Few agree on programs to cut

Library services at junior and senior high schools and vocational programs were ranked the three most important programs by 231 respondents to a Public Opinion Survey conducted by the St. Johns School Board.

Ranked first, second and third in the "least important" category were junior high interscholastic athletics, community use of the school's swimming pool and administrative services.

Most of the programs listed fell into the middle of the ranking system, and none were ranked extreme ends of the one-to-five scale by the time scores were averaged.

This indicates little agreement in the community about which programs should be cut if further budget reductions are necessary, Superintendent Don Burns told board members when the survey was presented Wednesday night, April 14.

"With the exception of two or three, there are very few programs where the majority of people agree," he said. And that means difficult decisions for board members, who face a millage election in June. The survey indicates renewal of 3.5 mills granted last August will pass, but any extra, to cover possible teacher salary increases, state aid cuts, inflation and enrollment declines, would not (see related story).

The group which responded to the survey, selected from those who voted in the August election, was composed mostly of home owners (88 percent). More than half of the survey group said they are parents of school age children.

Few said they have attended board meetings during the past year (18 percent), but almost three-quarters said they had been to plays, concerts or athletic events. Another 56 percent said they had attended open houses or parent conferences.

More than three of every four said they are satisfied with the overall educational opportunities at the school, and half urged the school not to reduce the number of hours to the state minimum five-hour day.

The survey also indicated:

- Two-thirds approve of combining two grades if enrollment is low enough.

- Nearly 80 percent said the proper number of students in a classroom is between 21 and 30.

- Discipline in the St. Johns schools is about right according to about two-out-of-three, but too lenient according to most of the remaining respondents.

- A surprising 42 percent favored discontinuing hot lunch programs if necessary and legal, while slightly more said they would not.

- Most said they are unaware of board decisions in the past year, 40 percent said they agree with most board decisions and 16 percent disagreed.

- Almost a quarter of the respondents said they would enroll in adult high school completion or community education courses if they were expanded.

In addition to the 250 voters selected for hand-delivery of questionnaires, voters throughout the district also received surveys in the mail. Their response rate, so far, has been about 11 percent, compared to the 92 percent returned in the group of 250.

Cash flow dried up, Sloat says

Maple River News sinks

Ovid's weekly newspaper, The Maple River News, has dried up.

Founded in 1974 by hometown boy Bill Sloat, the paper "folded" following its last edition March 31 when its owner, Don Hughes of Flint, agreed to stop publishing if The Advertiser, a shopper, would have its Elsie edition printed at his plant.

According to Don Hinkley, owner of The Advertiser, Hughes needed jobs to keep his Flint Central Printing presses busy, but was not doing well financially with the Maple River News, which he purchased from Sloat in June, 1981.

"It was a trade-off, not a sale," Hinkley said. "We went with a contract to have our advertiser printed at his plant in Flint and he agreed to fold the Maple River News."

The agreement gives Hinkley's publication a clear field at local advertising, eliminating competition from the Maple River News, he said.

Hinkley has hired the Maple River News editor, Thorn Jarvis, and intends to publish more local news in his Advertiser, he said. But the amount of news published in The Advertiser is not expected to rival news content in the now non-existent Maple River News, Sloat said.

When Hughes bought the Maple River News shortly after purchasing the Shiawassee Journal, a weekly

newspaper in Perry, he retained Sloat as editor. Several months later, however, the partnership dissolved and Sloat left. Hughes announced the former editor's departure in an angry page-one announcement, informing local businesses Sloat was no longer with the newspapers, but giving no reason for the rift.

"Basically I got canned," Sloat says. Personal disagreements with Hughes about what a local newspaper should be got in the way and the two quarreled, he said. "I'm a little outspoken and we got in a row. He was taking a more active interest in running the paper and I didn't think he knew how. His only experience in the field of journalism was running the machines (presses) at the Flint Journal."

But Sloat, who has a liberal arts degree, admits he did not have much journalism background either, and blames his own management for the paper's demise.

The paper began with about 1,300 subscriptions in a community of about 2,200. But to compete for advertising with large circulation shoppers, Sloat decided to expand his circulation by delivering the paper free to readers in the Laingsburg and Ovid-Elsie school districts.

Circulation boosted to 6,400, and things were looking up, he said. The staff, not including Sloat, was expanded from two-and-a-half to four full-timers, and new equipment was purchased.

That's when Michigan's chilly economy gave the Maple River News the flu, Sloat said. "I hate to admit it, but my management skills were probably to blame," he said. Advertisers started having economic problems — 13 went bankrupt and left the News with unpaid bills — just when new staff and equipment purchases were running up big monthly bills, he said.

"With two or three years of a reasonable economy, we could have cut it. I took risks, financially, that I thought would pan out."

Sloat also blames Hughes' policy. "The immediate reason the paper folded was that you can't run a local paper like an absentee landlord," he said.

Asked how he feels now that his paper has folded, Sloat replied, "I don't think you could print that. It's kind of sad."



Board told 'move' on millage request

With results of their public opinion survey in hand, members of the St. Johns School Board were given a few more samples of public opinion when they met before a large crowd for the second month in a row Wednesday night, April 14.

Caught in a "Catch 22" budget bind, board members told their audience of about 70, mainly staff members, they find it hard to come up with a millage request figure until they know how much teachers will demand in their next contract, currently being negotiated. But negotiations cannot be settled until the board knows how much money will be available following the success or failure of a millage request to be voted on June 15, they said.

The public opinion survey, meanwhile, is a clear indication that although voters likely will renew 3.5 additional mills they granted for one year last August, they will not approve any new extra millage request, Superintendent Don Burns said. The survey, a sample of 250 voters, said 58 percent would approve renewal, but the same percentage would turn down extra millage requests.

"In order to keep the faith with those we have surveyed and with the intent of the survey," the board should not ask for extra mills without the urging of parent teacher organizations or other community groups, Burns said. He asked for such support from the local Chamber of Commerce and other groups.

"The board will have to have some kind of input to override the impact of that survey," he said. "What we're hearing more and more is that schools, like

Safety, not sports, is report's top priority

Door-to-door student pick up should be resumed even at the cost of bus trips for out-of-town sports contests, a Citizens Advisory Report on Transportation says.

Roy Ebert, a member of the committee and candidate for one of two school board seats open in June, presented the report to St. Johns School Board members Wednesday night, April 14.

"The number-one priority of this committee is that students be bused," Ebert said. Interscholastic athletics and other extra-curricular activities requiring use of school buses should be eliminated if they cannot be afforded along with safe transportation of students to and from school, he said.

The committee, composed of parents from throughout the school district, studied school busing policy, the state's regulations regarding student transportation, the budget, contracts with bus drivers, mileage and student ridership comparisons and bus routes, the report says.

