Computer for the purpose of logging city budgetary, accounting, and utility records, as well as payroll and personnel.

The total cost of the computer is projected to cost a total of \$63,813.80 over a five year period, including two terminals and a printer.

According to City Clerk Richard Coletta, \$31,400 is budgeted into the City Budget for the purchase of the computer. During the first year, only \$17,075 would be needed for the software and \$9,347.76 for hardware payments.

Board adopts new budget

include an improvement in the Adult Education Program, with the addition of a new computer class.

The budget was adopted 4-2, with board members Leonard Puetz and Neil Barnhart opposing. Board member Gary Whitford was absent.

According to Controller Rick Terres, the budget was adopted in conjunction with the a state law that requires a tentative budget be adopted by July 1st. However, he explained that state aid and enrollment are still unknown and that he expects the budget to be amended when that information becomes available. A new detailed line-item budget should be adopted in October.

In other action, the board extended Superintendent Earl Gabriel's contract for one year, gave him a \$1,000 increase in salary and decided there

will be no change in his fringe benefits.

Despite an effort by board members Thomas Irrer and R. Lee Ormston to increase Gabriel's salary to \$47,000 for the 1984-85 school year, the motion was defeated with the board voting to increase the pay to \$46,000. Last year, Gabriel made \$45,000.

Board member Barnhart questioned the extension of Gabriel's contract, stating that there had been some satisfaction in his evaluation. He suggested that the extension, slated to end June 30th, 1986, was a bit premature and suggested the board wait until the end of next year for the possible extension of his contract.

Nevertheless, in a 5-1 vote, the board chose to extend the contract, with Barnhart voting no.

Warning on mail order fireworks

The Michigan Consumers Council is warning consumers of the dangers of using mail order chemicals and other hazardous fireworks during the upcoming July 4th holiday.

The warning is being issued following reports of serious injuries to individuals attempting to make their own fireworks using mail order kits.

Michigan Consumers Council Director Kent Wilcox, in commenting on the warning, said that the alert is necessary because "the Consumer Product Safety Commission has identified the sale of mail order kits which may produce explosions that are even more dangerous than the illegally-sold M-80's and Silver Salute fireworks."

Wilcox noted, "these kits are a transparent scheme designed to get around the law by selling parts of the fireworks separately. The individual chemicals contained in these separate mail order kits pose a significant health hazard if mixed together incorrectly."

"Consumers must be aware that a majority of accidents associated with the use of fireworks each year can be prevented if caution is exercised."

"The Consumers Council doesn't promote private use of

fireworks," Wilcox said, "but urges fireworks users to take precautions when using fireworks."

The following guidelines are recommended when handling fireworks: adult supervision in the selection and use of fireworks; follow manufacturer's instructions when using fireworks; store fireworks in a dry, cool place; avoid rough handling of fireworks to avoid damage to their fuses; use fireworks outdoors only; keep fireworks away from houses, dry brush and other potentially ignitable items; keep a bucket of water handy to put out small fires if they occur or to extinguish any malfunctioning fireworks; and keep firework devices out of the hands of small children.

The United States Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) estimates that some 8,300 people were treated for fireworks-related injuries at hospital emergency rooms last year. More than half of the injuries

The State Board of Education will hold a public hearing Friday, July 6 on a property transfer case in Clinton County.

