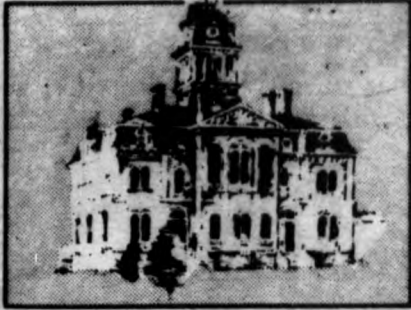

## Candidates fill positions

# Martlew takes lead for judge in primary election

It looks like Clinton County may be undergoing some changes at the governing level this November after Tuesday's primary election resulted in DeWitt lawyer Jeffrey Martlew taking the lead for the 65th District Judge.

According to the County Clerk's office, Martlew slipped ahead of 11-year-incumbent Frederick

Lewis with 2514 votes, 136 votes more than Lewis obtained in the primary. Richard Koenigskecht, an assistant Clinton County prosecutor trailed them both with 2206 votes.

Terry Hanechow, currently a deputy sheriff, garnered the County Sheriffs position with 3649 votes, while Erban Royce Brown, a former state trooper, followed closely behind with 3208. Both men were newcomers to the election, while current Sheriff Anthony Hufnagel chose not to seek re-election to the spot. Hanechow and Brown were

also running on the Republican platform, as were all of the candidates in the election.

In other heated races, 12 year incumbent Jon Newman maintained his position as Prosecuting Attorney with 4309 votes, while opponent Bob Steinman, a St. Johns lawyer, received 2392.

Patricia Purtill, a deputy county treasurer, won the County Treasurer title with 4163 votes, while St. Johns City Clerk Eugene Simon trailed with 2467.

Incumbent Arden S. Pierson will continue as the Drain Commissioner after stepping out with 3430 votes, 727 more votes than opponent Gerald Wilcox, a former St. Johns city commissioner.

Bonnie D. Wickerham was unopposed for the office of Register of Deeds, as well as County Clerk Jane Swanchara. Each received 5483 and 5682 votes respectively.

The County Clerks' office reported that only approximately 25 percent of the registered voters took part in Tuesday election, with 8902 of approximately 33,000 registered voters making their selection. The poor turn out is believed to be caused by a number of reasons including the heat of the day and the Clinton County 4-H Fair.

In the commissioner races, only two districts had any competition. In District 1, Incumbent Glenn Webster won the race with 598 votes while former drain commissioner Harry Harden trailed with 427.

In District 4, Lois A. Bracey received 429 votes

**Shroud challenged by literary journal**

Is the Shroud of Turin the authentic burial cloth of Jesus, or is it one of thousands of bogus Christian relics which appeared in the Middle Ages -- its "miraculous" image the work of a clever medieval artist?

A scientific group claims to have established the authenticity of the Shroud and reputable periodicals such as National Geographic and Harper's have endorsed

their findings.

The Shroud and the scientific investigation are challenged in an article appearing in the Summer 1984 issue of Michigan Quarterly Review, the cultural and literary journal of the University of Michigan.

Author Denis Dutton, editor of The Forger's Art, refutes a recently published report on the Shroud of Turin Research Project (STURP) written by a scientist involved in the voluntary group.

Dutton critiques numerous aspects of the conclusions, such as whether paint or blood had been applied to the Shroud, implausible physical dimensions of the image, and how human craft may have rendered it. He also cites fourteenth-century documents which state that the origins of the Shroud were traced to an artist in the early half of that century. These documents were disregarded by the STURP investigators.

Pointing out parallels between the methods of the STURP research and Creationism, Dutton concludes that "Shroud Science and Creationism both pretend to a scientific objectivity that they obviously do not possess ... they are both efforts to promote religious beliefs by placing at their service the power and prestige of science."

Referring to an

editorial in the conservative/bi-weekly National Review praising the work of STURP, Dutton makes a case for political motives underlying the Shroud investigation and its outcome.

"The scientific legitimization of the Shroud of Turin is, as the National Review understands, fine ammunition for the religious right's attack on the secular state," Dutton writes.

