Board takes care of long agenda

A long agenda including problems with Central Elementary School's roof, a search for a new superintendent, parent's concern over busing from East Essex School, and the sale of Olive Center Elementary kept St. John's School Board members busy late into Wednesday night, July 14.

The meeting, which began at 8 p.m. in the Administration Building of St. Johns High School, attracted over 20 spectators, many of whom were parents, teachers and other school staff members with questions about agenda items.

James Bauer and Ken Johnson were the first to address board members with their proposals on repairing Central Elementary's roof. Bauer, an architect summoned by board members to survey the problem, offered a six-step plan for reconstruction of the roof: 1) Review the 1980 report; 2) historic restoration; 3) meet with fire marshall to discuss plans; 4) consider possibility of handicap facilities; 5) consider future use of rooms and floor plans and multi-purpose room extension; 6) actual work to be done along with the stages of construction. The cost of repairs was estimated at \$3,200 and Bauer has offered two choices for payment, a 12 percent fee or a phase approach using money allocated during the project and a \$45 per hour consulting fee.

"We would re-do the fascia work immediately if you are ready to start renovation. I'd say the roof could make it through another winter, but we've been saying that for the last 20 years," Bauer said.

Board members final decision was to accept the outlined steps and to commit \$3,200 to the project. Gordon Vandermark urged the board to accept bids for work on everything but the roof, and board members approved the suggestion of the non-instructional services administrator.

Board members then tackled another agenda item, the search for a new superintendent to replace Don Burns, who will retire in January.

John Brandenburg, assistant director of Placement Services at Michigan State University (MSU) was present to explain the assistance MSU and other Michigan universities provide to local boards faced with the task of finding a superintendent.

Brandenburg supplied board members with a brochure of his department's available services and told them what they could expect.

"Probably 65-100 will apply due to the location of the St. Johns Schools and 8-12 interviews are usually appropriate," Brandenburg said.

The cost of MSU's services should not be more than costs associated with mileage, food and lodging, he said, about \$450-\$750.

Next on the agenda was Olive Township Supervisor Earl Barks, who asked the board about the township's proposed purchase of Olive Center Elementary School. Other members of Olive Township Board were also present to make the request.

Board members acknowledged that the issue had been tabled at an earlier meeting and moved to put the school on the market, open for sealed bids. Board members have reserved the right to refuse all bids, and proceeds of the sale will payoff the building debt and be added to a maintenance fund.

Also during the meeting, Nancy Bottoms questioned the board about busing of first and second grade students from East Essex to Perrin-Palmer School. Parents are concerned that their children are being bused too far from home, she said. Board members replied that their children have also been bused and said kids adjust to the situation easier than parents do.

"I was told by Roger Feeman that it was cheaper to bus the children from the country to the city rather than vice-versa. How can that be when it is the same distance?" Ms. Bottoms asked.

"The difference is, we cannot deviate from our original plans. It's a jigsaw puzzle. If we do deviate it will throw the whole thing off," Superintendent Burns replied.

Board members ended the discussion by advising parents and teachers with questions on the busing subject to first meet with the administration.

Board members also approved a parent request by James Voit to transfer his son's state aid membership to the Laingsburg School District where his son plans to attend in September. Recommendations by the high school principal and others who have counseled the student convinced board members the move would be in the student's best interests, and the motion was passed.

Also accepted were the resignations of John Furry from the position of boy's gymnastics coach for the 1982-83 school year, and teacher Mary Huneke.

