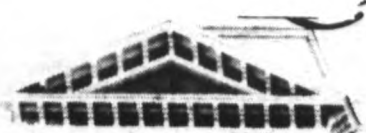

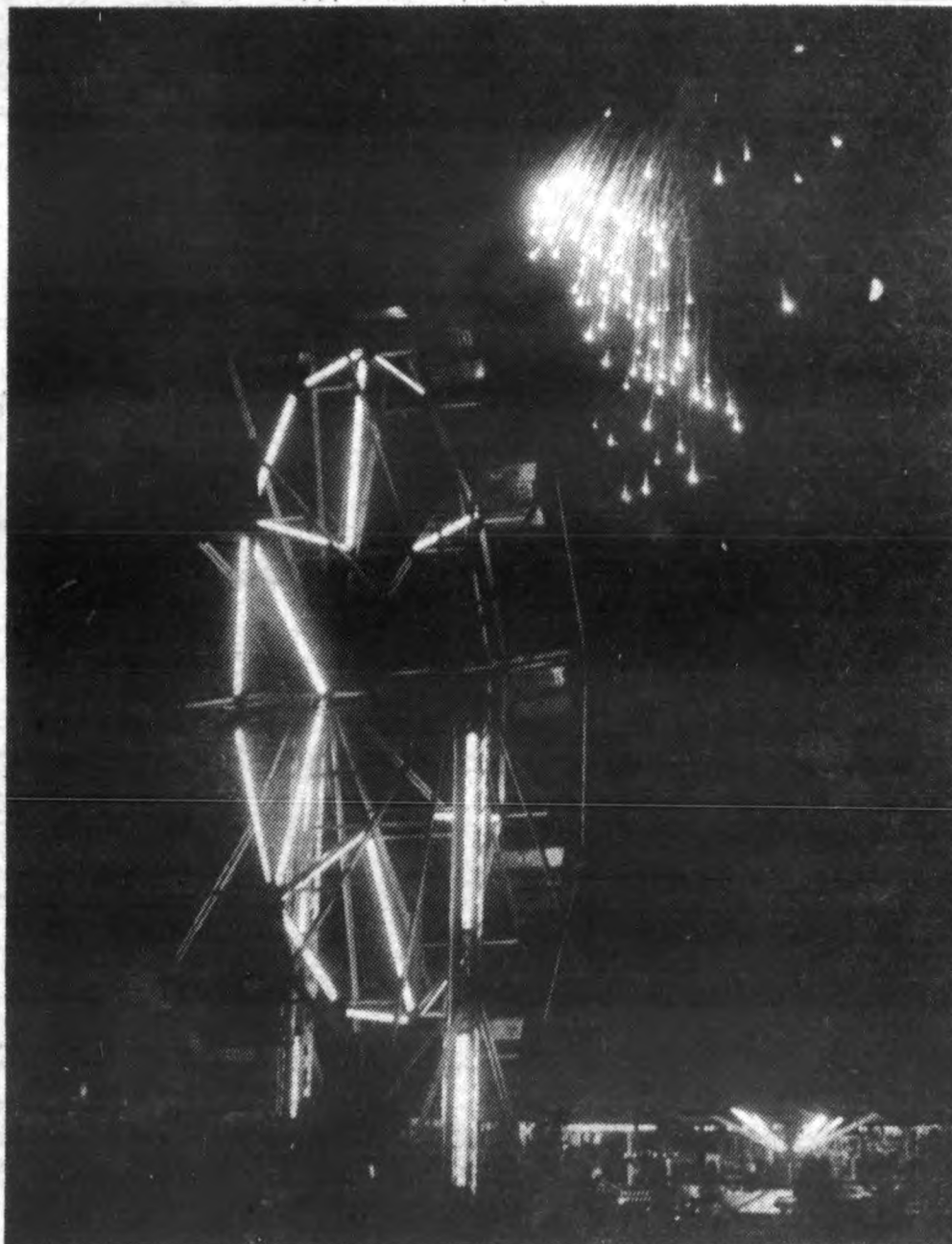

Over 70 walk out at air compressor factory

St. Johns plant shut down by UAW strike

More than 70 workers at Saylor-Beall Manufacturing Co. in St. Johns went on strike Friday, June 25, shutting down the plant's production of air compressors.