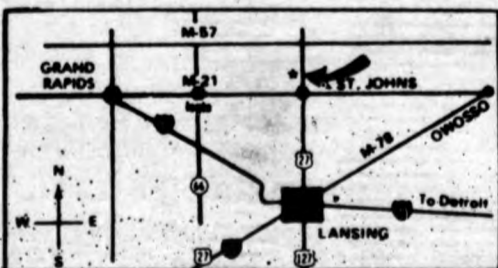

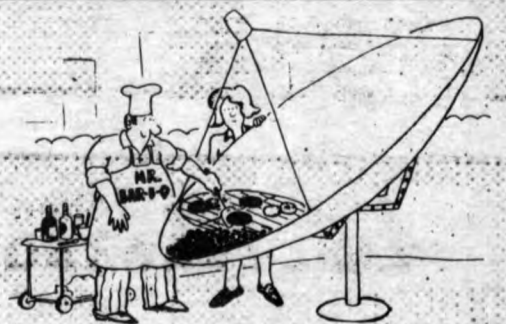

## Albosta addresses Dow employees

Congressman Don Albosta, speaking to a large group of Dow Chemical employees, said we have to cut Federal spending and restore common sense to the Federal Government before this country goes bankrupt.

"I have strongly supported the Pay As You Go budget plan to reduce the deficit by over \$175 billion. We have to balance the budget and stop mortgaging the future of this country," Albosta said.

"The time has come," he continued, "to cut the campaign rhetoric and put the brakes on reckless Federal spending, particularly the wasteful money spent by the Pentagon where they buy screwdrivers for \$1500 and lightbulbs for \$500 apiece."

The Congressman told the crowd of Dow employees that he represents all of the District not just Midland and that there are many different groups with varying interests in the 10th District.

According to Albosta, his opponent, Bill Schuette, is reportedly an heir to the Dow fortune, by being the stepson of former Dow Board Chairman, Carl Gerstacker, and has received \$1,000 contributions from wealthy individuals in Texas, California, Ohio and other states around the country. Schuette, who is 30, is reportedly worth \$2 million, much of it in Dow stock, and is strongly supported by many of the top executives of Dow Chemical.

"I hope you will look at my record in Congress," Albosta told the group, "where I have consistently opposed tax increases and voted to cut Federal spending. I believe we need to run government on a cost effective basis and cut the waste, fraud and abuse out."

He added, "I also believe we need to restore values of family, hard work and the respect for human life to our society. We need to put welfare recipients to work and provide the incentives for people to make better lives for themselves and their children."

Albosta's opponent, a lawyer from Midland, has publicly said he is for abortion and will oppose legislation now before Congress that seeks to ban abortion in this country.

"The choices we make in the 1984 elections will affect our country for years to come. I believe the future can be bright if we restore fiscal sanity to the Federal Government and invest in the future through better education and fairer policies for everyone," Albosta said.

### STATEWIDE TROUT AND SALMON REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on July 13, 1984, under the authority of Act 165, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, ordered that for the period beginning September 1, 1984, and ending March 31, 1984, no person shall possess, take or attempt to take, any species of trout or salmon from any of the waters of this state except by hook and line during the open seasons prescribed, and within the minimum size limits and maximum possession limits indicated below.

Statewide open seasons on all trout streams and designated trout lakes shall be from the last Saturday in April through September 30 (longer on waters designated by the Director for extended fishing under Act 165) on all trout and salmon. Statewide open seasons on all other inland lakes and the Great Lakes shall be any time for all trout and salmon except on Lake Huron and its tributary streams and on Lake Michigan and its tributary streams the season on lake trout is from May 1 through August 15.

Size limits shall be 8 inches in Lower Peninsula streams, 7 inches on Upper Peninsula streams, and 10 inches on all lakes. The possession limit for trout and salmon shall be 5 fish singly or in combination, but no more than 2 lake trout or splake from Lake Michigan and its tributary streams or 3 lake trout or splake from Lake Superior and Lake Huron and their tributary streams, except that an additional 5 brook or brown trout may be taken from streams from the last Saturday in April through September 30 only.

