but both sides reported no progress.

The forecast is a dark one, according to Gehoski and Congleton.

"They will argue they are saving their money for a rainy day, but hey, sport fans, it's here now," Gehoski said. Congleton called a strike "likely."

"They are the ones who have refused to move," he said. "They have pushed our backs to the wall. The board wants to push us as far as they can. As far as I'm concerned, I think they must want a strike."

Johnson and Superintendent Don Burns both say there is not enough money for teacher salary increases in the 1982-83 school budget. They have offered step increases for teachers who qualify, but no percentage raise for all teachers. And that's as far as the board will go, Johnson said.

Asked what the SJEA has proposed, Johnson replied: "I can only tell you it's way too much because it's more than our offer. I can tell you this is a solid, one-hundred percent decision of the board to stand firm."

## Why a strike if no one wants it?

Teachers, negotiators and board members agree on one thing: nobody wants a teacher strike.

Why, then, are three county school districts threatened by strikes? One reason may be that teachers in all but one county districts belong to the Ingham County Education Association, represented by the MEA.

According to negotiator John Prevost, the MEA would like most to settle in DeWitt, where money is available to grant larger raises than elsewhere. The DeWitt contract could then be used as a lever to force raises in other districts.

MEA negotiator Tash Sogg says otherwise. She says her organization now looks at each district individually, and has abandoned the "patterned settlement" approach of previous years.

She blames the delay of settlements on cold feet. "It's like nobody wants to dive into the cold surf," she said. "Whatever district settles first will have a beneficial effect and break the ice. The boards are all sitting there afraid to be first."

But a superintendent at one smaller system, who wished not to be named, said it was more a case of the chicken and the egg. The larger districts do not want to set a hard-to-match raise precedent which could be used to pressure financially strapped districts; and the MEA will not allow a low raise or wage-freeze settlement to be ratified in a small district, which might be used to pressure teachers in larger districts to follow suit.

Following is a breakdown of county districts, and where negotiations stand:

• **ST. JOHNS** — Teachers have set a Nov. 12 strike deadline. Board members will not back off their demand for a wage freeze, and neither side has so far called an 11th hour negotiating session to avert a strike.

• **DEWITT** — Teachers are expected to take a strike vote Nov. 11, calling for a walk out Nov. 15 if their demands for a salary increase are not met. The board is sticking by demands for a wage freeze. They are scheduled to meet again Nov. 11.

• **BATH** — Teachers have received authorization from the MEA to hold a strike vote. They meet with board negotiators Wednesday, Nov. 3. A state mediator has not been called in, and the board is sticking by its demand for a wage freeze.

• **OVID-ELSIE** — Teachers have requested a state mediator to get stalled talks moving again. The board is sticking by its demand for a wage freeze.

• **FOWLER** — Negotiations will resume Nov. 8. The board is standing by demands for a wage freeze, and no mediator has been requested.

said the strike deadline was targeted with availability of State Mediator E. J. Connors in mind. Connors, who has mediated recent sessions, is free on Nov. 11, he said, and the board could call an 11th-hour meeting to avert a strike. "It's up to them now," Congleton said.

Scheduled to meet the same day are DeWitt teachers, who are threatening to walk out Monday, Nov. 15. Represented by Michigan Education Association (MEA) UniServ Director Tash Sogg, they will try to work out a contract with DeWitt School Board negotiator John Prevost and avert a strike.

"We're down to salary and insurance," Prevost said, "but, then, salary is a pretty big item, isn't it." He said teachers are asking for a five percent raise the first semester, and three percent the second semester. The board, he said, has asked teachers to accept only the step increases they would receive under last year's contract.

The 5-3 raise package is "baloney," Prevost said, and contains hidden costs. "They don't sound like much to the average guy on the street, but when those raises compound, they can be really expensive." The three percent raise is figured using salaries already increased by five percent, he explained, and what sounds like an eight percent total actually is much higher.

But the same package was approved for teachers in Holt and Mason, Ms. Sogg said, and there is no question the board can afford it.

In DeWitt, lack of money is not an issue. Negotiators on both sides accuse the other side of foot-dragging and stalling negotiations, but both sides agree the system can afford the raises teachers are requesting.

