Promised gusher a trickle

Well worries city

Most would like to see business booming again, but for St. Johns residents, there's a cloud attached to economic recovery's silver lining: a shot in the arm for local industry could drain the city's water supply.

Had things gone as expected, city residents might not be facing brown lawns and a sprinkling ban again next summer as they have during droughts in summers past, Water Superintendent Carl Fonger said. But St. Johns' newest water source, Well 10, expected to contribute a steady flood of 300 gallons-per-minute is coughing up a mere trickle.

"We expected 300, but now we're told we can only get 150 (gallons per minute)," Fonger said of the latest bad news from well driller Walter Meinert of Grand Rapids. "But they say we can only run it three or four days a week, so we're not even getting 150."

Meinert told city commissioners about the problems with Well 10 during their March 22 meeting. Long past its promised schedule, the well has finally begun producing water, but Meinert said he does not know why it's pumping so little. Problems with the well hole and mechanics are suspected, Fonger said, and the city plans to look into the problem, according to City Clerk Richard Coletta.

Tests of the aquifer are planned and the well may have to be re-dug or moved, they said. But with the cost of the new well already near \$30,000, city commissioners intend to make sure Meinert shoulders his share of costs for repairs or new construction, Coletta said.

"We haven't paid much of any of (Meinert's bill) yet," he said. "It shouldn't take this long to get a well drilled. For some reasons it was dragging out, and the reasons were not the kind that encouraged us to start sending in checks."

Meanwhile, new developments — okayed under the assumption the city would have healthy new well — could strain the city's tight water supply next summer, Fonger warned.

"It kind of hurts us when we planned on having the water," he said. The Clinton Area Care Center, Suntree Apartments and the new South Point Mall will all put additional heavy demand on the water supply in coming months, he said. Well 10 would have taken care of the new developments, and may even have provided enough extra to local customers to avert sprinkling bans during dry months.

As it is, water use restrictions are practically inevitable, Coletta and Fonger agreed.

The city has seven working wells, not including two which have been shut down awaiting maintenance and number 10, Fonger said. During last summer's biggest water demand, the wells produced as much as 2.1 million gallons per day at a rate of 1,400 gallons per minute. Presently, city wells are producing only 1,200 gallons per minute; a minimum of 1,600 gallons per minute would be needed to avoid water shortages next summer, he said.

With luck and city commission approval, one or both of the shut down wells can be put into operation in time. "Hopefully, there will not have to be a total sprinkling ban," Fonger said.

If local industry were not suffering, though, things could be much worse, he pointed out. "The factories have slowed some. They used to use half of all our water."

Industrial water use has dropped significantly in recent months, but if the trend was reversed and local factories began booming again, the present wells might not be adequate, he warned.

Coletta agreed. "We're right at capacity now. There's not a whole lot of reserve water there for industry to use."

Ironically, one possible bright spot on the horizon for gardeners next summer would be cloudy skies and rain.

"Unfortunately, we usually do get a drought and a hot spell," Coletta said.

Even wage freeze can't ease cash crunch, according to latest board budget figures

A crowd of over 60, composed mostly of staff members, was given some bad financial news by the St. Johns Board of Education during a special meeting Wednesday night, March 24.

Armed with prepared questions and expecting a decision on millage proposals for next June's annual school election, teachers and their union representatives were quick to challenge administration figures projecting possible savings from a teacher salary freeze and a fringe benefit cap. Currently negotiating a new contract, teachers are keeping a close eye on the financial health of the district in preparation for a millage vote which may affect their next agreement.

But regardless of millage increases or rejections, both board members and staffers agree even wage and fringe concessions would not be enough to keep the system out of red ink.

According to Superintendent Don Burns, declines in enrollment, coupled with state-mandated cuts in aid to schools, will force the system to seek a millage increase or make drastic cuts in programs and staff levels.

