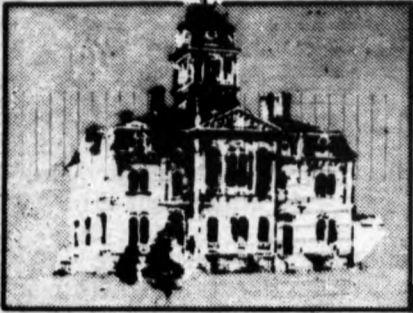

City receives Works grant for town renovations

Despite the overwhelming feeling that the city of St. Johns would not qualify for the recently applied for Small Cities Grant, the Department of Commerce notified City Assessor Diane Edwards Friday that the city will be receiving the monies for the improvements to the downtown area.

"I was really surprised when they told us we had received it," Edwards admitted. "We had gotten a lot of negative feedback regarding the grant."

The grant, totaling \$47,600, will be used in as part of a funding ratio between downtown business owners and the city. According to Edwards, the ratio represents \$2 being paid locally by business owners and the city, to every \$1 of grant money requested for the project.

The grant money will be used to improve the downtown area by repairing sidewalks, curbs and gutters, supplying new water leads and

doing asphalt paving. At the same time, downtown businesses have agreed to make general improvements on their stores by remodeling, putting on new store fronts or increasing their employment.

Edwards said receiving the money is only the beginning of the process to improve the conditions of the downtown. The next step of the process is to assess the needs of the merchants to determine what improvements will be made as a business. Then, a public hearing must be held to announce plans and bids for the project. She adds that the entire project must be done by next June.

Last week, Edwards had been told that 141 cities had applied for the grant, adding up to approximately 141 million dollars. In full, the Public Works Grant had only five million dollars to distribute. She said she's glad St. Johns was chosen as one of the few to receive the money.

The Farmers Market is returning to downtown St. Johns, beginning Saturday, July 21, from 8 a.m. to noon, on the east side of Maple Avenue.

According to Joann Martis, executive director of the Chamber of Commerce, the weekly market will feature home grown products and crafts supplied by area residents wishing to sell their produce.

"We expect the market to continue on into September," she said, "Or as long as there seems to be an interest."

Company pays for civil penalty

Breckenridge Stockyard, Inc., has agreed to a \$300 civil penalty and a cease and desist order from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

B.H. (Bill) Jones, head of USDA's Packers and Stockyard Administration, said the firm agreed to the penalties to settle charges that it operated without an adequate bond.

Breckenridge Stockyard, which draws livestock consignments from central Michigan, has since filed the required increase in its bond.

In agreeing to the penalties, the firm neither admitted nor denied the charges which were filed last January by USDA in an administrative com-

plaint under the authority of the Packers and Stockyards Act.

The cease and desist order, similar to a permanent injunction, was issued to insure future compliance with the P and S Act.

The P and S Act is an anti-trust, fair trade practice and payment protection law.

Education Committee sponsors county candidate night

The Political Education Committee of the Clinton County Farm Bureau is sponsoring a "Meet the Candidate Night". All candidates for the office of District Judge, Prosecuting Attorney, and Sheriff have been invited to participate in the program. It will be held on Thursday, July 26 at 7:30 p.m. at Smith Hall. The public is invited to attend.

The purpose of the meeting is to give the public the opportunity to meet the candidates personally and to ask questions concerning local issues. All candidates will be running in the August 7 primary.

The format for the meeting has been established by the Political Education Committee. The moderator will be Al Almy, director of public affairs, from Michigan Farm Bureau. Each candidate will be allowed approximately five minutes to state his qualifications, to discuss issues which

pertain to the office he is running for, and to outline programs he would implement if he were elected.

Following introductions, the audience will be allowed to submit written questions which relate to county issues or to the position for which the candidate is running.

The Committee is also inviting any individuals running for Township, County or State offices to come to the meeting. There will be a refreshment time following the meeting at which all candidates may mingle among the people. Tables will be provided for literature or any hand out materials the individual candidates would like to distribute. The Committee does request that groups distribute materials only after the meeting has concluded. If individuals have any questions, they may call the Farm Bureau Office at 224-3255.

