Fowler request is narrowly defeated

All but one county millage request passed

Clinton County voters approved millage requests in all but one school district during annual school elections Monday, June 14.

Though margins were slim in some districts, renewals of operating mills were all approved and extra mills were granted in two districts. Of the five districts with millage requests on the ballot — DeWitt had none — only Fowler's request was turned down.

Following is a district-by-district round-up:

•**ST. JOHNS**— St. Johns voters narrowly approved renewal of 3.5 additional mills granted last August, 1,583 to 1,451, but overwhelmingly turned down requests for two mills — 2,157 to 879 — and for one-third mill, 2,350 to 677.

Superintendent Don Burns said he was not surprised by the results, but was surprised by the narrow margin of victory for renewal, just 132 votes. The outcome means combined classes for all elementary students next fall and as much as \$68,000 in program cuts, even providing employee groups agree to accept wage freezes and renegotiate contracts, Burns said.

•**OVID-ELSIE**— Two proposals, adding up to 23 mills, were approved by voters. The first, renewal of 21.5 mills, passed 953 to 551; the second, for 1.5 mills to retire a general fund deficit, was closer, 783 to 721.

•**FOWLER**— Voters were given one proposal in Fowler, a 23-mill package which included a 2.2 increase. They rejected the request by just 48 votes, 255 to 207.

•**BATH**— Voters in the Bath approved renewal of one maintenance mill by a vote of 312 to 265, a 47 vote margin.

Most of the approximately \$60,000 to be generated by the mill is needed for repair of the high school roof which received extensive damage during the past winter.

"We originally thought the repair would cost us between \$60,000 and \$70,000," Bath School Superintendent Ken Dyer said. "However, the bids we received were somewhat lower than we anticipated."

Dyer said that J & L Roofing of Grand Rapids has been awarded a contract in the amount of \$48,875 and roofing work would be completed before school starts in the fall.

•**PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA** — Voters in the Pewamo-Westphalia School District approved a millage request for 21.59 operating mills by a vote of 194 to 130. The approval includes renewal of 21.157 operating mills and an additional request of .433 mills.

Apostle and Irrer unseat Maples for school board

Peter Apostle and Thomas Irrer came in first and second in Monday's school board election, upsetting incumbent Paul Maples by a margin of between 400 and 600 hundred votes.

Apostle, a 40-year-old physical therapist at Clinton Memorial Hospital and nine-year resident of St. Johns School District, was the top vote-earner with a total of 1,553.

He was followed by Irrer, a St. Johns native and cash crop farmer, with 1,304.

Apostle and Irrer will replace Maples and Board President Ron Huard, who did not seek re-election.

A close third in the balloting was Ivan Whitford, with 1,268, just 36 votes behind Irrer. The Federal Mogul employee was followed by Maples, 902, and former St. Johns Mayor Roy Ebert, with 644.

Almost half of the district's roughly 6,000 registered voters turned out to cast a total of over 2,800 ballots in the Monday election of board candidates. The turnout was slightly behind last year's annual school election, according to Superintendent Don Burns.

Burns said he was "somewhat surprised" by voters'

choices of school board candidates, but did not elaborate.

Board seats were open in all Clinton County School districts Monday; as many incumbents did not run for re-election, and voters were given the opportunity to choose from among several new candidates in most districts. Following is a summary of election results.

•**DEWITT** — William Schaar, a Lansing Community College administrator, was the top vote-earner in a six-way race for two open seats left empty when two incumbents chose not to run. He earned a total of 335 votes. Also earning a seat was Carol Haag, with 211.

They were followed by Michael Towns, 123; Thomas Maier, 95; Michael Mandrick, 82; and William Fish, 29.

•**BATH** — Ronald Foote, a maintenance supervisor at MSU's Forest Akers Golf Course, ran away with a five-way race for two open seats. Foote topped the field of new candidates with a total of 385 votes. He will be joined on the school board by John McGonigal, the second place finisher with 266 votes.

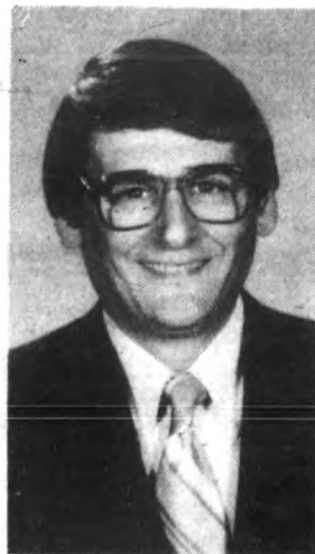
Defeated in the Bath election were Joan Mann, 194; Allen Rosekrans, 155; and Thomas Sump, 104.

•**OVID-ELSIE** — Retirement and resignations by incumbent board members left open a four-year term and two-years remaining in another four-year term in Ovid-Elsie School District. Renae Fatura of Bannister was the winner in a three-way battle for the full term with a total of 552 votes. She was followed by David Hill, with 497, and Robert G. Parker, with 411.

