Rescue response has firemen hot

A "confusion in terms" has been blamed for a mixup which left a Lansing couple trapped in their overturned pickup truck for nearly an hour while Clinton County Sheriff's deputies searched the county for a special rescue tool, and St. Johns firemen are mad.

Notified of the accident at 1:15 a.m. Sunday morning, May 2, sheriff's deputies finally found the tool they were looking for about 40 minutes later in DeWitt, about 20 miles south of the accident on N. Lowe Rd., north of St. Johns.

While waiting for the "Jaws of Life," a driver from Hettler's Wrecker Service pried the victims loose using a crow bar. The City of DeWitt rescue team was called off at 2:09 a.m. as they approached M-21 in St. Johns, 54 minutes after the accident was reported.

St. Johns Fire Chief Clare Maier says his men could have had the couple freed in a few minutes had they been called to the scene.

The victims, James C. Voorhees, 33, of 720 Clark, Lansing, and his wife, Sandy, of the same address, were treated for injuries and released at Clinton Memorial Hospital, a spokesman said. According to sheriff's reports, Voorhees was headed north on N. Lowe Road following several other vehicles about one-half mile north of Lowe Road when gravel dust obscured his visibility and he lost control of his pickup truck. He and his wife, who was riding in the truck, were trapped when it overturned in a ditch.

Clinton County Sheriff Tony Hufnagel admitted the Jaws of Life were probably not needed. "If we could go back on this situation and do it again, St. Johns would probably be called," he said.

Hufnagel said St. Johns was called first, but since the officer at the scene specifically requested Jaws of Life and St. Johns Fire Department has none, the sheriff department dispatcher told St. Johns firemen they were not needed and began looking elsewhere for the tool. Ovid Fire Department was also called before the tool was located in DeWitt.

"Whether (the officer at the scene) really and truly needed Jaws of Life, he probably didn't," Hufnagel said. "I think it was a confusion in terms."

Like the way most people ask for a Coke when they would be just as happy with Pepsi, the problem was simple semantics, Hufnagel said. "The Jaws of Life has had a lot of big publicity."

But St. Johns' rescue tool, called a Port-A-Power, has not. It does almost as much as Jaws of Life, Hufnagel admitted, and would probably have been adequate for the Voorhees' rescue, but its existence is not as well known. "I think the St. Johns Fire Department has done a fantastic job, but they don't advertise or publicize the equipment they have. This out-of-sight, out-of-mind situation could affect a policeman," Hufnagel said.