"I have a feeling they want to zero-in on DeWitt because DeWitt has a good, sound fund equity," Prevost said. "But the reason for that fund equity is that the board has taken some prudent steps and made some drastic cuts. They haven't done this just so they can turn around and give it to any union."

"We see no reason for not settling. We're not asking for all the money," Ms. Sogg replied.

DeWitt teachers plan to picket a Nov. 8 school board meeting, and are expected to call a strike vote soon after the Nov. 11 negotiating session, according to Ms. Sogg. President of the DeWitt Education Association Leila Congleton was out of town and could not be reached. But her husband, SJEA President Gerry Congleton, said DeWitt teachers will walk off the job Monday, Nov. 15 if the Nov. 11 negotiating session is not successful.

"They have been authorized to take a strike vote," Ms. Sogg confirmed. "But their decision will be contingent upon what happens at the negotiating session."

# Superintendent candidates narrowed to just nine

By Friday, 65 candidates for St. Johns School superintendent will have been narrowed to three, and a final round of interviews will begin.

According to St. Johns Board of Education President Robert Craig, a series of interviews ending Tuesday night will be used to make the final cut from nine candidates to three. The final three candidates will be announced at a board meeting Wednesday night, Nov. 10, he said.

The nine candidates interviewed Friday, Saturday, Monday and Tuesday are: Dr. Thomas Mercer, assistant superintendent of Grand Haven Public Schools; Dr. Jerry Herman, West Bloomfield Public Schools

superintendent; Len Shafley, superintendent of Airport Community Schools in Carleton, Monroe County; Robert Pobuda, Hartford Schools superintendent; David Smoker, Fowlerville Public Schools superintendent; Dr. Thor Petersen, superintendent of Lakeville Community Schools in Otisville, north of Lapeer; J. P. Ryan, superintendent of Holton Public Schools, north of Muskegon; Earl Gabriel, superintendent of North Dearborn Heights Public Schools; and Steve Bakita, St. Johns Public Schools administrator and athletic director.

Craig said the 90 minute interviews were open to the public, and 10 minutes was reserved during each interview for questions from the audience.

Craig said the board would be checking credentials of

the final three during the weeks ahead, and may have to remove one or replace a candidate with one from the final nine.

"We have targeted Dec. 1 as the day we would like to have our offer made to our final choice, but it's hard to say how long it will take to do some checking. We want to talk to board members they have worked with, leading citizens and others."

Craig said he and other board members will draw up a list of their top three choices and mail them to him by Friday, Nov. 5. "I hope we all agree," he said. "We have had just some outstanding candidates"

Final hiring is expected by mid-December, he said. The new superintendent should be on the job by mid-January to replace outgoing Superintendent Don Burns, whose retirement is effective Jan. 31.

# Martinized — Marauders run past DeWitt

We've all heard about DeWitt's Jim Seegraves. Big, tough player. All-state candidate. Wanted by several colleges.

But Ovid-Elsie's Jon Martin? Where did he come from? And what business did he have scoring three touchdowns to upset the Panthers last Friday, 22-20?

"Jon has been getting stronger in every game," O-E coach Russ Pope said. "He's just getting back in form after separating his shoulder in the Chesaning game."

Martin and Seegraves put on an awesome offensive show at O-E's stadium, each scoring three TDs. Martin, a 6-3, 195-pound junior, had 101 yards on 15 carries, not to mention a 77-yard fumble return for a score.

The 6-3, 205-pound Seegraves had "the best game of his life," according to DeWitt coach Gail Thornton, picking up 145 yards on 25 carries and making 19 tackles from his linebacker spot.

But in the end, it all came down to a two-point conversion try. The Panthers had battled back from a



22-6 halftime deficit for two touchdowns, making it 22-20. Thornton elected to have junior tailback Tom Deak, who had sat out most of the game with an injury, run for the two-pointer.

"We came up one foot short," Thornton said. Indeed, the O-E defense stiffened when it had to and stopped Deak short of the goal line. The loss dropped DeWitt to 6-2 on the year, severely hindering its state playoff hopes.

"I do feel sorry for Gail Thornton, because I wanted to see him make the playoffs this year," Pope said. "But he wasn't going to do it at the expense of my team."

The win was the second in a row for the Marauders, pping their record to 3-5 on the season. After a season in which they lost five games in a row, the win was a sweet one.

O-E got on the board first in the game, when Martin ran it in from one yard out. The extra-point kick by Pete Hurst made it 7-0.