Burns said figures prepared by Controller Rick Terres assumed a 100 student enrollment decline for next fall — which could cost the system \$186,306 — and included adjustments in revenue resulting from a \$28,890 state-aid cut last fall and a \$75,774 cut due in August. Balancing the cuts against an expected \$40,800 increase in tax revenues from Suntree Apartments, a new senior citizens housing development, the enrollment loss and state aid reductions could cost the system more than \$250,000, according to Terres' figures.

"Even if revenues do hold, we will have a serious problem trying to continue the kind of programs we have had this year and the kind of programs we have had in the past," Burns said.

The schools were granted a one-year 3.5 mill increase last fall and will likely seek to renew that increase in June, Burns said. To keep pace with declining revenues, the schools may also have to ask for an additional increase; the question, Burns said, is how much.

"We made the assumption in all our figures that we would go back for the 3.5 mills. The bigger question is whether to ask for additional mills or face severe cuts," he said.

Terres presented figures indicating a range of possible revenues and expenses. At one end, Terres presented a possible budget if teachers agreed to freeze their wages and fringe benefits; at the other end, he computed the possible cost of granting teachers an eight percent increase.

"Eight percent is even low compared to the last three years," he said. Teachers received nine percent in their last two-year contract, and Mike Gehoski, chief negotiator for the St. Johns Education Association, representing teachers, said his group would settle for that figure again.

The school board's negotiator, however, has proposed a wage and fringe freeze, which came as somewhat of a surprise, Gehoski said.

If teachers did accept such concessions, school costs, at over \$8.1 million, would still exceed revenues by \$150,319, according to Terres' report. If an eight percent increase was granted, the deficit would be \$788,884, Terres said. Both budgets were based on a 10 percent inflation rate, and were prepared for purposes of discussion, he cautioned.

Each mill in St. Johns generates about \$184,000, board members were told. At that rate, it would take less than one additional mill to keep the system in black ink with a wage and salary cap, and about 4.3 mills to cover a budget including an eight percent salary increase.

After considering their alternatives at the urging of Board President Ron Huard, who said "time is running short," board members decided to look over results of a recent opinion survey being distributed to district voters before making a specific millage request.

The survey, prepared by the Save Our Schools Committee, asks voters what areas they would agree to have cut from the system and if they would approve a millage increase to save programs.

The survey results should be available in time for another special meeting called by the board Wednesday, March 31.

Federal Land Bank elects officers

Federal Land Bank Association of St. Johns held its annual stockholders meeting at Smith Hall in St. Johns March 18, and re-elected three directors, including Clinton County representative Lee Ormston.

Ormston of St. Johns was returned to the board for a three-year term along with Robert Droscha of Eaton County and John Sebesta of Shiawassee County.

According to reports, those in attendance were also given a chance to look over a model of the new Federal Land Bank Office Building to be built in St.

Johns. Federal Land Bank will share the office with Production Credit Association, it was announced.

During a report by President Dennis McDonald, who was introduced by Board Chairman Ormston, it was revealed the bank increased loans by nearly \$12,000, with a record 618 loans during the year.

Thomas Gaughan, commodity trading advisor with the Chicago Board of Trade, was the featured speaker and told

stockholders near term prospects are poor for interest rates, grain prices and real estate values. He predicted interest rates will rise in late 1982, reports said.

Gaughn said his forecast was not optimistic, but stressed the need for peo-

ple to be aware how serious economic problems have become. Later, Gsughan answered questions.

Staff questions migrant program vote

Expecting questions about finances, St. Johns Board of Education members were taken by surprise during a special meeting Wednesday night, March 24, when angry staffers blasted an earlier board decision to discontinue participation in a Migrant Education Program.

"I didn't think we'd have to rehash all of this again," Trustee Robert Craig complained.

The question arose when a staff member asked why, when the board is struggling to make ends meet (see related story), a program which contributed revenue to the system was discontinued. Following about 20 minutes of questions and complaints about the board's February decision, Board President Ron Huard moved to end debate.

