Cleanup costly

St. Johns residents gave the city more garbage than expected this year during an annual Spring Cleanup campaign, causing costs to rise by about one-third.

According to Administrative Assistant Diane Edwards, costs for the 1982 Spring Cleanup Program rose from an anticipated \$15,000-\$16,000 to \$21,035.

The reason for the extra cost was an increase in the amount of trash left at curbside by local residents during the city-wide pickup of practically any unwanted items during May, Mrs. Edwards said.

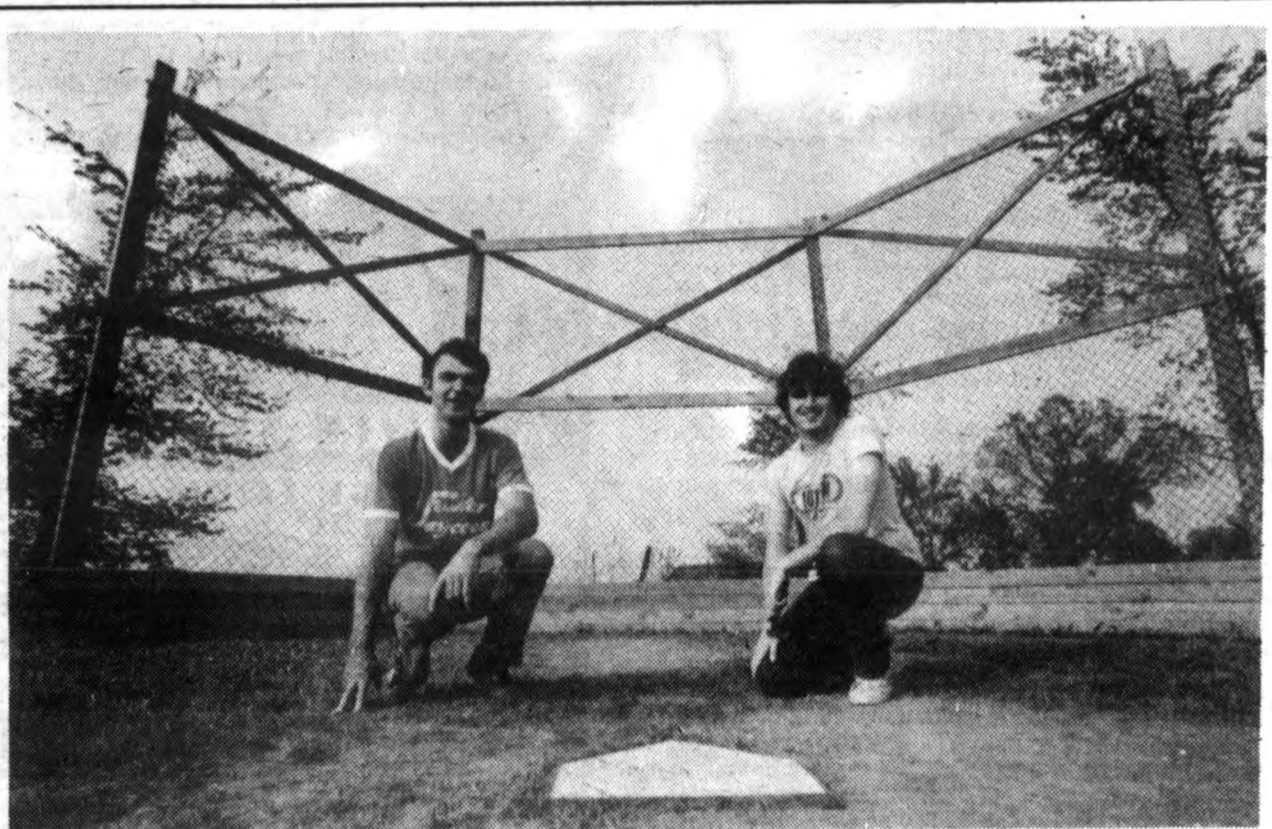
"The amount of trash we picked up this spring far exceeds that which has been picked up in the past," she said in a report to city commissioners. In 1981, the city picked up 1,200 yards of refuse; this spring, 1,660 yards were hauled away by private truckers, an increase of 38 percent.

