Star benched in locker room tiff

A locker room quarrel was blamed for the suspension of the Redwings' star center just before a big game against Okemos last Saturday, Feb. 20.

The verbal exchange, which did not come to blows, according to coach Al Werbish, involved starting center Dennis Sleep, 18, and starting forward Dave Gonzales, 17.

"Denny Sleep is now gone (from the team)," Werbish said the following Tuesday. "He verbally intimidated Dave Gonzales and admitted 'I was wrong' to me."

Sleep, who has averaged 13 points per game for the Redwings, has been suspended, Werbish said. Four regular season games and tournament competition remain in the 1892 season, and appeal of the decision is permitted under school guidelines.

Werbish would not elaborate on the cause of the exchange between Sleep and Gonzales, but said Sleep "brought a non-basketball problem into the locker room and it disturbed the team greatly."

"But I will say this," he added, "the players have accepted the decision and they will play over it."

For his part in the incident, Gonzales was suspended along with Sleep from the Okemos game, which St. Johns lost (see sports page for details), and was benched for the start of a game against Grand Ledge Tuesday night, Feb. 23. Werbish said he expected Gonzales to play in the Grand Ledge game, however.

High School Principal Bill Swears, a former coach, said he agreed with Werbish's decision after looking into the problem.

"There was an unfortunate incident that occurred and I have all the confidence in the world that Mr. Werbish has handled it properly," Swears said.

Proposed survey previews next millage campaign

Preparing to test the waters of voter opinion on millage increases, St. Johns Board members say they're leary of being burned.

Offered a preview Monday night of a public opinion survey which could play a role in the board's next millage campaign, board members said they will have to be careful not to ask questions they don't want answers to.

A suggestion by a Save Our Schools Committee member during St. Johns millage campaign last fall convinced Superintendent Donald Burns and others a survey of voter attitudes was needed before a similar campaign was launched, Burns told the board.

The survey, consisting of 33 questions, was compiled by Burns and a few teachers in hopes of determining what the mood of voters may be to a millage proposal, and what programs should be cut if a millage increase is not granted.

"We thought we should answer the question many people were asking, which was 'When we have to cut or reduce programs, why are some programs cut and not others?'" Burns explained.

Based on similar surveys used by other school districts, the Burns' proposed questionnaire resulted from about three months work, he said.

The superintendent said later he hoped to make the survey available to all voters, then also conduct a random sample of voters for more statistically accurate findings; and hoped to do both in time to plan any possi-

ble millage requests at the annual school election next June.

"I hope you find it as agreeable as I did," he said, submitting the survey to the board.

But some board members did not, and warned the survey could backfire.

ams on a scale of one to five, from "Most Important to Keep" (1) to "Should be Cut" (5). Questions cover possible cuts in the length of school days, participation in vocational programs, sports, driver's education, music, drama, art, remedial and honors courses, maintaining a swimming pool for student use, library books and personnel, counseling, busing, administration, custodial staff and hot lunch program.

Some board members took exception to a few questions, and insisted it would not be wise to include questions about cutting areas in which cuts are not allowed by law or are not feasible.

Time's up for draft sign-up extension

Draft eligible men who haven't registered yet have about three more days to do so, and many are apparently taking advantage of the deadline extension, according to local postal employees administering draft registration.

Young men who have failed to register for the draft may do so through Feb. 28 without fear of prosecution for late registration, according to Selective Service officials.

After Feb. 28, all 18-year-old male citizens who were born since Jan. 1, 1960, who have failed to register will face possible criminal prosecution. Men may register at any U. S. Post Office.

Asked if more registrants had been filling out forms during the deadline extension, Carl Martin, officer in charge at the St. Johns Post Office, said yes.

"It's been heavier. I've seen more people coming up to ask for cards and filling them out," he said.

The announcement implements President Reagan's statement of Jan. 7, in which he endorsed the continua-

"I'm not opposed and I think it would have value. But hanging our curriculum could have far reaching ramifications that the average taxpayer doesn't understand and maybe we don't even understand," Lee Ormston said. "We'd have to take these answers under serious consideration."

Ormston agreed with other board members who cautioned that the school system could get "burned" if angry respondents later asked why their wishes were not heeded. But, he said, "the schools do have an obligation to try to find out what the people are thinking."

Board PRESident Ron Huard echoed those sentiments, but offered a word of caution.

"If we go out and seek input, we are endangering our position," he said. "If we don't do what the survey says we should do, it looks bad."

