More than half of mall sites sold

The first grand openings at St. Johns new \$9 million Southpoint Mall are only a month away, and about half of the 190,000 square feet of store space available is already taken, the Clinton County News has learned.

More than 850 applicants lined up in hopes of landing about 90 to 100 jobs at a new Goff grocery store which is slated to open "sometime in August," owner Walt Goff of Haslett said. Last March, Goff said he expected the store to be open by July 4th. But contacted Monday, June 28, Goff said normal construction delays have pushed the opening back, and plans are "on schedule" for August.

Along with Fisher's Big Wheel, which is already open, the 25,000 square foot Goff store is one of the mall's "anchor tenants," developer Gordon Long says. The \$1 million food store, financed with aid from the Clinton County Economic Development Corporation (EDC), will resemble Goff's new Haslett store more than the East Lansing Carriage Hills supermarket he purchased from Shop Rite, he said.

Not including aid to Goff's store, the \$9.2 million shopping mall received \$8.7 million in low-interest, tax-free financing from the EDC, which is authorized by state law to issue bonds to projects that provide local jobs and increase local tax revenue.

Long, whose other Lansing developments have run into financing problems, could not be reached for comment on the Southpoint project. But a leasing agent for the project told the Clinton County News "about half" of the available space has been committed. Among the businesses which will locate in the new mall, the agent said, are a national health food chain store, pizza shop, beauty shop, barber shop, travel agency, sandwich shop and furniture store.

Long also predicted last March that the mall would open by July 4th, but stores were still under construction by that date and openings did not appear imminent. Long did not respond to requests for comments by phone, however, and no opening dates were available.

Corn 'head-high' by Fourth

Thanks to good weather and June rains, Clinton County farmers had no trouble raising corn "knee-high by the Fourth of July."

"Some of it will be over my head by the Fourth," Don Sisung, Clinton County Farm Bureau president said a few days before Independence Day. "Corn and soybeans are off to a beautiful start."

If hot weather and intermittent rains continue through July and August, local farmers will harvest "an excellent spring crop," Sisung said.

Roger Lurg, who farms about 450 acres on Round Lake Road in the DeWitt and Bath area, agreed. "Corn is looking very good," he said. "It will all be surpassing knee-high by the Fourth."

Lurg said beans and soybeans are doing well locally also, although other Michigan farmers' crops have been damaged by hail.

Sisung said the good performance of corn and beans is mainly due to hot and humid weather. But the same weather is not so good for harvesting hay, which has been too wet to bale, Lurg said. And both agreed local wheat crops will not be as good as expected this year.

"The wheat is pretty shabby in our county," Sisung said. "The real cold winter caused winter-kill damage, and the dry April didn't help any. Fields are spotty and they're saying we'll get 80 percent yield, but I'll be surprised if we get that much."

Sisung, who farms 850 acres near St. Johns in partnership with his brother, Charles, said although cash crop yields will be high in most areas, prices are too low to promise much in the way of profits for farmers. Lurg, who also runs a dairy cattle operation and farms in partnership with his father, Lavern, agreed that although crops look healthy, prices "are a whole different story."

"It looks like we'll have a good year yield-wise, but price-wise, right now it doesn't look too good," Sisung said. "It's kind of discouraging for cash crop farmers because there isn't one cash crop they can sit down and pencil out a profit on."

Livestock, on the other hand, is doing quite well, Sisung said, and along with dairy farmers, raisers of

hogs and cattle are making profits. Sisung raises both, and says he's glad he has diversified his farming operation.

"Hogs and steers are doing real well, which is a big change for our operation this year. Our hogs have been in red ink for the last three years."

Sisung said he expects to begin combining wheat by the third week in July.

Crops plentiful, but profits aren't

The farming industry, a major factor in Mid-Michigan's economic health, is producing more than ever, but the record-breaking production is not paying off.

Experts and long-time observers of the Tri-County farming industry say the dilemma has already hurt many, and unless financial pressure is alleviated soon, many farm owners will suffer serious financial setbacks, even foreclosure.

Bill Henquinet, president of the Lansing Production Credit Association said, "Next spring is going to be a pivotal time for the farmer economically."

