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Expansion plans continue for Sealed Power

The Sealed Power Corp., one of the largest industries in St. Johns, is currently moving ahead with their plans to expand their piston making company.

According to Assistant City Administrator Diane Edwards, plans for the \$2 million project, which includes additional equipment and approximately 20 new jobs, was announced at the recent City Commission meeting, along with a request to seek tax abatement.

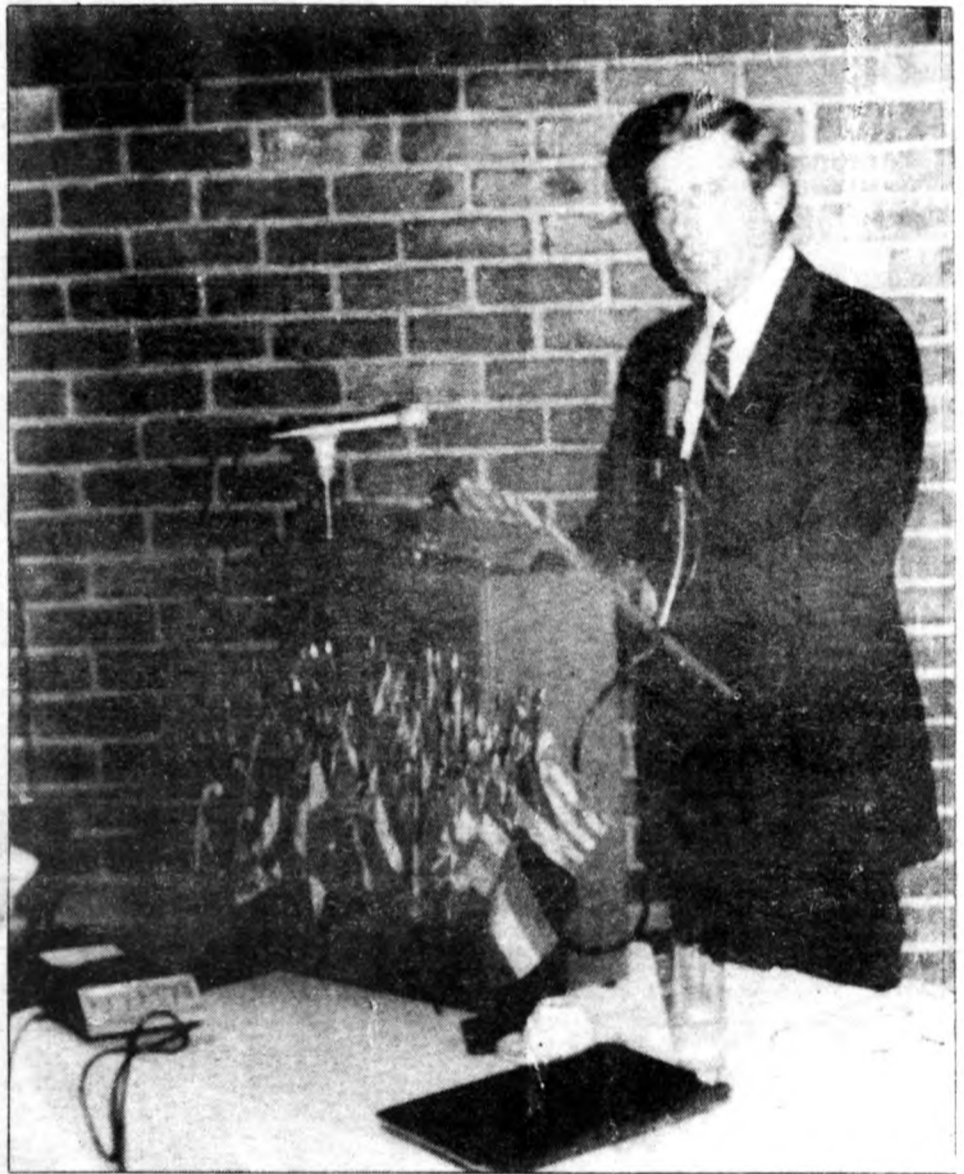
Two public hearings are needed before commissioners can grant the abatement request, with the first one recently being held July 23rd at the

St. Johns Munciple Building.

Edwards explained that the tax abatement, if approved by the commission, will allow the company to pay half of the normal taxes on the planned addition and equipment for 12 years. At the same time, the abatement will freeze the existing assessed value on the renovated structures for the same length of time.

"It's used as an incentive to bring in more jobs and new businesses to St. Johns," Edwards explained. "I don't foresee any problems in granting it."

