Armed robbery leads to chase

What police say was the first armed robbery in St. Johns in five years led to a high speed chase which involved two road blocks by several law enforcement agencies, and ended when the suspect's vehicle crashed into a state police patrol car blocking US-27 near Shepard.

According to St. Johns Police reports, Sillman's Store, 709 W. State, St. Johns, was the scene of an armed robbery 6:40 p.m. Monday.

Reports said the suspect, Rodger Luedeke, 18, E. Seventh St., Portland, Ind., pulled into the gas station at Sillman's and asked the attendant to "fill it up." He then entered the store and picked up some lunch meat and chips, according to reports.

After the attendant handled a transaction for one customer, another customer, woman, came into the store, reports said, and Luedeke selected some other groceries. Left alone in the store with the attendant when the woman departed, Luedeke pulled out a revolver and told the attendant to put money from the cash register into a bag, reports said. He then told the attendant to go into the back room and stay there until he had left.

Luedeke apparently then headed for Ashley, but missed a turn. Alerted by members of Community Radio Watch, a local citizens band (CB) radio club, a truck driver seeing a car matching the description of the suspect's vehicle called one of the CBers. The report was then given to the Clinton County Sheriff Department, who alerted the Gratiot County Sheriff Department that a Thunderbird was headed north on US-27 at high rate of speed, six miles north of St. Johns.

Troopers in two cars dispatched by the Ionia State Police Post saw the car and gave chase, reports said. Luedeke avoided one roadblock, but failed to get past a state police car at the Shepard exit.

The car driven by Luedeke, a white and red Thunderbird, was reported stolen from a lot in Portland, Ind.

Luedeke was arraigned in 65th District Court Tuesday on a two count warrant for armed robbery and possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony.

According to reports, approximately \$300 was missing from Sillman's. Following the arrest of Luedeke, \$292 has been recovered, police said.

Members must battle for seats

Commission size cut by four

Four Clinton County Commission seats will be lost and a few commissioners could be forced to fight it out for the remaining seven slots on the board under a redistricting plan approved by a narrow vote Monday night, Jan. 25.

The three-to-two vote by the Clinton County Reapportionment Committee will re-align county commission districts according to 1980 census figures. And the best way to accomplish the objectives set forth in reapportionment guidelines in Clinton County was a plan calling for a reduction of the board from 11 to seven, Reappor-

tionment Committee Chairman Richard Koenigsnecht said.

"Our first objective was representation," the chairman of the county's Republican party said. About a dozen plans calling for county boards with five, seven, nine and 11 members were considered, he said, but the final seven member plan was deemed best. "I voted for it and I personally felt it achieved the objectives set forth better than the others. It wasn't my plan, but I think it was the best," he said.

County Clerk Jane Swanchara and Prosecutor John Newman, also members of the committee, agreed with Koenigsnecht. Committee members County Treasurer Gerald Shepard and Max Calder, chairman of the county's Democratic Party, disagreed.

They and others present at the Monday night meeting protested the plan for various reasons, but fewer complaints were lodged than expected, the committee chairman and chief assistant prosecutor said.

"There was no great protest," Koenigsnecht said. "I think they came with the idea of raising some hell, but when they saw what we were working with, they changed their minds."

One who was present who hasn't changed his mind is County Commission Chairman Roger Overway. Announcing the reapportionment vote to county commissioners during their meeting the following day, Over-

Ice storm cools plan for hot time at Super Bowl

A Michigan ice storm resulted in the demise of Earl Lancaster's trek to Super Bowl XVI and he's disappointed, to say the least.

Anyone passing Lancaster's home on Circle Drive in St. Johns Monday morning would understand why the Clinton County commissioner and former school administrator was worried about venturing to Pontiac on Sunday. His driveway, like many other driveways and roads in the state, was like a skating rink. As he sat in the warm confines of his home Saturday, watching the wind whipping around his house stirring up a swirl of snow, Lancaster knew he should stay home and watch the game on television.

The decision not to go was anything but easy, and Lancaster knew he had given up his first and only chance to attend a Super Bowl game.

Naturally, he still has the unused Super Bowl XVI ticket. His seat (Club Level 215, Row 2), had he gone, would have been in the same box as Pete Rozelle's, commissioner of the National Football League. He was also invited to attend a morning brunch before the game at the Dearborn Hyatt Regency.

Now all Lancaster has is a dream of where he could have been on Super Bowl Sunday.

How Lancaster got the Super Bowl ticket is a complicated story which began in 1946, while he was coaching athletics at Corunna High. At the high school, there was a young man by the name of Jay Tissot who happened to be an all-stater in both football and basketball.

Tissot later went on to graduate from Central Michigan University, and Lancaster became superintendent of the Grosse Isle School System.

One August, the school needed a physical education and driver education teacher. Tissot walked in the door and was given the job.

During the time Lancaster and Tissot were involved with Grosse Isle athletics, they each coached a young athlete named

Warren Welsh.

Welsh later became a member of the FBI and is now Chief of Security for the National Football League.

The three men met 31 years later at a banquet honoring Tissot for being named to a high school coaches honor society. Lancaster and Welsh went back to Grosse Isle to say a "few words" about Tissot.

At the banquet, Welsh announced that Lancaster and Tissot, along with four other Grosse Isle faculty members, would be going to Super Bowl XVI as his guests.

"I never really gave it much thought," said Lancaster. "After all, that was eight months ago."

Two weeks ago Lancaster received his ticket along with a letter from Welsh which read, "A message to six special men in my life. In your own way, you taught me about work, about dedication and purpose, about teamwork, about sportsmanship and about life. Thank you. Enjoy the game."

About the same time Lancaster got the ticket to the Super Bowl, Bill Swears, St. Johns High School principal, invited his former boss, Lancaster, to dinner on Sunday, Jan. 24. Swears knew Lancaster had the ticket, and had only asked Lancaster to dinner in jest.

But the last laugh was on Swears, who got a phone call about 11 a.m. Sunday from Lancaster asking when dinner would be served. Swears thought Lancaster was playing a joke on him until Lancaster's wife got on the phone and set him right.

Earl Lancaster got his Sunday dinner and then watched the game with the Swears' family some 90 miles from his original front row seat.

On Tuesday, before the big game was to be played, Lancaster took the ticket to a Rotary Club meeting. There, he saw looks of envy in the other members' eyes; Monday there was a look of disappointment in his own eyes.

"I think I'm more upset about not seeing the five other guys," said Lancaster Monday afternoon. "I probably saw the game better on television."

