School board meeting full of surprises

Burns tells board this year his last

Board members and visitors got a couple of surprises Wednesday night, Feb. 10 when Superintendent Donald Burns announced his retirement and a local citizen charged the board with lobbying on behalf of a bill to allow twice-yearly collection of school taxes.

Burns made his announcement when an agenda item calling for discussion of his contract came up. Though board members were notified of his plans by mail the previous Friday, the news came as a surprise to others attending the meeting.

The superintendent announced he will retire Jan. 31, 1983, at the age of 55, following about six and one-half years as the top administrator of St. Johns Public Schools.

"My contract expires at the end of June and I will retire in January. I've shared this feeling with the president (of the board) for the last couple of years and that is the only comment I have," Burns said.

Board members had little to say on the topic, and agreed to extend Burns' contract until January.

Burns began his career in education teaching in a one-room school house near his parents Howell area farm in 1950. He continued his education while working as an elementary school principal in South Lyon, where he eventually became superintendent. He left that district to become St. Johns Superintendent in July, 1976.

At the beginning of the February board of education meeting, school bus driver and St. Johns area farmer Bruce Irish Sr. addressed the board. Irish said he had heard of a bill in the state legislature which would allow school districts to collect school taxes twice a year, and asked the board if they supported the measure.

"I think the taxpayers should know about it if you are. They're the ones footing the bill. Is our school district using tax dollars lobbying to get taxes collected twice a year?" he asked.

"If we have I don't know about it," Board President Ron Huard replied. "But there are a lot of things going

on in Lansing taxpayers don't know about."

Irish pointed out that the Michigan Association of School Boards, of which the St. Johns board is a member, is one of the backers of the bill, and dues paid to the association come from taxes collected from local residents, he said.

Irish warned that such a measure could force some to borrow money at high interest rates to meet their tax bills. Board members told him he might know more if he had attended the proper meetings.

"If we all went to meetings we would know what is happening, but look here tonight," Irish replied, waving an arm at the dozen in attendance. "Nobody goes to meetings or we wouldn't have to hear hearsay evidence at work."

Enlisting support of local voters will be biggest challenge, superintendent warns

Overcoming a poor impression of schools created by bad publicity and communicating better with the public will be the major challenges facing St. Johns next school superintendent, according to present superintendent Donald Burns.

Burns, who announced he will retire next Jan. 31 at a meeting of the school board Wednesday, Feb. 10, predicted that if such challenges are not met, the quality of education delivered by local schools will continue to slide downhill as financial resources dwindle.

"I think there is going to be more pressure on superintendents and local school boards in the next

three or four years as resources continue to shrink for public schools," he said in an interview Monday.

With state aid to schools being trimmed and voters becoming more hostile to millage increases as property taxes spiral upwards, "there has to be some improvement," in the method of financing aid to education, he said, or St. Johns "will continue downhill for the next five years."

The 54-year-old educator pointed out that state aid to education has declined from 51 percent of the school budget in 1976, when he took the job as superintendent of St. Johns Public Schools, leaving his job as superintendent of South Lyon Public Schools, to an estimated 28 percent of the budget in the 1981-82. To improve the school district's financial future, better communication between the schools and the public is needed, he said.

"Public relations or whatever you call it ... is going to be very critical if we're going to put the brakes on more cuts and reductions."

One of the biggest obstacles to needed millage increases, he said, is a bad public image of what goes on in schools. Thanks media reports that highlight discipline and drug problems, he said, most people think little of their local schools. And since state estimates say only about 30 percent of the population has kids in school, 70 percent do not have enough contact with their school system to find such notions are mistaken, Burns said.

Surveys repeatedly reveal the top two concerns regarding schools are drugs and discipline, but neither is a major worry in St. Johns, the superintendent said.

"I'm convinced there is not a serious problem in St. Johns. I don't think it's nearly the problem in many schools that the media — basically television and big city newspapers — make it out to be.

"What they present is not a fair picture. Granted, we have our problems with vandalism and discipline, because schools really reflect society. They have to."

But St. Johns is less troubled simply because it is a small town, he said. "Parents here have pride in their schools and that carries over to the students. A very small percentage of our students give our teachers trouble."

Explaining school financing to the public is another communications problem, he said. Many in rural areas who voted against joining the St. Johns School District years ago are still expressing their displeasure with the outcome of the vote when millage increases or renewals are asked, he said; others consider millage votes a "pocketbook issue," and most find it hard to understand why the schools need more money when the number of students is declining.

Enrollment is expected to drop by as many as 100 students next fall, costing the district roughly \$1,800 per student in state aid. But with actual student census not taken until the school year has started, staff reductions cannot be made in time to compensate, he said.

"I try to explain it's like a family when a kid goes off to college. You may have one fewer at the table, but you've still got the costs to heat your home, for energy and the rest."

Adjusting to declining enrollment has been his biggest challenge as superintendent, the Western Michigan University, University of Michigan and Michigan State University graduate said.