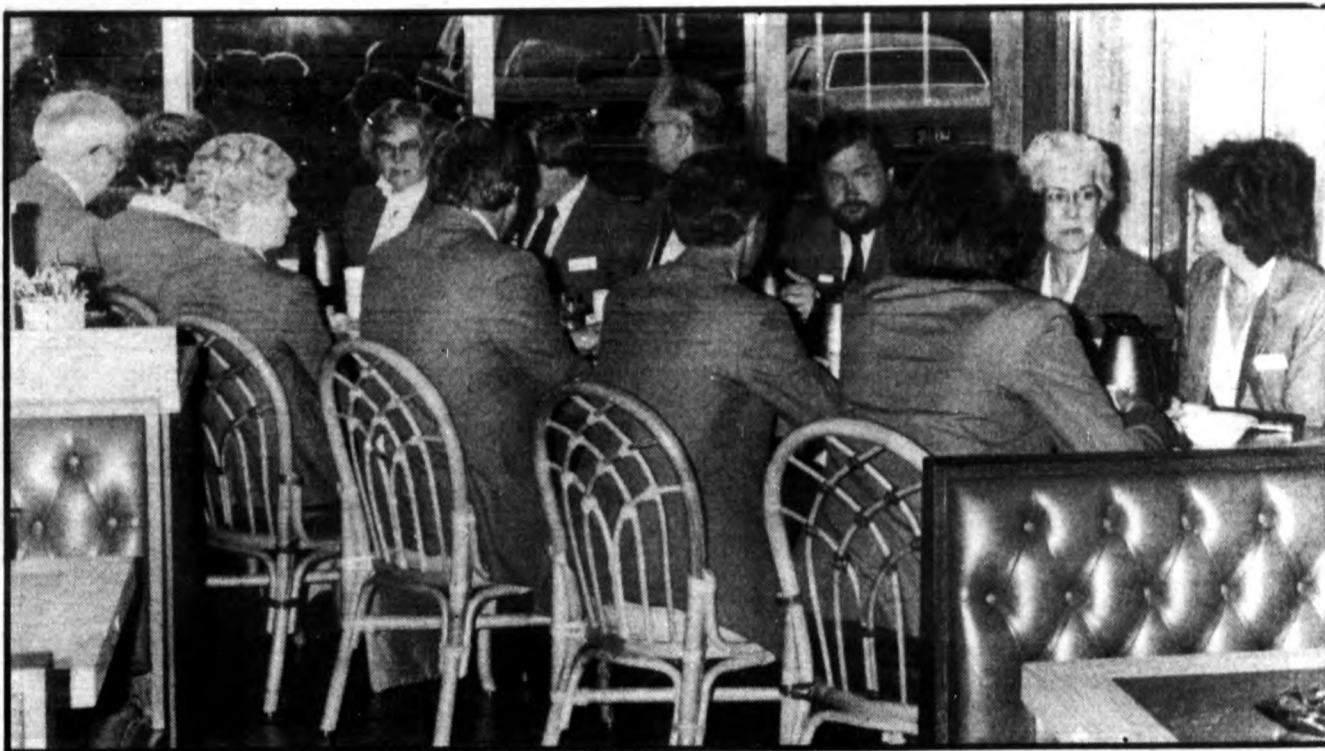

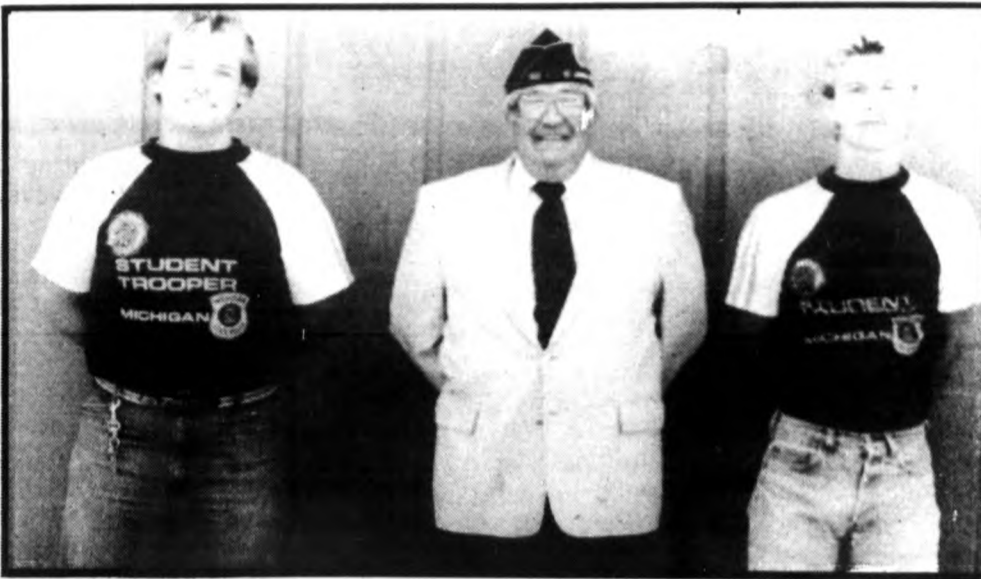
Robertson also announced that on July 17, Franklin Rothfuss, governor of this Rotary

Grain stocks lower in month of June

The June 1 grain stocks report showed much lower stocks of corn, soybeans and oats, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Corn stored in all positions, at nearly 53.8 million bushels, was 67 percent lower than last year. Big declines were noted in both on and off farm storages. About 62 percent of the corn in storage was held in on-farm locations. Soybeans on hand were 5.4 million bushels, down 46 percent from last year. Old crop oats in storage at 3.3 million bushels declined 52 percent from last year. Old crop winter wheat is the only major crop in Michigan to show an increase in stocks. On June 1, holdings totaled about 7.5 million

bushels, 14 percent above last year's level.

Nationally, corn stored in all positions on June 1 totaled 2.14 billion bushels, 57 percent less than last year's record high level of 4.92 billion bushels. Of the total corn on hand, 57 percent or 1.21 billion bushels was stored on farms. Soybean stocks in all positions totaled 456 million bushels, down 42 percent from a year ago, and 29 percent below June 1, 1982. Old crop oats in all storage positions totaled 181 million bushels, down 18 percent from June 1 a year ago. Old crop wheat stored in all positions totaled 1.39 billion bushels, down 8 percent from the 1.52 billion bushels on hand a year ago, but 20 percent more than two years ago.