Sen. Cropsey honored in California

State Senator Alan Cropsey (R-DeWitt) was recently presented the Outstanding State Legislator of the Year Award at the 11th annual meeting of the American Legislative Exchange Council.

The presentation was made by ALEC's National Chairman, Representative Bill Ceverha (R-Texas) at the Council's June 23rd meeting in San Diego, California.

Cropsey, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, is ALEC's state chairman in Michigan and has been a member of the group for six years.

The 30th District lawmaker was cited by ALEC for "continuously fighting the excessive income tax increase" passed in 1983 and for his support in the Michigan Senate for the balanced budget constitutional convention call.

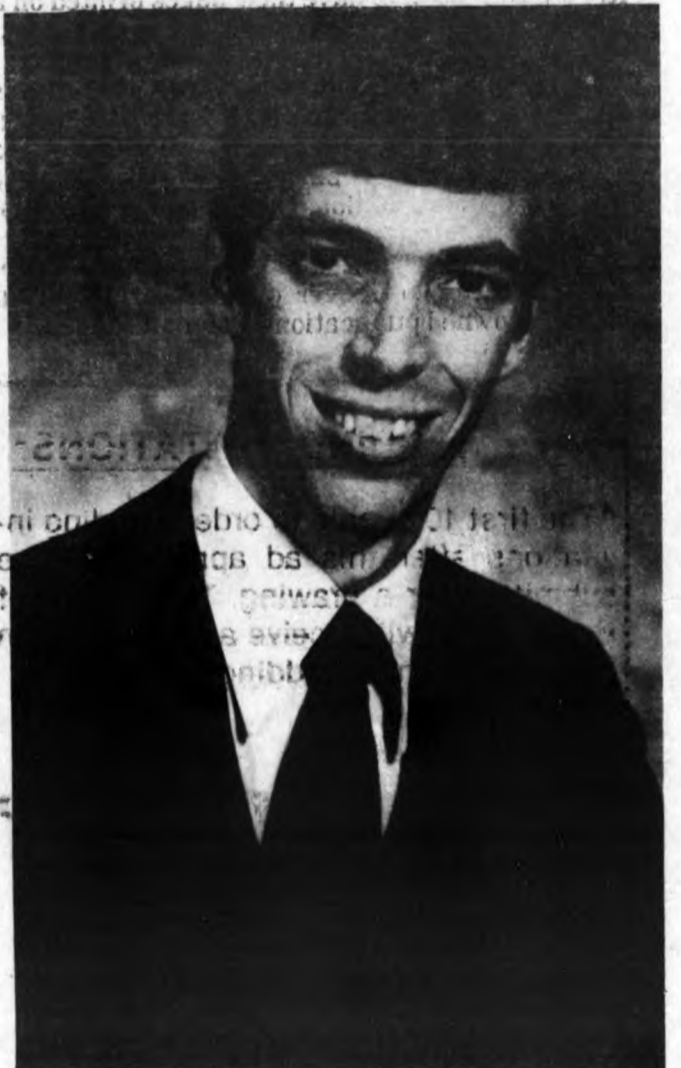

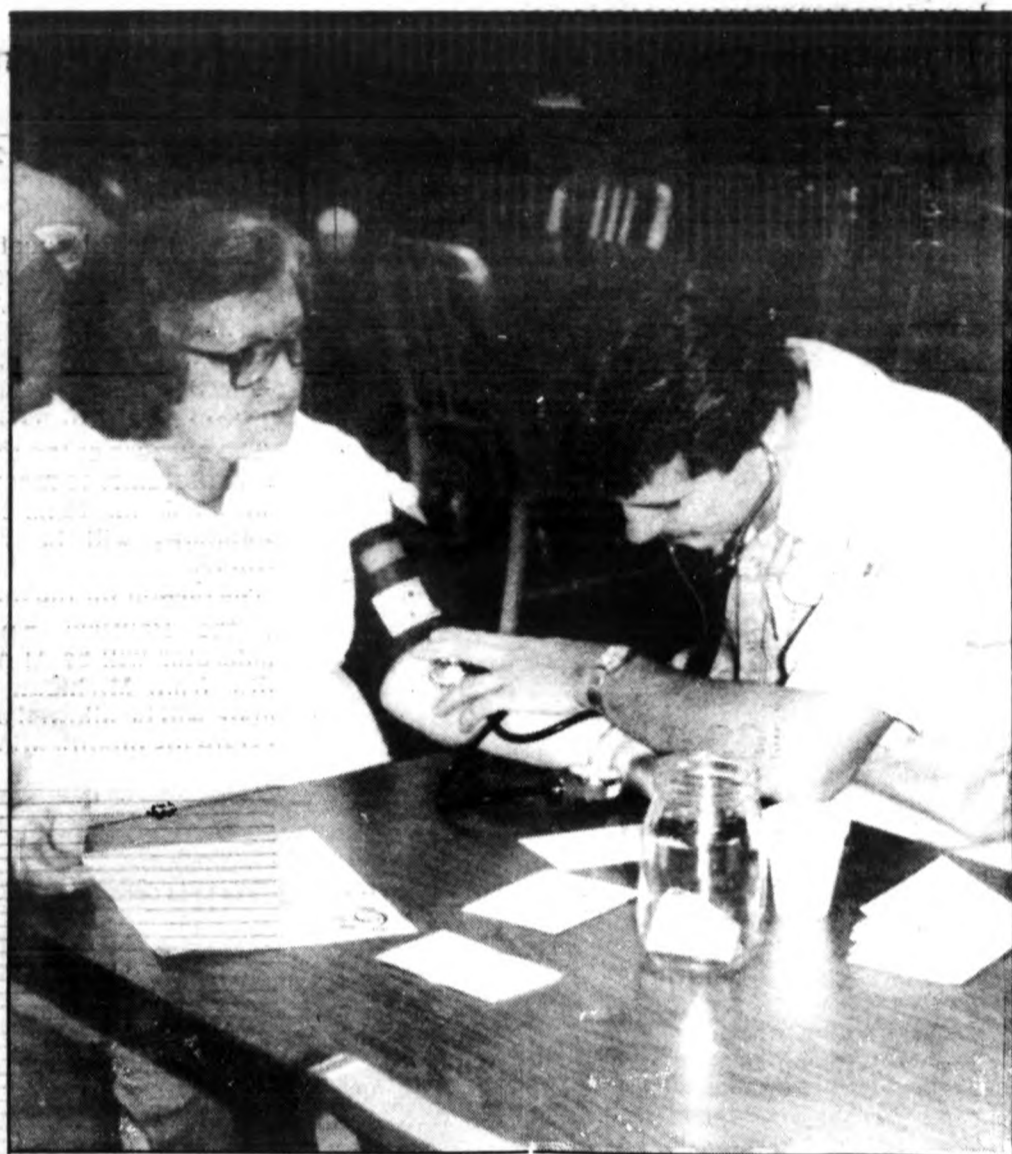

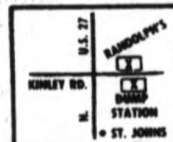

Rate holds steady

Michigan's unemployment rate held steady from May to June at 11.3 percent of the labor force, according to estimates released recently by S. Martin Taylor, director of the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

Taylor reported that the number of jobless workers in the state edged up to 503,000 in June, an increase of 6,000 from the May level. A year earlier, June 1983, Michigan's unemployment rate was 14.6 percent with 650,000 out of work.

The current June jobless rate is the lowest for the month since 1981 when the percentage of unemployed was 11.1 percent.

Taylor said conditions in Michigan's labor force remained stable during June as the work force and total employment registered fairly typical seasonal increases. The work force

grew by 56,000 to 4,451,000 while the number of new jobs by 50,000 to 3,949,000.

Most of the job gains occurred in the construction, service and retail trade industries. Since January, unemployment in the state has fallen from 12.8 to 11.3 percent, and the number of jobless has dropped by 27,000. At the same time, the labor force has grown by 305,000 and employment is up by 333,000.

