## Plenty buy permits for new parking plan

A new parking ordinance which allows downtown shoppers free one-hour parking has netted the city few complaints and nearly \$1,000 in fines and permit fees so far, city officials say.

The ordinance was passed by St. Johns City Commissioners April 26 and went into effect 20 days later on May 17. But an unexpected delay in delivery of signs and tickets held up enforcement of the temporary law for about a month.

*'The city started selling more permits after we started writing tickets,' French said.*

Two weeks ago the grace period ended for violators, however, and patrolman Jack Plowman began marking the tires of over-parked autos with chalk. Since then, Plowman has handed out 140 parking tickets on his five-hour per-day downtown beat, Police Chief Lyle French said Monday. At \$2 each — \$4 after 72 hours and \$10 after ten days — the tickets have earned the city about \$280, City Clerk Rick Coletta said.

"That's a pretty good average because some tickets were probably invalid and some people probably didn't pay them on time," he said.

Enforcement has also resulted in big demand for permits, French and Coletta agreed. The permits allow parking for 10 hours in designated areas of one city lot and in any spaces in other downtown parking lots for the remainder of the six-month trial ordinance. As of Monday, 73 of the \$10 permits had been sold for a total of \$730, Coletta said.

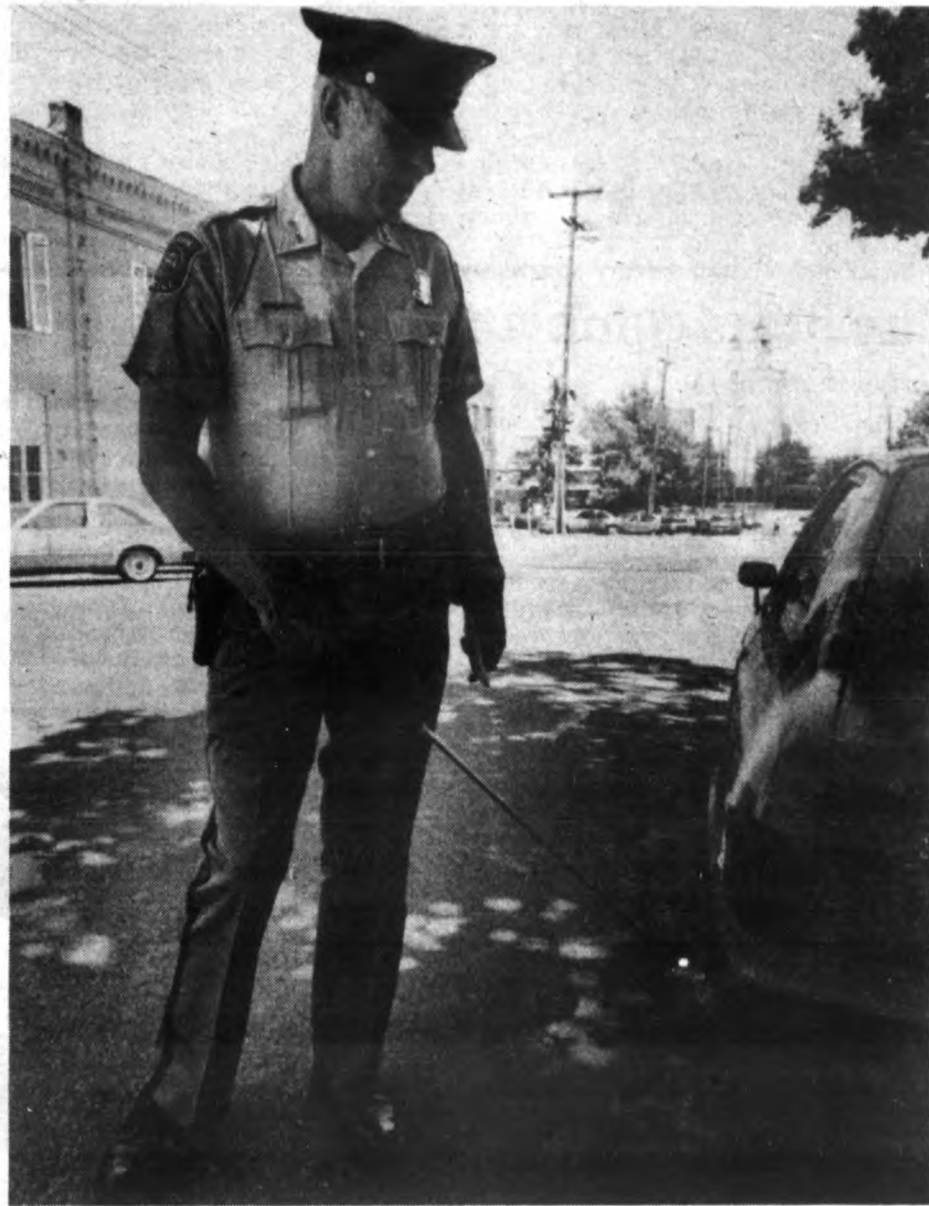
"The city started to sell more permits after we started writing tickets," French said. "Some people had gotten back in the habit of parking in front of their businesses again."

"The first day (of enforcement) was a little bit of a surprise for some," Coletta agreed, but both he and French said there have been few complaints about the ordinance.

The change was suggested to the city by a group of downtown merchants and St. Johns Area Chamber of Commerce members as a means to keep downtown businesses competitive with the new Southpoint Mall being built on the south edge of town.

One-hour free parking along most business district streets is intended to compare with free parking at shopping malls, while enforcement of the limit keeps business owners and their employees from using spaces intended for shoppers.

Meters taken down to implement the ordinance are being kept, however, and could be replaced if commissioners decide not to continue the ordinance at the end of the trial period.

## Patrolman honored by city

A farmer's market, a parade, work on a new city well and an award for a local policeman were approved by St. Johns City Commissioners during a brief meeting Monday night, July 12.

Sgt. Dennis Wilson, 32, a St. Johns Policeman for seven years, was presented a citation for his actions last April 13, when Wilson volunteered to enter a residence to talk to a former fellow policeman who was barricaded in his St. Johns home with a revolver.