The two-year term will be filled by John "Jack" Schwark of Ovid, who garnered 773 votes to Lorraine Buchele's 649.

•**FOWLER** — Two Fowler candidates, incumbent Clare Feldpausch and newcomer Alan Weber, were both unopposed.

•**PEWAMO-WESTPHALIA** — Douglas C. Campbell and John R. Kowatch, both unopposed, were elected. Both newcomers, they will replace two incumbents who chose not to run for re-election.

Delay over for Blastic, rezoning request rejected

About 40 acres of undeveloped land northwest of the intersection of Townsend Road and US-27 will remain so, at least for now, St. Johns City Commissioners decided Monday night, June 14.

The land was slated for offices, apartments, duplexes and single-family residences by owner Robert Blastic, provided the city would rezone the property from its present single-family residential classification.

Blastic says he was confident the rezoning request would be approved when he came to the meeting. That was before a small-but-vocal group of neighbors of the site showed up to convince commissioners otherwise.

"The time and effort put into this request by myself, the planning commission and the city did not warrant the action taken last night," Blastic said Tuesday morning. "That was an emotional reaction."

Led by Joe Gonzales of 1103 Hampshire, who said he was also representing 10 families not present, the group of six told commissioners their area of town was already saturated with multiple family dwellings.

Bordered by Suntree Apartments, the neighborhood is plagued with vandalism and traffic problems, Gonzales and others said. Property values have declined as much as \$15,000 per house since Suntree was built, and local residents were misled by developers of that project, he said.

"We feel we've already sacrificed for the community good," he said. "We went through all this before, then the person who owned it sold the property and we got an entirely different animal in there," he added, referring to Suntree's original developer's promise to build luxury apartments.

Mayor John Arehart admitted the development was not what had been promised, but pointed out the city has more control under a new zoning ordinance passed earlier this year. That ordinance gives the city and city planning commission authority for site plan reviews, and was passed specifically to cover the Blastic request, Blastic insists.

"The city has put me through my paces," he complained. "It's been a good year since I made my request."

Blastic said his plans have been changed several times to accommodate demands by the city planning commission, city commissioners and changes in the zoning ordinance. He said his latest plan would buffer offices with apartments or condominiums and buffer the apartments with duplexes, which would then border single-

family residences.

But one homeowner on nearby Townsend said the project would put too many apartment dwellers in one big "anthill."

Others said dust and traffic would ruin their neighborhood, forcing homeowners out and prices down. "Just go down Hampshire Drive and look at all the 'for sale' signs now," Gonzales said.

Commissioner Richard Stark pointed out Blastic's proposal for an eventual 400 units would house at least 800 new residents at a "conservative estimate." "That

plans to build a new office building in St. Johns.

would put 10 percent of the entire population of St. Johns in this one limited area," he said.

Commissioners offered proposals to zone only single-family residences or larger buffer zones, but it was Commissioner Tom Wiseman who finally moved to reject the request outright "on the basis that we do have enough office zoning and there is no need established for multiple family dwellings at this time." It passed unanimously.

"There has been a change of heart here tonight," Blastic said dejectedly.

"It was Suntree that screwed you up," Gonzales replied.

Blastic said he is considering taking the city to court or selling the land to another developer, but plans to discuss the chance of another rezoning request with city officials first.

Board unfair, staff groups charge

Accusing St. Johns School Board members and administrators of misrepresenting facts, school employee groups have complained to the Michigan Employee Relations Commission (MERC), charging unfair labor practices.

At a press conference Thursday morning, June 10, representatives of five school employee groups accused school officials of distorting budget figures and misrepresenting the bargaining position of employee groups to other bargaining groups and the public during negotiations.

They say the school district is unfairly trying to force them into accepting a wage freeze and renegotiating current contracts. Teachers have been asked to accept wage freezes by school officials in several Clinton County school districts. In Bath, administrative employees have already agreed to accept contract concessions and teachers are negotiating a new contract. In DeWitt, teachers are currently negotiating a new contract, but union representatives refused to comment on administration demands. In all but two county school districts, teachers are represented by the Ingham County Education Association, which has joined the SJEA in the MERC complaint.

"Different bargaining groups are receiving different information from the administration," Gerry Congleton, president of the St. Johns Education Association (SJEA) said. "Administrators said two groups will open renegotiations and accept wage freezes," he added. According to representatives of the two groups, no such agreement has been made.

"St. Johns teachers aides have not agreed to open contract negotiations," Jan Vermeersch, representing school aides said. "We have not been approached by any authorized board representative to reopen negotiations for the last two years of our contract," bus drivers' representative Bruce Irish added during the press conference.

Both groups are in the second year of a two year contract.

Mike Gehoski, also of the SJEA, announced the unfair labor practices charge. "The board has not been open and honest with the voting public at all times," he said.

