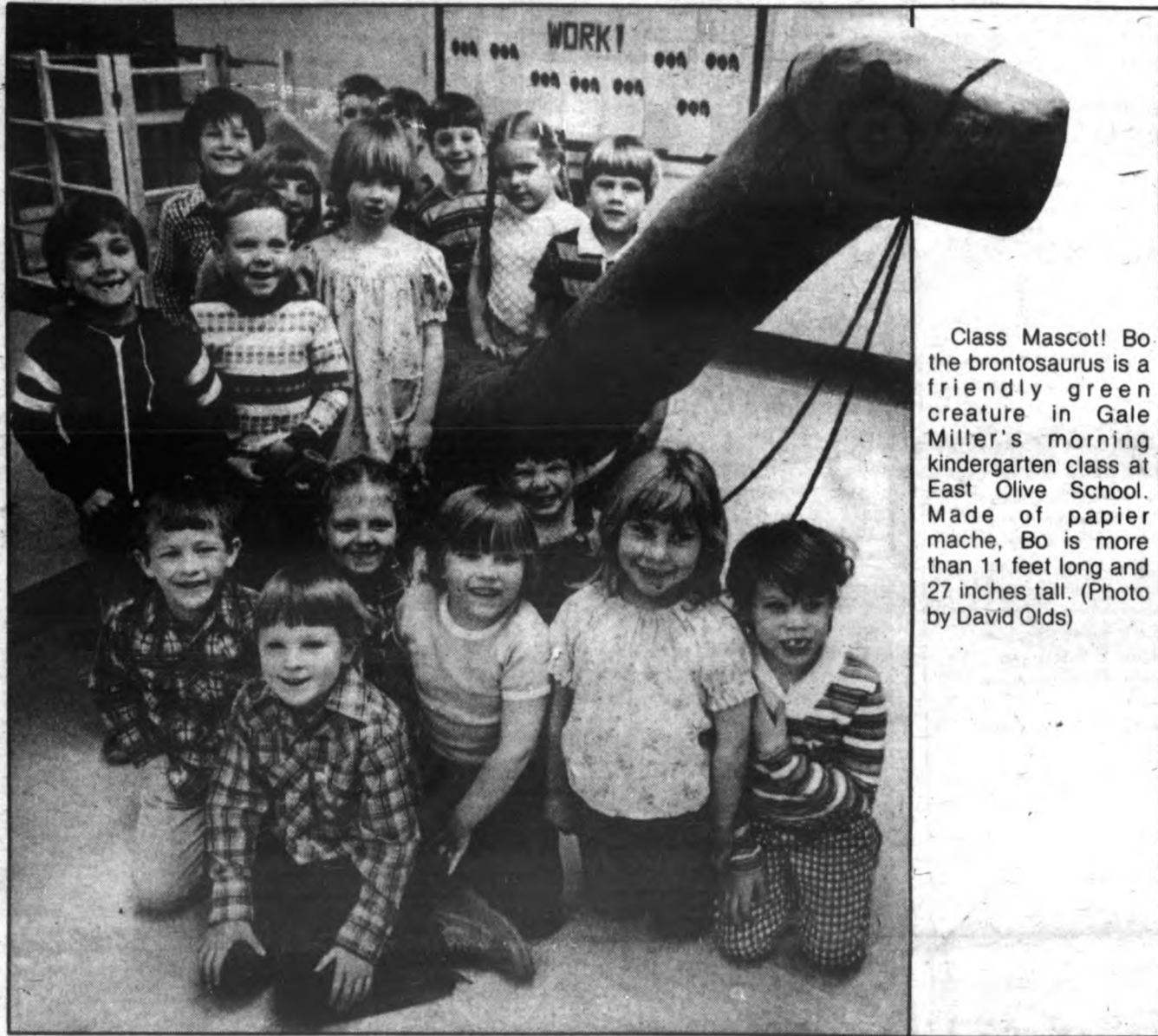

## Millages set

Voters will get three choices when St. Johns schools ask them for millages June 14.

First, they will be asked to renew for three additional years a one-year 3.5 mill increase approved last August.