Represented by Local 925 of the United Auto Workers (UAW), Saylor-Beall hourly employees are demanding a \$1 per-hour increase in their wage from an average \$7 to \$8 per-hour.

But the Kibbee Street factory can't afford pay raises, according to Executive Vice-president Jim Leon, and "a variety of options" including relocation or sale of the plant are being considered.

"We bargained in good faith and we did open all our books to them to explain why we could not afford any increased demand in the labor rate," Leon said.

"We hope we can reach a contract and stay in operation here in St. Johns, but we have to look at our alternatives," he said. "We have been approached about selling the company."

Saylor-Beall, privately owned by majority shareholder Russell V. Allman Jr., began manufacturing air compressors in St. Johns about 36 years ago. Buyers of the stationary and portable units include major oil companies and car dealerships, Leon said.

Leon said Saylor-Beall has demanded workers accept

a wage freeze, but has also offered goals, or incentives, for increased wages. If employees met previously attained production goals, he said, they would share in the added profits under a bonus system.

But Lloyd Cain, international representative with the UAW's IC Region, Lansing Office, says Saylor-Beall can afford raises if the plant is managed more efficiently. He said the strikers' basic goal is to improve wages and fringe benefits, but there is more to their story.

"The average wage is around \$7 an hour, and you just can't raise a family on that anymore," he said. "But there are a lot of things involved in this. When our people are making from \$13,000 to \$14,000 a year, we think the salaries of their executives is pretty high."

"While they're crying poverty, they paid their top people bonuses last week."

"If anybody in here got bonuses, I don't know who in hell it was," Leon replied. "There has been no management increase in salary and there hasn't been for several years."

Leon said UAW members may have confused stock dividends with bonuses.

Cain also said the 70 to 75 union members voted "overwhelmingly" to strike because they believe the plant is mismanaged.

"Somebody in management has got to start paying attention to how that plant's run, and we're tired of paying the price," he said.

Delays in obtaining parts and poorly planned work assignments often leave workers idled for hours at a time, and unless the plant is more efficiently managed,

production goals for worker wage bonuses are a joke, Cain said.

"You just can't run a factory like some kind of dinky corner grocery store."

"We reach a controversy there," Leon responded. "Let me put it this way: In 1978 and 1979 we produced an awful lot more units than we have this year. For some reason, Mr. Cain has neglected or refused to consider our (worker incentive) plan to improve production efficiency."

Leon said he hopes to keep the doors open for negotiation. But while Cain admitted the state of the economy puts a lot more pressure on the UAW to bargain, he said "it looks as if it could be" a long strike.

City staff praised by commission

Railroad crossing improvements finally on track

St. Johns residents will soon find city streets smoother and safer, thanks to action by city commissioners Monday night, June 28, approving paving projects and installation of four new railroad crossings.

"We're very excited about the fact that we will get almost \$1 million worth of work done in the city for just \$40,000," City Manager Randy Humphrey said of railroad crossing improvements.

Funded mainly by federal grants, the new crossings on Clinton Avenue and Lansing, Ottawa and Mead streets will include new automated signals, traffic gates, street and sidewalk repair, curbs and gutters and new rubberized crossing materials on Lansing Street and Clinton Avenue.

The total cost of improvements is \$926,000, with about 90 percent — \$887,000 — paid by two federal grants, Humphreys and City Clerk Rick Coletta reported. The city's share of the improvements is \$38,300.

Bids will be taken on the project in July and work will begin in late summer, with completion expected the following spring, Coletta said.

"There's probably no more visible area of the city than those railroad tracks," he said. "Just about everyone crosses them once a day, and the picture they get of our city is not necessarily in the most favorable light."

Efforts to obtain crossing improvement grants began 10 years ago when state transportation department and Grand Trunk Railroad officials were contacted for assistance and cooperation. Vice-Mayor Don Roesner, sitting in for vacationing Mayor John Arehart, complimented city staffers for "providing the city with a safety feature badly needed," and commissioner John Hannah agreed. He offered a motion "extending deep thanks and appreciation to the city staff."