In recent years, three other area industrial firms and several commercial businesses received abatement for expansions or new buildings.

Divine encourages congressional support

Stressing the importance of choosing the right Congressmen in the upcoming election, the Director of the U.S. Office of Personnel Management addressed a full-house of businessmen Tuesday afternoon at the Rotary Luncheon at the Shangri La Restaurant in St. Johns.

"Congress is the biggest management problem we have in the government," said Donald J. Divine, 1981 Reagan appointee as the chief bureaucrat. "We can't run the government because our board of directors -- Congress -- won't let us do it."

According to Divine, the Reagan administration has met with Congressional defeat in several areas concerning balancing the Federal budget. Nevertheless, he contends that as head of the civil service, he has already saved \$18 billion since joining the administration.

As OPM chief, Divine is responsible for a wide range of matters involving personnel including: federal employee pension; health and life insurance; trust fund operations involving more than \$40 billion per year; recruiting, testing and helping to hire people to fill jobs in a bureaucracy of more than two million people; and trying to make the Federal bureaucracy more efficient and productive through merit pay, performance appraisal and like reforms.

"We've done a lot," he said, "but there are still a lot of problems in our government."

"Before President Reagan took office, he made two promises: to reorient priorities and to make the government work. That's where I come in. We want to reduce the size of government and reduce the impact of government on individuals."

Divine cited several areas where

St. Johns honored for outstanding pedestrian protection program

St. Johns has been honored with a Pedestrian Safety Achievement award for its outstanding pedestrian protection program from the American Automobile Association, reports the Automobile Club of Michigan.

St. Johns won the award in the under 10,000 population group by going eleven years without a pedestrian fatality.

The highest honor for the year in Michigan went to Grosse Pointe Woods, which earned an Award of Excellence for top performances in both pedestrian safety program activities and pedestrian death and injury records. The city has had no pedestrian fatalities since 1957.

A total of 41 Michigan communities and the state were honored by AAA for their 1983 pedestrian safety achievements. Nationwide, 284 citations were awarded in the 45th annual Pedestrian Protection Program. More than 2,500 cities and 29 states participated in the AAA survey.

Craig re-elected as president of St. Johns School Board

Robert Craig was recently re-elected to his third term as the president of the St. Johns School Board, with Thomas Irrer being chosen as vice-president.

Craig won over the other nominee, Peter Apostle, who was re-elected as board secretary. Leonard Puetz was also re-elected as treasurer.

According to Assistant Administrator Gordon Vandemark, at the recent organizational meeting the board voted to change the meeting date from the second Wednesday of each month, to the first and third Monday of each month. The times will remain the same, occurring at 8 p.m. in the summer, and 7:30 p.m. from December to March. The meeting place will also remain at the Rodney B. Wilson Library.

Craig explained that the new meeting schedule will incorporate the first monthly meeting as the work session for the board, officially known as the committee-of-the-whole. The third Monday will be the regular school board meeting.

According to Craig, the switch

came as a result of conflicting times with area Wednesday night church services and an effort to reduce the length of time the present monthly meetings take.

"This is something the community has requested for a long time," Craig said. "Hopefully, everyone will feel like their needs are more accommodated."

In other action, the board approved a Job Trading proposal in which tenured teachers will be allowed to switch positions for an entire school year.

"It's a situation where, because of long seniority, it gives some teachers an opportunity to teach at another grade level," Vandemark explained.

The board also approved a Job Sharing proposal in which teachers are allowed to share voluntary job assignments and responsibilities such as parent-teacher conferences, staff meetings and report cards.

The superintendent also was appointed to establish a Citizen's Committee to develop guidelines for a new sex education course.

Lunch prices for the 1984-85 school year were set at \$1.50 for adults, \$1 for high school and middle school students and 85 cents for elementary school students.

The board also voted to hold the regular meetings on the third Monday of the month. They will be held at 8 p.m. at the Waldron School, room 102.