Setting goals should be board priority, Burns says

Superintendent Don Burns would like to set specific goals to be accomplished by the end of the present school year, but some school board members would rather not. As a result, the decision not to decide has left his administration confused about board policy, Burns says.

"Sometimes we get judged on making decisions on things where there is no firm policy, especially on personnel matters," the St. Johns Schools Superintendent said. "We may think the superintendent and the board is together on something, but if there is nothing in writing, our memories can play tricks on us."

Burns submitted a list of 17 board goals for 1981-82 shortly after the start of the school year. In November, he identified four top priorities and asked the board of education to approve his plans to implement them. But board members refused and the list was eventually tabled.

"The board never seems to be able to say to itself, 'These are the three or four goals to concern ourselves with,'" Burns said.

"This makes it more difficult to know precisely if the board really feels that out of 17 there are three or four goals with priority."

The goals selected by Burns and board president Ron Huard were:

--"Develop a plan which will remedy the small class sizes (under 24 pupils) in the rural elementary schools.

--"Determine the number of elementary schools the district will need by 1985 based on present and past history of declining pupil enrollment.

--"Identify those concerns which the board intends to bring to the negotiating table; establish input and feedback procedures for their negotiating team; and regularly review progress toward a hoped-for amicable and reasonable settlement" (with teachers).

--"Communicate with teachers and other school employees about board plans to operate the schools during the 1982-83 school year on present operating millage."

Other goals on the list of 17 included plans to: seek a tax referendum for renovation of Central Elementary School; improve student math performance in 4th, 7th and 10th grades; study the high school curriculum and suggest changes; seek money to rebuild athletic facilities; take stands on proposed legislation affecting schools; and formulate a plan to evaluate the board's performance.

"As near as I can tell, there seems to be a feeling (on the part of board members) that if you select three or four or five goals to zero-in on that year, you might neglect others," Burns said.

Board member Paul Maples, who led the opposition to his plan, has a policy never to approve policy, the superintendent said. "Why isn't policy necessary?" he asked.

Maples denied he is anti-policy, but admitted that in many cases he has voted against setting board policies because time spent formulating rules could be better spent taking action.

"I was not opposed to identifying certain priorities, I was opposed to those four," he said, referring to Burns' plan. "I'm not in favor of picking any priority and saying let's devote our time and efforts to that and nothing else. We should deal with any item that comes up at any time," he said.

Burns insisted his goals would not be achieved at the expense of other long-term goals or daily demands, however, and said establishing policies for the future is simply good management.

"We certainly can operate without policy, but I do think in these times, especially in the last 10 to 15 years, it's almost a necessity like it is in a business or any other large organization."

Maples countered that Burns should be aware of his responsibilities, and said there are plenty of school district goals set forth and adopted by the board. "I think he knows what his duties are," he said. "Since I've been on the board there have been no swooping changes."

But Burns said things have changed. "This is an entirely new board from the one that hired me. It does

seem harder for them to do some things that I kind of take for granted, such as setting goals for the school year."

Burns also complained that lack of policies leaves him at a disadvantage when board members evaluate his performance.

"If a superintendent moves ahead (without policy) he may be moving on something the board is not ready for. It's a risk you run."

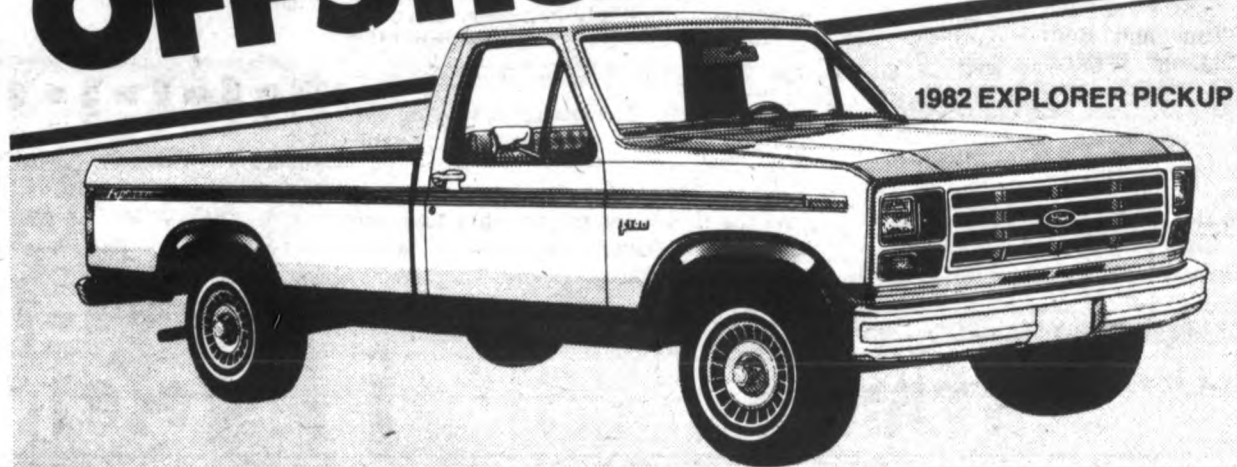
Burns was evaluated by the board in a closed session Dec. 16, but results of the evaluation have not been released.