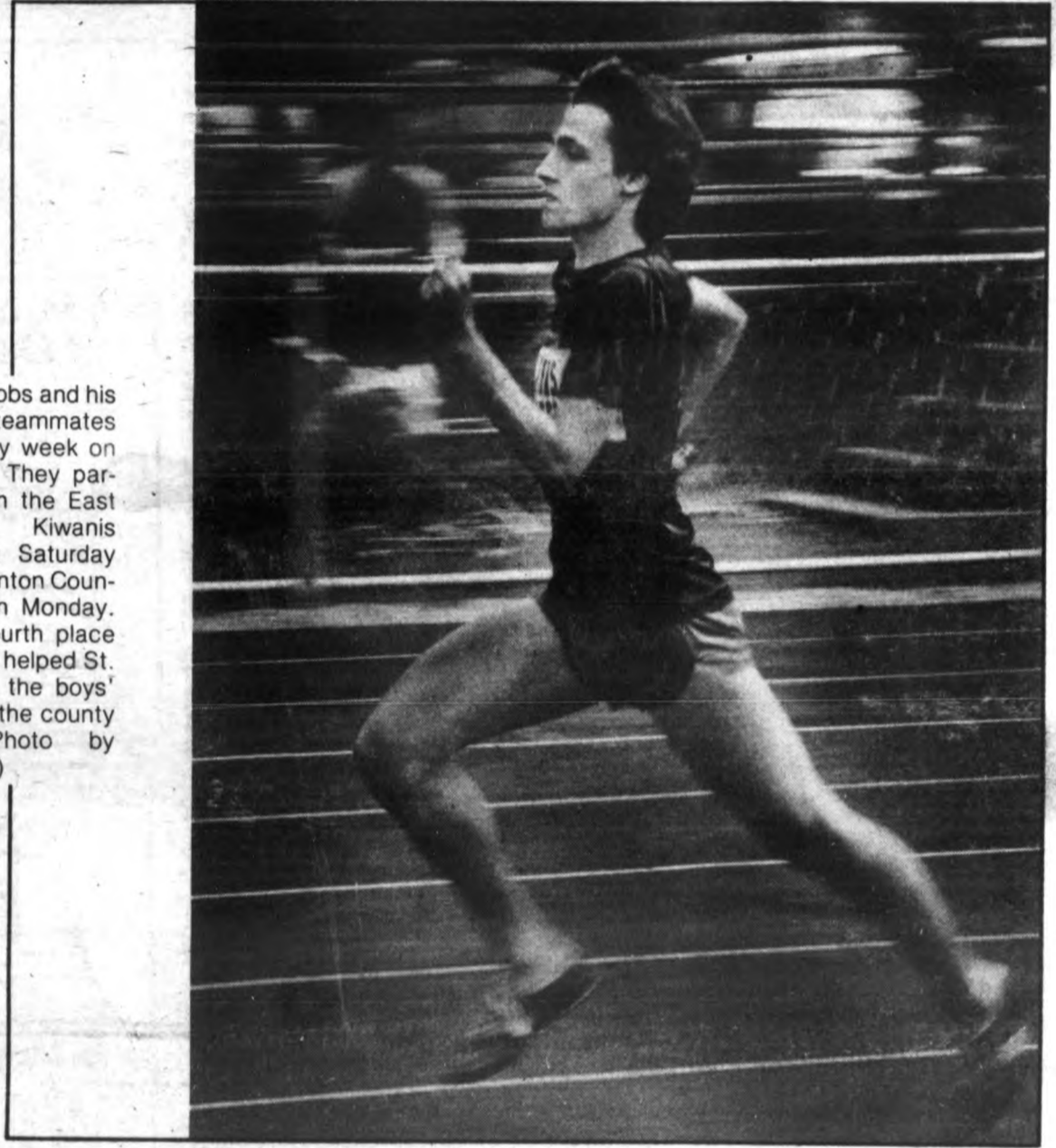
When St. Johns' volunteer fire department met for a meeting the following Wednesday, "The men were pretty upset," the firechief said. "It's a matter of pride," Maier said. "It's real simple. I think this was our territory and we've got the equipment here to rescue those people. We should have been called out before DeWitt was. If we can't do the job, we can call for some mutual aid."

Hufnagel, who said he would rather not name the officer who requested the Jaws of Life, added, "If we had it to do over again, things would be different." But similar communications snafus could occur again, he cautioned.

"I'm not going to be able to sit here and say there will never be a mistake like this again. You're dealing with people and their emotions in an emergency situation.

"And just because St. Johns has a Port-A-Power doesn't mean they will be called to every local scene where people are trapped. If we need a tool and there are lives in danger, we won't hesitate to get that resource."

Requests differ, but reasons don't

The list of damages is pretty much the same, only the bill for repairs varies among Clinton County school districts as annual school elections approach June 14.

Administrators throughout the county blame inflation, declining enrollment and state-mandated cuts in aid to education for depleted budgets. Some school boards have asked teachers and other employees to hold the line on salary increases and threaten more program cuts if millage proposals are not approved by voters.

All but one school system in the county - DeWitt - will seek additional mills. But among those asking for increases, the amount of requests ranges from less than one-half mill at Pewamo-Westphalia to a total of 2.33 mills on separate ballots in St. Johns.

Following is a district-by-district summary of proposals to be considered by voters between now and June 14.

