Land Bank backs out of new office building

A new 12,000 square-foot office building planned for St. Johns has been put on hold, maybe for good.

Federal Land Bank Association of St. Johns announced May 5 that plans to erect a new building behind their present office on South US-27 have been postponed.

"The economy has not really had any affect on the decision. We had the money set aside to build it," Federal Land Bank President Dennis J. McDonald said. The move was triggered by reorganization plans announced by Federal Land Bank's district office in March, he said.

"We are conducting a study to improve service to borrowers in our entire district, a four-state area (Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota and North Dakota)," McDonald said.

Realignment of territories is likely to be a recommendation of the study, he said. "We (the St. Johns office) have five counties now and we may pick up one or two more counties. That could affect the location of our new office."

McDonald said the study could take "a couple of years" to complete, and a location other than St. Johns is likely. "We're looking at sites other than St. Johns," he said.

Though a total project cost had not yet been arrived at, re-zoning of the roughly eight-acre site was obtained by the present owner of the property, Robert Blastic. The one-story building, not including furnishings, site preparation and parking, was budgeted for about \$800,000, McDonald said.

"I was kind of surprised," Blastic said of his reaction to the news. "They have expended quite a few dollars on that project. They've done a lot of architectural work, which I suppose they can use later when they decide where to build."

The new office was to have been shared with Production Credit Association, which occupies about half the present Federal Land Bank office. Production Credit will be moving to a new M-21 location in July, McDonald said, to help relieve overcrowding caused by increasing loan applications and expansion of Federal Land Bank services.

Federal Land Bank's board of directors made the decision "in the best interest of their member-borrowers to defer starting construction until a district-wide study looking at improving service ... is completed," McDonald said in his announcement.

Federal Land Bank of St. Johns is one of 48 associations serving farmers and ranchers in the four-state district, with a loan volume of more than \$187 million.

Although Federal Land Bank probably won't build them, St. Johns could use more offices and more office zoning, McDonald said.

"There is very little office zoning. When we went to look for a site, we found plenty of commercial (zoning), but that didn't do us any good. The only really available office zoning was the site right behind our office."

Blastic, a Laingsburg resident and owner of RABCO Construction Co. in Okemos, apparently agrees, and

plans to go ahead with development at the site. If Federal Land Bank won't help, maybe the county's economic development corporation (EDC) will, he said.

"I'm thinking about putting an office complex together with the help of EDC financing, something along medical lines," Blastic said. "I just finished a medical clinic in Eaton Rapids and I think the trend is for doctors to locate in smaller communities."

Citing recent expansion, including professional offices, at Clinton Memorial Hospital, Blastic said there is additional need for offices to house doctors, optometrists, dentists and other medical professionals.

Though his present rezoning has been okayed by the city, final site plans must be reviewed by the city commission or planning commission before final approval is given under a new zoning ordinance.

The city is also considering a second rezoning request from Blastic for land adjoining the eight-acre former Federal Land Bank site, south of Suntime Apartments off US-27. Blastic said he plans a condominium development on land west of the office site, and expressed optimism about economic conditions.

"I think the economy is rapidly getting there and is improving quickly," he said.

Two more arrested for tin thefts

Four men have been sentenced and perhaps a dozen more are facing prosecution for participation in a theft-ring which took ingots of tin from St. Johns' Federal Mogul plant and sold them in Detroit and Chicago.

The latest to be sentenced are Barry Robinson, 42, of 2516 W. Taft, Perrinton, and James Bakita, 39, of 8861 E. Greenlund, Bannister.

Robinson was sentenced to one year in jail and four years probation, ordered to pay a \$3,000 fine and court costs of \$960 for conspiracy to commit larceny from a building, a charge which carries a maximum penalty of four years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Bakita was sentenced to four months in jail, three years probation, fined \$1,000 and \$720 in court costs after pleading guilty to attempted larceny from a building, which carries a maximum penalty of two years in prison and \$1,000.

Both were sentenced Monday, May 10 by Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen.

Two employees of Federal Mogul, James Porubski,

28, of 9385 Taft, Bannister, and Kent Burl, 29, of 1647 Morrice Rd., Owosso, were sentenced last February to 90 days in jail by District Judge Frederick Lewis after pleading guilty to charges of embezzlement of under \$100 from Federal Mogul.