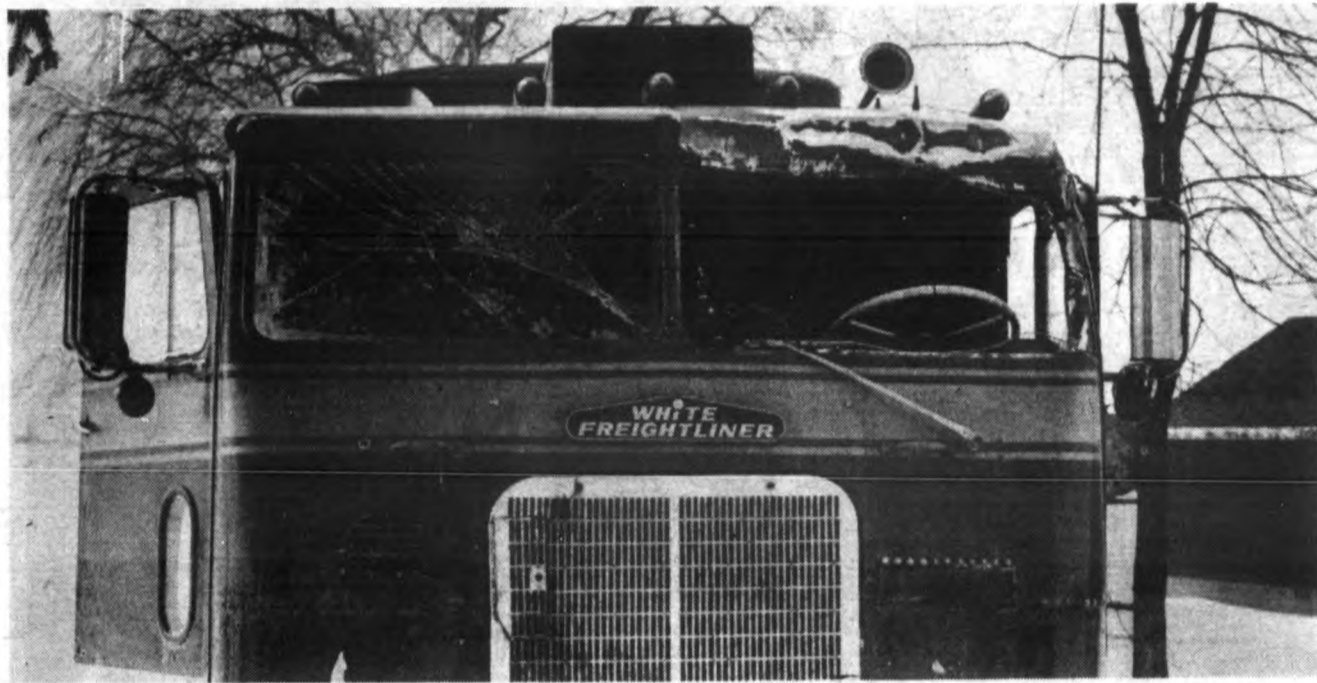

Truck driver killed in freak accident on M-21



A freak accident in which a 28-year-old truck driver was killed Friday, Jan. 22, was caused when a truck tire flew from the back of an oncoming truck through the window of this semi tractor, Clinton County Sheriff reports said. The

A 28-year-old Sturgis truck driver was killed in a freak accident Friday, Jan. 22 when a truck tire used to hold down a load of wood shavings flew off another truck and through the windshield of the semi he was driving.

According to Clinton County Sheriff reports, William Joseph Easter of 1311 Laura Ct., Sturgis, was pronounced dead on arrival at Clinton Memorial Hospital following the crash at 1:08 p.m.

Reports said Easter was headed west on M-21 in Bengal Township about one-half mile west of Foresthill Rd. when a large truck tire flew off the back of an eastbound truck driven by Timothy Kochanski, 24, of 3761 Campbell, Dearborn. The tire, which was being used to hold down a sheet of canvas covering a load of wood shavings, went through the driver's side window of Easter's truck, forcing him from the out-of-control semi, which came to rest in

a nearby field. Easter was killed when struck in the upper body by the tire, but no other injuries resulted from the crash.

Easter's truck is owned by Troyer Transport of Burr Oak, reports said.

The accident is still under investigation, Clinton County Sheriff reports said.

Fire contained

According to reports, the blaze broke out near 7:10 a.m. when a wood box in a utility room apparently ignited. The cause of the fire was undetermined, and a damage estimate was not released.

City blames creative financing for tax hikes...

Joining a growing number of local units of government, St. Johns City Commissioners added their voices to the rising chorus of complaints about property tax increases Monday night, Jan. 25.

Unanimously approving a resolution prepared by City Assessor Diane Edwards, the commission blamed "creative financing" for driving up sale prices of homes and, in turn, forcing up assessments and resulting property tax rates.

The commissioners gave Mrs. Edwards the go-ahead to begin preparing an assessment formula which, by next year, could take into account possibly inflated home sale prices resulting from land contracts, mortgage assumptions and other non-conventional financing methods, and endorsed the efforts of other units of government in Michigan to implement similar plans.

Presenting a resolution by Washtenaw County, where

such a new formula is being used this year, Mrs. Edwards argued that alternative financing methods that offer interest rates below soaring bank and savings and loan rates make some homes more attractive. Since few homes are being sold through conventional mortgages, those that sell at all are likely to reflect their more attractive "creative financing" rates in inflated sale prices, she said. Thus, while many insist the value of homes has not increased or has declined due to difficulty of sale, inflated sale prices of a few homes are pushing up all assessments, forcing higher property taxes, she said.

"If you have two identical homes," she explained, "one could sell for \$50,000 at a conventional mortgage rate of 18 percent. The home next door, financed at an 11 percent land contract, could be sold for \$55,000 or \$60,000 because the people would be willing to pay for the lower rate.

"The state looks at the sale price, not at the terms."

Calling the present method of determining assessments "unfair" and "inequitable," Mrs. Edwards asked commissioners to support her effort to determine an assessment formula for next year that would eliminate the influence of creative financing methods, which she said "do not reflect the true cash value of the property."

"As far as I'm concerned there's no question," Mayor John Arehart said. "I certainly can't argue with that. It's happening all over and I've seen it happen."

Other commissioners agreed, calling the plan timely and appropriate, and voted to recommend its adoption to state legislators, the Clinton County Board and the state tax commission.

"Throughout this year I will be working on getting the necessary facts and figures to show exactly how the City of St. Johns valuation figures are affected by 'creative financing,'" Mrs. Edwards promised in her report to the commission.

Under the Washtenaw County plan, home sale prices used for property tax assessments will not include amounts paid for financing, personal property included in sales and bills for surveying property, the resolution says. Also, the county's equalization director has been directed to take into account the possibly inflationary effect of "creative financing" when preparing his report.

"The terms of each contract need to be considered and the sale price adjusted to reflect the true cash value of the property," the St. Johns assessor explained in her report.

Washtenaw County's plan will likely meet with state opposition and the county expects the state tax commission to enforce its own factor to bring assessments up to levels enforced in other counties, Mrs. Edwards said, but the county is prepared to battle with the state in court, if necessary.

way said, "It's an unfortunate thing and I don't like it, but we have to live with it."

The county board has no veto power in the reapportionment committee's decision, which will be submitted to the state and, if not challenged during a 30-day appeal period, becomes law.

Overway pointed out commissioners will have to fight for their seats in four of the seven new districts in elections that could pit Second District Commissioner Walter Nobis against Third District Commissioner Harold Martin for the new First District seat; Robert Wood, district four, against Earl Lancaster, district five, for new district three; Overway of district seven against Robert Steinman, district 10, for the new district four; and Glen Webster, district one, against Robert Wood, district four, for District one of the new plan.