Also contributing to the cost increase, Mrs. Edwards said, were fee hikes by Granger Landfill, where the trash is dumped, and higher trucking charges.

"This program seems to be very popular with the citizens of St. Johns and will most likely increase in size each year," she said.

Also likely to increase in size next year are annual rubbish removal fees. The 1982-83 city budget calls for \$5 increase in the garbage collection fee, from \$44.50 to \$49.50 per year.

The annual fee covers weekly garbage pickup, monthly brush collection, annual removal of Christmas trees and the Spring Cleanup Program.

Commissioners scramble to fill fewer seats

Some familiar faces may not return to Clinton County's Board of Commissioners and a few new names may take their place as candidates scramble to fill fewer seats in a primary election Aug. 10.

The board was cut from 11 seats to seven under a redistricting plan approved last Jan. 25. Some commissioners at first threatened to challenge the reapportionment plan, but no suits were filed and the plan stands, forcing four board members to go head-to-head in two races for newly combined districts in an Aug. 10 Republican primary.

Two other incumbents on the all Republican board will be challenged by Democrats in November.

By filing deadline at 4 p.m. Tuesday, June 8, two commissioners had not thrown their hats in the ring. Robert C. Stienman of District 10 and John McNailey of District 9 did not file petitions, county clerk's records said.

Meanwhile, two incumbent Republicans, Walter Nobis of Fowler, who has represented District 2, and Harold L. Martin of Westphalia, District 3, have both filed for the new District 2. The new second district includes all of old districts 2 and 3 except Essex Township, which becomes a part of District 1 under the new plan.

In that district another Republican, Glenn Webster of Elsie, presently commissioner of the old District 1, is unchallenged. The new first district has also swallowed up what was District 4, which surrounds St. Johns and was represented by Commissioner Robert H. Wood of St. Johns.

Stripped of his district, Wood has decided to challenge Earl Lancaster, also of St. Johns, for the new District 3, which will include 7,528 St. Johns residents.

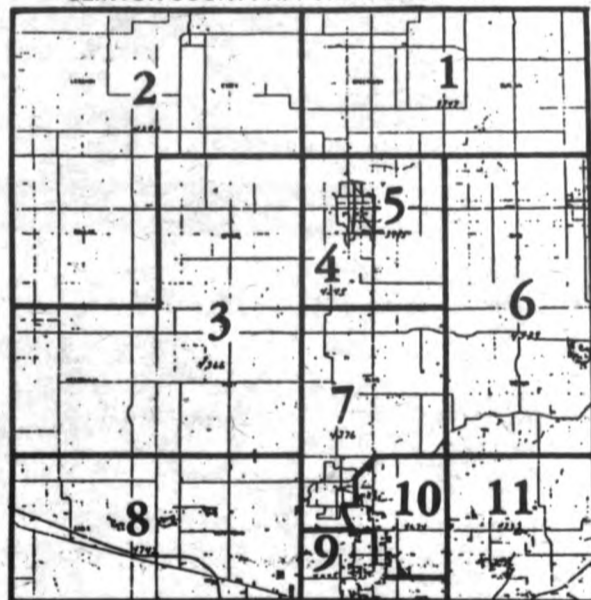
Elsewhere in the county, commissioners have switched districts and otherwise divided the spoils of reapportionment to avoid contests between incumbents.

A newcomer, Democrat Max W. Calder of 2407 Clark, Lansing, will challenge Roger Overway of DeWitt in District 6. And in District 5, another Democrat, Steven C. Uptegraft of 103 Brittany, Lansing, will challenge

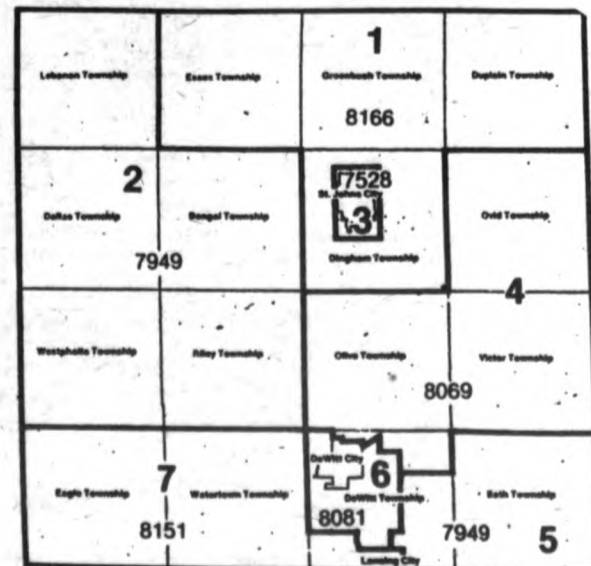
Richard Hawks of Bath in District 5. Hawks is currently commissioner of District 11.

