## Area man barricades self in Ovid

Larry Gordon Bellaire, 41, of E. First Street, Ovid, is currently awaiting trial in the Clinton County Jail after breaking into an area home and barricading himself from four area police departments.

According to Detective Dick May, of the Clinton County Sheriff's Department, Bellaire telephoned the home of William E. Kerby, 200 E. Oak Street, early Thursday morning and told him he was coming over to destroy both Kerby and his roommate, Ross E. Walters. May said that at approximately 9 a.m. Bellaire arrived at the home and proceeded to kick in the front door. Both Kerby and Walters fled the home and called the police. The Clinton County Sheriff's Department, the St. Johns Police Department, the Ovid Police Department and the Owosso State Police responded to the call.

After several witnesses reported that they had seen Bellaire remove an item from his car and put it in his pocket, police decided to block off the surrounding area to insure everyone's safety. Detective Sgt. Don Kennell, also of the Sheriff's Department, acted as chief negotiator and tried contacting Bellaire by phone to try talking him into giving himself over to the authorities. When Bellaire didn't respond, a personal friend was brought to the scene to try negotiating. When still no contact was made with Bellaire, police decided to enter the home and restrain him.

After entering through the back door, police found Bellaire hiding in the basement of the home, underneath the stairwell. Negotiations continued

## IGA store purchased in St. Johns

"We can't wait to get started," said Dorothy Anderson, regarding the new purchase of Andy's IGA. "Our intent is to become the cleanest, friendliest and most dependable grocery business in town."

Dorothy and her husband, Bob, of Perry, recently purchased Andy's after 18 years in the grocery business. He is currently partners in the ownership of Snyder's IGA in Perry, a market that has remained in the area for almost 100 years. He said that after discovering Andy's was for sale in St. Johns, he and his wife decided to look into purchasing the additional store.

"The store seems to be a nucleus within the area," Bob said. "People seem to have strong ties to the store. This is where they will continue coming because they feel comfortable. We're going to work hard at making it that way."

Bob was recently recognized as the "Progressive Grocers" 1984 Outstanding Independent Retailer for his outstanding merchandising. He was among 11 Michigan retailers recognized nationally, with less than 500 being honored across the country. He plans to continue serving the St. Johns residents in that same capacity.

Andy's will officially become Bob's IGA this week, with the store closing

for three days for a thorough cleaning of the premises and re-stocking of the shelves. But, according to Bob, that's only the beginning. Long term goals include a complete remodeling of the store, with a total equipment change, the addition of a large walk-in beverage cooler, a new roof and the resurfacing of the parking area. The building itself will be re-sided and undergo a change in decor.

"We want to make Bob's a full-service store, complete with carry outs and all of the other services available to the store. We want to add departments that Andy's didn't have and enhance and improve upon the others. It's gonna get new life."

According to Dorothy, one of the

newest features will be the addition of a deli in which cold salads and fried chicken will be among the items available.

"I think we'll have a great time," she said. "We have a great crew in Perry and I think we'll have a great crew here, too."

Jay Rice, of Houghton Lake, will be managing the store with most of the former employees continuing at Bob's. He added that with the additions, new openings may become available in the future.

"We create a family atmosphere in the market," Bob said. "It's more than just employees and employer relationships and our customers can feel it."

# Grocery dynasty ends in St. Johns

After 48 years of serving the local St. Johns residents, a dynasty came to an end last week with the selling of Andy's IGA, one of the areas leading grocery stores.

The family enterprise actually began more than 100 years ago when Margaret (Nienaber) Anderson's grandfather began a food market in New Orleans, Louisiana. Behind his corner store he featured grain in hay for the carriage horses and block ice. In 1915, Margaret's father, Rudy, took over the small business.

Fourteen years later, Margaret married a man named Dorr Anderson of Eaton Rapids. He and his brother, Warren, also had their roots in the grocery business with their mother's store in Eaton Rapids, "L.S. Anderson and Sons."

Dorr and Margaret continued running the his store throughout their their many years of marriage. Adventually, they moved to St. Johns and bought their first store from Glenora Burk in 1936.

In 1942, Dorr also purchased Smith Food Market at the corner of N. Clinton Avenue and US-27 and named it "The Shopping Basket." The store was the first supermarket type of store in St. Johns, a concept that was just beginning in the grocery business. Prior to this idea, grocery stores only offered behind the counter service.

