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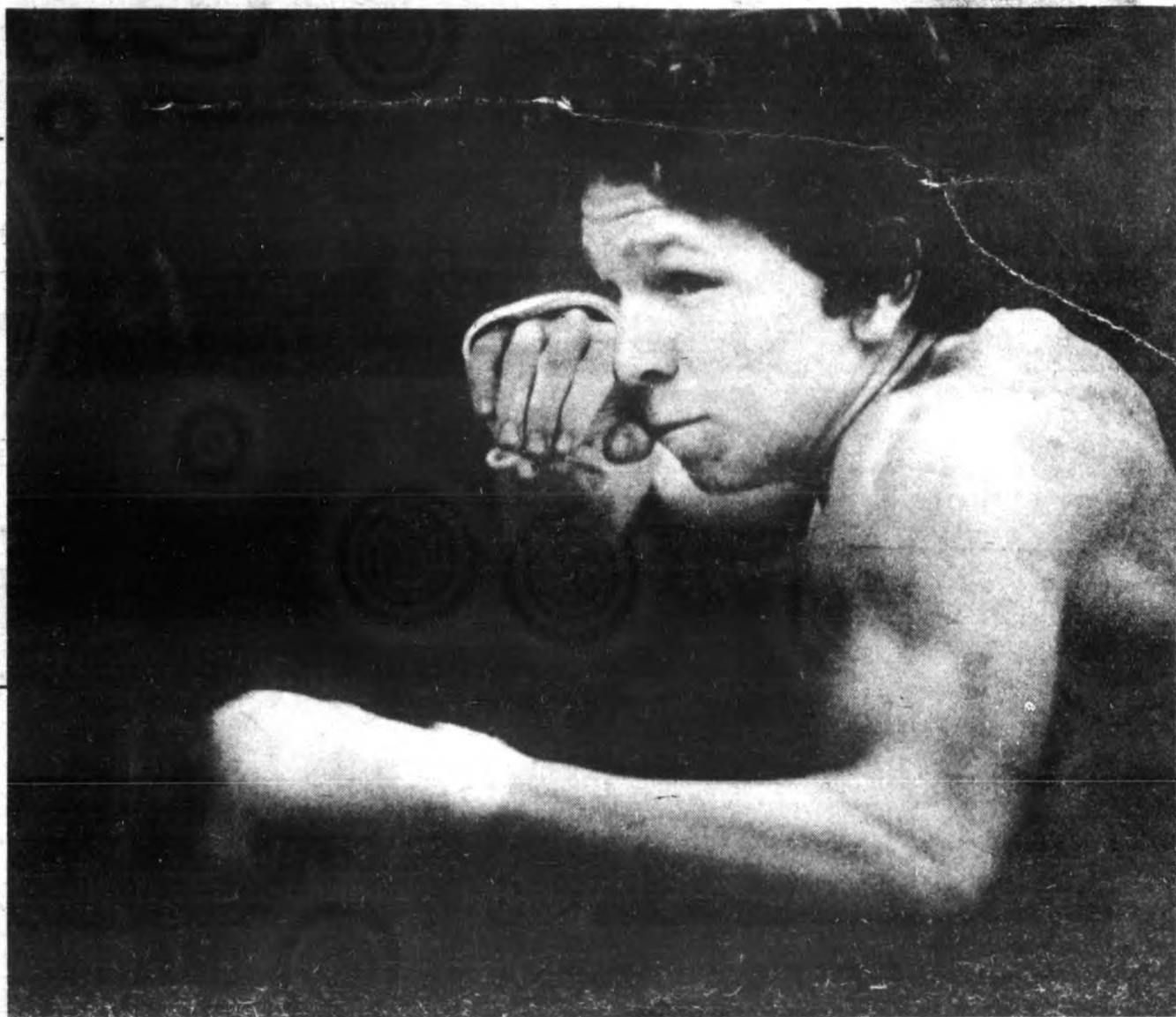

Cable company televises team

Redwings ready for prime time

For better or for worse, when St. Johns High School's Redwings tip off against Ionia Friday night, their fast-breaks and freethrows, rebounds and back-court fouls will be recorded for posterity. The next day, they'll be among the first in mid-Michigan to dribble a basketball into the living rooms of local cable television customers.

Television coverage of the Redwings' home basketball games was approved by the St. Johns Board of Education during a meeting Wednesday night, Dec. 9. Under a two-page contract with the school system, Clinton County Community Television will broadcast delayed taped film of the Jan. 8 game on channel two of Omega Cablevision, Inc. According to the agreement, the approximately 8 p.m. basketball game can be broadcast 18 hours later, or at about 2 p.m. Saturday, at the earliest.

"This is an experiment and we're going to try to do the best we can," Charlie McLravy, general manager of WQTK said. McLravy, who described his agreement with Clinton County Community Television owner Mark Holden as a joint venture, said his station will provide the play-by-play voice-over for the cable telecasts. WQTK already broadcasts live coverage of Redwing games, and tapes of the radio broadcasts will simply be synchronized with televised tapes, he said.