"With a possible \$788,000 shortfall, we're missing our mission if we continue on this one point," he said, announcing he would take only three more questions on the topic.

During their February meeting, board members voted to discontinue the summer program which provides education to children of migrant workers. Although administration figures showed that federal reimbursement for school costs exceeded expenses for the program by \$6,700, board members said there were hidden costs and the program was really closer to breaking even.

"Personally, I wasn't convinced that the program did bring in any money to the community. I was never convinced the program was breaking even," Huard said. "The nature of the vote was not against the program itself, it was against our participation in it."

But critics insisted purchases of materials and staff salaries for the program, paid for at federal expense, were providing new money to the school system and the community.

"It's a valuable service to the migrants as well as to the community. Is it too late to look at why we have lost that revenue?" one staff member asked.

"This is quite a monumental decision," another member of the audience said. "I don't know if the board knows it, but those kids don't belong to a school district. They belong to the United States school district. Whether it was money or not — and I'd like to think it wasn't — the decision has been made, and I think it would be curious to learn why."

"By saying no, we're not saying we don't care or have compassion for migrant children," Craig replied. The

Migrant Education Program is administered through Montcalm Area Intermediate School District, and another school district can be found to participate, he said.

"It will continue, not by us, but by someone else. It's not up to St. Johns, it's up to Montcalm," he said.

Other board members agreed with Huard that costs for insurance on buses and building depreciation were not included in administration figures, and said such costs made the program at best a break-even proposition, at worst, a liability.

But when a member of the audience asked if the administration had not provided adequate figures, Superintendent Don Burns said the real reason for the board's decision was fear of bad public relations.

"I don't want to leave the impression the board was questioning the administration's figures," he said. "Money was a factor, but more of a concern was how to address the general public who were calling board members and asking why our school buses were going down the road with two or three kids in them."

Burns said all figures that could be totalled up, from supplies to phone calls, were submitted. "The board felt there were some expenses they were not able to put figures on," he said. "And they felt that the overall PR the district was receiving was negative."

Renee Buentello, director of the Migrant Education Program in the Montcalm Intermediate School District, admitted the St. Johns district had an image problem.

Unlike programs in other school systems in the state, St. Johns had to pick up students from three different migrant camps, dividing approximately 70 student participants into groups of about 20 for each 60-passenger bus, he said. "It did look pretty bad," Buentello said.

Budget problems have not been a problem in other districts, though, he said, and finding a replacement participant for St. Johns was no trouble.

Clinton Intermediate School District (CISD) will consider adopting the Migrant Education Program at an April 19 meeting, and CISD Superintendent Larry Schwartzkopf is optimistic approval will be granted.

"The program has been ongoing and there is still a need here for it. The intermediate school district can use some revenue from the program for the special education fund," he said.

Participants are not supposed to make money from the program, Buentello said, but most do, according to Schwartzkopf.

St. Johns collected more than \$11,000 from the program last year and spent just \$4,353, according to ad-

ministration figures. Buentello said schools are allowed to figure their costs any way they want, and can bill the program for any "reasonable" figure.

"The state department of education generally approves the figures. If it was way too far out of line from the last year, they could get rejected, but we have four different school districts participating and we compare them. They're pretty much the same (budgets)."

Schwartzkopf said the CISD budget would likely be about the same as St. Johns budget.

