# Election to determine political outcome

The County is gearing up for the 1984 primary election to occur August 7th, with voting taking place from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the designated areas throughout the county.

According to the County Clerk's office, this election will determine the outcome of several County office holders despite the upcoming November general election.

The Republican Party clearly shows a strong representation in the county this year, with few of the candidates representing the Democratic Party.

At the Congressional level:

For REPRESENTATIVE IN CONGRESS:

Don Albosta, incumbent, Democrat

Been the district's House of Representative since 1978. Before his election, he was the 1976 Democratic Nominee for the U.S. House; elected the 1974 Democratic Nominee for Michigan House of Representative; 1970-74 Saginaw County Commissioner; and the 1968 Democratic Nominee in the Saginaw County Commission. He attended Delta College and was a sugar beet farmer.

Bill Schuette, Republican

Political career includes 1980 State Political Director for the Reagan/Bush Presidential cam-

paign; 1982 10th District Representative to the State Republican Issues Committee; and the 1972, 1974 and 1982 precinct delegate to the state convention. He has a Bachelor of Science degree from the Georgetown University, graduating in 1976. He also received his law degree from the University of San Francisco in 1979 and has since been an attorney.

FOR US SENATOR:

Carl Levin, incumbent, Democrat.

Jim Dunn, Republican

## Fire Hall in plans for change

By next summer, the City of St. Johns is going to be changed thanks to current plans to remodel the downtown area with new streets, sidewalks and a long awaited Fire Hall.

According to City Manager Randy Humphrey, the monies received recently from the federal Small Cities Public Works Grant will allow the city to totally revivie the three blocks of Clinton Avenue. He said the project includes placing brick underneath the benches and around the squares of trees.

"Our approach for this project will be 'all will be new,'" he said. "When working with this kind of project, it should look its best. When completed, it should add flare and character to the downtown area."

The City recently received the \$47,200 grant from the government as part of a plan in which the city will pay \$52,800 and the balanced being special assessed

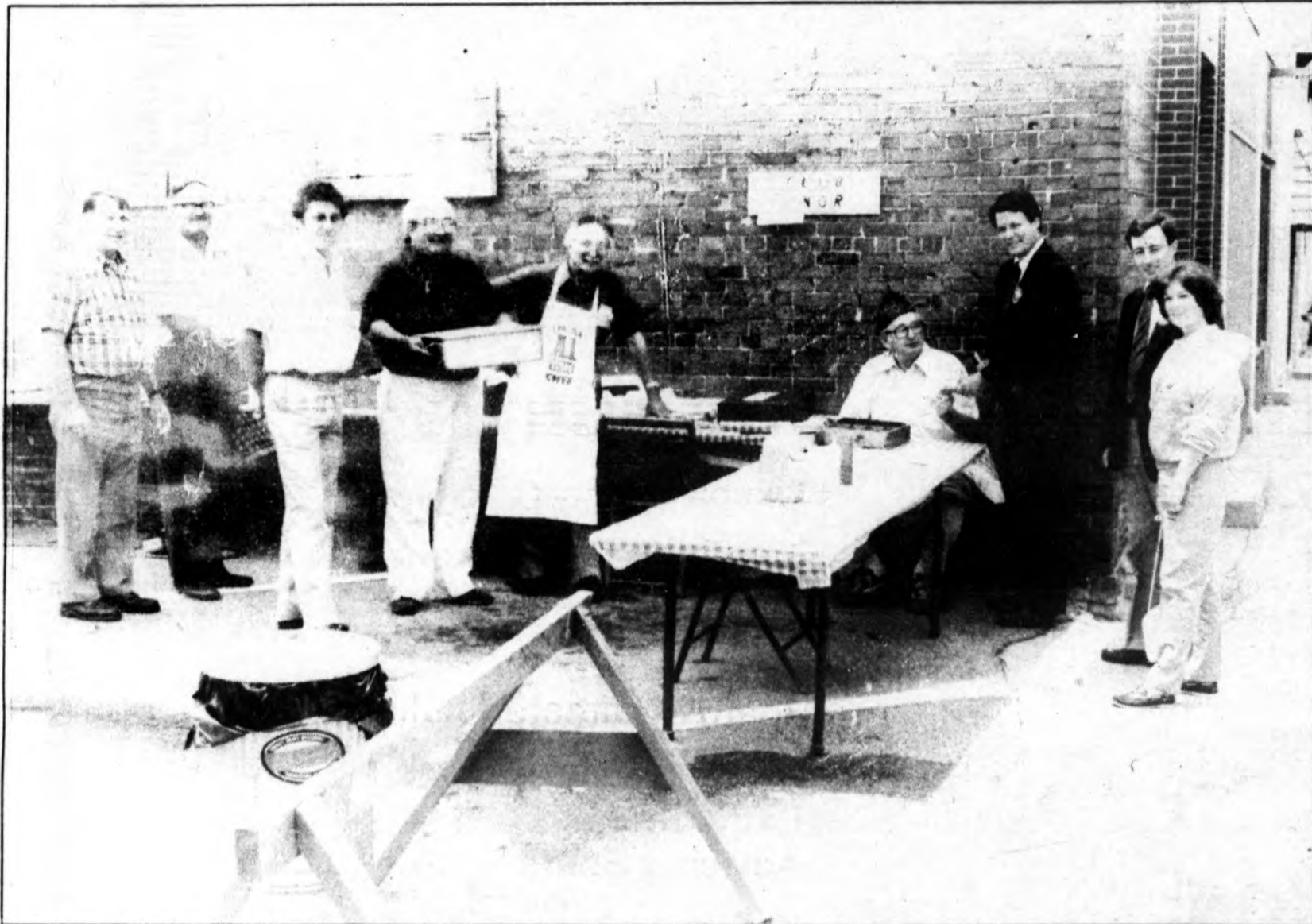

## Resident faces local charges

According to St. Johns Police Chief Lyle French, Jan Szymczak, 37, of St. Johns, is currently being charged with a misdemeanor of Disorderly Person after police traced the telephone lines of a St. Johns woman and identified Szymczak as the subject who had been calling and repeatedly using obscene language.