The credit association last year accounted for 52 percent — \$129 million — of all the short-term operational loans to farmers in the eight-county area surrounding Lansing. Because of the difficult economic times, it has in several instances made special accommodations on outstanding loans to keep local farmers afloat in rough economic seas, Henquinet said.

This financial pressure exists alongside remarkable production statistics, say experts.

Commissioners ponder more cells for jail

Clinton County's jail must once again pass state inspection if it is to remain a "real" jail.

The Clinton County Board of Commissioners at its June 29 meeting directed the criminal justice committee to explore different alternatives to achieving state approval for its jail facility.

On December 30, 1980 the jail passed a state inspection that allowed the facility to operate as a full-time jail for a two-year period. Failure to pass would have meant that the facility could have only housed a prisoners for a 72-hour period and then would have had to transfer them elsewhere. State approval for the jail expires at the beginning of 1983.

Since 1980 there have been a bevy of proposals and suggestions for improving the third oldest operating jail in the state.

Space problems have recently pressured commissioners to come up with a plan that would increase the current jail size. Currently, there are 18 prisoners the county is "farming out" to other detention facilities at a cost of between \$25 and \$30 a day because there is no room at the local jail.

"We've already spent \$20,315 for boarding out prisoners in the first five months this year," county administrator Bill LeFevere said. "The total may be \$50,000 before the end of the year. It's more than we anticipated."

LeFevere said that adding additional cell space would undoubtedly enhance the county's chances of receiving approval from the state corrections department, but that it was not necessarily essential.

Attempts to gain funding to construct a new jail have consistently been turned down by county voters and it does not appear likely commissioners will ask voters to approve additional millage for jail construction.

"I don't see a millage issue being passed by voters at this time," County Commission Chairman Roger Over-

way said.

LeFevere agreed. "I think any additions to the jail would come out of the general fund," he said. "I can't see us asking for additional millage."

Sheriff Anthony Hufnagel has already drawn up a plan for a 42 by 36 foot addition to the existing jail. Commissioner Harold Martin estimated Hufnagel's proposal would cost approximately \$225,000.

Overway said he was thinking of a somewhat smaller addition and suggested an architect be consulted.

LeFevere said that he is in the process of looking for architects who have had experience in the area of designing jails.

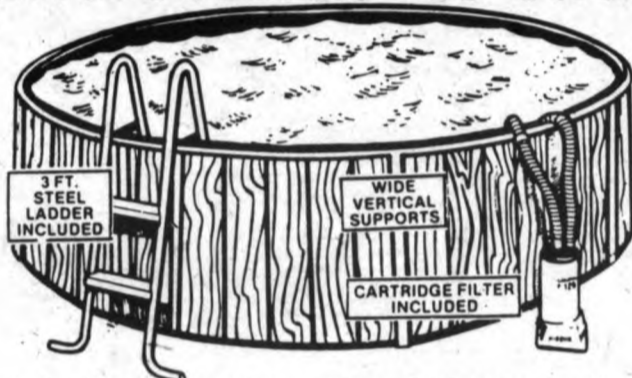

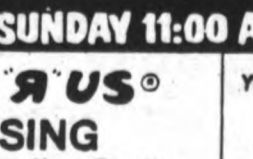

Bath boy drowns in Lake Lansing Park

A safe, accident-free July 4 was celebrated within Clinton County, according to local law enforcement agency reports, but a county family visiting Lake Lansing was not so fortunate.

• Ian Allen McNitt, 4, son of James and Kathleen McNitt of 5781 Sleight Rd., Bath, drowned while swimming with his twin sister and a six-year-old brother at Lake Lansing Park South near 5 p.m. Sunday, Meridian Township Police reports said.

Reports said the child became separated from his brother and sister and was reported missing by his mother at 5:04 p.m. A human chain was formed and the boy's body was found in about four and one-half feet of water just outside safety ropes at the swimming area, reports said. Attempts to revive him by swimmers and a doctor at the scene were unsuccessful and the child was pronounced dead on arrival at Sparrow Hospital.

• Clinton County law enforcement agencies, meanwhile, reported few complaints and no serious injuries or accidents resulting from fireworks or other causes during the July 4 weekend.