According to Police Chief Lyle French, Wilson was ordered to leave the home, then continued to talk to the barricaded gunman through a locked door for some time before he was finally ordered to leave the area. Wilson later talked to the former policeman, Donald Lenon, by phone, and persuaded him to leave his residence and surrender, ending the eight-hour ordeal.

"The bravery and dedication to his profession

displayed by Sgt. Wilson was far above and beyond the call of duty," French said in a written statement.

Vice-mayor Donald Roesner, filling in for vacationing Mayor John Arehart, presented the commendation to Wilson.

Also during the half-hour meeting:

- Commissioners approved a \$12,833 contract with Keck Consulting Services Inc. for installation of a new gravel-packed well for the city. Commissioners agreed they will impose a time limit on the Keck project at a later date. The city's latest well, Well 10, has not lived up to expectations and although construction was overdue, is still not producing the amount of water promised by the contractor, Walter Meinert.

Commissioners agreed a time limit is necessary with Keck in light of their experiences with Meinert's installation of Well 10.

- An Aug. 3 parade celebrating the grand opening of a new grocery store in the Southpoint Mall was approved. The 9:45 a.m. parade will be sponsored by Goff The Food Store of St. Johns.

Commissioner John Hannah pointed out, "We've never done this for a single individual before who was promising a business," and asked if the city might be setting a bad precedent. But other commissioners said they doubted the approval would cause future problems.

- Commissioners were told good growing conditions have prompted a request from area farmers that a St. Johns Farm Market plan be moved ahead to July 31. Permission to open stands on the east side of Maple Street was granted for Saturday mornings from July 31 through September.

- City Clerk Rick Coletta told commissioners work to improve the Oddfellows Building has still not been completed. The building was nearly condemned by the city last winter when loose bricks and materials were deemed a hazard to pedestrians in the area. Oddfellows representatives will be contacted and asked to report to the commission, it was decided. "They've been cooperative for 85 percent of the work," Coletta reported.

## Stingray 'winners' just get stung

Sorry folks, there's no free Corvette.

About two dozen victims of an apparent hoax learned the bad news last week from Bee's Chevrolet-Oldsmobile.

Told by pranksters they had won a new Corvette in a drawing and had only a day to pick it up, the would-be sports car enthusiasts contacted the St. Johns dealership last Thursday and Friday, only to be told the sad truth: they would not be driving home in a new car.

"We had people calling and walking in for about two days," Bee's Sales Manager Ralph Dara said. "They were getting calls, they said, from a radio station or TV station, telling them they'd won a free Corvette in a drawing and it was the last day they could come and pick it up."

"Naturally, many couldn't remember having entered a drawing, though."

Contacted by Dara, St. Johns Police suggested the "winners" might be able to identify TV or radio station call letters used by the phony contest callers. But although many said they thought the caller sounded like a disk jockey, none could remember the call-letters of the "sponsor" station, Dara said.

"We figured it was a prank of some kind. We haven't had any calls since Friday," Dara said. "Most of the calls came from north of St. Johns — Maple Rapids, Middleton, Pompeii."

"We got 11 one day and about six or seven the next day, and several people walked in the showroom. We don't know how many more might have been called and just figured it was a joke."

# Jury acquits Alzner in stepfather's killing

After 28 days, Roy Christopher Alzner and his attorney, Fred Abood, both said they were "very happy" July 12 when the jury finally delivered a verdict of not guilty on all charges in the April 11, 1981 shotgun slaying of William Barrett.

Alzner admitted killing his 50-year-old stepfather, an Oldsmobile employee, during an argument at their DeWitt home at 145 Boichot Rd., but insisted the shooting was in self defense. He said his stepfather abused family members when drinking and that he feared for his life the night he shot Barrett. The jury, apparently, agreed.

"The verdict is exactly what we wanted. From the beginning we felt that the prosecution shouldn't have prosecuted," Abood said. "We are certainly pleased for Roy and all of his family."

The six men, six women jury apparently did not find

• Brian Rogers, a WQTK reporter, complained about the city's new parking ordinance. Rogers said it was his understanding that all meters were to be removed, and said he has received two tickets in areas still metered in front of the city library and the county courthouse during recent weeks.

Commissioners and City Manager Randy Humphrey pointed out meters still standing will remain, and no plan to remove all meters was approved.

"What you see now is what really exists," Humphrey said. He suggested the city notify residents that all parking areas are now designated according to the new ordinance, and commissioners agreed a notice should be sent with water bills.

the case as clear cut as Abood, however. Interrupted by the July 4th holiday and court scheduling problems, the trial began June 15. The jury finally began deliberating for four hours nearly a month later, Friday, July 9, then returned for an additional hour the following Monday before delivering their verdict. Alzner was acquitted of charges of second degree murder and a felony firearm violation.

All homicide cases are hard, Abood said, explaining the lengthy deliberation. "They are all hard and they seem to get harder as they go along," he said. Thanks to scheduling problems and sweltering heat, that was especially true of the last week of the Alzner proceedings.

Following a July 4 holiday recess, the trial resumed Tuesday, July 6 at 1:30 p.m. in Ithaca, where temperatures in the antique court house escalated to 85 degrees. Prosecutor Jon Newman said he found it difficult to deliver his case in the heat and the trial was again returned to the cooler, air conditioned Clinton County Courthouse in St. Johns (the 29th Circuit includes Clinton and Gratiot counties, with courts in Ithaca and St. Johns).

Alzner himself then testified in his own defense when the trial resumed on Wednesday, July 7, stating he was "upset and scared" when his step-father threatened to take away his books and forbade him to play in a

backyard sandbox. When questioned by Abood as to how he felt before shooting his stepfather, Alzner said: "He was getting meaner by the beer and I had no idea of where I was going to go."

Newman in turn asked Alzner, if he had it all to do again would he go back into the room with the shotgun? "No, sir," Alzner responded.

"What would you change?" Newman countered. "I would have left the house," Alzner said.

Newman argued Alzner's story of the shooting did not fit the facts, including an autopsy report which the prosecutor said proved Alzner could not have shot Barrett from the hallway where he claimed the fatal shot was fired.