French said the woman lodged the complaint with police on July 4th, at which time officers began tracing the phone calls. On July 16th, the police identified the suspect after following up the taped conversations. Police then contacted him and the complaint was signed.

Szymczak's arraignment was waived and a trial date has not yet been set.

# Rumbaugh to retire from Clinton Bank

John A. Rumbaugh, a lifetime employee of Clinton Bank and Trust Co., will retire as Chairman of the Board this month, marking the end of a banking career that spanned 49 years.

Rumbaugh began as a clerk and janitor with the former State Savings Bank of Elsie and, in Horatio Alger fashion, ran through a litany of titles that included teller, loan officer, assistant cashier, cashier, vice president, assistant trust officer, executive vice president, chief executive officer and chairman of the board. And along with those, there were a few others he carried while serving with the U.S. Navy from 1941 to 1945.

Rumbaugh joined the Elsie Bank in 1935 while still a high school student and upon graduation assumed full-time responsibilities which included "everything". "I did accounting and teller work along with sweeping and shoveling coal into the furnace," Rumbaugh explained, "and all for \$1.50 per week. And payday was every other week!"

With participation in the war imminent, he enlisted in the Navy and served in the Panama Canal zone. He later had stateside duty in Georgia with the classification of Storekeeper, advancing to the rank of Chief Petty Officer at war's end.

Following discharge, an unusual turn of events deterred him and his wife, Catherine, from locating elsewhere and, perhaps, pursuing an entirely different career. His last station was Atlanta, Georgia, and some consideration was given to remaining in that area. Upon returning to Elsie in 1945, the couple learned that Mrs. Rumbaugh's father had just left for a new job assignment in Atlanta. Had that new assignment been known to the Rumbaughs, it might have prompted a decision to remain in the Atlanta area.

Fate had not completed its task, for it seemed the Rumbaughs were destined to remain in the Elsie area. John had applied at other banks and had already been offered, and decided to accept, another position when the president of the Elsie State Bank persuaded him to return. After some consideration, he agreed and resumed his work in Elsie, where he remained until 1961, when the

Elsie State Bank was consolidated with Clinton Bank.

After his move to St. Johns, he became active in the Chamber of Commerce, serving as treasurer; was secretary-treasurer of the local hospital board, and remains as a trustee; and has been an active member of the St. Johns Rotary Club. He was also active in banking outside his community and served in the series of offices that led him to the presidency of Group 7 within the Michigan Bankers Association.

In 1981, the couple received an award and recognition from the Historical Society of Michigan for their efforts in the restoration and establishment of the Paine-Gilliam-Scott Museum for the Clinton County Historical Society. They remain active members of the Clinton County Historical Society.

The Rumbaughs are the parents of two daughters, Janyth and Karen, and grandparents of three.

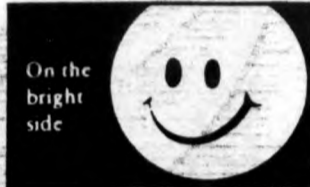

# Schuetz-Albosta meet at MAPAC

Before a large crowd of Dow's Michigan Division MAPAC, Republican Bill Schuetz, candidate for the 10th Congressional District, told the audience and his opponent, Don Albosta, that he offers them hope for the future versus the failed policies of the past. Schuetz and Albosta were there for a debate of the issues.

"You have an opportunity to participate in the sport of Democracy today and I want you on my team," Schuetz said. "My team, the Republican team, has brought economic stability and progress to this country. Inflation is below four percent, interest rates are at 13 percent, and there are more people employed today, 107.4 million, than ever before. The liberal Democrats, the Mondales, Blanchards and the Albostas offer nothing new but only fiscal ideas that will put this country back to the Carter days where inflation peaked at 13.5 percent."

Schuetz cited Albosta's liberal voting record; voting 88 percent of the time with the liberal democrats on economic issues; his voting 86 percent of the time with Blanchard while they served in the Congress together; and voting against

President Reagan 82 percent of the time in 1983.

"My liberal opponent's solution to cutting the 200 billion dollar deficit is to raise out taxes," Schuetz said. "Walter Mondale told us that he would raise our taxes in his address to the Democratic Convention. The only way that the deficit can be reduced is by cutting spending."

Schuetz addressed the need for a balanced federal budget, adoption of the recommendations of the Grace Commission and the implementation

of line-item veto power for the president.

"Congressman Albosta has voted against the Constitutional Amendment to balance the federal budget and opposes line-item veto power for the President," Schuetz said. "He has been rated a big spender by the National Taxpayers Union every year since he has been in the Congress and there is no indication that he will stop his spending spree. The time has come for a new leader of this district. One who will vote and support the fiscal philosophies of the people of Mid-Michigan."