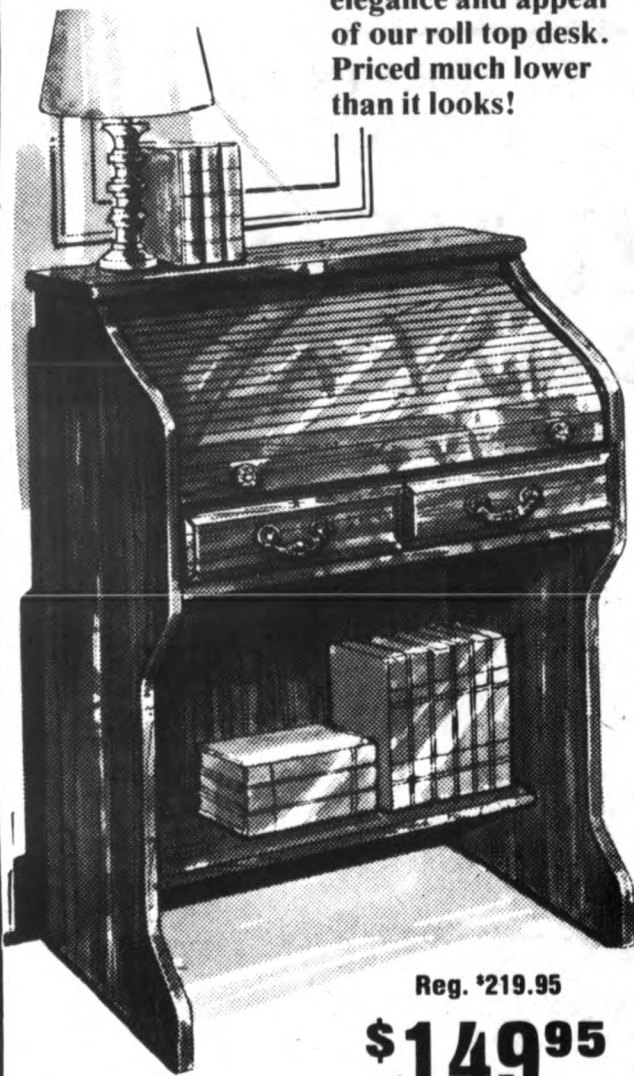

Lightning hits twice at I-69 intersection

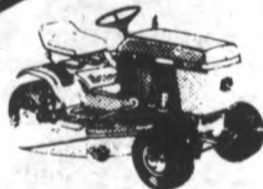

Tax tips

Individual Retirement Accounts

Little publicized tax rules can influence IRA decisions.

The basic tax facts about Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) are well known. A taxpayer can contribute and deduct up to \$2,000 a year. No tax is paid on IRA earnings until they are withdrawn at retirement — when the tax rate for most is lower. But that is only a fraction of the story. Here, in question and answer format, are the tax angles taxpayers need to know to make intelligent decisions about IRAs.

Q.: Not everyone is eligible to set up an IRA. What is the Rule on Eligibility?

A.: A participant must have earned income for the year — salaries, professional fees, commissions, etc. — in order to make an IRA contribution. A taxpayer with only investment or pension income cannot contribute to an IRA. And there is an age limitation. A participant must not have reached 70.5 years of age during the year. There is no minimum age, however, so an IRA can be opened for a child, assuming a child has earned income.

Q.: If both spouses work, they can both set up IRAs. Total annual contribution allowed is \$4,000, and if one spouse is not employed, the other can set up a so-called spousal IRA. How does the new law affect these spousal IRAs?

A.: The annual deductible contribution was increased from \$1,750 to \$2,250 beginning in 1982. But the most interesting new change in 1982 allows spouses to divide the IRA contribution between each of their accounts in the way they choose, as long as the contribution for either does not exceed \$2,000.

The deduction for contributions to a spousal IRA is allowed only if one spouse has no compensation income for the year and if the couple files a joint income return.

Q.: How much time does a taxpayer have to open up an IRA for 1982?

A.: A taxpayer has until the due date for his or her return, April 15, 1983, or longer if an extension is granted. Why wait? The earlier an IRA starts earning

tax-sheltered dollars, the better. Contributions can be made at the beginning of the year before the taxpayer has made \$2,000, as long as at least \$2,000 is made during the year.

Also, less than \$2,000 can be contributed and contributions can be spread throughout the year.

Q.: Does a taxpayer have to make contributions every year to the IRA?

A.: No. A taxpayer can skip a year entirely or contributions can be increased or decreased from one year to the next. But a taxpayer cannot make up a skipped contribution in a future year.