Managers at Federal Mogul, which manufactures bushings and parts for engine bearings, began noticing tin thefts when accountants discovered tin purchases did not match output, Clinton County Prosecutor John Newman said. An investigation was launched and the first arrest was made in late 1981.

"It was a combination of accounting and rumor," which prompted the investigation, Federal Mogul Plant Manager Matt Armitage said. With the aid of employee-surveillance cameras, video tape of thefts was obtained in a lengthy, \$20,000 investigation, reports said.

Thefts began sometime in 1979, Newman and his Chief Assistant, Richard Koenigsnecht, said. Employees began carrying ingots and tin from the plant, concealed in clothing or, sometimes, melted down and poured into pop cans.

Secretaries' proposal gets rejected by school board

St. Johns School Board members rejected a contract offer from the school system's secretarial group during a 40-minute closed session Wednesday night, May 12, leaving the 24-member group "demoralized," according to their union negotiator.

"They want to tie the agreement to a wage freeze for next year, but we want to settle this year's contract first and get it out of the way," Barbara Mason of the Michigan Education Association (MEA) said.

The secretarial group still does not have a contract for the school year which is about to end, Ms. Mason said, and decided to organize with the MEA recently in attempt to gain a better bargaining position with the school administration and board.

The group still has not received a nine percent raise promised them a year ago, Ms. Mason said, although their raise was budgeted in the 1981-82 school year.

"Nine percent was budgeted, and we thought it would be no problem," she said. But that was before the board and administration began putting pressure on teachers and other employee groups to accept a wage freeze and, in some cases, renegotiate contracts ratified a year ago.

Squeezed between declining enrollment and state aid cuts, school officials say, salary cuts and freezes will be necessary to make ends meet even if voters approve millage increase requests slated for June 14.

Ms. Mason said the secretarial group presented a contract package to the board which included wage concessions. Instead of nine percent, she said, the group was willing to accept an eight percent raise if granted other benefits. Among them were two paid holidays for

secretaries who work only 35 to 37 weeks of the year — only those working the entire school year presently earn paid holidays, she said.

"We were willing to reduce salaries for all in the unit to get those two holidays," Ms. Mason said.

The group also backed-off on a demand that their new union be considered a closed shop, but stood firm on a demand for binding arbitration in their grievance procedure, she said.

"They were demoralized by the rejection. It was a package proposal. If you reject part of it, you reject it all," she said. "I hope the board will give the proposal some more consideration and come back with a counter-proposal."

Thefts ended after the first arrest, but by then losses added up to \$331,000, about 15 tons of tin. But because Federal Mogul obtains large discounts by making bulk purchases, the street value of the tin is about twice the \$7 per pound cost to Federal Mogul, Koenigsnecht said.

Robinson, along with others still awaiting prosecution, testified he purchased 90 lb. ingots and loose chunks of tin from Federal Mogul employees, Koenigsnecht said.

Some members of the ring have admitted they made as much as \$20,000 by taking tin from the Federal Mogul factory, and three suspects awaiting prosecution in Grand Rapids Federal Court made \$80,000 on one sale of tin to a Chicago junk dealer, according to court records.

Newman asked federal authorities to assist on the case when it was learned stolen tin was being sold out of state.

Since the first arrest, the thefts "stopped cold," Koenigsnecht said. "The problem is solved," Armitage said.

Honors she has received include the Alumni Scholarship Award, and Don Tatroe Music Award.

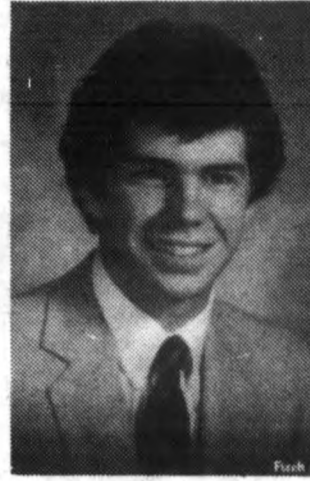
Playing freshman, junior-varsity and varsity girls basketball, she was 1981 captain and earned the 101 Percent Award.

Board authorizes bids on buses

St. Johns Board members authorized bids to be taken on new buses during a meeting Wednesday, May 12.