They came up with several recommendations, foremost among them a return to door-to-door student busing. Safety was the primary concern, Ebert said. According to the report, the policy change would reduce:

- The risk of students being molested.
- Student exposure to the elements.
- The chance of accidents caused by reckless drivers.
- The possibility of undue physical or mental stress.

Door-to-door student busing would apply throughout the system, including return to a city shuttle bus for students who live too far to walk to school, Ebert said.

The report also suggested the school board:

- Implement a voluntary safety program modeled after Riley Elementary's.
- Use buses exclusively for transportation of students to and from school to reduce operating costs and depreciation.
- Begin transportation of elementary students starting with kindergartners immediately.
- Study the possibility of stationing all elementary buses at the schools they serve.

The committee did not come up with cost figures, Ebert said, and recommendations may run contrary to other studies or the recent Public Opinion Survey conducted by the board. The survey indicated a majority of those who responded, 62 percent, are happy with the present transportation policy. About 15 percent favored a return to door-to-door busing, 12 percent suggested further reductions in service and 11 percent suggested busing be eliminated if law allows (see related story for additional survey details).

"Our boundaries were narrow, but we did our best to figure out how we can improve the system and reduce costs," Ebert said. "The most important thing we achieved was a better understanding of the busing program. Everybody didn't change their minds, but we are all more sympathetic now."

families and businesses, have to make cuts to hold the line. I know this can be very difficult when the administration is committed to quality education."

Burns' comments led to discussion of teacher negotiations, which broke down about a month ago when the St. Johns Education Association refused to consider a salary freeze and wage cap proposed by the board's negotiator.

Such a freeze could keep the school's programs operating "very close" to present levels, assuming voters renew the 3.5 mill request, Burns said.

But teachers are unlikely to accept such a freeze, an association spokesperson insists. The education association has proposed the board request of an extra two mills to maintain programs and another 1.5 mills to restore programs lost to budget cuts since 1978. Along with the 3.5 mill renewal, the proposal would give voters a chance to approve three separate issues totalling 7 mills. Each mill generates about \$184,000.

Other teachers' groups at school systems near Clinton County have won raises in the nine percent range during the past year. Such a settlement in St. Johns would require at least four more mills, Controller Rick Terres said.

But, board members say, without knowing the outcome of negotiations, they have to consider a whole range of possible millage requests to maintain programs in the face of state aid cuts, inflation and enrollment declines.

One local resident, Greg Pennix, disagreed; judging by the applause his remarks drew, many others do, too.

"As a parent and businessman, I encourage you to go to work and get those things settled so we can determine what kind of programs you're going to have," Pennix said.

"Then come back to the people and say, 'in order to have this program, we need this amount of mills.'"

Pennix, a teacher and coach in the Bay City School system before moving to St. Johns, said decline of Bay City schools prompted his move and warned St. Johns could soon have similar problems if board members don't make a decision soon.

"I can't believe with Oldmobile (UAW contract concessions) etcetera it's that hard to negotiate a contract. Let's move it along," he demanded. "Move the board

and the teachers and the bus drivers and the secretarial pool off dead center and get those figures in. We're playing with the lives of young people. Let's get the show on the road."

Board members pointed out that 80 percent of their budget goes to salaries. "It's hard to agree on an amount of money when you don't know if you've got it," Marian Kurnz replied to Pennix.

"Ask the administration to prepare a budget based on just renewal and settle the contract on that basis," Pennix urged in reply. "Pink slip teachers, bus drivers, whatever you need to do."

Pennix also said Burns, who will retire in January, does not provide adequate leadership.

"Even though I'm leaving in January I hope you don't think I'm going to lay down and play dead," the superintendent replied later. "I'm going to continue to provide all the leadership I can."

Business savvy needed, petitioners tell board

St. Johns' next school superintendent should be one with a background in business, according to a group which has collected about 250 signatures on a petition presented to the board of education Wednesday night, April 14.

Handed to board members by local farmer and bus driver Bruce Irish, the petition was prompted by a suggestion from the Clinton County Farm Bureau, Irish said.

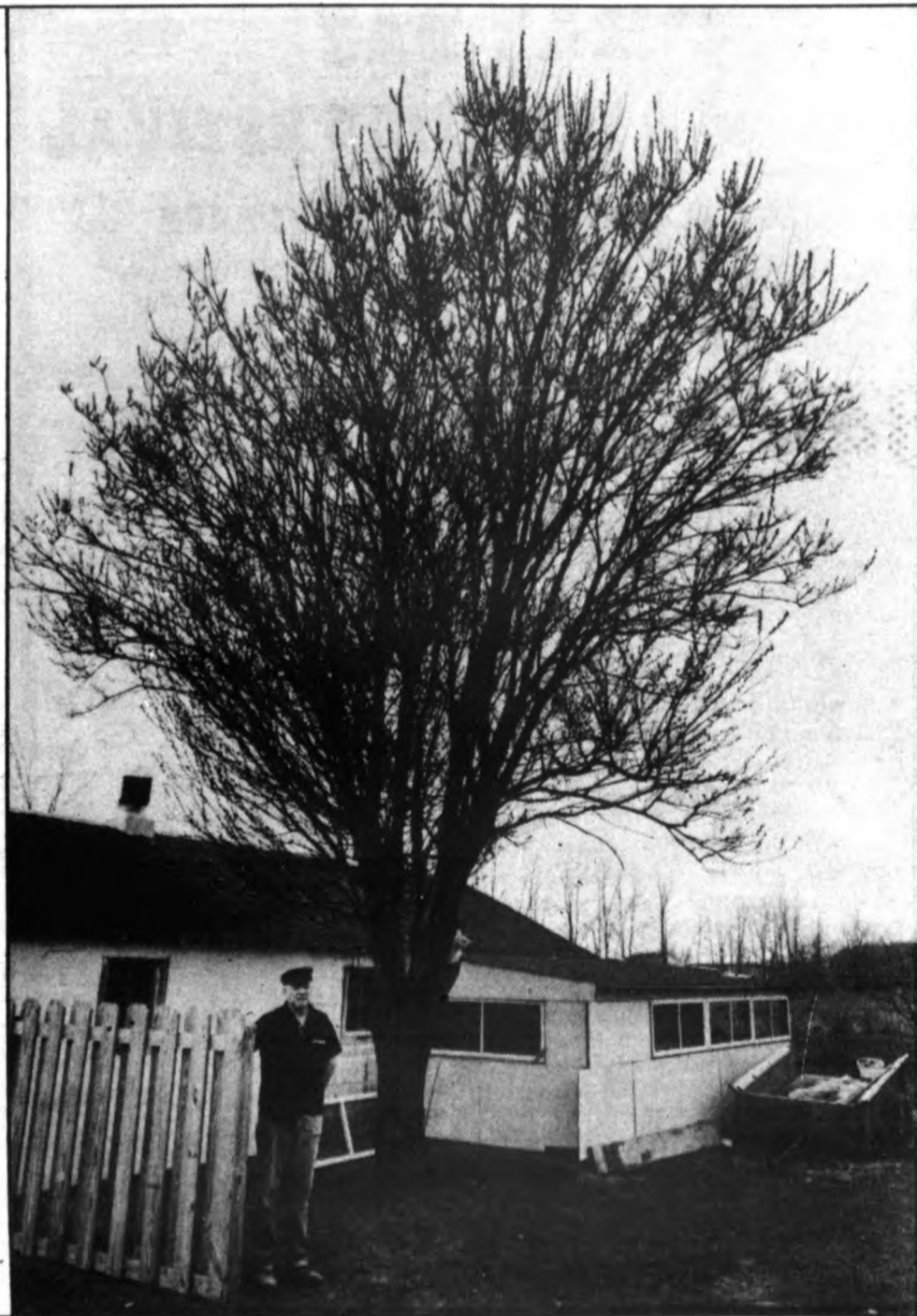
The petition urges the board to consider only applicants for superintendent who have had some experience in the business world as well as education.