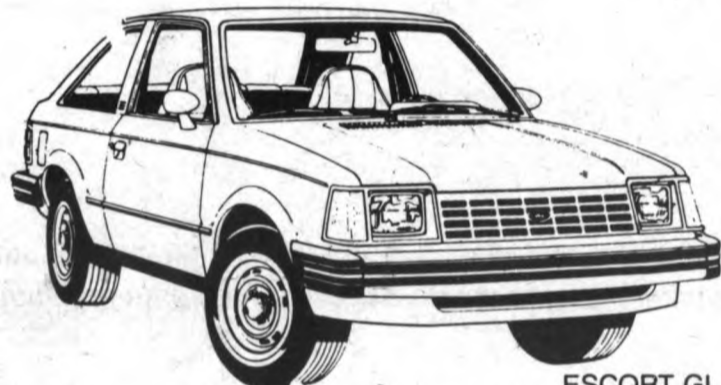

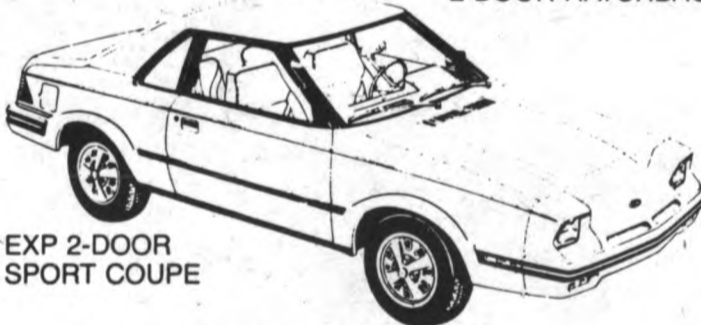

No cowboys, but plenty of water

Fowler looks back on 125 years

J.R. Ewing a Clinton County farmer? "America's Team" the Dallas Dairymen? But for a morass of mud, it might have been, and Fowler would now be — no kidding — Dallas.

At least that's the way it began 126 years ago, according to Clinton County News files, when the Village of Dallas was founded three-quarters of a mile east of Fowler.

But the land chosen for a Detroit and Milwaukee Railroad depot by Chief Engineer Robert Higham — who had more success in his earlier selection of the site of St. Johns — was soon discovered to be in the middle of a swamp. About a year later, fed up with having to slog through muck to leave town in all but the driest or coldest months, the handful of Dallas residents were begging the railroad to move the station west to firmer footings.

For a fee of \$750, the railroad agreed, and the depot was moved in 1857 to land owned by a man from Detroit named J.N. Fowler. Also moved was a hotel which had been built in Dallas by E.A. Wales and Herman Marsh. They renamed their hotel The Fowler House, which was pretty smart since the new town wasn't named Fowler for two more years.

According to local history, you see, Fowler was not only once Dallas, it was also Isabella — and was almost Polk. Research done in time for the village's centennial in 1957 turned up the fact that Mr. Fowler also owned land in Isabella County. Why he preferred that name to his own, and why local residents did not, are still matters of speculation, however. In any case, Mr. Fowler agreed in 1869 to grant the request of Isabella residents and change the name of their village to Fowler.

None of the name changes were probably welcomed by Davis Parks, who was among the first settlers in the area. Drawing straws, he won the honor of naming Dallas Township, which was part of Lebanon Township until 1845. He chose the name of James A. Polk's vice-president (the other choice was Polk, historians say).

So what happened to Dallas? Some say it was one of

the first from Michigan to pick up and leave for Texas. Others say the destination was Hollywood. Reliable local accounts, though, say Dallas just sank into the swamp, leaving only its township behind.

As for Fowler's leaders, a name is a name. "I don't know what difference it makes," Fowler Supervisor and life-long local resident John Schafer said. Fowler Clerk Winnie McKean agreed.

"Maybe there is one," she replied when asked if there should be a Dallas in Michigan (there's a Dafter and a Daggett, but no Dallas). "People would probably just get us confused with Dallas Township the same way they confuse us with Fowlerville (in Livingston County). We even have people drive here thinking we're Fowlerville, but we usually straighten them out," she said.

Schafer suspects the original site, if not the name, might have been better, though. "If we hadn't moved, we might not have had trouble with flooding," he said, referring to the Fowler flood of July 11, 1957.

The flood left water two-feet deep in all of the village south of the railroad tracks, and lakes as deep as 41 inches in some places. At the time, meteorologists called the phenomenon a "once-in-a-century" event. "It happened exactly one month before our centennial," Schafer recalls.

According to that schedule, Fowler residents have 75 years to build an ark. Celebrating their village's 125th anniversary last Saturday, many of Fowler's 1,021 residents — up from 1,020 at the 1970 census — turned out to enjoy a dance, live music, a barbeque and a parade.

Heavy rains and thunderstorms drenched areas north of Fowler the same day, and in Holland, about 75 miles southwest as a crow flies, 11 inches of rain fell, causing a record-breaking flood.

"We had to push the parade back an hour because of the rain in the morning," said Bill Beauchamp, chairman of the 125th anniversary celebration.

It did not rain on Fowler's parade, however, and "everything went pretty well, except it was really hot," Beauchamp said.

Mrs. Tropp is originally from Lansing, where she attended Walter French Junior High School and Eastern High School through the 10th grade. Her own children attended St. Johns High School.