In addition to one day's possession limit of salmon and trout, a person may possess an additional two day's possession limit of processed salmon. For the purposes of this Commission Order the term processed means:

- (a) Canned in a sealed container
- (b) Cured by smoking or drying
- (c) Frozen in a solid state

Any processed salmon or trout aboard a vessel on the water or at dockside shall be included in the daily possession limit.

## Telephone process made easier in area

Telephone calls in Owosso, Corunna, and Ashley will be processed faster and with less noise and more reliability, thanks to a highly sophisticated state-of-the-art electronic switching system which will be placed in service by General Telephone of Michigan on August 18.

The system works by transmitting conversations in digital pulses, the way computers operate.

Customers will need to make some changes in their dialing patterns. Direct dialing of long distance calls will be simplified. Rather than dialing "120" when placing station-to-station calls, telephone users will simply dial "1", plus the area code if necessary, plus the phone number.

The party line code, for those who have party line service, will be eliminated. They'll dial the seven digit number listed in the telephone directory for the party they wish to reach. Those who have been using only five digits to place calls will have to use all seven digits with this new equipment. In addition, customers will be timed out if they delay for more than 15 seconds between digits.

Familiar sounds such as dial tones and busy signals will be a higher pitch. Callers no longer will hear a "progress tone" after dialing a long distance call. That means silence for up to 20 seconds. Callers are urged to stay on the line while the call switches quietly along the network.

With the addition of this equipment, those who have purchased push-button instruments without signing up for Touch Calling service may find their instruments not responding. Touch Calling is an optional feature customers pay for monthly. If customers did not contact the phone company when they purchased the new instruments, the technicians won't program that line for the special Touch Calling service.

# Farm News

## Block to speak on 1985 Farm Bill at conference

John R. Block, Secretary of Agriculture, United States Department of Agriculture, will be speaking on the 1985 Farm Bill at a Michigan Agriculture/Business Council breakfast on August 30, in Lansing.

The Council anticipates that more than one thousand farmers and agri-businessman from across the state will attend to hear Secretary Block address this key topic. A press conference with the secretary will follow.

The 1985 Farm Bill will be a top priority item in Congress next year. This legislation will be of major interest to all farmers and agri-businessmen since it will establish the government's farm policy and, therefore, the direction U.S. Agriculture will take over the next several years. Secretary Block summarized its importance when he stated, "We now have an opportunity to make some changes that could affect the industry that it is; one that will recognize the importance of ex-

ports to our economic vitality; and one that will be designed to keep U.S. Agriculture competitive in international trade."

The Michigan Agriculture/Business Council is a newly formed organization of agri-business and farmers, founded to present a unified voice for all of Michigan agriculture to both the public and the legislators. Robert E. Rushton, Council President, states, "The Michigan Agriculture/Business Council is an opportunity for every individual, organization and business to take an equal part in speaking up for an industry which has a \$15 billion share in Michigan's economy." Rushton added, "Not many folks realize the importance of our total industry to Michigan -- but we plan to change that!"

## Index of Prices fall two percent during July

The Index of Prices received by Michigan farmers for all farm products was 137 percent of its 1977 base for the month ending July 15. This represents a 2 percent decline from June, ac-

ording to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Reporting Service. The overall index remained 11 percent above the comparable period last year despite the monthly decline in farm prices. The Index of Prices paid by farmers, nationwide, for commodities and services, interest, taxes, and farm wage rates for July was 166 percent of its 1977 base. The Index was unchanged from June, but it was 4 percent above a year earlier. Price increases since June for feeder cattle and calves were offset by lower feed and fuel prices.

Most of the commodities included in the Michigan index displayed lower prices than a month ago. These decreases were led by dramatic drops in hay and soybean prices, which were off 37 and 12 percent respectively. Price decreases were also noted for corn, winter wheat, oats, calves, slaughter cows and milk. Early season potato harvest resulted in stronger potato prices this month. Other price gains were noted for dry beans, eggs, hogs, steers and heifers.

Nationally, the July All Farm Products Index of Prices received by farmers decreased 1 percent from June to 143 percent of its 1977 average. The Index was 9 percent above a year ago. Compared with a month earlier, prices were lower for soybeans, wheat, peaches, hay and grapefruit. Partially offsetting were higher prices for hogs, oranges, broilers, apples and milk.