Michigan's seasonally adjusted jobless rate dropped slightly in June to 11.6 percent from 11.7 percent in May. The number of unemployed was down by 6,000 to 505,000.

In June, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for the nation's civilian labor force fell to 7.1 percent from 7.5 percent in May. The number of unemployed workers nationwide fell by 384,000 to 8,130,000.

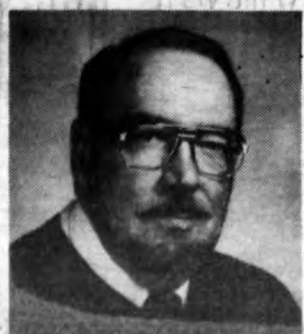

becomes obsolete. People don't often see that kind of service anymore, but I think its very important."

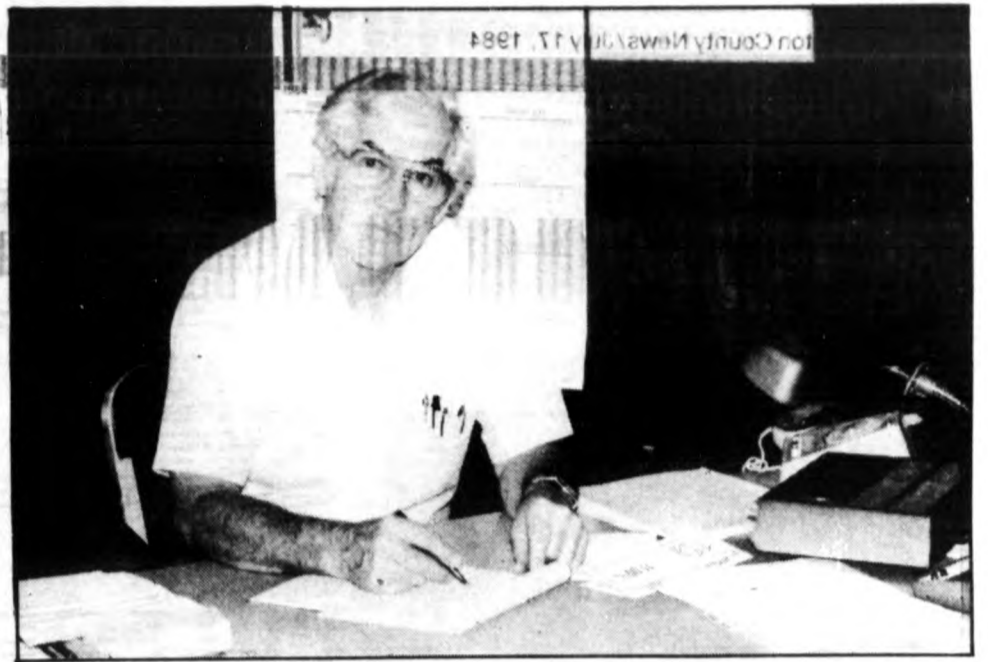

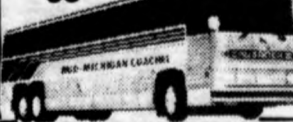

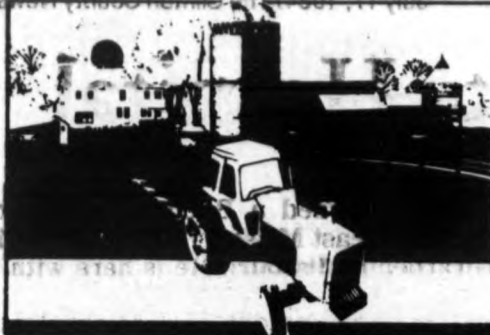

Michigan products preferred in state

Given a choice between products of equal price and quality, 85 percent of Michigan residents would prefer to purchase products manufactured in the state, according to results of a Michigan Department of Commerce survey announced recently by First Lady Paula Blanchard.

"These results demonstrate how important it is for Michigan manufacturers to identify their goods as 'Made in Michigan,'" Blanchard said.

Blanchard is a volunteer advisor to Commerce Director Ralph J. Gerson. She spearheads the state's "Yes!" Michigan product promotion program, which is working to encourage Michigan manufacturers to identify their products as having been made in the state.