Her classmates were of all ages, but many, like her, finished raising their

families before going back to school for an education.

As an employee at Michigan State University, is higher education one of Mrs. Tropp's future goals?

"I haven't really decided yet what I'd like to do or if

I'd like to continue," she said.

Senior citizen update By Ruth Delo

After four long years of working, planning and waiting, the Clinton Area Care Center is in operation. It has been named the "Hazel I. Findly Country Manor".

Mark Stapelman, administrator of the County Manor, reports that as of July 12, 35 patients had been admitted to the facility. There will be three or four patients admitted everyday until the nursing side of the facility is full.

The whole thing starts with people putting their name on a waiting list. They are then contacted to determine the kind of client they will become — skilled care, basic care or residential.

The Social worker and director of nurses will visit the patient to establish their physical condition and A.D.L. (activities of daily living). The information they receive at this time is very important. They learn residents' past history, their interests and social experiences, such as singing, bible group, etc.

Patients also must have reports from their physician about their condition. A chest Xray and a certification from the physician stating that they are free from communicable disease are required.

When all of this is put together they should have all the information they need and are ready for admission.

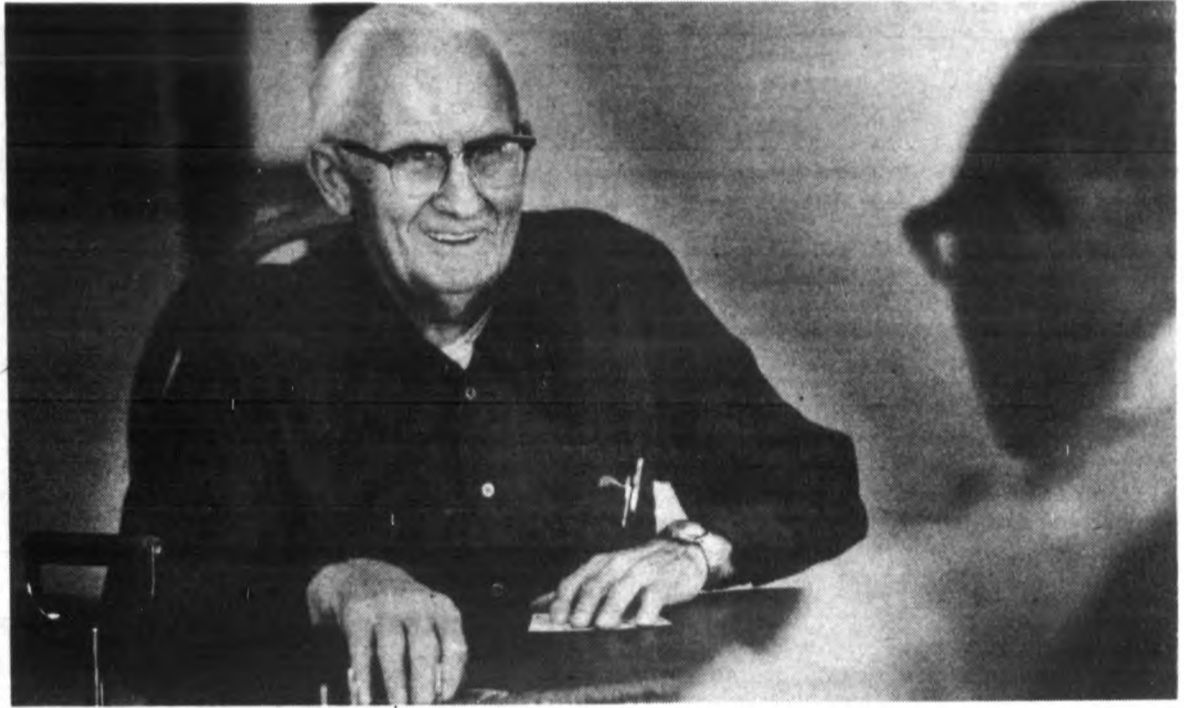
For most people, entering any kind of nursing home is quite a dramatic experience. Even moving from one nursing home to another is quite an ordeal. Moving from a place that they have become accustomed to into a new place, even as beautiful as the Country Manor, is a very trying experience. They are reluctant to be uprooted, either from another nursing home, their own home or wherever they call home.

Of you should visit the facility you would see that most patients are, by now, getting "settled in" and enjoying this beautiful place.