Gordon Vandemark, administrator for non-instructional services, will seek bids on two types of buses: Transit buses which seat 89 passengers, and conventional buses which have a capacity of between 66 and 72 passengers, Vandemark said.

"We're looking at about \$27,000 per unit for conven-

tional buses and \$55,000 for a transit model," he said.

The larger bus would replace three conventional buses if routes are combined, he explained. It is available only in diesel-powered models, but bids will be taken on both diesel- and gas-powered conventional school buses, he said.

Vandemark said he would report on the bids at the board's June meeting.

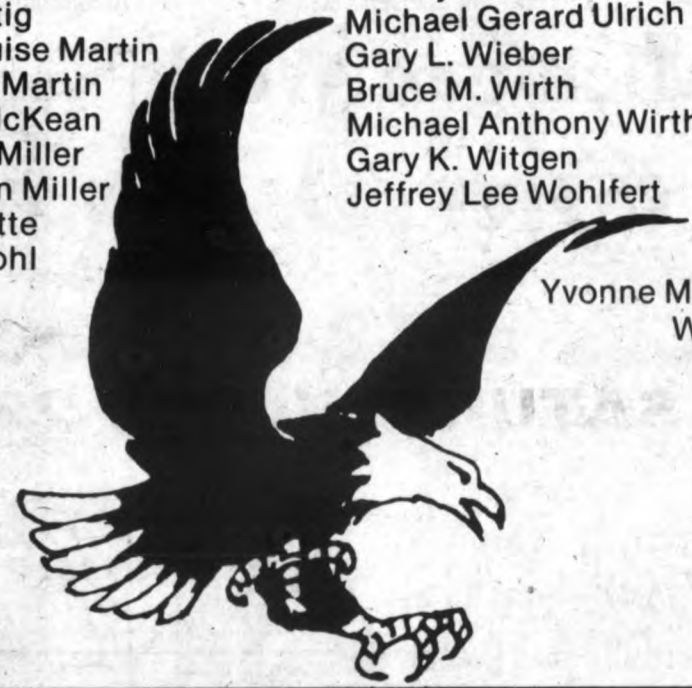

Child bitten by dog, drugs taken from pharmacy

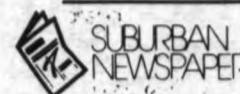

Wreck examined Hufnagle details facts

To the editor:

I would like to clarify, as much as possible, any misconceptions and rumors which have been expressed regarding a serious accident that took place on May 2 at Lowe and North Lowe roads, where questions arose which imply poor judgment in the use of resources, as well as actual times involved.

I have collected all documented time cards, logs, reports, as well as checked our times with those resources used, i.e. ambulances, wreckers, DeWitt City Fire Department, etc. The following sequence and elapsed times are recorded and verified.

- 1:15 a.m. — accident occurred.
- 1:23 a.m. (eight minutes later) — report received, two units dispatched to unknown rollover.
- 1:30 a.m. (seven more minutes) — units arrived at scene and assessed resource needs.
- 1:33 a.m. (three more minutes) — ambulance and wrecker requested.
- 1:45 a.m. (12 more minutes) — Jaws of Life requested. St. Johns Fire Department called, no jaws. Ovid Fire Department called, no jaws. Carson City Fire Department called, no jaws.
- 1:54 a.m. (nine more minutes) — DeWitt City Fire Department dispatched after attempts to locate jaws on north end of county negative.
- 1:58 a.m. (four more minutes) — people freed. One victim loaded on cot, second free but being attended by EMT's.
- 2:01 a.m. — second ambulance dispatched.

It should also be noted that the TOTAL TIME from occurrence to extraction was 43 minutes. It was 28 minutes from our arrival until extraction took place. The resource used for extraction was two wreckers and a porta-power unit carried by the wrecker.

If you analyze the period of time between 1:33 a.m. when the REQUEST for wrecker and ambulance was made until 1:58 a.m. when the people were free, you find 25 minutes. This time INCLUDES the travel time from St. Johns eight miles away, stabilizing the victims and extracting them from the overturned vehicle. Please consider this letter a commendation for their swift professional actions.

I was one of the two wrecker drivers that were at the scene of the accident. We usually take two wreckers in a situation where persons are trapped in vehicles. That way if another is needed in an emergency situation, there is no time wasted in waiting for it.

I would also like to add that we had a port-a-power rescue kit at the scene which we have had for 12 years and have had to use many times.