Board negotiators have demanded the SJEA accept a wage freeze in their new contract, currently being negotiated. And board members have asked voters to approve two millage proposals which are contingent upon acceptance by teachers of a freeze and renegotiation of current contracts with aides and bus drivers. Gehoski says that's unfair.

"The board is trying to pressure us through the public," he said. "For the board and administration to

base the budget on a wage freeze is unrealistic and irresponsible."

Board budget figures presented prior to the millage requests said the schools would be only \$150,000 in the red if teachers would agree to a wage freeze for the coming year. Based on those estimates, board members voted to ask for one-third additional mill, which they say would make up the deficit. Another request for two additional mills would maintain programs and prevent combined classes if not used for teacher salary increases, the board has told voters.

Gehoski and Congleton say millage requests should not be tied to negotiations because there are "too many variables."

"We think the public is being led to believe that the same educational program being offered this year can be offered again next year," Gehoski said. "There is a very strong possibility that this is not true (because of) all the unknown factors involved."

Not known, he said, are the amount of millage to be available, the state aid formula, the number of teacher layoffs and the possible savings from SJEA cost-cutting proposals, yet to be considered by the board.

"They have not looked at our incentive for early retirement yet," Congleton said. "That's our primary proposal."

Also present for the press conference were Clare Matter, representing the custodial and maintenance staff, and Darlene Lawrence, president of the recently organized school secretaries union. Both said their groups are also opposed to a freeze.

"The secretaries in no way will agree to a wage freeze," Mrs. Lawrence said. "We do not believe that the information that we and the public have been receiving regarding the district's financial condition, budget or future expenditures is accurate."

Superintendent Don Burns said he would not comment on the charges until he has a chance to read them.

The SJEA complaint, including dates, times and budget figures for documentation, has been submitted to the MERC, Gehoski said.

When a hearing date is set, the charges will be heard before an MERC administrative law judge, who can dismiss them or find school officials in violation of state labor law.

According to Shlomo Sperka, an administrative law judge with the Detroit MERC office, if found in violation, school officials would likely be ordered to cease and desist any illegal negotiating tactics, and could be ordered to bargain in good faith in an extended negotiating period.

Findings by MERC administrative law judges are subject to appeal to the three-member Employee Relations Commission.

Board rep responds, says publicity is aim

Responding to unfair labor practice charges Monday, June 14, the St. Johns Board of Education's chief negotiator called complaints by school staffers "a public relations ploy."

"The board is distressed and disappointed," by the charges filed with the Michigan Employment Relations Commission by the St. Johns Education Association, and is "dismayed and perplexed" by similar charges filed by a secretary's union, George Johnson said.

"Attorneys for the school district have reviewed the charges and are confident they have no merit and that the filing of charges is simply a public relations ploy," the negotiator said in a prepared statement released by Monday.

Johnson said negotiations are underway with secretaries and were due to resume Tuesday with teachers. Talks on a new teacher contract broke down in March when the board demanded a wage freeze.

Secretaries, meanwhile, have been offered a contract including a retroactive eight percent increase for last year, provided they also agree to a wage freeze if other employee groups do, Johnson said.

Johnson also said charges that public statements made by the board and administration have compromised negotiations are not sufficiently detailed as to "when, where or who."

St. Johns judge not ready for prime time

St. Johns court film could be first in state

Most probably didn't know it, but viewers of WILX TV's 6 p.m. news broadcast Wednesday, June 9 may have witnessed the first broadcast of a court session in Michigan, taped in a St. Johns courtroom.

Cameras of any kind are not permitted in court during sessions or recesses between sessions under the Michigan Supreme Court's Judicial Code of Conduct. So Channel 10 reporter Chuck Darany was "surprised as Hell" when District Judge Frederick Lewis allowed him to film an arraignment of two credit card fraud suspects in Clinton County's 65th District Court, a WILX cameraman says.

"Of course I was surprised," Darany said. "I don't think I even asked. (Det. Sgt. Dick) May said 'I don't think you can shoot in here,' then (Chief Assistant Prosecutor Richard) Koenigsknecht asked the judge and the judge said 'sure'."

"They caught me by surprise," Lewis said Friday. "I thought the detective sergeant was kidding me when he said there was a TV crew outside that wanted to film us. I said sure."

Lewis said he was not aware of the rule — canon 3, paragraph 7 of the Judicial Code of Conduct — which states: "A judge should prohibit broadcasting, televising, recording or taking of photographs in or out of the courtroom during sessions of court or recesses between sessions of the court except as authorized by the supreme court."

"There's not one criminal thing they don't dump on us here. We don't have the time or the luxury of philosophizing on these fine points," the district judge said.

Lewis said he has conducted trials videotaped for University of Michigan law students in Ann Arbor, so he saw nothing wrong with allowing filming of an arraignment in an otherwise empty courtroom. "I would be more concerned if there had been other people in the courtroom," he said, pointing out viewers might think others present were also implicated in some manner.