ST. JOHNS - Three millage proposals have been requested: a three-year renewal of 3.5 additional mills

Cut phone line puts 'reach out' on hold

A farmer tiling a field on Ely Highway one-half mile south of Middleton cut a cable Monday, May 10 at about 3:30 p.m. and put phones out of order in five Clinton County communities.

The cable, which carries all long-distance calls on General Telephone lines to Alma, was repaired seven hours later at about 10:30 p.m., GTE Customer Service Manager Jack VanRiper said.

Meanwhile, long-distance calls could not be made from St. Johns, Maple Rapids, Pewamo, Westphalia and Fowler. Attempts to reach an operator for assistance or information were also unsuccessful, since GTE operators are located in Alma.

"It was a big cable," VanRiper said. "To repair it they had to take a section right out of the middle and replace it."

granted last August; a one-year, two-mill request to maintain programs; and another one-year, one-third mill request to hold the line against most cuts, providing teachers - currently negotiating a new contract - agree to a wage freeze, other employees renegotiate their contracts and some classes are combined.

St. Johns Board members may designate any funds provided by the two-mill proposal for items other than staff salaries in an effort to force teachers to accept a wage freeze. One such item could be a promise that elementary classes would not be combined.

FWOLVER - Board members are requesting 2.2 additional mills and a 20.8 mill renewal, both for one year. The additional millage is designated for maintaining programs on the basis of a projected budget that does not include salary increases. A 1.8 mill increase was granted last August.

Fowler administrators have already accepted a salary freeze in an effort to set an example for teachers and other employee groups. Contract negotiations with teachers are underway.

PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA - One ballot proposal for renewal and a .433 mill increase will be put to voters. Last June, a similar proposal for 21.157 mills was approved. This year, the proposal is for 21.59, a slight increase to maintain present programs.

Pewamo-Westphalia teachers have been asked to accept a wage freeze. One lay-off must be made due to declines in enrollment, but others would be made if a wage freeze is not granted, school officials say.

OID-ELSIE - Voters will be asked to approve a 23 mill renewal, plus 1.5 mills to eliminate half of a \$320,000 general fund deficit. Both ballots are for one year. The system received three additional mills last summer, and board members decided not to request more after considering survey results indicating 65 percent of the district's residents would prefer program cuts to additional millages.

School officials are taking "a real conservative approach" to salary concessions during current negotiations with teachers, Superintendent Dave Porrell said. Board members considered a .8 mill request to buy new buses, but the third ballot proposal was narrowly rejected.

Owmar said he had been cutting wood in front of his house and went inside. When he returned in 90 minutes, the saw was gone.

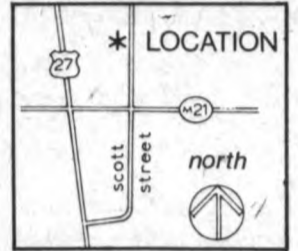

Annual EDC report boasts over 1000 new jobs

Nearly 1,200 jobs have been created in Clinton County during the past three years thanks to the county's Economic Development Corporation (EDC), an annual report given to county commissioners at their April meeting says.

In addition, the seven projects so far awarded EDC financial aid in the form of low-interest, tax-free bonds have contributed an additional \$336,000 in annual tax revenue, EDC Secretary and Consultant Don Lowell said in his report. Of that, about \$37,000 was paid to Clinton County, he said.

Projects approved in the last three years include a car dealership, three shopping centers, an industrial development, bank computer center and restaurant. The projects totalled over \$14 million and were financed with about \$13 million in EDC aid, the report said.

EDC's were established by state law to allow local units of government to keep and attract industry and commercial developments which produce jobs and add to local tax revenues. As an inducement, EDCs are allowed to grant tax-free bonds for development, which allow bond purchasers to loan money to developers at lower than normal interest rates — often half the going rate.

