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## Buses needed, but students and aid declining

# Schools' budget future bleak, Burns tells board

Though healthier than many school systems in the state, St. Johns School District is beginning to show symptoms of succumbing to an almost epidemic Michigan malady: lack of cash.

Thanks to declining enrollment, rising inflation and state funding reductions, the St. Johns school board could find itself forced to reduce programs and staff as other troubled districts have done, Superintendent Donald Burns told board members Wednesday night, Jan. 13.

"We, like many other schools, are going to have a difficult time based on what our revenue is going to be."

Burns predicted. "Nobody really knows," he added, cautioning that his figures were only good guesses, "but if we continue the present programs that we have this year, it appears there will be a \$550,000 to \$700,000 difference in our expenditures and revenues next year."

Pointing to similar problems which have forced about \$1 million worth of reductions in the Grand Ledge School District, Burns warned that St. Johns may soon find itself suffering from similar problems if additional funds are not obtained.

The biggest problem facing the district is declining enrollment, he said. With state aid granted on a per-student basis, any drop in enrollment means fewer dollars for the district. Burns predicted 100 fewer

students would enroll next fall in St. Johns.

But even without fewer students, state aid will be cut as a result of executive orders to reduce the amount of state funds spent on education, he said. Such reductions have been ordered by Governor William Milliken in the past in an effort to reduce state spending, and Milliken is likely to order similar cuts before the 1982-83 school year, Burns warned.

"Based on what we know now, we expect to get \$200,000 less from the state," he said. "That's been pretty much our problem. The State is just not continuing to support education as it did before 1976."

The superintendent explained that since 1976, state aid as a portion of the total school budget has shrunk from 51 percent to 33 percent.

"The local taxpayers and local citizens have to pick up the slack and it couldn't happen at a worse time."

Though there was no mention of requesting a millage increase, Burns said the last increase of 3.5 mills, approved for one year only, will not fund existing programs for the 1982-83 school year. He suggested a work session be scheduled by the board soon, and board president Ron Huard agreed.

"If it's a noon luncheon, we'll have to consider a diet of bullets because we're going to have to bite some," he said. "The handwriting's been on the wall. We're going to have to make some major decisions."

One of those major decisions regards transportation. A report submitted to the board during the same meeting by Director of Transportation Gordon Vandemark indicated the school system "has more buses that need replacing than we do that are good," in the words of one board member.

Vandemark's report says the school system has achieved a reduction in miles-per-day driven by school buses since 1976. At 376.8 miles-per-day, the buses are now traveling 17.6 percent fewer miles than in 1976, while the actual number of pupils riding the buses has declined by nine percent, the report says.

To achieve the lower mileage, Vandemark said, he has increased average school bus capacity from about 59 students in 1976 to just over 68 this year, when buses on some routes have carried as many as 72 students at one time. Students have also been asked to walk to corners, a move the administrative assistant credited with reducing the number of students carried by three percent, and the number of miles travelled by seven percent.

"I don't know how much more we can take away, but will keep trying to contain the cost without sacrificing too much safety, if that is the charge," he said in his report.

The school system presently has 42 buses, including its most recent purchase, a 1980, 84-passenger diesel-powered bus. The remainder are 66-passenger gasoline fueled buses purchased between 1973 and 1980. Mileage on the units ranges from a low of 17,121 to nearly 113,000 miles, the report says.

"The engines and transmissions will last, it's the body shock that's a problem," Vandemark said, citing metal stress hazards. "We need better shocks and radial tires to improve them in the future and we could reduce the body shock."

## Carbon monoxide kills local man

A 22-year-old St. Johns man, Chris A. Bancroft of 305 E. Oak St., was killed Saturday afternoon at his residence while vacuuming his idling auto in a garage, St. Johns Police reports said.

According to Police Chief Lyle French, Bancroft returned from a car wash and parked his auto in a garage at the home of his sister and brother-in-law, where he was living. He apparently left the auto idling in the closed garage as he began to vacuum the interior. Bancroft, believed killed by carbon monoxide poisoning, was found in his car, slumped over the vacuum cleaner hose when others returned home near 2:15 p.m., French said.

Neighbors saw Bancroft return home and told police the windows of his car were fogged as though he had been to a car wash, French said. The chief speculated Bancroft left the car running to defrost his windows.

Bancroft was a 1977 graduate of St. Johns High School and was employed as a carpenter. An autopsy was performed, but results were not yet available Tuesday morning, French said.

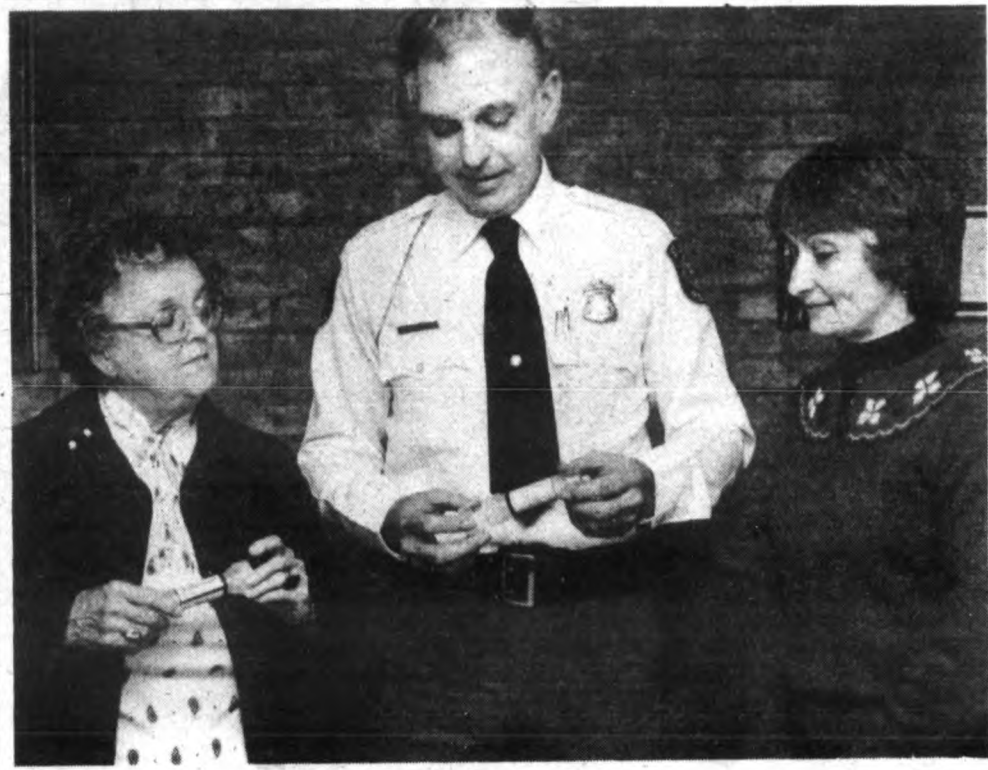

## Program offers vial of life

If you are an elderly person living alone, or someone with a chronic illness or with a physical disability, a Vial of Life is a nationally recognized method of having information readily available for individuals who might not be able to communicate should an emergency arise. With the help of the Sheriff's Department, St. Johns Police Department, area Ambulance Services and Clinton Memorial's Home Health Services, a Vial of Life Program has been initiated by the Community Services Committee of the Clinton Memorial Hospital Development Council.