But barring write-in campaigns, candidates in the remaining districts will go unchallenged.

Calder, a former Clinton County Commissioner, and Uptegraft are the only Democrats to file nominating petitions, county clerk's records said.

Overway, presently District 7 commissioner and chairman of the board, will face Calder in the new District 6 in November, which represents basically the same territory as his present district — the City of DeWitt — with additional area in northwestern portions of DeWitt Township.

Unchallenged are Richard DePond of Ovid in District 4, present commissioner of District 6; and Robert E. Van Driesen of Eagle in District 7, presently commissioner of District 8.

Jackson to quit

After three years as superintendent of Fowler Public Schools, Gary Jackson has announced he will resign to take a new job near Detroit.

Jackson says he has been selected to become superintendent of Huron Area Schools in New Boston, a city located southwest of Metropolitan Airport in Wayne County.

"The board's been aware I would probably be moving on this year. I'll stay until July 1. If they need any assistance from that point on, I'll be glad to assist them," he said.


The district Jackson will be working for is "about four times the size of Fowler's," he said. Huron Area Schools is a Class B school district, based on state enrollment figures. Fowler is Class D.

Along with increased responsibility, Jackson said he'll be getting a hefty raise. His new salary, about \$43,000 annually, will be about 22 percent higher than the roughly \$35,000 paid by Fowler.

Jackson worked for school districts in Kalamazoo, Antrim and Allegan counties before coming to Clinton County.

His announcement makes Fowler Public Schools the second district in Clinton County to begin a search for a new superintendent. St. Johns Superintendent Don Burns will retire in January.

Neither district has actively recruited replacements, so far, and Jackson was not approached for the St. Johns post, he said.

Elsie teen dies following bike collision with auto

An 18-year-old Elsie boy died of injuries sustained in an accident Tuesday, June 1, when his bicycle struck a car near the intersection of Island and Upton roads near Elsie.

Jeffrey Clark of 7101 N. Upton was headed south on Upton when his bicycle struck the right front fender of a vehicle headed west on Island, driven by Terry Bernath, 29, of 3657 Delta River Dr., Lansing, Clinton County Sheriff reports said.

Bernath and his wife, Phyllis, a passenger in the auto, were slightly injured in the accident as Bernath swerved in an attempt to avoid the bicycle. Both sought their own treatment.

Clark was hospitalized but died the following day of injuries sustained in the accident, which occurred at 7:29 p.m., reports said.

St. Johns City Police, with help from the Clinton County Detective Bureau, arrested two New York City men Friday for attempting to use stolen credit cards to obtain cash from several area banks.

Claude Lee Gibbs, 24, and Arthur Haynesworth, 24, are currently lodged in the Clinton County Jail awaiting arraignment. Specific charges were not available by press time.

The arrest, triggered by a tip from two Clinton County Bank and Trust employees, led to a five-state investigation of alleged credit card fraud. Police in Meridian Township, East Lansing, Lansing and as far away as Wisconsin are cooperating in the investigation, Sergeant Dick May of the Clinton County Sheriff's Department said.

The pair was due to be arraigned Wednesday afternoon, June 9.

Two men were injured when a deer ran into their vehicle as they were headed south on US-27 June 1, Clinton County Sheriff reports said.

Ronald Buchanon of Vestaburg and Donald Havens of Maple Rapids were taken to Clinton Memorial Hospital for treatment following the accident near the intersection of US-27 and Centerline, reports said.

Both victims were treated for glass in their eyes after a deer struck the passenger side window, breaking it, then struck the windshield, breaking it also.

A DeWitt resident, David Sevenski, was hospitalized following an accident June 4 in Bengal Township, Clinton County Sheriff reports said.