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Former librarian honored by city

Former City Librarian and long-time St. Johns resident Hila Bross was given a certificate of honorary citizenship by the City of St. Johns Monday night, Feb. 22.

City commission members unanimously approved a resolution honoring Mrs. Bross for her "energy, enthusiasm and warmth which has earned her the admiration and affection of the people of St. Johns."

Mrs. Bross recently left St. Johns for Traverse City where she is recovering from surgery, and was St. Johns Librarian from 1965 to 1976, Mayor John Arehart said. "Mrs. Bross has been ill of late, quite ill," he said, introducing the resolution.

Framed copies of the resolution will be given to Mrs. Bross and hung in the local library.

The fate of the Oddfellows Building at 323 N. Clinton occupied the majority of commissioners' time at their second February meeting during a public hearing on condemnation of the aging structure.

The building, which has been responsible for falling debris, represents a "large sized threat," to the community, Vice-Mayor Donald Roesner said.

City Clerk Richard Coletta told commissioners the Oddfellows have already begun fixing the building, and recommended they be given a chance to repair the structure before commissioners proceeded further with condemnation. "The building is in a bad state," Coletta said, but he pointed out improvements are underway. "They did get some scaffolding up and have started repairs."

"The club has been very generous with civic groups that want to use the building and we want to be lenient with them. But we have a responsibility to protect the citizens of St. Johns," Roesner said.

Other commissioners were skeptical the Oddfellows' efforts would be sufficient to save the building, and Coletta, who inspected it with the city engineer, agreed.

"There should be some substantial repairs, not just a band-aid, and it should be done fast," he said.

Two representatives of the Oddfellows, Robert Gladstone and Gordon Mahar, said they were already doing their best with meager finances and poor weather conditions.

"Any day it's sensible to work, we'll be out there working," Mahar said. He estimated it would take eight

days to two weeks to finish work on the building to make it safer, including boarding up windows, replacing loose bricks and securing a broken gutter which has caused water erosion of the exterior brick veneer.

"It would be good to know, not only for us, but for the Oddfellows, too, if that building is worth saving," Stark said.

"The problem is there are not too many stores and buildings in the entire downtown area we can bring up to code," Coletta said.

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Redwings return with third place

Two-in-a-row was one too many for a group of dramatists from St. Johns High School who placed third in statewide competition at Central Michigan University Friday, Feb. 19.

According to their director, Robert Koger, the group drew the disadvantage of being the opening show in the two-day contest, which was their eleventh straight trip to state finals eliminations. Last year, the Redwings went all the way and captured the state championship.

Trying to repeat that effort, however, they ended up third with their production of "Godspell," in a tie with Southfield High's production of "Diary of Anne Frank." Both schools wound up with a total of 159 out of a possible 200 points.

"The group did St. Johns Proud," Koger said in his report on the competition.

First place was taken by Southfield Lathrup's production of "Anastasia," and second was won by Standish-Sterling Central's "Everyman."

In addition to their award, the St. Johns group received other honors, including "excellent" rankings for the

entire cast of 14, the lighting crew and program design by Gae Cobb. Ken Schaefer received the Redwing's only "superior" award for his lighting design, Koger said.

"The state finals are never easy," Koger said. "I was extremely proud of our students and their presentation. We moved a lot of people with this show, and that is what theatre is all about."

"I do feel we might have placed even higher in the competition had our show not been the first one in the long two-day competition. The first show in any competition has a hard time pointing high because the judges have no other shows to compare it to as they start the event."

Koger also said his show may have gotten more points if presented later, providing relief after less upbeat productions. But overall, the director said, the Redwings couldn't have done better.

"I couldn't ask for any more work, dedication or enthusiasm than the 74 students that went to the state finals in the St. Johns cast and crew gave."

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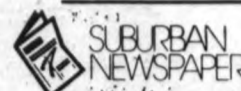

Cropsey's decision saves tax dollars, makes sense

State Representative Alan Cropsey, R-DeWitt, deserves credit for saving taxpayers money and the legislature wasted time with his recent decision to scrap a proposal to introduce legislation that would allow public schools to teach creationism.

In January, we argued legislating freedom is at best a contradiction in terms, at worst, a serious threat to existing academic freedom. We urged him to give up efforts to introduce a pro-creationist bill in Michigan's legislature.

Cropsey attracted much public attention with his proposal, which was also backed by Senator Ed Fredericks, a Holland Republican. Much of the response was negative.