## Terracing saves farming top soil

If you're losing too much top soil, your whole farm could be washed away. A call to the local Soil Conservation Service office can turn that loss into a profit situation. Take John Alexander of Hillsdale County as an example. His 102 acres were losing top soil at a rate of 15 tons per acre. That is five times the amount tolerable for maintaining profitable crop yields.

Michigan Farmer magazine details District Conservationalist Dennis Haskins' unique solution to Alexander's dilemma: terracing. Terraces can be used in other farms in the Hillsdale County area, Haskins says. Terraces reduce the length of sloping terrain by cutting into it in steps that reduce the volume and force of rain water.

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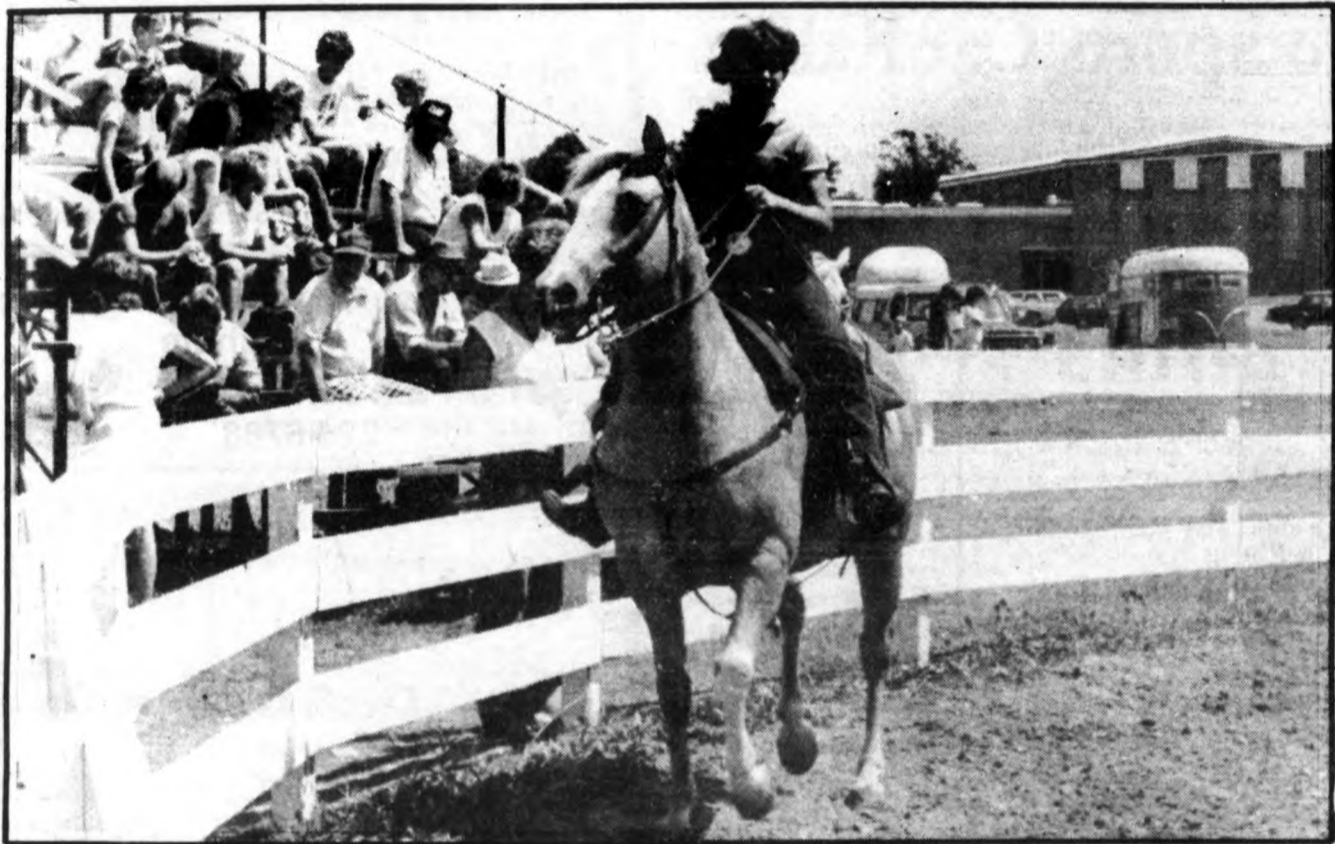

to the spot, while Raymond Canfield received 365. Both were newcomers to the positions.