Second, voters will be asked to okay an additional one-third mill for one year, which board members say will maintain most programs as they presently are if:

- Classes are combined throughout the district;
- All employees agree to a wage freeze;
- Bus drivers aides and cafeteria workers agree to renegotiate and reduce a nine percent raise approved last year.

Third, voters will be asked to approve a one year two-mill increase suggested by the St. Johns Education Association to provide for salary increases and maintain programs.

The first two proposals passed unanimously, but the third was barely approved following a stalemate and long debate during a special board meeting Wednesday night, April 28. The meeting, like the three previous, was held in the high school library before a large audience of mostly teachers.

A fourth proposal — also suggested by the teacher's association — to request another 1.5 mills to restore programs cut since 1978, was unanimously rejected.

The proposals were submitted by a sub-committee of president Ron Huard and trustees Robert Craig and Lee Ormston; Criag presented them, with comments from Huard. Ormston was absent, leaving the board without a tie-breaking vote.

Craig said the sub-committee's choice was based on preliminary 1982-83 budget figures which show a \$150,000 deficit, even without increases in salaries for teachers and other employees. Contracts for most employee groups are up this year and teachers began negotiating several months ago. Talks broke down when the board's negotiator proposed a freeze, however.

Craig said other criteria for the four proposals included a recent citizen's committee report which considered closing a rural elementary school or combining classes to save money and eliminate small classes (see related story), and a recent public opinion survey by the schools. The survey indicated renewal would be approved by 58 percent of the voters, but any additional request would be rejected by the same margin.

Board members found themselves deadlocked on the two-mill request after the first vote, and said they were confused about where the money would go. The question, Superintendent Don Burns said, was "Do you want to make the distinction that the two mills would be spent entirely on the needs of the district (other than teacher salaries)?"

Most board members hinted they did. With pressure on teachers to accept a wage freeze under the one-third mill request, board members appeared reluctant to try selling voters on a larger millage request to be used for raises.

"In difficult economic times, as we are experiencing in this community and in the whole country, we have to tighten our belts and try to live within our means," Craig said, explaining why he would not vote for the third proposal under any circumstances.

But voters need one choice on the ballot which would guarantee present programs will be maintained, a member of the audience told board members. Since classes would be combined under both of the first two requests, the third was the only one offering such a choice, Helen O'Dell argued. "By golly, I should have the right to vote for it," she said.

An attempt to earmark the proposal specifically for non-salary needs was abandoned, but board members said they would consider establishing a priority list for funds generated if the two-mill request was approved. Likely to be on it, according to administrators, are:

- A promise classes would not be combined;
- New textbooks for all levels;
- Teaching equipment;
- Physical plant and building maintenance improvements;
- New buses and delivery vehicles;
- New furniture;
- Equipment for vocational education programs;
- Parking lot repairs.

Told they could earmark the two-mill request at a future date, using the priority list, board members passed the third proposal on the second round of voting, 4-2.

## E. Olive parents offer own ideas

Their special meeting was called to discuss millage proposals Wednesday night, April 28, but St. Johns Board members answered questions for more than an hour before they began discussing the June 14 election.

Many of the more than 50 gathered in the high school library at 8 p.m. were apparently East Olive Elementary parents and teachers. They were present to question a citizens committee report on small class sizes presented to board members March 18 by administrator Dale Knight, which suggested closing the rural elementary school as one possible remedy for costly small classes.

"If I've said it once, I've said it a dozen times, these are options," Superintendent Don Burns complained to East Olive parents. "No decisions have been made."

Board members later agreed to combine classes rather than close any schools if their request for an additional one-third mill is approved (see related story), but the East Olive group, led by Sue Mox, had some suggestions of their own for saving money.

Mrs. Mox said her group has estimated the board could save money by:

- Promoting an administrator to replace Burns, who retires in January, and combining two administrative jobs for an annual savings of \$30,000.
- Changing kindergarten to full day classes, eliminating bus runs and teaching positions for a savings of \$29,000.

- Encouraging staff members with high seniority near retirement to retire, which could save about \$20,000 for each retiree.

- Putting drivers education on a pay-for-instruction basis;

- Cutting down on food for hot lunches, substituting fruit for "sugary" deserts.

- Making further cuts in secondary schools to spare East Olive cuts.

- Experimenting with combined bus runs.