"You heard Dr. (Laurence) Simson's testimony that you could not have shot him from where you were?" Newman asked the defendant.

"He said it was not likely," Alzner replied. Newman also said there were technical legal problems raised during the trial which will not be explored since Alzner can't be tried a second time. "The problem of course is when there is an acquittal, there is the problem with double jeopardy," he said.

Alzner, who turned 18 and became a father during his 28-day trial, was his own strongest defense, Abood said.

"We took the case because Roy was going to prison and we didn't feel he should be," he said.

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# Bug busters taken, but stolen turkeys recovered

Five persons were injured in a two car accident on US-27 and several larcenies, including the thefts of a pair of bug zappers, were reported to Clinton County law enforcement agencies last week.

George William Frazier Jr., 23, of 7461 W. Chadwick, DeWitt, was cited for failing to yield the right of way by Clinton County Sheriff deputies July 9, following an accident at 2:05 p.m. at the intersection of Alward Road and US-27, reports said.

Headed west on Alward, Frazier pulled in front of a northbound vehicle driven by Andrew William Nemeth, 66, of 3443 Lake Lansing Rd., East Lansing. Nemeth and a passenger in his auto, Hazel C. Nemeth, 63, were treated and released at Sparrow Hospital, reports said, along with Frank Earl Parish, 33, of 6070 W. M-21, Owosso, a passenger

in Frazier's car. Frazier and a second passenger in his auto, Jeffrey Andrew Myszak of DeWitt, were taken to Clinton Memorial Hospital, reports said.

Witnesses said Nemeth did not have time to avoid Frazier's auto.

A suspect who has refused to identify himself was arrested by DeWitt Township Police Monday, July 12 after a patrolman spotted him driving a stolen semi tractor towing a stolen trailer with \$50,000 worth of turkeys in it.

Reports said the suspect was apprehended, along with an unnamed passenger, at 4:50 p.m., minutes after a radio call was broadcast describing the stolen tractor-trailer, which was valued at a total of \$75,000.

The rig, with "Hotel California" written on the side, was spotted at the in-

tersection of southbound US-27 and State Road, reports said.

The tractor was stolen from Texas, but the owner of the trailer had not yet been located Tuesday, reports said.

An 18-year-old Elsie resident was killed in a one-car accident during the July 4 weekend, according to reports by the Michigan State Police, Owosso Post.

Anthony Earl Huff, 18, of 8503 N. Meridian Rd., Elsie, was pronounced dead on arrival at Clinton Memorial Hospital following the accident at 10:35 p.m. Friday, July 2, reports said.

Huff was headed south on Hollister Road about a mile north of Price Road at the eastern edge of Clinton County in Victor Township, when he lost control of his auto and struck a tree, causing his car to roll over.

Reports said excessive speed has been blamed for the crash.

Bath Township Police have been issued a warrant for the arrest of Mark Kessler, 22, of 11999 Upton Rd., Bath, on charges of carelessly discharging a firearm.

Reports said Kessler admitted firing a 12 gauge shotgun three times from his front yard on June 30. The shots were heard by Don LaGuire of 12060 Upton, who was playing tennis on a court at his home. Moments after the shots, lead pellets rained on the

tennis court and on a nearby metal barn, reports said. LaGuire collected a dozen for evidence and called police at 8:40 p.m.

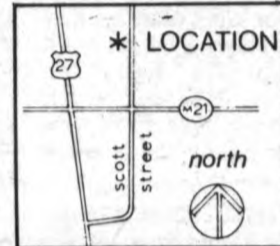
Kessler told Bath Township officers he routinely shoots birds from his front yard, and had just killed a protected species, a Baltimore Oriole, reports said.

A bug zapper valued at \$160 and an extension cord valued at \$25 were taken from the home of Gary Zimmerman, 8840 W. Heribson Rd., Grand Ledge, Clinton County Sheriff reports said. Zimmerman

reported the theft July 5 after returning home from work, reports said.

The following day, at the nearby home of Herbert Vanderwal at 9177 W. Clark Rd., Grand Ledge, a second bug zapper was taken, reports said. Reports said Vanderwal saw a man disconnect his bug zapper then run with it to a waiting vehicle. The stolen electronic bug killer was valued at \$70, reports said. Both thefts are being investigated.

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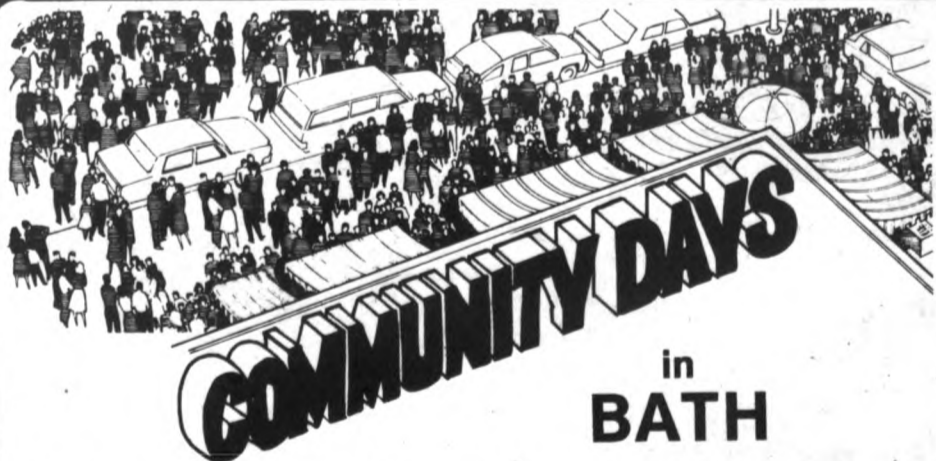

# Some break even, some just broke

With economic conditions deteriorating in the Mid-Michigan farming industry, it has become a challenge for many farmers just to stay in business, but the love of the farm and farming remains strong.

Scott Hansen, a Charlotte farmer, was forced to sell his business because of a string of hard years, but vows to return to the fields that brought him joy and satisfaction.

Young farmers are ready to continue their family farms, such as the boys of the Traver and Putman families near Williamston.