All other candidates stood unopposed in the primary. In District 6, however, Democrat Max Calder, will be challenging incumbent Roger Overway in the November election. In Tuesday's election, Overway received 731 votes, while Calder garnered 128.

In District 2, Walter G. Nobis received 874. In District 3, Earl Lancaster received 1308. In District 5, Richard Hawks received 479 votes and in District 7, Robert Van Driesen received 726.

In DeWitt Township, there will be a new superintendent, C. Frank Mann. He garnered 517 votes over incumbent Leonard Pung who received 463 votes. Voters also chose four newcomers from a field of eight for the four four-year trustee

vacancies. Names and number of votes are as follows: Michael J. Verlinde, 396; Douglas Hammond, 515; Charles Rademacher, 621; and Newcomer Bruce E. Angell II, 387.

For clerk, incumbent Greg Whitlock received 771 vote, while Judy M. Hazelo, a democrat, received 133.

Incumbent Alta Catherine Reed received 824 votes for the treasurer, while Democrat Eileen M. Corr received 135.

In Bath, none of the candidates had opposition to their positions, however, in November, incumbent Carl R. Croft will be challenged by Republican Tom King. Tuesday they received 112 and 262 votes respectively.

The following votes were received for the four four-year trustee seats: Incumbent Democrats, Paul N. Shaheen, 108; Robert L. Lieby, 129; Daniel A. Carleton, 113; and Robert A. Soper, 123.

Republican newcomers Thomas Woodruff received 213, with Charles A. Gutzki receiving 218.

Incumbent Republican Supervisor Richard T. Brook got 312 votes and incumbent Democrat Clerk Kathleen B. McQueen got 128 votes.

## Man sought in sexual assault case

## COMMISSION ORDER CWI-231.84

### PHEASANT HUNTING REGULATIONS FOR 1984

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on June 8, 1984, under the authority of Section 11, Chapter II, of Act 286, P.A. 1929, as amended, and Sections 1 and 3 of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, being Sections 312.11, 300.1, and 300.3 of The Michigan Compiled Laws, established the following pheasant hunting season regulations for 1984.

#### Seasons

##### Zone 1:

In that part of Menominee County lying south of Highway US-2 and Delta County, south and west of Escanaba River, October 10-20, inclusive.

##### Zones 2 and 3:

October 20 - November 11, inclusive.

#### Bag Limits

##### Zone 1:

The bag limit shall be restricted to 1 male pheasant per day, 2 in possession, and 4 during the season.

##### Zones 2 and 3:

Statutory bag limits shall apply -- 2 male pheasants per day, 4 in possession, and 8 during the season.

Pheasants taken in any of the prescribed pheasant put-take areas shall be included in the small game hunter's daily bag and possession limit.

This Order replaces the previous Order entitled, "Pheasant Hunting Regulations for 1983," CWI-231.83, dated June 10, 1983, and shall take effect October 10, 1984 and remain valid until November 11, 1984.

## Tornado sirens reviewed

In the event of a tornado warning, the St. Johns Police Department remind residents that they will sound the severe weather alarm for a period of three minutes. Upon hearing the steady blast, citizens are urged to take cover immediately and listen for further reports on their television or radio.

The police department will not issue an all clear signal and

residents are asked not to telephone the police or fire department for information, as it may interfere with an emergency calls. The television and radio will accurately provide all information.

Police also remind residents that the siren will be sounded if the tornado warning included any area in the county and despite what conditions may appear to be.

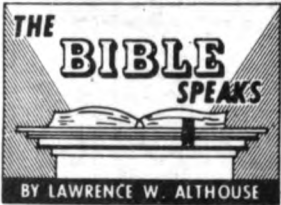

### THE WAY TO GROW

Background Scripture:  
2 Kings 21:1 through 23:30.  
Devotional Reading:  
2 Kings 21:1-9.