But because of the situation after we had righted the pickup, we had no use for it, and I used a special pry tool to free the two people inside. So it was not just by chance that we were called and happened to have a pry bar to free them. We have been in business since 1926 and this is just another one of our special fields.

Teachers hot over freeze editorial ICEA defends teachers view Freeze your salary first

To the editor:

Teachers in Clinton County are deeply concerned about the implications in your May 13 editorial. Certainly we care about education of students and have long urged the legislature to properly and equitably fund public schools. We are also more than willing to help school districts that are really in a crisis position weather the storm. However, to suggest that a wage freeze is the only answer is to place the whole burden on teachers.

The editorial uses a figure of 80 percent of budget going for salaries. Teachers in Clinton County get between 44 percent and 49 percent of the budget, with Bath and DeWitt at the low end of that range. Education needs only teachers and students to exist. Everything else is helpful, but cuts should come first from as far away from the classroom as possible.

Teachers are professionals, but why should they be asked to support their profession? Have doctors, also professionals, lowered their rates? The same can be asked of other professionals such as lawyers, engineers, etc.

There may be an intrinsic satisfaction in teaching, but it diminishes as classes are overloaded and priorities change from teaching to athletics and supplies.

The argument that jobs will be saved is insupportable in light of declining enrollments. Class size will not drop to keep teachers working. Layoffs will occur and teachers understand that. No district has yet guaranteed all current employees will be kept, no matter what the wage concession.

School employees also pay taxes and have family members out of work. If people who are working have less to spend, the whole economy will suffer.

We all, school employees and citizens alike, should be working to force the state to pay its fair share — 50 percent of the costs — as it once did. It now funds only about one-third of the bill. Federal aid is dropping also.

Some school districts are in difficulty and some will be able to make it without much difficulty. The place to solve problems is at the negotiation table. There we can work out equitable solutions to complex problems.

Editorials such as yours make it more difficult for our schools. Teacher morale is lowered, student attitudes deteriorate, and we find it increasingly hard to attract or keep the most able teachers. We urge you and your readers to talk to us and to understand that we are professionals who do care, but who have the same needs for a decent wage as do all of you.

Education costs less than ignorance and crime.

DeWitt Township landfill closer to reality

Recent actions by DeWitt Township and the Clinton County Solid Waste Committee have given new life to the operation of the controversial Coleman Road landfill in the southern part of Clinton County.

The township board voted unanimously at their May 10 meeting to enter into an agreement with the city of Lansing and the Granger Land Development Company that would allow Granger to operate a solid waste landfill on 115 acres of land located between Larch and Wood streets in the township.

The solid waste committee, commonly referred to as the Clinton County 641 committee because of the act which created it, voted 10-1 to include the Coleman Road site in the county's solid waste plan.

The Coleman Road site has been the center of controversy between the township and the city of Lansing since the city annexed the property in 1978. Township officials never recognized the legality of the annexation, continued to assess the parcel for tax purposes and threatened to put the land in the delinquent tax sale when the city refused to pay property taxes. Lansing filed a suit in Clinton County Circuit Court last fall seeking to have the court rule that the annexation was legal.

While some local political observers predicted a long and bitter legal battle over jurisdiction of the property, DeWitt Township Supervisor Leonard Pung quietly hammered out an agreement with the city and Granger that will likely eliminate the need for court mediation.

Under the agreement, the landfill will be used only by the city of Lansing and the Granger container service and will not be available to Clinton County residents. DeWitt Township, however, may use it in the future if the township establishes an overall trash pick-up service for its residents.

Granger agreed to establish a 300-foot buffer zone between the landfill and adjoining residential property, keep landfill traffic off Coleman Road and to stay under a grade elevation of 965 feet. No hazardous waste will be dumped in the Coleman Road site.

The city of Lansing agreed to give up their fight for control of the parcel and "de-annex" the Coleman Road site.

The 115-acre parcel is adjacent to a 120-acre landfill operated by Granger that is located in Ingham County

and currently serves the city of Lansing. Granger spokesman Kurt Guter estimated that the existing landfill would have a life of five to ten more years and the Coleman Road site would have a projected life of 20 years. Granger currently has a 15-year contract with Lansing to take care of its waste disposal.