The three commissioners present — Richard Stark was also absent — also okayed a bid for more than \$56,000 worth of street paving to be done this summer. Topping the city's list of streets to be paved are Circle Drive and portions of Ross, Giles, Ottawa, Park, Lincoln, Brush and Morton.

The bid is about \$10,000 over the amount budgeted for summer paving projects, but commissioners agreed to transfer the extra money from the city's general fund. Reith Riley Construction Co. of Lansing was low bidder.

Last year, the city spent about \$100,000 on street paving and repairs, Hannah pointed out. But the 1981 paving budget was one of the biggest ever, and this year's

allocation is "quite a bit" compared what is being spent by other communities the size of St. Johns, Humphrey said.

Hannah also added that Clinton Avenue should receive top priority for next year's paving project.

Morton Street residents troubled by sewer backups also got some good news Monday night when commissioners approved a bid of \$14,639 for replacement of 355 feet of six-inch sewer pipe. The small diameter pipe is adjoined at both ends by larger eight-inch pipe and has collapsed in places, causing occasional sewer backups and many complaints from nearby residents, Coletta said. Barnhart and Son Inc. of Holt was the low bidder.

Commissioners also:

- Heard an update on repairs to the Oddfellows Building, which was nearly condemned last winter when loose bricks from the deteriorating structure were deemed a hazard to passersby. Coletta said work on the building is still not finished, but "one or two minor items" should be finished soon.

- Approved a resolution honoring city employee Marion Baker for her 10½ years of service to the city. Mrs. Baker retired from her post as assistant treasurer Wednesday, June 30.

- Set aside \$5,000 in a special Wastewater Treatment Plant Reserve Account for replacement of worn out equipment. The fund is required by the Environmental Protection Agency, which funded 75 percent of the cost of the plant, and calls for a deposit of \$55,000 next year.

- Approved the use of the Municipal Building Auditorium for a Clinton County News open house on July 22 and for use by the Clinton Memorial Hospital Auxiliary during the October, when the group plans practices for the second bi-annual "Clinton Capers."

Green removes judge

A Clinton County Judge won't hear the trial of accused multiple murderer Robert Lee Haggart after all, state officials have decided.

After ruling to disqualify a Clare County judge, Clinton County's 29th Circuit Judge Timothy Green was asked to preside during the trial of Haggart, the alleged slayer of seven in Farwell last February. But on Tuesday, state officials selected a Midland judge instead.

Green, who shares the Clinton and Gratiot County circuit with Judge Randy Tahvonen, was asked by the State Court Administrators Office to rule on a disqualification motion by Haggart's attorney.

Green ruled Friday, June 25 that 55th Circuit Clare County Judge Kurt Hansen should be disqualified from hearing Haggart's trial because Haggart had bounced a check to the judge in return for legal services back in 1973, before Hansen became judge.

Green was then asked to continue hearing the case, but by Tuesday, another judge, Tyrone Gillespe of the 42nd Circuit in

Alzner trial is delayed

Given the option of continuing over the weekend or adjourning, jurors in the second-degree murder trial of Roy Christopher Alzner opted to postpone proceedings Thursday, June 24.

Alzner, charged with the April 11, 1981 shotgun slaying of his stepfather, William Barrett, is expected to testify when the trial resumes Tuesday, July 6, 1:30 p.m., in Ithaca. Following the Tuesday session, the trial will be moved back to St. Johns, court officials said.

The trial was postponed following testimony of a defense witness near noon Thursday, when jurors were told Circuit Judge Randy Tahvonen was scheduled to hear court of appeals cases the following week, reports said. It was decided to continue with the trial at a later date rather than risk interrupting it again or the possibility the jury would be forced to deliberate throughout the weekend.

Alzner faces a maximum life sentence if found guilty of second-degree murder.

Midland, had been chosen.

No reason for the change was given, a local court spokesperson said.

Independence Day plans provide plenty of sparkle

Clinton County residents have traditionally been a patriotic people and there has probably been no way their patriotism has been shown more impressively than on the Fourth of July.

One of the County's earliest and finest celebrations took place on July 4, 1887 in DeWitt. A balloon ascension, fireworks, music by the DeWitt cornet band and a wheelbarrow race highlighted the day's activities. In the evening, residents dressed in their finest and flocked to the lavish ball given at the Clinton House.