On Saturday and Sunday, Jan. 30 and 31, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., Vials of Life will be distributed in the Clinton Memorial Hospital Lobby. There will be someone available during those times to assist with completing the medical forms that go into the vials. Everyone picking up a Vial of Life should bring along a complete list of current medications being taken.

The Vial of Life program consists of a medical information sheet placed in a three-inch plastic vial identified with a Vial of Life sticker. The vial should be taken home and strapped or taped under the top shelf in the refrigerator. An additional sticker will be given with each vial. It should be placed on the outside of the refrigerator door. The refrigerator is the universally designated place for the Vial of Life. Emergency personnel are familiar with the program and would not have to search for medical information in purses or wallets which are sometimes not easily located.

"The Vial of Life is available to everyone, but we especially urge those people with any kind of medical problem or disability to take advantage of this program," said Inge Grost, CMH Development Council Community Services chairman.

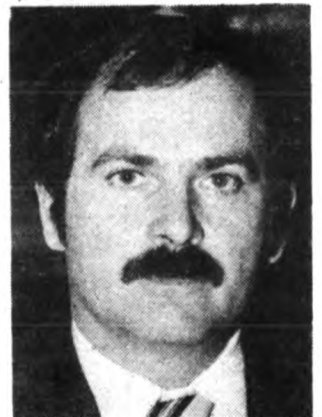
## LSNN appoints general manager

## Landfill lawsuit hearing set

The People's Action League (PAL), longtime foe of Granger Land Development Company's efforts to operate landfills in Clinton County, filed suit Jan. 5 in an attempt to halt dumping of hazardous wastes in southern Clinton County's Watertown Township.

The suit, filed in Ingham County Circuit Court, seeks an injunction to force the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to convene a site review board to determine whether Granger should be allowed to operate a hazardous waste facility at their existing landfill in Clinton County, north of Grand Ledge on North Grand River.

The DNR has been ordered to show cause why the site review board should not be convened at a hearing scheduled for Feb. 26 at 1:30 p.m. before Ingham County Circuit Judge Ray Hotchkiss, according to Ingham County Circuit Court Clerk's records.

Differing opinions as to the interpretation of the Hazardous Waste Management Act, commonly referred to as Act 64, are the basis for the PAL suit. Act 64 requires new hazardous waste facilities to have the approval of a site review board, but exempts existing

facilities that were operating or cleared for construction by Jan. 1, 1980.

According to briefs filed by PAL attorneys, PAL maintains construction of a 26-acre site on Granger property in Watertown Township is a "new proposal," and should be submitted to a site review board. The DNR considers the landfill an "existing facility" which would exempt it from the site-review process.

A site review board is a nine-member panel which must include two representatives from the township and two from the county where the landfill is to be located. It is intended to provide local communities with a role in the decision-making process surrounding construction of hazardous-waste landfills.

Opponents of the Granger landfill maintain that the dumping of hazardous wastes in Watertown Township will contaminate ground water, necessitate expensive cleanup operations and is contrary to the wishes of local residents. Granger contends that adequate safety precautions have been taken to protect adjoining property owners from the leakage of hazardous wastes and that all proper licenses and permits have been obtained.

# Unhappy with service, Fowler serves own lunch

Following several offers and counter-offers, and amid protests from their former food service contractor, Fowler's School Board decided Monday night to pay their bill from Canteen Food Services for hot lunch service during November and December.

The compromise ended a two-month dispute which began in November when the board discovered they were paying \$750 in manager's fees in addition to their \$650-per-month bill for maintaining the program. Ac-

ording to board member Clare Feldpausch, the board was unaware of the \$750 fee because it was not spelled out in their food service contract, which he said contained "hidden costs."

Although the food service company signed a revised contract at the beginning of the school year, the board did not, and the contract was cancelled after one month. Board members have since voted to provide their own supervisor for the schools' hot lunch programs, but were obligated to continue with Canteen Services until Dec. 31. Fowler's and Fulton's school districts shared the costs of Canteen Food Services, a cafeteria enterprise from Grand Rapids, and shared a supervising manager of the program.

At their Monday meeting, Fowler's board agreed to pay Canteen Services \$1,522 for November and \$762 for December. The bargain was struck following an offer by George Martin, board president, to pay only for maintenance of the program, not the manager's fee for November and December. Canteen Services rejected Martin's offer and another offer made by John Rademacher, treasurer. Rademacher asked that the food service company "knock off \$1,000 from their original bill."

Under the final agreement approved by the board, Canteen Food Service Manager Rick Simpson told the board he would accept the full November payment and only part of December's bill.

Simpson told board members he felt his company had lived up to the terms of the contract, noting food and labor costs had been cut. The food service manager blamed holiday vacations, the inability to receive reimbursement for free- and reduced-price meals until the third week of school, and severe federal cuts in funding for poor participation and a deficit budget.

"You never even gave us a chance to prove ourselves," Simpson charged. "After a month (of service) you were ready to throw in the towel."

The food service manager explained that on the national level, participation in hot lunch programs is down 40 percent. In Michigan, he claims, participation is down 30-35 percent. Due to a decrease in federal reimbursement in commodities and milk, a higher price must be charged for meals to make up the difference in cost, Simpson said.

"The increase in meal prices is probably cost-prohibitive to a lot of families," he said. "It's a lot easier for the kids to brown bag their lunch rather than pay the extra costs."

Simpson asserts that historically, hot lunch programs go into the red the first four months of the school year, but end up breaking even by the end of the school year.

"January, February and March are banner months," he said. "It's cold outside and moms want to make sure their children have good, hot meals."

Answering Feldpausch's question how the company could show a profit in November when they served less meals than in October, Simpson explained his company was able to use more commodities, which kept food prices down.

"You put stuff on the menu, but the food wasn't here for the cooks to prepare it," trustee Ruth Feldpausch charged. "And sometimes, you have to admit that the food wasn't the greatest."

Another complaint the board had against Canteen was the lack of time spent in the district by the supervising manager, Marion Thurston. In December, Ms. Thurston spent only 12 hours in the Fowler District, according to board records.