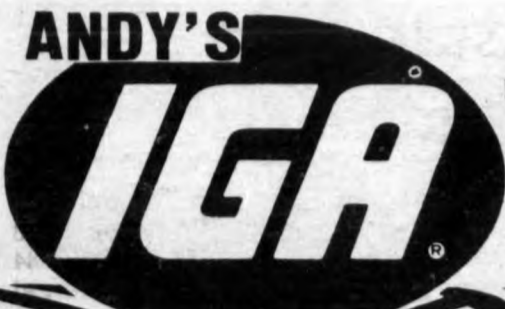

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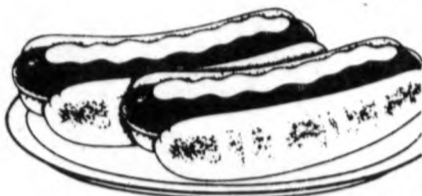

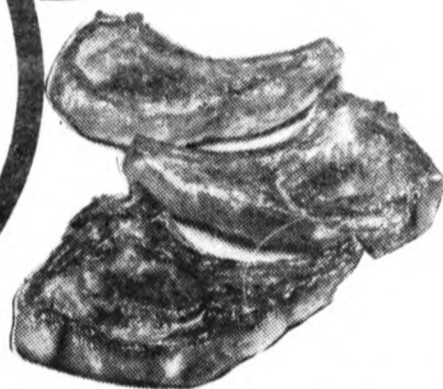

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Country band sets date for appearance

A new country group has spawned in the central Michigan area and will soon be featured in a special daylong appearance in Grand Ledge, this coming Saturday at the Island.

Known as W.B. Vaughn and the Western Union, country music's latest recording group has just released a record which is presently being aired on Lansing WITL and according to a spokesman for the group, the song describes Wild Bill Vaughn's life growing up in Grand Ledge.

According to a story which appeared in the Grand Ledge Independent last week authored by staff writer Paul Crandall, Vaughn started playing professionally at the age of 14 and became a hit while appearing at Grand Ledge's local talent show wearing Beatle boots and long hair and playing his guitar.

Crandall's story described Vaughn's ascent into country music via the rock and roll route. Twenty years and nine bands later, Vaughn comes back into his hometown, but this time, equipped with a group of his own.

Western Union is composed of Rick Bellant of St. Johns playing lead guitar and banjo; Jake Jacobus, bass guitar and harmonic; Barb Morse on the keyboards; Mel Sharrah on the drums; Lenny Retzloff, backup singer, harmonica and mandolin as well as W.B., the group's leader.

Bellant is the son of Beverly and Bill Bellant of 407 So. Baker St. He is 25 years old and has been performing for 15 years, starting with his father and seven uncles who were earlier involved in country music. He is employed in construction and also has business interests in silver and gold coins. He was earlier established in the coin business in downtown St. Johns shortly after his high school years.

Rick has played various

types of music, country, folk, bluegrass, and old type rock and roll. In earlier years, "one uncle would pay him a quarter to play and another uncle would pay a quarter for him to stop". Such described the early beginnings of music for Bellant at the age of 3.

Mel Sharrah is 35 years old, plays drums and was a native of Pennsylvania prior to his residence in Grand Ledge. He played guitar in other bands before assuming his percussion duties with Western Union. A 20 year music veteran, Mel has played in a variety of bands, ranging from rock and roll to country.

Jake Jacobus' parents are Howard and Louella Jacobus of St. Johns and he's a student at Lansing Community College majoring in music. He has performed for 17 years, starting in fifth grade in St. Johns, playing a trumpet. He has played various types of music including bluegrass, rock, folk and now, country. He is 27 years old and his obvious goal is a life career in

music. Barb Morse, the keyboard artist, is 26 and resides in Grand Ledge. She started playing piano in New York 21 years ago. She played classical for a lengthy period, and since that time has switched to country and western. She is employed by the University Association for Emergency Medicine. She began performing in churches at the age of 6 with her mother and sister and is presently giving piano lessons in her spare time.

Lenny Retzloff lives in Wacousta and is a backup singer for Western Union. He just came off a Gospel tour in Florida and two summers ago, worked with the reknowned Charlie Daniels on a summer tour. He plays saxophone, harmonica and the mandolin. He is 33 years of age, married and has a child, plus another one on the way.

Additional monies available for loans

An additional \$250 million for farm operating loans is being made available immediately by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration, Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block recently announced.

The funds are being transferred from other loan programs, where it is anticipated they will not be needed in the remaining 12 weeks of the current fiscal year.

"This move will help ensure that farmers' needs for credit to finance this year's production will be met," Block said. "These funds are in addition to a record-high \$1.91 billion already budgeted for operating loans this year for Farmers Home Administration."

Of the \$250 million total, \$150 million in insured, or direct, loans is being moved from the business and industry loan guarantee program.

The additional funds will be made available on an as-needed basis to FmHA field offices.