"The play-by-play will be the audio part of our radio broadcasts so the breaks (for advertising) should come at natural points," he said.

Most advertiser interest has come from sports-related businesses and advertisers owned by parents of basketball players, McLravy said, but if the games become popular, the broadcasts should be in the black by the latter part of the basketball season.

"We've invested a substantial amount and our intent is that it will eventually break even," he said. "We're doing it as an experiment to see what the local interest is in local programming. You can't get any more local than high school sports."

Eventually, if Holden's and McLravy's dreams come true, cable customers will be able to tune-in to high school football games and local news as well as basketball, McLravy said.

Meanwhile, the pair is buying broadcasting equip-

ment and has agreed to pay the cable franchise for use of channel two. They also must pay the school system \$14 for access to each game — a fee which rankles with a former partner in Clinton County Community Television, Bill Stoller.

Stoller, who says he sold his share of the venture to his former partner Holden as "a matter of principal," insists the school has no right to charge a fee for TV access to games while allowing local radio and newspapers to cover the events free.

In a letter to the school board signed by Stoller and "speaking also for Mark Holden," Stoller called the board "shortsighted." The former station manager at WQTK, now advertising salesman for the Clinton County news and the DeWitt-Bath Review, asked the board, "How can you sell something to Clinton County Community Television for any amount, no matter how small, when you so freely give it to ... another local broadcaster (WQTK radio)."

Stoller said he and Holden were assured by board members privately in advance of negotiations that they would be treated on an equal basis with other broadcast media, but that the board reneged on those promises and "chose to take the narrow view of control and regulation, in an inequitable manner at that."

Superintendent of Schools Donald Burns said the board plans to draft an agreement with the local radio station next year, but that no formal contract exists with other media covering high school sports. "If there is some unfairness, it isn't the result of any intention on the part of the board," he said.

The delay in broadcast was necessary to insure that televised games wouldn't have an adverse effect on ticket sales, he said, and the \$14 per game charge was determined to reimburse the board for the cost of attorney fees for consultation on the question of access by cable TV.

The present contract is valid only for the remainder of the basketball season, and a new contract may increase fees if other teams in the league agree to a standard access fee as expected, Burns said.

Whatever the future of Clinton County Community television, McLravy believes the first broadcast this weekend could make history.

"As far as we know this is the first of its kind," he said.



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Fatal crash and thefts mar holiday

A Petosky woman was dead at the scene of a two-car accident at the intersection of M-21 and Main Street in Fowler at 1:30 p.m., Dec. 30, Clinton County Sheriff deputies report.

Ann Angus, 63, of 3660 Resort Pike, Petosky, was northbound on Main Street when she apparently ran a red light and entered the intersection in front of a car driven by Karen Gillespie, 29, of 5960 N. US-27, St. Johns. Ms. Gillespie, eastbound on M-21, was unable to stop and crashed into the driver's side of the vehicle driven by Ms. Angus. Attempts made at the scene to revive Ms. Angus were unsuccessful and she was taken to Spar-

row Hospital where an autopsy was performed, deputies said. Ms. Gillespie was not injured, reports said.

A number of larcenies were also investigated by the sheriff department last week.

George Wizner of 7304 Round Lake Road, Lingsburg, reported that sometime between last September and Dec. 29, several items of jewelry were stolen from a jewelry box in his residence. The missing items, valued at \$850, included four rings, a gold necklace and a gold pocket watch.

Vocational programs jeopardized by cash cuts

Where do Clinton County students go when they want to learn how to build a house, cut and style hair or repair an automobile? Most students would say to the Shared Time program in St. Johns.

However, Clinton County Shared Time programs are hanging in limbo and their future lies in the hands of six supporting school districts, according to Jay Johnson, coordinator of the vocational education programs.

Although the shared time program is one of five priorities of area high school administrators for the 1982-83 school year, the continuation of vocational education in Clinton County may hinge on how well local schools fare on millage issues.

"All the districts are in financial trouble," said Johnson. "Even though vocational education is on a priority list, no one is making any promises."

Each of the six schools — St. Johns, Ovid-Elsie, Bath, DeWitt, Fowler, and Pewamo-Westphalia — own one-sixth of the program. The vocational education concept utilizing the six districts began 10 years ago at St. Johns High School, and involves adults, handicappers and junior and senior high school students.

In July of 1978, the Intermediate School District took over the vocational education program, calling it Shared Time, and the six school districts signed contracts saying they would participate in the program for five years. Each school has an allotted number of slots which varies depending on the size of the school district. The 1981-82 school year is the last year of the contract.

The contract, in essence, says that during the five year period if any of the districts dropped out of the program they would still be responsible for the tuition of the students they sent.

But uncertain of their budgets for the 1982-83 school year, most districts won't make a commitment, leaving participants and instructors in a quandry.

Any of the districts may drop out of the Shared Time program prior to June. However, according to Johnson, the various districts will not make any promises until after their millage elections in June.

Another problem facing the program is that teacher contracts require that they be advised of termination of the program 60 days prior to June, Johnson said.