Already tested in federal court, legislation to mandate teaching of creationist theories where evolution is taught have been found unconstitutional.

But Cropsey insisted his bill would be different; he said it would not require teaching of creationist theory, but would grant teachers the right to offer classes which interpret scientific evidence to support the theory that a supreme being, not natural selection, was responsible for the origin of our species and others.

But bills to regulate rights would accomplish the opposite, we argued, further restricting already sufficient latitude in local school systems. Cropsey apparently agrees.

In a release from the House Republican News Bureau, he said local schools already have the right to teach both creation and evolution and the choice should remain at the local level.

"We have very few laws that prescribe curriculum in the schools," he said. "Parents or students who want creationism taught should contact their school board to see what is being taught about origins in their school's curriculum."

We agree with the representative, and laud his change of mind. It will save the time and

money which otherwise would have been expended in an acrimonious, and probably pointless, legislative debate.

Waste law full of holes

To the editor:

"PERILOUS WASTE ACT OK'D" — This was the headline in a local paper for an article about P.A. 64, supposedly the best cradle-to-grave legislation for hazardous waste in the nation.

The original proposals for the act would have lived up to this expectation. But the plan has been altered, bent and manipulated until it actually is less protective than previous laws.

The committee charged with writing rules for the act was made up of waste haulers, landfill operators and chemical specialists. All of these groups have a vested interest in landfills, and I consider their serving in such a capacity a conflict of interest.

The rights of private citizens are being ignored. According to the rules, an existing site is not given the privilege of a siting review board (nine persons who would research and rule on the suitability of the site as a hazardous waste disposal area.)

To circumvent this right, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources has arbitrarily decided that most of the sites which are under consideration for accepting hazardous waste are existing sites.

The classification of waste has been remodeled so that many substances which are hazardous are no longer classified as hazardous. Examples are cyanide and asbestos. Also, hazardous materials which are to be recycled will not be managed as hazardous. The idea of recycling is good, but there is no provision for making sure that these wastes would be recycled and not disposed of by a "midnight dumper" in a general refuse pit.

Last, but certainly not least, the plan states that citizen information committees be established to involve the public in the earliest stages of landfill and hazardous waste site planning.

What has happened in Michigan to date makes a mockery of this plan. One only needs to read and listen to know that the people at Midland, Montague, Cascade, Watertown and many other places were not involved in planning hazardous waste sites in their areas.

Solid waste management committees made up of waste haulers and landfill operators do not constitute proper citizen involvement.

It is time the lawmakers of this state did something constructive towards elimination and safe disposal of hazardous waste. There are thousands of outraged citizens in who want to preserve our land and water for our two greatest industries: agriculture and tourism.

"We should be careful not to ask questions with answers we can't possibly live up to," Paul Maples agreed. "Why fuel that fire?"

Along with giving local residents a chance to speak their peice on possible program cuts, the proposed survey also gives voters a preview of the board's all-but-inevitable bid for a millage increase at the next school election in June.

Although not discussed during the Monday night meeting, "Opinion Questions," the second part of the survey, deal with millage requests and how they would be made.

"Will you support a 3.5 millage renewal," the first question asks. The remaining eight questions include, "Will you vote extra millage to avoid lfurther program cuts," "How do you believe the 3.5 millage renewal and any additional millage ... should be placed on the ballot?" and queries regarding proper school employees' salaries, closing low-enrollment elementary schools and the appropriate number of students in elementary classrooms.

Board member Neil Barnhart said more time was needed to look over the questions lwhich may be misunderstood by voters, and others agreed to look over the survey and mail suggested relvisions back to Burns within two weeks, in readiness for continued discussion during the next board meeting.

"We need to pinpoint out te ones that could burn us," Barnhart said.