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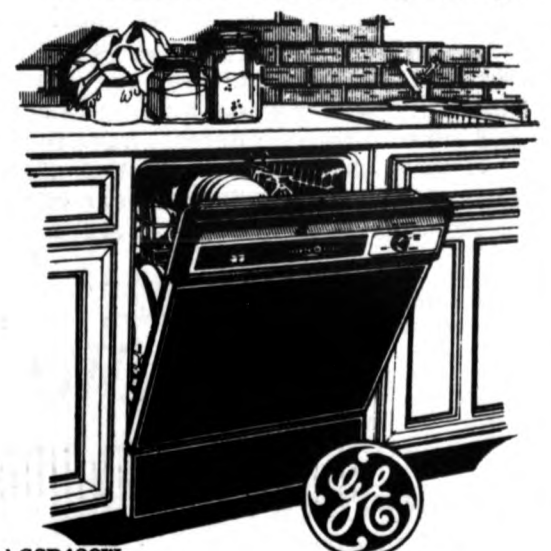
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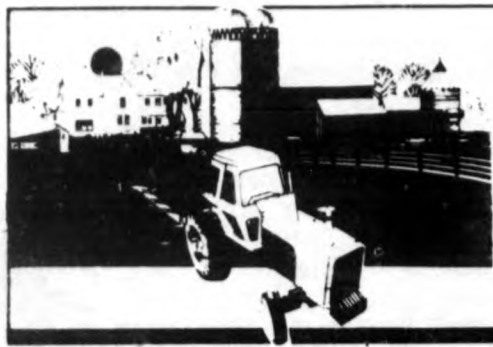


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Farm News

Nitrogen fertilizer essential for lawn

Proper nitrogen fertilization is essential in maintaining a good lawn. Nitrogen is important because it influences color; topgrowth rate (mowing); root growth; competition with weeds; susceptibility to diseases; moisture stress; high temperature stress and traffic. Both time of applications and rate of applications of nitrogen fertilizer are significant in how a lawn responds.

Most homeowners in Clinton County appear to want the kind of lawn resulting from two applications of nitrogen during the growing season. These should be applied about June 1 and September 1 at a rate of 1 pound of nitrogen per 1000 square feet each time. This should result in acceptable color, reduced disease problems and reasonable weed control.

A third application of nitrogen about November 1 at the same rate will provide even better color and less disease and weed problems, but may require more mowing. Mow at 1 1/2 - 2 inches height each time for best grass growth and weed control.

Most problem broadleaf weeds can be effectively controlled by fall (late October) application of a mixture of 2, 4-D and 2, 4-DP at a rate of 4 teaspoons per 1000 square feet. The same application in April will do about as well.

Additional care is needed for a very high quality lawn and for special weed or other problems.

Fruit production expects increase in state

Fruit production in Michigan is expected to increase for all four fruit crops estimated on July 1. Apple production for 1984 is forecast at 800 million pounds. This is a 7 percent increase over last year's moderate sized crop, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. A cool, wet spring resulted in variable pollination. Nationally, apple production is set at 8.2 billion pounds, 1 percent less than last year. Peach production for the state is forecast at 45 million pounds, a 10 million pound increase from a year ago. At the U.S. level, peach output is estimated at 2.5 billion pounds, 40 percent more than last year.

Michigan's sweet cherry crop is expected to total 30,000 tons, up from last season's 18,000 ton freeze damaged crop. National production is placed at 180,600 tons, about equal to last year. Pear production in Michigan is expected to be up 25 percent to 10,000 tons. The U.S. pear crop is forecast at 687 thousand tons, down 11 percent from 1983.

June weather was characterized by generally above normal temperatures and wide extremes in rainfall. Precipitation varied from excessive in "the thumb" to very dry in southern counties. On July 1, Michigan's winter wheat production is forecast at 40 million bushels, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. This is 12 percent above last year's production. Despite limited rainfall during June, potential yields for winter wheat are unchanged from a month ago. Yields are expected to average 50 bushels per acre, 1 bushel above last year. Oats production is expected to total 18 million bushels, up 15 percent from a year ago. Average yields for oats are estimated at 60 bushels. Rye production is forecast at 640,000 bushels, up 7 percent over last season. This year's barley crop is expected to total 1.9 million bushels, an increase of 18 percent.

Summer potato production is forecast at 2,560,000 hundredweight (cwt.), up 17 percent from last year. This year's larger production is attributed to an increase in both harvested acreage and average yields. Yields are expected to average 200 cwt. per acre, 15 cwt. above last year. Planted acreage for all potatoes is estimated at 45,000 acres, up 5 percent from a year ago.