Irish said the move could save the school system from three to seven percent on their annual budget, and told board members superintendents with business experience hired by other school systems have contributed to better budget management.

Superintendent Don Burns has announced he will retire in January, 1983, and the board is expected to begin looking for a new superintendent soon.

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Former Policeman holes up in home

Threatening suicide, a former St. Johns Police officer fired nearly a dozen shots into his 604 W. Walker St. home and kept officers from three law enforcement agencies at bay for about eight hours Tuesday night, April 13.

Following several conversations with his counselor and fellow police officers, Donald Lenon, 30, gave himself up to authorities near 1:45 a.m., St. Johns Police reports said.

Lenon, who resigned from St. Johns Police Department Dec. 31, 1981, was a patrolman and sergeant with the department for five years. Chief Lyle French said Lenon was having marital and personal problems prior to his resignation, and is undergoing counseling.

Although he fired between seven and 11 shots into his ceiling and walls, once in the presence of his counselor, no criminal charges were filed and Lenon was released after undergoing counseling at a Lansing hospital, reports said.

Lenon was alone at home near 6:30 p.m. when he began threatening to kill himself during a phone conversation, reports said. Notified by a relative, St. Johns officers watched his home and contacted him by phone. Lenon continued the threats, and nearly eight hours later his former co-worker, Sgt. Dennis Wilson, persuaded him to give himself up.

Meanwhile, St. Johns Police and Clinton County Sheriff's deputies, assisted by a special crisis team from the Lansing Police Department, closed off a nine block area to vehicles and pedestrians. Five families in nearby homes were also evacuated, reports said.

Later, police discovered seven spent cartridges from Lenon's .38 cal. five-shot revolver and ten bullet holes were discovered in walls and the ceiling, reports said.

Breaking and enterings were reported in several areas of Clinton County last week, and St. Johns Police believe a pair of suspects they arrested early Saturday morning, April 17, are responsible for several break-ins and thefts in the city during recent weeks.

Daryl D. Welton, 17, of 403 N. Morton, and James Allen Cobane, 17, of 311 Wight, were apprehended near 2:30 a.m. when a patrolman became suspicious after he spotted them walking down a city street carrying a large box.

In the box was a television, a calculator and some candy bars, which the suspects claimed they received from a city resident. The resident was contacted, but denied any knowledge of the items, and the box was confiscated, reports said.

Later, near 5:50 a.m., a break-in was reported at Drake's Gas Station. At 7:30, an attempted break-in was discovered at Hub Tire Center. Police investigated a building located between the two and discovered a third break-in at St. Johns Oil, where a television and a calculator had been taken.

Several cartons of cigarettes and candy bars had been taken from the gas station, reports said.

The pair was arrested and has since admitted recent break-ins and thefts at Family Fare Restaurant, 1000 N. Lansing, Itsagood Restaurant, 705 N. US-27 and Pop's Mobile.

Police also suspect the pair of being responsible for recent school building break-ins and said the thefts included candy and cash totalling more than \$300.

Three Okemos men were arrested by Clinton County Sheriff's deputies near 3:40 a.m. Friday, April 16 at Adgates Grocery Store in Westphalia, reports said.

James L. Mosely, 19, of 4589 Seven Rails, Elliot M.

Woodworth, 19, of 4398 Okemos Rd., and Shawn M. Woodworth, 18, of the same address, were apprehended when an officer discovered planks had been removed to gain access to a pop can bin, reports said.

(under authority of Act 230, P.A., 1925, as amended)

1982 YOUTH PHEASANT HUNTING PROGRAM

The Natural Resources Commission at its meeting of March 12, 1982, rescinded the 1982 Youth Pheasant Hunting Program Order of February 12, 1982, and under authority of Section 3, Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, adopted rules and regulations for the 1982 Youth Pheasant Hunting Program as follows:

Designation of Experimental Areas

The Rose Lake Wildlife Research Area is designated as an experimental game management area, not to exceed 40,000 acres in size, for the period of August 1 to August 31, 1982.

The Holly, Ionia, Pinckney, and Sleepy Hollow put-take areas are designated as experimental game management areas, not to exceed 5,000 acres each in size, for the period September 15 to September 30, 1982. Participants in the 1982 Youth Pheasant Hunt on September 18 and 25 on these areas will not be required to possess a put-take permit.

Application Procedures

To qualify for this hunt, a person shall have completed their Hunter Safety Education Training Course between the dates of January 1, 1982, and July 15, 1982, and shall not have reached their 17th birthday before September 15, 1982. They shall make application on a postage prepaid form available from their Hunter Safety Education Instructor or the Law Enforcement or Wildlife Divisions. Information required on this form shall be: applicant's Hunter Safety Education Certificate number, instructor number, applicant's name and address, choice of hunting area and date desired, and the statement, "My son/daughter, (name) has my permission to participate in the Youth Hunt at the area and on the date indicated above," signed by a parent or guardian.

An applicant may submit only one application and apply for only one hunting date. Duplicate applications will be rejected. No application postmarked later than 12 o'clock midnight, July 15, 1982, will be accepted. Maximum numbers of hunters allowed per hunt on each area is as follows: Rose Lake Wildlife Research Area - 30; Sleepy Hollow State Park - 60; the Holly, Ionia, and Pinckney Recreation Areas - 75 each. On over-subscribed dates, drawings will be held to determine successful applicants. Only successful applicants will be notified by July 30, 1982.

Hunting Restrictions

Each hunter shall possess a 1982 passbook and small game hunting stamp, plus a validated permit. Each hunter must be accompanied by a parent, guardian, or person authorized by parent or guardian who is at least 21 years of age and who will not be allowed to carry a gun. Shotguns only must be used. Both youth and parent/guardian must wear a vest, jacket, or cap of highly visible fluorescent blaze or flame orange color. Backtag must be worn.