"This is the worst predicament the program has been in," he said. "We have a chance, but no one knows for sure what's going to happen."

There are 215 students enrolled in Shared Time classes for this school year, and students normally begin signing up for classes in February and March, Johnson said. This causes a problem for principals, he said, because they are going to need two schedules: one with vocational education and one without.

The Intermediate School District rents the building on Higham Street in St. Johns which houses the Shared Time programs.

"If we lose the building, we won't get it back," said Johnson. "The only other way would be to start a Skills Center, but that was turned down by the voters in 1978."

DeWitt does have some students who go to Lsing Community College for vocational education through some slots made available by the Eaton County School District. However, they only get what's left over.

"Even if there were extra slots available at LCC, that would be a long haul for Pewamo-Westphalia and Ovid-Elsie students," added Johnson.

Presently there are five vocational programs being offered to students. They include: auto mechanics, building trades (in this class students build houses which are sold on the open market), cosmetology, food service and health assistance.

Because of budget cuts, auto body, health occupations, two sections of auto mechanics and one section of cosmetology were dropped from the curriculum. There are presently seven teachers, four parttime aides, one

administrator, one secretary, and one parttime custodian on the payroll. According to Johnson, one auto mechanic instructor and one cosmetology teacher were lost due to cuts resulting from lack of funds.

"We have never had any problems filling up the classes," said Johnson. "The cuts were due to dollar and cents not lack of interest."

Johnson explained that two years ago when one section of the cosmetology was eliminated, 30 students had to be cut from the program. Those wishing to enroll in the class had to be screened. In the health assistance course, several students had to be turned down.

For the 1982-83 school year Fowler has 17 slots available; Bath, 22; DeWitt, 24; Ovid-Elsie, 41; Pewamo-Westphalia, 28 and St. Johns, 50.

"Vocational education is becoming more and more important because only 30 percent of the high school graduates go on to college," Johnson said. "Voc ed is one way to get a job."

To substantiate this statement, Johnson produced data which showed 65.5 percent of the students who took the auto mechanics course went on to find full or parttime work in that field or took related college courses. In building trades, 48 percent of the students obtained related work following graduation; in cosmetology, 68 percent; food service, 44 percent; and in health assistance, 100 percent of the students either obtained jobs or went on to further their education in a health related field, Johnson said.

"Clinton County is higher than the state average with its percentage of students obtaining related employment or furthering their education," he said.

The coordinator noted that the students should be given a lot of credit for their efforts, stating the students in outlying areas are on the bus by 7 a.m. for 7:30 a.m. classes.

"The big thing the students get out of the classes in addition to training is a sense of self-worth and self confidence," he said. "For example, in cosmetology they can see a job completed by the work they've done."

Students learn other skills also, he said. While a student may be in a building trades class learning house construction, he also uses math and reading skills. And in auto mechanics classes, students use reading skills to understand complicated instructions. In cosmetology, students learn anatomy, chemistry, electricity, management skills, business records and salesmanship.

"The standards are high," said Johnson. "Passing has to be 100 percent ... either the car runs or it doesn't."

Tuition for each student is \$850, Johnson said, and the total projected tuition for the 1982-83 school year is \$156,000. This excludes the building trades program, because its cost depends on what student-built houses sell for on the open market.

The 1978 enrollment for Shared Time programs was 340 students, but today the figure has dropped to 215, and Johnson estimates \$100,000 was lost in tuition along with \$33,000 lost in state aid as a result.

Johnson noted that if one of the schools dropped out of the program, they could still operate, but at a higher cost. This, in turn, would probably cause a problem for other districts who could not afford to pay the higher costs.

"We've done everything we can to cut costs," he said. "Now we'll just have to wait and see."

Two held for forgery

All ears for a new view

What a way to start a new year -- a new job in a new office in a new town with all new news to cover.

Although all news is "new" by definition, some is newer. After being on a certain beat long enough, a reporter becomes accustomed to looking at recurring stories in the same way, and a fraction of their objectivity is lost in the process.

I'll be getting a chance to test the validity of this theory as I begin covering news in St. Johns and Clinton County as Managing Editor of the Clinton County News and DeWitt-Bath Review, a job I accepted almost a month ago and started just this week.

Maybe a word or two about myself is in order here.

For the past two years, as editor of the Charlotte Republican Tribune, my beat has been Eaton County. There, covering county government, local government and schools, police, fires and politics -- not necessarily in that order -- along with many stories that simply don't fall into any category, I've developed friends and "sources," as they're known in the news business.

These people have made my job easier by cooperating and trusting me to tell their side of the story. The problem, however, is that sometimes, dependable sources can make a reporter's job too easy. If helpful spokespersons are overused, they tend to tint certain stories with the color of their own viewpoint.

We all have a tendency to get set in our ways and develop habits in our jobs. But in journalism, where we

strive for objectivity and an unbiased viewpoint, habits can be an occupational hazard.