Nationally, winter wheat production is forecast at 2.02 billion bushels, 2 percent more than a year ago. Oats production is forecast at 455 million bushels, 5 percent less than a year ago. Potato acreage for harvest in 1984 for all seasonal groups

is estimated at 1.3 million acres, up 5 percent from last year. Fall potatoes will be harvested from 1.09 million acres, 4 percent above last year.

Armyworm alert

Many corn growers are finding armyworms in fields now, according to County Extension Director George McQueen, and farmers should be alert to the possibility of the worms in their fields.

He said that the destructive armyworms usually hatch in grassy areas in corn or possibly in grass along the edges. However, if found only in certain areas in a field, treat, if needed, only the infested area and a 20 foot border around it.

Check fields regularly to find worms when they are still small, one inch or less. He urges farmers to spray as soon as possible after the armyworm threat has been determined.

"Do not delay," he said. "The large worms are not detected until they are large and a lot of damage has already been done, treatment may not be worthwhile."

Control materials include the following shown in order of decreasing effectiveness: Lorsban, Pydrin, Lannate or Nudrin, Dylox or Proxol and Sevin. As with all chemicals, follow the directions on the label.

Corn Rootworm Adults can reduce grain set in corn if there are five or more adults per ear and it is within 10 days or less after first silks have appeared, according to County Extension Director George McQueen.

It takes this number of adults to keep the silks pruned back during the 10 days of pollination. He said pollination is usually complete before many adults are out. Late planted or retarded corn is especially susceptible.

the current administration has been able to do that. He said that the president has made a good step in making our government run more efficiently

on less expenditures, resulting in a three percent drop in the unemployment rate, the lowest inflation rates since the 1960's, the strongest labor recovery in years, productivity the

best in two decades ago, and real growth continuing to climb.

"We're doing the job better, quicker, with less people and at a lower unit cost," he said. "We're doing it because we're taking managing the government seriously."

At the same time, Divine states that there is only so much that the President can do without the support of Congress.

"The question is, can we run the government better? We can, but we need Congressional support to do the rest. The President can't run the government if he can't get the support of Congress."

According to Divine, the biggest problem they face with Congress is that they oppose the trimming of the budget in several areas by refusing to take federal money seriously. He pointed out a recent case in which Congress blocked the performance

regulation of retirement, with the chairman of the sub-committee stating that performance shouldn't matter in deciding the age of retirement and pensions.

"That attitude on the part of Congress is our problem we face in Washington," he said. "Congress is blocking our regulations. We face the possibility of trillion dollar deficits and we can't keep going with business as usual."

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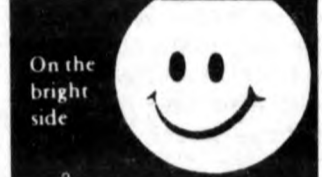

Birdwatching is a popular American past time

The number of bird watchers in the United States today is difficult to estimate. One conservative guess puts the number at 40 million. To some extent, the figure depends on how you define "bird watcher." Webster's includes catchers or hunters of birds as well as people who identify birds in their natural surroundings. Roger Tory Peterson, America's most distinguished bird watcher, takes a broader approach. He defines the major birding "types" as: the window watcher, who enjoys watching the birds attracted to a backyard feeder.

The print collector, who collects bird prints as others collect stamps or coins.

The armchair birder, who has a large library and is well-informed about all kinds of birds but spends little time in the field.

The sportsman, who is keenly interested in knowing as much as possible about the habits of the ducks and other game birds he shoots.

The bird photographer. Peterson is one of the nation's top bird photographers with more than 10,000 color transparencies in a library which he draws on to illustrate his many books and articles and as a visual reference for his paintings.

The academic and advanced amateur, who holds memberships in clubs such as the American Ornithologists' Union and subscribes to journals such as "The Auk" and "The Condor." Many of these people, like Peterson, explain various birds and their behavior to the public through books, articles and television.

The hard-core bird watcher, who writes nearly any length to compile a large list of "life birds" is possible. When a bird watcher says that he or she has a new "life bird" it means that he or she has spotted or the first time a species new to him or her. A select group belongs to the 600 Club, whose members have a life list of 600 species seen north of the Mexican border in North America. Peterson's own life list is 696. He also boasts a substantial worldwide life list. In his years of travel to all of the world's seven continents, he has seen somewhere between three and four thousand of the nearly 10,000 plus species known to exist.