Sevenski was injured when his car struck a tree as he tried to avoid hitting a group of dogs while headed south on Francis Road, reports said.

A Laingsburg resident who allegedly lost his temper and shoved his arm through a plate glass window was charged with malicious destruction of property valued at over \$100 by Bath Township Police.

Arrested was James Joel David, 23, of Colby Lake Road. Reports said David broke a plate glass window on the front of Bath Hardware, 13684 Main St., June 5, in a fit of anger. David had also smashed the windshield on his car earlier in the evening, reports said.

Several breakins were reported in the county during recent weeks.

The first occurred on May 25 at the home of Roy Dem-

morrest on Airport Road, DeWitt, Clinton County Sheriff reports said.

Reports said someone entered the Demorrest home and took \$65 in cash and jewelry with a total value of \$740.

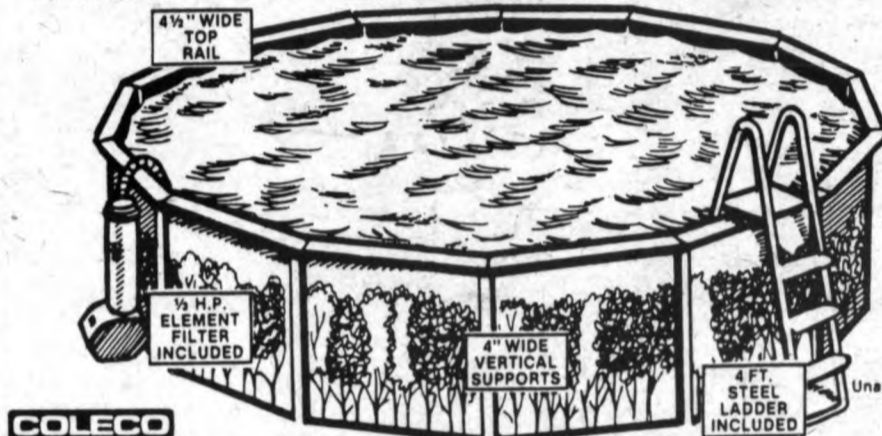

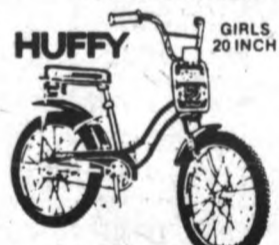

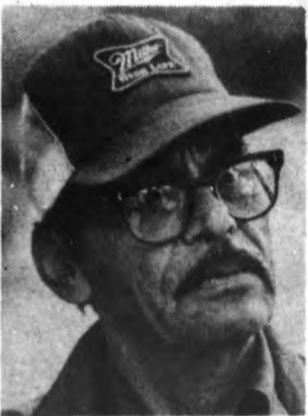
Street Talk

We asked local residents, "Are you planning to vote in the June 14 annual school election?"



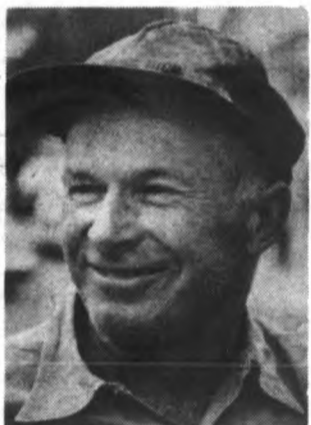
Dorthea Daley: "Certainly I am. I always vote in all elections. I hope the millages all pass. I'm with the intermediate school district."

Nate Medina Sr.: "I don't know yet, you caught me by surprise. But I plan to vote if they'll let me. It's important."