Price of milk hiked by five cents

Federal funding cuts were blamed for a five cent hike in milk prices approved by the St. Johns Board of Education Monday night, Feb. 10.

Following the lead of many schools in the area, board members agreed to raise the price of milk from 15 to 20 cents per half-pint after administrator Steve Bakita told them the lunch program could go into the red without the increase.

The main reason for the increase, Bakita said, was withdrawal of federal government reimbursement for the school system's Special Milk Program. The federal government no longer requires schools to sell milk to students who carry a sack lunch at the same price offered to hot lunch program participants, and has withdrawn funding.

Combined with increased costs for milk and hidden costs to handle milk sales, the funding cuts would mean the milk program would run at a loss, Bakita explained.

"If we have a deficit this year, this would be one reason," he said.

Half-pints of white milk cost the school system about 13 cents each, and chocolate milk half-pints cost about 15 cents, for an average cost of 14.7 cents per carton, he said.

But when hidden costs for cleanup and handling are added on, milk costs the schools closer to 20 cents per carton, he said.

A member of the audience suggested selling only white milk or sellin white milk at a lower rate, but Bakita said a similar effort about 10 years ago was abandoned in the face of parent protests. Students presently buy about nine cartons of chocolate milk for every one carton of white or two percent milk sold, he said.

"If I had my way, I'd just sell white milk or two percent," the administrative assistant said. "But I don't think we are ready to try that again yet."

The special milk program will continue and students are welcome to bring milk from home, Bakita pointed out. "They don't have to buy it for 20 cents."

Tires stolen from board member

Redwings 'get their act together'

"A good combination of effects from clowning to the ultimate tragedy," characterized a production of *Godspell* by St. Johns High School, according to judges in the Michigan High School Drama Competition Saturday. They deemed the effort good enough to rank number one in regional competition.

The Redwing dramatists achieved a score of 180 out of 200 possible points to win the Region A championship for the second year in a row, according to Director of Theatre Robert Koger.

"The victory was not an easy one for the Redwings," he said. "This is one of the toughest regional competitions that I can recall, and we have been fortunate enough to pass on to the regional level of competition for the past 11 years."

The local drama group barely earned a slot in the regional competition two weeks before, Koger said, when the production placed third in the district. By winning the highest third place score among three schools in district competition across the state, St. Johns was given a second chance to face the schools that had earned higher points in earlier competition, he said. Barely squeezing out a win, the team moved on to higher levels of district competition, then to Saturday's regional hosted by St. Johns.

Performing on their home stage, the Redwing thespians "got their act together," Koger said, and managed to eke out a one point margin of victory in judging against rival Stevensville-Lakeshore's production of *Peer Gynt*.

In third place was Standish-Sterling's production of *Everyman* with a score of 172.

"This means that St. Johns is going to have to keep its nose to the grindstone as they pass on to the state finals this Friday and Saturday at Central Michigan University (CMU) in Mt. Pleasant," Koger said. Both Stevensville and Standish will also compete in the finals and will have an opportunity to unseat St. Johns and bring the curtain down on the Redwings' chances to retain the 1981 crown of State Champions.

In addition to winning the regional title, the cast of 14 and band of four performing in the *Godspell* production also earned superior individual performance titles, Koger said. "This is the highest individual title that can be attained in the drama competition," he said.

The production's lighting crew also came out with special recognition for their individual work when judges awarded each of them certificates of excellence, he said.

The St. Johns drama team will perform *Godspell* Act II in the State Finals on Friday at 1:30 p.m. in Bush theatre on the CMU campus, he said. Their production will be the first presented during the two day eliminations for State Drama Champion, a title won by St. Johns in 1975, 1978, 1979 and 1981.

The performances are open to the public, free of charge, and present an opportunity for audiences to view the finest in high school drama, Koger said.

"It's almost impossible to balance expenditures without making cuts in programs and staff. The board needs to make a decision if they're going to just go for renewal of the 3.5 mills we got last year or ask for an additional millage," he said.

Burns said the cuts that may be necessary before he leaves will have an impact on parents, students and the general public.

The father of three, including two teenaged sons, said he plans to do some part-time work teaching at a community college or consulting after his retirement. "I have nothing definite in mind yet, but it would have to be on a part-time basis," he said.