The children's play, directed by Kristan Tetens, is about Christophe, a poor miller's son, who is left with only a cat named Minet after the death of his father. Minet does the best he can to provide food for himself and his master, but is usually unsuccessful because he lacks boots to protect his feet from brambles and a bag to trap his quarry. 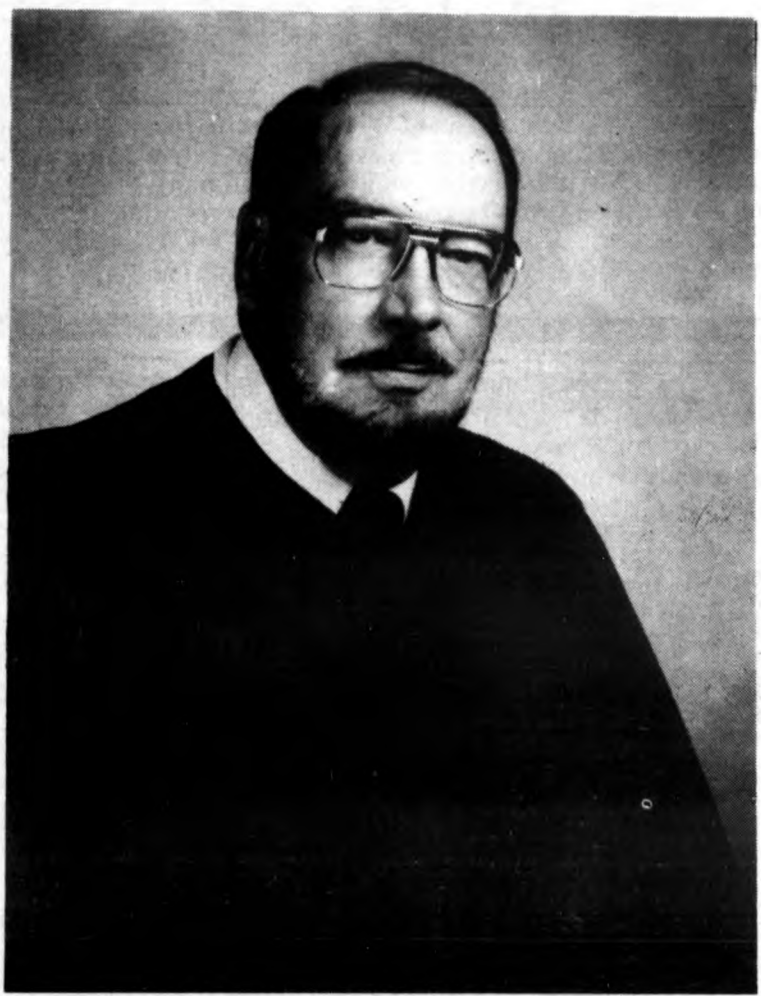

against property owners in the project area. City Assessor Diane Edwards said she expects the average cost for the owners will be approximately \$577, with payments being spread over a five year period.

In other action, Commissioners also voted to begin taking bids for the construction of a new

Fire Hall that Flint Architect Hermindo Roldan presented before the Commission Monday night.

Commissioners are seeking a general contractor to build the skeleton structure of the Hall, adjacent to the present Police Department on State Street. In

an earlier agreement, the volunteer firemen, as well as others, agreed to complete the project by donating their time and labor for the interior work, while the city pays for the materials to finish the

exterior. Officials have estimated the total cost of the project as \$91,740.

Roldan's proposal is to construct the addition with cement blocks to maintain the quality of both the present building and the city's

environment. He said with minor modifications to the existing building, the completed project will appear to be a single structure. A hose drying tower will act as a visual separation between the two

departments, as well as "add character" to the entire building.

The project will complete the nearly 10-year-old plan to remove both the police and the fire departments from the Municipal Building.

## STATEWIDE TROUT AND SALMON REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on July 13, 1984, under the authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning September 1, 1984, and ending March 31, 1984, no person shall possess, take or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

Statewide open seasons on all trout streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon except on Lake Huron and its tributary streams and on Lake Michigan and its tributary streams the season on lake trout is from May 1 through August 15.

Size limits shall be 8 inches in Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on all lakes. The possession limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination, but no more than 2 lake trout or splake from Lake Michigan and its tributary streams or 3 lake trout or splake from Lake Superior and Lake Huron and their tributary streams, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only.

In addition to one day's possession limit of salmon and trout, a person may possess an additional two day's possession limit of processed salmon. For the purposes of this Commission Order the term processed means:

- (a) Canned in a sealed container
- (b) Cured by smoking or drying
- (c) Frozen in a solid state

Any processed salmon or trout aboard a vessel on the water or at a dockside shall be included in the daily possession limit.