Pretty soon the guy who calls each spring to complain about his storm drains, or the citizen who regularly lodges vigorous protests to local government bodies, become a matter of routine. Once that happens, the complaints become stale and the protests lose credibility. If familiarity breeds contempt, listening to the same story over and over leaves reporters with a deaf ear.

The process is so gradual, though, that it can sometimes go undetected for years until the shock of a comment from someone with a fresh viewpoint forces a rude awakening. Other times, I suspect, attitudes become so ingrained not even a point-blank blast of reality can shake them loose.

We in this business do our best to avoid bringing preconceived attitudes and opinions to news stories, but when you've done something before, you're bound to bring some memories along when you do it again (and again and again in the case of stories about longstanding feuds and unresolved disputes).

So now I find myself bringing a fresh viewpoint, I hope, to another county. This, of course, has its risks. But the rewards of meeting new people and tackling new challenges and stories far outweigh them.

I look forward to covering Clinton County's news and getting to know the people behind the stories. As a journalist, I try to be objective and hope I can provide our

readers with the information they need to participate in their community. I believe local news stories should be thorough, yet interesting and readable; as a weekly paper, we can take the time to present many sides to a story and put all of the pieces of the puzzle together to form a clear picture.

I also believe we have the responsibility to interpret events through news analysis and editorials. We are your eyes and ears at many meetings and events and when we perceive problems or conflicts, it is our responsibility to inform the community. We will not shrink from taking a strong stand on issues of local concern on our editorial page, but nor will we hesitate to print letters to the editor from those who disagree with us. It is the duty of a newspaper, I believe, to provide a forum for public dialogue.

A weekly paper should also reflect those aspects of life in a community that are the real chronical of human existence: marriages, engagements, club meetings, births and deaths.

But most of all, a newspaper should be flexible enough to meet the demands of its readers and always ready to listen to those demands. If there is an area of the community you would like to see get more news coverage, if you have an idea for a story, if there is something we are doing you don't like, or if you just want to ask questions or get acquainted, give me a call.

I'll be glad to listen.

Chamber notes

Summertime in January? Hardly, but an out-of-state group is working in Michigan selling worm farms. According to a bulletin from the Cooperative Extension Service, the group's sales technique indicates that you can raise worms for them in your backyard, garage or basement for profit.

Their pitch stresses that with a small investment (\$2,700 to \$6,000), you can make \$3,000 to \$5,000 the first year and \$7,000 to \$10,000 the second. According to the Fisheries Cooperative Extension Specialist, Don Garling, to really hook the consumer the group impresses their prospective buyers with the time element -- they say it takes 30 minutes to an hour each day to maintain the business.

In addition, they provide professional guidance concerning what to do, how to do it and even promise to help with the first "harvest." Verbally, they agree to buy back all of the worms produced. They have three markets: fish bait, municipal composting waste treatment plants and the animal and human food market.

All the buyer needs to do to get "in" on this venture is to sign the contract and pay in cash or certified check before the sales representatives leave the area. Garling says the sales group has come through Ingham, Eaton and Shiawassee counties.

The extension specialist notes that "...these operations historically make money for the franchisers, but the markets they are describing are either saturated (fish bait) or non-existent (composting and food)."

Since the initial investment return depends on the first year's harvest, your franchiser or sales people need to be available at that time. Often at the end of the year, the company you bought the business from is gone or they won't take your worms because they don't meet "specifications."

Many times unscrupulous businesses will have a good business rating from the Better Business Bureau or Dunn and Bradstreet because they fulfill their contractual agreements. The verbal promises are not a legal part of the contract so any complaints are dismissed.

Anyone who thinks they can successfully develop a worm farm should call the Michigan Department of Commerce, Corporations and Securities Division, Enforcement Section or the Consumer Complaint Division of the Attorney General's Office. The Corporations and Securities Division can deal with franchise validity and the Consumer Complaint Division deals with consumer protection. Either of these agencies can answer your questions.

The Cooperative Extension Service does provide a

bulletin on the "how to" aspects of worm farming, but their advice on marketing, except as fish bait at a local bait stand, is that it is impossible.

I am sure there are ways to make money selling worms, but be sure to thoroughly check out any business deals through proper channels and make sure the contract you sign is the same as was presented verbally. After all -- you don't want to be left with a can (or garage or basement) of worms.

Extension news

"A factor that will continue to influence price rise, however, will be the volume of this year's crop," says John Ferris, Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service agricultural economist.

CORN

Markets should rise seasonally and bring the average price to around \$2.50 for Michigan farmers. This would be about 50 cents less per bushel than prices received for the 1980 crop. For this reason and a possible set-aside program, fewer acres will likely be planted to corn next spring.

Farm level prices for 1982 corn should average near \$3 per bushel and the \$3.15 release level under the farm-owned grain reserve should be reached.

SOYBEANS

Farm prices are expected to average just over \$6 for the 1981 crop, with meal prices at Decatur around \$180 per ton, with some pickup in demand in 1982-83, the farm

price of soybeans in 1982 should be close to \$7.