Mrs. Mox, a parent and substitute teacher at East Olive, questioned the committee's findings and the projected savings prepared by the administration.

"One of the board's big problems is a lack of trust from the public," she said. Cuts made after voters approved a 3.5 mill increase last August were a betrayal, she said.

"Loyalty to East Olive runs high. The steps you are threatening are too drastic."

## City backs down on driveway deadline

St. Johns has given a reprieve to 609 owners of unpaved driveway approaches, and the 96 law abiding city residents who paved their driveway approach since passage of a 1977 ordinance may have some money coming.

According to a release from the city on behalf of city commissioners, the deadline for mandatory paving of driveway approaches has been postponed, and the mandatory program has temporarily been replaced with a voluntary co-pay system.

Meanwhile, those who paved their driveways and complied with the law since Aug. 8, 1977, may be able to get half of their money back from the city.

"The foremost factor in this decision is the present state of Michigan's and St. Johns' economy," the report said, citing a 17 percent unemployment figure statewide and 13.3 percent in Clinton County. "In addition to the

# Watch out for phony checks, police warn

Clinton County residents have been warned by DeWitt Township Police Chief Tom Aranow to be on the lookout for phony checks.

Aranow said the checks, which are a concoction of fictitious names, addresses and phone numbers, including a pencilled in Consumers Power Co. seal, are written from a non-existent "Michigan Security Bank."

The light gray checks were cashed using false identification, Aranow said, and have been written to a Brad Niles and another name, also believed to be an alias. The checks were cashed for \$250 and \$200 in St. Johns and DeWitt.

Anyone who has suspicions about similar checks should contact the Clinton County Detective Bureau or DeWitt Township police, he said.

Several larcenies and break-ins were reported in Clinton County during the past week, including thefts of corn, tools, gas and snow tires.

A breaking and entering and pair of attempted break-ins, including one at a church in Ovid, were reported to Clinton County Sheriff's deputies.

The first attempted break-in occurred at Calvary Baptist Church on M-21 in Ovid April 25, reports said. A plexiglass window was removed but

entry to the church was not gained, reports said.

The next day, another attempted break-in was reported at the Main Bar in Ovid, where someone had attempted to pry a latch from the front door and had kicked the door, but had not gained entry, reports said.

A breaking and entering and the theft of more than 60 items, including furniture, appliances, yard tools and other household goods, was reported at the home of Vickie Barr in Ovid April 22, reports said. The home was robbed

while Ms. Barr was in Florida, reports said.

William Schafer of Fowler told Clinton County Sheriff's deputy about 50 bushels of ear corn were taken from a grain bin on his Lebanon Township property April 23.

According to reports, a pickup truck had been backed up to the bin inside a pole barn and the corn was loaded and taken. No value was reported.

DeWitt Police reported a theft of tools from a construction site valued at over \$1,000. According to reports, tools were taken

over a period of two weeks from a new home being built at 704 Lehigh. On April 28, windows at the home valued at \$627 were broken, reports said.

A set of snow tires valued at \$70 was taken from Al Cripe of S. DeWitt Road, DeWitt Police said. The theft was reported April 26.

A pump was taken from Highland Hills Golf Course April 29, Clinton County Sheriff reports said. No value was listed.

Five batteries valued at about \$120 were stolen from two tractors at the

home of Esther Personius on Taft Road, Ovid, Clinton County Sheriff reports said. The theft was reported April 26.

A Lansing resident, Terry Cole, 27, of 211 Moseley, was arrested following a one-car accident in DeWitt Township near the intersection of Turner and Valley Road May 1, DeWitt Township Police reports said.

Cole lost control of his vehicle and was charged with driving under the influence of liquor, reports said.

# County's welfare rolls shrink, commissioners told

While welfare caseloads soared in many areas of Michigan during 1981, the number of recipients in Clinton County have actually decreased during the same period.

"The Reagan administration has set in motion changes that became more restrictive (for welfare eligibility)," Clinton County Department of Social Services Director George Eberhard said in explaining the decrease to the Board of Commissioners at their April 27 meeting. "In addition, we've got a good staff that is very good on determining eligibility. Our error rate is low."

The 1981 annual report that Eberhard presented to the board showed a drop in Aid to Dependent Children (ADC) cases from 668 to 524 during 1981; a drop in general assistance cases from 125 to 89; and a drop in food stamp cases from 809 to 805.