• Two Fowler residents were injured in an accident July 2, Clinton County Sheriff reports said. Reports said Gary William McNamara and passenger David Lee Thurston were taken to Clinton Memorial Hospital following the accident at the intersection of French and Jones roads. McNamara lost control of the motorcycle they were riding and ran off the road, striking trees, reports said.

Thurston was transferred to Sparrow Hospital the same day for treatment of leg injuries, and McNamara was discharged July 4, a hospital spokesperson said.

• Parr's Drug Store in Maple Rapids was broken into June 29, Clinton County Sheriff reports said. Finding the front door pried open, deputies discovered nothing in the store had been taken.


Reports said a witness said he heard an alarm go off, looked out his window and saw a subject run from the store. The witness gave chase in his vehicle, but lost the suspect.

• Stereo equipment and a television valued at about \$1,500 were taken in a break-in at the residence of Debra Jean Dickens of Elsie on July 1, Clinton County Sheriff reports said.



Geneologically speaking

Florin and Phyllis Preece of Everton Publishers, a husband and wife team of teaching geneologists, were guest speakers at a recent all day seminar in Corunna hosted by the Shiawassee County Geneological Society.

After coffee and donuts, Susan Bettys of that organization introduced speakers who presented a concise basic program for beginning research.

They suggested everyone should have the following booklets available for a nominal fee from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402: "Where to Write for Birth and Death Records," "Where to Write for Marriage Records," and "Where to Write for Divorce Records."

There are seven basic searches for information and they differ from country to country. In European countries the state church prevails so church records are a basic record there. They are not in the United States, though as a supplemental record they contain much valuable information which is not available anywhere else. For instance, prior to 1867, vital statistics records were not required to be kept in Michigan. But through church records of baptisms we can find birth dates, names of parents, etc. Church records also contain death dates in burial records and dates of marriages.

The Catholic Church, beginning in 1541, required all parishes to keep a parish register of all baptisms, marriages and burials. These records are an invaluable tool to researchers because of the lack of civil records for the next 300 years or so.

What we call vital statistics — birth, death and marriage records — are called civil registrations in all other countries.

The seven basic searches are civil registrations; censuses; churches; land records, including deeds, mortgages and tax lists; probate records; military records; family records.

Supplemental records include, but are not limited to, cemetery records, shipping lists, newspapers, family Bible, school records, diaries, journals and licenses.

Before beginning research, we should ask ourselves four questions: 1. Do we know all of the surnames and variants of it? 2. Do we know all places of residence of the ancestral family? 3. What period of time did our ancestral family live in each place? 4. What type of records were created during this time and where are they today?

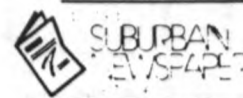

Chamber notes

The cliché about the reactions of the "tough" is so worn out I won't use it, but St. Johns business owners are doing something to combat this tough economy. They are pitching in and getting things done at an amazing pace.

Bill Bennett of Bennett's Jewelry is one such businessman. Bill was chairman of the Christmas Committee last year. Instead of holding a contest or more typical retail promotion, he decided he wanted to raise money and purchase Christmas decorations for the city.

Community Christmas decorations are expensive and there were many who said that in these economic times, the campaign would never get off the ground. Bill and his committee went to Frankenmuth and bought decorations, then they went to local businesses collecting money to pay for them. They were able to pay for about half of the decorations in December and they had pledged to cover most of the balance. Since business times have not been the greatest, the committee decided a fund-raiser might work out better than trying to collect the promised donations. After contacting the St. Johns Reminder and WTK Radio Station owners, the idea for an auction took shape. It was aired on the radio during Michigan Week. Farmers reap meager profits on bumper harvests

"The U.S. farmer will produce enough food for himself and 70 others," said Sylvan Wittwer. The ever-greater yield of American farms set records for corn and wheat production last year, explained Wittwer, who is director of the Michigan State University Agricultural Experiment Station.

So where's the problem? Why are many farmers throughout the U.S., and right here in the Tri-County area, either hard-pressed to stay in business, or having to sell out altogether?