In 1947, Dorr built an additional fruit market on US-27 and later enlarged it to house the present Andy's IGA. The building was three sided, being open to the air on the side facing the highway.

At the same time, the idea of pre-packaging meats was also beginning in the state and Dorr began cutting the meat in the downtown store and sending it pre-packaged to the US-27 store. Their daughter and son, Kay and Rick, were literally raised in the store.

Son-in-law Jerry Tiedt, husband of Kay, also began learning the business in 1961 and eventually moved to Ithaca to help manage Andy's IGA Foodliner, which Dorr had opened in 1959.

In 1962, Dorr Anderson continued construction in the area with the building of Redwings Bowling

Lanes which he leased to Orth Tatroe, of St. Johns.

The most recent design change came later, in 1968, when the building was reversed to accommodate a larger parking area. According to a design developed by Dorr, the about face was also a method of integrating the building with the total area in order to begin the development of a shopping center.

Dorr died in 1969 leaving his wife Margaret to operate the two stores with the help of her son Rick and son-in-law Jerry.



In 1979, Jerry and Kay (Anderson) Teidt returned to the St. Johns store and entered into partnership with Rick and Margaret. It wasn't until 1980 that the Tiedts took over both stores. Despite the selling of Andy's IGA in St. Johns, they will continue serving the residents of Ithaca with Jerry's IGA.

"It is with sadness that we are selling this store," expressed Kay on Friday. "Life long customers have expressed to me over the last few weeks their love and respect for my father and their concern over the possible loss of this store. I am very proud to be a member of this family. We (Jerry and Kay) want to thank all the faithful customers that have continued to trade with us through these trying circumstances. We feel they are part of the family at Andy's like our long time employees."

until Bellaire gave himself up at approximately 12:45 p.m. No weapons were found on the man.

Bellaire, who moved to Ovid from Detroit last year, had been threatening area residents, police and social service personnel during the recent weeks. After a fighting incident last week, Ovid Police transported him to the Mental Health Center in Lansing to undergo psychiatric examination. After the center found him mentally competent, he was released and returned to the area. He is reportedly unemployed and has no relatives in the area.

Bellaire was arraigned Friday morning before the Judge Frederick Lewis and bond was set at \$10,000. He is being charged with breaking and entering with an attempt to commit a felony.

## Woman found guilty in false fire alarm

The St. Johns Police Department has reported that Lisa Ann Coffman, 25, of 2088 E. M-21, is currently finishing out her 20-day sentence at the Clinton County Jail after being found guilty of turning in a false fire alarm.

According to police, Coffman placed the call to the St. Johns Fire

Department in the early morning of May 31st. Police said she confessed that she made the call to another woman as part of an ongoing conflict between the two.

She was sentenced on July 24th to 20 days in jail, six months of probation and \$190 for restitution.

# Winn named chairman of County Child Safety

Mike Winn, of the Clinton County Sheriff's Department, was recently elected Chairman of the Clinton County Child Safety Committee.

Winn, who has been a deputy with the Sheriff's Department for approximately 13 years, said he accepted the position with feelings that the department itself should be more involved with these types of community efforts.

"This is the biggest committee we've ever donated to," he said. "I've always felt we should be more involved in this type of thing. Now we're here."

"I care a lot about the cause," he explained, commenting on his own five children. "I've seen a lot of accidents over the years and I'm a firm believer in seat belts, as well as car seats."

The Committee works in cooperation with the Mid-Michigan District Health Department to reduce the number one cause of death to children, the automobile accident.

Their goal is to see that every child under the age of four in Clinton County rides safely in a restraint seat.

Currently, however, there are 60 families on the waiting list to receive a seat. The committee is concerned about these families, and is trying to raise enough money to supply these families with a seat as soon as possible.

The safety seats are provided free on a loan basis through the Health Department, expectant parent classes, some local law enforcement agencies, and local clergy.

When used correctly, the seats reduce the risk of death by 90 percent and injury by 80 percent. Classes are offered at the Health Department to learn the proper use of the seats.

Seats are purchased at a discount rate with donations from businesses, community groups

and individuals. There are approximately 700 babies born each year in Clinton County. If 25 percent of parents acquire seats through another source, an inventory of 2100 seats would be needed over the next three years.

## Albosta study released

Congressman Don Albosta, in an open letter to the Big Rapids community, made public the results of a recent study by the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) on the cost and feasibility of expanding the town's post office. Albosta, chairman of a Post Office and Civil Service Subcommittee, requested the study after residents of Big Rapids expressed concern about the effects of a USPS proposal to relocate the post office.