Q.: Is a taxpayer limited to one IRA?

A.: No. Contributions can be made to several IRAs as long as the total contribution does not exceed the annual maximum. And a taxpayer can put one year's contribution into one IRA and the next year's into another.

Q.: Suppose a taxpayer decides to change IRA investments. Can they invest in, say, a bank certificate of deposit and then switch to a mutual fund?

A.: Yes. Taxpayers are free to change. There are two conditions — whatever is withdrawn must be transferred from the old IRA account and put in the new IRA within 60 days; and IRA investments cannot be rolled over more than once in a two-year period.

Q.: Can cash be borrowed from an IRA?

A.: No. Borrowing from an IRA automatically disqualifies it. The entire amount in the IRA, not just the amount borrowed, becomes instantly taxable. What is borrowed is also subject to an additional 10 percent early withdrawal tax and taxpayers can be penalized if IRA funds are used as security for a loan.

Q.: A company's retirement plan permits voluntary contributions by employees. Will any contributions an employee makes reduce the amount that can be contributed to an IRA?

A.: That depends on whether the plan contributions are deductible or not. Nondeductible voluntary contributions have nothing to do with an individual IRA. Contributions may be made to both.

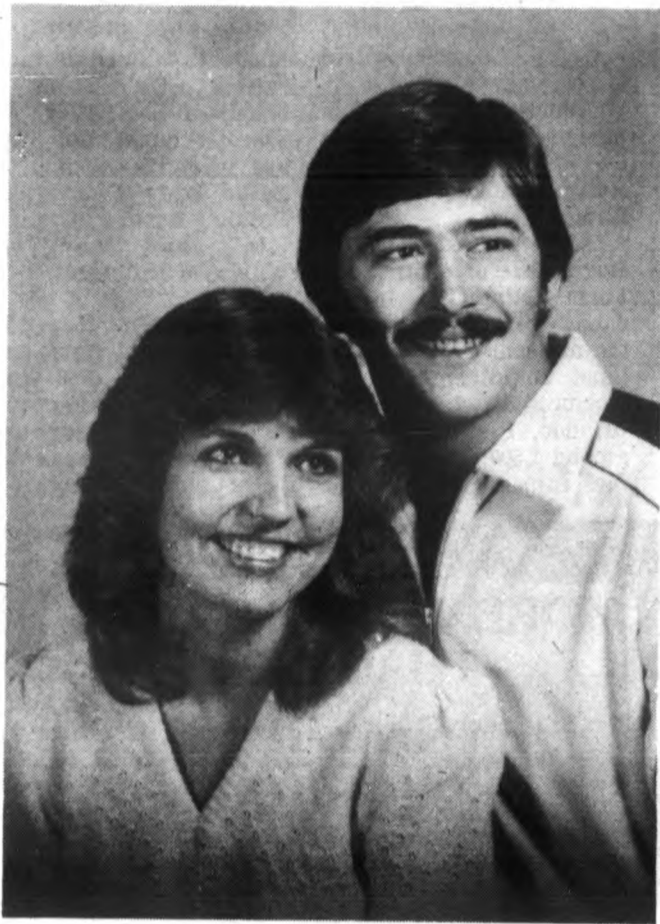

Jeff Casler top star on All-County basketball team

High-scoring Jeff Casler of St. Johns is captain of the 1982 All-Clinton County basketball team that features an exceptional combination of speed, good shooting, strong rebounding and tough defense.

Joining Casler on the 10-member honor squad are teammate Steve Gonzales, Tim Deak and Sam Dalman of DeWitt, Glenn Feldpausch and Darryl Thelen of Fowler, Jeff Nurenberg and Jeff Spitzley of Pewamo-Westphalia, Carl Teelander of Ovid-Elsie and Todd Tucker of Bath.