If you have a potential resident or patient for the facility, contact Roberta Dianda, the social worker at the Country Manor. Her number is 224-8936.

At the present time there is no waiting list for residential care. For this part of the facility you must be 62 or older and fairly self-sufficient.

Bucs keep Cards winless, 17-6

All the conditions were right for the Bath Cardinals to break out of their winless slump when they played the Detroit Bucs July 17. There was a large Bath Community Days crowd on hand, the players were fired-up about playing at home and they were eager to rebound after suffering a big loss the week before.

Trouble was; the Bucs weren't willing to co-operate. Detroit got two touchdowns from tailback Mike Rue en route to a 17-6 win over the Cardinals, dropping Bath to 0-5 on the year. For Bath coach Gary Feaster, the main disappointment was his team's inability to capitalize on two Bucs turnovers.

"I was just disappointed in our inability to move the ball in the first half after we'd get a turnover," Feaster said. "But it was just the second game for our quarterback (Craig Tyler) and he's coming along real well."

One of the turnovers for Bath came on the second play of the game, when defensive end Dan Doneth pounced on a Detroit fumble on the Bucs' 29-yard-line, putting the Cardinals in excellent scoring position.

The Cardinals were unable to move the ball, however, and were faced with a long fourth down. They elected to try a fake field goal, but the Bucs thwarted the attempt and took over on their own 30-yard-line.

Detroit used a strong running game spearheaded by Rue and Roosevelt Sweeney to move the length of the field before Rue ran it in from one foot out to give the Bucs a 6-0 lead. E.J. Burno converted the extra point, making the score 7-0.

The visiting Bucs scored again on their next possession, with Rue once again doing the damage. The conversion was good, and the Bucs had a 14-0 lead to take into halftime.

Cardinal defensive back Mike Zeeb saved another possible touchdown in the first half when he intercepted a Lee Stiltner pass on the Bath 10-yard-line.

"The defensive backfield has been one of our most consistent spots all year," Feaster said. "But I didn't feel that Detroit's passing attack was as good as we've seen. Grand Rapids (which beat Bath, 54-7, the week before) had the best passing attack in the league."

After a scoreless third quarter, Detroit got on the board again in the fourth with a 25-yard field goal by Burno, making the score 17-0. Burno missed another field goal attempt later in the quarter, however, kicking the ball wide to the right.

Then came the Cardinals' turn to tally some points. Late in the game, Bath started a drive on its own 20-yard-line. Working out of the shotgun, the Cardinals began completing passes and moving down the field. The most spectacular play of the drive was a circus catch by Jim Heldmeyer which brought Bath all the way down to the Bucs' nine-yard-line.

Two offsides penalties courtesy of Detroit moved the Cardinals all the way to the one. Bath returned the favor with an illegal procedure call, however, and a quarterback sack following the penalty gave the Cards a fourth-and-15 situation.

But Tom Gooden found his way into the end zone, where he caught the ball to give the Cards their first points of the night. Rick Szedlak's conversion was good, leaving the score at 17-6.

The Cardinals will continue their search of the elusive first win July 24, when they travel to Haslett to face the Lansing Crusaders.

"That's going to be a big ballgame for us," Feaster said. "I'm sure we'll be the underdogs. Lansing has one of the best passing attacks in the league."

And as if the Crusaders won't be enough to handle, Feaster also said the Cards are facing a little morale problem. "There's no question," he said, "there is starting to be a morale problem on the team. But we have guys who just go out and play hard every week and never complain, so we'll be alright."

Wrestler off to nationals

Jim Sinadinos of DeWitt will be one of 35 high school wrestlers representing the state of Michigan in the United States Wrestling Federation Junior National Championships, which will be held on the campus of the University of Iowa July 27-31.

Sinadinos, who will be a junior at DeWitt this year, earned the trip to Iowa City by placing second in both the freestyle and Greco-Roman (no leg use allowed) categories at the Michigan Junior Nationals, which were held at Michigan State University

Casler set to tackle LCC

A very honest and candid young man, Jeff Casler says he accepted an athletic scholarship to attend Lansing Community College — as opposed to a four-year school — because "my grades weren't as good as they should have been."

But if Casler tackles his schoolwork the way he tackled basketball, his goal of eventually transferring to a four-year college will no doubt be realized.