"Out of the 71 school days, Marion spent 44 here in Fowler," said Simpson. "She spent a lot more time in Fowler in September and October than she did in Fulton, and you're not even paying half her salary."

Simpson blasted board members, and charged Ms. Thurston has done a good job for the district but was not given any support.

"She made a few mistakes, but you never gave her a chance to make it work," Simpson said. "It takes time to regroup and correct the many problems that you had. You can't do it all in a month."

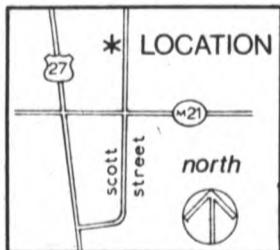
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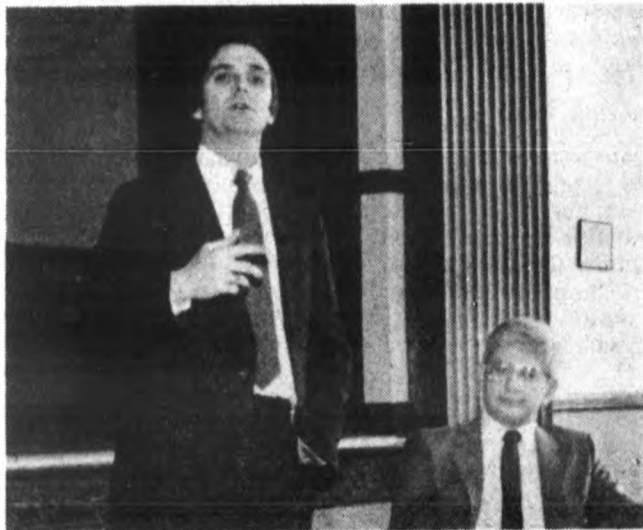
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# Business getting bum rap, Amway exec. says

Citing television as a poor example of teaching children about business world, McNamara claimed 96 percent of the shows relating to business involve criminal overtones.

"Children will only get the importance of business from you," he said. "Impress your children with work values and what you do."

The Grand Rapids executive of one the nation's most successful direct marketing firms explained the United States is no longer an industrial society; rather, it has become an informational type society. He noted that in 1980, only 30 percent of the country was industrialized as compared to a few years earlier when the figure was 80 percent. In 1980, 55 percent of the jobs available to people involved information processing, according to McNamara.

"In spite of all this, we are still becoming a nation of illiterates," he commented. "A job revolution has begun or is on its way."

America, he said, is a bunch of people who don't want to be judged on their performance living in a world of people who do. In Japan, for example, one out of every two employee suggestions are accepted by employers, he said. By comparison, in the U.S. auto industry, according to McNamara, about seven suggestions are accepted every year.

Using the term "global economy," the former English professor and television newsman said those countries that do the best economically come up with the best ideas.

"You should take a good, long look at what has to be

done," he said of the nation's business climate, "then look at your own business situation."

Steering off in another direction, McNamara said this country is suffering from the "semantics of slobology."

"Kids should know the difference between a job and a career, money and wealth, sight and vision," he said. "You are obligated to teach your children these differences."

McNamara suggested St. Johns retailers take their children to their businesses, show them what they do and why they do it.

"Don't take them on a weekend or when no one else is around," he said. "Show them the true picture of what happens."

The second greatest tragedy in America, he said, is to let children believe they can buy and put on a personality. The greatest tragedy, in McNamara's words, is to succeed.

"Kids don't need all the things they think they need," he said. "TV is a sales medium that entertains."

In conclusion, McNamara said in order to be successful, business people have to be more aware.

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# Warmth, dedication help children reach goals

The small cluster of buildings housing the Clinton County Intermediate School District changed and expanded over last summer. The changes took place for a very good reason: so Clinton County youngsters who were travel-

ing to Lansing's Beekman Center could stay closer to home and still receive good care and training.

Among the children transferred from Beekman is Brent Thelen. Soon to be six-years-old, Brent is one of six Severely Multiply Impaired children in Clarisa Suarez-Miller's room. Each day, along with Instructional Aides Diane Gray and Sharon Hitchcock and Program Assistant Albert Smith, Clarisa works with her students in achieving personal objectives. These objectives, such as feeding skills, are designed to lead toward greater independence for the children.

The daily schedule includes mealtime, work time for specific goals, afternoon nap, music, art or crafts, and self-care skills like teeth brushing. Clarisa and the rest of the staff, who work with the children 280 days each year, keep detailed records of each student's progress, which she then evaluates monthly.

For Brent, like many of the children, seizures are a major problem he has to live with. And while at times he is hampered by them, other times he has accomplished several objectives in one day. Quite an accomplishment. Watching Clarisa work with her students, face to face, helping them overcome their problems, shows the warmth and dedication it takes to advance the students toward the ultimate goal of greater independence.

Located two miles south of St. Johns on US-27, the CCISD also has programs for the Severely Mentally Impaired, Trainable Mentally Impaired, pre-primary special education (speech and language) and impaired pre-primary program.

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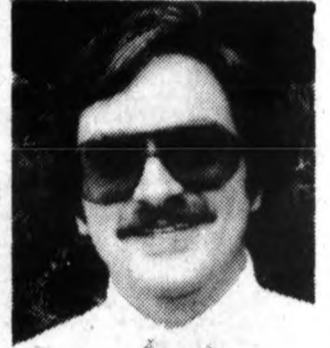
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## Then Came Bronson

## Tax tips

If you drive back there to see it, you may be surprised by the size of the structure. It's all enclosed now in what they call the "dry."

There is heat in the building now so there is much activity going on inside. This means that everyday work can go on, even in this cold weather.

Just to bring you up to date: this is a 108 bed facility with 18 for skilled care, 47 for basic care and 43 for home for the aged.

The Clinton Area Care Center office reports that the building is on schedule and they plan for an optimistic May 1 opening.

Many people are already signing up to do volunteer work when the center opens. Everyone seems to be keeping up with their pledges and others are urged to make pledges, since they are still needed.

Soon, this facility will become a reality. Won't that be a thrill? None of us know how soon we will need their care. So keep those pledges coming.

Wages farmers pay to their unmarried children under the age of 21 are exempt from Social Security (FICA) and Federal Unemployment (FUTA) taxes. This is provided the farmer is an individual taxpayer and not a partner in a farm partnership or a shareholder partnership or a shareholder in a farm corporation. The wages a farmer pays his wife are also exempt, subject to the same restrictions on the type of farming organization.

### Investment credit -- single purpose livestock structures

Single purpose livestock structures are eligible for investment tax credit. Examples include hog breeding facilities, milking parlors, silos and egg production buildings.

These buildings have been eligible for investment credit for years ended after Aug. 15, 1971. If you were entitled to, but did not claim the investment credit on a prior year's tax return, an amended return may be filed, provided the statute of limitations has not expired.