In his letter to residents of Big Rapids, Albosta revealed that expansion of the current facility would cost the Postal Service \$76,000 more, over a ten year period, than construction of a new facility.

ty. Additional costs would be incurred, Albosta said, because of disruptions in the normal operation during the expansion period.

Albosta said Postal officials have agreed to his request for another meeting with the residents of Big Rapids, which will ensure maximum input from the community before the final decision is made. The Congressman said he believes the results of the study will allow the town's elected officials, business owners, and postal customers to make an informed decision on the future of the post office in Big Rapids. "As your representative in Congress, it is not my position to tell the Postal Service which course of action it should follow. It is my responsibility, however, to make sure the residents of my district are properly and fairly served by the Federal government," the third-term Congressman concluded.

## COMMISSION ORDER CWI-231.84

### PHEASANT HUNTING REGULATIONS FOR 1984

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on June 8, 1984, under the authority of Section 11, Chapter II, of Act 286, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Sections 1 and 3 of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, being Sections 312.11, 300.1, and 300.3 of The Michigan Compiled Laws, established the following pheasant hunting season regulations for 1984.

#### Seasons

##### Zone 1:

In that part of Menominee County lying south of Highway US-2 and Delta County, south and west of Escanaba River, October 10-20, inclusive.

##### Zones 2 and 3:

October 20 - November 11, inclusive.

#### Bag Limits

##### Zone 1:

The bag limit shall be restricted to 1 male pheasant per day, 2 in possession, and 4 during the season.

##### Zones 2 and 3:

Statutory bag limits shall apply -- 2 male pheasants per day, 4 in possession, and 8 during the season.

Pheasants taken in any of the prescribed pheasant put-take areas shall be included in the small game hunter's daily bag and possession limit.

This Order replaces the previous Order entitled, "Pheasant Hunting Regulations for 1983," CWI-231.83, dated June 10, 1983, and shall take effect October 10, 1984 and remain valid until November 11, 1984.

### STATEWIDE TROUT AND SALMON REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on July 13, 1984, under the authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning September 1, 1984, and ending March 31, 1984, no person shall possess, take or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

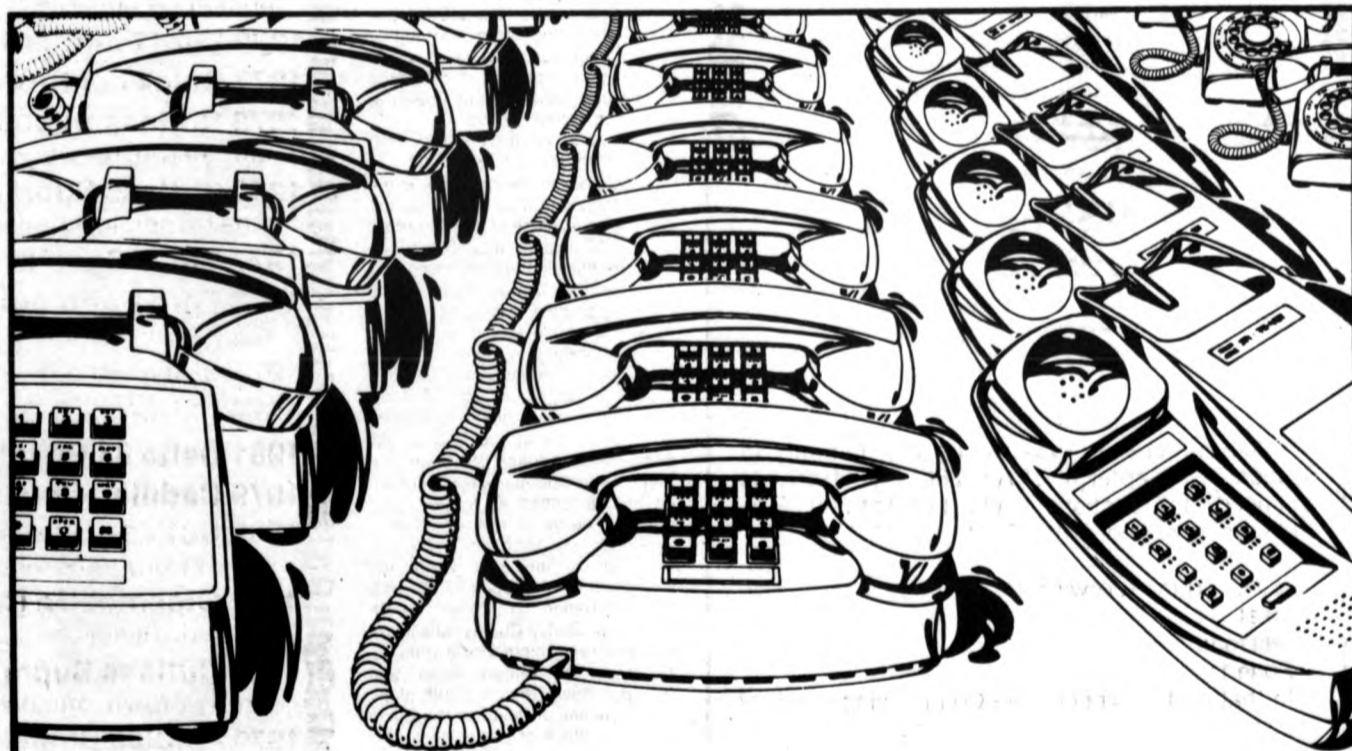
Statewide open seasons on all trout streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon except on Lake Huron and its tributary streams and on Lake Michigan and its tributary streams the season on lake trout is from May 1 through August 15.