Casler, recently selected as an honorable-mention choice on several All-State teams, began the season by scoring 32 points against Mason and never cooled off after that. His 46 points against Grand Ledge was one of the top performances in the entire state this season. For the year, the 6-foot-1 senior averaged 24 points, four steals, four rebounds and was chosen his team's most valuable player. Casler, also selected to the first team last year, will likely be playing his college ball at Lansing Community College next season.

Super-quick Steve Gonzales was the quarterback of the Redwing team and his outstanding passes frequently resulted in Casler scores. The 5-foot-10 junior averaged 11 points, six assists, four rebounds and three steals per game. He was a second team All-League selection.

DeWitt's Tim Deak was one of the finest pure shooters in the area and was the player the Panther's went to when they needed a basket. The 6-foot-3 senior averaged 22 points per game and shot 75 percent from the foul line. After being switched from guard to forward at midseason, he became one of the team's best rebounders. His 30 points against St. Johns in early March paced the Panthers to a thrilling 73-72 win and his steal of a Haslett pass and jump shot with just 10 seconds left in the game gave DeWitt an 83-82 win. Deak was both a second team All-League and an honorable mention All-State choice.

At the beginning of the season DeWitt coach John Blumberg called Sam Dalman "inch for inch the best player I've ever coached." Dalman did nothing to change Blumberg's mind. The 5-foot-5 junior was the key to the Panther offense and his defensive play gave many opposing players fits. He averaged 14 points, six assists and five steals per game. He also shot 78 percent from the foul line. Dalman was recently chosen on the second-team All-League squad.

"Glenn Feldpausch did everything for us," said Fowler coach Dennis Smith about his 5-foot-10 junior star. Feldpausch was the Eagle's leading scorer with a 13.2 average and led his team in steals as well as being second in assists and third in rebounding. He had his best scoring night of the season with 28 points in a 63-59 win over Laingsburg. Feldpausch was both an All-Conference and an honorable-mention All-State pick.

Fowler's 6-foot-1 Darryl Thelen almost always had to battle bigger opponents on the boards, but he still managed to grab 8.8 rebounds a game. The senior forward-center was chosen the Eagle's MVP for the past season and his coach calls him "the nicest young man you'd ever want to meet."

When Pewamo-Westphalia needed points, they usually went to Jeff Nurenberg. A 6-foot-0 senior guard, Nurenberg averaged 14.6 points a game and was one of the county's top defensive players. Against Laingsburg he held scoring-star Bob McDougall to just four points in the second half and scored 20 points himself in the 66-56 Pirate win. He was an All-League selection.

Jeff Spitzley is considered the top rebounder in the Central Michigan Athletic Conference by his coaches. The 6-foot-2 junior forward averaged 10 points and 10 rebounds per game this past season and came through for the Pirates again and again in key situations. He was a second team All-League choice.

At 6-foot-8, Ovid-Elsie's Carl Teelander is the tallest player on this year's honor squad. He missed his junior year because of injuries, but made up for it by having an outstanding senior year. He averaged 14.8 points and seven rebounds per game and was a first team All-Conference pick. He frequently dominated the boards. Against Bullock Creek, for example, he scored 17 points and pulled down 19 rebounds.

The Bath Bees did not have much success on the basketball court this year, but one bright spot was Todd Tucker. A 6-foot-3 senior, Tucker showed considerable improvement as the season progressed and frequently scored in double figures. His 23 points and 14 rebounds against Haslett, for example, was one of the few positive notes in a 102-43 loss.

Receiving honorable-mention selection were Kurt Thelen, John DeBrabander and Dennis Sleep of St. Johns, Jim Seegraves and Steve Sontich of DeWitt, Greg Armbrustmacher and Marty Hamilton of Fowler, Ted Droste of Pewamo-Westphalia, Scott Hudecek and Pete Hurst of Ovid-Elsie, Tim Palmatier and Jon Seeger of Bath and Wayne Bond of Fulton.

"We're definitely down from past years," Smith said at the beginning of the season.