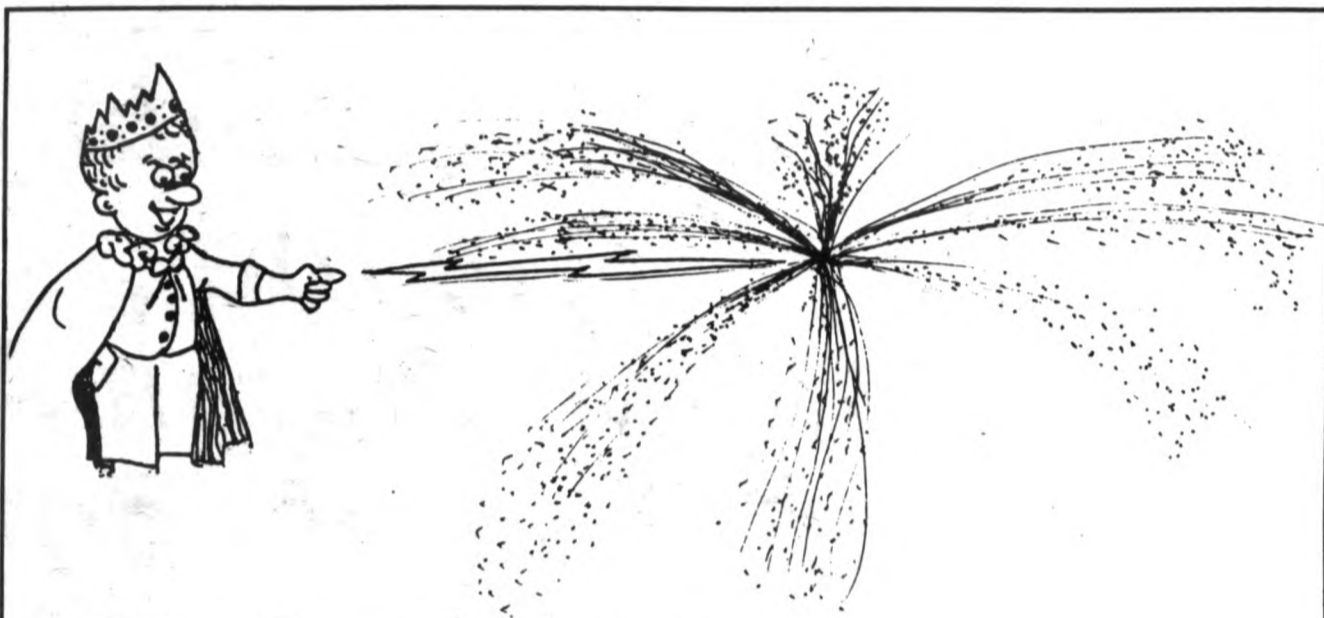
Oliver Beck: "I haven't thought about it much yet. I will vote, though. I go by the signs on the highway, and my wife and I always sit down first and concentrate on it."

Fulton employees agree to wage cuts

Fulton School employees have agreed to cut promised pay increases by half, making them the first in the area to accept wage concessions in contract negotiations with school board representatives.

Superintendent Ned Curtis announced the agreement, in which 40 aides, cooks, bus drivers, secretaries and others agreed to spread a promised nine percent raise over two years, cutting the increase to an average 4.5 percent. Under the agreement, Michigan Educational Support Personnel Association will extend their three-year contract an extra year, returning almost 80 percent of the scheduled pay increases — \$12,500 — to the district, Curtis' report said.

Teachers and employees in most Clinton County districts have been asked to accept a wage freeze or renegotiate contracts to help their districts weather a tough economic climate aggravated by enrollment declines, state aid cuts and inflation.

Among the first to renegotiate wage concessions, Fulton's employees agreed to hourly pay cuts from \$4.92 to \$4.50 per hour in some areas, and will give up options on health insurance where a spouse receives basic health insurance elsewhere. Also, one bus driver position was eliminated.

In return, the support staff group received assurance of "limited job security," and group term life insurance for those losing health insurance options, Curtis reported.

Employees covered by the agreement can only be laid off if a building is closed or if lay offs are forced by further cuts in state aid, he said.

"We could not responsibly guarantee jobs to everyone under any given turn of events," Curtis said.

Chamber notes

When the doorbell rings and two young men ask for your high school senior daughter by name, don't automatically assume they are personal friends of hers. According to reports from parents of senior girls, this kind of sales approach is being used to sell cookware, dinnerware and crystal.

Door-to-door selling is always easier if salespeople can make you think they have dealt with all of your friends, so every time they call on a senior girl, they get a list of names of friends of hers. With this list of classmates, the salesmen are on their way.

One parent was particularly concerned at the approach used on her daughter. The salesman showed his product line and encouraged the girl to use money she would be getting for graduation to make a purchase. Billing would not arrive until after graduation, just to make it easier to purchase, she was promised. The same parent said if she hadn't been home, she was afraid her daughter would have been pressured into ordering.