### Investment credit regarding related persons

The tax law states that used property acquired from related persons does not qualify for the investment tax credit.

Used property acquired from a partnership can qualify, if the proper planning is done.

### Depreciation

For tangible property placed in service after 1980, the depreciation deduction must be calculated under the new Accelerated Cost Recovery System. This new method of depreciation computation is mandatory.

Under ACRS, businesses take "recovery deductions" instead of depreciation. The taxpayer will no longer need to determine the useful life and salvage value of assets. The Act establishes a number of property classes and sets forth the allowed deductions calculated as a percentage of the property cost or other basis.

The three major property classes which will affect business and farmin are the three-, five- and fifteen-year property classes. The three-year class includes automobiles and light trucks. Five-year property class includes most machinery and equipment and the fifteen-year property class consists of most buildings and other permanent structures.

## Education corner

**Editor's note:** Following is the first in a series of columns on education prepared in cooperation with St. Johns Public Schools. The columns are being written by teachers, parents, students, administrators, school board members and others. It is hoped the columns will increase parent involvement in their child's education.

Some of you may remember homework as an interesting, challenging opportunity to practice what you learned in the classroom; to review, expand and explore new ideas; to complete projects without the time restriction of the school day.

On the other hand, some of you may have viewed homework as nothing more than punishment -- an imposition, wasting precious play time.

Teachers say homework is a valuable reinforcement of classwork. It teaches students to work independently. It develops self-confidence. It builds responsibility and it provides parents a chance to keep in touch with their children's education.

But does homework really make a difference? Yes, according to a study by the National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP). In a study of 10,000 teenagers, the NAEP found that students doing the most math homework performed best in past achievement tests.

Parents can help with homework in several ways:

Provide your children with an adequate place to study: good lighting, a comfortable chair and few distractions.

Make sure your children have a specific time each day for homework and that they start early enough to finish.

Help by calling out spelling words and multiplication tables.

Suggest sources of information for a paper.

Don't actually do the homework, though, that defeats the purpose. But ask to see it sometimes and ask questions or make comments on it. Just your expression of interest will make a child want to do a better job.

If your children have trouble with homework, or seem to have too much or too little, call the teacher. Teachers see homework as an important link between home and school and we would welcome your call.

Net result for former star is love

## Planning and family leave no time for tennis

Ten years ago, when he was the star of St. Johns High School's tennis team, Tom Warstler's most challenging look at the future was to devise strategies for his next battle on courts.

Today, his strategy sessions are not limited to Clinton County's athletic fields, but run the gamut of the area's lakes, streams, farm lands and towns.

Since 1979 Warstler has been the county's top planner, and though his job probably generates enough hassles to severely age any ordinary county employee, he still retains the boyish good looks and lean build of a high school athlete.

As the only designated planner in Clinton County government, Warstler has been given the thankless task of putting together background information and offering recommendations on special use permits for such volatile projects as the Granger landfill, a planned Federal Land Bank office complex and WQTK's proposed radio tower.

"I think I've aged over the past year with this Granger thing," he says with a laugh. "Seriously, though, I think the public is getting more involved in some of these land-use issues and demanding we do more preparation for specific cases. We seem to be in that era where everybody is suing everybody else ... I think it's good having public involvement, but sometimes emotions run so high that my job becomes a little less fun than it used to be."

In putting together staff reports used by the county planning commission as a basis for its land-use decisions, Warstler attempts to use objective data and not to involve his own personal feelings and opinions.

"Consciously, my personal feelings don't enter into the decision-making process. Subconsciously, I don't know for sure," he says. "We have our land-use policies and the text of the zoning ordinance. I guess those are the two things that guide us the most. We'd get into trouble if we started basing our decisions on whom we like or what we like."

The battle over a special use permit for Granger was one area where Warstler tried especially hard to be fair and objective.

"On Granger, the easiest and most popular thing would have been to recommend denial. We would have made a lot of friends," he remembers. "But it was a case where we looked at the ordinance and a lot of other related things. The recommendation for approval, based on the data and the facts, was the appropriate recommendation."

Warstler is hoping controversies over special use permits and zoning issues do not take up as much of his time in 1982 as they did this past year. He is eager to address more conventional planning activities that he says are going on in many other counties in Michigan.

"One reason I'm working so much on zoning matters is that we are such a small department," he explains. "There is simply no one else to do it ... We've been so involved with things like Granger that everything else has taken a back seat."

"Hopefully, this year I'll be able to do some more of the traditional planning functions — updating our future land-use map, work on our land-use policies and getting the land-use inventories completed."

Life for Tom Warstler, however, is not made up entirely of landfills, radio towers and land-use maps. He has strong ties to Clinton County, and except for four years at Aquinas College in Grand Rapids and short stints as a planner in Missouri and the Upper Peninsula, his entire life has been spent in St. Johns.

Especially important to him are his wife, Pasqua, and his two daughters, three-year-old Page and one-year-old Bailey. He also spends as much time as he can with 12-year-old Eric, whom he met through the Big Brothers-Big Sisters of Clinton County program.

One of Warstler's most recent passions has been family history. His parents, Don and Shirley Warstler, both still live in St. Johns. But it is branches of his family tree long before his parents' generation that interests Warstler.

"Hendrick Warstler came over in 1746 from Alsace-Lorraine and settled in Ohio," he explains. "Now there are some 20 different spellings of Warstler all over the Midwest. Some of the Warstlers are pretty active in tracing the family."

Warstler regrets he was not able to take advantage of a recent opportunity to learn more about his family.

"There was a trip last summer," he says. "Warstlers from all over the United States took a trip back to Europe ... They visited Hendrick's old home ... If I could have afforded it, I would have gone."

But he admits it is his wife's side of the family that really knows family history.

"She's from a big, Kalamazoo Italian family," he says. "She's got real strong ties to her Italian heritage. They're very ethnic oriented. They even say grace in Italian."

"We went to Italy several years ago and visited her

aunt who lived in the old hometown. The aunt's house was beautiful ... all pillars and marble floors ... it was once confiscated by Mussolini ... he used it as a summer palace."

Pasqua Warstler has attempted to pass much of her family's heritage on to her daughters.

"We eat a lot of Italian food," Warstler admits. "My wife uses lots of garlic. And when the kids refer to their grandparents, it's not grandpa and grandma, but nanni and nanna — the Sicilian words. Her family is colorful, to say the least."