Interest rates obtained by Clinton County EDC ap-

plicants during the last three years have ranged from a low of 6.2 percent obtained by Elias Bros. for a \$700,000 restaurant in St. Johns, to a floating 70 percent of prime interest rates — between 11 and 12 percent at present — obtained by developers of the Southpoint Mall in St. Johns.

A few percentage points in interest payments can mean big savings for developers when project costs run close to \$10 million, as in the case of the Southpoint Mall. But economic conditions have put banks and lending institutions in a bind. With profit margins slim, tax breaks from EDC bond purchases are no longer that attractive. Selling EDC bonds is not as easy as it once was, Lowell said.

Clinton County's EDC closed bond sales for two projects during the past year, nonetheless — the Southpoint Mall and A.J. Sparks Co., a printing company on Grand River Ave. in southern Clinton County.

Due to be completed soon, Lowell said, are Westmac Inc., a grain elevator in Eagle Township, and Clinton Partners, a \$750,000 medical office building adjacent to Clinton Memorial Hospital.

The largest single job-provider is the yet to be completed mall, which will offer 925 new jobs, developers promise. Although the jobs have not yet been advertised, much less filled, Lowell said other projects have come through with even more jobs than promised and predicted the new mall will do the same.

He said the Southpoint job estimate does not include hiring by a supermarket in the mall, which is being financed under a separate EDC project. The final job figure will be closer to 1,100, he predicted.

Other projects approved in the last three years, followed by the number of jobs provided, are as follows:

- Elias Bros. restaurant in St. Johns, built with \$650,000 in EDC bonds, more than 70 jobs.
- DeWitt Shop Rite, DeWitt, \$500,000 in EDC bonds, 60 jobs.
- Bath Shopping Center, Bath, \$600,000 in EDC bonds, 45 jobs.
- Clinton Bank & Trust computer center, St. Johns, \$1 million in EDC bonds, 35 jobs.
- A.J. Sparks & Co. printing facility, Watertown Township, \$1,300,000 in bonds, six jobs.
- St. Johns Ford dealership, St. Johns, \$400,000 in EDC bonds, 12 jobs retained.

Lowell said jobs retained at St. Johns Ford may have been lost without EDC aid. Expansion by A.J. Sparks has been delayed by Department of Natural Resources waste water restrictions, he added, but with installation of new drainage systems, expansion, along with more jobs, is expected.

So far, the EDC has cost the county \$13,126, the report said.