Their lives and thoughts reflect a side of the farming industry in the Tri-County area that is decidedly optimistic despite the economic times.

## HOLDING STEADY THROUGH THE YEARS

While commodity prices have soared and swooped like barn swallows, and the fortunes of many farmers have changed for the worse, life has remained relatively stable for the Putman and Traver farm families. They kept their land, tried to invest prudently, and amid hard times are "keeping our heads above water," as one son put it.

For more than a century, the Putman and Traver farms nestled together in the rolling hills along Meech Road south of Williamston. The Putmans are in their sixth generation on the centennial family farm; the Travers are in their fifth. The sons have become partners of their fathers, and plan to farm for the foreseeable future.

That gives their fathers comfort, for though Grant Putman and Richard Traver could have "bottled up our land and retired," as Traver says, they preferred their farms to stay in their families. Respect for their heritage helped keep their operations small and stable, says Traver, for "we could never bring ourselves to mortgage these old home farms to expand with."

The sons appreciate how lucky they are to have land already paid for. The absence of a mortgage frees money to use for equipment and other expenses, says Kirk Traver, who with his brother Keith are partners with their father. Their unmortgaged farm property is an "ace in the hole," Keith explains.

The Travers farm about 200 acres in hay, oats and corn, and raise between 150 and 200 head of livestock. Their operation includes about 50 each of beef and dairy cows. Grant Putman and his partner-son, Dan, own 200 acres and rent another 400, including 250 in corn, 150 in

wheat, 125 in soybeans and 80 in alfalfa. They raise about 60 dairy cows.

Grant, President of the Michigan Soybean Association, modestly says "no great planning" has accounted for his farm's success. They have increased their land size over the years, Dan says, but have invested conservatively amid policies and conditions that encouraged bigness.

When it has come to buying equipment, they have tried to be "selective in thinking what they can get along without," Grant says.

Richard Traver says his business hasn't expanded or "gone overboard on machinery," and points out that both families have had outside sources of income, which helped them through hard times in the '30s and '40s. Putman is a DeKalb seed dealer, and the Travers have had a milk route since 1903. Keith's wife currently teaches.

Traver once told his sons they would never earn enough from their farm to have any extra spending money. Their actual farm income is low, though that is largely offset by tax advantages, he says.

But just because they are getting by now is no guarantee for the future, Traver cautions.

"Five years down the road we may be out of business, because we may longer have an economic unit big enough to compete."

Kirk and Keith Traver, along with Dan Putman, are set on sticking with farming despite its future uncertainties.

"It's the greatest life in the world," according to Keith. "You get up every morning, you look out, and it's yours." Kirk says simply, "I like animals and the open air."

Richard Traver likes the competition and freedom of farming: "You're in competition with every guy that milked a cow this morning. You work hard, but your feet are under the table with your family three times a day. There's a whole bunch of freedom there that I don't think you get any place else."

## SCOTT HANSEN: DOWN BUT NOT OUT

Scott Hansen likes farming and wants to remain a farmer. That's easier said than done, however.

Hansen has been working his Charlotte family farm since 1974, when he returned to the land where he grew up after attending Bible school and working on a construction job in Grand Rapids. But a combination of problems beset him from the beginning of his farm venture, and eight years after his return to the farm, he has sold his livestock, most of his equipment, and 90 of his 100-plus acre farm is for sale.

Despite the financial and emotional hardships, he is intent on remaining a farmer. Wheat and a little corn is still growing behind his family's house, and Scott still does farm work; he is sore from pitching hay as he thinks about the past and tells of his hopes.

Hansen is negotiating with interested investors and hopes to go back into business as manager of a different kind of farm operation. If he isn't able to swing a deal by fall, he will return to school, this time to complete a four-year agricultural program.

What is it about farming that makes such difficulties worth trying to overcome? Hansen's fondness for the land is apparent as he replies, "...being outside, watching things grow and change."

He is strongly attached to the property on which he grew up, helping his father, who still lives there, operate a dairy farm: "Once you've been born and raised on a farm, it's kind of hard to get put in someplace else."

He worked in a factory after moving back to the Mid-Michigan, and didn't like being a cog in the production line. "Out on the farm, you have more responsibilities, and it's a challenge."

Challenging indeed—he tried to raise livestock, corn and soybeans while also raising three children. Farming is complex, and the weather is an unpredictable monarch. A farmer faces a wider world in which prices fluctuate wildly and governments impose acreage set-aside policies and grain embargos.

Hansen, who rented about 400 acres in addition to working his own land, refinanced his Farmers Home Administration loan in 1978, and was initially turned down last year for a second refinancing. By the time his appeal was granted, it was too late to plant corn or soybeans, so he planted 185 acres of navy beans. Because of unusually wet weather, he was unable to harvest entire fields.

### Koenigsknecht makes first-team track squad

According to Fowler track coach Tom O'Rourke, any high school long jumper who can leap 22 feet is high-caliber.

If that's that case, what would that make Fowler's Dave Koenigsknecht, who has leaped 23-6?

According to the Detroit News, that would make him the best schoolboy long jumper in the state. The News named the junior standout to its All-State track team last week, making Koenigsknecht the only Clinton County athlete on the honor squad.

"Yeah, I was surprised," Koenigsknecht said. "I didn't know they knew about me up here."

With his credentials, it's likely that track people all over the state know about Koenigsknecht. As a freshman, he jumped over 20 feet, but injured himself running the high hurdles and as a result had to miss the state meet.

He made up for it his

sophomore year, though, winning the Class D long jump title and then repeating as champion this year with a leap of 23-5½.

Following this year's state championship, Koenigsknecht entered a Junior Olympics meet in Muskegon. The result was a personal-best 23-6 and an invitation to compete in a regional Junior Olympics meet in Dayton, Ohio this Saturday.

What makes Koenigsknecht's performance this season even more remarkable is what happened on the football field last October. Playing tailback on the Fowler squad, Koenigsknecht made a cut, but his knee didn't. He had to undergo ligament and cartilage surgery to repair the damaged knee.