Another reason Overway does not like the new plan, he said, is lack of commissioners to support the board's committee structure. With fewer commissioners, all board members might be forced to attend all committee meetings in addition to serving on several other non-board committees, he said. Becoming a commissioner will get to be practically a full-time job, he said.

"We'll have people working 20 to 30 hours a week. We'll have no night life at all," Overway said.

Commissioner Robert Steinman agreed with Overway's assessment. "I don't know anyone that's in favor of it," he said during the board meeting Tuesday.

But Mrs. Swanchera, like Koenigsknecht, said most who were at first opposed to the plan changed their minds after looking at the alternatives proposed since work on reapportionment began last Nov. 1.

"It was not an easy job," she said.

Irene Zeeb, auxiliary and hospital board member, presented a talk on the history and growth of Clinton Memorial Hospital, reports said.

Also during the meeting, Corky Paradise outlined successes of the auxiliary and reported that the group has been growing. Among more recent projects undertaken by auxiliary members was funding of a new \$81,000 color television system, featuring closed circuit capability for broadcast of in-house

educational programming, reports said.

"In 1981, a total of over 16,600 volunteer hours were donated to the hospital and \$26,000 was raised by the auxiliary," Mrs. Paradise said.

Both legislators offered informal presentations and both were optimistic about the state of Michigan's economy, reports said.

Three new members were welcomed to the auxiliary board during the January meeting. Joining the auxiliary were Ruth Comstock, Kathleen Warren and Debbie Serrine, reports said.

In other business: the auxiliary donated \$8,000 to the hospital, bringing the total owed on the new TV system to less than \$20,000; and reported on their annual fund raiser, the Heart Ball, set for Feb. 6 at Highland Hills.

Tickets for the ball will be \$30 per couple and may be purchased from Verna Lynam, 224-7926.

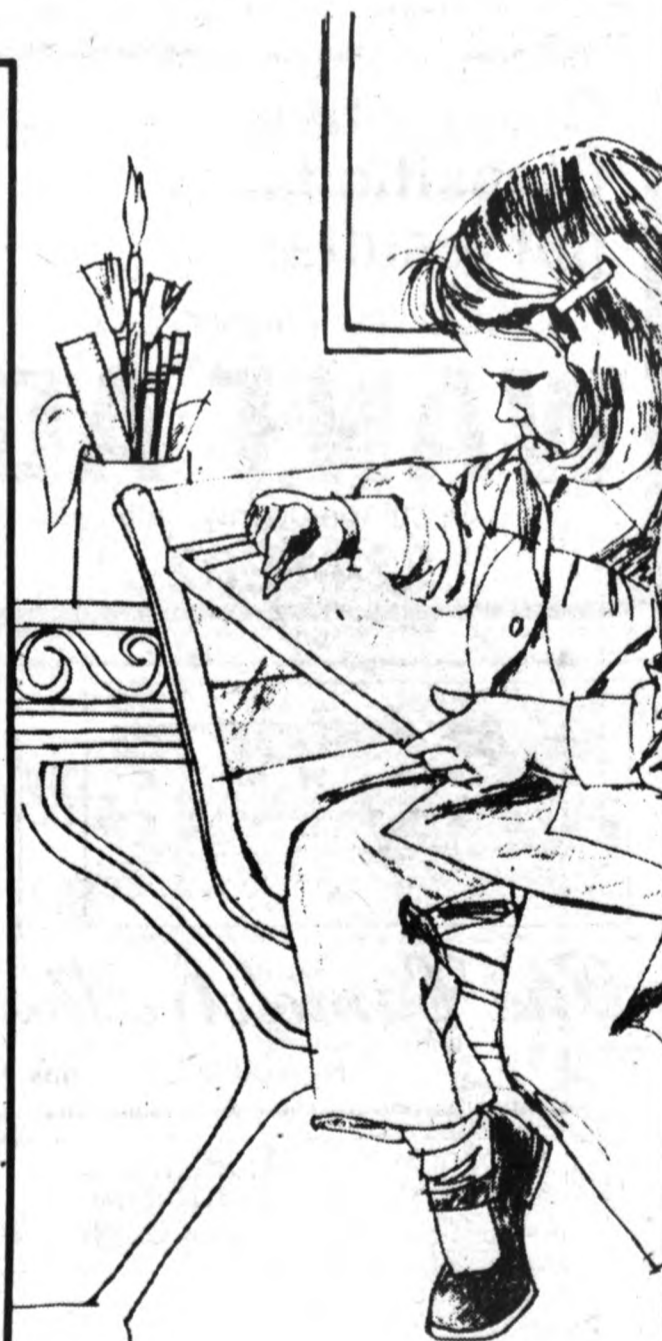

...But county says freeze needed to force reform

Their decision won't stop the state from hiking property taxes, but the Clinton County Board of Commissioners took a symbolic stand Tuesday by voting to freeze assessments at 1981 levels.

Approving a resolution by commissioner Walter Nobis of Fowler to "tentatively agree to stay with the 1981 county equalized value," Clinton commissioners followed the lead of several other Michigan counties where similar action has been taken in an effort to force a reform of state property tax laws.

If the board does not rescind the action, the state will be forced to raise the county's equalized value by a factor of about eight percent on residential and agricultural property, causing a similar increase in property taxes in those categories, Equalization Director Leon Thelen said.

Thelen said the county's equalization report, already submitted to the state, calls for no increase in commercial and industrial properties, but recommends agricultural and residential properties be raised by an average of eight percent. Compared to his 1981 report, Thelen said, the increase is not that great. Last year,

agricultural properties saw a 14 percent increase, residential property values went up nine percent, commercial properties rose by about three percent and industrial properties climbed five percent, he said.

"What the board is saying (this year) is that there should be no increase except for new construction. That's what they think should happen," Thelen said.

But the state will have the final say, he emphasized, and Roger Overway, county commission chairman, made that clear in his comments on the resolution.

"This is a protest and it is a tentative thing on the part of our board," Overway said. "If we did finalize it, we would probably subject ourselves to a state tax factor. Other counties around us are doing the same thing we're doing."

Overway admitted there is another way for the county to reduce property taxes and said opponents of similar freezes elsewhere say counties can simply roll back their millage rate if they want to give property owners relief from the growing tax burden.

"I'd agree if it would work properly," he said. "But if we reduce our millage, the schools do not, and 85 percent of the taxes we pay go to schools."