Cameras in courtrooms "has been an issue since cameras came along," a Michigan State University School of Journalism professor says. "At first they had those huge cameras. When the flash went off, it just blinded people," Dr. Robert S. Cullen said. "The camera was like an obnoxious intruder." Courtroom doors were opened to cameras only recently, under experimental projects in just a handful of states where trials and other court action are being televised.

In Michigan, however, Supreme Court justices have not changed their minds about cameras in courtrooms. Films or still pictures of court sessions are permitted only with specific authorization of the supreme court,

a Michigan State Bar official said.

and no recent requests have been made or granted, Roger Lane, executive assistant to Chief Justice Mary Coleman says.

"It's not up to the individual judge," Lane said when asked if he had ever heard of court sessions being filmed in Michigan. "I'm not aware we have ever had a thing like that ... you don't expect a judge to defy rules of judicial conduct."

Officials at the State Court Administrators Office also knew of no previous instance in which court sessions had been filmed in Michigan. And Emery Freeman, liaison to the Standing Committee on Legal and Judicial Ethics of the Michigan State Bar, agreed.

"We've never had a complaint from anyone regarding

the use of cameras," he said. "I assume that's because the rules are being followed."

None would hazard a guess if the rare footage, broadcast on Channel 10's evening news to about 37,000 viewers, would jeopardize the defendants' rights to a fair trial. The pair, Claude Lee Gibbs and Arthur Haynesworth, both 24-year-old New York residents, asked for court-appointed attorneys during the arraignment, and will seek legal help from New York later, Lewis said.

They were charged with using stolen credit cards to withdraw thousands in cash from banks in the Lansing area and as far away as Wisconsin.

Local attorneys Robert Steinman and Jim Moore have been appointed to represent Haynesworth and Gibbs. Neither would speculate how a TV broadcast could affect prosecution of their clients, but Steinman said he was studying the question. Moore said he doubted it would have any affect.

But Spencer Abraham, a professor at Thomas M. Cooley Law School in Lansing, said otherwise. He said the same code of conduct that demands cameras be kept from courtrooms would mandate that any defense attorney explore the possibility of a mistrial if the code of judicial conduct is violated. "The attorney is obligated under the same code that the judge has violated," he said, "even if their own personal view is that cameras in court are an advancement."

Other technical violations which can cause mistrials in areas such as evidence gathering can be argued, Abraham said. Not so the issue of cameras in a court. "This is clear," he said. "Either the cameras are there or they're not."

"I wouldn't know about violating the rules, but if that's the rule, I go with the rule," Lewis said when asked if he will permit cameras in his court again. "We've got a lot of bosses. There's the Supreme Court, the Court Administrator's Office, the Attorney General and the Court of Appeals."

Flood insurance offered

Thanks to city officials, St. Johns residents can now get what Noah couldn't: flood insurance.

The City of St. Johns was accepted in the National Flood Insurance Program May 28, making it possible for local residents to obtain protection at the cost of about \$250 per year for a \$50,000 home, a city press release says.

Although there are no rivers near St. Johns, that could be important considering the flooding which damaged local businesses last October when heavy rains left water standing door-handle deep at two local car dealerships.

The flood insurance is federally sponsored, and is available from any property insurance agent or broker in the community, reports said.

Owners of property in flood-prone areas must, by law, buy flood insurance to receive any form of federal financial aid to build or buy buildings in those areas, including FHA, VA and small business administration loans.

The city has not been mapped to indicate flood-prone areas, but application under the program has been completed quickly since St. Johns construction and zoning codes already met Federal Flood Insurance Program standards. Mapping is expected to be completed soon, City Clerk Rick Colletta said.

The insurance covers contents of a residence up to \$10,000, and has a maximum of \$100,000 for non-residential structures, reports said.

Free tennis lessons begin June 21. Registration is at city offices.