ORDINANCE NO. 5

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 5, WHICH IS AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ACQUISITION OF A SANITARY SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM BY THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF WATERTOWN, CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, TO PROVIDE FOR THE OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE WATERTOWN CHARTER TOWNSHIP WASTEWATER COLLECTION SYSTEM; TO PROVIDE FOR THE OWNERSHIP, OPERATION OF, AND MANDATORY CONNECTION TO, SAID SYSTEM; TO REGULATE THE DISCHARGE OF WATER AND WASTE INTO SAID SYSTEM; TO PROHIBIT PRIVATE SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEMS AND EXCEPTIONS THERETO; TO PROVIDE RATES AND CHARGES TO BE LEVIED UPON USERS OF THE SYSTEM AND FOR CONNECTION THERETO; FOR CAPACITY UTILIZATION, INSPECTION AND FOR INDUSTRIAL COST RECOVERY; TO ESTABLISH ADMINISTRATIVE AND FINANCIAL PROCEDURES FOR THE OPERATION OF THE SYSTEM AND THE DISCHARGE OF OBLIGATIONS INCURRED IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; TO DEFINE TERMS, ESTABLISH FUNDS AND PROVIDE REMEDIES AND PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE, BY ADDING SUBSECTION 3 TO SECTION 7 E OF SAID ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR NOTIFICATION AND PROHIBITION OF PROHIBITED ACCIDENTAL AND OTHER UNAUTHORIZED DISCHARGES INTO THE SYSTEM, AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF WATERTOWN, CLINTON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. That Section 7 E of Ordinance No. 5 shall be amended to add a subsection 3 thereto, said subsection to provide as follows:

"3. That any industrial user hereunder, in the event of an accidental or other unauthorized discharge of prohibited materials into the system, shall immediately notify the Township and the Southern Clinton County Sanitary Sewer Authority of the fact of such discharge and shall:

A. describe with particularity the approximate time of the discharge;

B. the nature, chemical and biological makeup and characteristics of the discharge, if known; and

C. the approximate quantity of the discharge.

In addition, said industrial user shall, at its own expense, take all steps directed by the Authority to terminate such discharge and prevent its recurrence. Failure to cooperate fully with the Authority and/or the Township in the prevention of additional prohibited discharge, including such pre-treatment as may be required, may result in termination of service."

SECTION 2. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and publication as required by law.

feature the talents of Clinton Memorial Hospital's Dr. Jack Clarkson.