"The first doctor I saw, the one who did the surgery, told me to just be careful with the knee," Koenigsknecht said. "But then I went and saw another doctor, and he told me that I needed to do more exercise. He also told

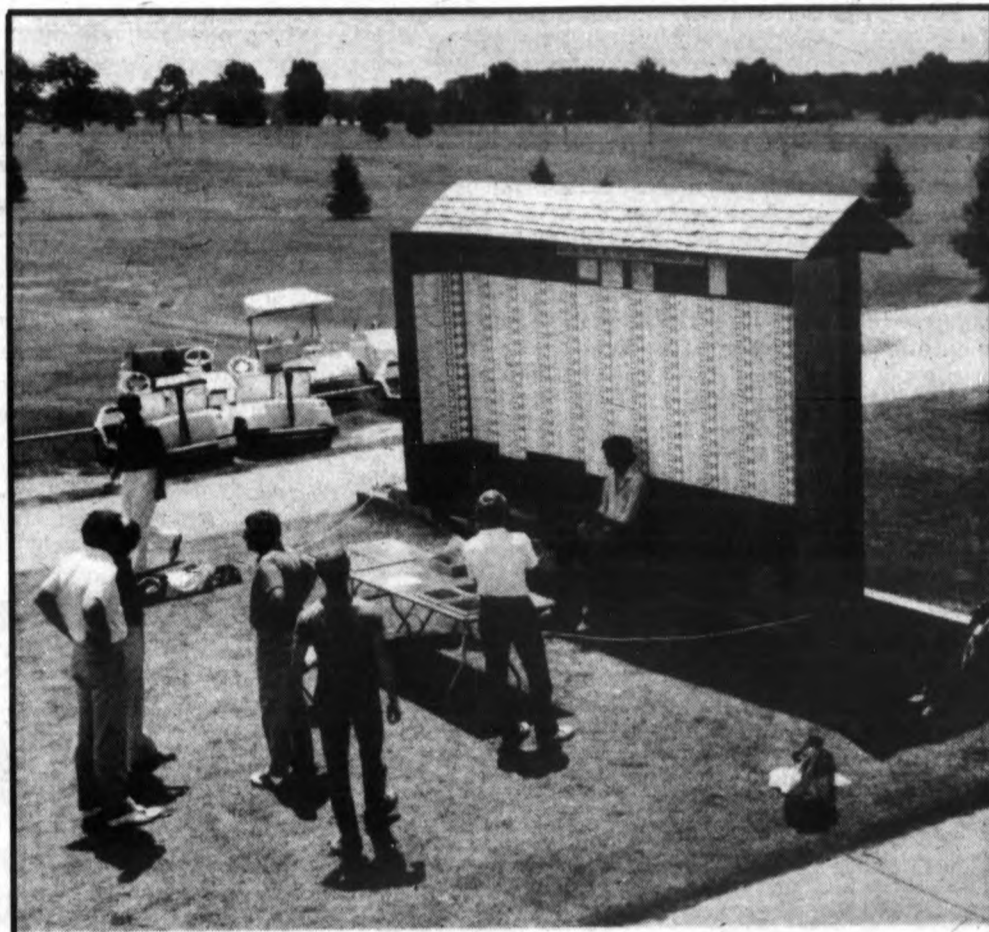
me I shouldn't play football anymore, so I'm not going to be playing this year."

Even though it was just a few months after his surgery, Koenigsknecht said he wasn't worried about his knee when he long jumped. "I jump off my good leg, so that doesn't bother me," he said, "but I land on both legs. It did bother me one time when I landed, but I haven't felt any pain since then."

In addition to giving up football, Koenigsknecht will also be retiring from the high hurdles, concentrating almost exclusively on the long jump. If he stays healthy, another state title seems likely, and maybe even a 24-foot leap.

"I think he can do 24," said O'Rourke. "If it's the right board on the right day, I think he can do it."

Koenigsknecht isn't so sure. "I don't know — that's a long way," he said. But after thinking about it a second, added, "But it is only six more inches. I don't know. We'll just have to see."

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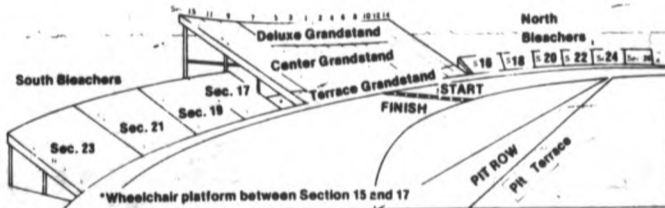

By the end of the year, he had run out of equity, couldn't refinance, and this year sold his equipment, hogs and beef cattle.

Hansen cites numerous factors in recounting the tough string of seasons: a drought in 1974, the need to buy new equipment because of the cost of repairing his older machines, and in particular the policies of the Carter administration.

"That's what I feel hurt the farmer more than anything else," said Hansen, a friendly man who displays no bitterness. Carter's mandatory set-aside

program didn't provide sufficient loan incentives, he feels. And he thinks the grain embargo of the Soviet Union following the Afghanistan invasion "was a political move to try and lower prices for consumers," which didn't work, he said.

"The way it looks to me, the government's mostly on the outlook for consumers. Of course, there's more consumers in this country than anyone else. But they don't look at the production end of it as much as they could."

He doesn't place all responsibility on the government, though. Farmers must be better organized to market their products, he feels. By working together through the National Farmers Organization, farmers could get higher prices for their grain and reap some of the profits now going to middle men, Hansen says.

Farmers could also benefit by working with more outside consultants, said Hansen, who had difficulty getting FHA staff to examine his operation and offer advice. Sophisticated computer services will be increasingly necessary for farmers to keep abreast of market changes, he said.

(B) Amending Article 6, Section 6.5.2A by adding the following new definition of single family dwelling.

A. Single family dwellings, structures, either constructed on the site or manufactured off the site and which are designed and used for the complete living accommodations of a single family and complies with the following regulations:

1. The dwelling shall meet dimensional requirements for the district in which it is situated as delineated in Art. 6, Sec. 6.18 Schedule A or Art. 6, Sec. 6.5.5. of OR-1-78, the Clinton County Zoning Ordinance.