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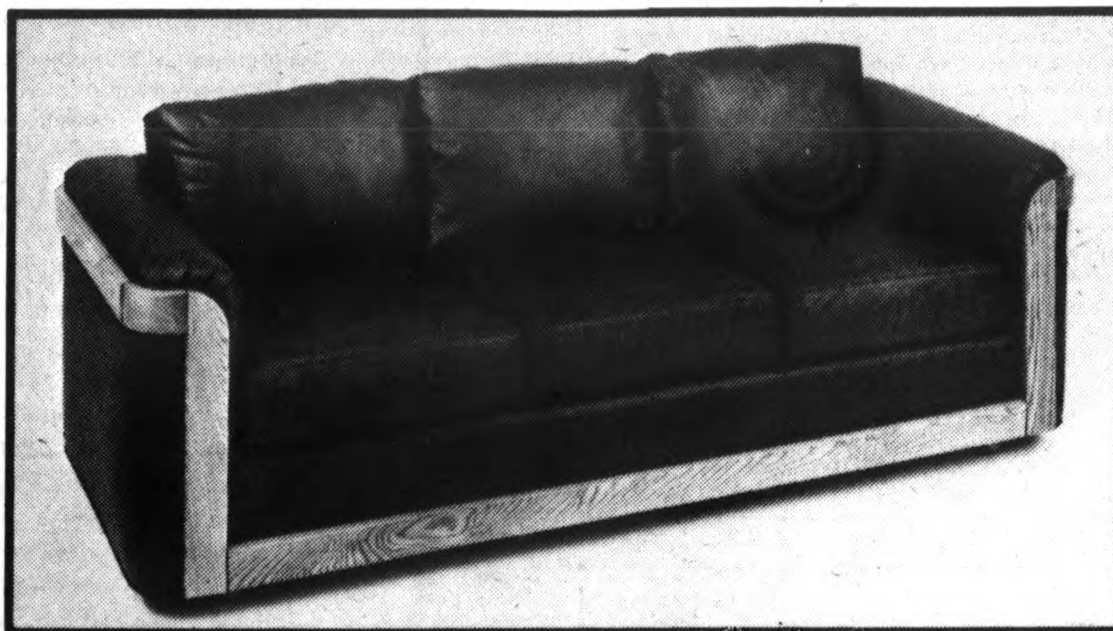

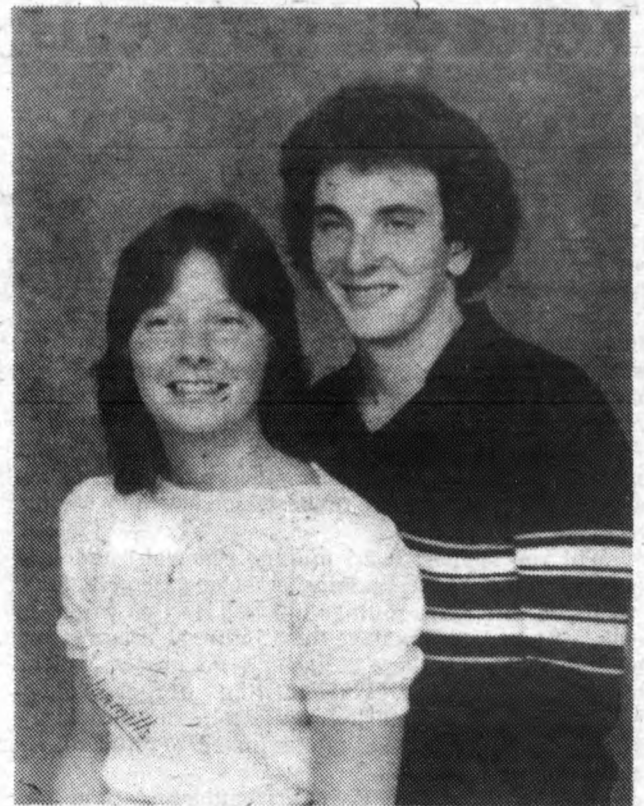

Consumer tips

The Better Business Bureau advises:

- Be cautious in dealing with companies who advertise only a telephone number, not an address.
- Lighting is by far the most cost effective deterrent to burglary and assault. Good exterior lighting should be placed to eliminate shadows and provide maximum visibility. Using timers, interior lights can be activated when your home is not occupied.
- To measure floor space for carpeting, multiply the length of the room by the width and divide by nine. Remember to ask if padding and installation are included in the price.
- Don't let a store lure you in with a so-called price reduction, then tell you the item is sold out. This is called "bait and switch." If you cannot get what you want, walk out.
- Some door-to-door salesmen try to sell overpriced merchandise by saying they are working their way through college, supporting an out-of-work father and the like. Resist. Buy only what you need and at a fair price.