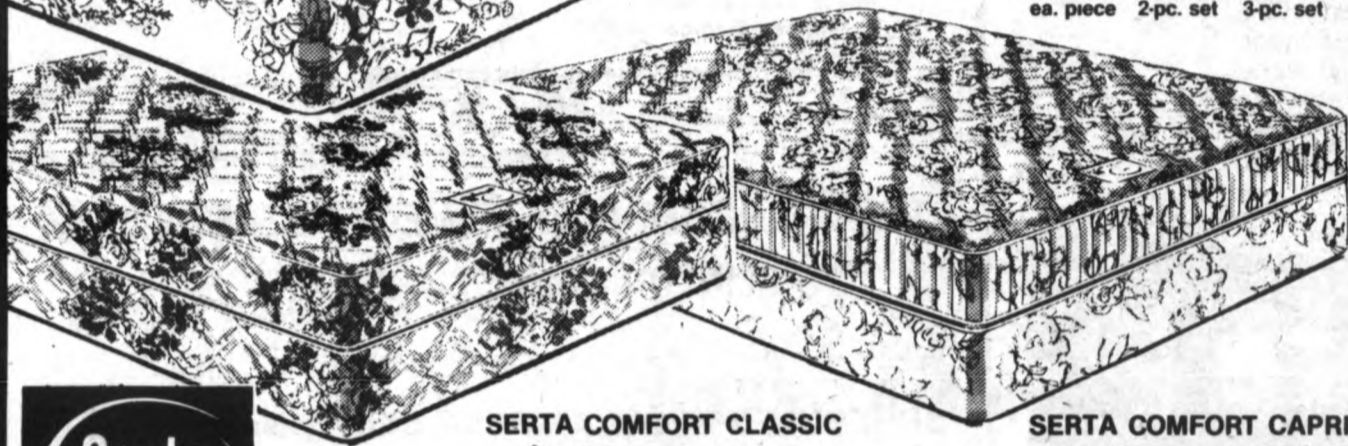

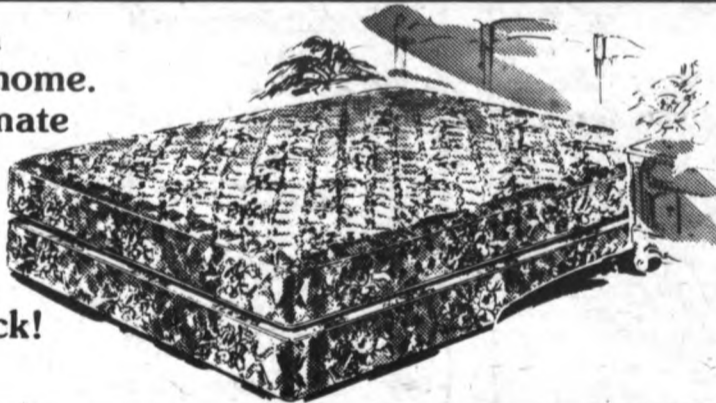

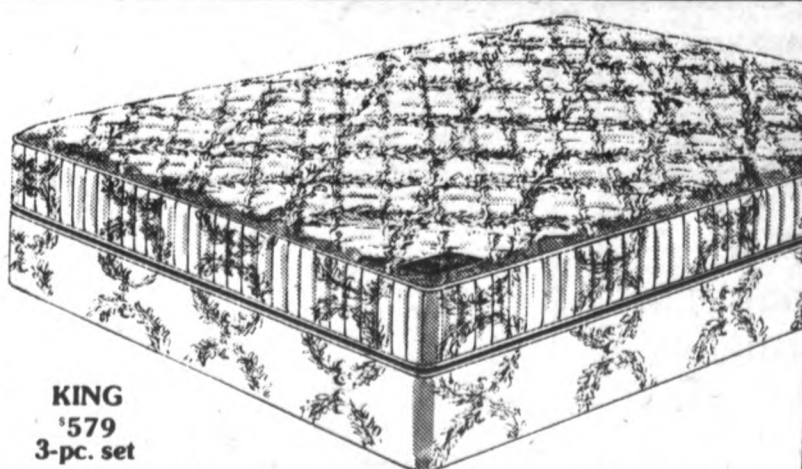

Millage drop and fee hike to keep city healthy

St. Johns is in "good, sound financial shape," and local residents will pay only about \$17.50 more this year to keep it that way, the 1982-83 city budget says.

City Manager Randy Humphrey presented the new budget to commissioners Monday night, May 10. Thanks mainly to an increase in property tax assessments, the budget is about seven percent higher than last year's.

Also, the city will raise annual garbage collection fees by \$5, from \$44.50 to \$49.50. The fee includes the same services — weekly garbage collection, monthly brush gathering and annual Christmas tree and spring cleanup drives.

Along with tax assessment increases, the garbage fee hike means city residents will pay an average of \$17.49 more this year.

With school budgets tight, the cost of a field trip to a farm was saved when teacher Kay Eckert, a friend of Mayers', suggested he bring the farm to the students. Several classes participated, visiting animals penned in by a temporary corral Mayers built.

But passing up a chance to raise taxes by one mill, the city will actually reduce the millage by about .7 mills, from 14.1 a year ago, to 13.32 this year, Humphrey's budget report says. He pointed out the city could have raised the millage by one mill and still have been in compliance with the Headlee Amendment and recent Truth in Taxation and Assessment legislation.

"This cut in millage is our attempt to be responsible to the taxation concerns of our citizenry," Humphrey's report says.