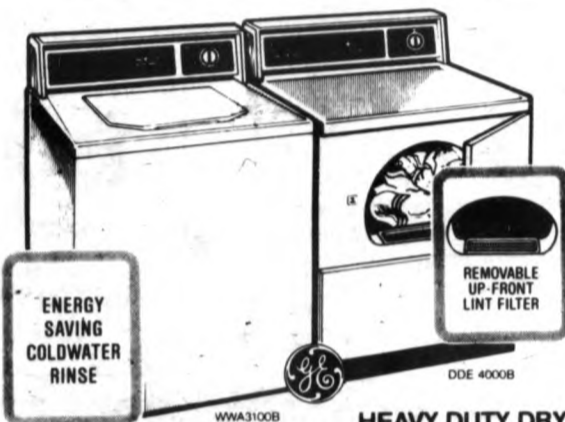

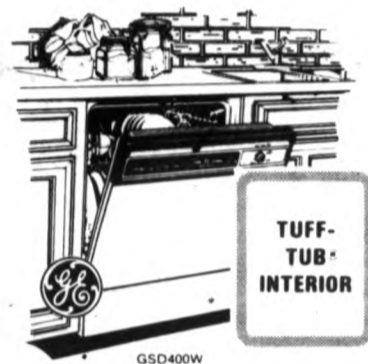

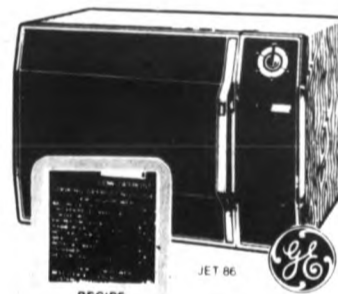

Board begins lay offs and superintendent search

Cutbacks, combined classes, teacher lay offs and the first steps in the search for a new superintendent occupied members of the St. Johns Board of Education during their monthly meeting at 8 p.m. Wednesday, June 9 in the St. Johns High School Administration Building.

Low class sizes and busing dominated discussion as board members approved the lay offs of four teachers as part of a plan to combine classes next fall at elementary schools throughout the district.

Elementary Principal Roger Feeman briefed the board on plans underway to implement combination classrooms at the elementary level next September. He said combination classes would result in teaching staff cuts, student re-assignments and bus route reductions. Board members took no action on Feeman's recommendations.

In an addition to their agenda, however, the board okayed an administration recommendation to pink-slip, or lay off, four elementary teachers.

Six teacher lay offs were

planned under the combined class program, saving the district about \$82,000 in salaries, Superintendent Don Burns said. But two teachers, Margaret Wyrick and Mildred Sleight, have retired, and another pair of teachers will take leaves of absence. As a result, two of the four teachers laid off Wednesday night — Gail Miller, Randall Rude, Lorraine Kudwa and Keith Haske — could be re-hired in the fall, Burns said.

In other business, Board members decided to begin discussing their criteria for selection of a new superintendent to replace Burns, who will retire in January. Winners in Monday's school election will be invited to take part in the discussion during a meeting June 23.

Board members also approved a recommendation by Gordon Vandemark to buy two new Thomasville buses.

Vandemark's recommendation brought reactions from other bidders on the bus purchase present at the meeting. Capital Coach representatives proposed that the school try

one of each of the companies' buses on a preliminary bases before choosing, and board members agreed to take a short recess to examine the vehicles.

Board members still chose to go with larger Thomasville Coaches, however, despite the pleading of bus driver Gladys Irish for the board to think twice before placing responsibility for extra student riders on bus drivers' shoulders.

"You're stating you want to put more students on a bus for a bus driver to handle. Not all bus drivers can handle that many kids," Mrs. Irish said.

With a higher passenger capacity, it is expected two of the new buses can replace three old ones.

Other agenda items were:

- Maintaining Central Elementry School. After much discussion, board members moved for a preliminary meeting with an architect before taking any action on the building.

- Bids were approved for tires; new roofing on Eureka, Swegles and high school buildings; and new

Elementary English textbooks were purchased.

- Retirement of Pauline Graham, bus driver, was approved.

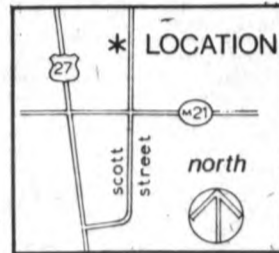
- The resignation of third-grade elementary teacher Linda Kuchar and requests for one-year personal leaves of absence by

Patricia Kuenzli, third grade teacher at Swegles, and Patricia Eshenroder, special education teacher at Rodney B. Wilson, were approved.

- A license agreement to grant Charles Kebler of Chasco Plumbing a limited

right to use a strip of school property on the bus garage site for large truck delivery use was approved.

Board members then adjourned to a closed session to discuss current negotiations with employee groups.

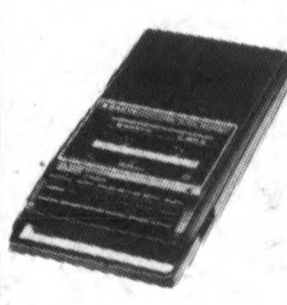

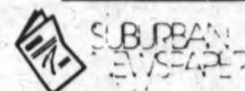

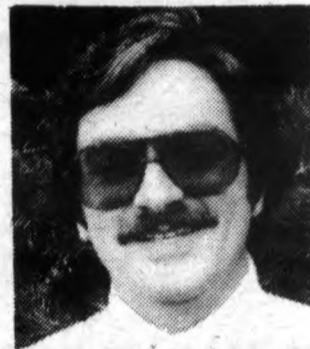

My daddy always said...

If this column ends abruptly, it's probably because I'm rushing to the hospital to "coach" delivery of a 1982 model son or daughter. Already almost a week overdue, it's our first, so when I get the call I'm not staying around to finish reading the latest press release from the Michigan Dry Bean Institute.