As the scoring star for St. Johns last season, Casler led the Redwings to an 11-11 record. Along the way, the 6-1 guard poured in points as fast as the scoreboard could tally them. His season-high of 46 points against Grand Ledge ranks as his personal highlight of last season.

But while he had no problems keeping ahead of the competition in high school, Casler realizes it won't be as easy next year. "I'm going to have to bust my tail," he says. "It's really going to be a jump for me. We didn't play in a competitive conference — it was a Class B conference — so I didn't have to work that hard in high school."

But work he will as a member of coach Art Frank's LCC Stars. "I'm really going to have to work on the defensive things," Casler says. "I also need work on my ballhandling and passing. I didn't have to do much of that in high school. They just passed me the ball and I shot."

At LCC, Casler will be joining a team which went 26-5 last year and looks to make a serious run at the National Junior College title this year. The Stars were also the state JC champs last season and will be looking to duplicate the feat this year.

"My personal goal is just to play," says Casler. "I just want to be in the top eight on the team. But as for the team, coach Frank says we have a really good chance at the national championship this year, so I'd really like to do that. I just want to help the team."

Casler would also like to run track at LCC, but there is one little problem with that. LCC doesn't have a track team. "Maybe I'll run track when I transfer to a four-year school," he says.

In addition to his standout performances on the St. Johns basketball and track squads, Casler also played football until he dislocated his elbow his junior year. He says the injury still bothers him from time to time. "It's kind of a permanent thing," Casler says. "Sometimes when I throw something, it will start to hurt."

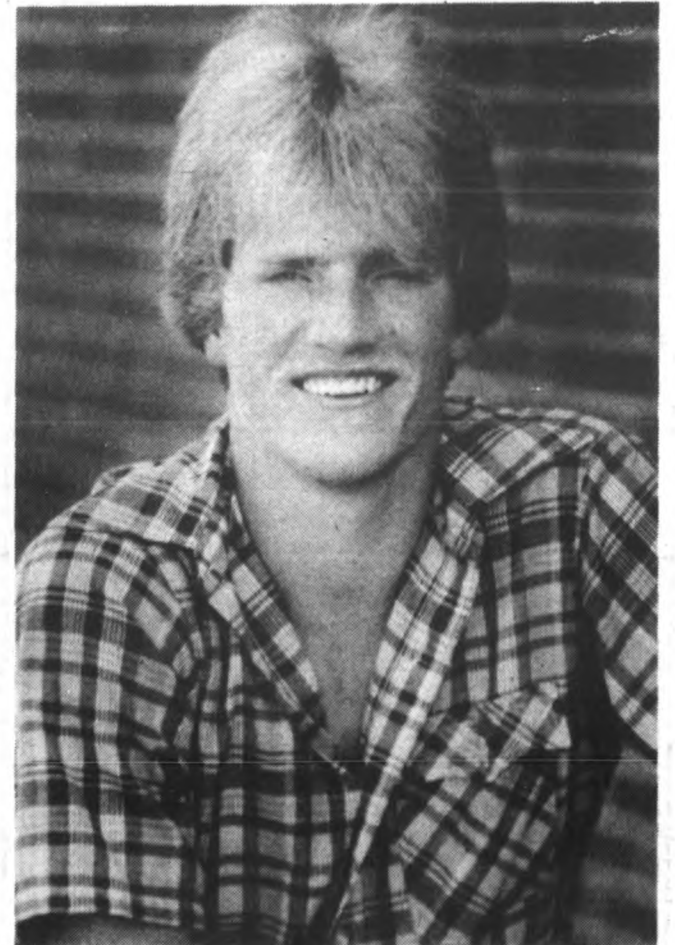
During the summer, Casler says he hasn't been spending much time on the basketball court. He is one of those athletes who likes to play whatever is in season at the time. In the summer, that means bats and balls.

"I've been playing a lot of softball this summer," Casler says with just a little guilt in his voice. "I probably should be playing more basketball, but I figure that since we start practicing in October, I'll get my fill of basketball soon enough."

At LCC, Casler will start on a Physical Education major with a minor in business. "They're real big on

business down there," he says. And being able to concentrate solely on basketball, the Stars should find themselves with some added scoring punch from Casler next year.

He also has one more goal he wouldn't mind reaching. "I'd like to grow another inch or two before next year," he says.

Furry resigns as coach

Farming's future is not so gloomy

Editor's note: This the final story in a three-part series about the plight and future of the Mid-Michigan farmer by Charles Honey, editor of the Williamston Enterprise. Our "Searchlight" series is an attempt to focus on issues which affect the eight Tri-County communities served by Lansing Suburban Newspapers.