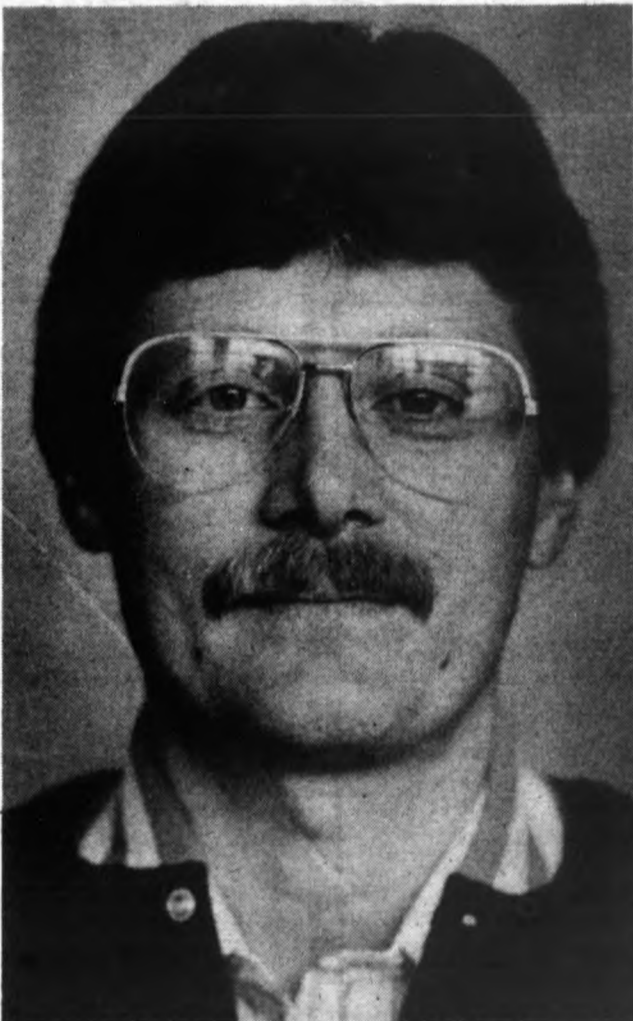

Pewamo-Westphalia's Steve Spitzley piloted his inexperienced team to a second-place finish in the Central Michigan Athletic Conference, while DeWitt's John Blumberg turned around what looked to be a losing season and registered victories over such respected teams as St. Johns, Lansing Catholic Central and Pewamo-Westphalia.

CREAM OF ONION SOUP

If leek and potato soups are two of your favorites, you might enjoy trying this for a change of pace.

- 2 lb. white onions
- 2 oz. butter
- 1 tbsp. olive oil
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 c. chicken stock
- 2 c. water
- juice of 1 lemon
- 2 eggs
- 2 c. light cream
- 3 tbsp. chopped chives

Peel and chop the onions. Melt butter in a deep saucepan, add oil, and gently cook onions, turning them often, until they are translucent. Sprinkle with salt. Pour in stock, water and lemon juice, and bring to a boil. Simmer for 30 minutes. Beat eggs and cream together in a bowl. Pour about 1 c. of the hot soup into the eggs whisking to blend well. Then pour the egg mixture into the rest of the soup, whisking all the while. Bring the soup to serving temperature, but do not let it boil. Serve in a tureen and sprinkle with chives.

CHEESE AND BEEF CASSEROLE

Cheese contributes to the low cost of this delicious casserole.

- 2 tbsp. oleo
- 1/2 c. finely chopped onion
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 c. (16 oz.) stewed tomatoes, undrained
- 3 tbsp. chili powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. hot sauce
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
- 8 oz. egg noodles, cooked only half way
- 1 carton (8 oz.) dry curd cottage cheese
- 12 bz. processed American cheese, sliced

In a large skillet, melt oleo, add onions and cook until soft, about 5 minutes. Add ground beef and cook until lightly browned. Add tomatoes and can liquid, chili powder, salt, hot sauce, sugar, pepper and garlic powder. Cook, stirring frequently, about 10 minutes; remove from heat and set aside.