- If your attic is not insulated, you may be spending money to heat or cool the outdoors. Sealing off cracks and openings around windows and doors can save you from 10 to 30 percent of your annual heating and cooling costs.
- If your car engine doesn't turn over in cold weather, first have your battery checked. Have connections, specific gravity and water level of your old battery checked before you buy a new one. When you do buy, shop around for prices and know exactly what the warranty covers and for how long.
- Getting the most out of your food dollars begins by planning at home. Check what you have on hand before you make your list. Plan your menus and shopping list before you shop. Waiting until you get to the store can be costly. Keep your list flexible so you can take advantage of unadvertised specials. Food wasted is money wasted. Plan attractive meals proportioned for the number you're feeding.
- When leaving for an out-of-town trip, be sure to fix leaky faucets and turn off faucets firmly after each use. One drop per second from a leaky faucet adds up to 60 gallons per week down the drain.

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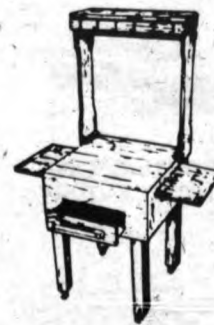

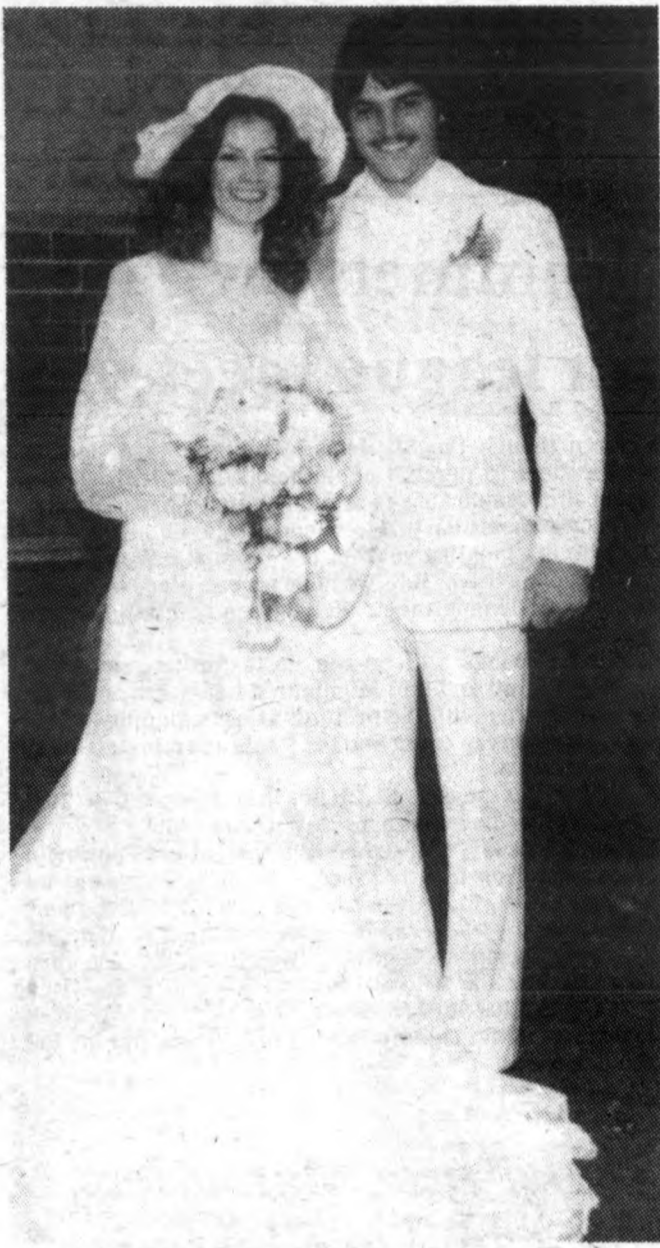

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"Devil's Invention" A lesson from the past...

Almost a century has passed since Silvio Dolza heard a Sicilian clergyman assail the steam engine as the "devil's invention."

History, of course, has proven the clergyman wrong. But time hasn't erased the sermon from John Dolza's memory, for his father - Silvio - stressed it as an example of the dangers of ignorance and superstition.

"God made fire the enemy of water," the clergyman warned. "Great fires will make water disappear. He made water the enemy of fire; indeed much water will kill a fire. The men that try to marry fire and water in engines are sacrilegious and are working against God."

"To us it sounds ridiculous, but the opposition to modern things of most of the Sicilian leaders proved to be a very, very serious handicap for many years," John Dolza says.

The lesson accompanied Dolza and his engineering skills when he immigrated to the United States as a young man. He worked for General Motors for many years, then began Dolza International Engineering. Credited with more than 120 inventions, he lives in Fenton.