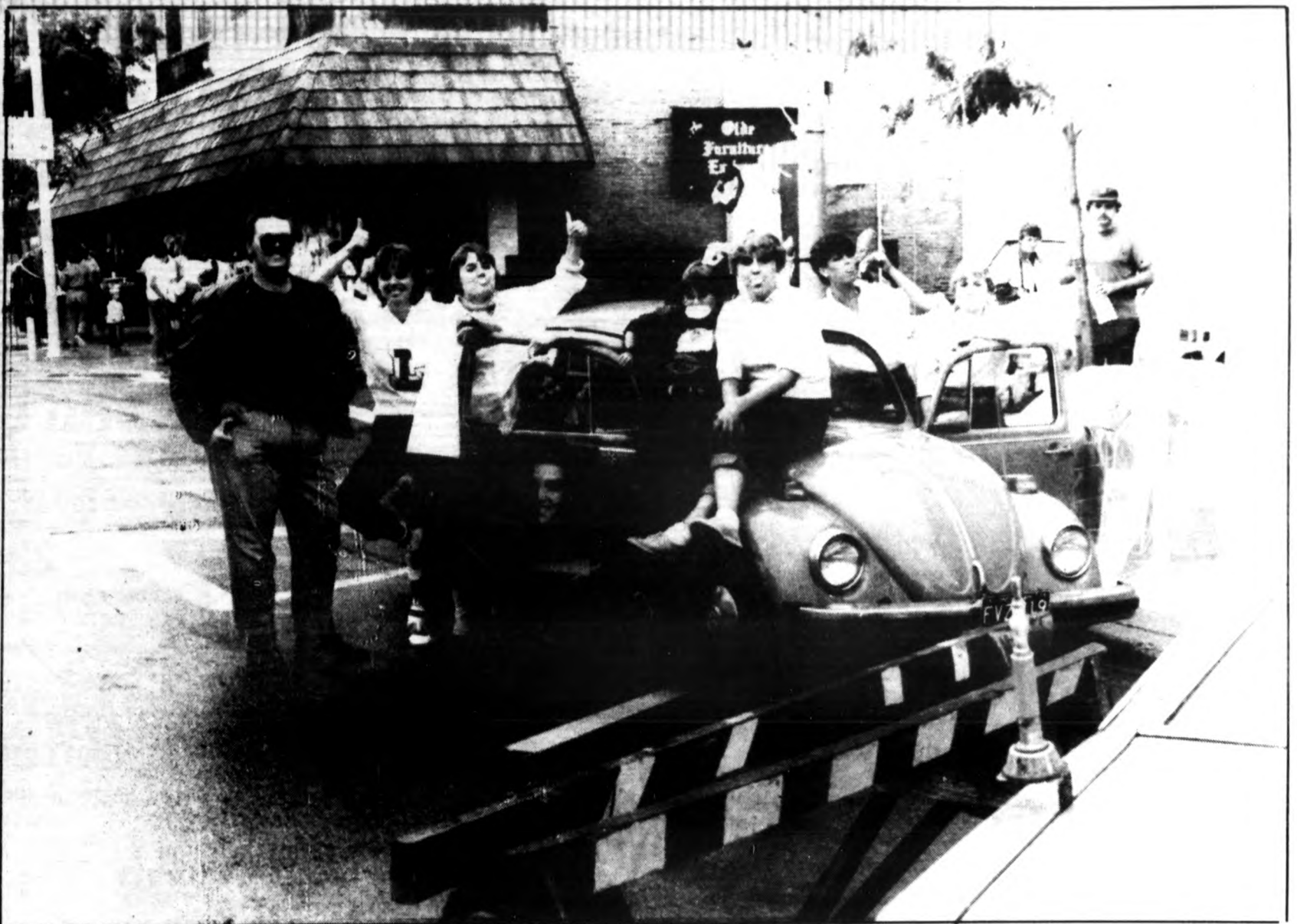

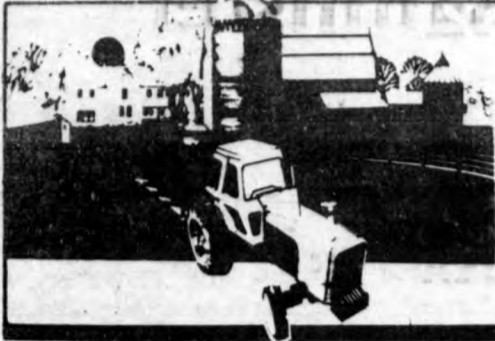

## Farm News

### Make arrangement for removal

Dorn Diehl, State Executive Director, said farm program participants who are planning to move farm-stored grain under loan to make room for their 1984 grain must make arrangements in advance to do so.

"Farmers who plan to commingle their 1984 and 1983 harvests and request a loan, also need to make arrangements with our office."

Dorn Diehl said grain under regular or reserve loan is mortgaged and if it is removed before repayment of the loan or receipt of release authorization, it is considered unauthorized removal and subject to penalty. The penalty consists of immediate repayment of the loan, plus interest, plus early redemption, if applicable, denial of further loans and possible investigation by the Office of the Inspector General.

To help maintain the quality of grain under loan, farmers may rotate their farm-stored grain as new crops are harvested.

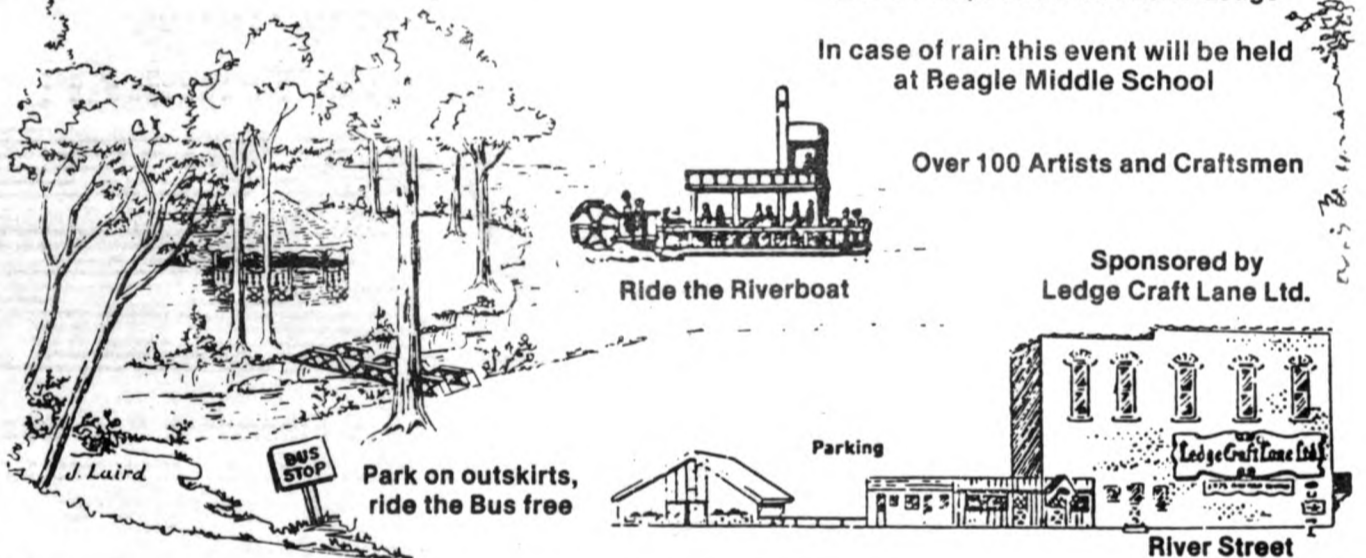

# Duties requested for pork products entering United States

The National Pork Producers Council (NPPC) recently announced that it is in the process of filing a formal petition with the U.S. Department of Commerce and the U.S. International Trade Com-

mission requesting the imposition of countervailing duties on live hogs and, perhaps, pork products, entering the United States from Canada.

## Milk production down in June

Dairy herds produced 449 million pounds of milk in Michigan during June, down 5 percent from a year earlier, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. Milk cow numbers averaged 392,000 head, down 12,000 from June, 1983. Milk output per cow also continues to decline. The June average of 1,145 pounds was down 20 pounds from a year ago. Lower grain feeding rates have led to this reduced milk output per cow.

At a news conference at NPPC's Des Moines headquarters, Council president Wayne Walter said the organization, which represents the nation's pork producers, is considering similar action aimed at the European Economic Community of nations.