Because the growth in domestic crush and exports in 1981-82 is not expected to equal the increase in production, carryover is expected to accumulate to 430 million bushels at the end of this crop year. This would be a record carryover equivalent to 20 percent of annual utilization.

WHEAT

The bear in the grain bins continues to be wheat. Prices in 1982 are expected to average around \$4.25, some 50 cents higher than the 1981 crop.

Farm prices on the 1981 crop will average around \$3.75, about a quarter under the previous year. USDA intends to implement a 15 percent acreage reduction in the 1982 crop, contingent upon new farm legislation. Even with this reduction, there will still be a 2.5 billion bushel crop.

It appears that the loan rate for 1982 will be about \$3.55 with a target of \$4.05, based on the latest version of the farm bill. This compares with the \$3.20 regular loan and \$3.81 target on the 1981 crop.

Personality Profile

Vivacious musician, song writer turns folk to gold

*"My life flows on, an endless song..."
Above the tumult and the strife,
I hear the music singing.
It sounds an echo in my soul,
How can I keep from singing?"*

The words are from a verse of a traditional folk song sung by Sally Rogers to close her performance Dec. 30 at the Olde World restaurant in East Lansing.

On that bitter cold night, when the town was quiet as students vacationed and residents stayed warm in their homes, Rogers drew to the Olde World a barful of old friends, fans and folk lovers.

They came to hear their local songstress, home from a European tour, to sing in the bars where she began her career.

Though she gave a solo show, accompanying herself on guitar, banjo and dulcimer, hers was not the only voice singing.

In harmony or out of tune, the audience enthusiastically joined in on choruses, verses or any part of the songs they knew.

Yet Rogers' clear, sweet voice rose strongly above the crowd, as she mourned love lost, gave support to political causes, remembered lifestyles past and rejoiced in the emotions she expressed.

*"Do you love an apple?
Do you love a pear?
Do you love a laddie with curly brown hair?
But still I love him, can't deny him, I'll be with him
where ever he goes."*

The vivacious singer quickly established a comfortable rapport with the audience, calling greetings to friends and intertwining her performance with fragments of folklore about the songs she sang.

Since December 1979, Rogers has been a full-time musician, touring this and other countries, recording her first album ("The Unclaimed Pint," released in April 1980 on the Wheatland label), and now she is at work on her second album ("Circle of the Sun," to be released this spring on her own label, Thrushwood Records).

During her visit to East Lansing, she'll perform with the Lost World String Band at a benefit concert for the Ten Pound Fiddle Coffeehouse, the local folksong society which Rogers directed while earning her bachelor degree in music at Michigan State University. The concert will be held Friday, Jan. 8 at 8 p.m. in Williams Hall on campus.

Her "vacation" also includes teaching two dulcimer workshops for the Elderly School of Folk Music, and two more Wednesday night shows at the Olde World.

Though her home is in Bath, Mich. and her mother lives in East Lansing, most of Rogers' time is spent on the road and she was quick to note that her current achievements took a long time to attain.

"I did music for eight years before I went on the road," she said.

The business end of her profession is hard work, she said, and expensive. Rogers does her own bookings by

phone, pays for travel and publicity expenses and for engineers to record her albums.

"Playing is the icing," she said, compared to the work necessary to make a living as a folk musician.

In addition, Rogers said folk music is not commercially popular these days. On her recent tour in Europe, Rogers said that, "The feeling I got while I was in Britain was that they wanted to hear lighter songs, not much heavy, not political music."

Rogers explained this trend, at a time when politics are overflowing Europe, as a sign that folk clubs are getting old.

"A lot of the people going to it are the ones who started it," she said.

And folksong societies in this country are also having financial problems, Rogers said, as they hold benefits to keep their doors open.

"It used to be that you didn't have to do anything to get people there — you could count on it," she said of folk concerts. "But this ain't the '60s."

"There's a danger in thinking that things will get back to what it was," she said. "But with people losing their jobs, and hard times, folk music often ends up being the expression of that."

"Traditional music is not going to die though," she said. "It may not be on the radio, but it was never meant to be."

Rogers said she's been lucky — she's making a living, paying her bills and her record has been "amazingly successful, especially for the first one."

But with all her travels, she's had little time to write music. "The last three songs were written in the driver's seat," she laughed.

In a more serious tone, she said, "I feel the need that I want to write more. There are a lot of songs that need to get out."

In terms of her style, she said she's at a "crossroads" right now and "I'm not sure where I'm going to go."

Yet for a woman, who as a young teen dreamed of singing jazz in the tradition of Serge Mendez, Rogers said, "I've always wanted to be doing what I'm doing now."

For Rogers, folk music provides her "with a sense of being. There's a bit of humanity (in these songs) that's been there longer than anywhere else," she said.

"As they're passed from one person to another, each person preserves parts that are meaningful to them, or that they like," she said. "For years, they (the songs) have been simmered, and the essence remains."

Rogers spoke of this essence as expressing emotions common to people over time.

"Music triggers emotions," she said. "No one kind of music is better than others — jazz, classical, folk — all create emotions in people."