Overway's point was illustrated during a later report to the board when commissioners were given a

breakdown of how the county's tax revenues are allocated.

According to the report, schools received roughly \$20 million of the \$26.1 million collected from tax revenue sources in the county last year, Overway pointed out. The recipients, according to the report, were as follows: county government, \$2.9 million; township government, \$1.2 million; cities, \$1.3 million; villages, \$500,000; schools, \$18.1 million; colleges, \$500,000; intermediate school districts, \$1 million; special assessments, \$238,000; other assessments, \$56,000.

In approving the symbolic freeze, commissioners decided to reject another approach toward property tax reduction suggested by the City of St. Johns. The alternative approach would eliminate the influence of so-called creative financing methods which many say inflate home sale prices, causing an increase in assessments and a resulting increase in property taxes.

St. Johns voted Monday night to support an investigation into the new method of assessing properties, which is being applied in a couple of Michigan counties. The method seeks to eliminate increases in home sale prices caused because buyers are attracted by lower rates available through land contracts, assumable mortgages and other non-conventional home sale methods.

"What we're getting is a false value of property," Thelen said. He agreed creative financing has inflated home sale prices and caused misleading assessments and higher property taxes. But at the root of the problem is high interest rates, which have forced home sellers into creative financing sales, Thelen said.

"Everybody's priced out of the market," he said.

Thelen said attempts to reduce the influence of creative financing can provide relief to taxpayers, but true reform of tax laws requires pressure on state legislators. To get their attention, many counties will follow Clinton in voicing protest, he predicted.

"Pressure on the legislature would be a quick way to change the method of determining value. The resolution (by the county board) is part of the pressure. It does force an issue."

Chase proposes new radio tower site

Bowing to public pressure, Chase Broadcasting Company of St. Johns has selected an alternative site for its proposed 268-foot radio tower which has been a point of controversy in Clinton County since early last fall.

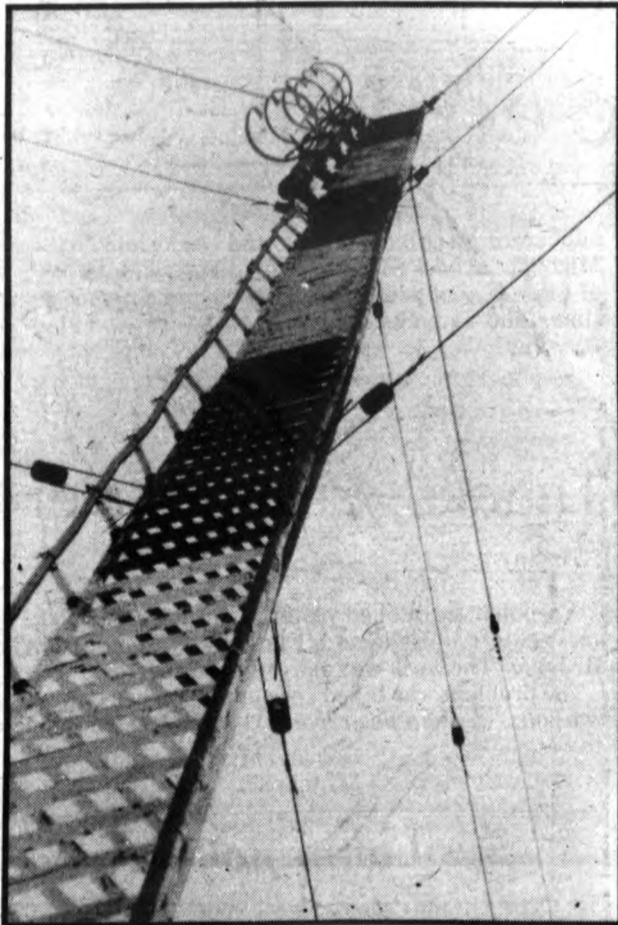
"It's important for the media to be a good citizen," said Chase President R. Charles McLravy. "If we can find a site that is more acceptable to everyone, then the whole community benefits."

The new site is located west of US-27 in Olive Township on the west side of DeWitt Road, south of Alward Road. The property is owned by Lloyd and Doris Powell of DeWitt and the general area consists of wooded, rolling countryside as well as cultivated farm land.

A public hearing to consider issuance of a special use permit (SUP) for construction of the tower at the new site will be held by the Clinton County Planning Commission at a special meeting on Thursday, Feb. 18 at 7:30 p.m. in the Clinton County Courthouse, according to county planner Thomas Warstler.

McLravy said Chase Broadcasting Company, operator of WQTK radio, needed the additional tower to expand coverage of its FM station. Current range of WQTK-FM is approximately 15 miles. The proposed tower would increase coverage to at least 25 miles, according to McLravy.

Chase Broadcasting Company's original selection of a tower site approximately two miles from Archer Airfield in Olive Township caused considerable opposition from nearby residents and from airfield owner Richard Archer.

Forty-six Olive and Victor Township residents signed a petition protesting construction of the tower so near the airfield and many of those signers showed up at last October's planning commission meeting to urge commissioners to deny the permit. Opponents expressed concern that the tower would be a safety hazard for pilots attempting to take off and land at the airport.

Despite the protests, the planning commission voted 5-2 to issue a SUP and forwarded their recommendation to the Clinton County Board of Commissioners. McLravy, however, has asked the commissioners at both their December and January meetings to table the request for a SUP for the Archer Airfield site until alternate locations could be explored.

Robert Remus, Victor Township Supervisor and one of the most vocal opponents of the original tower site, felt the new location on DeWitt Road was acceptable.

"I'm satisfied," he said. "I think there was a legitimate reason for our original concern. The safety feature was a concern. I think the new site will be better for everyone."

The life you save may be your own

We urge all senior citizens and persons with chronic illnesses or physical disabilities to take advantage of a very special offer by Clinton Memorial Hospital's Development Council and Community Services Committee.

On Saturday and Sunday, Jan. 30 and 31, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., Vials of Life will be distributed in the hospital lobby. During that time, participants will be offered assistance filling out their medical forms that go inside the vials. Four volunteers, including a nurse and a physician's assistant, will stand by to aid participants.

Vial of Life is nationally recognized method of making medical information readily available to emergency personnel caring for individuals who might not be able to communicate should a medical emergency arise.

With the help of the Clinton County Sheriff Department, St. Johns Police Department, area ambulance services and the development council and community services committee, the nationally recognized program has been initiated locally at Clinton Memorial Hospital.