Rose Lake Wildlife Research Area:	August 14, 21, and 28, 1982
Holly, Ionia, and Pinckney Recreation Areas and Sleepy Hollow State Park:	September 18 and 25, 1982

Shooting Hours

Bag Limits

The bag limit shall be two (2) pheasants. At the Rose Lake Area, only male pheasants may be taken. On the Holly, Ionia, Pinckney, and Sleepy Hollow areas, either sex may be taken. At all areas, hunters must return to a designated check-in location at the conclusion of their hunt to report results and present their birds for examination. For validation purposes, birds will be sealed with a 1980 put-take seal before leaving the area.

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Patients encouraged to remain home

One of the greatest dilemmas facing Americans in the 1980s is the problem of caring for their sick and their elderly. Clinton Memorial Hospital is meeting that problem head-on.

The Clinton Memorial Hospital Home Health Service program attempts to keep patients out of nursing homes and hospitals and helps them function independently in their own homes.

The program was started last June and has provided nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech therapy services to homebound patients. Just recently health aides have been added to provide county residents with an even wider range of services. The health aides will be visiting patients to provide personal care services such as bathing and hair care.

"The key to the program is the nurse," program coordinator Michelle Wiseman said. "The nurse is the eyes in the home for the doctor."

When a patient is referred to the program, a registered nurse does an initial evaluation to determine what services are required, monitors the patients' physical condition and teaches family members how to manage the patient at home. The nurse also arranges visits by other members of Clinton Memorial's health team.

The home health care services are covered by Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross Home Care and Veterans Insurance. The patients' doctor must certify eligibility.

"The purpose of the program is to promote independence," explained Ms. Wiseman. "Most of our patients are able to be on their own after about 15 visits. We do, however, have a few that are more long term."

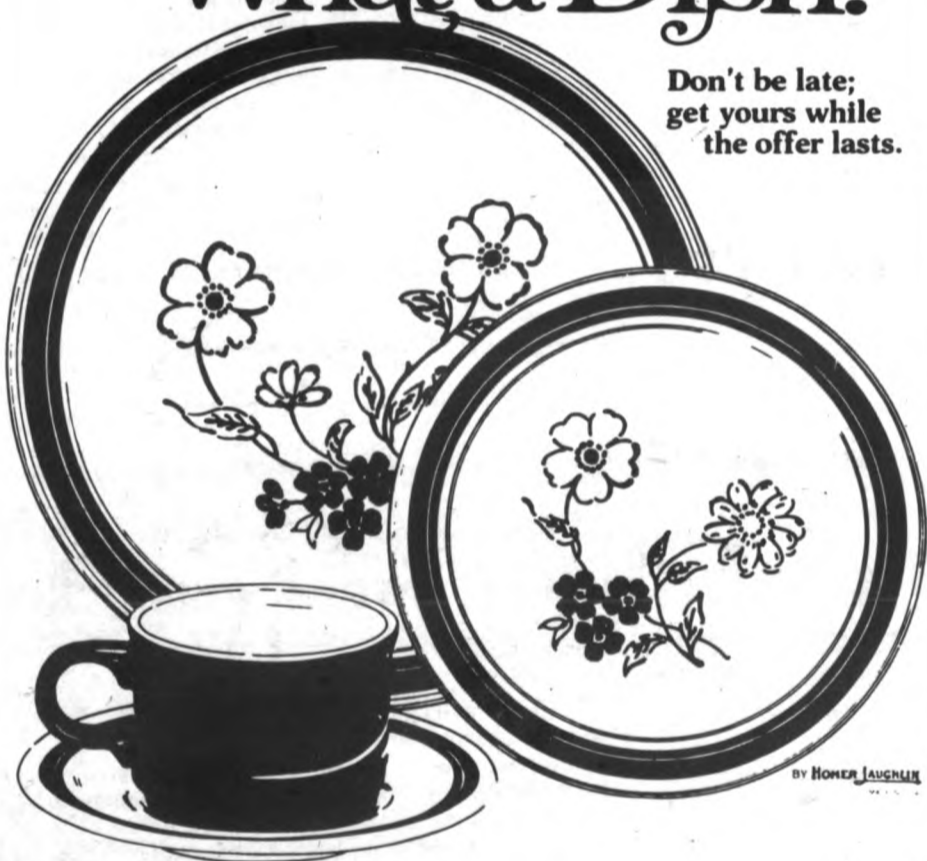

A weekly paper bites the dust

When you think of newspapers going out of business, big city dailies like the Washington Star come to mind. But small town newspapers are threatened, too, and when a small weekly folds, there is seldom any competition to fill the gap.

Like a mirror, a small town newspaper should reflect an unflattering, objective image of the community it serves. Without a local paper, communities lack an identity; a sense of where they have been and where they are, or should be, going.

The latest small town paper to sink in Michigan's turbulent economic waters is the Maple River News in Ovid. Only a year ago, Eaton Rapids lost their weekly paper, the High Water Mark. Both communities are the poorer, and we will miss both paper's contributions to weekly journalism.

There is a trend that becomes evident, examining the cases of both, however. Both folded as a result of many reasons, including mismanagement and poor planning, the staffs admitted. But another common reason given was lack of community support and competition from established shoppers which drain advertising dollars from a community while providing little or no news.

Newspapers are not public utilities. Though the greatest effort is made to distance news from coercion or pressure from advertisers, the cold fact is newspapers anywhere cannot survive without support from local businesses.

Tree time is now

Although spring is barely here, now is the time to take off those rose-colored glasses and assess the trees in your yard. Remember that tree that loses a major limb every time it storms? Remember running your lawnmower over all of those messy fruit? Remember the tree that's so old it has more branches than leaves?

If so, now is the time to take inventory and replant if necessary. Not only is early spring the ideal tree-planting season, but most nursery stock is cheaper now.

Even though you may choose to leave a bothersome tree in its place a while longer, plant a new tree nearby to fill the void when you finally do cut it down. Thinking ahead can prevent future eyesores.

After deciding where a new tree is needed, decide what function it will have. Trees can beautify a yard, provide shade or screen a neighbor's yard or unattractive view. Knowing what you want and where it will be planted helps tremendously when it comes to choosing a suitable variety.

County extension agents, landscape contractors and retail nursery staff can help match a specific tree to certain needs. Before purchasing a tree, find out how tall it will grow and how fast, and how far it should be planted from other plants or structures.

Don't pinch pennies when it comes to buying a tree — a good tree should live as long as you. Before final purchase, also inquire about terms of sale, since some nurseries guarantee their stock for a slightly higher price.

A wise shopper will purchase trees within the next few weeks, when bare-root stock is available. As the name implies, bare-root stock is sold without any soil covering the roots. Later, when trees begin budding, nursery owners are forced to pot their trees. The extra labor and materials, depending upon size, can boost the price of a tree by \$5 or \$10. Also, transplanting trees in bare-root condition causes less shock and water loss to the plant than waiting until the tree is in full leaf. One drawback, however: Trees over 6'8" are seldom available bare-root.