The birding boom also has seen the development of an increasing number of "top-flight" "interpretive birders," who, like Peterson, started out in the field as amateurs but then gradually developed into professional-level bird identifiers. A few years ago, the interpretive birders were almost entirely men, but now women, like Claudia Wilds of Washington, D.C., are coming to the fore.

A leading specialist on shorebirds, Wilds has written and consulted for two new field guides published by the National

Geographic Society and the Audubon Society.

"I enjoy birding as an intellectual pursuit," Wilds says. "You get this craving to acquire information and then to spread what you acquire." Among her many activities, she produces a weekly telephone tape for the Audubon Naturalist Society of the Central Atlantic States. The tape reports significant bird sightings in the Washington region.

For those people who are interested in becoming bird watchers, Wilds offers

these tips

First, buy one of the major field guides. Its introduction will have useful recommendations for getting started. Before you go out into the field, study your guide and become familiar with the pictures of the birds in your area. In a few months, you may want to buy additional bird references.

Wilds also advises beginners to get a good pair of central-focusing binoculars (7x and 8x are the most commonly used). If you're interested in water birds or birds of the

open country, you'll eventually need a powerful telescope. These can be purchased with either interchangeable eye pieces or zoom lenses ranging up

to 60x. Most birders use their telescopes on tripods or rest them on their car window.

The only other basic expense is for travel. If you

only want to watch birds in your neighborhood, it costs very little. But most birders like to go farther afield to see birds in different habitats.

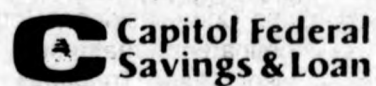

Unfortunately, fish go on vacations too

How many times have you heard about a friend going on summer vacations and really catching the fish? Or, let me put it another way: Why is it that fish seem to choose the same time to go on vacation that most of us do? The simple fact is that the nicest times to fish are not usually the times the fish like best.

Still, one needs not be completely victimized by the whims of the fish if he will but practice seeing things from his "finny adversary's point of view." To begin with, the water is usually warmer and more stirred up from use during the heat of the typical summer day. This might suggest that fish, like us, seek cool and shady places during the day and venture out to feed mostly at night or just before and after night.

Again, fish may be just a little less hungry and eager for big meals once the spawning process is completed. Most of us do not eat the same large, rich meals in the hot summer that we do during more comfortable times. So how can these theories lead to successful fishing during summer vacations? Here's how.

Cut down on the amount of time you spend "churning up" the waters. Instead, learn about the lake, work the cooler and shadier portions of the lake and concentrate on fishing them very early or very late. And instead of working the waters with the exotic lures in your box — the ones that hic, cough, rattle and specialize in acrobatic dancing — use live and natural bait. Often smaller bait and lighter tackle help because of the slower examination and "take" of the fish.

Where 'gills and other panfish are concerned, it has long been known that tiny ice fishing tackle, like tear-drops and wet flies, often take the big sulking fish where everything else fails. Fished on 2-pound test line and using waxworms for bait, fishing can be fun again.

Where bass are concerned, small minnows and

crayfish will often work when the big gobs of nightcrawlers so effective a month earlier, will not.

When fished slowly, with a small floating jig, and

again with as light a line as is possible, a fishless trip can be turned into one to remember.

Now, all this may be totally ignored if you are "fortunate" enough to get a good rain during your vacation. The cooling of the water plus the apparent revitalization of the oxygen supply can lead to fishing the way we'd like it to always be. Only the severe electrical storms and radical temperature and pressure changes fail to improve the fishing. Before, after, or even during summer rains — if it's safe — can be excellent times for mid-summer fishing.

But maybe fish understand that most of us don't like to fish at 3 a.m. or during a rain storm. Maybe they know we'd rather watch a bobber or cast a jitterbug than patiently fish ultralight tackle or subject our fingers to a painful of lively crayfish.

But wait. There's an easier way to be a hero and the provider of delicious summer fish dinners. Take along a package or two of those more easily caught fish that are waiting in your freezer — those that you caught last winter perhaps. They are delicious on a grill and need to be used before more fall and winter catches are made.

You don't have to tell anyone when you caught them, only that you ate fish on your vacation!

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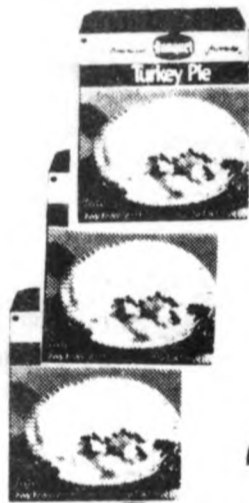