Approval of the Coleman Road site by the township and the 641 committee does not give Granger full authorization to operate a landfill. DeWitt Township Attorney Richard Robinson stressed that the agreement between the city, the township and Granger is not final.

"On a tentative basis the township agrees to allow the landfill," Robinson said. "There are still a lot of details to work out."

The details of the county's 641 plan are also a long way from being final. Public hearings and the approval of both the board of commissioners and local units of government are needed before the plan is submitted to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for final approval.

Granger would also have to secure required permits from the township and the DNR before actual operation could begin, according to Pung.

Consideration of the new landfill site has not generated the emotional opposition that the expansion of the Granger landfill in Watertown Township produced. Some residents, however, who live near the Coleman Road site have attended recent meetings and asked for assurances that waste material would not spill over onto their property.

Others, like Clinton County Commissioner Richard Hawks, have argued that Granger's intent to limit use of the landfill to the city of Lansing is not an appropriate use of Clinton County land.

"Bath residents would have to drive by the Coleman landfill and go all the way to Watertown," he said. "I question whether this plan (barring local residents from the landfill) would serve county residents."

Granger president Gerald Granger contends that the landfill does serve the county because of the high number of area residents who work in Lansing and contribute to the city's refuse problem.

At the present time, the township, the city and Granger all appear happy with the agreement.

"I'm satisfied," said Pung.

County residents to decide future landfill use

The future of solid waste disposal in Clinton County may well rest in the hands of the 13 individuals who serve on the Clinton County Solid Waste Committee.

Commonly called the 641 committee because it was created under Act 641, the group of 13 county representatives has been meeting since October of 1980 for the purpose of creating a plan that would identify a means of disposing of solid waste and designate appropriate disposal sites. The committee agreed last Friday to add 115 acres of land owned by the Granger Land Development Company in DeWitt Township to the county's plan.

The committee, appointed by the Clinton County Board of Commissioners, is made up of county residents and consists of representatives of local government, industry, environmental groups and private citizens.

The committee's plan must be approved by both the board of commissioners and by 67 percent of the local governments (villages, cities and townships) in the county before it is sent to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for final approval. A public hearing is also required.

Act 641 states that when a landfill is used by one county, but is located in another county, the landfill must be included in both counties' plans. Because the Coleman Road landfill will serve the city of Lansing, it must be also be a part of Ingham County's 641 plan.

The portion of Clinton County's 641 committee representing local government consists of Clinton County Commissioner Robert VanDriesen, Watertown Township Supervisor Vaughn Montgomery, St. Johns City Treasurer Eugene Simon and Tri-County Planning Commission member Virginia Zeeb.

Robert Herrguth of Allied Disposal Company of Bath, David Harte of Hart Enterprises of Bath, Larry Randolph of the Tri-County Transfer Station of Solid Waste and Gerald Granger of the Granger Land Development Company represent industry.

Tom Smith of the Michigan United Conservation Clubs and Stanley Baird of the Clinton County Soil Conservation District are the consumer representatives, while Paul Baerman of DeWitt, Douglas Weir of St. Johns and Harvey Darling of Ovid represent private citizens.

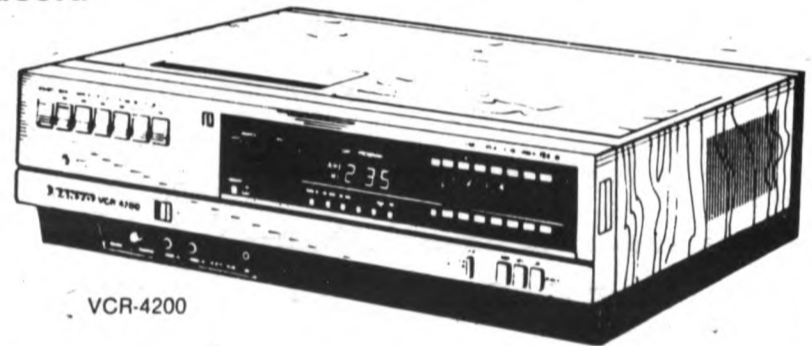

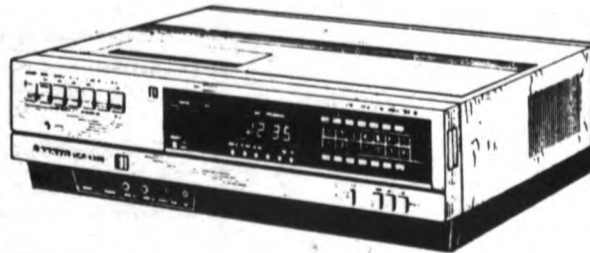

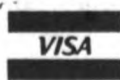

Debbie Hufnagel jumped 5-foot-2 in placing second in the high jump, while Rapelje took a second in the 880-yard run and tied with teammate Melinda Roberts for fourth in the 440. Gloria Stratton grabbed a sixth place in the shot.