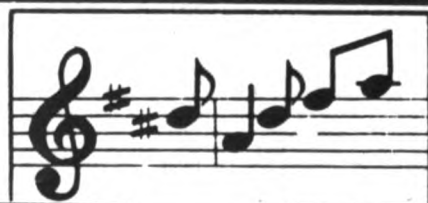

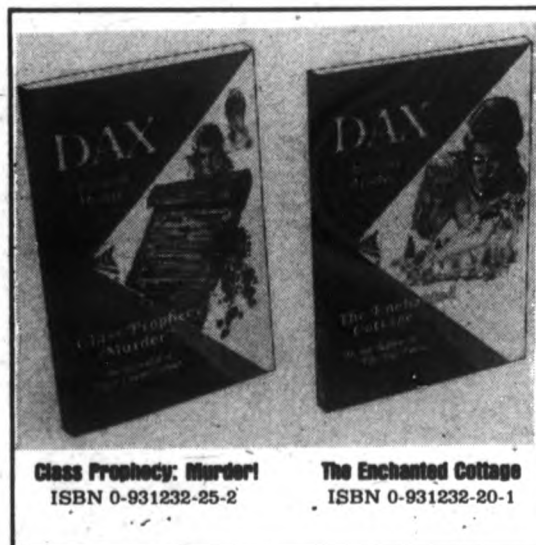

In a gymnasium on the outskirts of St. Johns, 20 young men driven by a determination reminiscent of a Rocky Balboa slug it out in hopes of mastering the skills that may someday take them to the pinnacle of the boxing world — a championship fight.

Under the tutelage of former boxer Dick Padgett, members of the Clinton County Boys' Club meet each week night from November through April in the small clubhouse behind Bee's.

Actual fighting, however, is only a small part of their routine. Padgett leads the young athletes through a series of rugged calisthenics, shadowboxing and individual drills of skill. Like a Dallas Cowboy practice, everything is precise, organized and done with a specific purpose in mind.