I've always said I wouldn't abuse the privilege of being one of the few new fathers with access to a newspaper by crowing the good news in foot-high headlines or, more likely, boring readers to death with an interminable series of columns about the thrills of "parenting." I've seen others do that and I always figured it was about as interesting to read as an insurance policy (which, incidentally, is still more exciting than having an insurance salesman explain the policy he'd like you to buy.)

I'm going to stick by my promise, but since it doesn't apply to columns about "expectant parenting," I guess I can get away with this one.

Since I don't know much of anything about raising kids yet, I've been spending a lot of time thinking about the important advice dads are supposed to dispense at timely turning points in childhood development. You know, the kind of homilies Ward Cleaver and Ozzie Nelson always delivered near the end of the show after the evening's moral lesson was suitably impressed upon TV Land tots and teens; the kind of common-sense, pithy pieces of wisdom usually preceded by, "My daddy always told me..."

Well, when he or she grows up, the 1982 Bronson will be able to say things like:

• "My daddy always told me never to throw snowballs at anyone wearing running shoes."

• "Never call the office when you're on vacation."

• "Don't cook bacon in an uncovered pan without a shirt on." (Although this applies mainly to boys now, the way things are going it could be pretty valuable to girls, too, before long.)

• "Don't tease mean dogs unless you know how long their chain is."

• "Don't carry a hip flask if you plan to walk on icy streets."

• "Never invite people who sell Amway or insurance into your home."

• "Don't eat yellow snow."

• "Don't leave rakes in the yard with the tines pointing up."

• "Don't put together baby cribs outdoors if they don't fit through the door to the nursery."

• "Don't argue with a pregnant woman about where a crib should be assembled." (Or about anything else.)

• "Never try to switch hands on your bike handlebars." (So-called friends will try to get you to fall for this suicide trick by just resting their hands on the opposite handlebars while riding 'no-hands'.)

Senior citizen update

Senior Citizens, are you taking advantage of all the services offered to you?

I learned a lot by talking to Brenda Hamilton, director of the Senior Citizen Office; I will attempt to give you a run-down on some of the services offered by that office.

•Of course, the use of the van is one of the most popular services. The van is available at no cost for any essential needs, such as a trip to the doctor, dentist or hospital. Monday and Tuesdays are the best days to make doctor appointments.

Trips to the grocery store are also considered a necessity. Because of the many people who request this service, there are regularly scheduled days for different areas. Call the Senior Citizens Office at 224-7998 to find out when the van is available in your area.

All trips on the van must be scheduled ahead, so call and make your appointment.

•If you need help on the Energy Assistance Program, they will gladly help you. This program ends July 15.

Home health assistance is still available, on a limited basis. If you need this service, call the senior citizen office for information.

•There is also Legal Assistance available to you, by appointment only. This includes advice on such things as consumer problems, guardianship, insurance, Medicare and Medicaid and Social Security.

•The weatherization program is still in effect. There are some guidelines, though. If you qualify, they will provide at no cost for labor or materials, storm windows, weather stripping and insulation. They are now doing homes, rental units and mobile homes. Call the senior office for information.

•There is still cheese available. About 500 lbs are left. Income guidelines are: one person, \$5,850, two persons, \$7,775. All ages are eligible.

The cheese is available at 100 S. Ottawa St., St. Johns. Bring proof of income and pick up your cheese.

It was the hitter that dominated the world of high school softball in Clinton County in 1982.

Seven athletes hit over .500 this season and more than 30 ballplayers had averages that topped the .300 mark.

Twelve of these athletes, selected on the basis of recommendations from county coaches, were chosen to the All-Clinton County softball team for 1982.

Leading the way was Fowler's Patty Wieber whose .560 batting average was tops among the first-team selections. Named with Wieber to the honor squad were teammates Becky Klein and Julie Pung; St. Johns' Sue Pearsall and Sue Howe; DeWitt's Jenny Carey and Tami Newman; Bath's Sandy Asbridge and Sue Bower; Pewamo-Westphalia's Judy and Patty Theis; and Ovid-Elsie's Tena Woodbury.

Even the pitchers participated in the never-ending bombs, shots and zingers that rocketed off county bats this season. Judy Theis compiled an impressive 16-6 record on the mound for the Pirates, but also hit a hefty .444. Sue Bower was the Bees' best pitcher as well as being a .471 hitter. Julie Pung won 14 games against only five losses and helped her own cause at the plate on a number of occasions with her .350 batting average.

The Redwings' Sue Howe and Sue Pearsall formed one of the best one-two punches in the league as they both hit near the .500 mark. Howe was also her team's top hurler with a 7-5 record.

Challenging the two Sues from St. Johns for honors as the county's "dynamic duo" were DeWitt's Jenny Carey and Tami Newman. Carey hit a fine .546, while Newman was close behind at .463.

Fowler's Becky Klein, the uncontested queen of Class D track, spent the other half of her spring hitting .460 as the Eagle's starter at third base. She also stole 16 bases, hit three triples and slugged two home runs.