The total budget for the coming fiscal year will be \$4,032,477, up about \$188,000 from a year ago. The biggest portion of the budget is earmarked for the city's general fund for city services like police and fire protection, parks and recreation and insurance. The general fund increase was 6.6 percent, to a total of about \$1.5 million.

Water funds, at over \$918,000, accounted for the second largest budget item, followed by bond retirement and the mobile equipment fund.

Humphrey said a recent survey of city residents was helpful in allocating various budget items, and gave St. Johns a clean economic bill of health.

"The city is in a good and strong financial situation, particularly in view of the hard economic times," he told commissioners.

"If we do have any worries, it's not from internal factors, but from external factors," he said later, pointing out that cuts in federal and state revenue sharing funds could drastically alter the budget picture. About \$184,000 in revenue sharing funds are included in the new budget.

Also during the Monday night meeting, commissioners approved authorization to bid on their 1982 paving program and on a project to replace sewers along the 100 block of North Morton.

The paving plan calls for work on 21 streets. Topping the list for partial or complete repairs will be Circle Drive and portions of Ross, Giles, Ottawa, Park, Lincoln, Brush and Morton.

Frozen wage better than none

"A rock and a hard place" best describes the spot many Clinton County School districts are in as annual June elections approach.

Board members must face the prospect of making program cuts if millage proposals are rejected by voters; on the other hand, they are also bargaining for new employee contracts and do not know how much more they may have to pay their staffs, whose salaries account for about 80 percent of school system budgets.

We submit they should pay no more than they do now.

Some school districts have already asked employee groups to make concessions in the form of wage freezes. Teachers will be the first to accept or reject such proposals in most cases, and other groups traditionally have followed their lead in contract negotiations.

For teachers, we believe, the proper course should be clear.

Although never a highly paid profession, teaching does have its benefits: the intrinsic satisfaction of knowing the work has a direct impact on the potential of individuals and the community as a whole; the satisfaction that comes from seeing immediate results from daily efforts; the challenge and excitement of constant diversity; the self esteem that comes from helping others.

Furthermore, teacher salaries have improved considerably in recent years, and any comparisons on an annual basis must include three months of leave each summer for leisure, employment for additional income or continuing education, a fringe benefit rare among occupations.

Regardless of salary comparisons, however, teachers, as professionals, must put education first. Even minor salary increases must not be allowed to cause major setbacks in the quality of education provided to our youth — a distinct possibility considering steadily constricting school budgets.

With declines in state-aid and enrollment, inflation and resistance to millages, salary increases can only add to layoffs and force further program cuts.

But more important, perhaps, is the possible contribution teachers can make now to improve the quality of education in their community or, at worst, mitigate the economy's affect on school programs. If teachers agree to accept wage freezes now, prior to June elections, voters will be assured any millage they pass will be spent for school programs and supplies, not for raises.

Though such agreement would not guarantee passage of millage requests, it could greatly improve their chances by giving voters the accurate impression that all are shouldering the burden of our weak economy equally and putting education first.

In return, school boards should promise teacher layoffs would be kept to an absolute minimum justified by enrollment declines.

Even a frozen wage will keep a home warm next winter.

DeWitt's Jeff Mulder won the 880, but lost a close race to Pioszak in the mile, while the Panther's Gary Challis was an easy winner in the shot put.

Fowler's Dave Koenigschnecht won the most individual events by taking the 100-yard dash, long jump and high jump, while Jim Spagnuolo of Bath won the discus. Koenigschnecht's 21-5 leap in the long jump broke the meet record.

The DeWitt girls used their strength in the hurdles and sprints to pile up enough points for their victory. Teresa Kirchen and Tami Noyce finished first and second in the hundred yard dash, both clocking a fast 11.6. Cindy Faggion won the 110 hurdles and Noyce, Sheri Schmitt, Kim Willson and Kirchen took the 440-yard relay. Other DeWitt winners were Sharon Nichlas in the two mile and Lana Becher in both the shot put and discus.