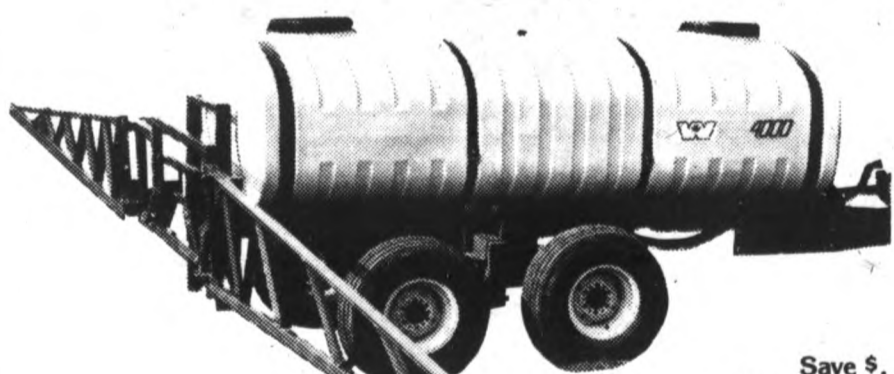



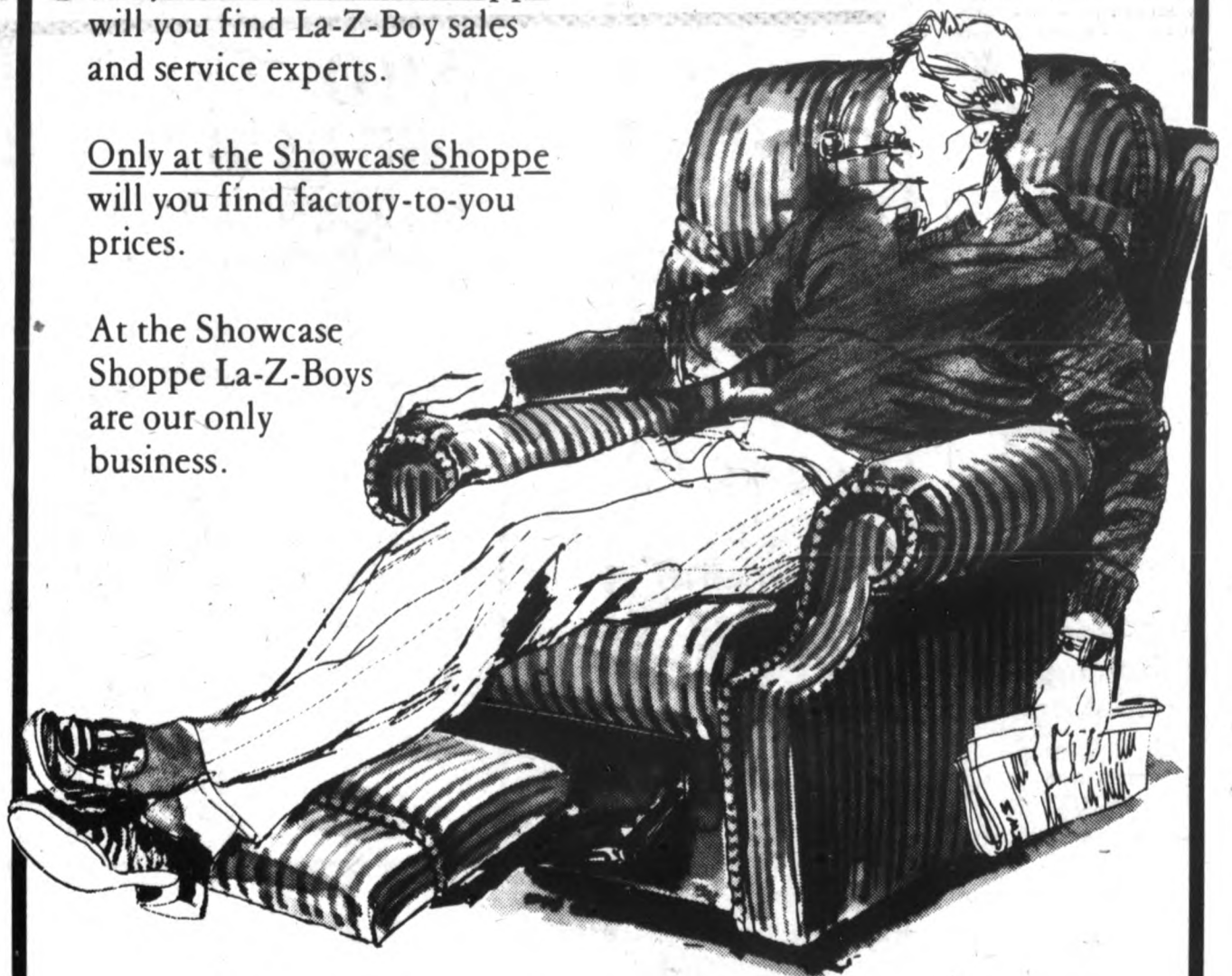

Employees admit ingot thefts

Two former Federal Mogul employees were sentenced Friday to ninety days in the county jail for their involvement in the theft of \$200,000 worth of tin ingots from the local plant.

James Allen Porubski, 28, of 9385 E. Taft, Bannister, and Kent Roger Burl, 29, of 1647 S. Morrice Rd., Owosso, both pleaded guilty to a charge of embezzlement of under \$100 in Clinton County

District Court.

Porubski and Burl set aside ingots intended for the melting pot in the Federal Mogul plant, which manufactures bearings. The ingots were later smuggled out of the plant, according to Clinton County Prosecuting Attorney John Newman.

Newman said testimony from the two men was instrumental in the arrests of Larry Chick and Arthur

Rockafellow, also alleged to have been involved in the case. They have been charged with larceny of over \$100, and are awaiting action in circuit court, Newman said.

St. Johns Police Chief Lyle French said the arrests resulted from an investigation of employee theft at the plant which began last September.

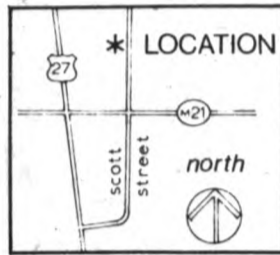

More to migrant program than dollars and cents

Attending meetings regularly and witnessing the democratic process in action at the local level can be rewarding; it can also be puzzling and disappointing. A meeting of the St. Johns School board Wednesday night, Feb. 10 falls in the latter category.

Covering local news on a regular basis to keep our readers informed, we get ample opportunity to observe local citizens making important decisions on behalf of their constituents. For the most part, it is encouraging to see elected officials weigh alternatives and take the path they believe will lead to the greatest good, regardless of political pressure or popularity. Unfortunately, that did not appear to be the case Wednesday night when the board discussed participation in the Summer Migrant Education Program, federally financed summer school for children of migrant workers.

The board's decision to end participation was disappointing. By withdrawing from the program, St. Johns will force directors of the program in the Montcalm Area Intermediate School District to find other, less centrally located facilities. As a result, participants will likely be forced to travel farther, causing costs of the federally financed program, and the bill to taxpayers, to increase.

More serious, perhaps, is the impact of the decision on participants. Unfortunately, things have changed little since Edward R. Murrow's documentary depicting the plight

of migrant workers was aired decades ago, and "Harvest of Shame" remains relevant today. Most migrant workers still lead rootless lives, moving from town to town to follow job opportunities: an existence most of us would find intolerable. Because most parents must work in the fields to make ends meet, and there are no day-care centers in cucumber patches, children are often forced to work along beside them from an early age.

The migrant education program, criticized by some board members as a baby-sitting service, provides less fortunate youngsters a chance to better themselves. At the worst, it does free parents from watching their babies, giving them a chance to earn more and better the lot of their family while their children are bused to a cleaner, more stimulating environment away from stoop labor and dusty fields; at its best, the program may provide an escape hatch for a few education-hungry kids who wish to improve themselves and their future.

For St. Johns to abandon such a program, after migrant labor has helped harvest area crops for years, is disappointing.

It is also puzzling.