By CHARLES HONEY

The long-term future of farming in Michigan is not as gloomy as the farm industry's current plight.

Mid-Michigan area farmers and agricultural experts don't know when recovery will occur, and at least one expert says another hard year is likely for farmers. But most agree a combination of the farmer's savvy and the state's encouragement, added to Michigan's natural resources and diversity of farm products, will revive and strengthen the state's \$16 billion industry.

However, the speed of Michigan's farming recovery, like other states', will largely depend on issues out of the state's control — interest rates and foreign trade policies, experts add.

About one-third of Michigan's 36 million acres are used for agriculture, and more than 50 farm commodities are produced commercially, according to Don Schaner, chief of the state agriculture department's soil conservation division. The importance of the farming industry, stressed by Gov. Milliken in last year's State of the State Message, has been made "more of a priority in the minds of the people of Michigan," Schaner said.

Michigan leads the U.S. in production of tart cherries,

edible beans and blueberries. Schaner and others see crop diversity as an inherent strength in state agriculture. By contrast, Iowa is basically a two-crop state — corn and soybeans, Schaner said.

Another strong point for Michigan's future is its vast fresh water resource, according to Sylvan Wittwer, director of the Michigan State University Agricultural Experiment Station. Water will be farming's "most critical factor in the next decade," as agriculture consumes 80 to 85 percent of U.S. fresh water resources, Wittwer said. Because of the Great Lakes, Michigan won't experience serious shortages like many other states, he said.

Wittwer predicts that the state's farming industry will

bounce back because farmers will change their techniques to cope with new realities. Many farmers are taking greater control of the marketing of their products, with pick-your-own operations or city market stalls, Wittwer pointed out. Increased productivity and efficiency through genetic engineering will also become more important, he believes.

1983 will be a hard year for Michigan farmers, but by the end of that growing season, an upswing may begin, believes MSU agricultural economist Mike Kelsey. Farmers must continue to set aside acreage in order to reduce crop surpluses, Kelsey added.

"As long as we've got this tremendous carry-over we have from year to year, we're going to be stifled in any recovery," Kelsey said.

Kelsey doesn't foresee many farmers going out of business next year. The large operators with big investments could be hurt the most, while full-time family operations should remain the strongest, he speculates.

All farmers must adapt to a riskier financial environment in which government support is much weaker than it formerly was, in Kelsey's view. It is "a completely new ballgame," in which farmers have to learn to play by more closely assessing their capital purchases, maintaining financial reserves, and being shrewder marketers.

Farming's increasing financial complexity has created a tremendous demand for college-educated farmers who also grew up on a farm; those who did not grow up as farmers are not considered good credit risks, he said.

The state recently moved to assist young farmers financially when Milliken signed into law the Michigan Family Farm Development Program. Young farmers with a net worth of \$250,000 or less can borrow up to

\$400,000 at rates possibly 3 to 9 percent below the prime, and \$125,000 can be used to buy equipment. The loans may be available by next summer, according to the Farm Bureau, and will be financed through bond sales.

The Right to Farm Bill, approved by the state last year, was another important protection for farmers; it is an incentive for those hesitant to invest in operations neighbors could consider a nuisance, said Schaner of the state agriculture department.

Public Act 116, which affords a property tax break for those who agree to keep their land in production for several years, is probably the most significant farmer assistance law, according to state Sen. Richard Allen. Farms are also exempt from the single-business tax, and that break would be extended to agricultural processors under a bill Allen has introduced.

Attracting processing industries was one of the keys of Milliken's pro-agriculture pitch, and Allen sees them providing better prices for both farmers and consumers. Several processing businesses are reportedly negotiating to locate in Michigan, and the Ingham County Economic Development Corporation has approved a resolution for a potato processing operation.

Ingham, Eaton and Clinton counties have EDC programs to help farmers finance their equipment and land purchases.


State and local incentives notwithstanding, farmers' fortunes are largely controlled by the interest rates on their credit and the prices on their commodities.

Opinions vary on how to raise prices and depress costs, but there is a consensus that grain embargoes are an unnecessary evil. The American Farm Bureau Federation included "guaranteed grain delivery" in a 12-point plan to improve depressed farm income.

MSU's Wittwer said the U.S. must re-establish its international "credibility as a food exporter" in the wake of the Russian grain embargo.