St. Johns received a winning effort from Debbie Hufnagel in the high jump, while Bath's Laurie Wentzel took the mile and 880-yard run. Terri Reed of Ovid-Elsie was the winner in the low hurdles.

Barlow likes the play of Marcel Hirschegger who is playing No. 3 singles and John Stephanek and Rich Latz who play No. 2 doubles.

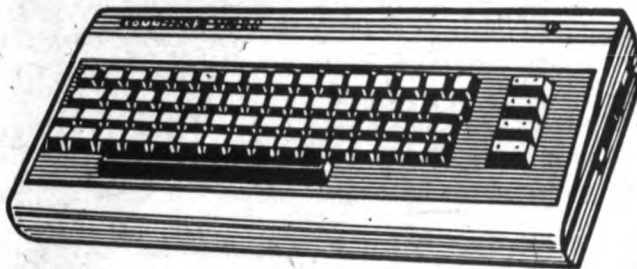

But can't replace Friday night fights

Cable conflict rivals TV plot

Since the plug was pulled on their televisions Friday, some local mobile home park residents are seeing red. But owners of the park say they won't hook up to cable again until they get promises in black and white.

A petition drive to force Searles Mobile Home Park to restore cable service was launched Monday by David and Stephanie Vasold, residents of Lot 458 in the park on W. Parks Road, south of St. Johns.

"Luckily we still had our antenna up and we're pulling in two channels, not very good. But a number of people aren't getting anything," Mrs. Vasold said Monday.

"We can't watch hardly anything. We're upset about not having TV, but we're more upset about them saying what we can and can't have in our lives. What are they going to take away next, our newspaper?"

Leon Searles, who shares ownership and management of the park with his brother, Bill, and mother, Lillian, said he got fed up with complaints about unburied cable Friday morning and called Cable Vision Inc. in Mt. Pleasant at 9 a.m.

"I told them we're not going to put up with it anymore, pick your cable up," he said. The Searles' office phone began ringing almost immediately, he said.

"You'd be surprised how many people watch TV at nine 'o'clock in the morning. We found out because that's when we shut it off."

Mrs. Searles said the cable was disconnected as a last resort. "It's the only way to get action," she said. "In the first place, they've (the cable company) never gotten together with us to get an easement to put the cable in."

The Searles asked for an agreement in writing, but anxious to install lines before winter frost set in, Cable Vision promised the paper work would come later, Mrs. Searles said. It never did, and now the Searles are worried about liability from accidents caused by sections of cable protruding from the ground.

"If a kid trips on that cable they're not going to go after them (Cable Vision) because we own the property," Mrs. Searles said.

And then there are complaints about unburied cable which have been rolling in almost as fast as complaints about the disconnection, Mrs. Searles said. "In the last week and a half, we've had 15 or 20 calls from tenants who are disturbed that they can't mow their lawn because of the cable. They feel it is our place to get it out of the way."

Ed Francke, regional manager for Cable Vision, admitted some cable was left unburied which could have been buried before winter set in. "Unburied cables have been a problem, but some have literally been pulled out of the ground by kids, too."

He also admitted the Searles did ask for a written contract. "It really is probably a valid complaint," he said from his Mt. Pleasant office Tuesday.

But there's more to the story, Francke says. "What the whole thing boils down to is money. They think we're making money hand over fist and they're not getting any. They want a piece of the action, they want money."

Francke said the Searles were offered a commercial rate agreement. If they would handle hookups and routine maintenance, the rate would be discounted by half, offering them a chance to collect 50 percent of the monthly cable fees.

But the Searles weren't interested, Francke says. "They want all of the gravy and none of the hassle. They

want us to pay a flat percentage each month."

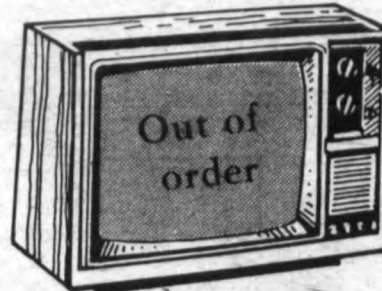
Leon Searles admits money has been discussed. "If I'm going to set here with the liability of their poor workmanship and complaints, why should I have the headaches and not make any money?" he asked.