The medicaid program increased slightly from 278 to 279.

"Although many new cases are being opened due to economic conditions, many other cases are being closed due to the Reagan changes," the report read.

Eberhard also passed out a recent press release issued by the Michigan Department of Social Services attempting to counteract recent information distributed by groups interested in limiting the level of welfare spending "to not more than the average of the max-

imums of the adjacent states."

The release cited a recent survey that indicated Michigan ranks third among six states in the Great Lakes Region in the average, monthly aid to ADC families.

Acting DSS Director Noble Kheder was quoted as stating that "the study refutes a claim by some, including a ballot initiative, that Michigan's welfare benefits are drastically higher than the average of the surrounding states."

Board Chairman Roger Overway remained unconvinced.

"I guess I feel that at a time when Michigan is in a depression, we should not be paying more than other states," he said.

unemployed, many St. Johns people work for the state or Oldsmobile and are faced with pay concessions, unpaid holidays and other cuts in their net income."

Also, thanks to a new piece of equipment, the city can clean out plugged up catch basins — a problem caused by unpaved driveway approaches — four times faster. Obtained with federal grant money, the sewer vacuum machine allows the city to clean catch basins quicker, relieving many of the problems caused by unpaved driveway approaches, which would otherwise plug catch basins faster than they could be cleaned.

City commissioners still agree with the intent of the program, namely to provide cleaner streets and sewers and reduce sewer maintenance. But since the driveway ordinance was passed in 1977, the economy has changed drastically, and the city has been affected along with local residents, the report said.

State and federal revenue sharing payments have declined, along with revenues from sales and gasoline taxes. As a result, the city can no longer afford the approximately \$90,000 it would cost to have all unpaved approaches done and then charged to property owners through special assessments, the report said. "The only way the city could come up with this amount would be to cut one or more of its major programs, like street paving."

Those who still want to pave their driveway, however, can rely on the city for help. Modeled after the city's sidewalk program, the co-pay system provides half the funds necessary, up to a maximum of \$100. To qualify, the paving must meet Department of Public Works specifications, and the city will not pay for driveways at new homes, new driveways or repairs to driveways.

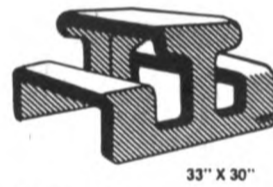

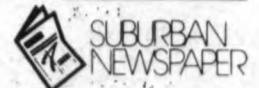

### Allen against tax change

To the editor:

I have received a number of letters opposing House Bill 4150, which would allow school districts to collect taxes in areas where they are not now collected twice a year.

This legislation passed the House of Representatives early in March and has been assigned to the Senate Committee on Education, of which I am a member. I anticipate we will be considering this bill within the next few weeks.

I am opposed to this bill for several reasons. Most of the areas that do not collect taxes twice a year are rural farm areas. Farmers would find it a great hardship to come up with from 50 to 80 percent of their property taxes in the summer before they have sold their summer crops. I realize that collection of school taxes in January has caused a number of schools to borrow money early in the school year to meet their bills. However, changing the collection date of taxes would merely shift the burden of borrowing to the taxpayer.

While it is true that collection of summer taxes might not be a burden in metropolitan areas that often have computers to assist them, many rural areas perform the paperwork by hand and this would double their costs.

For these reasons, I plan to actively work against passage of this legislation both in committee and if and when it might be considered by the entire senate. # Judges issue split decision on pay cut suggestion

One judge says yes, another says no and a third is undecided. The fourth judge in Clinton County was out of town and could not be reached for comment.

The responses came in answer to a letter from Michigan Supreme Court Chief Justice Mary Coleman urging all judges in the state to take a voluntary pay cut to help the state through tough economic times. Layoffs and salary concessions have been demanded from other state workers, and Mrs. Coleman thinks the state's 550 judges should do their share, too.

Mrs. Coleman's letter asking all Michigan judges to give up a week's pay was received by three Clinton County judges Friday, April 23.

"I'm going to go along with it. Why not?" District Judge Frederick Lewis said Monday morning. "It seems to me in this kind of economic mess we all have to chip in and help out."