The Vial of Life program consists of a medical information sheet placed in a three-inch plastic vial identified with a Vial of Life sticker. The vial is then strapped or taped under the top shelf in participants' refrigerators. An additional sticker, given with each vial, should be placed on the outside of the refrigerator door. The refrigerator has been designated as the universal place for vials so that emergency personnel familiar with the program will not have to search through residences, purses or wallets

for vital information.

It is important that information on the medical sheet is up-to-date and accurate, so program organizers ask that persons in the program bring along a complete list of current medications being taken.

For those who may already have a Vial of Life, check your vial and make sure the medical information contained on the sheet is correct.

There is probably nothing more frustrating to emergency personnel than facing an unconscious or incoherent victim with no clue as to what may be wrong. The Vial of Life provides information necessary for proper and efficient first aid and care.

This program could save your life. Make plans now to spend some time at Clinton Memorial Hospital Jan. 30 or 31.

Chamber notes

As soon as I saw the sign, "We cater to cowards," I knew I was in the right place. My dentist has to put up with a lot of cowardice in me.

At my last dental appointment, I overheard another patient asking for a filling without having her mouth numbed. Not me. I have always considered dental appointments deserving of awards for meritorious living and would actually prefer a general anesthetic for every appointment.

What the patient wanted to try, though, was a method Dr. Richard Nettke says is similar to acupuncture. A clothespin is "pinched" on the patient's ear, and because of the sensation created by the clothespin, the brain ignores pain impulses relayed by nerve endings in the tooth. Of course, this is oversimplified, and if you want a more detailed explanation, check with your dentist or doctor.

The amazing thing is that this patient had a very deep cavity drilled and filled with no pain. As soon as she was

done, she was out of the chair, smiling and saying how nice it was not to leave with a numb mouth. An added benefit was not having to face the needle for the numbing process to begin.

Dr. Nettke says that he has a few other patients who have used the clothespin this way and it really works for them. One patient had a cavity which had damaged the tooth to such an extent that the nerve itself was nearly exposed — a situation where filling would require a very numb mouth. This patient opted for the clothespin and experienced no more pain than drinking a cold glass of water.

Evidently, the people who requested this type of pain reliever got the idea from a television show and Dr. Nettke let them try it. Of course, if the pain began they could always change their minds and seek more traditional relief.

Following this procedure requires confidence in your dentist and a relaxed attitude. I think any dentist will agree that the biggest favor you can do for yourself and dentist is to just plain relax. Dental work doesn't have to be painful.

Have I tried the clothespin? I'd answer that, but my mouth is numb.

DeWitt attorney finds time to open new art gallery

Have paint brush, will travel is Matson's motto

Dan Matson is a Renaissance man. Craftsman, entrepreneur, lawyer and world traveler, he is quickly becoming "a force to be reckoned with" in Michigan art circles.

Last November, Matson realized a long-time dream by opening an art gallery in downtown DeWitt, and in just two months he has seen it grow into one of the most unique studios in the Midwest.

"We want to be known for having different kinds of art than other area galleries," he says. "We're trying to have a different theme each month."

January's theme is fiberart, and one of the featured exhibits is the work of several Laotian refugees who recently settled in the Lansing area. Their fabrics, called Paj Ntaub, look like American quilting from a distance, but closer inspection reveals an intricate form of stitchery featuring bright colors and simple designs. Each piece tells a story and the designs represent such objects as hills, mountains, snails and even the eye of a chicken.

The gallery is not just a hobby for Matson, who also practices law and serves as city attorney for DeWitt. He takes his art very seriously.

He has hired Lansing artist Christine Farmer to take over management of the studio. An accomplished practitioner of an art form she calls "sculptured felt," Ms. Farmer is also a piano teacher who currently instructs 11 Clinton County students in the gallery's music room.

Though both are busy, Ms. Farmer and Matson have time to make ambitious plans for the art venture.

"We've got a barn out back that I may convert into some type of studio," he says. "I'm also thinking about building a deck that we could use for outdoor seminars and workshops."

This spring, Matson and his wife, Marleene, also an

artist, are planning a trip to Paris where he is considering purchasing some French pieces of art, bringing them back to his gallery and having a "Paris exhibit."

Matson was formally trained as an attorney, but he has had a long-time love affair with art. He spent many hours at the Detroit Institute of Art while a student at Wayne State University. Four years ago he took his family to Tasmania for a year of church work and used

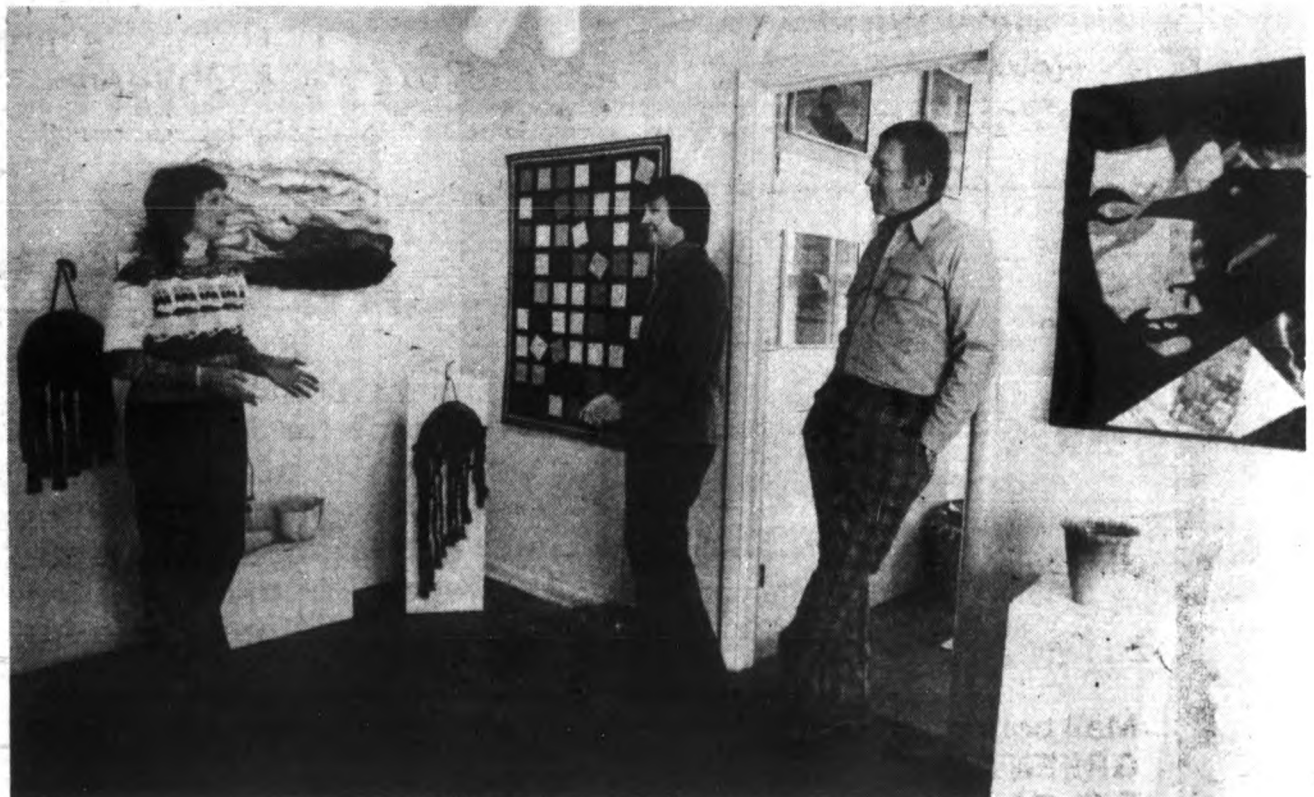
his free time to experiment with ink and water colors. He always keeps an open eye for unique art styles that would enhance a future exhibit at the gallery.