But only three conditions must be met before Cable Vision can reconnect their 118 customers in the park, Searles said: a formal easement; clear Cable Vision responsibility for liability; and a diagram or plan depicting cable layouts and customers.

"That's all we want, but they'll never do it until we get jumpin' up and down and have to really holler at them," he said.

"Why didn't he tell me that on the phone," Francke asked in response. "I couldn't even put two words in edge-wise."

Encouraged by the demands from Searle, however,



Francke said he would call the owners and attempt to work out an agreement. "It's the customers who are suffering in the meantime," he said. Leon Searles agreed. "I know it's a bad deal for those that have cable, but they're less than half of the people in the park," he said.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Vasold said her group will "keep the pressure on" in hopes of forcing the Searles to reconnect the cable during negotiations with Francke, or possibly with another cable company.

As of Tuesday noon, 59 had signed Mrs. Vasold's petition, and collecting more would be no effort, she said.

"We've got a lot of angry men who missed the sports channel and were mad about missing the big boxing match Friday night," she said.

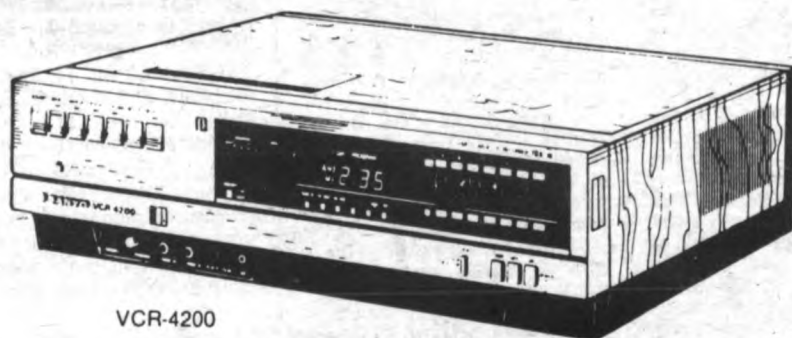

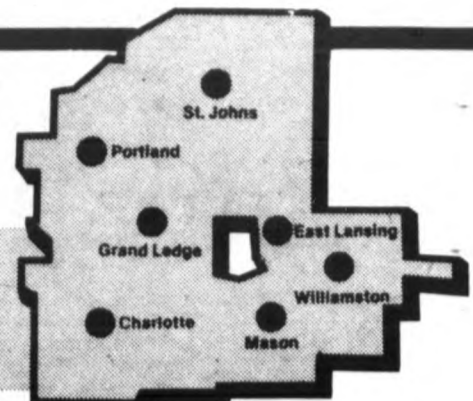



- 2 1/2 pound chuck roast
 - 2 lbs. potatoes, cut in chunks
 - 1 pound carrots, sliced
 - 4 medium onions sliced
 - 2 tsp. salt
 - pepper to taste
 - paprika, and any of your favorite spices
 - 3 c. water
 - Sour pickles
- In a roaster pan, layer meat, potatoes, carrots and onions, sprinkling each with salt and pepper. Add water, cover and bake in a 300 degree oven 6 to 7 hours or until meat is tender and vegetables are soft. (Most of the liquid should have evaporated.) Remove meat and slice; keep warm. With whisk stir vegetables to form a coarse puree. Adjust seasonings. Serve with sour pickles.

- Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Grease and lightly flour a 10 inch tube pan. In large bowl, cream butter, shortening and sugar until light, fluffy and lemon colored. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well. Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add gradually to batter, beating at low speed. Stir in whiskey. Pour batter into prepared pan and bake 1 1/2 to 2 hours or until done. Let cake cool 10 minutes in pan, invert and remove pan and cool completely on wire rack.