Lewis, who makes \$47,665 annually, said the week's

pay cut would cost him from \$350 to \$500, depending upon whether or not various tax and pension deductions were included.

Probate Judge Marvin Robertson was less enthusiastic about Mrs. Coleman's request.

Robertson, whose annual salary is \$47,316, said he might feel differently if Clinton County Commissioners had approved payment of a roughly \$10,000 per-judge bonus approved by the state legislature to standardize state judicial salaries.

"About 90 percent of the counties in Michigan did, but Clinton did not," pass on the bonuses, he said. Robertson said although he has not made a final decision, he would not likely volunteer for a pay cut when Clinton judges make less than their colleagues elsewhere in the state.

"Let's put it this way," he said. "If I had received the legislative pass through (bonus) like 90 percent of Michigan's judges, given the state of Michigan's economic climate and times, I would have."

Lewis, however, said the pay cut was to come out of his state salary, according to Mrs. Coleman's request, so although he would have liked receiving a bonus, it would not affect his decision to take a cut.

Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen said he was undecided. He also mentioned the bonus that the county never distributed.

"The purpose of judicial standardization pay is to standardize judicial salaries and that hasn't happened here," he said.

"With state salary cuts, I can see that Justice Coleman is concerned. But most of the judges in this county are paid substantially less than judges in nearby counties."

Circuit Judge Timothy Green was out of town attending National Judicial College in Reno, Nev. He and Tahvonen each earn annual salaries of \$56,930.50, part of which is paid by Gratiot County, which shares their circuit with Clinton County.

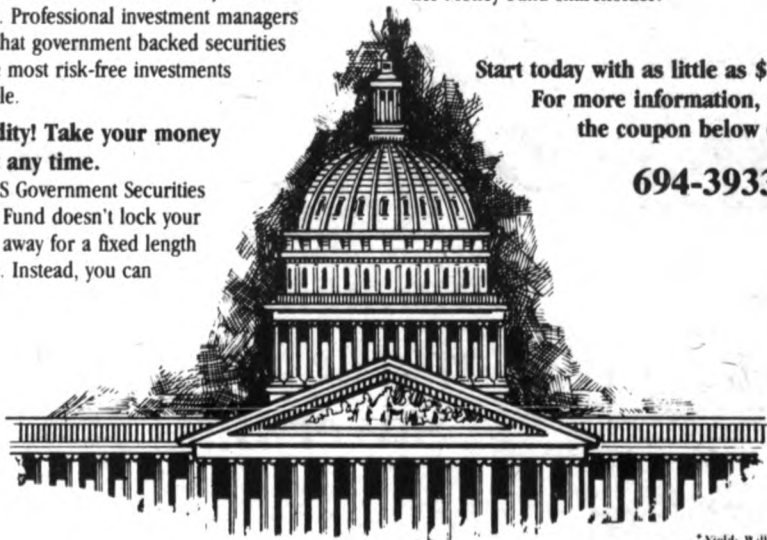

The "new kid on the block" may end up with all the marbles.

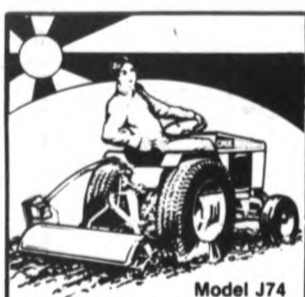
The DeWitt Panthers took both ends of their own DeWitt Invitational tournament, winning championships in both baseball and softball last weekend.

## Michigan's Energy Costs . . . Lower than most large U.S. cities

A recent survey has discovered some reassuring news for Michigan residents beleaguered by rising energy costs.

Few areas of the United States have escaped the sting that inflation and natural gas deregulation have dealt heating and electric bills. But the survey indicates that many Michigan residents have been hit less hard than persons living in other parts of the country.

The Planning Commission will consider the following amendments to the Clinton County Zoning Ordinance, OR-1-78, as amended.