Most of the most deeply spiritual people I know were not born that way. Rather, it seems that as they have met opportunities and challenges in life, they have responded by growing in ways that have led to new levels of maturity and spiritual vitality.

Correspondingly, most of the un-spiritual people I know were not born that way either. They have encountered similar opportunities and challenges along the way, but they have not responded by growing in the way of spiritual maturity.

### REPAIR THE TEMPLE!

When Josiah became king of Judah at the age of eight, who could have predicted that this boy would prove to be one of Judah's greatest kings? His great grandfather had been the beloved Hezekiah, but his grandfather Manasseh had been one of Judah's worst kings, and his father Amon was also a disaster. The nation was headed downhill. How could this mere child halt this downward slide?

At the age of 18 Josiah made a momentous decision when he decided to have repaired the temple which had fallen into disrepair and decay

during the idolatrous times of his father and grandfather. This decision itself was hardly an act of piety on his part, but it was a first step that started the young king in the right direction. He realized that his people needed the temple worship that had fallen into disuse in the past two reigns.

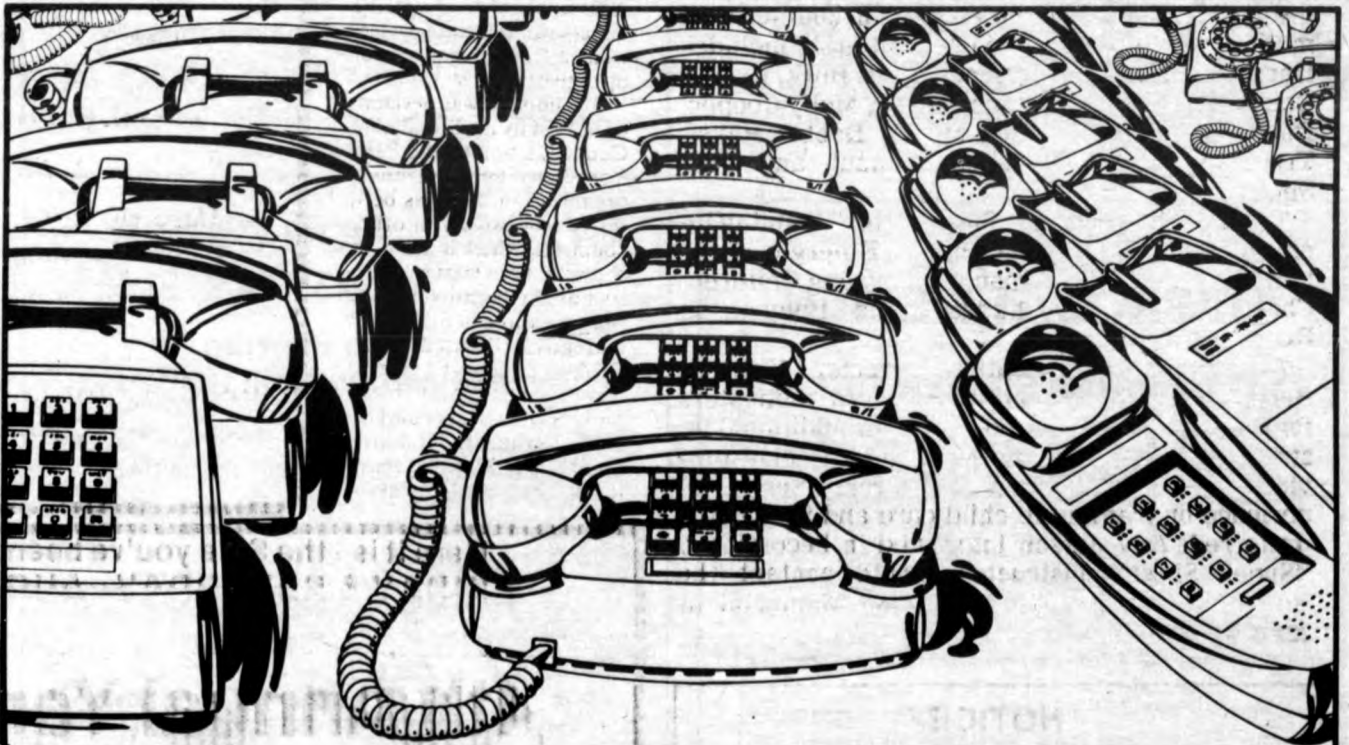
Furthermore, because Josiah made this decision to repair the temple, his life moved into a whole new level of spiritual growth. For, during the repair of the temple, Hilkiah the priest found an ancient scroll upon which was discovered the Deuteronomic law that apparently the people of Judah had forgotten.