Warstler admits his job and family leave little time

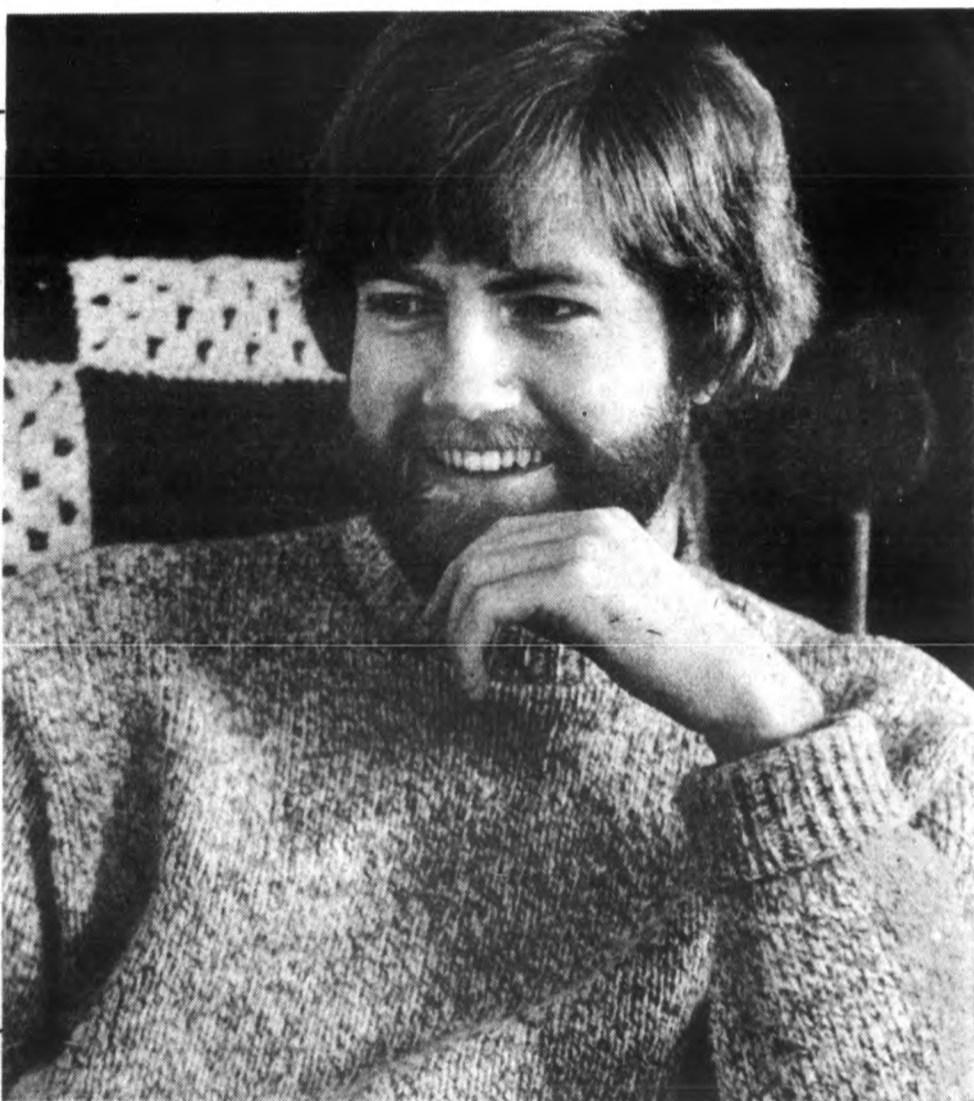
for tennis, which he enjoyed so much just a decade ago.

"I really love playing tennis, but I just haven't found the time lately," he says. "Once my daughters are able to play, I may pick it up again. Actually, I've played some tennis with my oldest girl. I've given her a badminton racket and we've gone out and played in the driveway. She gets a kick out of it."

Does the former Redwing star still possess enough skills from his high school days to beat his three-year-old daughter?

"Oh sure," he says with a laugh. "At least on a good day I can."

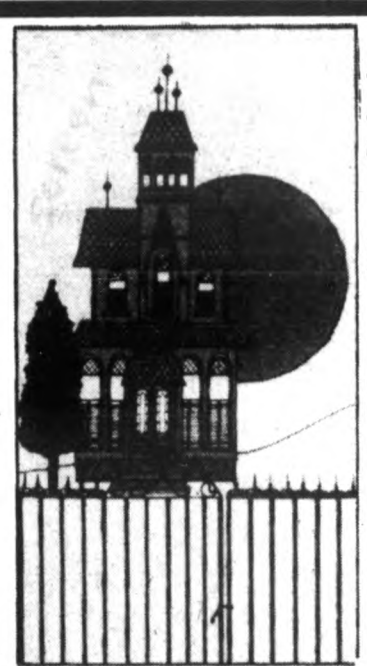

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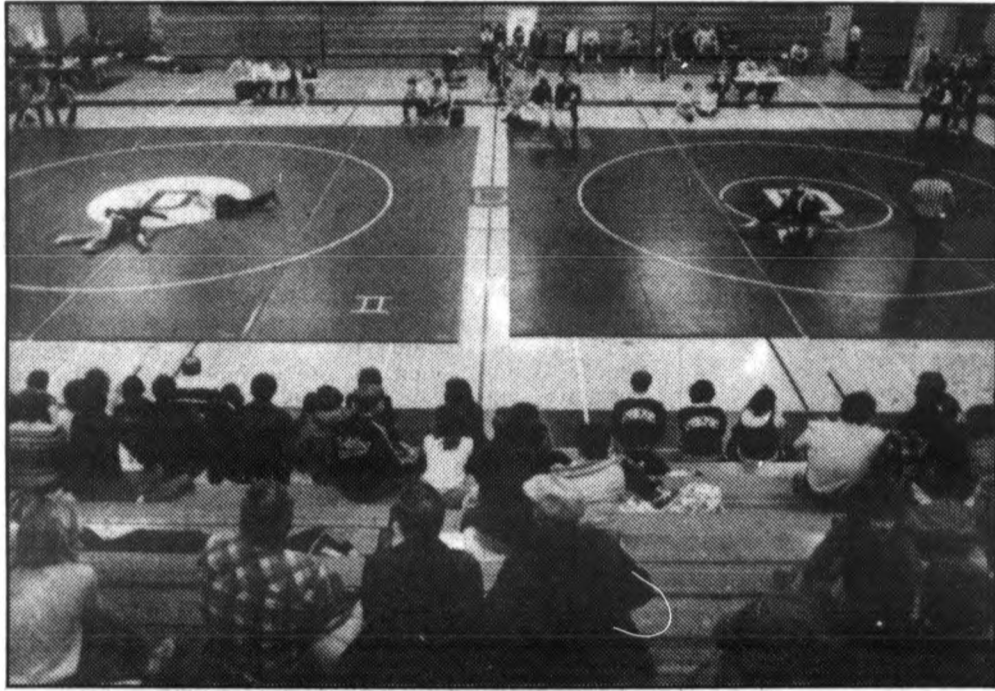

"It was very competitive," said DeWitt coach Randy Smith. "Going into the finals any team could have won it."