Cherry crop is up

Michigan's 1984 tart cherry crop is forecast at 240 million pounds,

compared to last year's small crop of 87 million (Continued on page 22)

Milk production declines during May

Milk production continues to decline, both nationally and in Michigan. Dairy herds produced 463 million pounds of milk in Michigan during May, down 3 percent from a year earlier according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Milk cow numbers averaged 394,000 head, down 10,000 from one year ago. Milk output per cow has also declined from year earlier levels. The May average of 1,175 pounds was down 5 pounds from 1983. Despite this lower production, Michigan continues to hold sixth place nationally in milk cow numbers and milk production. The value of milk sold in Michigan during May averaged \$13.10 per hundredweight (cwt.), down 40 cents from a

year earlier. This price reflects the total value of milk at the dairy plant or receiving station before deductions are made for hauling and dairy assessment charges. Slaughter cow prices averaged \$42.00 per cwt., down 3 percent from a year ago.

Nationally, milk production during May totaled 12.3 billion pounds, 3 percent less than a year earlier. Production per cow averaged 1,132 pounds during May, 6 pounds less than May 1983. Milk cow numbers averaged 10.9 million head, 2 percent less than a year ago. Accumulated milk production during the first 5 months of 1984 exceeded

58 billion pounds, down 1 percent from the comparable 1983 period. May milk production was below previous year levels in 32 of the 33 states which compile monthly estimates. California showed a 5 percent increase in milk production from a year ago. Milk production in Wisconsin, the leading dairy state, was off 1 percent from the previous year.

Dairy manufacturing plants in Michigan produced 4.9 million pounds of butter during April, down 11 percent from the previous year. American cheese output, at 1.2 million pounds, was down 24 percent from a year

earlier. Ice cream production, at 3.1 million gallons, was up 23 percent from last year.

Day Camp to explore the sky at MSU planetarium

Helping with the afternoon activities will be Bill Selleck, president of the MSU Astronomy Club. The afternoon activities will include follow-up projects on the morning

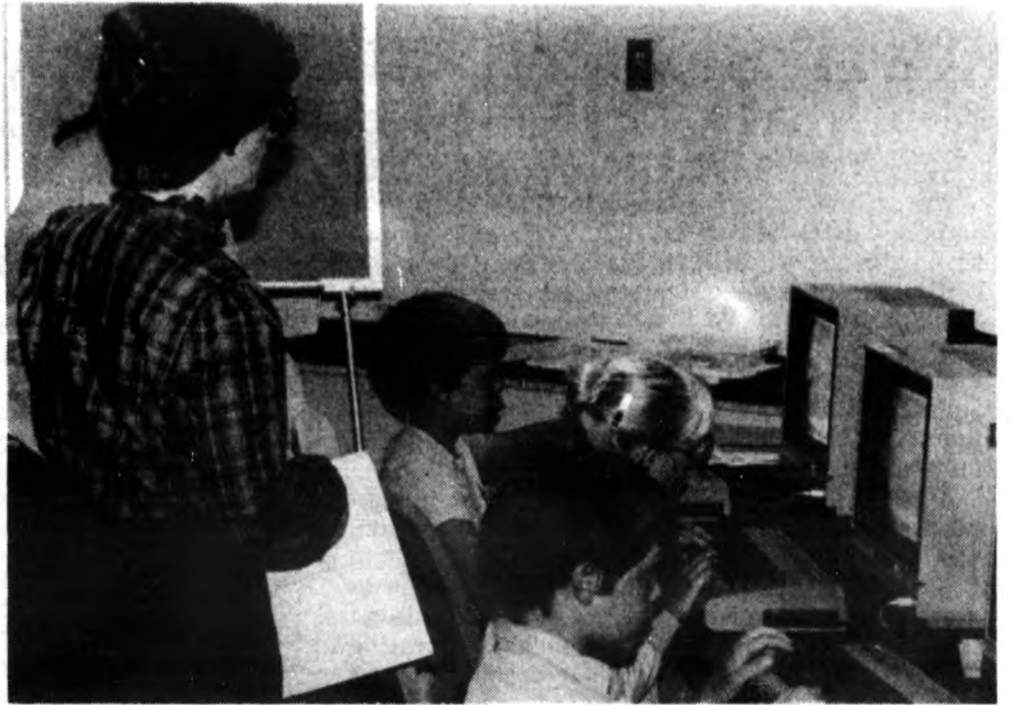
presentation as well as taking advantage of related experiences at MSU.