While Padgett appears more interested

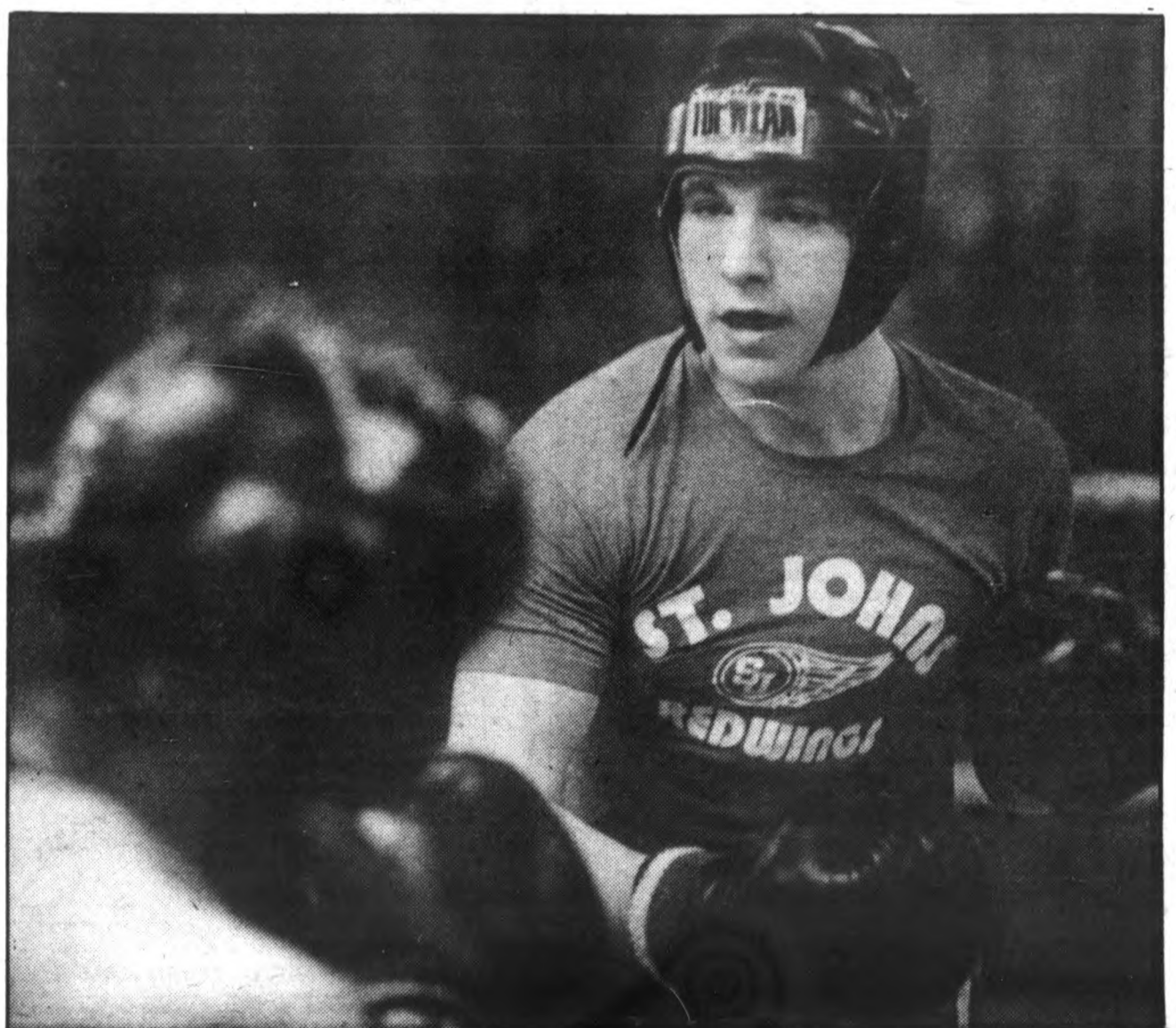
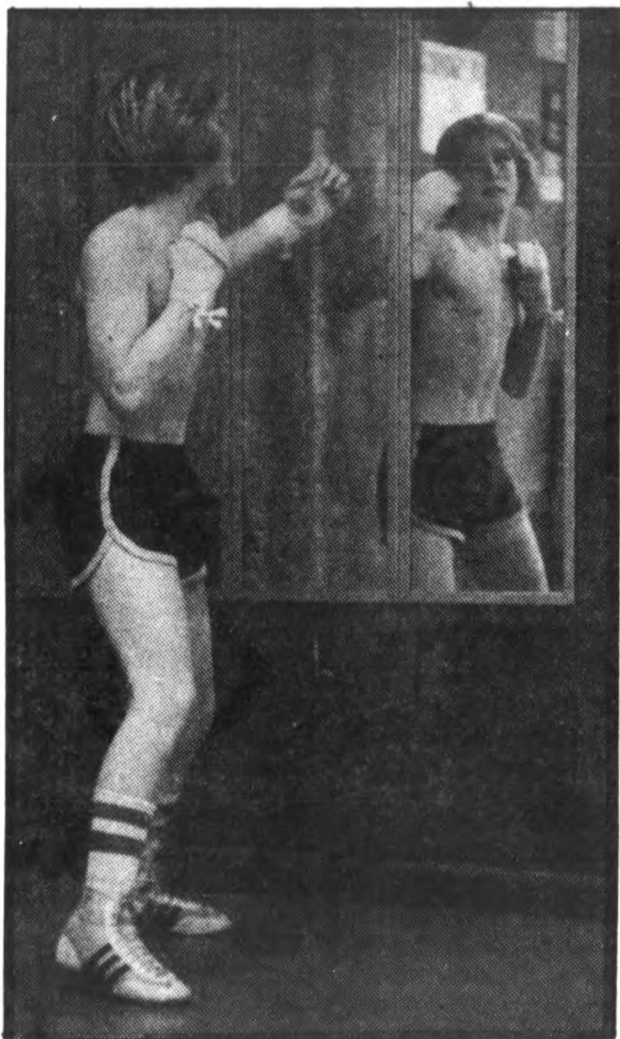
in teaching young men the skills of self-defense than producing world champions, he has had his share of winners.

"I'd rather have these kids take out their aggression in the ring than in the school halls," says Padgett.