But not for long. On the ensuing kickoff, Seegraves, who was returning kicks in place of Deak, took the ball on the 15 and headed upfield. Eighty-five yards later, he found himself in the end-zone.

"That was simply a beautiful return," Thornton said. "After looking at the films, we noticed that there were about four excellent blocks which did it."

The two-point conversion try was stopped, however, leaving the score 7-6.

The Marauders added to their lead in the second quarter, when a pass-interference call on a Hurst-to-Kevin Baese throw gave O-E the ball on the DeWitt one. Martin plunged in from there for the TD. The kick gave O-E a 14-6 lead.

Then came the most interesting play of the game. As DeWitt was driving for a score late in the half, Panther QB Ken Rajala made a good pitch to Deak. Deak couldn't find the handle on the ball, however, and it squirted in the air, landing in the hands of Martin, who sprinted 77 yards for the score. A two-point conversion by Craig Coleman made it 22-6.

The Panthers came out roaring after the intermission, scoring on two one-yard runs by

Seegraves, but the missed two-pointer gave O-E the win.

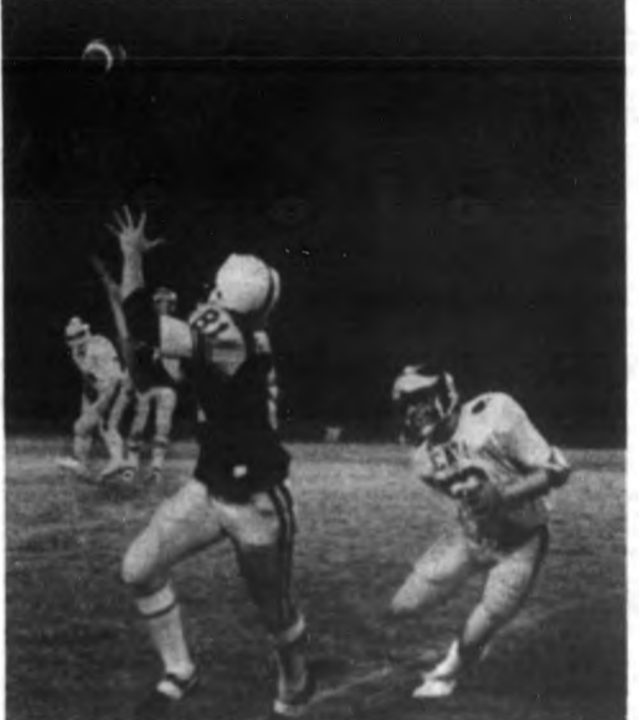
"I was really proud of the way we came back after halftime," Thornton said. "Our kids haven't had to do that all year. But I have to give a lot of credit to Ovid-Elsie. No one has run or scored on us like that all year. The most points we had given up this season was seven, and we only did that once."

Pope had words of praise for the Panthers, and Seegraves in particular. "Seegraves is definitely an all-state performer," Pope said. "His performance against us sure didn't hurt him any."

Statistically, the Marauders were led by Martin and Hurst, who had 69 yards rushing, but just four-of-11 passing for 52 yards. O-E piled up 283 yards total offense to DeWitt's 220.

On defense, Jeff Sovis piled up 20 tackles and an interception to lead O-E. Steve Gardner added 18 stops and an interception, while Todd Meadows had 12 tackles.

The Marauders will close out the season with a rare Saturday game at Linden. "They're going to be a tough team to beat," Pope said, noting Linden's win over Okemos last week.

The way St. Johns is playing, those two losses on the Redwings' record could be wins now.

Mt. Pleasant became the latest victim of the Red Machine last Friday, losing a decisive 34-0 battle to St. Johns. It was the sixth straight win for the Redwings after the two season-opening losses.

"It wasn't really as easy as the score indicates," St. Johns coach Joe Gonzales said. "It was only 7-0 at halftime, before we came out firing in the second half."

Mt. Pleasant actually had a chance to get on the board first. The home squad recovered a St. Johns fumble on the Redwings' 37-yard line, driving all the way to the one-foot line. Mt. Pleasant had two chances to ram it in from there, but on fourth down, Redwing linebacker Tim Moore hit the running back at the line of scrimmage and got the ball back for St. Johns.