2. All habitable rooms within the dwelling shall have an average ceiling height of not less than 7'6" in at least 50% of the required area with no portion less than 5' in height.

Exception: Beams and girders spaced not less than 4' o.c. may project not more than 6" below the required ceiling height.

All other rooms, including hallways and corridors shall have a ceiling height of not less than 7' measured to the lowest projections from the ceiling.

3. The single family dwelling, including mobile homes and manufactured housing, shall have a minimum exterior breadth/caliper/width of 20'. Breezeways, garages, porches, and other appurtenances shall not be considered part of the required 20'. The minimum dimensional requirement is not intended to prohibit unusual, creative or unique architecture and design.

4. All single family dwellings shall comply with the pertinent building code. If the dwelling is a mobile home, all construction, plumbing, electrical apparatus and insulation within and con-

nected to said mobile home shall comply with the "Mobile Home Construction and Safety Standards" as promulgated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, being 24 CFR 3280 as amended. Additionally, all dwellings shall comply with the applicable roof snow load and strength requirement.

5. The dwelling shall be placed upon and secured to a permanent foundation in accordance with the Michigan building Code and where applicable, the manufacturer's installation instructions.

6. Skirting shall be installed if the dwelling is not placed upon a basement or crawl space. The skirting shall be installed in accordance with Act 419 of 1976, the Mobile Home Commission Act.

7. If the dwelling is manufactured off the site, it shall be installed with the wheels removed. In addition, a dwelling shall not have an exposed towing mechanism, undercarriage or chassis.

8. The dwelling shall have a roof with a pitch of at least 2 in 12. (Earth sheltered homes being excluded from this requirement.)

C. Amending Art. 6, Sec. 6.6.2(A) by adding the following language: As per Sec. 6.5.2(A) herein.

D. Amending Art. 6, Sec. 6.8.2(A) by adding the following language: As per Sec. 6.5.2(A) herein.

E. Amending Art. 6, Sec. 6.9.2(A) by adding the following language: As per Sec. 6.5.2(A) herein.

Case ZC-21-82 Text Amendment-Site Development Requirements for Gravel Extraction Operations

(1) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(A) in the following manner: Delete paragraph A entitled **Excavation of Soils and Minerals** and replace it with the following new language:

#### 1. EXCAVATION OF SOILS AND MINERALS

A. **Introduction:** This ordinance recognizes that certain soil and minerals are fixed in location, are rare, and nonrenewable in nature. The purpose and intent of these provisions is to provide for the use of these areas which have significant mineral deposits such as sand, gravel, peat, muck, shale, clay, or other natural mineral deposits except crude oil, and which if mined for such deposits under regulations of this section, insures that doing so will not constitute a hazard to the public health, safety, and welfare. The intent of this section is also to insure proper reclamation of mining sites, and to provide for proper environmental management during the site planning, operational and reclamation stages of the extraction process.

This section of the ordinance applies to excavation of areas subject to mining, which means an area of land from which material is removed in connection with the production or excavation of peat, muck, sand, gravel, clay, shale or other natural minerals deposits, except crude oil, by surface or open pit mining methods, the land on which material from the mining operation is deposited, the land on which a reservoir is used in the process, and any auxiliary land which is deemed a part of the operation.

\* Excavation of soils and minerals means the extraction of sand, gravel, peat, muck, topsoil, clay, rock or other earthen materials or minerals in the regular operation of a business or manufacturing operation for the purpose of sale or exchange. Included in the regular operation is processing, or manufacturing, stockpiling, removing the overburden lying above a natural deposit of a mixed material and mining directly from the natural deposit thereby exposed, by mining directly from a deposit lying exposed in the minerals natural state and also inclusive is all mining below the water table or that mining which upon its cessation will result in the creation of a body of water of any size. The excavation of soil and Minerals does not include excavation or grading preliminary to a construction project; grading or filling incidental to improvement to the land or for agricultural or residential ponds provided the spoil material is not sold, is not intended to be sold and remains on the property where it was excavated.

The above described activity(ies) may be authorized in the A-1, Agricultural Production, M-1, Limited Industrial, and M-2, Heavy Industrial zone districts by the Clinton County Board of Commissioners by issuance of a special use permit.

(2) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.2(1) in the following manner: Add the following to the existing sentence after A-1 district: "the M-1, Limited Industrial and M-2, Heavy Industrial zone districts".

(3) Amend Section 6.25, Schedule G in the following manner: Place the letters SUP in the line designated as surface mining under the heading M-1 and M-2.

(4) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(C) General Site Plan Requirements in the following manner:

a) No. 4 Delete the word **Cell** and replace with the word **Phase**.

b) No. 4(f) delete the entire subsection and replace with the following language:

f. Description of location of each phase, number of acres included in each phase, estimated length of time to complete each phase and the amount of time projection to complete the entire project.

c) Add a new subsection 11 as follows:

11. Measures to be taken by the applicant to control noise, vibration, dust and traffic.

d) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(D) in the following manner: Delete the entire section entitled **REHABILITATION** and replace with the following new language:

(5) **D. RECLAMATION DURING OPERATION AND FOLLOWING TERMINATION OR ABANDONMENT:**

Progressive Reclamation: 1. All phase units shall be reclaimed progressively as they are worked out to the extent that they shall be reasonably natural and inconspicuous and shall be reasonably lacking in hazard. All slopes and banks shall be graded to angles which do not exceed 3' horizontal to 1' vertical.

Sufficient topsoil shall be stockpiled on the premise and promptly redistributed on abandoned areas or where extraction operations have been substantially discontinued for any period in excess of 1 year. Such areas shall then be seeded with at least temporary protection the first year and by the second year permanent seeding to stabilize the soil lessen soil erosion potential and encourage proper growth. Seeding and fertilizer shall be applied according to the Soil Conservation Service Technical Guide IV G, Standards and Specifications for Critical Area Plantings.

(6) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(E) in the following manner: Delete section (E) entitled **SITE DEVELOPMENT REQUIREMENTS** in its entirety and replace it with the following language:

**E. Site Development Requirements:**

1. Setbacks in which no part of the mining operation may take place, excepting ingress and egress shall be as follows:

a. Excavation shall not take place less than 20' from any adjacent property line.