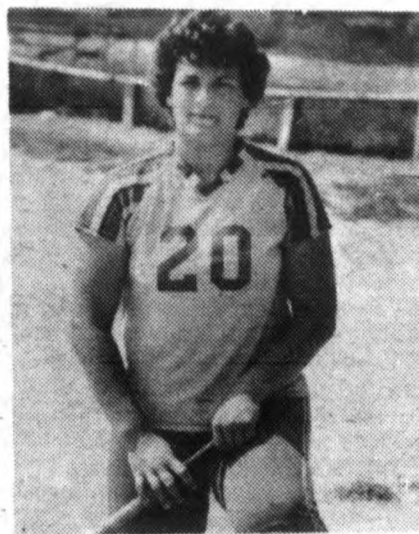
Ovid-Elsie's Tena Woodbury hit an even .500 for the season despite sitting out her junior year because of financial problems that eliminated the Marauder's spring sports. Woodbury was recently named her team's MVP.

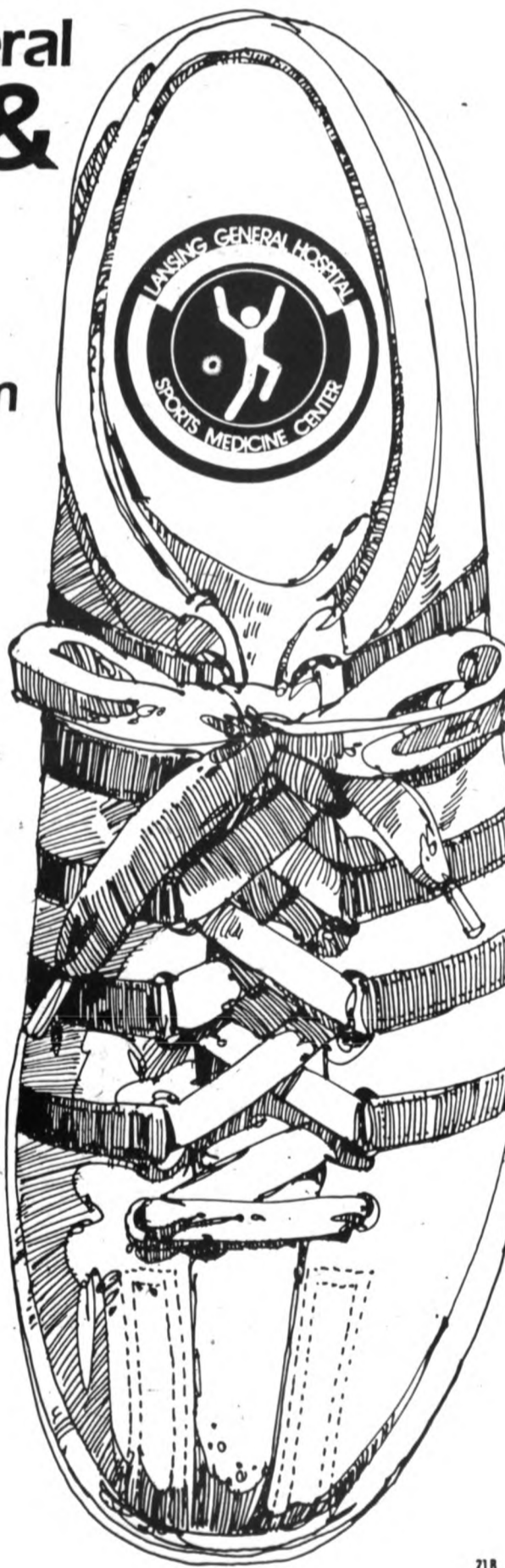

The latest solar house built by CISD students

Solar house lets sun shine in

Dick Vitek and a couple dozen students from the Bath and DeWitt schools have a house for sale.

It's not an ordinary home, but an energy-efficient model built by students of the building trades program of the Clinton Intermediate School District.

Each school day since September, under Vitek's supervision, juniors and seniors from Bath and DeWitt high schools have arrived at the building site on Primrose Lane in DeWitt to work on the three-bedroom, 1398-square-foot home. It is nearly completed and Vitek is hoping to soon find a buyer.

"The emphasis this year has been on energy conser-

vation," Vitek said. "We built in such things as a solar wall . . . air locks on the entries . . . steel insulated doors . . . triple panel casement windows . . . and extensive caulking and insulating."

Vitek is cautious about making exorbitant claims for the home, but believes the savings are substantial.

"There's a lot of energy-saving done in building today, so it's hard to say exactly how much energy we're saving," he said. "But I think it would be safe to say we're saving between 50 and 75 percent over the houses that were being built 10 years ago."

Students are selected for the building trades program on the basis of

grades and positive attitudes.

"In addition, their career goal must be one of the construction trades," Vitek said. "It can include a variety of trades, ranging from architect to landscaper."