### HEART AND SOUL

At this point in his life, the young king made another dramatic leap forward in his spiritual growth. Gathering the people of Judah together in Jerusalem, Josiah read the book and took the lead for his people by personally renewing the covenant that his forefathers had made with the Lord. He and his people joined together in pledging themselves to live by the book and the commandments of God.

It had all started with a decision to repair the temple. And each time Josiah took a step deeper into his own path of spiritual growth and development,

#### Contraceptive Implant

The University of California's San Francisco General Hospital has begun clinical trials of a new hormonal contraceptive, implanted in capsules under the skin of the upper arm, that may protect women from pregnancy for up to five years.

The implant was developed in 1974 by the Population Council, a non-profit, New York-based family planning organization, and has been tested extensively in other countries, where it has been shown to be at least as effective as birth control pills. Manufactured in Finland, it currently is licensed by the FDA as an investigational new drug and is available in the U.S. at two other medical centers: the University of Southern California, where it has been used for eight

years, and at Rutgers University which, like SFGH, is just beginning to offer the product.

## Farm labor statistics

The farmer labors from dawn to dusk to produce food for the American public. But how much of the family food bill actually goes to the farmer and how much is taken by others between the field and the grocery?

A pound of beef that sells for \$2.39 at the supermarket brings the cattleman \$1.38, according to Michigan Farmer magazine. Likewise, a pound of pork retailing for \$1.52 will earn the farmer who produced it 70 cents.

Milk selling for \$2.23 a gallon realizes the dairyman \$1.24 and a dozen eggs going for 91 cents earns the chicken farmer 56 cents. But those are the items where the farmer makes out best. The loaf of white bread that sells for 53 cents earns the wheat farmer just over a nickel. A pound of tomatoes selling at 50 cents will make the retailer more money—about seven cents—than it does the farmer who produced it. The farmer will get less than five cents.

There is more money spent in trucking a head of lettuce from field to shop than there is to the farmer who plows, plants and grows the crop. A head of lettuce is worth about 4.3 cents in the field. Inter-city transportation costs 8.5 cents per head.

## Substance programs relocated

The Clinton-Eaton-Ingham Community Mental Health Board has announced that two components of the Board's Comprehensive Substance Abuse Treatment Programs, the Westside Crisis and Counseling Center and the New Birth Center, have relocated to 808 Southland, Lansing 48910. The two components have now been consolidated and will operate as a single unit of the Comprehensive Substance Abuse Treatment Programs. The new component has been renamed and will be known as Southland Counseling Center.

The services, outpatient drug-free counseling and outpatient methadone maintenance, will remain the same as those previously provided at Westside Crisis and Counseling Center and the New Birth Center, respectively. # 1984-85 ST. JOHNS BUS ROUTE INFORMATION

The bus routes for the 1984-85 school year are designed to accommodate as many families as possible; however, as in the past, some families will find it necessary to get their students to a designated bus stop, if they live within a 1/2 mile of a main route of travel. Notices will be sent to those families where a bus doesn't travel by their home. If you do not receive a letter and, in reading the routes, you find the bus doesn't pass your house, call 224-7510 for information.

Your bus driver will also be combining bus stops that are located close to each other during the first week of school to reduce the number of stops. Other stops will be changed where an approaching vehicle does not have clear visibility of the entire school bus for a distance of 400 feet (state law).

All bus routes reflect the intent of the rules and regulations of the State of Michigan regarding the transportation of students.