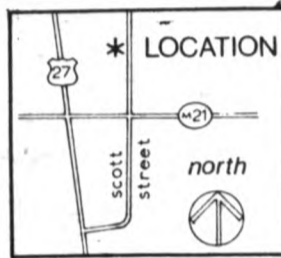

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON INCREASING PROPERTY TAXES

As required by Public Act 5 of 1982 (Truth in Taxation), the Village of Fowler will hold a Public Hearing on Thursday, May 27, 1982, at 7:00 P.M. at the Village Office located on North Main St. in the Village of Fowler, on the proposed 1982 tax levy.

Although the Village of Fowler is authorized by Charter to levy 15 mills for operating expenses, for the past several years only 11 mills have been levied. However, due to the Headlee reduction factor, this 11 mills was reduced to 9.80 mills in 1980, and 9.7757 mills in 1981. In 1981 the SEV for the Village of Fowler was \$7,669,400. The tax levy of 9.7757 mills produced revenue of \$74,974.

This year (1982) the SEV has increased to \$8,363,000. This amount times the proposed tax levy of 9.8846 mills (11 mills x Headlee factor of .8986) will produce revenue of approximately \$82,665, an increase of approximately 10% over 1981.

Residents are encouraged to attend the Public Hearing to offer their comments on this proposed tax levy and the 1982 budget.

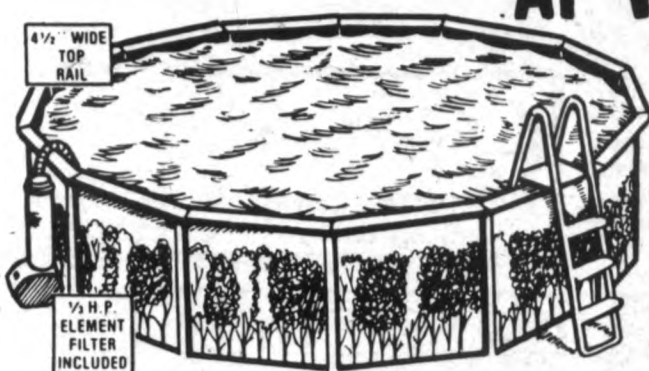

- 1 1/2 c. sugar
- 4 tbsp. flour
- 3 c. rhubarb diced

- 1/4 tsp. cream of tartar
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 6 tbsp. sugar

Whip yolks with fork and add 1 1/2 c. sugar and the flour; mix. Add the rhubarb mix and pour into a 9 inch pie crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes until rhubarb is tender. Beat the 3 egg whites with cream of tartar until fluffy. Add 1/2 tsp. vanilla, 6 tbsp. sugar, gradually, beating until it peaks. Pile on cool pie and bake at 350 degrees for 10-12 minutes until brown.

CRANBERRY MEATBALLS

Sweet, small meatballs just right for your buffet table.

- 2 lbs. lean ground beef
- 2 lbsp. soy sauce
- 2 lbsp. minced onion
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 c. dried parsley flakes
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed, or 2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1 c. cornflake crumbs
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. ground black pepper
- 1 can (1 oz.) cranberry sauce, jellied or whole berry
- 1/2 c. ketchup
- 2 lbsp. brown sugar
- 1 bottle (12 oz.) chili sauce
- 1 lbsp. lemon juice

In large bowl, combine ground beef, soy sauce, onion, eggs, parsley, garlic, crumbs, salt and pepper. Mix well. Shape meat mixture into balls the size of a large olive. Place meatballs into baking pans. Combine cranberry sauce, ketchup, brown sugar, chili sauce and lemon juice. Heat, stirring until cranberry sauce melts. Pour sauce over meatballs and bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.