A report given to board members listed revenues from participation in the program at more than \$11,000, compared to costs of about \$4,353 — that's a net profit of roughly \$6,700. Board members pointed out depreciation and wear and tear on school buildings

was not included, and after discussing various costs, managed to come up with figures that indicate the schools made only \$800. When their "investment" didn't pan out as well as anticipated, the board agreed the program did not merit participation.

Few good reasons were given for the decision, but we're prepared to make some guesses.

Judging by board members' comments, constituents have asked uncomfortable questions about St. Johns School buses carrying a handful of children across the county during the summer. Although the bus runs for participants are fully funded, this hasn't been made clear and a bad impression has been created in the minds of many voters.

Another likely reason for the decision is a declining need for migrant workers in the area as a result of increased agricultural mechanization. Fewer farmers employ migrants and support for their needs finds fewer sympathetic ears.

The simplest reason for such a decision, however, is the tendency of many today to express human lives in dollars and cents. In rough economic times, the needs of the less fortunate too often are the first to be sacrificed on the budget cutting block.

Were the program just breaking even, without generating extra federal dollars for the school district, it would still be profitable for society in the long run.

Extension news

Future bright with cooperation

Several Clinton County officials and agribusiness representatives were among a select group participating in a meeting with Michigan State University administrators Feb. 5.

Attending one of MSU's eight "People to People" meetings throughout the state were Dale Kuenzli, manager of Valley Marketing, Marie Thelen, Gerald Shepard, and Don Sisung, president of the Clinton County Farm Bureau.

The veteran 4-H leader had an opportunity to discuss and make recommendations for MSU's educational efforts for the next year. The delegation met with university officials at the Sweden Inn in Saginaw.

The group heard comments from several MSU officials, including Jack Kinsinger, associate provost; James Anderson, dean of the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources; Gordon Guyer, director of the

Cooperative Extension Service; and Sylvan Wittwer, director of the university's Agricultural Experiment Station.

The meeting opened with brief comments by the Kinsinger, who talked about the current challenges and opportunities facing the university. Then the administrative group answered questions and discussed comments from those attending the meeting.

The purpose of the meeting was twofold, Anderson said.

"We want to assure the public that the university will continue to serve the needs of people across the state through its academic, research and outreach program," he said.

"We also want people to understand that, in spite of the current economic problems, there is a lot of energy and momentum within the university and that it is not

going to fold up and blow away — it is in business to stay.

"In many ways," he continued, "we are at a crossroads, not only at the university but agriculture in general throughout Michigan. In keeping with our mission of serving people, we need their suggestions and guidance on how best we can tailor our programs to meet their needs for the rest of this decade and beyond."

To the editor:

Sunday morning, Feb. 7 was a sad commentary on human compassion and the respect of one human for life. My eyes well up with tears as I remember what occurred that led to the death of my family's best friend and companion, Trinket, our one-year-old English Springer Spaniel.

My wife and our dog went outside Sunday morning to get the paper from a container located across our lightly travelled side road in Bath Township. Trinket saw another dog and came onto the road with my wife. She attempted to stop Trinket and to encourage her to return to the yard.

As my wife moved in the direction of the dog, a speeding pickup truck approached from behind her on the slippery road. Before our dog could get secure

footing to leave the road, the truck passed my wife, striking our dog and leaving her beside the road unable to move.

The driver neither attempted to slow down to avoid contact with the dog, nor did he even have the courtesy to stop to see if any help could be given. We rushed our dog to the veterinarian where she lived but a few hours with a broken back before she had to be put to sleep.

The loss of Trinket is difficult to explain to myself, my wife and our boys. The insensitivity to life the driver of the truck displayed leads to even more anguish. This terrible accident to our pet could possibly have been avoided. I pray the driver never has to experience this kind of a tragedy within his family. His lack of compassion and understanding of feelings is hard to comprehend — it could have been my wife.