The value of milk sold in Michigan during June averaged \$13.00 per hundredweight (cwt.), down 30 cents from a year earlier. This price reflects the total value of milk at the dairy plant or receiving station before deductions are made for hauling and dairy assessment charges. Slaughter cow prices averaged \$43.00 per cwt., down 30 cents from a year ago. The quantity of grain and other concentrates fed to milk cows in Michigan averaged 15 pounds per cow on July 1, down 1 pound from a year earlier. The value of this feed averaged \$8.00 per cwt., up 40 cents from last July 1. High feed cost relative to the returns for milk sold have encouraged many producers to cut back on feeding rates.

The decision to seek countervailing duties is the latest in a series of moves by the NPPC to call attention to the increasing flood of live hogs and pork products entering the United States from Canada. In the first five months of 1984, the number of live hogs imported to the United States from Canada was up 131 percent over the same period in 1983 and already exceed the number of Canadian live hog imports for all of 1983.

Nationally, milk production during June totaled 11.8 billion pounds, 4 percent less than a year ago. Production per cow averaged 1,091 pounds during June, 13 pounds below a year ago. The total number of milk cows averaged 10.8 million head during June, down 2 percent from June, 1983. Dairy feed costs for the U.S. on July 1 averaged 8 percent above a year ago.

Walter, in announcing the decision to seek countervailing duties, said that U.S. pork producers "have no desire to jeopardize trade relations with Canada; our nation's best agricultural trading partners. All U.S. pork producers are seeking is restored of fair trade in pork commerce between our two nations. U.S. producers are not seeking protection from fair competition. We simply seek the opportunity for U.S. producers to compete in their own nation on an equal basis with pork producers from other countries. It is impossible to do that when foreign producers are subsidized by their government," the NPPC official said.

Dairy manufacturing plants in Michigan produced 4.4 million pounds of butter during May down 24 percent from a year earlier. American cheese output, at nearly 1.3 million pounds, was down 25 percent. Ice cream output, at 3.5 million gallons, rose 15 percent from the previous year. For the U.S., ice cream production was up 4 percent from 1983.

In seeking countervailing duties, the pork industry is taking the advice of U.S. Agriculture Department and U.S. trade representatives who testified at a recent Congressional hearing and said if U.S. pork producers really believed they were being injured by exports from other nations they should seek remedies already available within the framework of international trade rules. Countervailing duties are not subject to retaliation or compensation requests from other nations and thus would not jeopardize U.S. general trade agreement arrangements involving other U.S. agricultural commodities.

Walter told reporters, "U.S. producers fully understand and appreciate the importance and complex nature of foreign trade. However, we cannot just stand by and leave unchallenged the present unjust circumstances which continue to work an unfair hardship on U.S. producers."

The president of the National Pork Producers Council said his organization is dedicated to doing everything in its power to equalize the situation so that U.S. pork producers can compete fairly with their counterparts in Canada and other nations who do business in the U.S. domestic market.

# County Abuse Council goes independent

At the recent meeting of the Clinton County Council for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect, members voted to discontinue their formal association with the Tri-County Council which began a year ago.

According to acting chairperson Gail Nutt, the Clinton County Council began their affiliation as a task force with the CPCAN a year ago. She said at the time, the Clinton County Council thought it might be advantageous for their status and in meeting their goals to join in with Ingham and Eaton Counties in taking preventive action against child abuse. At the same time, they joined as a trial run for one year, after which they would decide whether to continue the affiliation.

Roger Schutes, of the Department of Social Services, recently addressed the council on their affiliation, stating that he and several other prominent businessmen in the area would encourage the council to return to independence again.

"A vote for independence is a vote for the special needs of Clinton County kids," he said in a letter addressed to the Council.

Following the majority vote, Nutt expressed her appreciation to Sharon Shay, the Executive Director and acting consultant for the Tri-County Council for all of the assistance she gave to the Clinton

County Council.

Shay said that even though the council voted to go independent of the Tri-County Council, she hoped that they could continue working

together in the prevention of child abuse in the area, and that she and her Council would continue to offer any help they can to make the council both effective

and successful.

Next month's meeting, to occur August 8th at the First Congregational Church in St. Johns, will hopefully determine the

new chairman of the council. Ken Kralick also volunteered his services, and was subsequently voted in, as the coordinator for the new council.

# Find out why plants don't flower

Flowering plants that don't flower can be a big disappointment in your garden. A little detective work can usually pinpoint the reason why plants failed to bloom.

The most common reasons for failure to flower are the age of the plant, the winter temperature, light, nutrition and improper pruning.

Lee Taylor, Extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University, says many landscape ornamentals spend a certain amount of time in a juvenile stage when they grow vegetatively but don't flower. If youth is the problem, patience is the answer.

Temperature can affect plants by being either too low or not low enough.

Extremely low temperatures in the winter may kill flower buds on such plants as forsythia and dogwood. On the other hand, some cold is necessary for normal flowering in many ornamentals and some house plants. Familiar ex-

amples of flowering plants that require a chilling period are tulips, daffodils, crocus and cactus.

Many plants flower in response to certain periods of light or dark. The poinsettia and chrysanthemum fall in the category of photoperiodic plants. Other plants, such as peonies, will survive but produce few or no flowers in heavy shade. Sun-loving annuals will bloom poorly in the shade, while shade-loving plants, such as rex begonias, will not thrive in full sun.

Overfeeding, especially with nitrogen, may stimulate plants to produce lots of shoots and leaves but few flowers. A soil test is your best guide to fertilizer requirements, Taylor notes.

Pruning plants at the wrong time may also prevent flowering by removing flower buds. Spring-flowering trees and shrubs should be pruned immediately after they flower. They set the buds for

According to Dr. Javier Ruiz-Esparaza, assistant clinical professor in dermatology, this method is particularly effective for recurring cancers, and those on the nose, ear or other facial areas where tissue conservation is very important.