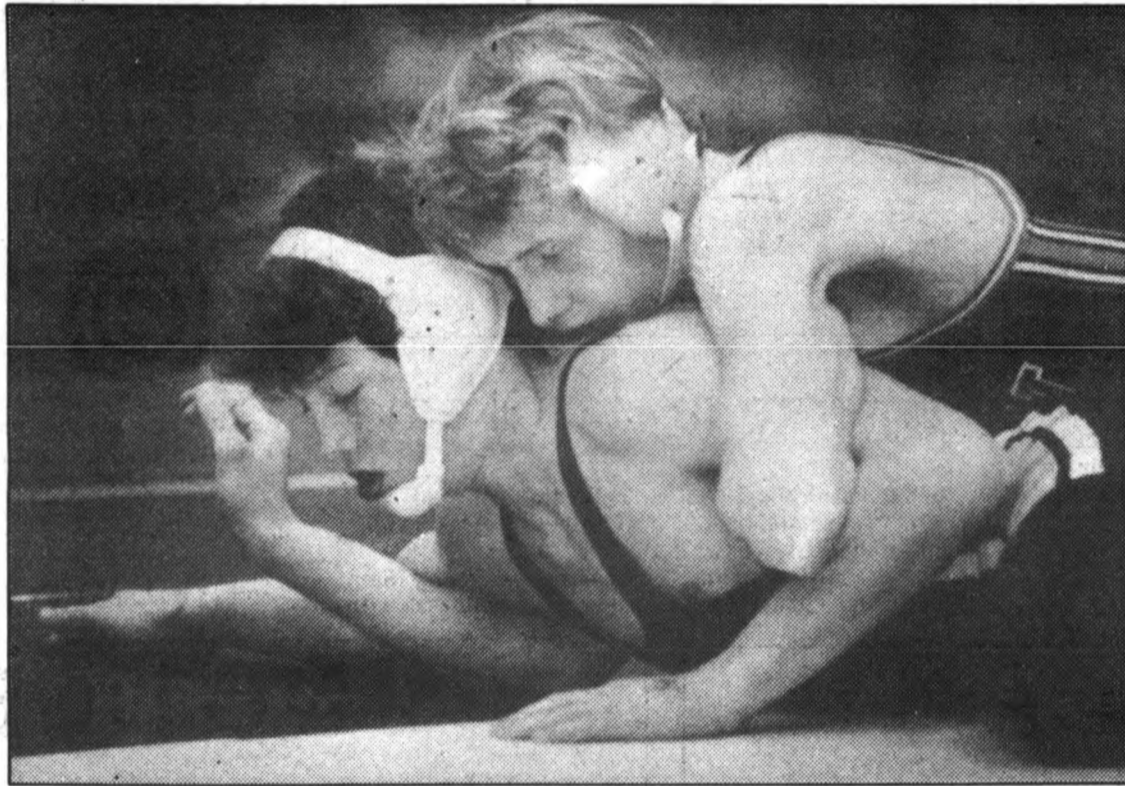
Only one team did, however, and that team was Haslett which scored 129.5 points to 117.5 for runner-up DeWitt.

"We won it last year and would have liked to repeat," said Smith. "But Haslett was tough."

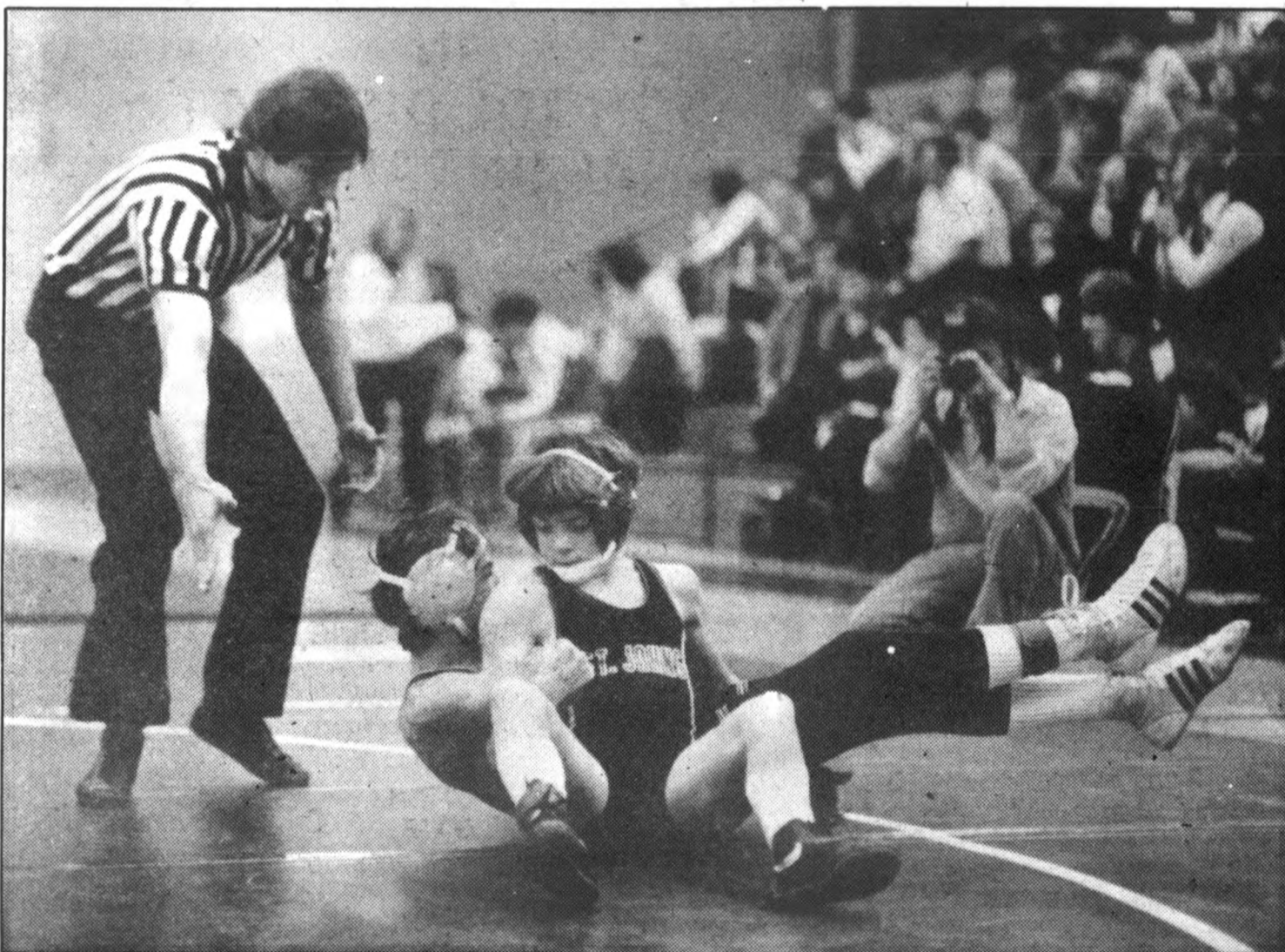

## Dairy seminar set in SJ

"Milk Prices Production Profits — Where We Are Headed" will be the topic of the upcoming Dairy Industry Seminar. For months, dairy production has far exceeded demand, while federal support has lessened and bottled milk appears to be losing ground, said Roberta Weber, Extension agricultural agent.