The Chamber of Commerce urges all sellers to stop by our office and explain what they are selling. It is not a law, but it enables us to answer questions and check on where else the product was marketed and how salesmen were received by other communities.

According to the Attorney General's Consumer Complaint Division, buyers should be very cautious and certain of all terms and conditions in any contract they sign. There may be hidden finance charges or other conditions not apparent at first glance.

Remember, if a contract is signed in the home, the purchaser has three days in which the order can be cancelled. Thorough inquiry into anything which involves your money is never out of line.

Want to exchange babysitting services for a piano, or piano lessons for eggs? Call Pasqua Warstler of United Skills Effort (USE) and get your barter started. USE is a barter group which Pasqua and others interested in bartering have started. To register, call Pasqua and enter the skills or products you have to trade and check the list to see what is available. The whole thing is very detailed and a lot of work for all involved in the grass roots attempt at organizing a bartering program.

Pasqua says they have plumbers, electricians and furniture craftsmen as well as people with eggs, furniture and even farm equipment. She says the key to success will be flexibility of the members.

The whole concept takes a lot of coordinating, but between Pasqua, her friend, Cindy Irish, and the Community Resource Volunteers office, all seems to be going well.

Barterers fall into two categories: a direct barter, in which two parties strike their own bargain and no records are kept by the office; and a more complex barter, in which a system of debits and credits are used to keep track of transactions. There is a standard rate at which a member can collect and spend from a bartering account. Pasqua says they use an hour-for-hour credit system. Of course, many of the barterers are simple barterers, but USE equalizes barterers for those who require it.

USE has been working hard to let people know what they are doing. They had a swap meet May 1 and participated in Michigan Week activities. Later this summer they plan to take part in the Chamber of Commerce Farm Market.

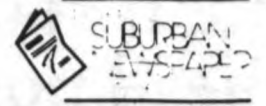

Our opinion

Two stand out in school election

Tough choices and decisions are ahead for St. Johns Board of Education members. Erosion of school finances caused by declining enrollment, state funding cuts and inflation are likely to force program and staff cuts. New contracts must be ironed out with teachers and other employee groups and, perhaps most important, a new superintendent must be selected.

Therefore, it is imperative local voters look closely at candidates for two open seats on the St. Johns School Board. Five choices are offered and the decision is not an easy one.

Based on our coverage of the school board and candidates' replies to our election coverage questionnaire, we are prepared to recommend two candidates to voters on June 14.

With the exception of incumbent Paul Maples, we have not seen any of the candidates regularly attend board meetings. This is unfortunate, since any hoping to serve should be willing to devote time to learning the issues faced by the board first-hand.

As for Maples, the board member chose not to respond to our questionnaire. A candidate unwilling to take any opportunity to inform voters prior to an election cannot be expected to make an effort to communicate issues to his constituents once elected. Also, Maples has admitted he is sometimes reluctant to establish school policy. This, we believe, runs contrary to the role a school board should play. In our opinion, a school board should

establish goals and policy for its administration, then openly and critically evaluate the performance of administrators, making changes where needed.

Only one candidate, Peter Apostol, answered all of our nine questions. His willingness to comment and schooling in education and business administration have earned him our support. Apostol appears energetic and open-minded, willing to tackle the demands before future board members.

We were also impressed with Thomas Irrer. He seems to have a good grasp of the types of problems board members must deal with, particularly in the area of communicating with the public, and appears prepared to shoulder his responsibility to make controversial, sometimes unpopular decisions. We were convinced by Irrer's statement, "The challenge of the board is to separate the needs from the wants ... and then act accordingly."

We believe Roy Ebert and Ivan Whitford would also make good board members. Both appear to be concerned: Ebert has devoted his time as leader of a citizen's committee on transportation, and Whitford is a life-long resident of the St. Johns District.

However, based upon our contact with them, we feel Apostol and Irrer are the best choices, and we urge voters to give both a chance to serve on the St. Johns Board of Education.

Millage requests merit close look

So far, St. Johns School District has been fortunate to gain continuing voter support during millage elections. Passage of 3.5 mills last August, although not granted on the first attempt, is noteworthy considering rejections of millage proposals by voters in similar districts throughout the state.