A big reason, said Wittwer, is the vast resource inputs necessary to farmers' impressive output: machinery, land, water, energy, and the money tied up in those resources.

"The reason American agriculture is in such a bind today is not the prices, but the cost of those inputs and the cost of credit," Wittwer declared.

The double whammy of high interest rates and low prices is taking its toll on what in the 1970s was a booming business nationwide and in Michigan. And in the counties of Ingham, Eaton and Clinton the effects have not been minor, as approximately two-thirds of this area's land is used for agriculture, officials estimate.

The experience of Mid-Michigan farmers has been no worse nor better than those of the country in general, most experts agree. In the words of Roger Betz, Clinton County Cooperative Extension Agent, "People are really just kind of surviving and just plan on making it through."

Not everyone is making it through. Ingham agricultural agent Roger Morrison cited several examples of farmers having to auction off their equipment and livestock this year: "These people are going out of business, not because they're going to retire, or because there's been a death in the family or anything. They're just plain having to get out because of lack of profits."

Auctioneer Bill Stanton of Vermontville said he's conducted from 10 to 15 farm auctions this year, which he thinks might be just a slight increase from last year. However, the word he gets from those he deals with is that things will get worse.

"I think those that sold out were down to the point where they could no longer continue and were asked to sell out before they were foreclosed by the lending institution," Stanton said.

Eaton County extension agent George McQueen said he knows of "very few forced sales so far this year...probably no more than normal." However, he added, "I suspect there is a fair number of farmers on the

edge...If we have another bad year for those farmers, I'm sure we'll see a number of close-outs."

Farm income has been characterized by fluctuations over the years, but the present situation is unusual in that "practically all types of farms in agriculture are down," said MSU extension agent Myron Kelsey. Further, the income swings "are getting wider and wider," Kelsey said. "We're pulling out the programs we've had that have essentially stabilized agricultural prices."

The farm income slump has sent ripples into other industries such as farm equipment manufacturers. For instance, sales are down this year at International Harvester, said Jerry Rigelman, business manager for the Lansing district. Despite company programs to help farmers finance purchases, many farmers are waiting to see how their crops come in, and how the prices go, before buying new equipment, Rigelman said.

The result, Rigelman added, is "a pent-up need for equipment...There'll be a day when you'll (newspaper reporter) be calling and asking, 'What about this shortage of equipment?'"

Farmers were not waiting before buying in the early and later 1970s, when farm income was strong and investment was heavy. Some farmers over-extended themselves, going heavily into debt but relying on the value of their land to keep ahead of interest rates, explained MSU's Kelsey. When inflation slowed down and interest rates soared in 1980, those who made heavy investments on a tight cash flow "got caught," Kelsey said.

One area farmer committed suicide after getting stuck with high investment, Kelsey said. His wife auc-

tioned off the livestock and equipment but has been unable to sell the land, he said.

Another group particularly hard-hit has been younger farmers, and agents cited examples of area farmers unable to carry on their family farm operations.

"Any younger farmer is in a lot worse situation than an older farmer because interest rates make it a lot harder to buy land or machinery," said Betz. If land is bought at \$1,000 an acre at 15 percent interest, that means \$150 in interest per acre, while an acre of corn will only gross \$250, he pointed out.

The burden of high interest has shown up in delinquent loan payments; according to Morrison, the Farmers' Home Administration recently reported that one-third of its Michigan loans are delinquent.