Through his 80 years Dolza has seen countless technological changes. But although the machines change - nuclear power is on the energy forefront that steam power held a century ago - Dolza sees a disheartening similarity between his father's time and today's fight against nuclear power.

"The opposition to nuclear power is very, very harmful," he says. "With the price of imported energy, keeping these nuclear plants from being completed is just plain criminal."

He points out that Italy paid a high price for a similar mistake long ago, when 10- and 15-year-old children were forced to work in underground sulfur mines.

"These youngsters died of tuberculosis caused by malnutrition, no ventilation in the tunnels and sulfur dioxide," he says. Meanwhile, American ingenuity found a way to inject steam into the ground, melt the sulfur and make it float through nearby wells to aboveground collectors. This technique, besides discarding the dangerous child labor, was more economical.

In Italy, however, prejudice against steam power blocked the new technology. The opposition killed Italy's sulfur industry.

"When I see on television mostly young people opposing nuclear power plants, I realize with great sadness that ignorance is just as serious today as a century ago," he says.

"Imported oil is making us poorer and poorer, and the money spent abroad comes back to buy off our land and its resources. Oil for power stations will be even more prohibitive in the future than now.

"I've never seen anything so safe or so respectful of its surroundings as nuclear energy. I think the developers have to be congratulated for a step forward," Dolza says.

"If we are to follow the antinuclear power plant logic, then we would all go back to nature and live in caves.

"Nuclear power does not put smoke into the atmosphere. It does not put sulfur dioxide into the atmosphere. It does not put dust into the atmosphere. We need nuclear energy.

"It would show the future financial disaster if this nation permits itself to lose its muscles by accepting the intimidations of ignorance."

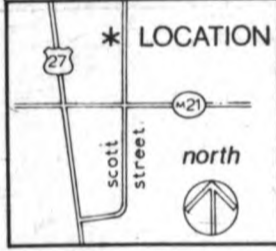

Airwave auction readied by broadcasting students

Thousands of dollars of merchandise, including slaves, jewelry and an outboard motor, will be put up for bid in the fourth annual WOES Radio Station auction beginning at 10 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 20.

According to a spokesman at the student-operated station which broadcasts from Ovid-Elsie High School, the proceeds from bids on more than \$16,000 worth of merchandise donated by 500 businesses in Ovid, Elsie, Owosso, St. Johns, Lansing and Flint will be used to help finance the station.

According to Geroge Bishop, general manager of WOES, there will be some format changes in the auction this year. There will be eight mini auctions during the two-day sale. Four auctions will be held Saturday at 10 a.m., 1:30, 5 and 8:30 p.m. Three will be held Sunday, at 10 a.m., 1:30 and 5 p.m. A big board, with items of high value, will be bid on throughout the auction and will be closed at 8:30 p.m. Sunday, Bishop said.

"One new feature this year will be the addition of 28 slaves who will be auctioned off to the highest bidders to do six hours of any type of work," Bishop said in a news release.

Last year, many potential bidders were discouraged by the difficulty in getting through on phone lines, he said. This year, the number of lines has been nearly doubled, and all will be toll free.

The station will accept Visa and Mastercharge on all purchases. To be auctioned are about 300 dinners and food items, jewelry, appliances, medical exams, weekend accommodations, stereo equipment, more than 70 autographed items from movie stars and an outboard motor.

Thanks to such fund raising efforts, the radio station has been entirely self-supporting for the last two years, Bishop said. Future fund raisers include

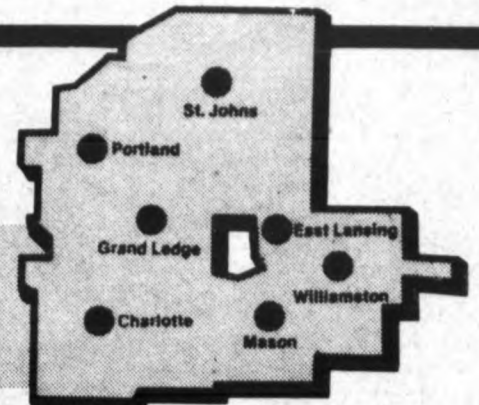

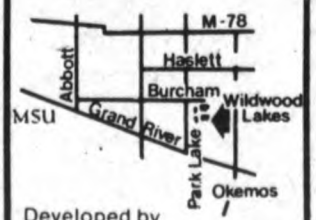

'Psychologist' talks with animals

SAN DIEGO — Myra McCormack shyly brought her half-sheltie, half-poodle Tasha Lee to Horseman's Park in nearby Mira Mesa in search of some answers.