On June 14, St. Johns voters will be asked to consider three more proposals. We commend the board for offering voters a wide range of options, but with a voter's eye-view of increasing property taxes, we cannot urge support for all of the requests with equal enthusiasm.

We urge approval of the first request, renewal of 3.5 additional mills for three more years. Future declines in enrollment, declining state aid and rising inflation will combine to force further program and staff cuts. The increase granted last August will help keep these cuts to a minimum.

However, we view the remaining requests with mixed feelings.

One is a .33 mill increase proposed, the board says, to keep program and staff cuts to a minimum. But there are strings attached. The request would generate the amount of funds needed to maintain programs only if classes are combined throughout the district, all employees agree to a wage freeze and bus drivers and cafeteria workers agree to renegotiate their contracts.

This proposal is contingent on far too many variables to be given realistic consideration. The measures named in the proposal should stand on their own merits as cost cutting steps, and should not be promised to voters when there is a good chance the board may

not be able to deliver.

This request was proposed primarily as a means to exert pressure on teachers to accept a wage freeze; we support a wage freeze for reasons we outlined in an earlier editorial. However, teachers are not likely to agree to such a freeze prior to the millage election when it would assure voters an additional .33 mills would save programs — and may not agree to such a freeze at all.

The third proposal is for two mills, which the board says could guarantee classes would not be combined, and could generate money to pay for needed physical plant repairs, textbook replacement and other teaching equipment.

Like the previous proposal, however, this one is again tied, indirectly, to wage freeze demands and contract negotiations. To prevent funds generated by an additional two mills from going to teacher salaries, the board has proposed designating the funds for other purposes.

There is no question two additional mills could maintain, and even improve the quality of education in the district. But enrollment decline, state aid cuts and inflation will not go away, and means of keeping the school budget in line other than additional millage must be addressed sooner or later. We believe the time is now.

By approving a 3.5 mill increase last August, voters have indicated they are willing to shell out the cash needed to keep standards high at St. Johns Schools. We believe more cost saving steps should be taken by the school board, administration and staff before new additional millages are warranted.

Spencer takes it easy, gives team a rest, too

Afternoons are a bit quieter at St. Johns High's football field this spring. Bellows of "Faster! Faster! ... You're not going to make it under time!" and "Pace yourself!" are conspicuously absent. The coach who sent his track teams on "three-mile" runs — they had to be longer than that — then drove around looking for walkers — he always found them — has retired.

For the first time in seven years, Bob Spencer is not coaching track at St. Johns High School, and those who know him miss him.

"Coach Spencer worked us a lot and pushed us hard and yelled at us a lot. I used to get mad at times, but I know it was good discipline," St. Johns senior track and cross-country standout Paul Piozsak says. "I was disappointed when Mr. Spencer didn't coach this year, but he still helps Coach (Randy) Rude out with the long distance runners."

Spencer retired as head track coach this spring to honor a personal commitment he made several years ago, he said. "When my son Andy graduated, I said I'd retire from coaching. But I went one year beyond that with track."

Even more than his big voice, Spencer's big heart is missed. "Coach used to take the whole cross-country team out to dinner on occasion and bring us rolls and milk on Saturday meets," Piozsak recalls. "Since the cross-country team is so small, he can be more personal."

Piozsak also remembers a place called "Zululand," well known to St. Johns cross-country competitors. "Coach Spencer used to drive us out to Zululand, which is really hilly, rough terrain, and make us run really hard. It was tough, but afterwards he'd bring a lot of food out to us as a reward."

Spencer's enthusiasm for running stems from his high school sports career in Ionia. "I liked participating in football, but I was more successful in track," he recalled.

As a senior, Spencer took first-place in low hurdles, high jump and shot put and second-place in high hurdles at a conference meet. He was expected to win the hurdles at a state track meet, but slipped while running them, he said.

At Alma College he ran track, played football and studied physical education, history and mathematics.

"I came to St. Johns in the fall of 1956, and they were talking about teachers who had been teaching 25 to 30 years," he recalls. "I wondered how anyone could teach one thing for so long. Well, I've been here for 26 years now."