How dairymen can affect the milk market will be discussed at the seminar, sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service of Michigan State University.

Seminar topics will probe milk marketing problems, farm management for financial survival and improved feeding and milk quality production recommendations, said Weber.

## To explore beef market future

The beef industry holds an important place in Clinton County with over 6,300 head of beef cattle. However, decisive steps must be taken if the beef cattle industry is going to recover from current economic chaos and area producers must be involved, said Roberta Weber, Extension agricultural agent.

What can and should be done to help the industry remain in business is the purpose of a special seminar, "Surviving in the '80's," to be held Jan. 22 at Long's Convention Center in Lansing, she said.

Starting at 10 a.m. the seminar will feature some of the nation's top authorities on beef herd management. All beef industry personnel — cow-calf producers, cattle feeders, processors and support businesses — should attend, Weber said. The seminar is sponsored by the Michigan Cattlemen's Association and Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service.

"We believe this is the best program that has been planned for beef producers in recent years," said Weber. "Anyone who has hopes of being part of the beef industry in the years ahead should plan to attend."

Featured on the program are Gary Smith of Texas A and M University and Larry Corah of Kansas State University.

Smith specializes in beef carcass quality and the factors that affect it — such as cattle type and breed, feeding programs and processing methods. His presentation will focus on how beef can be more competitive and profitable to produce and market, said Weber.

Corah's specialty is beef herd management and nutrition programs for stocker and feeder cattle. He will speak on the future of the U.S. beef cattle industry and what producers can do to maximize returns from every calf born.

The program concludes with a 7:30-9 p.m. panel discussion. Corah and Smith, along with John Waller, MSU Extension beef specialist, and Ritchie will discuss current issues in the beef industry. Program details may be obtained by contacting Ritchie at MSU 355-8401.

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# City mails out wastewater survey questionnaires

About 108 of St. Johns' 2,300 wastewater treatment plant users will be receiving questionnaires in the mail soon, City Manger Randy Humphrey told city commissioners Monday night, Jan. 11.

According to Humphrey, the survey is required under regulations which accompany federal funding for the system, and will be used to determine if any substances disposed of locally could damage the wastewater treatment system.

"The main object is to find out what's out there that could pose a threat to the system," Humphrey said.

Those who will receive the surveys are industrial and non-domestic users selected from residential and commercial property tax rolls, he explained. Short form questionnaires will be sent to about 90 property owners who are less likely to dispose of potentially dangerous

wastes, and 18 long forms will be sent to industrial "customers," the city manager said.

"We are flying in the face of the federal government's determination to cut down on paper work," Mayor John Aerhart noted. But Humphrey pointed out the survey is mandatory under state and federal guidelines for implementing an Industrial Wastewater Pretreatment

Plan, a system designed to improve the operation of the city's sewage disposal plant.

## Transportation committee formed

At the urging of concerned parents, the St. Johns Board of Education has formed a 13-member Advisory Committee on Transportation.

The committee was formed in December and will review current pupil transportation policies and develop alternatives without increasing operational costs, Superintendent Don Burns said.

"The request came from the millage committee last summer. We felt it would be a good idea to look at some of the concerns of parents," he said.

Concerns mainly were in the area of student safety, Burns said. Parents have expressed concern that some children walk too far under the present bus policy, that some must walk roads without sidewalks or close to heavy traffic areas, and that there are no houses near some bus stops.

"They've been asked to determine if our present transportation practice is more hazardous than our

previous practice, which was essentially door-to-door in rural areas," the superintendent said.

Committee members, appointed by Parent Teacher Organizations, school principals, the superintendent and the school board, represent a cross section of the school district balanced between rural and city residents, Burns said.

Those on the committee are: Alan Anderson, Darrell Corp, Sue Crawley, James DeBrabander, Ann Holm, Tina Kurncz, Adella Lyon, David Paksi and Carol Woods. Also serving are St. Johns School Board President Ron Huard, bus driver Melvin Gibson, who was appointed by his co-workers, Gordon Vandemark, administrator of the school system's transportation, and Roy J. Ebert, elected chairman of the committee.

Burns said the committee met recently for the first time and recommendations on possible changes in school bus service are expected in mid-spring.

## State okays waivers

St. Johns Schools and the Clinton County Intermediate School District were among several in the state recently given approval by the State Board of Education to staff special education programs with half-time supervisors.

According to State Superintendent Phillip E. Runkle, "This action indicates the State Board's support of local efforts to cut costs in the face of declining enrollments, rising costs and lower revenues."

St. Johns Superintendent Don Burns said waiver of the state requirement will have little significant impact on area schools, since local special education programs have been supervised by a half-time administrator since mid-way through the 1980-81 school year.

When a staff member resigned, Burns said, the district's fulltime special education supervisor, Rosemary Green, was appointed principal of Eureka Elementary School in a cost-saving move.

## GI bill explained

As many as 39,000 Vietnam-era veterans are expected to take advantage of a one-time, two year extension of their GI Bill delimiting date, the Veterans Administration estimates.

Extended eligibility for certain training programs was included in the Veterans' Health Care, Training and Small Business Loan Act of 1981 signed into law by President Reagan on Nov. 3.

The extension period, which exists through all of 1982, applies to educationally disadvantaged or unskilled Vietnam-era veterans who allowed their 10-year delimiting date to expire before using all their entitlement for educational training.

Eligible veterans may use their remaining entitlement to obtain a high school diploma, or its equivalent, or pursue a program of apprenticeship, other on-the-job training or a program with a vocational objective.

Enrollment in college degree, flight or correspondence courses is not included in the extension. Veterans who have already earned college degrees are ineligible for the extension.



# Schools as good as ever, U of M research says

The supposed decline in the quality of public high schools has been alleged so repeatedly that it is accepted as fact by many persons. Ray E. Kehoe, who has been professionally evaluating the quality of Michigan schools for 30 years, sharply disputes that supposed fact.

Kehoe, associate director of the University of Michigan's Bureau of School Services, feels high schools are "getting a bad rap," and says they are better in many ways than when he began visiting them in the early 1950s.