#### CASE ZC-7-82 Text Amendment - Flood Hazard Area

The following amendments are necessitated since Watertown Charter Township is going from the emergency to the regular phase of the Federal Flood Insurance Program. The proposed changes are as follows:

1. Amending Art. 5, Sec. 5.10.2(A) by deleting the first paragraph and replacing it with the following new paragraph.

A. The flood hazard area zone shall overlay existing zoning districts delineated on the official Clinton County Zoning Map. The boundaries of the flood hazard area zone shall coincide with the boundaries of the areas indicated as within the limits of the 100 year flood in the report indicated "The Flood Insurance Study County of Clinton, Michigan" dated November 17, 1981 with accompanying Flood Insurance Rate Maps and Flood Boundary and Floodway Maps. Within the flood hazard area zone a regulatory floodway shall be designated. The boundaries of the regulatory floodway shall coincide with the floodway boundaries indicated on the Flood Boundary and Floodway Map. The study and accompanying maps are adopted by reference, appended, and declared to be a part of this ordinance. The term flood hazard area as used in this ordinance shall mean the flood hazard area zone and the term floodway shall mean the designated regulatory floodway.

2. Amending Art. 5, Sec. 5.10.6 by adding the following new subsection (C).

C. Mobile homes within zones A1-30 on the Flood Insurance Rate Map shall be located in accord with the following standards:

1. all mobile homes shall be placed on stands or lots which are

elevated on compacted fill or on pilings so that the lowest floor of the mobile home will be at or above the base flood level.

2. adequate surface drainage away from all structures and access for a mobile home hauler shall be provided.

3. in the instance of elevation on pilings, lots shall be large enough to permit steps, piling foundations shall be placed in stable soil no more than 10 feet apart; and reinforcement shall be provided for piers more than 6 feet above ground level.

4. in mobile home parks and mobile home subdivisions which exist at the time this subsection is adopted, where repair, reconstruction or improvement of streets, utilities and pads equals or exceeds 50% of the value of the streets, utilities and pads before the repair, the standards in subparagraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this subsection shall be complied with.

3. Amending Art. 5, Sec. 5.10.7 which had been reserved for future amendments by adding a new section entitled FLOODWAY PROTECTION STANDARDS, as follows:

A. New construction, substantial improvements and all other development, including fill, shall be prohibited within zones numbered A1-30 on the FIRM, except where it is demonstrated to the zoning administrator that the cumulative effect of the proposed development when combined with all other existing and anticipated development will not harmfully increase the water surface elevation of a base flood. In determining whether a harmful increase will occur, compliance with P.A. 245 of 1929, as amended by PA 167 of 1968, shall be required, provided that the allowable increase shall not exceed one foot. The provisions of this section shall not apply within the regulatory floodway. The provisions of subsection (B) shall be applied to land situated within the regulatory floodway.

B. All development occurring within the regulatory floodway shall comply with the following standards:

a. encroachments, including fill, new construction, substantial improvements and other development shall be prohibited. Exception to this prohibition shall only be made upon certification by a registered professional engineer or the DNR that the development proposed will not result in any increases in flood levels during a base flood discharge, and compliance with Act 167, P.A. of 1968.

b. the placement of mobile homes shall be prohibited except in mobile home parks and subdivisions which exist at the time this article is adopted.

c. development which is permitted in the regulatory floodway shall meet the requirements of sections 5.10.3 to 5.10.6.

The uses of land permitted in an underlying zoning district shall not be construed as being permitted within the regulatory floodway, except upon compliance with the provisions on this section.

#### Case ZC-8-82 Text Amendment - Mobile Home Site Development Standards.

Amending Art. 6, Sec. 6.11.3(G) Rule 944 (R 125.1944) SETBACKS FROM PROPERTY LINES, by changing the fifty (50) feet property line setback to thirty (30) feet.

The purpose of this amendment is to correct a typographical error in the ordinance which was inadvertently approved.

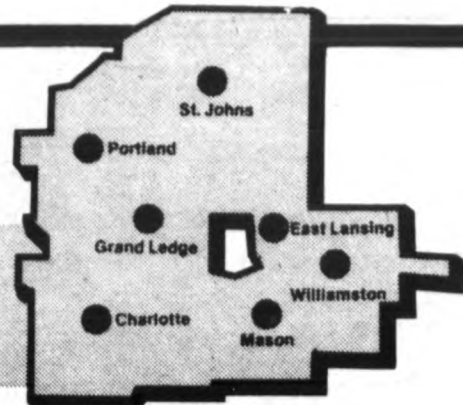