Fowler takes track championship

Superstar Becky Klein topped off an unbelievable 1981-82 sports season by leading her Fowler teammates to the Class D state girls' track championship on Saturday.

Klein, an All-County basketball selection as well as an outstanding softball player, set a state record of 57.5 in winning the 400-meter dash, finished second in the 200-meter dash, ran on the winning 1600-meter relay and the second-place 800-meter relay teams.

"Becky was sensational," Fowler coach Kim Spalsbury said. "But you have to realize that we wouldn't have won without the points we got from some of the other kids."

The "other kids" were Lana Hafner and her third place in the 800-meter run and a tie for fourth place in the high jump and Connie Feldpausch's second place in the high jump.

"We weren't expecting that many points (11) in the high jump," Spalsbury admitted.

Joining Klein in the winning 1600-meter relay were Jan Schmitt, Lana Hafner and Jill Ambrustmacher.

Fowler scored 53 points to finish 14 points ahead of second place Detroit St. Andrew.

The Fowler girls were not the only Fowler team to receive an outstanding performance on Saturday. The Eagle's Dave Koenigsknecht won the long jump with a meet-record leap of 23-5 3/4 and jumped 6-5 to place third in the high jump to pace Fowler to an eighth-place finish in the boys' division. Jeff Thelen finished sixth in the 800-meter run.

Fowler's girls also had the opportunity to shine at last Wednesday's Lansing State Journal-Sexton Honor Roll of Champions Track Meet. Klein won the 400-meters in 58.7 and also ran with Hafner, Schmitt and Ambrustmacher on the winning 1600-meter relay. Other placers for Fowler were a third place by Hafner in the high jump, a fourth by Schmitt in the 400 and an eighth by Emily Feldpausch in the 3200-meter run.

Kris Rapelje of St. Johns finished second in the 800, Debbie Hufnagel was third in the high jump, Carol Good took fifth in the 100 and Tina Simmon took a fourth in the

3200.

For the boys, Fowler's Koenigsknecht was fifth in the high jump and third in the long jump. St. Johns' Paul Pioszak took third in the 1600 and second in the 3200, while Ron Patrick finished fourth in the high hurdles in a fine 14.7.



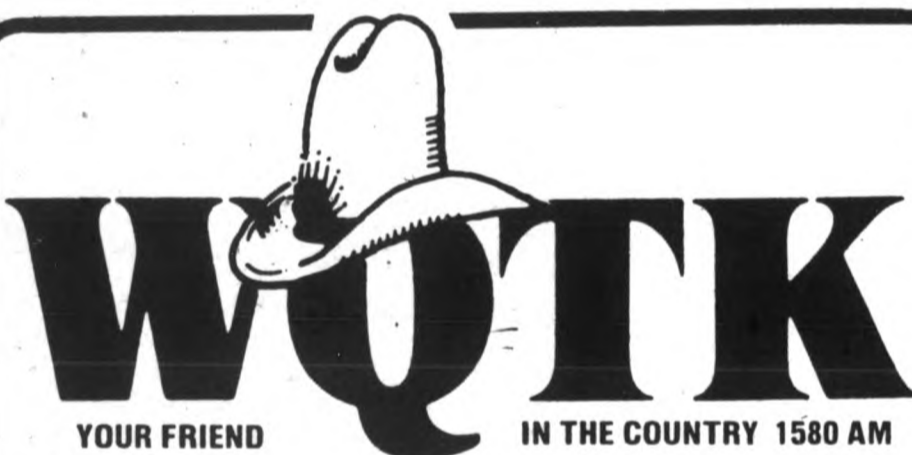

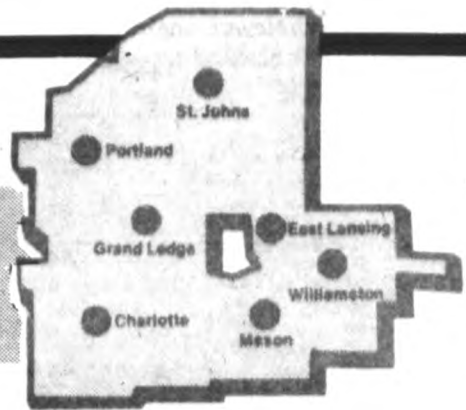