Matson now practices a unique form of paper sculpture which involves an elaborate process of mixing, pressing and pouring to achieve a final product that would look good on the walls of either a Parisian atelier, artist's studio, or a DeWitt living room.

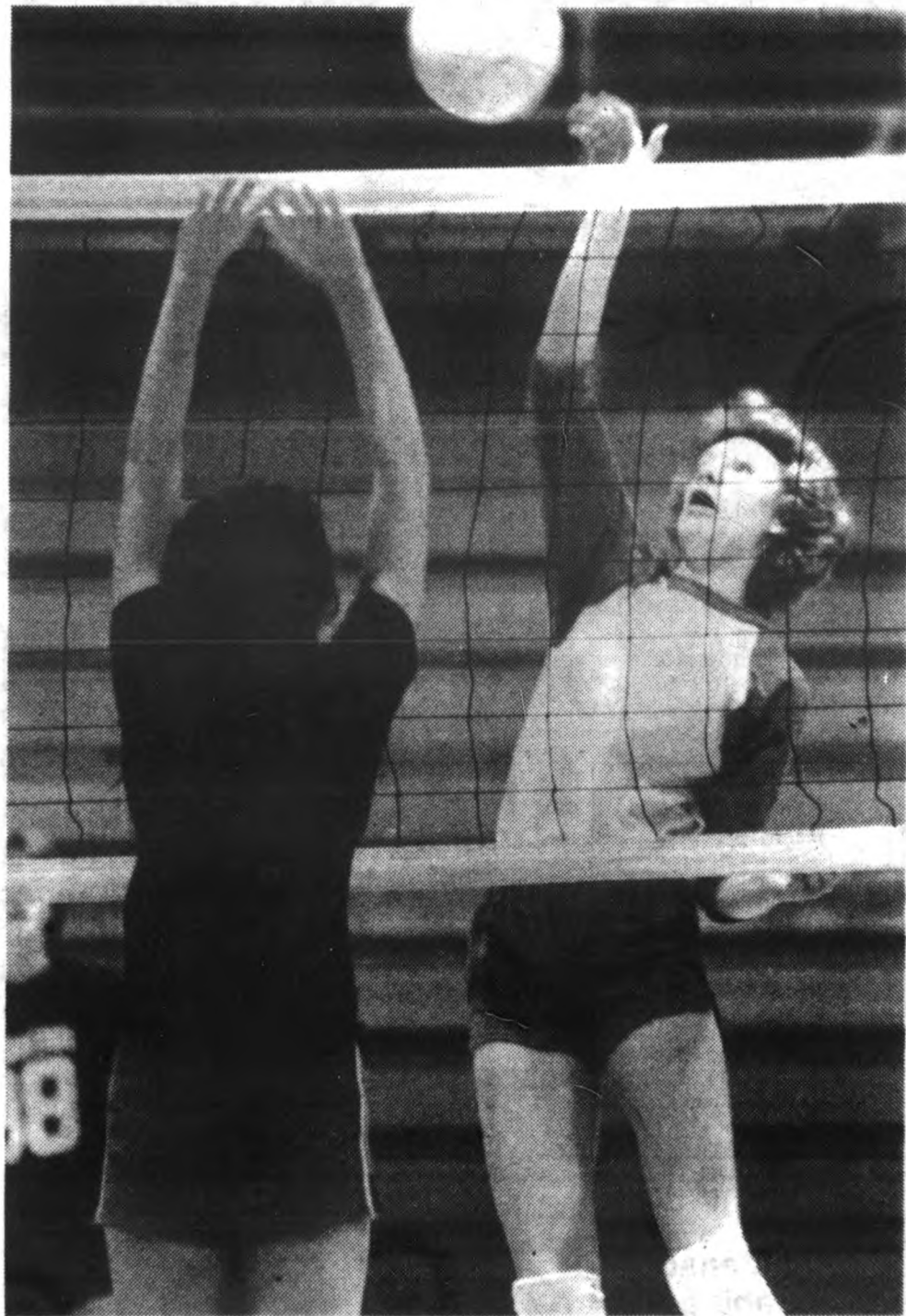
Dry Dock'd (2-0) got by Wilcox Engineering (0-2) by a 68-46 margin.

"He gives us some quickness, good defense and is a good ball handler," said Blumberg. "He'll see a lot more playing time in the future."