Some desirable shade trees suited to soils in Clinton County are: little leaf linden, European or American beech, sugar maple, red maple, sycamore, any oaks

Senior citizen update

Watch those medicines

Once again I want to remind you of the importance of keeping track of your medicines.

Do you ever have trouble:

•Remembering how to take a number of different medicines?

•Remembering WHEN you took a particular medicine?

•Remembering WHETHER you took a medicine when you were supposed to?

•Reading the labels on your prescriptions?

If so, you may want to use a system to help you solve the following problems.

□PROBLEM: I take several different medications and it's hard to remember how I'm supposed to take each one.

SUGGESTION: Make a list. Include the names of the drugs and what you take them for; the color and shape or other useful descriptions of each drug; the directions and any special precautions (three times a day with meals, every four hours, do not drink alcohol, etc.); the actual time of day to take the medicine.

□PROBLEM: I don't take many medicines, but sometimes I forget whether I've taken them or not.

SUGGESTION: If you only take one dose of medicine a day, you can turn the bottle upside down after you have taken it, or move it from the left to the right side of your dresser.

SUGGESTION: If your medicine does not need to be stored in an air-tight container (ask your doctor or pharmacist to be sure), you can count out your whole day's dosage in the morning and put them in another container. Then you can tell whether you took a particular pill by counting the ones that are left.

SUGGESTION: Many pharmacists have special containers with one pocket for each day of the week so you can set out all of your pills for an entire week at once. This can be helpful if you take medicine every other day. However, be sure to ask your doctor or pharmacist if storing medicines in such a container will affect their potency.

□PROBLEM: I take several medicines and sometimes forget whether I've taken them and when to take them.

SUGGESTION: If your medicines do not need to be stored in air-tight containers, you can make cups of egg cartons with the 12 daytime hours. In the morning, put the pills you take at 8 a.m. in the 8 a.m. cup, your noon pills in the noon cup, etc. The cup tells you what time to take a medicine, and if you forgot whether you took it, all you have to do is look in the appropriate cup to see if the pills are still there.

SUGGESTION: You can make a chart with a place to check off your medicine as you take it. To use this chart, simply check off the times that you take your medicine. For example, the patient takes some kind of medicine at 8 a.m., noon and 5 p.m., so check off the names of the medicine that should be taken each time.

I hope this will help you.
So, until next time...

and crimson king or Norway maple.

Avoid weeping willow, pussy willow, poplar and silver maple. Although usually inexpensive and fast-growing, these are not a good bargain. All four are weak-wooded, messy and short-lived. Willow roots have a peculiar tendency to beeline for water mains and plug them.

Good trees for screening are Arborvitae, amur maple, spruces or any other hardy tree which branches densely to the ground. An important factor to remember when choosing a screen plant is whether or not winter screening is desired. If so, choose an evergreen.

The best specimens for beautifying a yard are those with good fall color, attractive flowers or fruit, sturdy branches, attractive bark and low maintenance. It is also best to choose specimen trees that don't completely block the view of your home. Mountain ash, hawthornes, crabapples, red maples, redbuds and honeylocusts are good choices. Many other trees are acceptable, depending upon what is available at local nurseries.

In Clinton County, avoid birch, elm and sunburst honeylocust, which play host to some specific pests. Homeowners who plant these set themselves up for high maintenance and perhaps even death of the tree.

'Nick' and his wife lead a wild life

Most people swerve to avoid dead animals. If they're fresh, Gijsbert van Frankenhuyzen will stop and pick them up. Kept in a basement freezer at his Bath home, they come in handy as models for wildlife paintings or, later, as meals for his owls and sparrow hawks.

Sometimes they surprise him by not being dead at all, like the mink he picked up last year which now regularly dines on less fortunate victims of untimely road-crossings.

Known as "Nick" to friends, van Frankenhuyzen is an award-winning wildlife artist whose works can regularly be seen in Michigan Magazine, published by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). He also is saint and savior to hundreds of wild creatures wounded, trapped or carried away from nests and dens by unknowing hikers and hunters.

In the past year, his farm on Clark Road was home to 30 racoons, three sparrow hawks, a trio of opossums, a green heron, squirrels, a doe, sheep, three dogs, three cats, a mink, chickens, pigeons, mice and four owls, including three great horned owls, now on the endangered species list.

That doesn't bother his wife, Robbyn, an animal technician at Haslett Animal Hospital. "I love it. It's just what I always wanted to do as a child, taking care of wild animals," she says.

"It's a lot of fun as long as you don't add up what it costs to feed them all," van Frankenhuyzen agreed in a lilting Scandinavian accent, a reminder of his boyhood in the Netherlands where he first began sketching and painting at the age of 10.

When he started, van Frankenhuyzen painted stuffed birds, cows, horses or any furred, feathered or four-footed creature he could find. But taxidermed subjects gave his paintings a "stiff," unnatural appearance, he said, looking over one of his early works. Today, he paints only live, or recently alive subjects whenever possible. And the managerie he keeps in cages, pens and barns just outside his studio, along with his basement freezer, provides plenty.

Most of the animals are brought to van Frankenhuyzen by park rangers throughout the state. They confiscate them from park visitors who have often kidnapped cuddly creatures from their nests, believing them abandoned. Gijsbert understands how that can happen; he picked up a baby racoon on a visit to Michigan about six years ago and ended up landing his

job with the DNR. He turned the kit in to a local park ranger, who, when he discovered van Frankenhuyzen's talents with camera and paint brush, told him about Michigan Magazine.

"When I heard about a job painting and photographing wildlife, I knew it was just what I wanted," he said. Gijsbert, 30, moved to Michigan in 1976, settling first in Laingsburg, then at his present home near the edge of Rose Lake Wildlife Research center.

Now art director at Michigan Magazine, he has learned a lot in the past six years, he says. For example, people who stumble upon baby animals in the woods shouldn't pick them up. Although they may look abandoned, their parents are usually hiding nearby keeping close watch and will return to their young as soon as intruders leave.

Another thing he's learned since he adopted his first wild animal: racoons can be a nuisance. Although he releases most of his recuperated charges near his home, he takes racoons to Houghton Lake.

"They are a real pain in the neck. They get in the barn and come in the house or get in the chicken coop and steal eggs," he said. "I've got one somewhere up in the barn now who won't leave. I can't find him."

Most of the animals he keeps get along fine together. His sheep recently pinned down his dogs in the corner of the sheep pen when they got too close to new-born lambs, and a pigeon or chicken sometimes turns up missing about the same time an owl or cat gets picky at evening meal time. Gijsbert also lost an orchard of young fruit trees recently when his doe got a craving for fresh bark. But with a collection of wildlife to rival Potter Park's, it's surprising he doesn't have more problems.