"That was the play of the game," Gonzales said. "If they had scored, it could have been a whole different game."

But it wasn't, as St. Johns rolled to five straight touchdowns to up its record to 6-2. Quarterback Steve Gonzales scored the first three TDs for the Redwings. The first was a 28-yard run in the second quarter, set up by John Keenoy's pass interception.

Gonzales' next two scores came in the third quarter, on runs of three and seven yards. Jamie Werbish booted all three extra points. Having by far his best game of the year, Gonzales finished with 97 yards rushing on 15 carries and 37 yards on two-of-five passing.

"Steve really had an excellent game," coach Gonzales said. "They were keying on (Todd) Elsea, so that took away our of-tackle play. But they gave us the outside plays, so we let Steve run the ball more."

St. Johns scored in the fourth quarter on a one-yard run by Elsea, followed by a Jess Bendixen extra point, and a one-yard pass from backup QB Brub Zamarron to Tim Hyde. Zamarron missed the extra-point try, however.

Elsea finished the game with 35 yards on 10 carries, while Bruce Riley had 46 yards on seven tries and Chris Loucks 66 yards on just four carries.

"Riley had a good game, both offensively and defensively, in the second half," Gonzales said. "No one really played well in the first half. There were several college scouts watching, and I think some of our kids were nervous."

Defensively, St. Johns had another banner game, led by Moore's 18 tackles. Riley had 12 stops, while Jeff Hayes and Chad Munger chipped in seven apiece. Ross Pope and Eric Slamka each had six stops.

"The defense is finally learning (defensive coordinator) Garry Grady's scheme," Gonzales said. "They're finally coming of age."

St. Johns will close out the season tomorrow night against 1-7 Grand Ledge. Gonzales is quick to point out, however, that the Comets' record doesn't tell the whole story. "That record is very deceiving," he said. "They've barely lost several games this year. They've been right in every game. This game is big for us, because for years, this was our main rivalry."

"We're going to be severely tested this week."

# The Pirates get their kicks in win over Portland

Pewamo-Westphalia's game against Portland last Friday was an unusual one.

Not because P-W won, 39-7. The Pirates have done a lot of winning this year. It was unique because the Pirates kicked not one, but three field goals in the game. That's three more than they've kicked all year.

"We unveiled our kicking game," P-W coach Mike Folk said with a laugh.

In reality, most of the kicks were to avoid running up the score by making touchdowns. One of the field goals came on a first down play and another came at the end of the first half, when the Pirates had the ball on the two-yard line and still had plenty of time to run it in.

In any case, the victory over Class B Portland upped P-W's record to 7-1 on the year and kept a slim hope for the state playoffs alive.

The Pirates scored first on a 40-yard pass from Td Droste to Jeff Spitzley on the third play of the game. George Heckman scored the two-point conversion. The next score was a 52-yard run by Tom Schafer, set up by a 28-yard Heckman run.

P-W added to its total in the first half with a two-yard run by Schafer and a 22-yard field goal by Spitzley. The field goal was set up by two passes, of 14 and 20 yards, from Droste to Jim Weber. That

gave P-W a 25-0 halftime lead.

Portland came back in the third quarter, as John Rock recovered a fumble by Schafer on the opening kickoff and ran it to the P-W two. Bill Nowack scored from there.

The Pirates came back, though, scoring on a four-yard run by Dean Pohl, along with a 25-yard field goal by Spitzley and a 23-yarder by Dennis Kolp.

In addition to a fine offensive outing, P-W also got some outstanding defensive performances. Senior tackle Dan Thelen had his usual team-leading performance, piling up 15 tackles. "Dan only played in

the first half, really," Folk said. "He's just been an outstanding football payer for us all year. He's worked harder than anyone on this team."

Mark Miller, also seeing action primarily in the first half before the reserves came in, picked up 11 tackles and caused a fumble.

Folk and his Pirates close out the season tomorrow on the road at Carson City, a team sporting a 6-2 record. "They have fairly good size, including one kid who goes 230 pounds," Folk said. "I don't think Carson City is as good as Fowler, but we're expecting a very tough game."