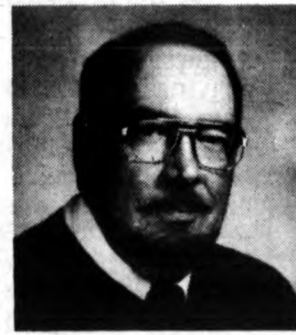

pounds. This will be the State's fourth largest tart cherry crop since records began in 1925, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Substantial tree plantings in the late 1970's which are now coming into production helped push this year's crop to its large level. There was no significant freeze damage this spring. Cold, wet and windy weather during pollination, however, limited the crop from reaching its maximum potential. Michigan has three primary growing regions which are located along the Lake Michigan shoreline. Production in the Northwest area is forecast at 140 million pounds, up 180 percent over last year. The West Central

area is pegged at 45 million pounds, up 275 percent versus a year ago. The crop in the Southwest is expected to be up 121 percent to 53 million pounds. Rounding out Michigan's tart cherry crop is an additional 2 million pounds forecast for minor growing areas.

Nationally, tart cherry production is forecast at 307.9 million pounds, nearly double last year's output. Michigan's production represents 78 percent of the U.S. total.

Sweet cherry production in Michigan is forecast at 30,000 tons, a 67 percent increase over a year ago. Nationally, sweet cherry production is pegged at 186,000 tons, a 4 percent increase versus 1983.



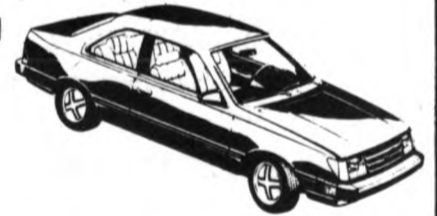

Badge Beat

On June 27th, the DeWitt Township Police were called to the scene of an accident involving Bath Police Officer Steven Michael Mitchell.

Ordinance No. 352

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE V, ZONING AND PLANNING, CHAPTER 51, KNOWN AS THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS, PARTICULARLY TO AMEND ARTICLE 6, SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS THEREOF TO CREATE A NEW SECTION, SECTION 5.181 ENTITLED "SATELLITE TELEVISION ANTENNAS" TO PROVIDE REGULATIONS WITH RESPECT TO THEIR CONSTRUCTION, ERECTION AND USE.

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

Section 1.

That the Zoning Ordinance of the City of St. Johns, and particularly Article 6 thereof, "SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS", shall be amended by the addition of the following section, which shall provide as follows:

Section 5.181. Satellite Television Antennas.

No satellite television antennas shall be erected, constructed, maintained, or operated except in conformance with the following regulations:

(1) Definitions.

(a) A "satellite television antenna" is an apparatus capable of receiving communications from a transmitter, or a transmitter relay, located in planetary orbit.

(b) Satellite television antennas also are commonly defined as, and it is the intent of the within section to provide for, satellite earth stations, satellite dish antennas, earth stations, or other apparatus used to receive communications from a satellite transmitter or transmitter relay.

(2) Satellite Antenna Location.

(a) The installation of a satellite earth station in any designated zoning district shall be in compliance with a setback requirement of 25 feet of the front property line and at least 10 feet of each interior side property line.

(b) In the event that a usable satellite signal cannot be obtained by locating the satellite earth station on the rear, side, or front yard of the property, such antenna may be placed on the roof of the dwelling structure or commercial structure, provided that a building permit is obtained prior to such installation and the construction and erection thereof is otherwise in compliance with City building and electrical codes.

(3) Antenna Size.

(a) A satellite earth station, located in a non-commercial zone, shall not exceed 20 feet in height, including any platform or structure upon which the antenna is mounted or affixed, and such antenna shall not exceed 15 feet in diameter.

(b) Not more than one satellite earth station shall be allowed in any non-commercial zone, on any parcel of land less than one-half acre in size.

(c) All satellite earth stations, and the construction and installation thereof, shall conform to applicable St. Johns city building code, electrical code, regulations and requirements as well as the provisions set forth herein.

(d) Except in a commercial or industrial district, any satellite earth station constructed in a residential or multi-family residential zone, shall be located and designed to reduce visual impact from surrounding properties at street level, and from public streets and right-of-ways, and shall be properly screened structures, painting or decorating and/or plantings and greenery to blend so much as is practicable with surrounding lands.

(e) Every satellite earth station must be adequately grounded for protection against a direct strike of lightning.

Section 2. The City Commission has predicted this amendment upon recommendation of the St. Johns Planning Commission, as a result of the Planning Commission's regular meeting held May 3, 1984.

Section 3. Except as herein provided, the Zoning Ordinance of the City of St. Johns Code shall stand as first enacted or subsequently amended.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its passage.

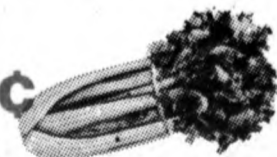