Local children know about his "family" and often drop by to visit. Gijsbert says he likes that.

"Many of them aren't aware what can happen to animals if they're picked up and carried away from their homes or mistreated. This gives me a chance to show them just how serious a problem it really is, and I think many of them are surprised."

It's clear Gijsbert enjoys feeding, painting, playing with or just watching his animals, and his face lights up when he answers questions about each one's history, where it was found, how it was injured or what it eats.

"We're in our glory," his wife says. "We are pretty fortunate his interests are the same as mine."

The hundreds of creatures now in the woods again after being nursed back to health probably would agree.

Tennis courts in Clinton County will not be overflowing with high school tennis teams. There are only three. Only St. Johns, DeWitt and Ovid-Elsie are choosing to play the game that Major Wingfield introduced in Wales in 1873.

There might have been only two net squads, however, except that Ovid-Elsie's booster club agreed to fund the sport after it was not included in the school's athletic budget. The booster club insisted that girls as well as boys be allowed to participate in the spring tennis program.

"We didn't have tennis last year, so we're lacking experience," tennis coach Don Barlow said. "But I'm excited because we have so many kids out."

Barlow's 40 players include 25 girls and 15 boys. The ten best will play on the varsity and the next ten will play on the junior varsity.

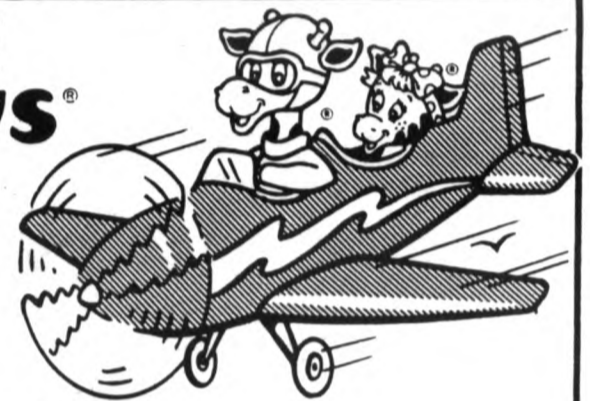

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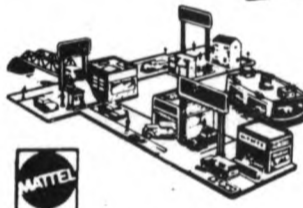

ORDINANCE NO. 340

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE V, ZONING AND PLANNING, BY THE ADDITION THERETO OF CHAPTER 54 - SITE PLAN REVIEW, TO ESTABLISH A SITE PLAN REVIEW PROCEDURE FOR THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE ORDERLY ZONING AND LAND USE CONTROL WITHIN THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS;

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

That Title V, Zoning and Planning of the St. Johns City Code, shall be amended by the addition of Chapter 54 - Site Plan Review, to set forth the procedure and requirement for site plan review when applicable, to require site plan review for certain buildings, structures and uses to assure an orderly development and to preserve the integrity of the development of the City of St. Johns.

CHAPTER 54 SITE PLAN REVIEW ORDINANCE

5.371 - PURPOSE

It is the purpose of this Article to require site plan review approval for certain buildings, structures, and uses that can be expected to have a significant impact on natural resources, traffic patterns, adjacent parcels, and the character of future development.

The regulations contained in this Article are intended to promote: 1) safe and convenient traffic movement, both within a site and in relation to access streets; 2) harmonious relationships of buildings, structures, and uses, both within a site and with adjacent sites; 3) conservation of natural amenities and resources; and 4) to preserve the integrity of the utility system of the City of St. Johns.

5.372 USES REQUIRING SITE PLAN REVIEW

A detached single family dwelling on a lot or parcel not having any other dwelling existing or to be located thereon, or a two family dwelling existing on a lot or parcel not having any other dwelling existing or to be located thereon does not require site plan review. All land uses shall be subject to site plan approval if any one or more of the following minimum standards are met:

- (1) Any use requiring four (4) or more parking spaces.
- (2) The land being developed is two (2) acres or more.
- (3) The building being constructed consists of 2,500 square feet or larger.

(4) The proposed structure, use or land to be developed will abut an existing residential district.

5.373 - SITE PLAN REVIEW PROCEDURES

Applicant: The owner, or his designated agent, of the subject property shall file a request with the Planning Commission for site plan approval.

Application: Applications for preliminary and final site plan approval shall be submitted to the City Planning Commission on a special form for that purpose. Each preliminary application shall be accompanied by the payment of a fee of \$25.00 to cover costs of processing the application. No part of the fee shall be refundable.

Data Required in Preliminary Application: Every application for site plan approval shall be accompanied by the following information and data:

(1) A special form supplied by the Zoning Administrator filled out in full by the applicant. This form shall contain the following information:

- (a) The applicant's name and address in full.
- (b) Applicant's phone number.
- (c) A statement that the applicant is the owner of property or acting on the owner's behalf.
- (d) The name and address of the owner of record if the applicant is not the owner of record.
- (e) The address, legal description and parcel number of the property.

(2) An accurate drawing(s) showing:

- (a) Property dimensions.
 - (b) Topographic elevations as required by City Engineer.
 - (c) Significant vegetation.
 - (d) Water courses and water bodies, including man-made surface drainage ways.
 - (e) Existing public right-of-way, pavements, and/or private easements.
 - (f) Existing buildings and structures.
 - (g) Zoning classification of abutting properties.
- (3) A preliminary site plan, drawn to scale of 1" = 200 feet or less of the entire property involved showing:

- (a) Dimensions of property included in proposed development.
- (b) Location of abutting streets and proposed alignment of streets, drives and easements serving the development.
- (c) Location of proposed buildings and intended uses thereof.
- (d) Location of parking areas.
- (e) Proposed water supply, wastewater systems and tentative locations.
- (f) Proposed grades and site drainage pattern.
- (g) Proposed common open spaces and facilities, if applicable.
- (h) Proposed accessory buildings and uses, including free standing signs.

(4) The Planning Commission may require written impact statements relative to traffic capacity or streets, schools, existing utilities or natural features.

5.374 - REVIEW BY PLANNING COMMISSION

The Zoning Administrator shall send notice of site plan review, by first class mail, to all persons owning property within a 300 foot radius of the property in question.

The City Planning Commission shall review the preliminary site plan to determine compliance with permitted land use, density of development, general circulation, and other provisions of this Ordinance. The preliminary site plan shall also be reviewed for the same compliance, by the zoning, water, wastewater, public works, police and fire departments along with the City Manager and City Engineer, and shall report to the Planning Commission their recommendations. This review will also include the county drain commission and county zoning, when applicable.

The Planning Commission shall respond to the applicant its decision within 45 days of filing, and if denied, shall cite the reason for denial. If approved, a Certificate of Preliminary Site Plan Approval shall be issued to the applicant by the Zoning Administrator.