The solar-walled house on Primrose Lane is the seventh house Vitek and his students have built in his seven years with the

program.

"In the past we've been able to sell them before we were even finished with the construction," he said. "Now, with the economy in bad shape, it takes a little longer."

Another construction site serves students from Fowler and Pewamo-Westphalia schools.

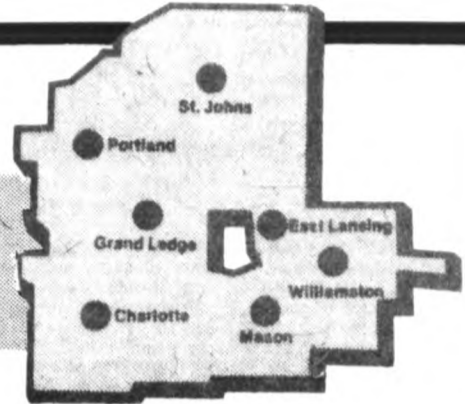

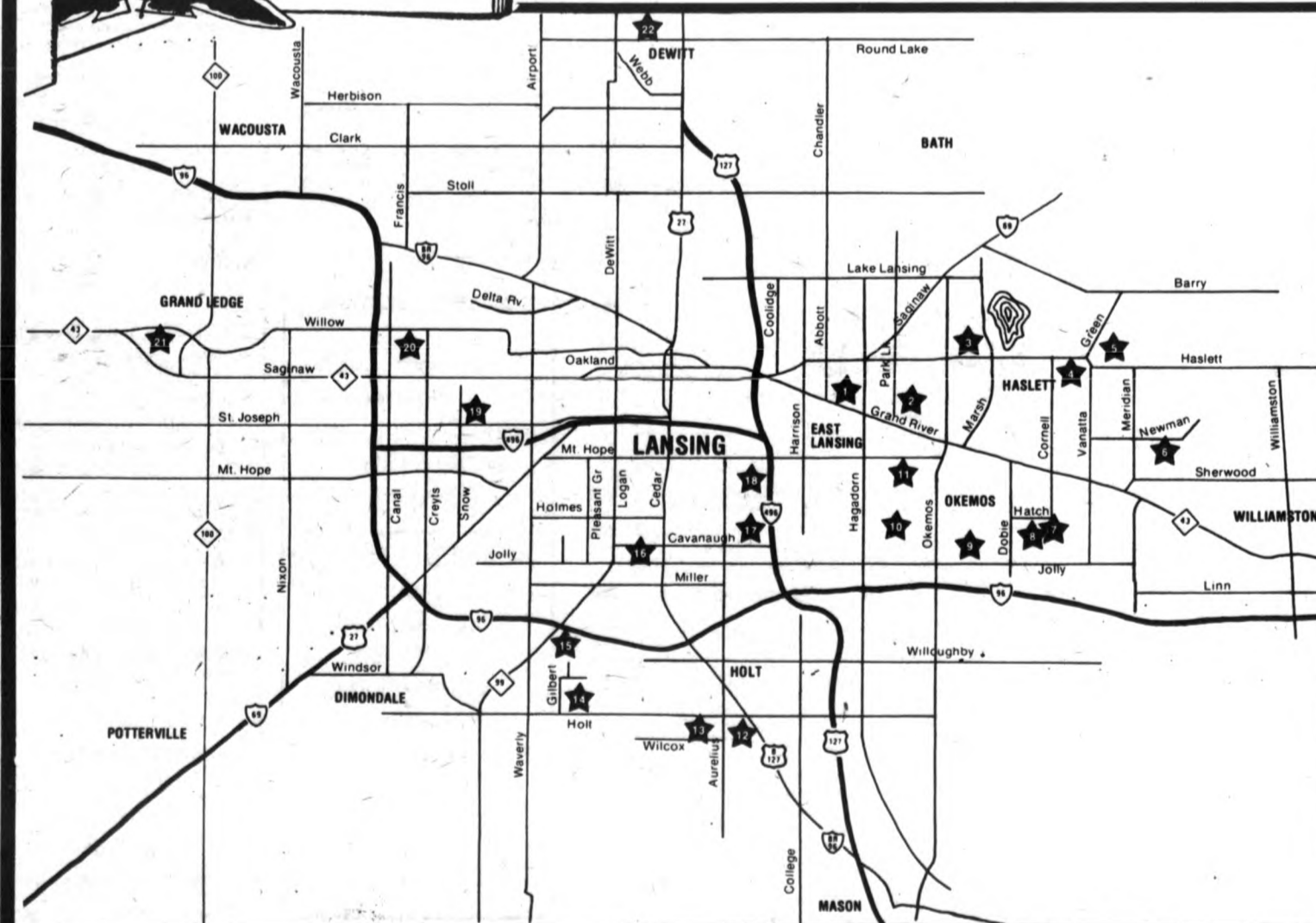