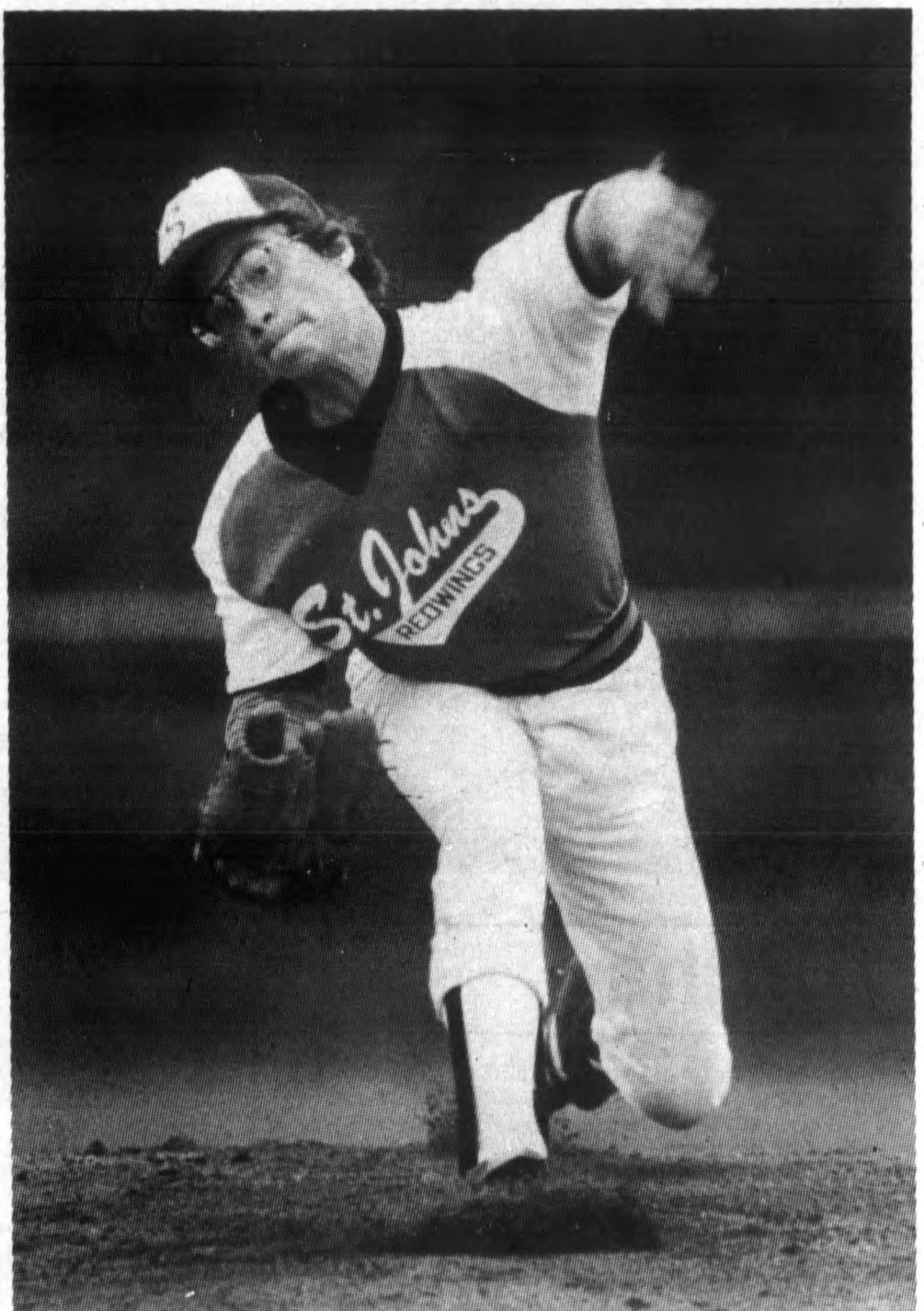

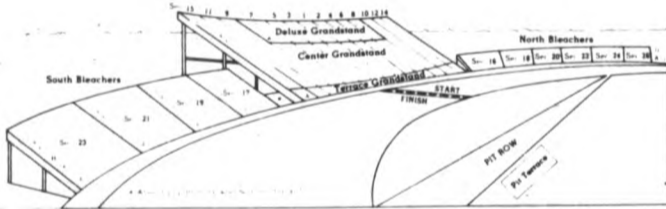

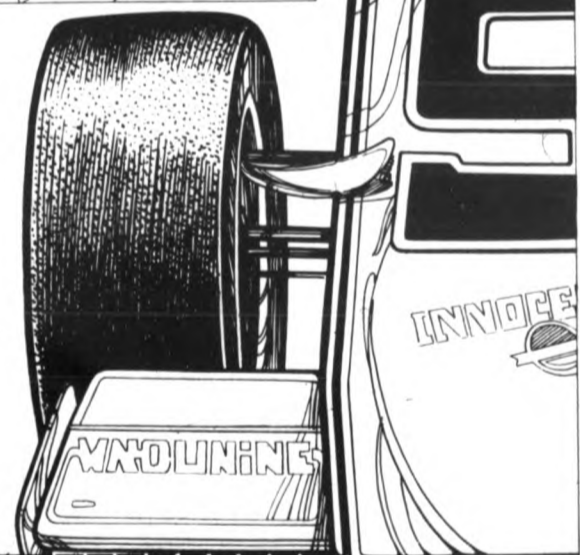

Craig elected president of St. Johns school board

Three-year board member Robert Craig was elected president of the St. Johns Board of Education during a special meeting Friday, July 2.

During the noon organizational meeting, board members elected a slate of officers and decided not to change their regular meeting dates from the traditional

second Wednesday of each month, at 8 p.m.

Craig replaces former Board President Ron Huard, who did not seek re-election. Other board officers were not changed. Neil Barnhart was re-elected vice-president, Lee Ormston was re-elected secretary, and Leonard Puetz was re-elected treasurer.

Two new board members were present for the meeting, Peter Apostol and Thomas Irrer. They won seats on the board in a June 14 election, replacing Huard and incumbent Paul Maples, who was defeated in his bid for re-election.

"It will be an exciting year," Craig said. "Our main goal will be to maintain the level of quality education for the kids in our district."

Craig, commodity activities and research department manager at Michigan Farm Bureau in Lansing, said the remaining year of his first four-year term on the board will be demanding. He cited present bargaining with teachers and other employee groups, plus the search for a new superintendent to replace Donald Burns, who retires in January.

Craig said the search for Burns' replacement will be opened up to applicants recruited with the aid of the Michigan Association of School Boards and Michigan State University.

More than 100 applicants, both from within the school system and from elsewhere, are expected to apply, he said.