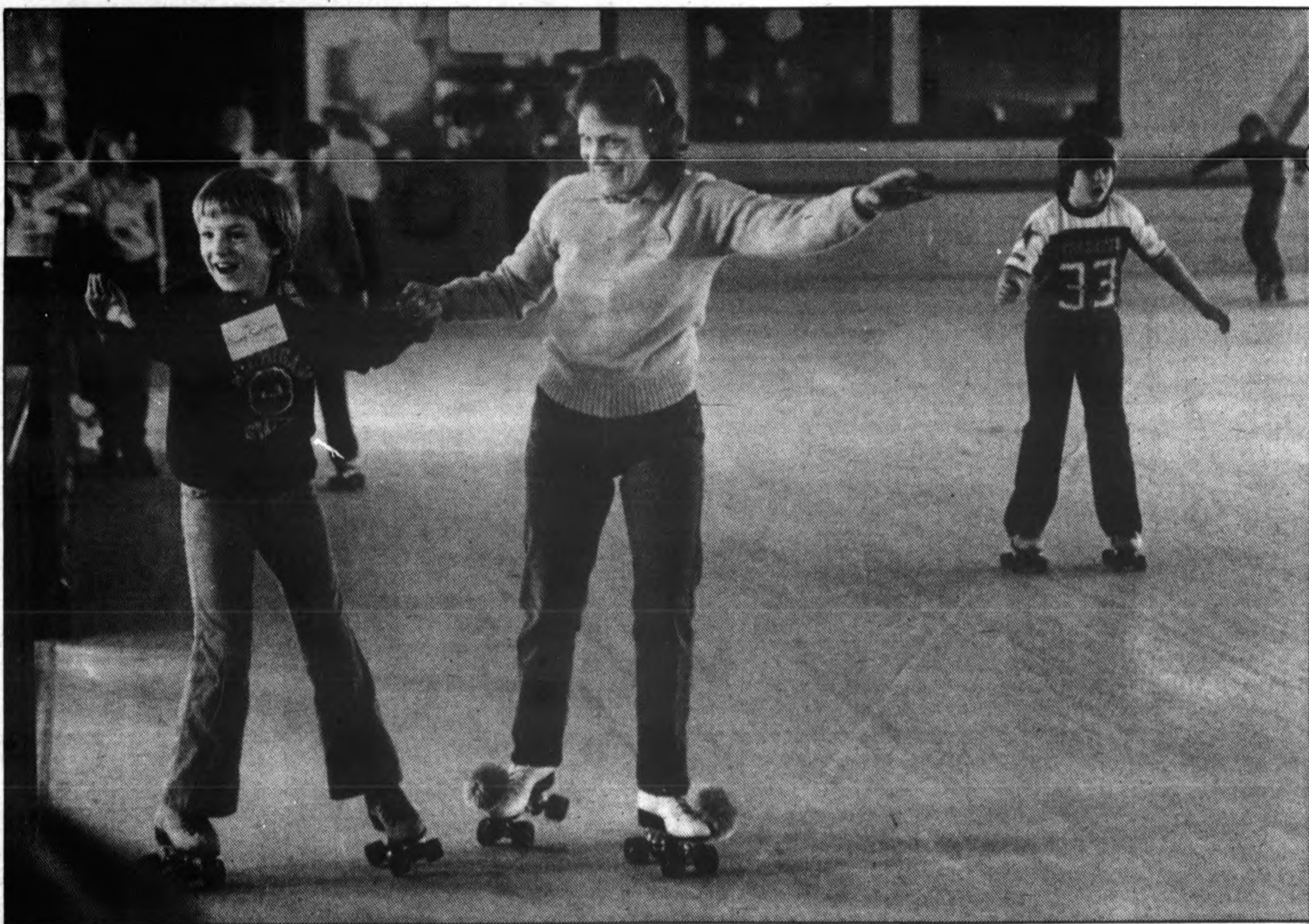

Would you give up one night a week plus put yourself on call for one weekend each month? The Clinton Area Ambulance Volunteers do and Saturday, March 13, they are holding a dance at the VFW Hall in St. Johns.

The dance is open to the public and is slated to raise money for classes, training and equipment for the volunteers. All ambulance volunteers must be certified as Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs), and in order to be certified, 130 hours of class and clinical time must be logged by each volunteer. The price tag on certification is about \$165 per student, plus a lot of hard work. An EMT's training is never done; they must keep up with their field through continuing education courses and they have to be re-licensed every three years. For licensing, they must pass a written exam provided by the state.

There is more to being an ambulance volunteer than meets the eye.

Carl Fonger, director of the Ambulance Volunteers, says that the staff at Clinton Memorial has gone all out to help with the training program. He said that working with Dr. Clarkson, head of emergency services, has been a real pleasure. In the past, all EMT training was done in Lansing, which put added stress on the

volunteers. But this year the classes are being offered right at Clinton Memorial Hospital in St. Johns. The hospital has also provided doctors to lecture on various aspects of ambulance service.

Along with his other support of the ambulance team, Dr. Clarkson has promised his band, "Jack and the Jackies," will provide music for the benefit dance.

Tickets are available from Gary and Judy Price, any ambulance service volunteer and several local businesses. If you still can't find a place to buy them, call the chamber office at 224-7248.