"I can tell you the poorest schools in Michigan today are superior to the best schools in the early 1950s," Kehoe stated in a recent article prepared by the U-M Bureau of Information Services.

Further, Michigan was a pioneer in promoting high academic standards, as the practice of accrediting secondary schools began in this state in 1871, according to Kehoe. He serves as an evaluator for the U-M and North Central accrediting services.

"Michigan still is a leader in the field of secondary education and the progress we've seen over the second half of the 20th century has been enormous," Kehoe stated. "The facilities and resources are more sophisticated, the teachers are better trained, and we are more sensitive to the needs of exceptional students."

"Having come this far, it would be a tragedy to slip back."

Michigan high schools are periodically visited by Kehoe and a staff of six others, to evaluate them for the U-M and North Central accrediting services. U-M is the state's recognized accrediting agency, while North Central is a regional association.

A school's accreditation status is considered by out-of-state colleges and universities when reviewing student applications. Some in-state schools also give weight to the accreditation status of a student's school, when considering the student for certain scholarships. The U-M Board of Regents Scholarship, for instance, is only given to students whose high schools are accredited.

Kehoe's conclusions are the result of his visits to between 30 and 50 high schools each year. His observations were personal ones, and not official positions taken by the U-M bureau or North Central.

He identifies several areas in which schools on the whole have greatly improved since he began his evaluations. These include:

— Retention rate: Since 1950, enrollment has increased from about half to 85 percent in the upper four grade levels, Kehoe says. With the decline in drop-outs has come an increase in slow-learning and less-motivated students, he points out.

— Programs for the gifted: More creative programming is now provided for academically advanced

students, such as college level courses, simultaneous enrollment in high school and college, and special music, fine arts and sports programs.

— Decreased sex discrimination: Girls now have opportunities equal to boys in sports and physical education. Further, boys are included in home economics classes while girls are taking drafting and shop.

— Students with special needs: Humane and effective programs for students with physical and emotional handicaps are being protected from budget cuts, and the ratio of guidance counselors to number of students has improved.

— Due process: Students can now question an inappropriate grade, and are treated with more dignity by school authorities.

— Media-centers: Nearly all of Michigan's schools have trained library specialists, "and have surpassed what was once considered the 'utopian' standard of 10 books per pupil," Kehoe reported.

— Lab equipment: Equipment in school media centers, art and music rooms, science labs, and business classes is superior to what it formerly was.

— Vocational education: "To my mind, the single most significant improvement in secondary education has been in meeting the needs of that 50 percent of students who by definition won't go to college," Kehoe stated. Nearly 125,000 students are being prepared for careers in such areas as business, industry and health care at vocational-technical centers.

Kehoe is concerned about the effects of budget cuts, such as shortening the school day and deleting extra-curricular activities. He fears many schools could become "credit factories," that do not "promote social growth and development."

U-M bureau Director Kent Leach generally agrees with Kehoe's conclusions, and feels schools are, on the whole, much better than they were 25 years ago. Increased media scrutiny of schools has created the public perception that schools have declined in quality, he believes.

When he started accrediting in 1948, "No news was interpreted as good news," Leach said. "Now schools are subject to microscopic inspection." Further, people used to assume a school was a good school simply because it offered Latin and other respected courses, Leach added: "The public didn't see the drop-out rate, or the fact that most courses were not designed for the majority of the students."

The accreditation service does not evaluate the quality of instruction or students' academic performance per se, but recommends improvements in testing and curriculum through the counseling departments, Leach said. And while agreeing with most of the points made by Kehoe, Leach also agreed with the general complaint that there is not enough emphasis given to basic academic performance.

Schools are tending toward a "cafeteria approach" to education, offering students many courses to choose from, while not, in Leach's opinion, spending enough time teaching the basics.

# Experts say where there's a will, there's a way to avoid trouble

When you speak of wills and trusts, you speak of confusion, according to members of Clinton Memorial Hospital's (CMH) Deferred Gifts Committee. In an effort to clear up such confusion, the group presented a Mini-Estate Planning Seminar for CMH's Developmental Council earlier this month.

The seminar was a sneak preview of an Estate Planning Seminar to be offered to the public Thursday, Feb. 25 at 7:30 p.m. in the hospital conference room.

"Everyone needs a will," said John Wieber, St. Johns attorney and member of the committee. "Wives need wills just as husbands do."

Although a person has a will, his estate must also go through probate, Wieber added.

"There's a common misconception here," he said. "A lot of people think just because they have a will they can avoid going through probate court. This just isn't true."

Probate is the procedure whereby property is passed on to heirs. Estates are used to pay taxes, outstanding debts, expenses incurred by the deceased and then distributed to heirs, he explained.

"If you don't have a will, the state has a distribution program," said Wieber.

A simple will costs between \$75 to \$80, according to the young attorney.

Along with a will comes the naming of an administrator or executor, an honorary gesture normally bestowed on a family member or close friend, according to Ron Huard, trust officer of Clinton Bank and Trust.

"When you pick an administrator it should be a person who has the right knowledge and expertise in handling your affairs," said Huard. "If you don't, the procedure takes more time and there might be more complications."

A will is a good place to name a guardian for young children in the family, Huard added.

Terry Hall, a St. Johns certified public accountant, noted the Internal Revenue Service plays a "cradle-to-grave tax game." One way to win it, says Hall, is to give money to charitable institutions such as hospitals and churches.

Hall said prior to 1981, gifts of \$3,000 were tax exempt. The figure has since been raised to \$10,000.

Al Mitchell, sales representative for Northwestern Mutual Life, explained life insurance can pay all the last expenses, pay taxes and maintain families' financial status, or be a charitable gift.

"Anyone can be named a beneficiary," he said. Paul McNamara, CMH administrator, noted that the

hospital has accepted gifts of real estate through provisions in wills.

How long the will procedure takes varies, the panelists agreed. According to Wieber, it all depends on who is suing who and how well the heirs get along.

"Three months is about as quick as they can be processed," said Wieber. "Normally, they take a year and a half."

One-half of one percent of the assets of estates go to probate court, said the attorney.

Hall also noted that Michigan Inheritance Tax effects more estates because the taxable levels are not as high as federal levels.

While a will directs ownership, a trust is an after-death provision for income of the beneficiaries or charitable organizations, the trust officer said.

"Although the purpose of a trust varies," said Huard, "the intent is for the growth of assets and income."

When donating funds to a charitable organization such as a hospital, it was noted by members of the committee, do not designate money for a specific purpose.

"Specific purposes can hurt an organization," said McNamara. "Organizations would like to use funds for current projects."

Because of constantly changing tax laws, Dan Matson, chairman of the Deferred Gifts Committee, recommends periodic review of all wills and trusts.