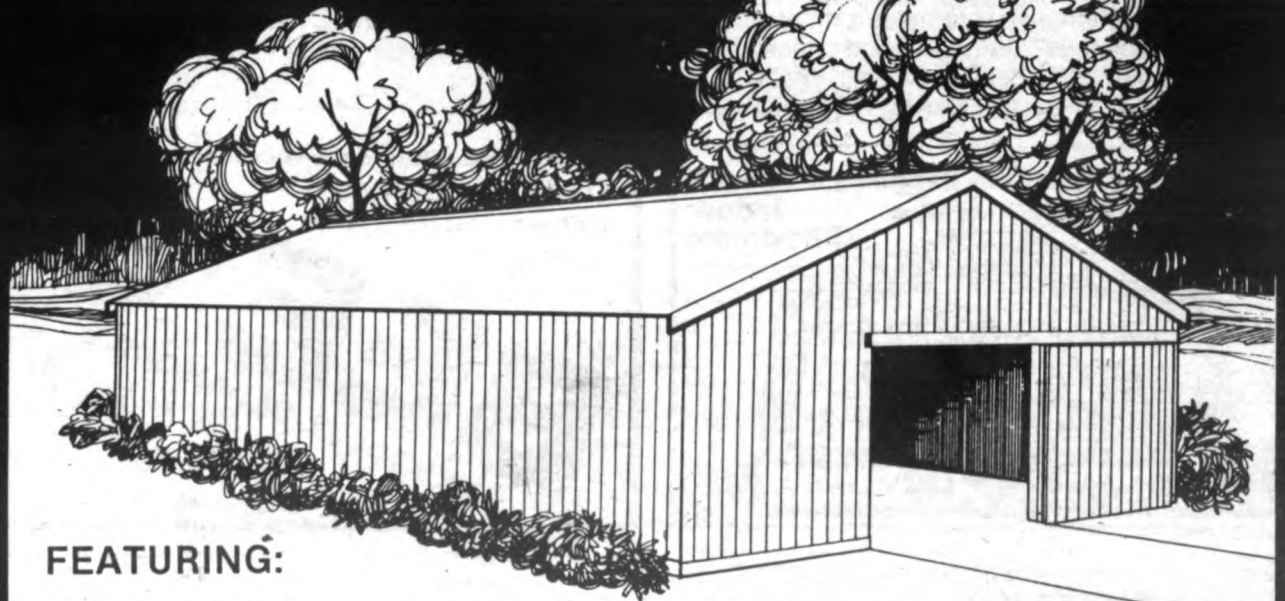

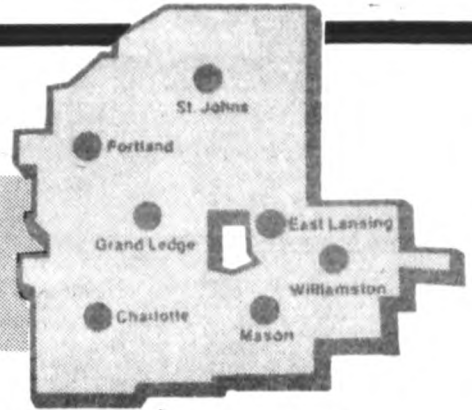

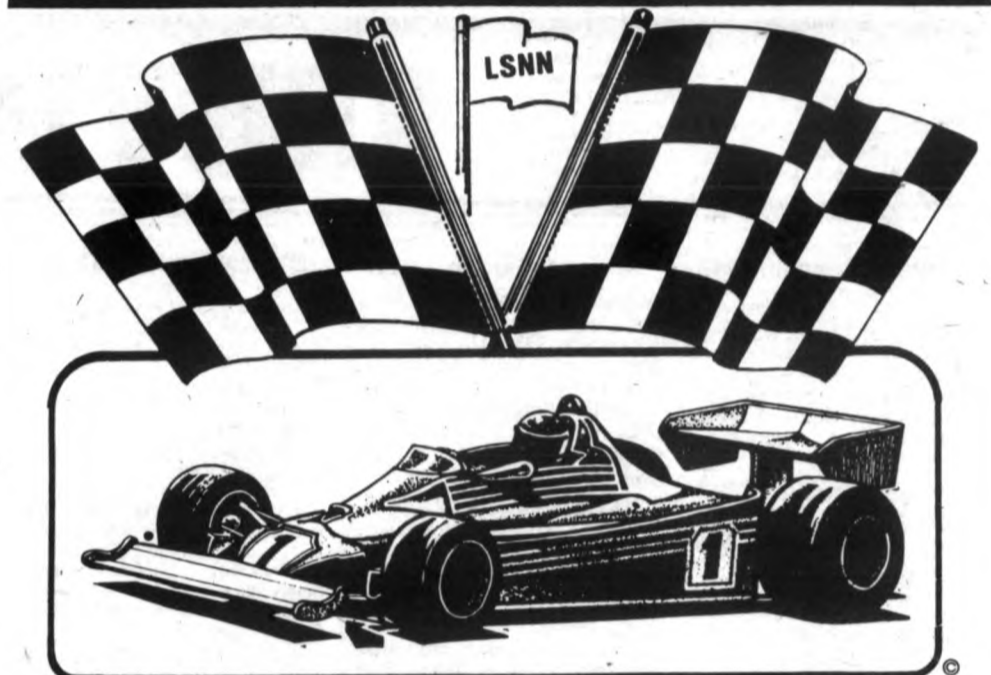

EASY DEEP-DISH PIZZA

If you haven't tried the Bisquick recipes for crusts, you really should. The crust on this pizza is delicious and easy.

3 c. Bisquick baking mix
¾ c. water
1 pound lean ground beef
½ c. chopped onion
2 to 3 tsp. Instant Beef Bouillon
2 cloves garlic, crushed
1 can (15 oz.) tomato sauce
1 tsp. dried oregano
1 jar (4½ oz.) sliced mushrooms, drained
½ c. chopped green pepper
2 c. shredded Mozzarella cheese (8 oz.)
Heat oven to 425 degrees. Lightly grease jelly roll pan that is 15½ x 10½ x 1 inch in size. Mix baking mix and water until soft dough forms. Pat dough in bottom and up sides of pan with well floured hands. Cook and stir ground beef, onion, bouillon and garlic until beef is brown and bouillon is dissolved. Mix tomato sauce and oregano, spread evenly over dough. Spoon beef mixture evenly over sauce. Top with mushrooms, green pepper and cheese. Bake until crust is golden brown, about 20 minutes. Serves 8.