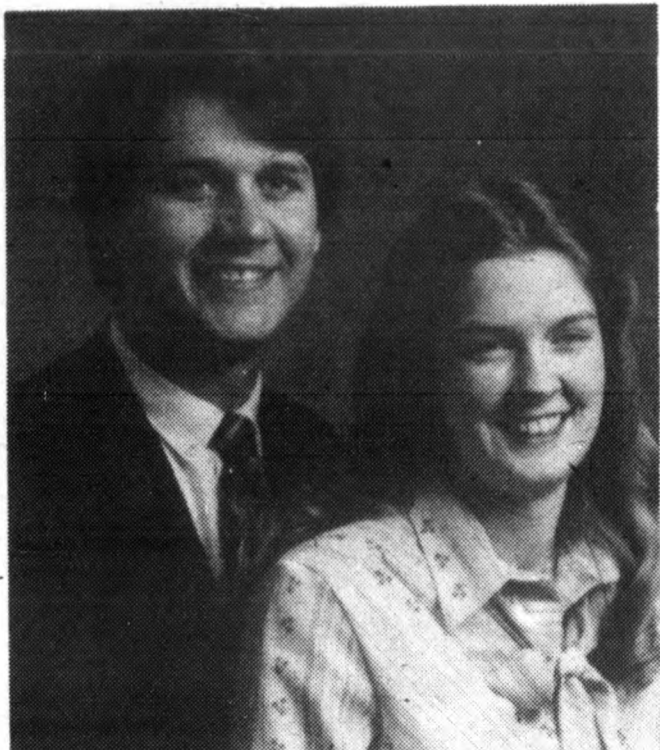

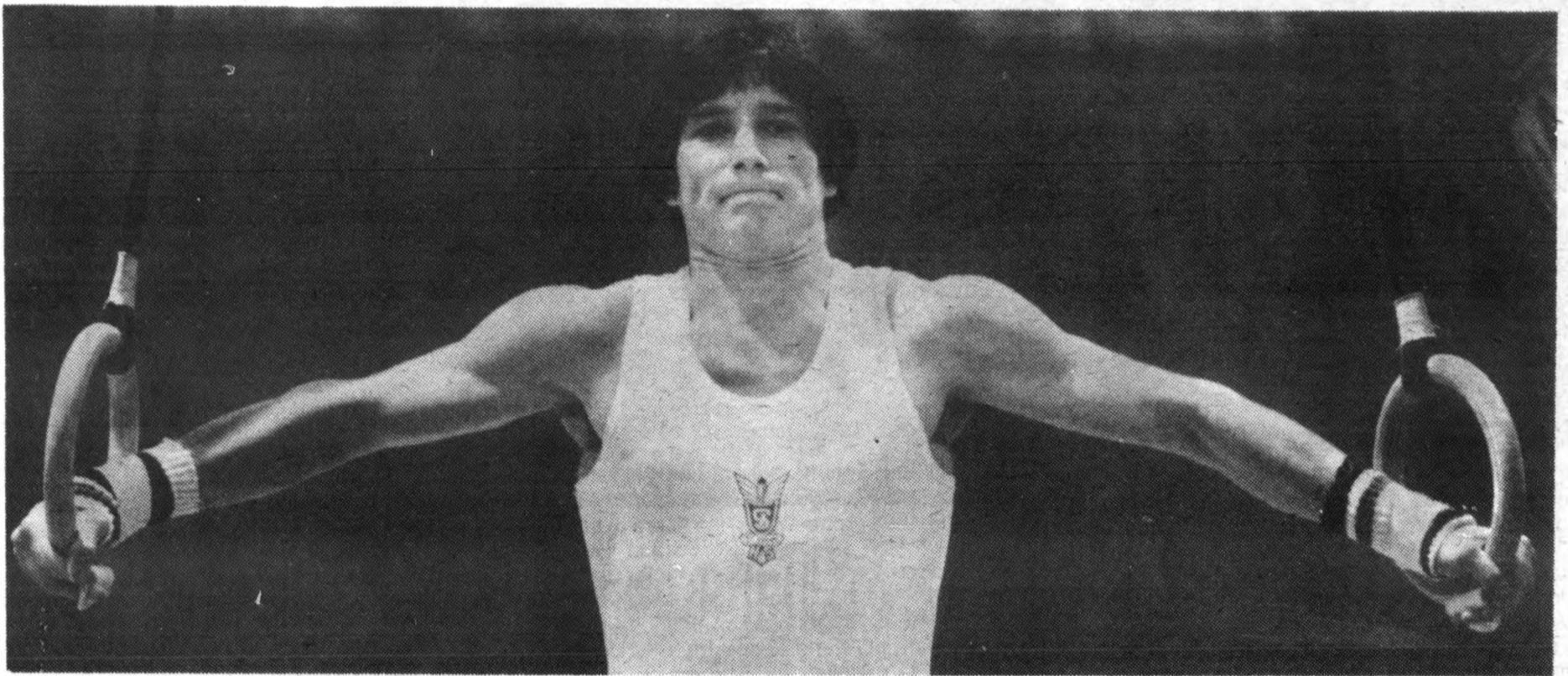

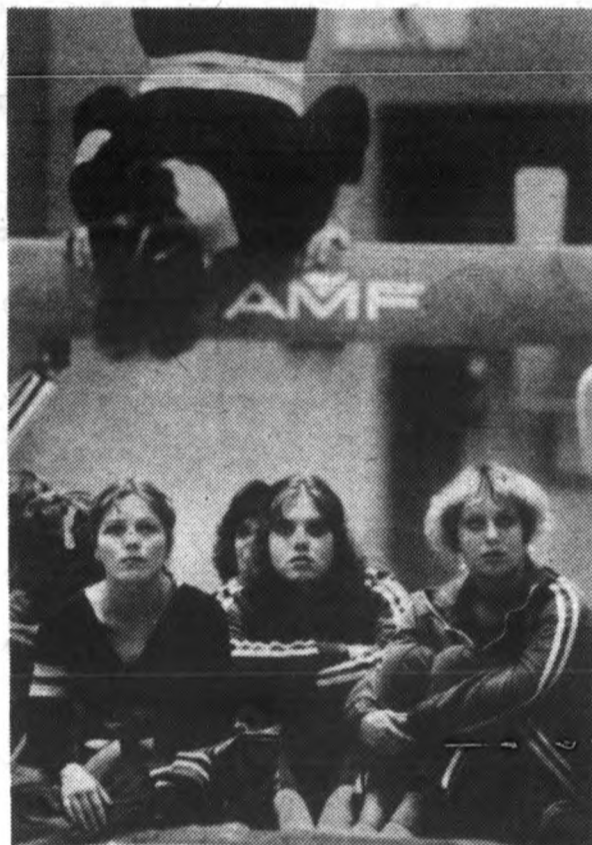

(Under authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929 and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended)

STATEWIDE TROUT AND SALMON REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on December 4, 1981, under the authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning April 1, 1982, and ending March 31, 1984, no person shall take, or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open season prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

Statewide open seasons on all streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon. Size limits shall be 8 inches on Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on lakes. The daily limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination but no more than 3 lake trout or splake, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only and no more than 2 lake trout or splake may be taken from Lake Michigan or its tributary streams.

Rapidly improving DeWitt beats Mason for fifth straight

Redwings lose to Ionia

Falling behind 16-8 at the end of the first quarter, St. Johns never was able to get back in the game and dropped a 77-56 game to Mid-Michigan B League leader Ionia Friday night.

The victory clinched the league title for Ionia and was their second win over the Redwings this season.

Backgammon

Nov. 4 to 7, 1981, the 20th annual Vietor Cup was held in La Jolla, Calif.

The Vietor Cup is probably the oldest continuously held backgammon tournament in the world. It is also one of the most prestigious. This year 17 players from many parts of the world participated in this invitation-only event.