5.375 - APPLICATION: FINAL SITE PLAN APPROVAL

Within 365 days of the date of issuance of the Certificate of Preliminary Site Plan Approval, the applicant shall file for final site plan approval. The application shall be accompanied by the following information:

(1) A special form supplied by the Zoning Administrator and filled out in full by the applicant. This form shall contain the following information:

(a) The same information contained on the application form for preliminary site plan approval.

(b) A reference to the date on which the Planning Commission granted preliminary site plan approval.

(2) Final site plan and site development specifications for the site, or portion thereof, on which site plan approval is sought.

(3) The final site plan shall conform substantially to the preliminary site plan.

5.376 - MODIFICATION OF APPROVAL OF PRELIMINARY SITE PLAN

Once site plan approval has been granted by the Planning Commission, changes to the approved site plan shall require a re-submission.

5.377 - FINAL SITE PLAN APPROVAL

The Planning Commission will forward its findings and recommendations for approval or rejection of the preliminary site plan to the City Commission for final site plan review.

The City Commission shall, within forty-five (45) days of action by the Planning Commission, act upon the application for final site plan approval. If final site plan approval is denied by the City Commission, notice thereof, together with the reason shall be sent to applicant. If approved, a Certificate of Final Site Plan Approval shall be issued to applicant.

5.378 - STANDARDS FOR SITE PLAN APPROVAL

All elements of the site plan shall be harmoniously and efficiently organized in relation to topography, the size and type of plot, the character of adjoining property and the type and size of buildings. The site will be so developed as not to impede the normal and orderly development or improvement of surrounding property for uses permitted in this Ordinance.

The landscape shall be preserved in its natural state, insofar as practicable, by minimizing tree and soil removal, and by topographic modifications which result in maximum harmony with adjacent areas.

The site plan shall provide reasonable, visual and sound privacy for all dwelling units located therein. Fences, walks, barriers and landscaping shall be used, as appropriate, for the protection and enhancement of property and the privacy of its occupants.

All buildings, or groups of buildings, shall be so arranged as to permit emergency vehicle access by some practical means to all sides.

Every structure or dwelling unit shall have access to a public street, walkway, or other area dedicated to common use.

There shall be provided a pedestrian circulation system which is insulated as completely as reasonably possible from the vehicular circulation system. In order to ensure public safety, pedestrian underpasses or overpasses may be required in the vicinity of schools, playgrounds, local shopping areas and other uses which generate a considerable amount of pedestrian traffic.

The arrangement of public or common ways for vehicular and pedestrian circulation shall respect the pattern of existing or planned streets and pedestrian or bicycle pathways in the area. Streets and drives which are part of an existing or planned street pattern which serves adjacent development shall be of a width appropriate to the traffic volume they will carry and shall have a dedicated right-of-way equal to that specified in the city specifications.

All streets shall be developed in accordance with the city specifications unless otherwise approved by the City Commission.

Any development affecting existing city streets shall comply with city specifications as to curb, gutter, walkways, paving, catch basins and underground utility locations.

Appropriate measures shall be taken to ensure that removal of surface waters will not adversely affect neighboring properties or the public storm drainage system. Provisions shall be made for the construction of sewer facilities including grading, gutters, piping, and the treatment of turf to handle storm water, prevent erosion and the formation of dust. Surface water on all paved areas shall be collected at intervals so that it will not obstruct the flow of vehicular or pedestrian traffic and will not create puddles in paved areas.

All appropriate measures shall be taken, by the developer, to complete a water loops system when deemed advisable by the City Engineer and City Water Department.

All appropriate measures shall be taken by the developer, to provide adequate water and fire protection systems when deemed advisable by the City Engineer, Water Department and Fire Departments.

Underground utilities may be required in all areas for distribution of utilities including water, sewer, electric, gas, telephone and cable TV when deemed advisable.

All loading and unloading areas and outside storage areas including areas for the storage of trash which face or are visible from residential districts or public thoroughfares shall be screened by an opaque wall not less than six (6) feet in height.

Exterior lighting shall be so arranged that it is deflected away from adjacent properties and so that it does not impede the vision of traffic along adjacent streets. Flashing or intermittent lights shall not be permitted.

In approving the site plan, the Planning Commission may recommend to the City Commission that a bond or other financial guarantee acceptable to the City of ample sum be furnished by the developer to ensure compliance for such requirements as drives, walks, utilities, parking, landscaping and the like.

5.379 - APPEALS AND QUESTIONS OF INTERPRETATION OF ORDINANCE

Any person considering himself aggrieved by any interpretation of the Planning Commission or its recommendation granting or denying site plan approval shall have the right to take an appeal to the City Commission as herein set forth for final site plan approval.

In the event the City Commission shall reject the final site plan, an appeal may be taken to a court of competent jurisdiction; such appeal shall be deemed exclusive.

Section 2. Except as herein provided, the Zoning Ordinance of the City of St. Johns Code shall stand as first enacted or subsequently amended.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

The Planning Commission will consider the following amendments to the Clinton County Zoning Ordinance, OR-1-78, as amended.

CASE ZC-7-82 Text Amendment - Flood Hazard Area

The following amendments are necessitated since Watertown Charter Township is going from the emergency to the regular phase of the Federal Flood Insurance Program. The proposed changes are as follows:

1. Amending Art. 5, Sec. 5.10.2(A) by deleting the first paragraph and replacing it with the following new paragraph.

A. The flood hazard area zone shall overlay existing zoning districts delineated on the official Clinton County Zoning Map. The boundaries of the flood hazard area zone shall coincide with the boundaries of the areas indicated as within the limits of the 100 year flood in the report entitled "The Flood Insurance Study County of Clinton, Michigan" dated November 17, 1981 with accompanying Flood Insurance Rate Maps and Flood Boundary and Floodway Maps. Within the flood hazard area zone a regulatory floodway shall be designated. The boundaries of the regulatory floodway shall coincide with the floodway boundaries indicated on the Flood Boundary and Floodway Map. The study and accompanying maps are adopted by reference, appended, and declared to be a part of this ordinance. The term flood hazard area as used in this ordinance shall mean the flood hazard area zone and the term floodway shall mean the designated regulatory floodway.

2. Amending Art. 5, Sec. 5.10.6 by adding the following new subsection (C).

C. Mobile homes within zones A1-30 on the Flood Insurance Rate Map shall be located in accord with the following standards:

1. all mobile homes shall be placed on stands or lots which are

elevated on compacted fill or on pilings so that the lowest floor of the mobile home will be at or above the base flood level.

2. adequate surface drainage away from all structures and access for a mobile home hauler shall be provided.

3. in the instance of elevation on pilings, lots shall be large enough to permit steps, piling foundations shall be placed in stable soil no more than 10 feet apart; and reinforcement shall be provided for piers more than 6 feet above ground level.