Layer one-half of the semi-cooked noodles in the bottom of a 9 x 13 inch shallow baking dish. Cover noodles evenly with cottage cheese. Layer one half of the tomato/beef mixture on top of cottage cheese. Cover with remaining noodles and remaining tomato/beef mixture on top. Place cheese over top of casserole, covering tomato mixture, and bake at 350 degrees 40 to 45 minutes, until casserole is bubbly and cheese lightly browned. Makes six to eight servings of generous portions.

APPLE TART WITH ALMOND CRUST

Be patient with this crust and allow enough time and quiet to work with it. This desert is well worth the trouble.

- Pastry:
- 1 1/2 c. flour
- 1 c. ground almonds.
- 1/4 c. sugar
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 c. butter

Combine flour, almonds and sugar. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in egg. Mix first with fork, then with fingers until dough holds together. Reserve 1/2 c. dough for lattice; press remainder into bottom and sides of a 9 inch fluted flar pan. Refrigerate until ready to fill.

Apple Filling:

- 3 c. pared, cored and sliced apples
- 1 tbsp. lemon juice
- 2 tbsp. flour
- 1/4 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1/4 c. orange marmalade, divided
- 2 tbsp. butter
- 1/4 tsp. almond extract, if desired

Toss apple slices with lemon juice. Combine apples with the flour, cinnamon and 1/2 c. orange marmalade. Place in pastry lined fluted flar pan; dot with butter. Roll remaining pastry in a 9 inch round; cut into 1/4 inch strips. Weave a lattice over apples with pastry strips; trim edges even with pan. Bake for 40 minutes at 325 degrees or until apples are tender. Cool 15 minutes. Melt remaining 1/4 c. marmalade; stir in almond extract, if desired. Spoon over filling between lattice strips. - 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 c. milk
- 2 c. codfish chunks, cooked
- 1 c. mushroom slices
- 2/3 c. chopped celery

- 1/4 c. slivered almonds toasted

Combine eggs, flour, salt and milk; beat until smooth. Let stand 30 minutes. The individual exercise levels that the Treece program concentrates on are determined by a mathematical formula, Keitchen said.

The formula shows each person what her training heart rate, the pulse speed that indicates the most efficient level of fat burn-off and exercise. After each dance in class, heart rates are monitored so students can determine just how much work they should be doing.

Unlike the Sorenson program, Treece dancers are not all put in to a common class. There is a beginner's level where students learn to monitor their own pulses, do the basic steps and work themselves up to 12 minutes of continuous aerobic dance at a time.

Students in the advanced level go on to work themselves up to 20-30 minutes of continuous dancing and exercise.

There also is an optional diet program, called "One Step at a Time," which focuses on good nutritional habits and weight loss goals of about two pounds a week, Keitchen said.

The technique was started in the fall of 1980 by three sisters who had been researching various exercise programs as part of their work on advanced

degrees in physiology and nutrition.

The sisters, Debora Treece Lasley of Albuquerque, N.M.; Diana Treece Mason of Petoskey and Linda Treece Angel of Lansing, found that none of the exercise programs included nutrition education.

So they combined nutrition and diet information with aerobic dance. So far, there have been no complaints about that from Soronsen instructors.

"That would be like saying no one can do ballet except this one person who originated it," Keitchen said.

Keitchen, a former professional dancer, said she became involved with Treece Technique instruction through her friendship with Linda Treece Angel.

"Instructors go through an extensive training program, learning to monitor pulse rates and on the book 'Fit or Fat,'" she said. "We also must have first aid and CPR training."

The program has grown rapidly in its first year, Keitchen said, and now is being taught in Wisconsin and New Mexico as well as Michigan. Classes are in the planning stages in Colorado, Texas and Illinois also.

Keitchen said those attending the class should wear tennis shoes and comfortable clothes. No special outfit is required.