Was the dog happy? Did she mind that she was unable to live with McCormack for the time being, until McCormack moved out of her apartment and into a house?

For \$15, animal "psychologist" Beatrice Lydecker "talked" with Tasha Lee, and McCormack went away satisfied.

Tasha Lee, Lydecker said, knows she is a very "special" dog, and is "very secure." But, Lydecker said, the dog is "just waiting for the day when you get your house," and is pa-

tiently sitting out the time she must stay with McCormack's friends.

McCormack had heard about Lydecker's abilities from friends who had taken their pets to her. After yesterday's session — at \$1 per minute for 15 minutes — McCormack was in the believer camp.

Lydecker had mentioned she thought Tasha Lee might be "missing" a brown-and-white dog. McCormack said, yes, Tasha Lee once had such a dog for a companion.

Dog and horse owners one recent day waited patiently to take their turn as Lydecker sat in a lawn chair, concentrating on the animal at hand and verbalizing to its owner what she said were the animal's feelings or thoughts.

She was using an ability, a "form of ESP," that she

said she first noticed about 12 years ago. Then a housewife, Lydecker was walking down a street in Monrovia, Calif., when she noticed a German shepherd standing behind a fence, and felt he was "calling" to her.

She felt a sense of depression and rejection emanating from the dog and went to talk to its owner, who said the dog probably was lonely because he was being left alone for the first time. Similar experiences, after working with veterinarians, psychiatrists and police officers, catapulted her into national prominence.

She has written two books dealing with her conversations with animals. She has been on several talk shows, and says there is the possibility of a national network show sometime this year that

would deal with everything from animal psychology to visits with Hollywood stars and their pets.

Her work, she said, involves "mind-to-mind transfer" with the animals. "I don't have to touch them" to know what they are feeling, Lydecker said. "I often even work with people over the phone."

Lydecker, 43, said she earns about \$40,000 a year that is quickly eaten up because she employs a secretary and three others at her El Monte, Calif., kennels, and pays \$600 a week in dog food.

Linda Tipon and her 12-year-old daughter Heather wanted to know more about Heather's pony, Ginger.

"I had seen Lydecker on the John Davidson show, and at first I thought she was some kind of nut," Tipon said. "But some of my friends who took their

horses to her, said there's some things she said that there's no way she could have known about on her own."

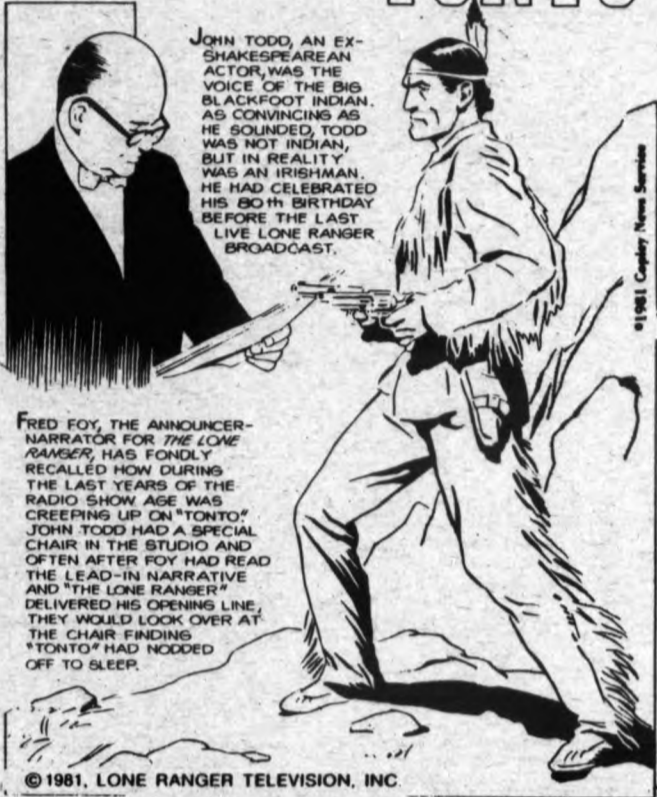
Speaking quietly as Heather held Ginger, Lydecker said: "This pony used to have a cat for a companion. She's missed that cat for a long time." She also said that Ginger likes goats, and asked if the horse had spent much time around them.