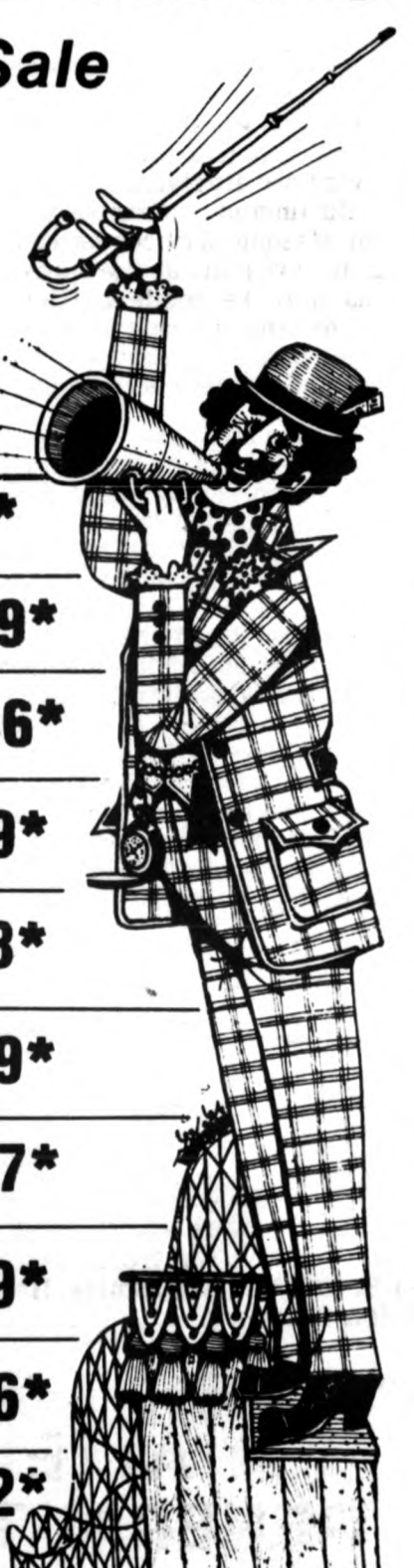

next spring's flowers by the time they go dormant this fall, so pruning in fall or winter removes the buds that would have opened into next year's floral display.

A frequent problem with naturalized bulbs—crocus and other spring flowering bulbs planted in lawn areas—is that the grass starts growing and requires mowing before the foliage on the bulbs has finished making food to build the bulbs for the next year's flower production. Mowing the foliage off may leave the bulbs too weak to produce a good show. Naturalized areas have to be left unmowed until bulb foliage dies down naturally.

Another kind of pruning may occur when moles, deer and other animals munch on bulbs, shrubs, trees and other plants, removing shoots or flower buds or girdling main stems. Controlling

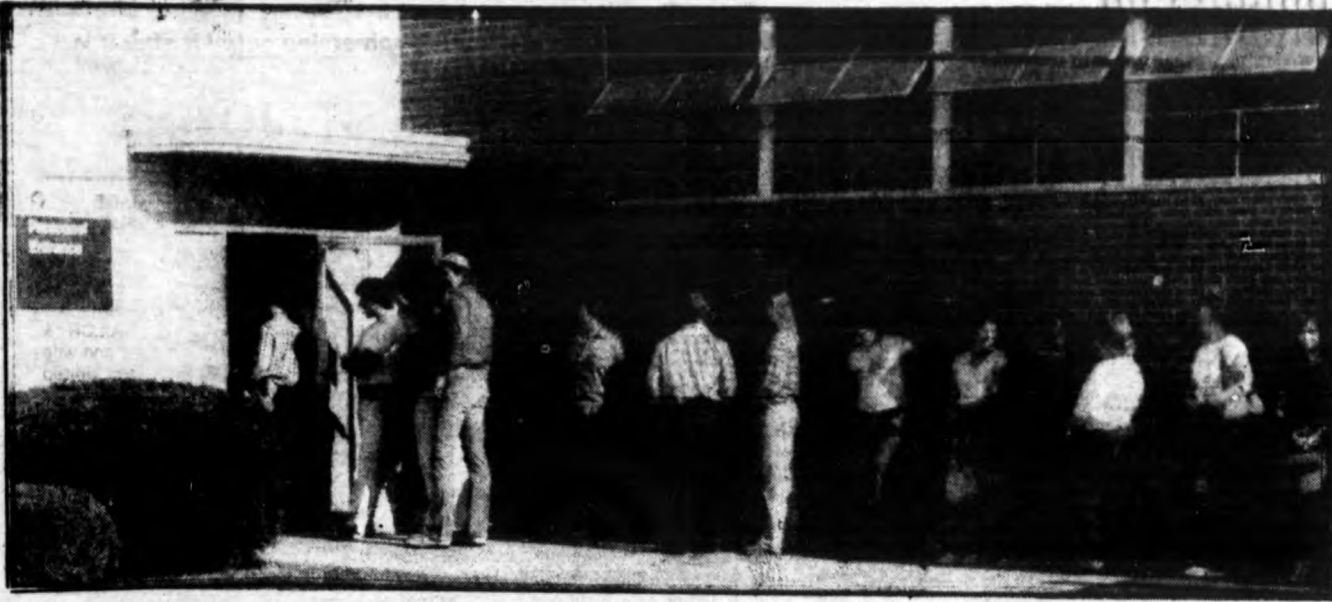

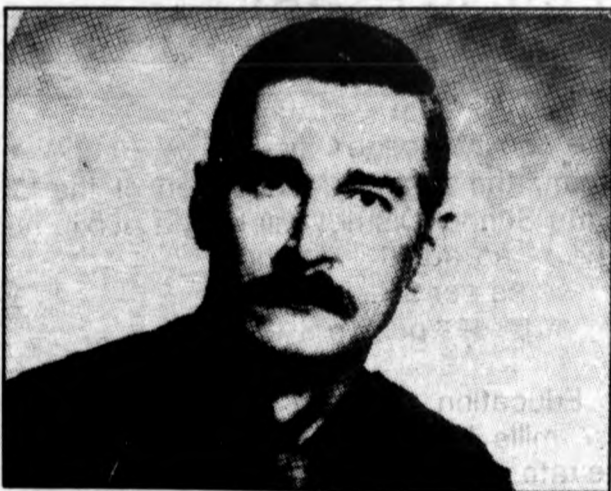

### Medication

The potential for drug abuse does not rest solely with the young.