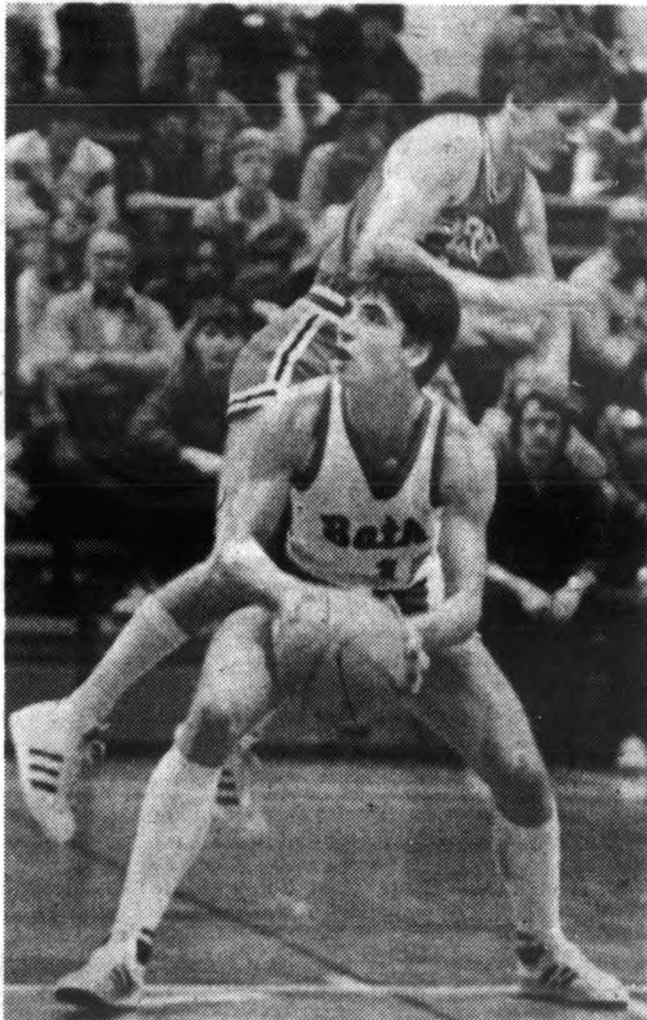

Moved and supported the County Employees be given one-half day off before Christmas and one-half day off before New Years Day. Voted and carried.

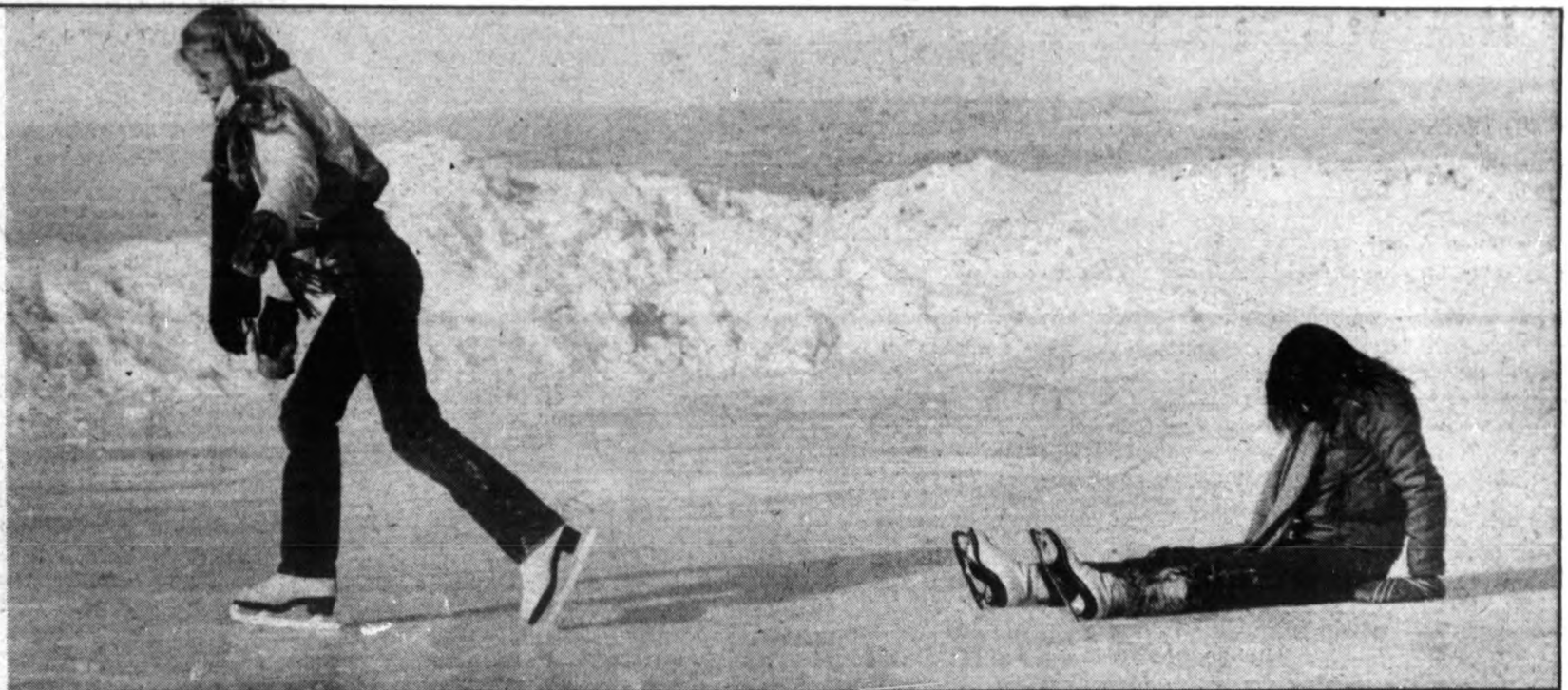
Moved and supported to approve Social Services payment of the 3rd. and 4th. quarter appropriations in a total amount of \$77,000. Voted and carried.

Safety experts warn that newspaper is highly flammable and burns quite rapidly compared to fire resistant padding available on the market.

A safer and more effective method of reducing your energy costs this winter is by caulking and weatherstripping your home.

Caulk is used around outside window and door frames and to fill outside wall and foundation cracks. Weatherstripping is used around doors and windows. Both of these methods prevent infiltration.

In poorly sealed homes, this infiltration allows cold outside air to be exchanged with warm air in your home three to five times every hour. Another comparison would be a eighth-inch opening around two door frames can let in as much cold air as a 12-inch window opened six inches all winter long. A well-sealed home will have from one-half to one air exchange per hour.

Many types of caulking materials are on the market. With each type, the life and cost of the product will vary. For example, a silicone caulking can be expected to last between 12-20 years and will cost \$3-\$6 per cartridge. Silicone adheres well to all surfaces, however it may not take to paint. Latex caulking will last 2-10 years, costs

\$1.79-\$2.60 per cartridge and is available in colors. Caulking cord will last one to two years, is very inexpensive and is used as a temporary filler around storm windows and air conditioners.

Some of the places to check when surveying your home before caulking are around doors and windows, dryer vents, faucet pipes and wires, where porches attach to the house, seams between masonry and siding, chimneys and inside corners.