Exception: The Clinton County Planning Commission may authorize the complete removal of material to an adjacent property line in situations where 2 extraction operations share a common property line, provided authorization is received from both property owners.

b. Excavation shall not take place less than 50' from any county designated primary road right-of-way.

Exception: Excavation may take place to within 20' of the road right-of-way provided the excavated area is backfilled and stabilized within 1 year of excavation. It shall be the responsibility of the operator to contact the Department of Development Control prior to excavation.

c. Excavation shall not take place closer than 20' from any county designated secondary road right-of-way.

d. No fixed machinery shall be erected or maintained within 100' of any property or street right-of-way.

2. **Fencing:** The Planning Commission shall in establishing the requirements for fencing of the operation take into account the scale of the operation, the population density in the surrounding area, and the potential hazard to the health, safety, and welfare of the public of Clinton County. If fencing is deemed a requirement of the special use permit, the Planning Commission shall specify the type and location of the required fencing.

3. Interior access roads, parking lots, haul road loading and unloading area shall be oiled, watered or chemically treated so as to limit the nuisance caused by windblown dust.

4. **Ponded Areas:** Should the final result of the excavation result in the creation of a water body, the periphery of the excavation shall be graded to a slope not to exceed 3' horizontal to 1 foot vertical to the seasonal low water level.

(7) Amending Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(F) in the following manner: Delete subsection 2 and 4 in its entirety and replace with the following new language:

2. A mining area shall be reclaimed by an operator pursuant to these rules, by the end of the permit period or within the time set forth in the operator's reclamation plan approved by the Planning Commission.

4. **Equipment removal:** Upon cessation of mining operations, the operating company, within a reasonable period of time not to exceed 12 months thereafter, shall remove all plant structures, buildings, stockpiles and equipment.

(8) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1)(H) in the following manner by adding the following new paragraph after paragraph number two.

In determining the area for which guarantees must be supplied, the Planning Commission may consider the following:

a. Any area stripped of topsoil or overburden.

b. Any area from which material is extracted.

c. Any area utilized for stockpiling extracted material, overburden and topsoil.

d. Any area which from a past year of operations has not been fully rehabilitated on the annual anniversary of the issuance of the special use permit.

e. Any other land determined by the Planning Commission as integral to the operation, which is directly deemed by them to warrant protection under financial guarantee.

(9) Amend Art. 7, Sec. 7.3(1) in the following manner: Delete Sec. L entitled **VIOLATIONS** and replace with the following new language:

L. **Violations:** Violation notices shall be issued pursuant to the provisions delineated in Art. 3, Sec. 3.8 of this ordinance.

(10) Amend Art. 14, Sec. 14(F) by placing the following definition of mineral in alphabetical order.

**Definition of Mineral:** Mineral means an organic or inorganic substance in the earth having a consistent and distinctive set of physical properties and composition that can be expressed by a chemical formula and includes, but is not limited to, coal, iron ore, copper, silver, gold, uranium, gypsum, stone, gravel, sand, clay, peat, muck, topsoil or shale.

#### Case ZC-22-82 Text Amendment - General Standards

Amending Art. 7, Section 7.1.7(A) **General Standards** in the following manner: Delete standards 1-6 and replace with the following new standards.

1. The proposed use, activities, processes, materials, equipment and conditions of operation will not be detrimental to the public welfare, persons or property by reason of excessive noise, fumes, dust, glare, traffic or objectionable odors.

2. Essential public facilities and services such as roads, fire and police protection, drainage facilities, refuse disposal, schools are adequate for the proposed use or are capable of being adequately provided for.

3. Requirements for additional public services and facilities which will be created by the proposed use will not be detrimental to the economic welfare of the community.

4. All standards set forth in this zoning ordinance will be complied with.

5. All administrative requirements pertaining to the issuance of special use permits have or will be complied with.

6. The proposed use, activities, processes, materials and equipment and conditions of operation shall be consistent with the objectives of the Policy Determination Study on a Future Land Use Map.

7. Where feasible, the proposed activity should not be located such that it will directly or indirectly have a substantial adverse impact on the natural resources of the County. Specifically, prime agricultural soils as defined by the Clinton County Soil Conservation Service; wetlands protected by P.A. 203, The Goemaere-Anderson Wetland Protection Act; and lakes, rivers, streams, county drains, major forests, water recharge areas and major mineral deposits.

#### Case ZC-23-82 Text Amendment - NONCONFORMING USES

Amending Article 13, Sec. 13.3 in the following manner: Delete the entire subsection and replace with the following language:

(a) No such nonconforming use shall be enlarged or increased, nor extended to occupy a greater area of land than was occupied at the effective date of adoption or amendment of this Article.