The Fourth of July celebration in St. Johns in 1902 was also a memorable one. The fireworks were spectacular and not a single youngster got hurt by an exploding firecracker.

"The street decorations surpassed anything attempted before in St. Johns," The St. Johns News reported.

Special events started with a parade on Clinton Avenue at 11 a.m. and continued with a greased pig chase, a fat man's race and a vaudeville show.

Firecrackers were popular items in those days and A. Rosenthal offered a

variety of cannons, sky rockets and Roman candles for under 20 cents apiece.

Gaudy fireworks, however, have not always been a part of Clinton County's Independence Day celebrations. In 1924, the state fire marshal prohibited the sale of all fireworks and local residents spent the day visiting quietly with family and friends.

The ban didn't last long, however, and in 1928 the county's older citizens were complaining about the noise caused by exploding firecrackers.

In St. Johns, the city commission had prohibited the sale of fireworks until June 30 and permitted lighting them only on July 4. While area merchants gave the commission their full cooperation, the city's young people began exploding their "torpedos, fireworks, Roman candles, mines and serpents" several days early and in some instances the noise continued until 2 a.m.

July 4, 1934 found St. Johns residents buzzing about an article in the Detroit News that told how small Michigan towns celebrate the holiday.

"The Civil War cannon on the courthouse square in St. Johns," the story read, "was once shot off on the Fourth with the result that all the windows on Clinton Avenue were shattered."

The early 1940s were quiet ones in terms of July 4 celebrations. Americans were involved in the war effort and most of their energies were directed toward supporting American troops overseas.

The 1950s saw a return to a more jubilant atmosphere on Independence Day. Richard "Sonny" Cornwell was in charge of the St. Johns celebration in 1953 and festivities featured fireworks, greased pole contests and a tug of war. Matthews Ice Cream was giving away American flags with each half-gallon purchase, while local grocery stores were encouraging residents to go on picnics and take with them some smoked hams on sale for approximately 45 cents a pound and watermelon that was priced at \$1.19 apiece.

Recent years have in no way diminished the enthusiasm area residents exhibit on Independence

Day. In 1968, for example, an estimated 3,000 people attended the fireworks display on the high school athletic field in St. Johns and Police Chief Everett Glazier was delighted by the excellent behavior of the crowds.

Fourth of July celebrations in the county promise to be just as impressive in 1982 as in previous years and, as has happened fre-

quently in the past, most activities will be taking place in St. Johns.

Sponsored by the St. Johns Rotary Club, the official celebration begins on Thursday, July 1 with a carnival at the high school parking lot. Featuring rides, games, food and souvenirs, the carnival continues through July 5.

Balloon ascensions are scheduled for both Sunday and Monday at 6:30 p.m. at

the high school, while a country western show starring Jay Lee Webb will be held on Monday at 3 and 7 p.m. at the high school auditorium.



Use care on 4th, buckle seat belts

Living on the banks of one of Michigan's mightiest rivers of concrete and cars, Clinton County residents have a sober appreciation of the sheer numbers of travelers who take to the roads on holiday weekends. Those who commute US-27 at relative ease most of the year, find themselves congested among the hurrying herd when holidays like next weekend arrive.

During peak periods of traffic Friday, sitting at a US-27 intersection in St. Johns or DeWitt, it will sometimes be hard to believe the entire City of Lansing has not spilled forth in a determined rush to flee north. By Monday, it is all too evident the exodus is only a temporary one, as the flood of "fudgies" is reversed and most return home, presumably rested.

Most, that is, except for the few killed or maimed in traffic accidents during holiday weekends. Compared to the thousands who travel Michigan's highways during the Fourth of July weekend, a dozen or so deaths are merely a handful, right?

Not for victims and their families. For anyone even remotely involved, one accident is far too many.

If the number seems small, however, we can thank our Michigan State Police. The state police have done a remarkable job reducing traffic fatalities in recent years through Operation Care. This year, they will have the aid of National Guard helicopters to boost the efforts of patrolmen logging more than 3,000 hours of overtime. But like all state budgets, the budget for Operation Care has been cut, forcing troopers to do the same job with limited resources.