4. in mobile home parks and mobile home subdivisions which exist at the time this subsection is adopted, where repair, reconstruction or improvement of streets, utilities and pads equals or exceeds 50% of the value of the streets, utilities and pads before the repair, the standards in subparagraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this subsection shall be complied with.

3. Amending Art. 5, Sec. 5.10.7 which had been reserved for future amendments by adding a new section entitled FLOOD-WAY PROTECTION STANDARDS, as follows:

A. New construction, substantial improvements and all other development, including fill, shall be prohibited within zones numbered A1-30 on the FIRM, except where it is demonstrated to the zoning administrator that the cumulative effect of the proposed development when combined with all other existing and anticipated development will not harmfully increase the water surface elevation of a base flood. In determining whether a harmful increase will occur, compliance with P.A. 245 of 1929, as amended by PA 167 of 1968, shall be required, provided that the allowable increase shall not exceed one foot. The provisions of this section shall not apply within the regulatory floodway. The provisions of subsection (B) shall be applied to land situated within the regulatory floodway.

B. All development occurring within the regulatory floodway shall comply with the following standards:

a. encroachments, including fill, new construction, substantial improvements and other development shall be prohibited. Exception to this prohibition shall only be made upon certification by a registered professional engineer or the DNR that the development proposed will not result in any increases in flood levels during a base flood discharge, and compliance with Act 167, P.A. of 1968.

b. the placement of mobile homes shall be prohibited except in mobile home parks and subdivisions which exist at the time this article is adopted.

c. development which is permitted in the regulatory floodway shall meet the requirements of sections 5.10.3 to 5.10.6.

The uses of land permitted in an underlying zoning district shall not be construed as being permitted within the regulatory floodway, except upon compliance with the provisions on this section.

Case ZC-8-82 Text Amendment - Mobile Home Site Development Standards.

Amending Art. 6, Sec. 6.11.3(G) Rule 944 (R 125.1944) SET-BACKS FROM PROPERTY LINES, by changing the fifty (50) feet property line setback to thirty (30) feet.

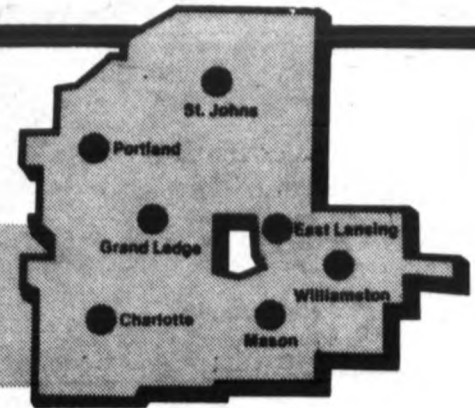

HONEY WHEAT BREAD

This recipe is a blue ribbon winner at the Eagle Fair, and I couldn't resist sharing it.

- 1 1/2 c. water
- 1 c. (8 oz.) cream style cottage cheese
- 1/2 c. honey
- 1/4 c. water (lukewarm)
- 2 pkgs. active dry yeast
- 1/4 c. butter
- 5 1/2 to 6 c. all purpose flour
- 1 c. whole wheat flour
- 2 tsp. sugar
- 3 tsp. salt
- 1 egg

Heat water, cottage cheese, honey and butter in medium saucepan until butter is melted. Put 1/4 c. water and yeast in small bowl until yeast is dissolved. Spoon flour into measuring cup; level off. Combine warm liquid, 2 c. all purpose flour and remaining ingredients in large bowl, beat 2 minutes with mixer. Stir in remaining flour (by hand), to make a stiff dough. Knead dough on floured surface, until smooth, about 2 minutes. Place in greased bowl. Cover, let rise in warm place until light and doubled in size about 45 to 60 minutes. Grease 2 loaf pans. Punch dough down; divide and shape into loaves. Place in greased pans. Cover, let rise 45 to 60 minutes. Bake 40 to 50 minutes in a 350 degree oven. Makes 2 loaves.

Arthritis—disease doctor, patients share

Chronic arthritis patients share their disease with their physicians.

There is a genuine partnership between doctor and patient.

There have been many times during the years I have suffered from this crippler when I've wanted to say: "You realize, we have arthritis, doctor."

I'm sure doctors must feel this. Treatment of arthritis can put extraordinary strains on them, because arthritis is such a frustrating disease to deal with.

People who study to become physicians are driven by a need to succeed in the healing arts. The slow progress in treating chronic arthritis can be defeating to them.

While the physician's frustrations may not be obvious, it is quite evident to anyone that people with arthritis suffer more than physical pain.

Fifteen years ago, when I was a college freshman and a successful model, I began to have aches and pains in my feet and hands. From that point began years of searching for relief from pain and from disabling deformities.

I have had surgery, traction, crutches. I've been addicted to cortisone, tried gold treatments and acupuncture. I've had illegal medicines and been victimized by quackery.

Above all, I have known severe depression trying to

cope with the pain and inability to rid myself of arthritis.

I am like millions of other arthritis sufferers who are treated regularly by physicians.

So, on the one side of the treatment is the frustrated physician. And, on the other, the depressed and anxious patient. The relationship between these two people is taxing for both.

"Doctor, will I ever get better?"

"How long will I have to take this medication?"

"Why don't I ever have a remission?"

Only the person who asks these questions knows the real anguish behind them. Yet, how rarely do we stop to consider how difficult they must be for the physician to hear, yet answer? In the baffling world of the rheumatic diseases, answers to these and other questions do not yet exist.

So, what advice can I give to the arthritis sufferer and the physician who must share this awful disease?

To the patient, I urge understanding. Because of the frustrations imposed on physicians by this disease, they have a tendency to try to depersonalize the patient. It is easier for them emotionally to look at you as an aching joint rather than as a human being. It is difficult for them to cope with their failures when they see them as having a direct impact on another person's life.

I am not suggesting that you let yourself be victimized by this attitude in some physicians. On the contrary, I urge you to voice your frustrations, your fears and your pain to your doctor. Remind him through your words and your gestures that you are a person who needs his emotional support.

And, to the physician, I urge tender loving care. We are not "arthritics," but people with arthritis.

Prescribing medications, recommending physical therapy or suggesting a surgical procedure are only parts of the picture. To this canvas a good doctor must add the subtle brushstrokes of understanding the emotional, familial, social and financial problems that face the patient.

A good doctor is a good listener who can be tremendously helpful in alleviating our negative feelings, which intensify our pain. We need more of these "people doctors."

And, to the medical establishment I add this plea: Give us more trained rheumatologists.

Despite the fact that there are approximately 31 million people suffering from arthritis in the United States, there are only 2200 rheumatology specialists practicing throughout the country. This demand upon the time of existing rheumatologists only adds to the frustrations of both doctors and patients.