The general quality of play in the tournament was quite high. Typical is this situation taken from a match between William B. Meyer of New York City and Jack Strauss of Los Angeles. Meyer (X) played the 5-1 by moving 13/7, leaving a blot which Strauss (O) can hit with a 2.

This is much better than playing totally safe with a play such as 13/8, 3/2. O has only a one-point home board (the 19-point) so X can afford to take all kinds of chances, knowing that he will almost certainly re-enter immediately if hit.

By leaving a blot on the 7-point, X stands to gain in two possible ways. If O doesn't hit X may soon cover the blot, making a useful blocking point.

But if O hits, X may gain even more. To hit, O has to break his valuable anchor on the 5-point, leaving himself highly vulnerable to a counterattack by X.

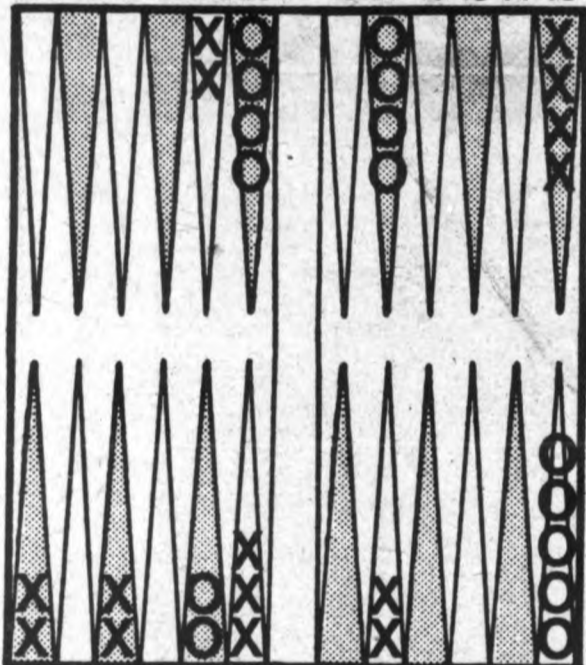
X would welcome an exchange of hits under these circumstances. X, of course, retains his anchor, and X also has the big advantage of three points made in his home board compared to O's one.

This means that when hit, O is more likely to stay out on any given turn. It also means that, unlike X, O can be closed out completely with a series of rolls favoring X.

By moving to the 7-point, X is actually dangling bait in front of O. X hopes that O will snap at it by hitting, and then suffer the consequences.

With strong play such as this (and a good roll here and there), Meyer built up an early 6-1 lead in the 9-point match. But then Lady Luck decided to favor Strauss, also a fine player. Jack staged a strong rally and eventually pulled out a close victory.

X to Play 5-1

Points are numbered 1 to 24, starting with X's home board at the lower left. A move, for example, from the 7-point to the 3-point is written 7/3. 7/3* means that a man was hit on the 3-point. 7/3(2) means that two men were moved to the 3-point.