DELUXE PORK BURGERS

Remember you can do everything with ground pork that you can do with ground beef. Mixing the two is an improvement for many recipes.

1 lb. lean ground pork
1 c. soft bread crumbs
1 can (3 oz.) chopped mushrooms, drained
½ c. chopped onion fine
½ c. (2 oz.) shredded process Swiss cheese
4 slices tomato
Alfalfa sprouts
celery salt
Combine ground pork and bread crumbs. Shape pork mixture into 8 three and a half inch patties. In small bowl, combine mushrooms, onion and cheese. Spoon about ¼ c. mushroom mixture onto half of the patties. Cover with remaining patties; press edges to seal. Place patties on rack in broiler pan. Broil at moderate temperature 3 to 4 inches from heat until browned, about 5 minutes. Turn; broil until patties are done, about 5 minutes. During last 2 minutes of broiling time, broil tomato slices alongside patties until heated through. Top each patty with alfalfa sprouts and broiled tomato slice. Season to taste with celery salt. Serves 4.

'Action Auction' takes aim Sunday at child abuse

Child abuse is like a communicable disease in the Tri-County area; it's spreading in epidemic proportions, and it weakens the mind and the body, according to Sharon Shay, director of the Council for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect.

"There were 2,100 cases of reported child abuse in Ingham, Eaton and Clinton counties last year," Shay said.

"On the average, about one third of all cases go unreported, however," she said.

Shay's disease analogy with child abuse goes a step further. Just as some people inherit a tendency for some illnesses, the child abuse pattern is often passed from adults to children.

"Research consistently shows that 80 percent of abusive and neglectful parents were mistreated by their own parents," according to figures made public last week by council officials.

According to the council, 90 percent of state prison inmates were severely mistreated or neglected as children.



The word epidemic does have a parallel with communicable diseases; if one percent of a populace is infected by a disease, then the disease is considered an epidemic — child abuse and neglect has reached that level, according to Shay.

According to council officials, experts estimate that 15 to 20 percent have been physically abused, neglected or sexually exploited by adults on whom they depend for basic physical and emotional needs," says a council spokesperson.

"In the 1950s, the prime health threat to children was polio. Fortunately, we focused on immunizations, as well as iron lungs, we'd still be trying to keep up with the cases," Shay said.

Shay and the council are attempting to spread this information to the public as part of public relations program designed to interest people in what council officials hope will become a major fundraising event for the organization.

This Sunday the five-year old group will conduct an auction, entitled "Action Auction," and chicken barbecue in hopes of raising about \$3,000 for treatment and prevention programs.

Starting at 1 p.m. in Wonch Park off Okemos Road in Okemos, the event will auction off close to 100 items. Included is everything from two season tickets to the BoarsHead Theater to the neutering of a dog or a cat.

Barbecued chicken, chips, coleslaw and drinks will be sold, too. Those wanting to inspect items to be auctioned may do so beginning at noon.

"We wanted to create one big fundraiser, and we hope to make it an annual event in order to stir interest...many people have already shown interest; many business owners have donated services and supplies," Shay said.

Child abuse problems are caused by isolation and financial stress. Family structures are changing, and the increasing numbers of single parents carrying the burden of child-rearing without support contributes greatly to the risk of abuse and neglect.

The council was organized in 1975, and since then has established a child protection team which meets with families, diagnoses their problems and plans treatment.

The Family Growth Center in 1977 in downtown Lansing. The center provides drop-in child care and parent programs to families undergoing stress and to parents in need of support. At the Center, numerous other services have started: Parents' Anonymous meetings; parenting classes, a special project for adolescent parents.

Finances for the group was uncertain in its earlier years. "We conducted bake sales and other fundraisers, but in 1980 were were granted admission to the United Way," Shay remembered.

But governmental funding has diminished, and additional funding is needed to operate the council's Family Growth Center. "We're hoping for more than \$3,000; if we fall way short, we may have to consider reducing the hours or the programs at the center."