The potential for misuse, adverse drug reactions and interactions exists in the senior citizens' category, where elderly individuals may use as many as 18 different medications a year.

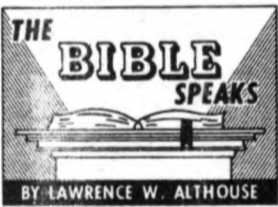
Dr. Peter Lamy, of the University of Maryland School of Pharmacy, who authored "Prescribing for the Elderly" says "we can no longer ignore the special health care needs of the elderly."

The problem long has been that older Americans did not know where to go for guidance and help with the medications they are taking. This situation should change with development of a new program called Elder-Care, a national consumer awareness

campaign to stimulate communication on medication between older patients and health care providers, particularly pharmacists.

Elder-Care, launched by the Parke-Davis Division of Warner-Lambert Company aims to increase medication compliance by calling attention to the fact that pharmacists can help older Americans understand how to use medications properly. The message will be delivered through nationwide advertising and publicity campaigns, in-store consumer education materials, speaking engagements by health practitioners, direct mail announcements and instruction sessions.

Senior citizens will also be alerted to the program through Elder-Care signs and display materials in pharmacies.



### A BACKWARD STEP AHEAD

August 12, 1984

Background Scripture:  
2 Kings 18 through 20.  
Devotional Reading:  
Isaiah 1:18-20.

Recently I had an opportunity to return to my university alma mater after several decades of absence.

I knew that in the thirty years since I had graduated, the campus had undergone a tremendous change. Many of the things we had dreamed of when I was a student there had now come to pass: bright, shiny new buildings to replace some of the old "dungeons" of my day, city streets had been closed-off, trolley tracks taken up and the campus almost doubled in size. Millions had been spent to improve the university.

### HE HELD FAST

But my "homecoming" was something less than the joy I had anticipated. The campus of my alma mater today is a hodgepodge of glaring architectural experiments, graffiti, and a campus that looks "seedy." All the new "improvements" have not necessarily made the campus a better place to pursue an education.

This is hardly a unique or singular experience, but one that I have encountered frequently. I realize at this point in my life that all too often in the past, I have placed too much stock in replacing the "old" with the "new." "New" is not necessarily "better."

Like many of us, the people of Israel were eager to

leave behind the "old ways" of their fathers and establish the "new" ways that seemed to be the only key to the future. The "old" religion seemed too restrictive and forbidding. The "new" religious movements all around them promised to be much more enjoyable and profitable.

That is, until Hezekiah became king. Unlike most of his predecessors and successors, Hezekiah was not hesitant to return his nation to the old values and practices which had so sustained Israel in former times. Thus, the writer of 2 Kings makes what was to be a very rare entry: "And he did what was right in the eyes of the Lord... For he held fast to the Lord; he did not depart from following him, but kept the commandments which the Lord commanded Moses" (18:3,6).

### HE PROSPERED

It wasn't that Hezekiah was trying to take the people of Is-

rael back to "the good old days," but that he was trying to get them to return to the eternal truths and values which time does not outgrow. It was Israel's heritage from the past that would be the foundation upon which the Israel of the present must build for the future. The end result was that "wherever he went, he prospered" (18:7).

Hezekiah apparently realized that one does not have to give up the past in order to live in the present and prepare for the future. There was value in the old traditions of Israel. There was continuity in perpetuating some of the old ways.

It was this appreciation and reverence for the traditions of Israel that made him so effective in the present moment. The reform of Hezekiah, although it appeared to be a movement backward, was actually a step ahead.

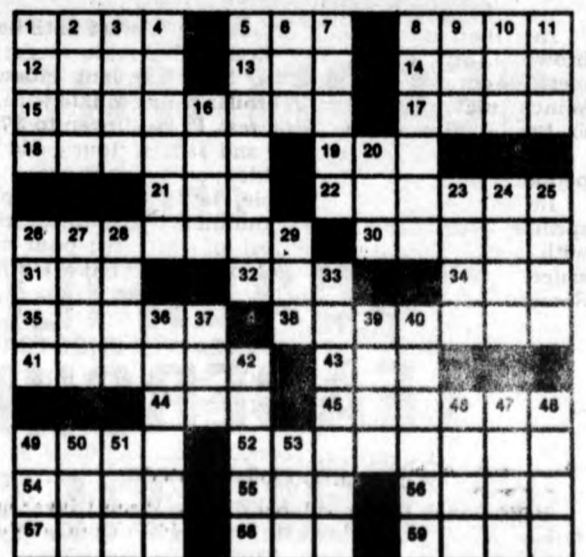

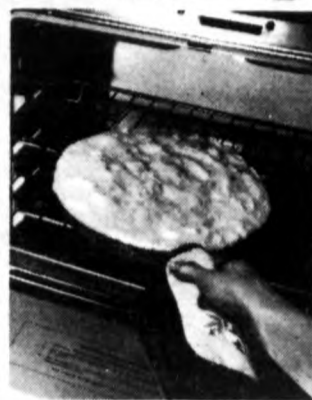

## State Fair ranks with best

More than 2.5 million dollars has been invested in the Michigan State Fairgrounds for renovating major buildings and improving landscaping. With the recent facility improvement and new construction in the Agriculture Complex, the Michigan State Fair has become one of the country's best livestock showing facilities. These changes and improvements demonstrate the State Fair's commitment to the livestock and agricultural aspects of the Michigan State Fair.