The research study was conducted by the

Michigan State University College of Communication Arts and

Sciences. It was designed to measure consumer awareness, attitudes

labeling program indicating that products are made in Michigan, as that which is currently underway ... The use of a product logo indicative of Michigan origin appears to be an appropriate promotional tool."

Nearly 1,000 valid telephone survey calls were made, yielding 454 valid responses from residents of 68 Lower Peninsula and 13 Upper

Peninsula counties. Some 70 percent were between the ages of 18 and 64. Sixty-three percent were females; 60 percent were married, and nearly 80 percent had lived in Michigan for more than 10 years.

and purchasing behavior regarding products manufactured in Michigan.

"Nearly one-third (29 percent) of the respondents said they make it a point to purchase Michigan-made merchandise," Blanchard continued. "More than half (54 percent) said they would read labels to determine product origin.

"We've developed materials that make it easy for a company to use the Michigan logo on its label or package or in its advertising," Blanchard said. "We're also working with companies to help them publicize the fact that their products are made in our state."

Sixty-three percent of the survey respondents agreed with a statement which said they found it difficult to identify products made in Michigan.

"Such a finding," the research study concludes, "suggests the need for some type of

Planting continues in August

First you plant the cool-weather crops. Then you plant the warm-weather crops. And then you're done, right?

Wrong! You can go on planting vegetables even into August if you choose your crops and your varieties carefully.

Lee Taylor, Extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University, advises planting a variety of quick-maturing, cool-weather crops through the summer for a fall harvest.

Radishes and lettuce, for instance, can be planted every two or three weeks all summer for a continuous

harvest. Root maggots may be a problem on all but the earliest sowings of radishes. To prevent extensive damage by these pests, sprinkle seed furrows with diazinon according to label directions.

Look for lettuce varieties that are billed as slow bolting. These perform better in hot weather than other varieties, which quickly go to seed and may become bitter.

Broccoli, some varieties of cabbage, Chinese cabbage, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts and kale can be seeded in the garden in

All are possible, even probable with a little planning.

Get out of the rut, off the highway and focus on the places others don't bother to explore. Michigan's waterways, both coastal and inland, offer countless experiences to the curious and adventuresome.

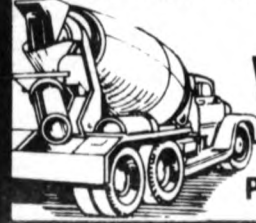

Survival skills are learned in state forest

When he was 20, Tom Brown entered New Jersey's Pine Barrens with nothing but desire, curiosity, intuition and survival skills he learned from an Apache Indian.

He lived in the woods for a year, making clothes from bark fiber, shelter out of leaves, tools from stones and bones, and a believer out of himself, according to a recent issue of National Wildlife magazine.

Brown now runs a wilderness school, teaching 2,000 people a year how to survive in the outdoors. He also tracks lost hikers and fugitives, and teaches police officers and rescue crews how to track.

When Brown stepped naked into the Pine Barrens, a desolate place the size of Yosemite National Park, he was fulfilling a childhood dream at the age of 21.

"I wanted to test myself completely," he said. "I've been thinking of it ever since I'd learned, as a child, that Indian scouts frequently spent a year alone in the wilderness."

Brown grew up near the Pine Barrens and began learning about the woods at the age of seven. His teacher was an 83-year-old Apache Indian who lived with and taught Brown about survival for nine years before returning to his home in New Mexico.

As a sort of final exam, the Indian took Brown to a path made by an animal and asked him to read it.

"I said it was made by a two-year-old female coyote, weighing 25 pounds, carrying a rabbit in the left side of her mouth, and that an old injury to her right rear leg -- probably she had been hit by a car -- was causing her to put her weight on her inner three toes," Brown recalled.

That kind of knowledge aided Brown in his time in the Barrens. His first shelter was a hut of leaves he built on a pole frame. He wove cedar bark fibers into a loin cloth and ate edible plants. He used an ancient Indian weapon, a short, heavy stick hurled with great accuracy, to catch animals. He skinned rabbits with a tool known as an eolith, a sharpened stone.