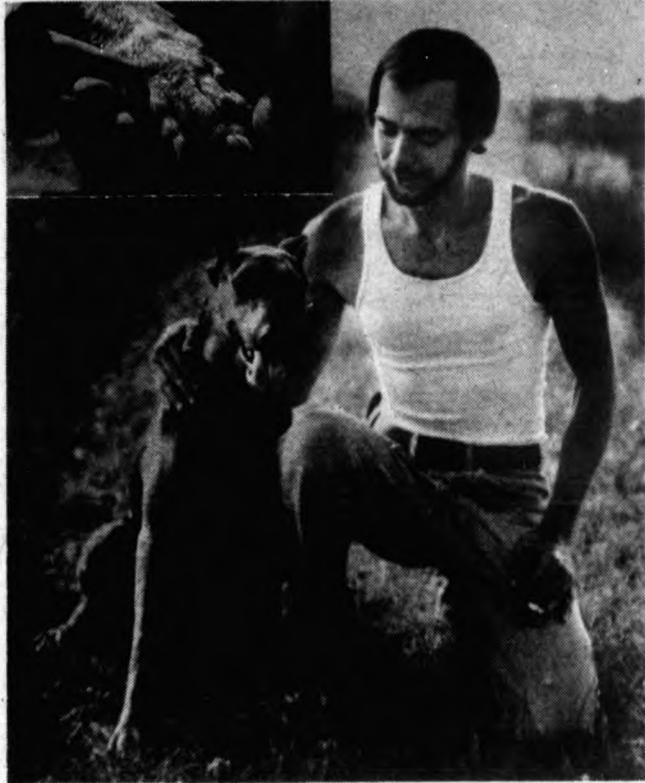

**Prime Agricultural Soils:** Prime farmland is land that has the best combination of physical and chemical characteristics for producing food, feed, forage, fiber and oilseed crops, and is also available for these uses (the land could be cropland, pastureland, rangeland, forest land, or other land, but not urban built-up land or water). It has the soil quality, growing seasons, and moisture supply needed to economically produce sustained high yields of crops when treated and managed, including water management, according to acceptable farming methods. In general, prime farmlands have an adequate and dependable water supply from precipitation or irrigation, a favorable temperature and growing season, acceptable acidity or alkalinity, acceptable salt and sodium content, and few or no rocks. They are permeable to water and air. Prime farmlands are not excessively erodible or saturated with water for a long period of time, and they either do not flood frequently or are protected from flooding. Examples of soils that qualify as prime farmland are Palous silt loam, 0 to 7 percent slopes; Brookston silty clay loam, drained; and Tama silty clay loam 0 to 5 percent slopes.

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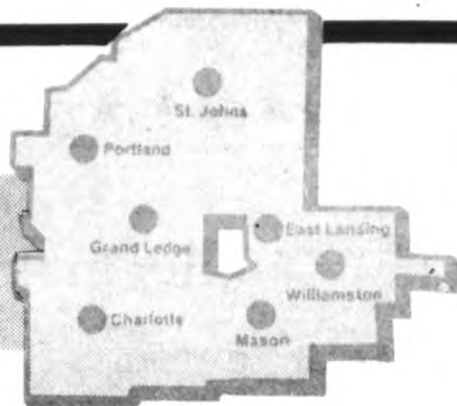

- 1/2 c. chopped green onions
- 1/4 c. minced parsley
- 1 tsp. lemon juice

Do not cook spinach but squeeze out and drain well. Mix all ingredients. Serve in a bowl. Surround with fresh vegetables such as celery, carrots, cauliflower, or cherry tomatoes. Keeps well and makes lots.

### TUNA VEGETABLE PILAF

A large family style casserole; if your family is fond of tuna and rice you will certainly have a winner here.

- 2 tbsp. butter or oleo
  - 1/2 c. chopped scallions
  - 1 pkg. (12 oz.) or 2 c. uncooked brown rice
  - 3 1/2 c. clear vegetable broth
  - 1 tsp. salt, if used
  - 1/2 tsp. Tabasco pepper sauce
  - 1/2 c. hulled sunflower seeds
  - 1/2 c. diced pared carrot
  - 1 med. zucchini, halved lengthwise
  - ans sliced 1/2 inch thick
  - 1 1/2 c. 1 inch pieces of broccoli
  - 3 cans (6 1/2 oz. each) tuna in vegetable oil
- Melt butter in a flame proof 3 quart casserole. Add scallions and rice; cook, stirring frequently, until rice is golden brown. Stir in vegetable broth and bring to a boil. Remove from heat, cover and bake in a 375 degree oven for 45 minutes. Remove casserole from oven and stir in salt, Tabasco, sunflower seeds, carrot, zucchini and broccoli; return to oven and cook 20 to 25 minutes longer. Just before serving mix in tuna.

### NEVER FAIL MERINGUE

A desert that we often overlook when needing something special. This is also a make-ahead-recipe.

- Light oven for 450 degrees before starting.
- 4 egg whites - room temperature
  - 1 and 1/3 c. sugar
  - 2 tsp. cornstarch
  - 2 tsp. vinegar
  - 1 tsp. vanilla

Beat egg whites until they stand in soft peaks. Mix sugar and cornstarch. Add 2 or 3 tbsp. at a time, beating all the time; blending well after each addition. Add vinegar after 3 addition. Keep adding sugar and add vanilla at next to last addition. Beat to firm peaks. Form 12 individual meringues on brown paper or fill two greased 9 inch pie tins. Set in oven and turn off heat. Leave 3 hours or overnight. Serve with Heavenly Pie Filling. Fill up to 1/2 day before serving. Dry shells keep well on shelf or in freezer.

**HEAVENLY PIE FILLING (fills 6 shells)**  
Beat 4 egg yolks slightly in double boiler. Stir in 1/2 c. sugar, 3 tbsp. lemon juice, 1 tsp. grated lemon rind, 1/8 tsp. salt. Stir constantly and cook to thick consistency (8-10 min.) Cool. Whip 1 c. cream. Fold custard into cream. Fill 6 meringues or 1 meringue pie shell. NOTE: Be sure to stir this mixture constantly and watch it carefully so the eggs do not scramble.

### BEEF WITH BROCCOLI

A pleasant and easy combination of meat and vegetables. Remember you do not need a wok to cook these Chinese recipes. A large skillet will do just fine.

- 1 lb. boneless beef (chuck, sirloin)
- 2 lbs. broccoli floweretts and tender stems
- 1/2 lb. mushrooms
- 3/4 c. beef broth
- 2 tbsp. dry sherry
- 1/2 c. soy sauce
- 2 tsp. fresh minced ginger or 1 tsp. ground ginger
- 1 tbsp. sliced scallion (I like to use more)
- 2 tbsp. cornstarch
- 1/4 c. water

Cooked rice (preferable brown)  
Slice beef 1/8 inch on the diagonal; separate broccoli into 2 inch floweretts; slice stems 1/4 inch on the diagonal. Slice mushrooms. In medium bowl, combine beef broth, sherry, soy sauce, ginger and scallion. Blend cornstarch with water smoothly; add to sherry mixture. Set aside. In a wok heat oil until hot, but not smoking. Add beef and stir fry. Just until pink disappears. Remove from wok and place in colander. Add broccoli and stir fry until crisp tender. Place in colander to drain with beef. Return beef and broccoli to wok with mushrooms and fry until mushrooms are just warm. Stir sauce mixture to blend and add to wok, stirring until mixture thickens. Serve immediately.