"She said some things that are absolutely true," Tipon said following the session. "Ginger was stabled at another place that had goats. And the people we bought her from did have a cat she was pals with."

Lydecker brushes off those who are skeptical about her ability.

"I don't waste my time with them," she said. "I'm not missing anything, they are."

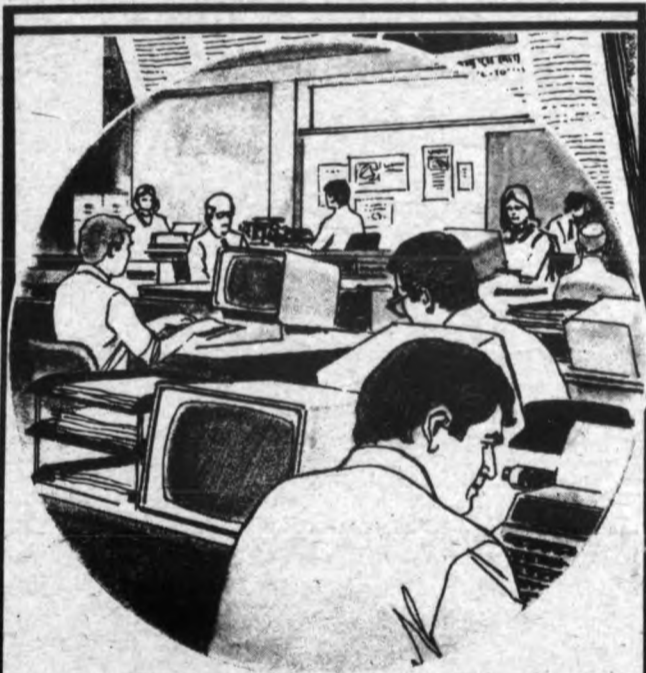
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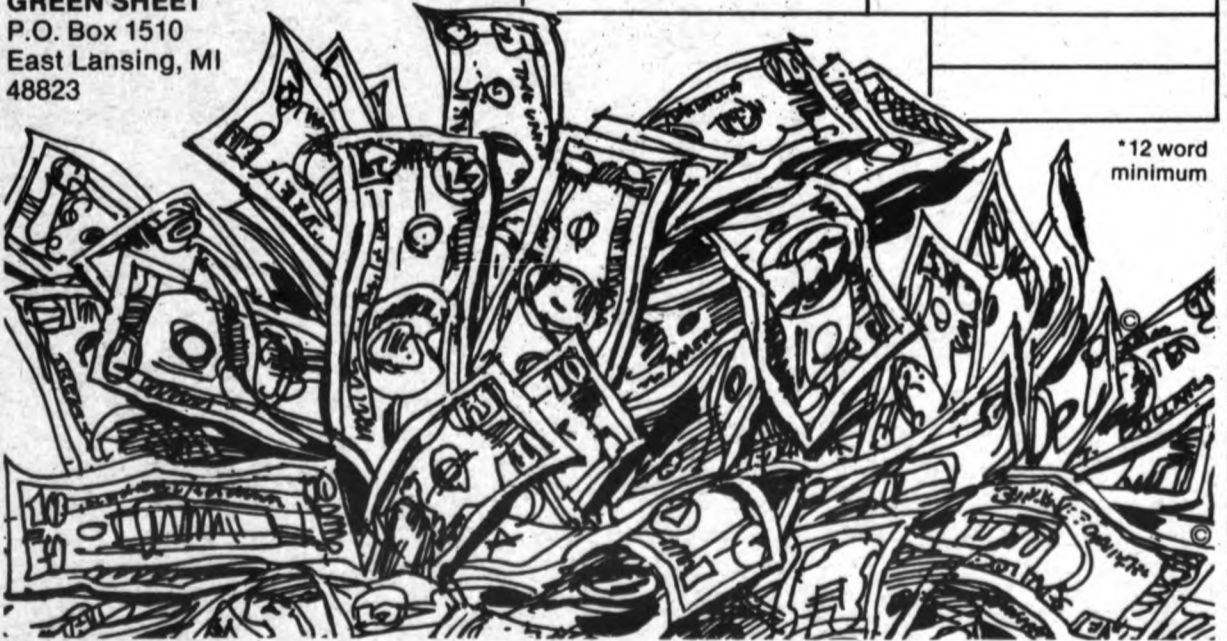
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