Luckily, they are aided by volunteers and, perhaps more important, improved public awareness. Memorial Day accident totals were some of the lowest ever, even with Care patrols trimmed back. We hope the reason is that more people are taking traffic safety more seriously.

Increased concern about drinking drivers indicates people are finally beginning to realize accidents happen to everyone, not just "the other guy."

But although most serious accidents are alcohol related, blaming drinkers is not enough. There is no longer any doubt that more injuries and traffic deaths can be prevented by proper use of passenger restraints. If you don't believe it, just try asking the 22 who died in July 4th holiday accidents last year: none of them were wearing seat belts.

School budget \$8 million

Next year's budget and a search for a new superintendent headlined the agenda for a Wednesday, June 23 meeting of the St. Johns School Board, and board members got some bad news about roof repairs at an elementary school.

Board members approved the proposed 1982-83 budget which projects total revenue at just over \$8 million. The \$8,043,207 budget is about \$122,000 higher than last year's \$7,921,190.

The main reason for the increase is new tax revenue from Suntree Apartments — about \$41,000 — and increased property tax assessments brought about by an increase in the State Equalized Value (SEV) of all property in the district.

But while the SEV rose by about nine or 10 percent, school revenues did not, due mainly to cuts in aid to education by the state, Controller Rick Terres pointed out.

"The major difference in the budget is the increase in the SEV," he said, "minus the executive order cuts."

Included in the new budget is about \$133,000 in cash and roughly \$425,000 in inventory left over from last year, he said.

Residents present at the meeting questioned board members as to how the budget would effect employee wages. "Is there an increase?" Susan Pouch asked. Teachers and other employee groups are negotiating new contracts, but raises aren't included in the budget, which assumes a freeze in salaries and fringe benefits, board members said.

Two new board members elected June 14, Peter Apostle and Thomas Irrer, were present for discussion of the superintendent search.

Both Central Michigan University and Michigan State University (MSU) have offered services to the board which would

provide a selection of candidates for superintendent. The only cost to the board would be for a dinner meeting to discuss the prospects, according to reports.

The Michigan School Board Association has also offered to help in the search. Irrer, proposed that both MSU and the school board association be asked to meet with the board and explain their credentials before a decision is made. Board members then passed a motion to invite representatives of both groups to an organizational meeting set for July 2, at noon.

Bad news for school district finances was reported by Gordon Vandemark relating to roofing on Swegles school. The original estimate given to the board of \$800 has now been revised upward to \$11,900, an increase of \$11,100. Vandemark, administrator for non-instructional services, told board members the unwelcome surprise resulted from more serious damage to the roof than first estimated.

Apparently the original roof consists of more wood than usual, making the entire roof more vulnerable to rot and deterioration. Vandemark said he couldn't say if it was the fault of the original builder.

Two bids were given to Vandemark by Mills Construction and Sherriff-Goslin. Vandemark recommended that the board accept the Sherriff-Goslin bid of \$11,900, with a 10-year guarantee. The motion was accepted and one-half mill is already available to cover the increase, board members were told.

The board concluded the agenda by accepting the resignations of high school teachers Art Peterson and Diane Knight.