Size limits shall be 8 inches in Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on all lakes. The possession limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination, but no more than 2 lake trout or splake from Lake Michigan and its tributary streams or 3 lake trout or splake from Lake Superior and Lake Huron and their tributary streams, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only.

In addition to one day's possession limit of salmon and trout, a person may possess an additional two day's possession limit of processed salmon. For the purposes of this Commission Order the term processed means:

- Canned in a sealed container
- Cured by smoking or drying
- Frozen in a solid state

Any processed salmon or trout aboard a vessel on the water or at dockside shall be included in the daily possession limit.

# Recipe Page



Quiche aux Epinards et Chèvre is a blue-ribbon recipe that your guests may well consider a "best ever." It derives its unique flavor from spinach and two great French cheeses—delicate triple crème and tangy chèvre (goat's milk). French chèvres come in many different shapes, such as patties, logs and pyramids. Most are snowy white; some are dusted with vegetable ash; others are sprinkled with herbs or annatto, which tints them orange. With the quiche, serve a French dry white wine such as a Sancerre from the Loire Valley.

## QUICHE AUX EPINARDS ET CHEVRE (Makes one 10-inch tart)

- 1 package (11 oz.) pie crust mix
- 1 lb. spinach, trimmed or 1 package (10 oz.) frozen chopped spinach
- 2 T. butter
- 3 shallots, minced
- 4 oz. French goat's milk cheese (e.g. Bûcheron, Ste. Maure, Pyramide)
- 6 oz. French triple crème cheese (e.g. Boursault, Brillat-Savarin)
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup (1/2 pint) light cream
- 1 finely chopped ripe tomato

Prepare pie crust mix according to package directions. Use pie crust to line bottom and sides of ungreased 10-inch flan pan. Cook spinach if using fresh, then squeeze dry and chop. If using frozen, thaw and squeeze dry. Heat butter in small skillet and sauté shallots for 5 minutes. In bowl, beat eggs with cheeses until smooth. Gradually beat in cream. Stir in sautéed shallots and spinach. Pour mixture into prepared shell. Bake in preheated moderate oven (350°F) for 40 to 45 minutes or until puffed and brown. Garnish edge of pie with chopped tomato.

# Albosta supports school prayer

Congressman Don Albosta (D-St. Charles) recently announced he voted in favor of a bill to permit silent prayer in America's public schools. The 365 to 50 vote to allow prayer came as an amendment to the Federal aid to states that deny individuals in public schools the opportunity to participate in moments of silent prayer.

"It's my feeling that this action is the right course to follow," Albosta declared following the vote. "Just look, for example, at the United States

Congress. Each day, before we get down to the business at hand, a clergyman leads us in a short and meaningful prayer. It often provides the inspiration I need, particularly when there is a tough vote waiting to be cast."

Albosta went on to say he believes it is unfortunate that educators throughout the country have remained confused as to whether they were within their Constitutional rights to allow silent prayer in the classroom. With passage of this legislation, he feels confident that much of that confusion surrounding the issue has been eliminated.

Said Albosta: "Religion is an important part of

American life. While it is taught in our homes, churches and synagogues, there is no reason we should not allow school children the opportunity for a minute of silent prayer to reflect on the day that awaits them."