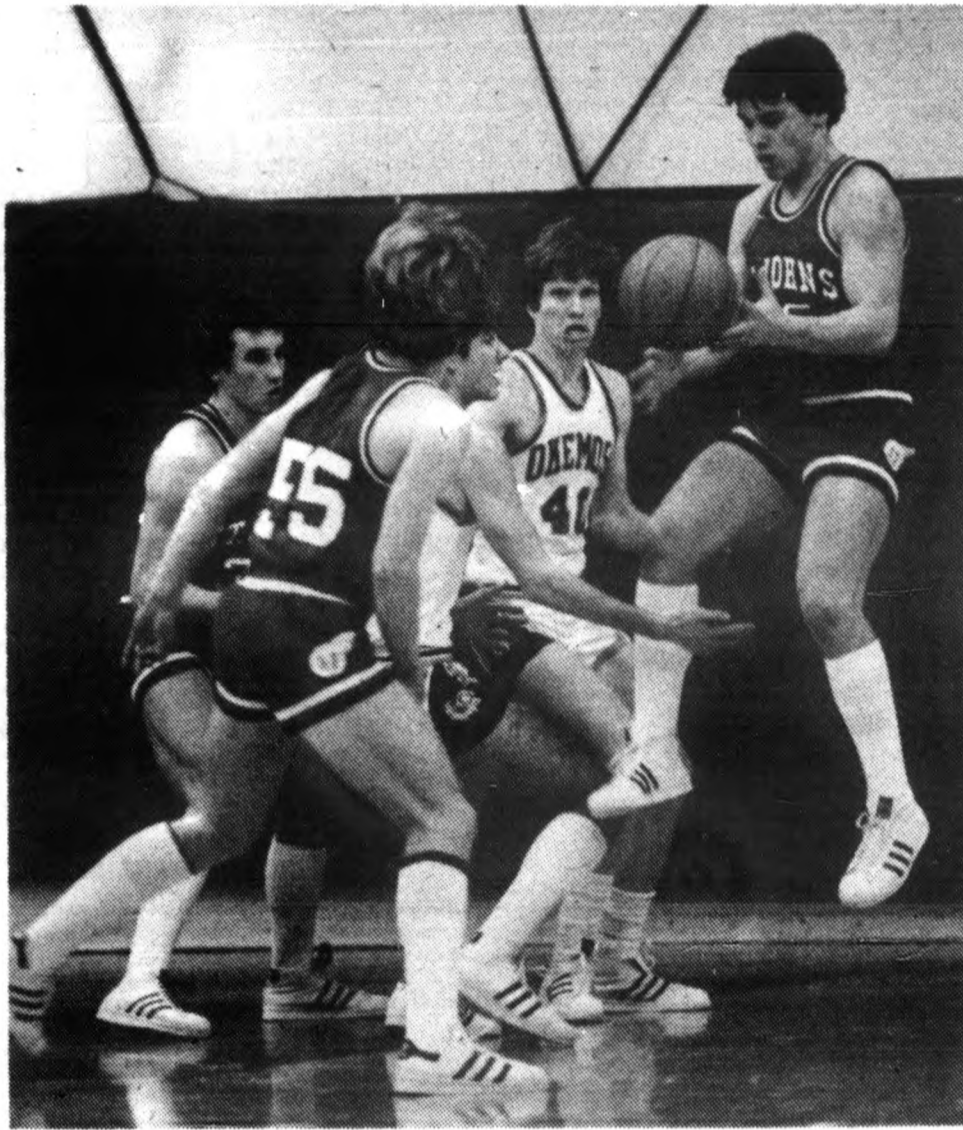

St. Johns now begins an ambitious week of basketball. On Tuesday they travel to undefeated Mt. Pleasant and on Friday they return home to play powerful Ionia.

DeWitt beats Lansing Christian, wins Haslett tournament

DeWitt's basketball team entered the Haslett High School Holiday Invitational knowing they might lose both of their games. They didn't. They came away tournament champions.

It wasn't, however, a breeze. Last Tuesday night the Panthers jumped out in front of Haslett by 13 points in the first half and then had to hang on to win in the second half by an 83-82 margin. Wednesday night they fell behind 22-10 early in the game and had to stage a strong second-half comeback before pulling out a 65-58 win over highly-regarded Lansing Christian.

"The kids are improving," said Panther coach John Blumberg. "We still have to put a whole game together. At times we look good and at times we don't look so good. But we're real excited about the wins. Haslett, Eaton Rapids and Lansing Christian were all excellent teams."

Against Haslett it was the scoring and clutch playing of Tim Deak that made the difference. Deak paced the Panthers with 28 points and nine assists. It was his steal of a Haslett pass, however, and his jump shot with just 10 seconds to go that provided the final one-point margin.

The key to the championship game against Lansing Christian was the fine defensive job DeWitt did against Pilgrim star Jason Peters, according to Blumberg.

"Anytime you hold Peters to 25 points you've done a good job defensively," he said. "We used a box and one in the first half and our normal zone in the second half. Sam Dalman did a great job on Peters. In the box and one he was the man on Peters and in the normal zone he was on Peters' side of the floor. Sam is the only player we have who was quick enough to cover him."

The fine second-half defensive effort held Lansing Christian to just eight baskets in 39 attempts.

"It was an outstanding team effort," said Blumberg. Deak again led DeWitt with 18 points, while Steve Sontich added 17 points and Dalman 10.

Eaton Rapids, a 73-71 loser to Lansing Christian in the opening round, defeated Haslett 79-63 in the consolation game Wednesday night.

DeWitt, which improved its season record to 3-3, now moves into the toughest part of its schedule with successive games against Mason, Ovid-Elsie, Okemos, Grand Ledge and Eaton Rapids.

"They're all outstanding teams," admitted Blumberg.

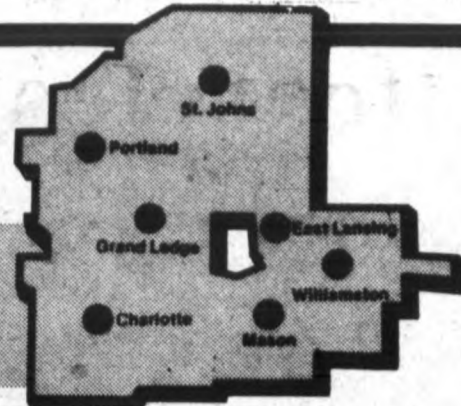

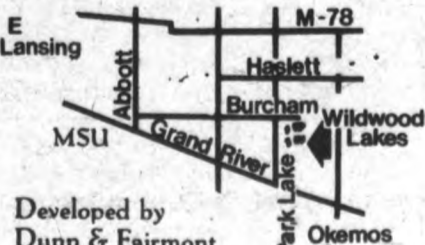