In sum, Wittwer feels U.S. farming is blessed with a balance of assets unapproached by any other nation, and to thrive in the future, he confidently declared, "We just need to put those endowments to work."

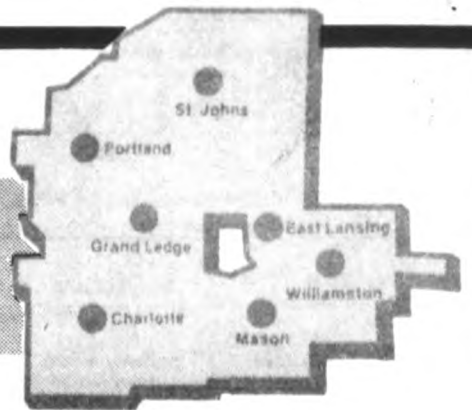

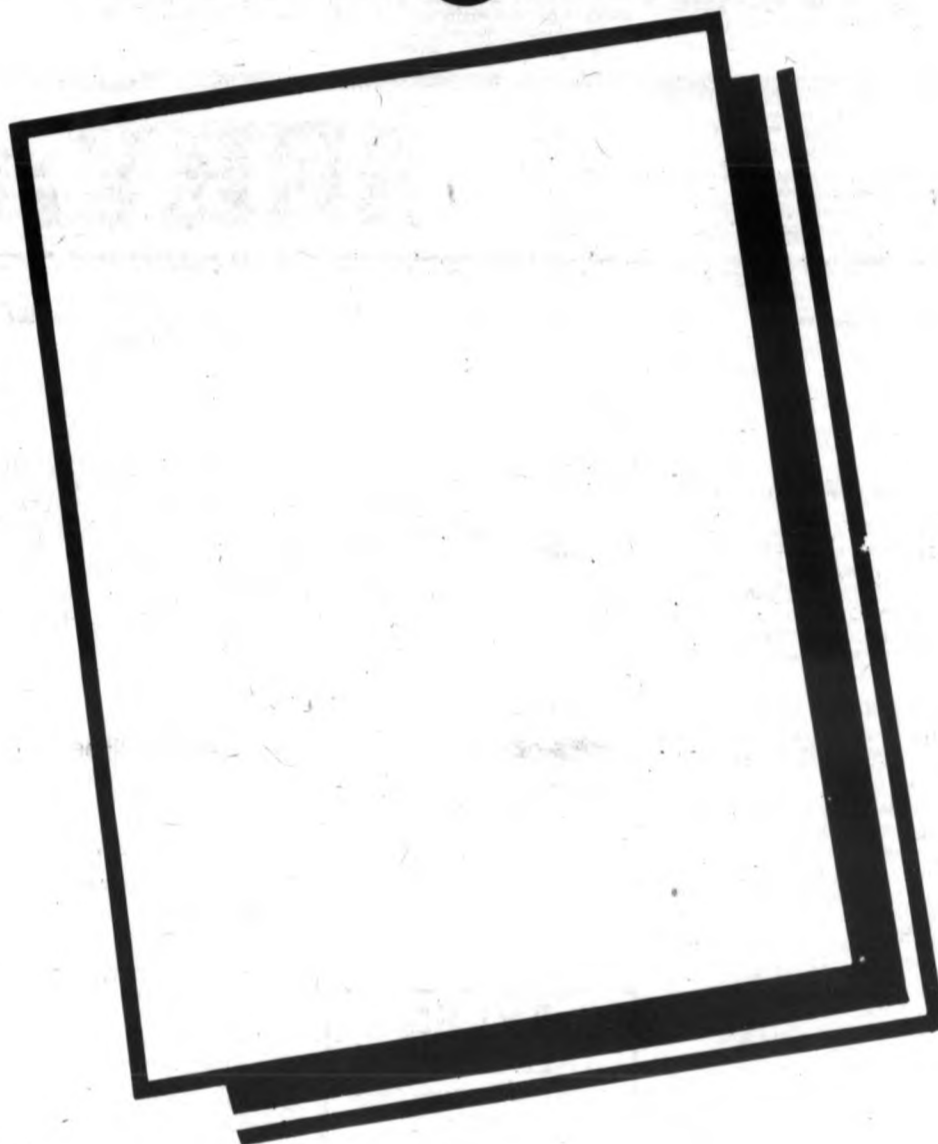