Brown's Indian teacher had made Brown spend two weekends a year blindfolded in the woods, an experience that paid off one winter day when Brown became snowblind. He now teaches students how to survive "blind."

Brown also teaches students how to create a fire, improvise animal traps, make bows and arrows, chip arrowheads and create wilderness shelters.

Not everyone has to take Brown's class to get the most out of a trip to the woods. Brown has some suggestions for outings: don't worry about settling a schedule that must be followed when going for a walk, take your time; do something different, take a new path, lie down, look up into the trees instead of down at the ground, look into dark places; know where and when to look, wildlife concentrate in transition areas such as the edges of forest, fields and streams, and at night and

before and after storms; and hide your scent from animals by bathing with a natural soap. Also, rub your clothing and exposed parts of your body with pine needles, catnip or any other aromatic herb.

ORDINANCE NO. 353

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A REVISION AND CODIFICATION OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS, ENTITLED THE ST. JOHNS CITY CODE, 1983 EDITION, AND TO PROVIDE A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS THEREOF.

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Pursuant to Act No. 279, Public Acts of 1909, State of Michigan, as amended, the City of St. Johns hereby adopts the St. Johns City Code, 1983 Edition, and the printing of said Code is hereby ordered. Said Code contains all ordinances of the City of a general and permanent nature as compiled, consolidated, amended, revised, re-arranged, and codified in Titles I to X, inclusive, of said Code. At least one complete copy of said Code has been and now is filed in the Office of the City Clerk, and shall there remain for public use and inspection.

Section 2. The provisions of the St. Johns City Code shall be effective on and after July 30, 1984, and prior editions of the St. Johns City Code and all ordinances of a general and permanent nature of the City of St. Johns adopted prior to November 8, 1982, and not contained in such Code are hereby repealed upon the effective date of the St. Johns City Code.

Section 3. The Ordinances of the City of St. Johns of a general and permanent nature contained in the St. Johns City Code, 1983 Edition, are amended, repealed, and re-arranged in the particular part of the St. Johns City Code set out opposite the subject pertaining to such ordinances, to which references is hereby made, as follows:

Section 4. This Ordinance shall be effective after publication in accordance with the Charter of the City of St. Johns.

Section 5. The adoption of this Ordinance shall not prevent or affect the prosecution, within the time limited by law, of any violation of an ordinance or code which occurred prior to the effective date of the St. Johns City Code, 1983 Edition, even if the ordinance or code violated was amended or repealed by the St. Johns City Code before the time prosecution of said offender was commenced or completed.

Section 6. Whenever any act is prohibited, or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense, or the doing of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful or an offense by the Code adopted by this Ordinance, or in any other ordinance of the City, or in any rule, regulations, or order promulgated by any officer or agency of the City under authority duly vested in him or it, and no specific penalty is provided therefor, the violation of any said provision of said Code, or any other Ordinance of the City, or such rule, regulation or order, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

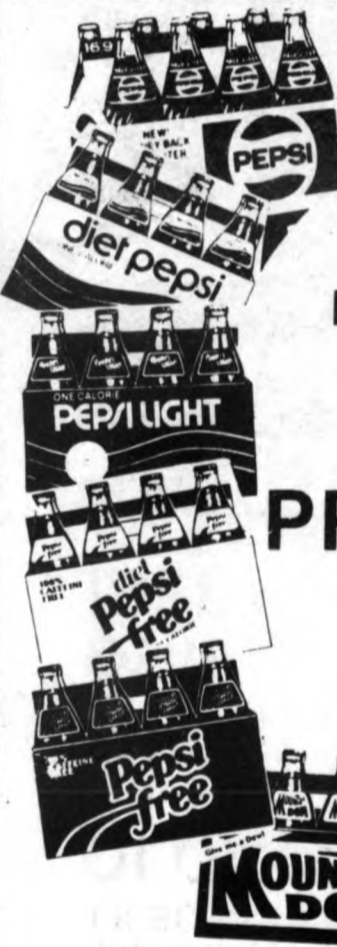