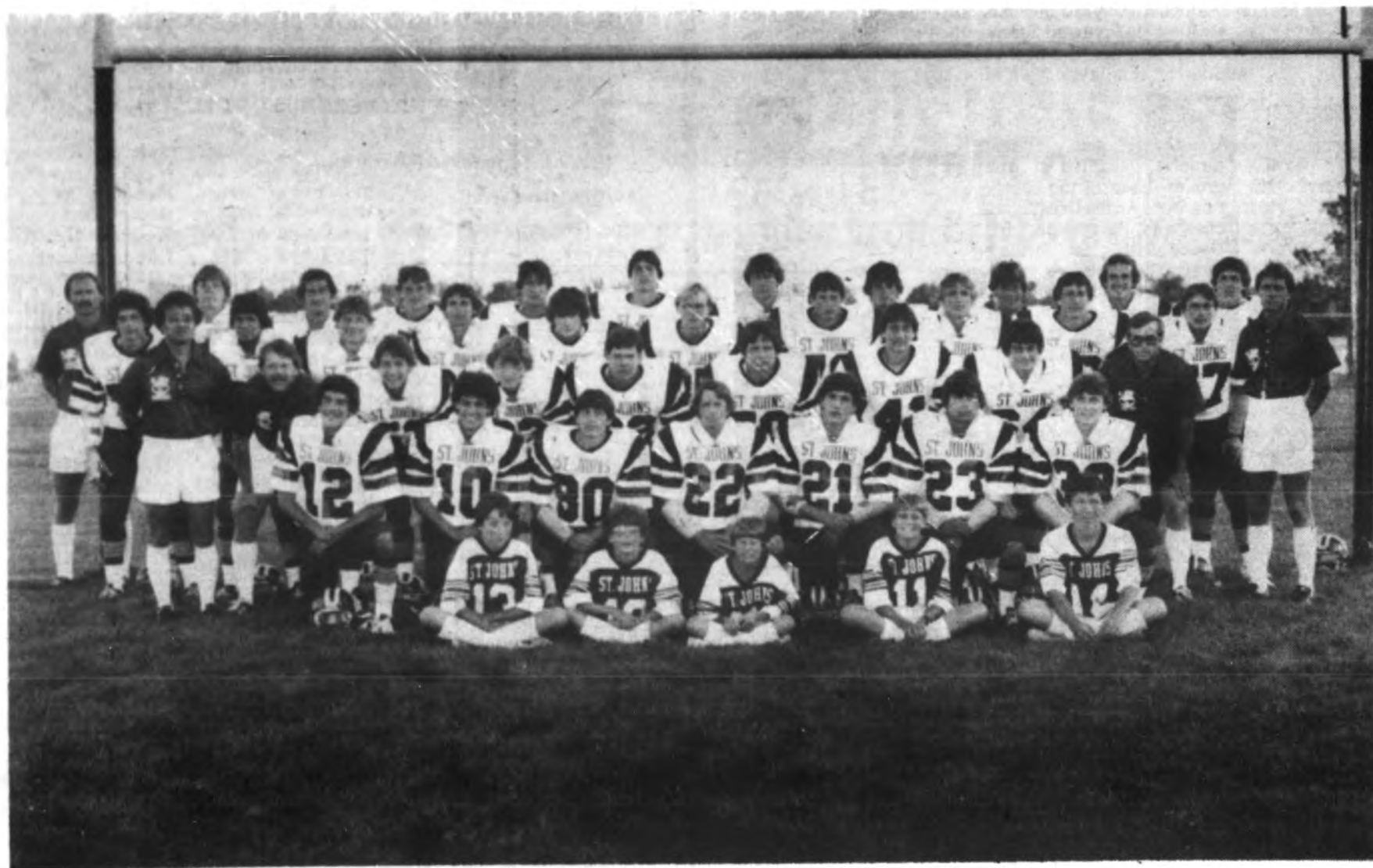

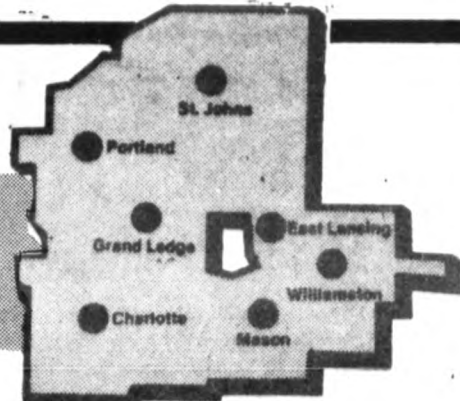