The 8 p.m. meeting was adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

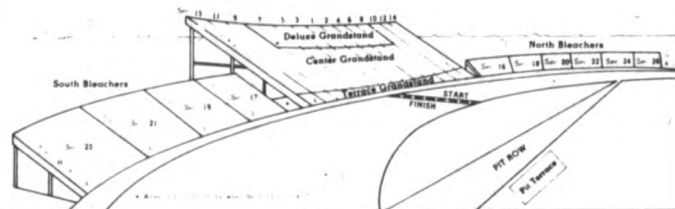

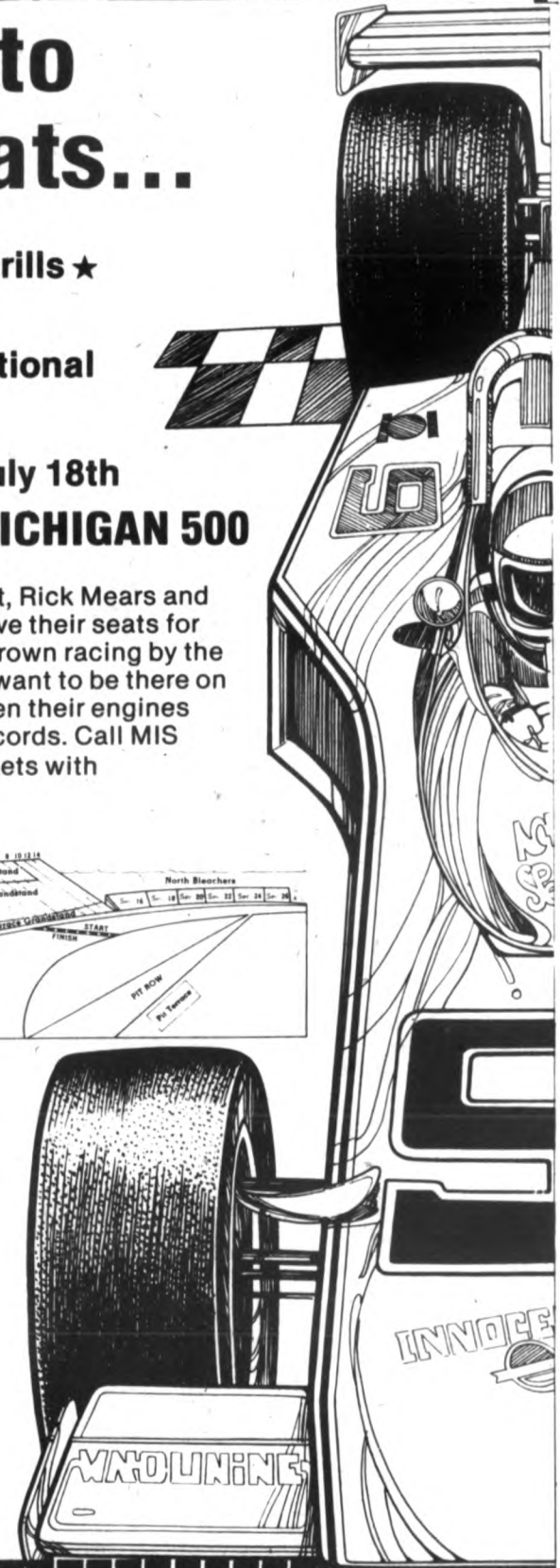

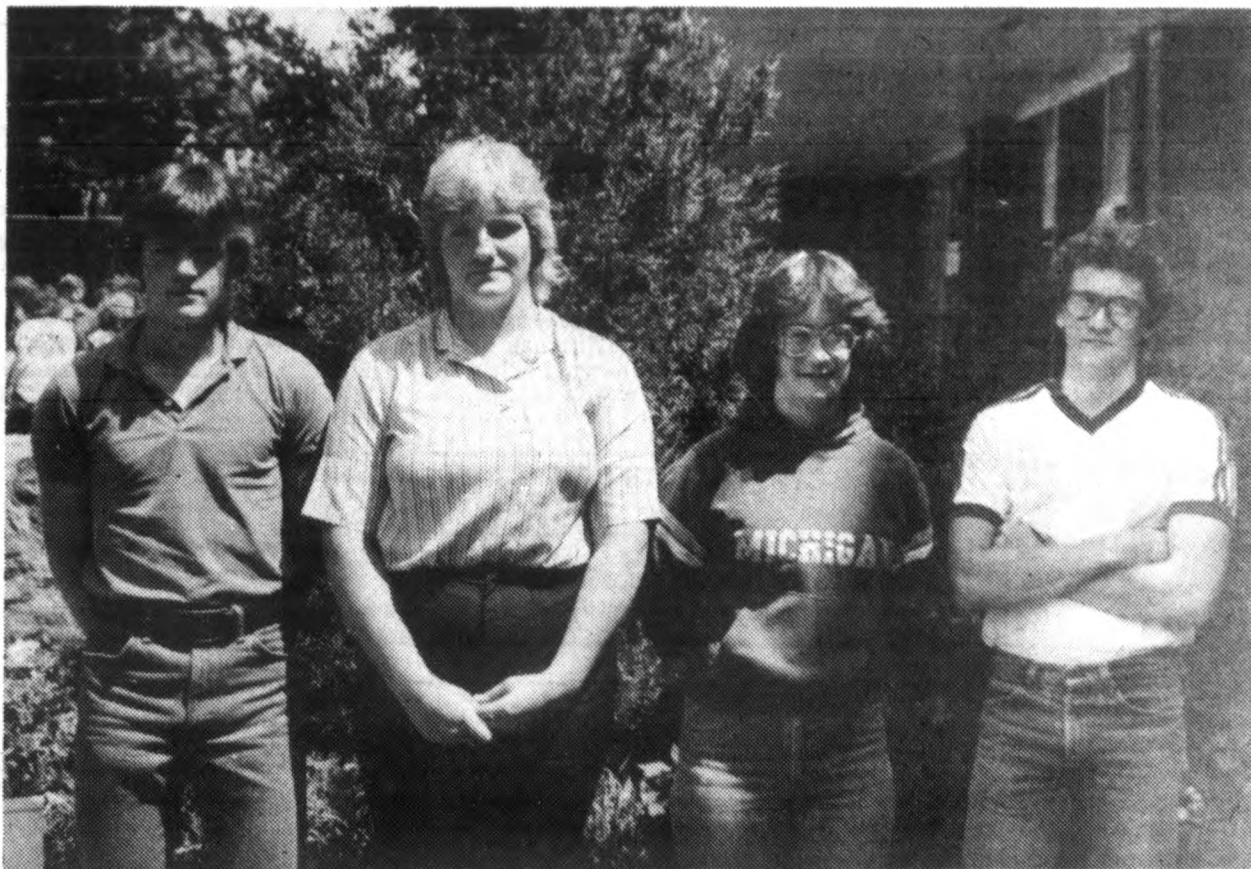

RECALL OF TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR

1) Richard Brook has employed unfair and inequitable practices in assessing property in the township in that he specifically lowered the assessed value of his own property and selectively raised the assessed values of certain other properties at lesser rates and by methods different from the rates and methods used in the assessment of all other property in the township.

2) Richard Brook has constantly and continually participated in violations of the Michigan Open Meetings Act and the statute governing special meetings of township boards, being section 7(D) of Public Acts 359 of 1947, as amended, which restricts the business that a township board may transact at a special meeting to that business stated in the notice of such meeting. Specifically at a special meeting of the township board held on December 14, 1981, which was called for the purpose of discussing zoning problems, the board, in absence of one member, appointed Brook, township assessor and set his salary, although the notice of such meeting did not state such business would be undertaken.

3) Richard Brook authorized installation of a meter for a use prohibited by township ordinance. Informed of its illegality on December 22, 1981, he allowed this violation to continue.

JUSTIFICATION STATEMENT OF RICHARD BROOK:

In all property reassessments, I used consistent methods which were in accordance with state tax laws and procedures. The reappraisal of my property, as an LCC classroom assignment, brought to my attention many other errors on property cards, mistakes made in past appraisals. This knowledge led to 330 changes in assessment, as verified by the Board of Review. True assessment has not yet been completed, and it will take at least two years for total evaluation to bring about benefits to the taxpayers.

In compliance with the Open Meetings Act, all agendas and certifications of posting for all township board meetings, special or regular, were done in accordance with the law and are on file with the township clerk. In accordance with state statute, upon certification by the state, the township supervisor is the qualified assessor if he so desires. Thus my appointment was only a public formality and, as such, was verified by the township attorney.

The mobile home park water meter, though installed, was never used to determine sewer charges. This matter will come before the Sewer Appeals Board. Bath Township did not lose one penny on his meter matter.

ZUCCHINI YEAST ROLLS

½ c. zucchini, cooked and mashed
¼ c. sugar
¼ c. shortening
½ tsp. salt
½ c. scalded milk
½ cake compressed yeast
¼ c. lukewarm water
2½ c. flour

Combine squash, sugar, salt and shortening with milk. Heat to lukewarm. Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water and add to milk mixture. Add flour and mix well. Dough will be soft. Let rise in warm room until double in bulk. Knead and shape into pan rolls and let rise again in warm place. Bake in a 400 degree oven for 15 to 20 minutes.