Some of last year's changes included painting the exteriors of the agricultural building, the horse barn, the Coliseum and the cattle barn. And, for the comfort of the exhibitors, a brand new shower and restroom facility was built adjoining the cattle barn. The old first aid building has been torn down and the new modern facilities are located in the Coliseum, which was under major construction.

There are big changes in store for the sheep exhibitors. The sheep barn will be in a new location this year. It will now be located under the large roof structure next to the Michigan Mart, and all new pens will be installed. The camping site for sheep, swine and goat exhibitors will be available at the site of the recent demolished sheep and swine building. The wool room, along with the lamb and wool activities, will now be located inside the agriculture building.

Some of the many events returning to the 1984 Michigan State Fair are the sheep shearing contest, the Livestock Auctioneer Championship and the Agriculture's Amazing Acre, which promotes Michigan's agricultural commodities, with brochures and food tastings.

The State Fair Advisory Council and the State Fair Acting General Manager, O.J. Scherschligt, have been instrumental in the Agriculture, Livestock and Youth sections of the Fair. Through the agricultural and horse committees, a master plan was developed and approved for the agricultural complex.

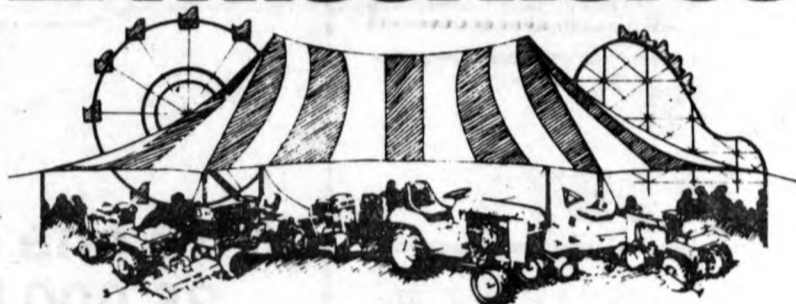

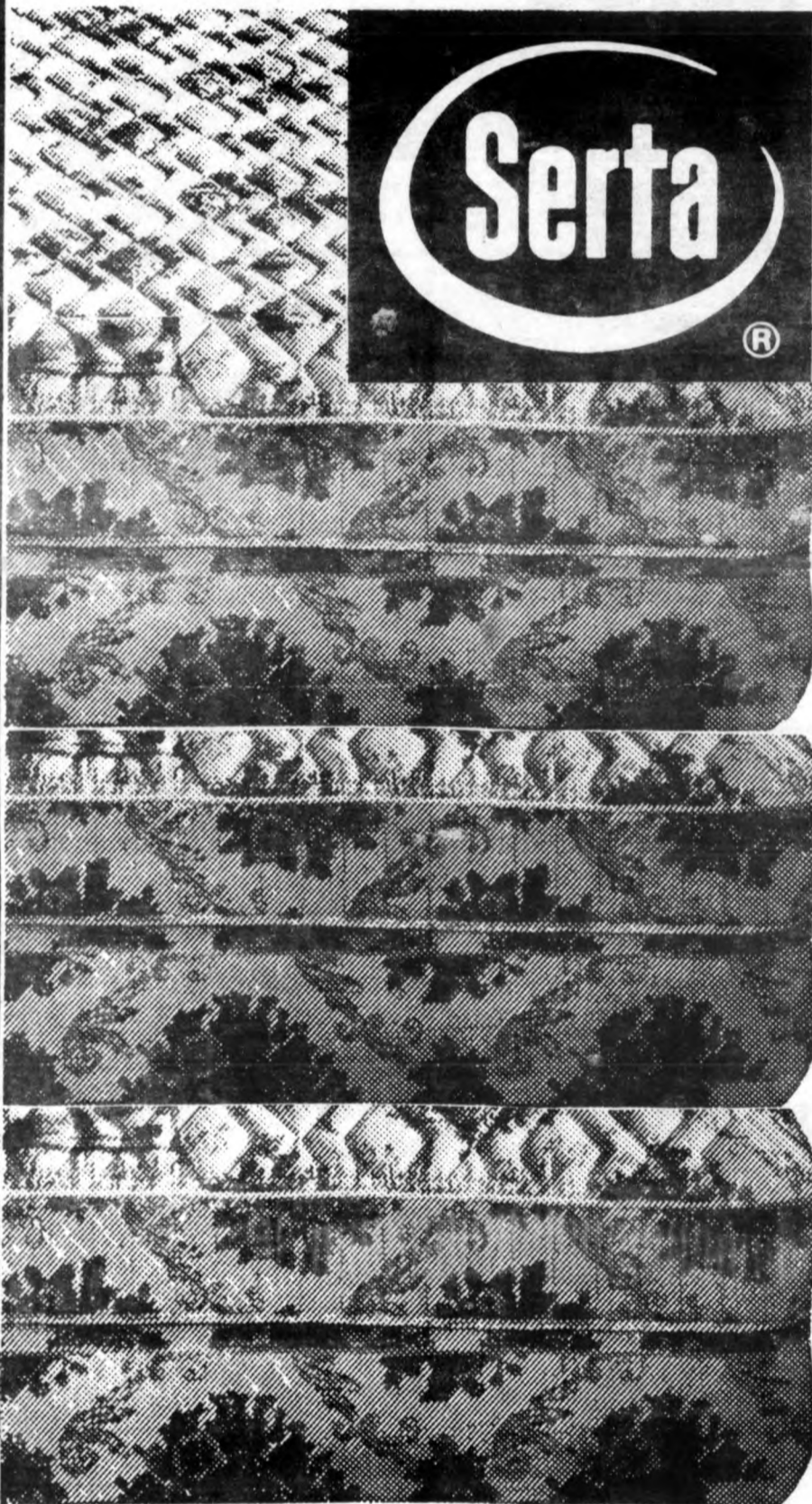

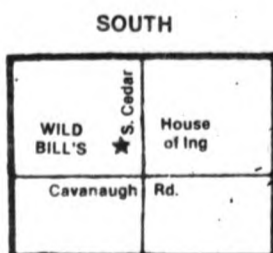
